Airport

Departure: Arriving at Adelaide Airport

- Families meet tour staff in Airport lobby
- Students given boarding passes to check in bas and proceed to to bag drop
- Staff collect boarding passes from students
- Parents to farewell students before the boys move through security with teachers
- Duty of care begins at security gates

Arriving Home

- Parents to collect students from arrival gate
- Students and parents to move to baggage collect baggage.
- Students **must report to their teacher** with their parent to be signed off before leaving the Airport



What to Wear

Accommodation

We will be staying at The Capital Airport Motel

Located in Queanbeyan. Situated just a 7minute drive from Canberra Airport, the Motel features 65 rooms spread throughout a unique indoor atrium.



Dorms

Packing List

Medication

All additional personal medication is to be clearly named and accompanied by written instructions stating how and when the medication is to be taken. Medication requirements must be written on the student's medical/health forms.

Mount Ainslie

The International Flag Display consists of 110 flags in total, representing 108 Missions that have a diplomatic presence as well as flags for the European Union and the United Nations.




Questacon

Engage with science in extraordinary ways with interactive exhibits throughout Questacon galleries, as well as foyer and outdoor Science Garden experiences.



Bike Ride Lake Burley Griffin

Lake Burley Griffin is a shallow lake occupying a large section of Canberra. On this ride, the students will have the opportunity to see some of the sights such as the Carillon and take in the fresh air.



High Court of Australia Guided Tour

One of Canberra's major tourist attractions with four main elements: a large public hall, three courtrooms, an administrative wing, and Justices' chambers.



National Gallery of Australia

Embassy Drive

National Capital Exhibition (ANZAC Parade)

Guided through four of the significant military memorials along Anzac Parade, students will interact with the sculptures, find their meaning and explore their connection with the design of Canberra.




Parliament House

A one-hour comprehensive guided tour including the House of **Representatives and Senate** chambers and Parliamentary exhibits. A hands-on experience of how our Parliament works to make Australia a better place to live. Roleplay by debating a bill in the House of Representatives or Senate or conducting a committee of inquiry.



Australian War Memorial

Visit the War Memorial for a guided tour and learn about our rich history and pay tribute to those who have served us. Boys will be present for last post.



National Electoral Education Centre

Suitable for students of all levels, this program explores key concepts of representation and voting. Experience the preferential voting system in action by participating in a House of Representatives election scenario.



Museum of Australian Democracy – Old Parliament House

Learn about active citizenship and how change is made in Australia's democracy. Investigate parliamentary roles within an historic chamber and discover how young people can have their voices heard.



Australian Institute of Sport

Groups enjoy a 60- minute session in the interactive sports exhibit set among a unique collection of Australian sporting memorabilia.



Royal Australian Mint

The groups participate in a guided tour of the mint and learn about the history of our currency and how it is produced.



Zone Bowling

Here the boys will enjoy some down time with their friends and play some games of bowling to round out one of our many busy days.



Power Kart Raceway

The boys will be able to put their competitive spirit to the test and enjoys gokarting and mini golf.



Dinner at RSL

The boys will enjoy a dinner with their peers at the RSL near the airport as a way to round out their trip as a cohort.
