Headmaster's Report



It was a Sunday morning on the weekend of the Vailo 500 car race that I came into my office and looked over the rows and rows of Prince Alfred College Chronicles, as well as yearbooks I've collected at previous schools I've worked at. Before I started to write the introduction to the 2024 Chronicle, I pulled down the 1940 edition. As I turned the pages, I could see the same fig trees that adorn the front of our school today, and boys who were part of cricket,

debating, and football teams – much like you would if you opened up this year and last year's Chronicle. Their faces were determined and their eyes told stories of harder times. Perhaps they were worried about what the future held for them. Sadly, many of the boys from the Chronicle of 1940 would lose their lives fighting for their King and Country.

Perhaps in 100 years from now people will pull out the 2024 Chronicle. A great grandson or daughter will look for photos of their great grandpa and wonder what school and life was like for them.

Let it be known then that the 2024 school year was an excellent year despite the ongoing instability and fighting in the Middle East and in Ukraine. Our students were fortunate to live in a prosperous and stable country and city. For them, there were many highs and quite naturally a few lows, and there was much for our community to feel collectively proud of. For instance, our boys' conduct and performance across the summer and winter Intercols was exceptional, and there was a surge in drama and music participation.

In June, the College Council launched our 2025-2028 Strategic Plan. The Strategic Plan development included the collective work of the Executive and Council, as well as considerable consultation with our student, staff and parent community. A key addition to this was a vision statement and the articulation of the values that have always been part of who we are.

Our Vision: *To be the leading educator of boys with exceptional people, programs and facilities.*

Our Purpose: *We nurture each boy to develop into well-rounded young men of good character, who are prepared to contribute positively to society.*

In Term 2, the Year 12 Learning Commons opened in the lower level of our Main Building in a space that has had many lives; at one point it had been the Boarders Dining room. Our Year 12s quickly settled into good routines within this space, and they appreciated the access to the new kitchen.

A key area of focus remains the development of opportunities for every boy within the College's academic and co-curricular programs. We continue to focus on the development of well-rounded students, but at the core remains the expectation and delivery of academic rigor

across the College. You will note that one of our values is 'Excellence', yet it is each boys' individual excellence, which may be in the English classroom or in the Technology workshop. The introduction of professional learning for explicit, direct instruction in the Preparatory School as well as the staff coaching pilot through Steplab were both excellent initiatives that will continue into 2025.

In 2024 we welcomed to the College, Mr Jon Gelsthorpe our new Deputy Headmaster/Head of the Preparatory School. Mr Gelsthorpe hails from England, via Pembroke School and most recently St Peter's College where he was the Deputy Head of their Preparatory School and Head of Teaching and Learning. We also welcomed Mrs Sarah Onions as the new Director of Admissions. We farewelled the Deputy Headmaster and Head of the Secondary School, Mr Greg Atterton who has been appointed to Pulteney Grammar as their new Principal. We thank Mr Atterton for his four years of exceptional service and congratulate him on a well-deserved headship. Departing us in October of 2024 was the Director of People and Culture Mrs Elizabeth Tyson who is re-entering the corporate world. Mrs Tyson has done an excellent job over seven years and has mentored our People and Culture Advisor, Angela Rankine, who has been appointed the new Director of People and Culture.

The class of 2024 and their teachers should feel immensely proud of their academic achievements. The Class of 2024's Median ATAR was 87.96. 23% were above 95 and 43% scored above 90. Our large International Baccalaureate Diploma Program cohort had a great year, with a Median score of 35.5 which equates to an ATAR of 90.25. Congratulations to the students who obtained 81 merits between them in 2024 and to the students who scored between them, 13 High Distinctions in their University of Adelaide and University of South Australia Headstart subjects.



Our enrolment numbers have remained steady with 1,163 students enrolled from Reception – Year 12 at the conclusion of the 2024 academic year. Our Boarding house is also at capacity with 154 boarders in residence through the year with the villas being used for the increased numbers.

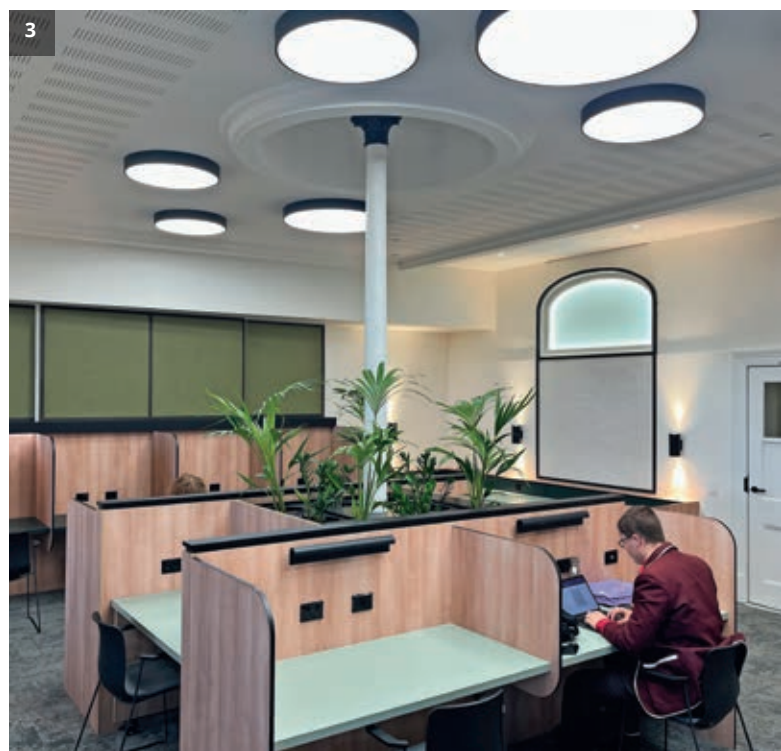
At the conclusion of the 2024 school year parts of the Robertson buildings in the Preparatory School will be demolished and building will commence in January 2025. We have been working with architects Walter Brooke & Assoc. and we have appointed the builder, Marshall & Brougham.

I would like to acknowledge and thank the College Council members for their dedication as 2024 saw the delivery of a new Master Plan and Strategic Plan which required their commitment for the successful delivery of these projects. Our Council Chair, Mr Richard Hockney steps down at the end of 2024, but will remain on the Nominations Committee and the Endowment Fund as well as taking on the role of Chair of the Capital Campaign Committee. We are grateful for his dedicated service and the passion and care he continues to show for Prince Alfred College.

Our Secondary School leaders Max Whittle (College Captain), Thomas Henchcliffe and Tom Turnbull (Vice-Captains) and the Preparatory leaders Sam Rayner (Captain) and Henry Stirling (Vice-Captain) were exceptional role models, and we thank them for their leadership throughout the year.

Finally, we would like to express our thanks to the Executive and all the staff for their efforts and dedication throughout 2024, as well as the parents, friends, Old Scholars, and supporters who have contributed so much to the College community.

Preparatory School Report



2024 has been an incredibly exciting year in the Preparatory School. I am filled with immense pride, joy and gratitude for all that we, as a school – students, teachers and parents – have achieved together this year. Every year in a school is a journey, and this one has been no exception. Together, we have faced challenges, celebrated achievements, and created memories that will last a lifetime.

This year has seen the development of a boldly ambitious College Strategic Plan. In this plan, we have shared our College-wide Values. In doing this, our boys in the Preparatory School are starting to use the language of Respect, Excellence, Belonging and Endeavour.

Our Values, along with our College Purpose *'We nurture each boy to develop into well-rounded young men of good character, who are prepared to contribute positively to society'*, provide an articulation and understanding for boys in the Preparatory School.

As we *'...nurture each boy to develop into well-rounded young men of good character...'*, there has been a metaphor that has resonated with boys in the Preparatory School – The Iceberg. While what we see of an iceberg is impressive and beautiful, this is only part of an iceberg and what is above the surface. Deep below every iceberg is a foundation of ice that provides stability and support, yet we do not ever see this. This has become a well-versed metaphor for success. While people might see the awards and accolades that we achieve, they do not see all the hard work that has gone into getting us there – the foundation that lies below the surface. Whether this be run training on a cold winter's morning, instrument practice, or learning times tables, this metaphor resonates - to achieve success requires foundational work. This metaphor is developing character in our boys that will serve them throughout their lives, far beyond the walls of Prince Alfred College; and this is part of our Mantra: Work Hard, Be Kind.

This year has seen the Preparatory School focus on implementing a different approach to teaching and learning - explicit direct instruction. This approach, while some may see as traditional, moves the role of the teacher back to explicitly teaching students. For context, teaching practice can be seen as a continuum. At the extreme left is a laissez-faire approach where children explore and naturally construct understanding, at the extreme right is a dogmatic memorisation and recitation. As a school, we have questioned, researched, and reflected upon teaching and have made the informed decision to move our practice from left of centre on the continuum, to the right. This is already reaping rewards for our students.

There are many academic competitions that students are able to compete in; competitions that remove all constraints and appropriately challenge our students to push themselves beyond their current boundaries and compete on a national or international stage. Some of these are APSMO Olympiad, AMC (Australian Maths Competition) and ICAS (International Competition & Assessments) which has competitions across six subjects. It has been pleasing for our students that the number of Distinctions (top 10%) and High Distinctions (top 1%) in these competitions has risen this year. For the first time, we have also received multiple ICAS Medals, awarded to the highest score in the state.

Our Preparatory students won the Independent Primary Schools Poetry Competition in Years 4, 5 and 6; and also won the Independent Primary Schools Oratory Competition in Year 5. Winning one of these awards is a huge achievement; winning four of the five awards has never been achieved before by any school. Our Preparatory students also won the International Ethics Olympiad – a true sign of a well-rounded young man – and our Preparatory School Debating team are the State Champions. Academic competitions are a place for boys to experience success and we are incredibly proud of what they have achieved this year.

This academic success is not just for the few. Our NAPLAN results this year have shown a marked increase across all domains. We are incredibly pleased with the fact that we can see all our students are making significant gains in their academic development. Our Year 3 results were the third highest in South Australia and we hope to see this upward trend continue across age groups and disciplines into the future.

It has been wonderful to see that our boys have performed at the highest levels in the sporting arenas. Whether this be National, State, District, or our House events. We have seen our boys work hard to push themselves and break personal, and benchmarked, records.

The arts have allowed our boys to flourish. The repertoire of musical experiences continues to develop and broaden. Our Prep School Concert Band is a significant experience that allows boys to play at a high level before joining further bands in the Middle and Senior Schools. This Concert Band performed at ABODA this year and achieved a Silver placing. Our Voice program has continued to thrive, and boys are confident singing in front of hundreds of people.

It is wonderful to see all of our boys getting the opportunity to find their niche, whether this be academic, sporting, or artistic. This happens because our dedicated staff provide a breadth of high-quality experiences for boys to enjoy as they develop into well-rounded young men.

The journey starts in ELC where our boys (and girls) have continued to have an outstanding experience. Our ELC is a leading example of practice across South Australia where others seek to learn from. The fine balance of structure and exploration, coated with a layer of a love, is part of what makes our youngest students' experience enviable to all.

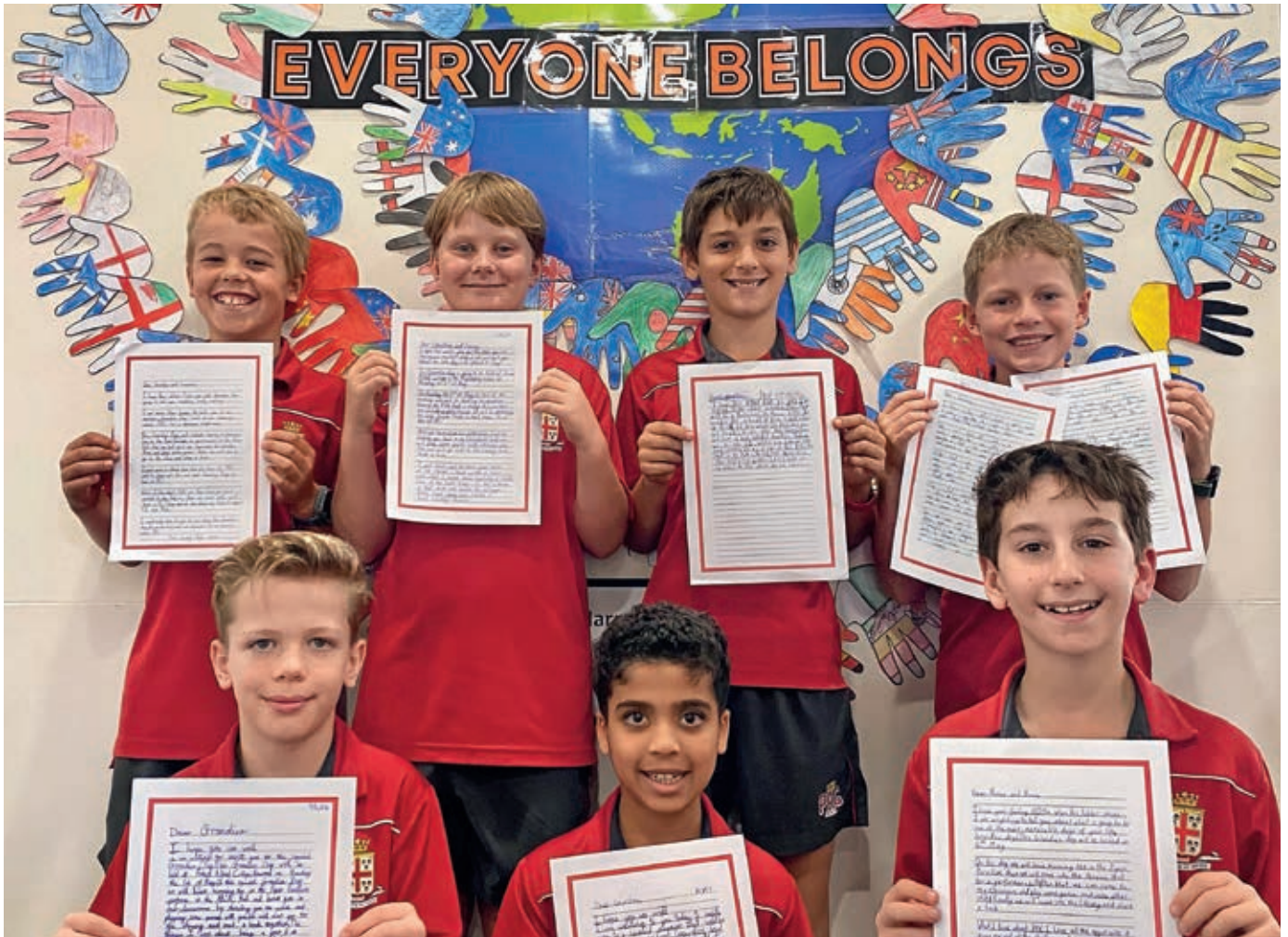
There are three significant staff farewells that we make this year. While it is sad that they are leaving us, each one of them will explore new horizons, which we will celebrate with them.

Secondary School Report



The 2024 academic year has, in many ways, been a mix of new beginnings, and a continued commitment to age old traditions and rituals that make the Prince Alfred college experience a unique one. As you make your way through the Secondary School pages of the Chronicle you will quickly learn that this year has been much more than a collection of photos and words; it's a celebration of the friendships we have formed, the lessons we have learned and the

memories that will last with us for many years. From classrooms to sports fields, from concerts to school trips, every moment has contributed to the unique story of our Secondary School.

PAC has a long history of strength in being a place of great belonging. Boys who have long ago become men still have undeniable connection and belonging to our great school. The traditions of the College have always been safeguarded by strong connection and this has included, over many years, a strong identity with House. This year we launched a new system of pastoral care; one with a strengthened focus on House and the opportunities for mentorship and belonging; a strengthened Princes Man Program, more opportunities to serve our community and build connections outside the gates of PAC, and further opportunities for students to demonstrate genuine leadership. We essentially 'supercharged' our four Houses and have been fanatical about providing opportunities for belonging, connection and identity, as well as meaningful service and leadership. There has been a resurgence of House activity and House spirit throughout the year, and it has been heart-warming to see how staff and students have embraced the new system.

Year 8 student, William Katdare, I think best sums up the benefits we have seen from our re-energised focus on House in his following comments, *"Belonging is the essence of our school culture, and it's at the heart of our new pastoral care initiatives. It's about nurturing relationships and friendships, which are foundational to our experience at PAC. Whether it's through school sports, co-curricular activities, or just sharing a laugh with friends, the relationships we build here shape who we become. As we continue to strengthen our House culture, foster meaningful relationships, and embrace opportunities for student involvement, we are building a community where everyone can thrive."*

Our Year 12 students also took advantage of the newly refurbished Learning Commons with many students choosing to attend Extended Study on Monday and Thursday evening, staying at school until 8:30pm to make the most of their independent study and revision time. Working hard and showing endeavour in their learning is what all our students should do, and it was pleasing to see our Year 12 boys leading from the front in this regard.

Our student achievements in national English, Mathematics and Science competitions continued to be of a very high standard while

students in Year 8 thoroughly enjoyed EduKart, Educook and Adelaide week opportunities in their House groups. The Year 9 Wambana program continued its success, with all boys making the most of this experience, from enjoying the sail across to Yorke Peninsula, the mountain bike adventure, the chance to share a Wardli with new friends, engaging in a range of service-learning activities or making the most of fitness and aquatic pursuits. Through this flagship program, all have learnt a great deal about others and themselves.

Music at the College continues to flourish. The 'Music Royalty' concert was a memorable occasion which showcased our students' exceptional talent and enthusiasm, combined with our very special guest, on the night, Mr Jackie Barnes, son of famous rocker Jimmy Barnes, who provided wonderful mentoring to our budding musicians. Excellence was also on display in Term 3 as our Year 11 drama students put on a moving and impactful piece of physical theatre titled, 'Dance of the Machines'. The piece explored the conflict between humans and technology in a show that was unlike any other the College has produced. All those who saw the performance were blown away by our students powerful acting and disciplined study of Japanese Bhuto.

Students continued to serve our community through range of service-learning activities in 2024. This included the rehabilitation of the environment through the Forktree Project, regular meal service at the Mary Magdalene Centre and our Year 10s supporting students with special needs at Outreach Camp. The students who volunteered for these activities developed a respect for the challenges our society faces, as well as an appreciation for how we can make a positive difference to the world around us. Once again, the PAC community rallied in support of the Childhood Cancer Association (CCA). With another ambitious target to raise \$50,000, our College Prefects set to work in organising many fundraising initiatives. Our students and staff demonstrated a strong commitment to helping those in need, coming together to show what a difference we can make to children who need vital support after receiving a childhood cancer diagnosis. As a result of their efforts, PAC easily surpassed its \$50,000 target for the Childhood Cancer Association, truly making a difference in the lives of those facing a time of challenge and uncertainty. Service-learning will continue to grow in 2025 with the appointment of a new Service-Learning Coordinator position. This role will facilitate opportunities for all students in the Secondary School to serve others and our community. As a College we are committed to making a difference to the world beyond our gates.

On Anzac Day and Remembrance Day we joined together to show our respect for the sacrifices made by past students and staff. Our Field of Remembrance provided the opportunity to acknowledge those who died as a consequence of war and was a moving demonstration of our connection to the armed forces and the selfless contributions of PAC students and staff over our College's history.

The annual Boarders' Week was a fun and much anticipated event on the College calendar which included the Young Boarders' Challenge, Boarders' Assembly, Boarders' Herald, and the much-loved Rushton

Cup football match played on the Front Oval at lunch time so that all could watch. Boarding at PAC is a thriving metropolis which saw 154 boarders enjoy the support of their peers, make the most of service and co-curricular activities and contribute positively to a strong sense of community. Our thanks extend to Mr Phil Noble, Mr William Mercer and to all our boarding staff for their outstanding efforts, and to Ms Mani White for supporting our international boys.

During the year, we have embraced the cultural messages shared at assemblies, learning the importance of supporting others and striving to make a difference in our community. These lessons, woven into the fabric of PAC life, remind us that our actions contribute to something enduring and meaningful, and we take great pride in being part of something far greater than ourselves.

Our time at PAC, as proud members of the 'Reds', should be defined by the values that make our school truly special - Respect, Endeavour, Excellence, and a strong sense of Belonging. For me, to be a 'Red' is to belong, to support one another, and to strive for excellence in all we do.

Over the past four years I have enjoyed the privilege of getting to know the PAC community and have had the honour of working alongside our students who make an extraordinary contribution to the life of our school. Academic Report



The 2024 cohort built momentum strongly throughout year and delivered a median (midpoint) of 87.96. Overall, these were historically amongst our best results and a wonderful follow up to our exceptional results in 2023.

Excellence was seen across both SACE and the IB Diploma in a wide range of subjects, with 70 merits achieved by students, along with 13 University HDs (via the University of

Adelaide Headstart program, Flinders University Extension Studies and University of South Australia). In short, we can be confident students can excel and prepare for university study in both of our Year 12 academic pathways.

Michael Cook was awarded the Thomas Elder Prize Dux of School, achieving an ATAR of 99.90. He achieved merits in , Mathematical Methods, Specialist Mathematics and Physics, High Distinctions in Programming and Object Orientated Programming (University of Adelaide). Michael will study Advanced Computer Science at the University of Adelaide.

Jesse Rothgrew was awarded the E B Colton Prize (Proxime Accessit to Dux of School) with an ATAR of 99.90, with subject merits in subject Merits in English, General Mathematics and High Distinctions in Human Anatomy and Physiology and Introduction to Forensic Science (University of Adelaide). He will now take up a place to study Medicine at Griffith University.

At the Emeritus Assembly, Dux, Michael Cook gave the boys some great advice for their academic journey including the importance of keeping things simple, enjoying the learning process and remaining balanced. He finished his speech by noting that,

"The most vital thing I will take away is the necessity of ambition. It took time for me to actually set ambitious goals in Year 12 as it takes courage. You put yourself in a vulnerable position of potential disappointment. However, being ambitious is certain to extend you further than expected and is simply making the most out of your time at the college."

We wish all of 2024's leavers the very best for future endeavours.

Our NAPLAN results were again sound and there was clear evidence of the positive impact of our curriculum development in this area which we are confident will result in further growth during the coming years. There were pleasing gains made in Year 3 and 5 under the leadership of Mr Jon Gelsthorpe and Mrs Lisa Clemente and we look forward to more as the explicit direct instruction pedagogical model is embedded.

It was also exciting to see Prince Alfred College for the first time crowned the top school in the state in NAPLAN – mathematics. NAPLAN data across Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 continues to provide meaningful, important results that offer a point of valid reflection for our teachers and boys. We know growth in English and Maths proficiency is crucial to academic progress.

Our commitment to reading for pleasure and its clear academic benefits remains steadfast. Our Reading Program thrived in the new timetable with a number of new, exciting titles and resources added. This was complemented by excellent participation in the Premier's Reading Challenge. Additionally it was great to see the successful

implementation of the Wambana Reading Project in which boys at Wambana and teachers exchange letters about the books they are reading. Reading is both a pleasure and an important foundation for academic achievement, and we look forward to building further momentum in 2025.

Academic Extension took on a number of new themes in 2024 with Mr Scott Parker, Dr Di Hu and Ms Rebecca Hassam bringing fascinating perspectives on topics outside of our taught curriculum on topics like, Gelato: Its history, The Golden Age of Silent Films (1894 – 1924), Climate change and sustainable building, Future of architecture, Forensic science - Crime scene, Victims and suspects, Fakes and extortions.

2024 was an exciting time in the Preparatory School as the shift to an explicit direct instruction pedagogical model was implemented. This was accompanied by a timetable that provides more curriculum time in English and Mathematics along with greater freedom to develop our teaching programs in line with best practice in boys' education. This was complemented by purposeful, informed knowledge-rich inquiry experiences, most notably in a newly established learning area of Science, Technology and Robotics.

In our academic programs, there have been a number of exciting competition performances and developments.

Our academic culture fosters deep thinkers and this was evident in 2024. Notably, it was exciting to see our Year 9's win the Da Vinci Decathlon state title and competed strongly in the national final held in Sydney. While it was wonderful to see Princes awarded the gold medal SA Senior School Ethics Olympiad and then represent South Australia in the International Senior School Ethics Olympiad, a prestigious event in which 330 schools worldwide compete.

Our Prep and Secondary students continued to have great success across a range of competitions in Mathematics. Here, it was particularly exciting to see the Co-curricular Mathematics thriving on Sundays under the stewardship of our Co-ordinator in Mathematics: Non-routine problem solving and experiences, Ms Marta Matthews, with the support of Ms Tayla Harradine. The innovative 'Maths Battles' were a great success and we look forward to the expansion of this concept in 2025, along with the ongoing roll out of the X Mathematics curriculum. These offerings are critical to ensuring that our talented and passionate mathematicians have every opportunity to thrive.

In Science there was a continuation of its strong tradition of success, and there were many great results in the National Titration Competition, Australian Science Olympiad and Australian Science Innovations 'Big Science' Competition and Oliphant Awards. The Science Journal was an exceptional publication in 2024, with the standard of articles reaching a new high under the leadership of Mr Peter Hopkins and student editor, Caleb Tang. Similarly, there were several strong results in the field of Humanities competitions such as the Australian History Competition and Australian National Geography Competition.

The 2024 Shades of Red Journal again reflected the high quality of student literary work while the Year 10 Poetry Slam has become a highlight of the year, showcasing the boys' insightful thinking, creativity and performance skills.

Overall, 2024 was an excellent year and we have much to look forward to in 2025.

Later in the term, we saw the culmination of our rowers' tireless efforts throughout the season with the annual 'Head of the River.' It was a day that saw many of our crews achieve remarkable results, including our 1st VIII crew who narrowly finished 2nd in a nail-biting race. In shallower water, we saw a great turnout of students who came to support our rowers regardless of the result – giving our 1st VIII an emotional ovation as they carried their boat ashore. This fantastic day was followed by our Summer Intercollegiate series, hosted here at the College. This week of sport saw a multitude of remarkable performances on the field, accompanied by the support of students all across the College, such as Yarra Mickan and Jared Kuhl's crucial 10th wicket partnership in the cricket and Sam Ciccocioppo leading his water polo side to a dominant victory. Ultimately, the week ended with a final score of 4 – 4; St Peter's College taking swimming, rowing, badminton, and volleyball; PAC taking tennis, water polo, sailing, and cricket.

The year also saw the reinvigoration of our College's House System, with a new pastoral structure and emphasis on House sport and events. This new House System facilitated mentorship and the formation of inter year-level connections through House locker areas. It also resulted in increased participation during our House Swimming Carnival and Athletics Carnival. The College-wide reception towards these changes was extremely positive, facilitated by the hard work of the Heads of House and House Prefects.

In 2024, the College continued to foster our relationship with the Childhood Cancer Association (CCA), setting an ambitious goal of \$50,000. Through the tireless work of the Prefect's 'service portfolio'

Student participation across the year levels in the leading of these services has been a feature. The ambience of the church itself has contributed to the gatherings providing an opportunity to pause and reflect on the values-inspired messages in a sacred space, away from the familiar hustle and bustle of school classrooms, corridors and routine.

I had to scoop it up (the paper pulp), and the roller got out the water. **Blake Johnson**

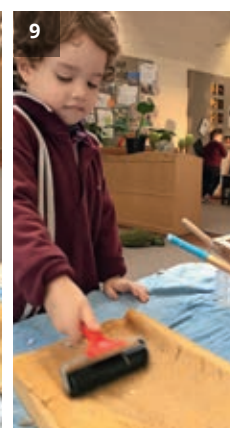
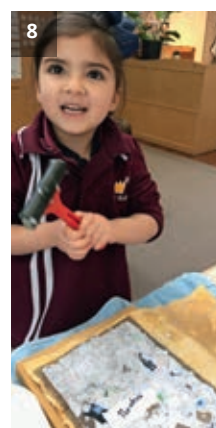
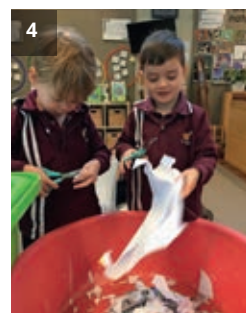

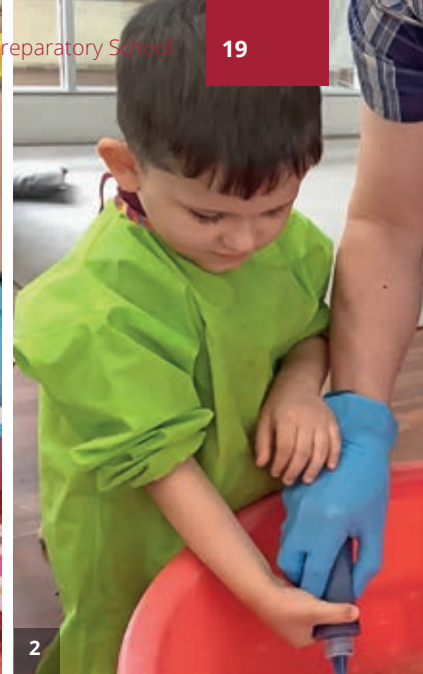

Langley Classroom

Across the year, the Langley children have been enthusiastic builders, using a range of loose parts and construction materials to create with. To challenge the children's ideas and thinking, they have been offered unusual shaped pieces, including loose parts and recycled materials, that need considered thought to get them to balance and to create a stable structure. This has required the children to think creatively, reflect on their work and problem solve. They have shown determination and resilience through this play, trying out new ideas and not giving up when their first attempts are not successful. The children have been working both individually and in small groups as they create in the construction zone, providing them with opportunities to encounter and engage with peers, share resources and materials and share knowledge and understandings. This work has inspired play and conversations where our youngest learners have been exploring mathematical concepts and using mathematical language around shape, measurement and size.

As an ELC staff team, we have been exploring and challenging our thinking around the use of technology in the classroom. As part of this research, the children have been offered the opportunity to document their own work, photographing their completed structures. These images have been collated in a book to allow the children to revisit their work at another time or use other's work as inspiration for their own creations.

Mattingley Classroom

Throughout the year, The Mattingley Classroom has engaged in learning about identity, communication, emotions and the natural world. The children presented their learning through a variety of media and particularly enjoyed putting their ideas and creative flair into their Claymation animation movie – *Silly Santa*. This project stemmed from the children's interest in classic fairy tales such as *Jack and the Beanstalk* and books like *The Gruffalo* by Julia Donaldson. A group of children came up with the idea to create a book of their own and thus *Silly Santa* was born. Once we had created the book, we explored ways to bring the story to life so that it could be accessible to those who might not be able to read independently. We spent the remainder of the term working on turning our book into a movie using a mixture of Claymation, music and voice so we were able to present it to the remaining ELC classrooms to finish off the term.

The Mattingley children became very engaged in both the bookmaking and moviemaking processes. Throughout the project, multiple entry points were provided to children. For example, some children made the background, some created the clay characters and some added their voices to the story. The end product was an excellent representation of the power of imagination as a tool for learning and a showcase of teamwork and class collaboration.

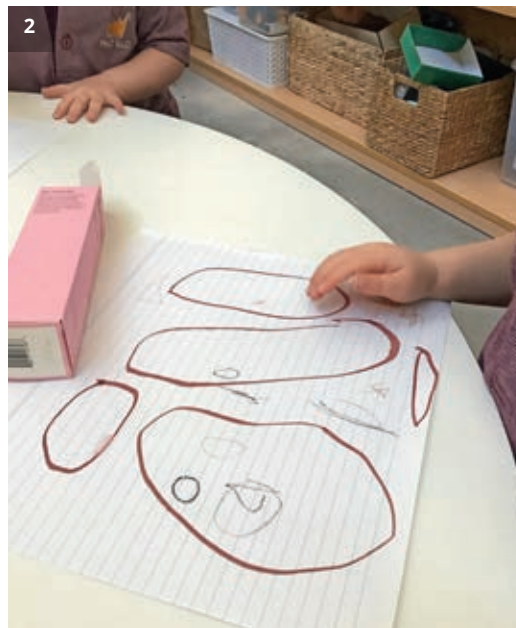

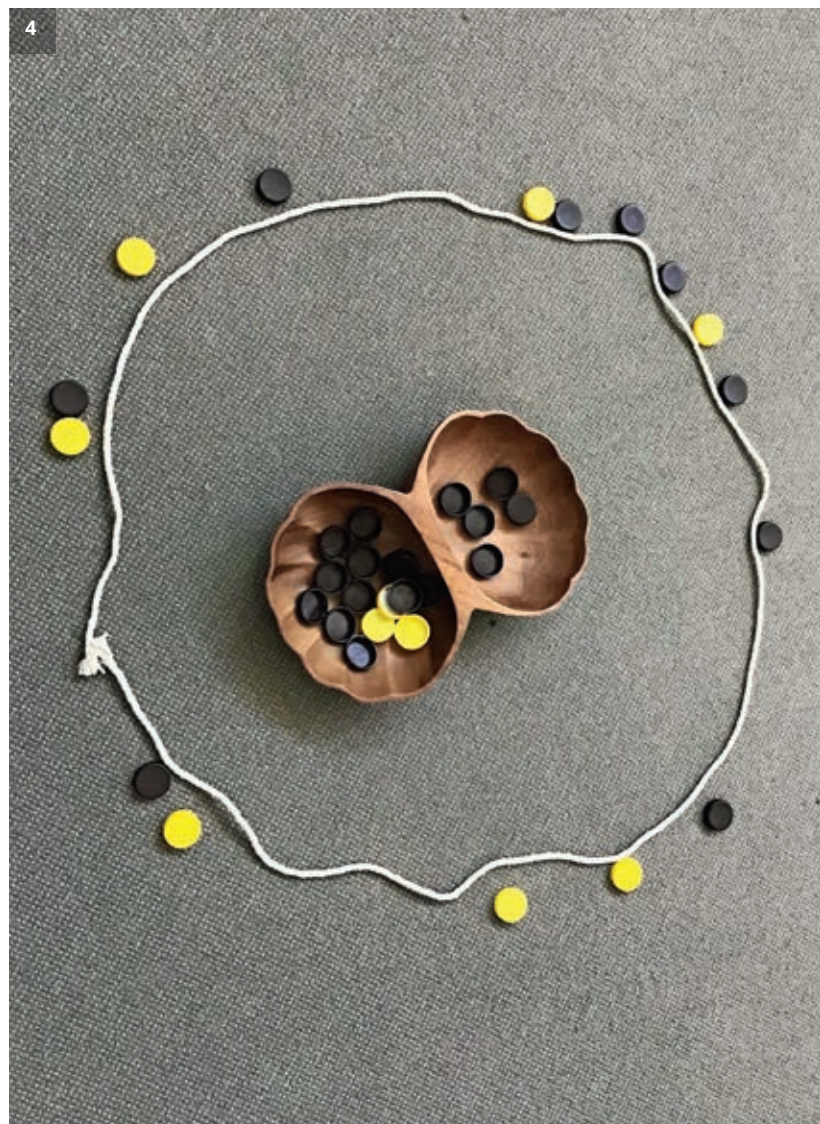

Preparatory School Captain 2024



"We do not learn from experience... we learn from reflecting on experience."

This is a quote from the American philosopher John Dewey. While activities like reviewing a book, recounting a camp trip, or reporting on a school project, might seem boring, these tasks are essential for improvement, growth, and wisdom—and can set the foundation for an amazing year ahead.

At the start of this year, I highlighted the opportunities available to us as Princes Men. Today, as my classmates and I conclude our time in the Preparatory School and move into the Senior School, I want to consider the other side of the coin: reflection.

2024 has certainly been a busy and eventful year packed full of events such as the Swimming Carnival, Cross Country, Sports Day, poetry and speech competitions, and co-curricular activities like football, cricket, soccer, and chess. I don't intend to list everything we've accomplished, but instead, I'd like to focus on *how* we have done it.

In life, opportunities are always presented to us, but it's not just about seizing them, it's about reflecting on our experiences. Reflection helps us understand how far we've come, and it deepens our appreciation of the journey that led to our achievements. For example, this year I joined the school band. At first, I was nervous because I was relatively new to the saxophone and couldn't read sheet music. But through struggle and persistence, I've learned to read music, play multiple pieces, and perform in front of an audience. I am still a work in progress when it comes to performing. However, reflecting on how far I've come, I take pride in my progress. I can now say, "I'm going to play that piece. I'm going to do a solo. I'm going to learn more notes." Reflection builds self-esteem and gives us the fuel we need to reach higher next year.

The value of reflection is not just about appreciating the end result; it's also about understanding the process behind it. I didn't learn to read sheet music from performing at concerts, but through practice at home, early band rehearsals, and working with my tutor. Reflection helps us value the effort and persistence that go into reaching our goals.

This leads me to the metaphor that is familiar with the boys who have sat in Anzac Hall every Friday - 'the iceberg'. The visible part of the iceberg—the success we see in academics, athletics, and other activities—is only the tip. Beneath the surface is all the hard work, practice, and "endeavour" that makes those achievements possible. Mr Gelsthorpe often reminds us of this iceberg, teaching us that reflecting on what lies beneath helps us gain wisdom and gratitude. When we reflect, we ask questions like, "What shot did I play to make that run?" or "What strategy did I use to capture the queen?" or "What technique did the author use to hook me into the story?" These reflections help us to improve and appreciate the effort behind our success.

Reflection also teaches us gratitude. One of the most significant moments this year was the Anzac Day Field of Remembrance Service. As part of the commemoration, Mr Roberts read the names of the 263 former PAC boys who died in World War I and II. Each man was honoured with a cross, and the senior school boys laid them out carefully in rows. Seeing our boys standing on the Front Oval representing each of the fallen soldiers was incredibly moving and caused us to reflect on all the young men and women who died in these wars and the stories of their lives. Their significance isn't in how they died, but in how they lived: their courage, selflessness, and fight for freedom. Reflection gives us a chance to be grateful for their sacrifices and consider what actions we can each take to help make the world a better place.

Returning to 'the iceberg' metaphor—our success this year could not have been achieved without the many people who form the large chunk of ice below our waterline. On behalf of all of the Preparatory School boys, I'd like to thank Mr Gelsthorpe, Mrs Howat, and Mr Shackleton for their brilliant leadership. I want to thank the teachers – classroom and specialist – for working tirelessly to give us the best possible educational experience. I also want to thank the parents and supporters for giving our boys the care they needed to grow and excel. I would like to thank Reverend Mark, who we are farewelling after fifteen years of outstanding service at the school, and Pastor Andrew, for their thoughtful and impactful chapel services. To our prefects and house captains, thank you for being outstanding role models and organising so many awesome events. I want to especially thank Henry Stirling, our Vice-Captain, for his inspirational leadership and friendship over this year. And finally, I'd like to thank every one of my fellow Preparatory School boys. While you may not always see it, your effort, kindness, and contributions have helped to make this year such a success, and served to deepen and strengthen what it means to be a Princes Man.

It has been an honour to serve you all as Captain of the Preparatory School in 2024. We're all entering new chapters in our lives—whether moving up in school or for some, leaving the Preparatory School behind. As we conclude our year, we have the chance to reflect on the amazing institution we've been part of—the Prince Alfred College Preparatory School. While we may not all have future classes here, this school has shaped who we are today. We reflect with thanks for the sacrifices and efforts of our teachers and parents. We reflect with gratitude for the friendships we've made that will last a lifetime. Until the day we die, we can all look in our hearts and reflect on the things we did at this school and how it has changed us because this incredible school will follow us wherever we go.

We look forward to seeing these boys continue to thrive next year and beyond, as we prepare to welcome a new cohort in Year One.



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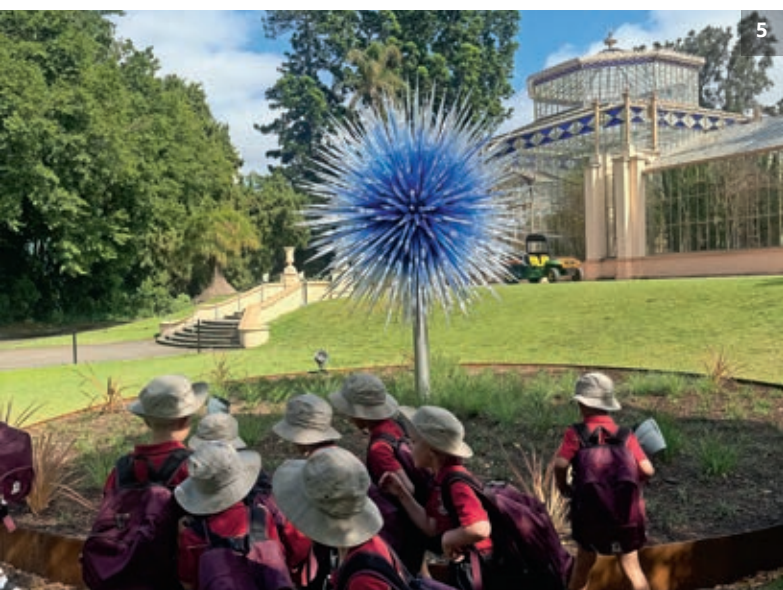

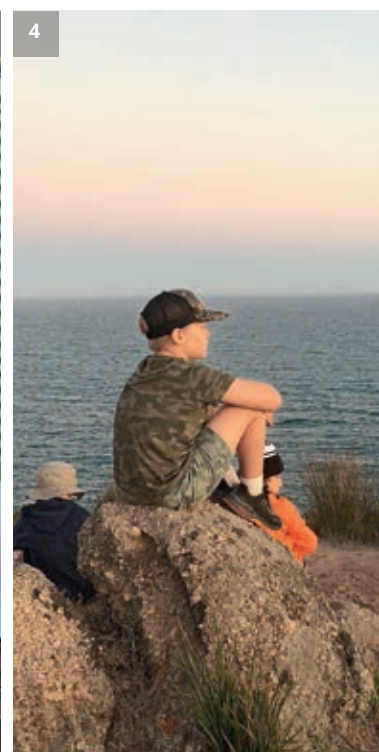

Student Success Team

One of the most powerful tools in education is the ability to identify and address targeted learning early on. Whether through extension and enrichment opportunities, EALD support or early intervention we ensure every boy has the opportunity for success. Early screening and targeted opportunities can make all the difference in a student's journey in not only their academic success, but wellbeing, confidence and self-belief. Knowing where each boy is at and where they are headed is vital in planning and implementing tools to ensure each boy can be his best.

Regular checks ensure that we can address needs early on, so growth excels for every student. Early screening tools and assessments give us insight into where students need additional support or opportunities for extension and enrichment. This may be in literacy, math, or socio-emotional development. Research consistently shows that the earlier we intervene, the more successful our students will be in the long run. More importantly, boys learn early that learning takes rigour and grit. Asking for help, having another go and trying again are all strategies we encourage. As we tailor our support from day one, we help navigate the twists and turns of each student's learning journey to ensure the end goal of success can and is achieved.

Assistance may include providing one-on-one support through our Morning Program, small group sessions in research-based interventions, or using targeted materials in classrooms. This year, it has been wonderful to see first-hand how these early steps help students catch up, build confidence, and stay engaged in their classroom learning both with support from the SST team but also our Year 11 tutors during the Morning Program.

Small group work allows for more individualised attention and gives students a chance to practice in a setting that feels less intimidating than whole-class instruction. It also allows us to address specific gaps in knowledge and provide opportunities for repetition to build strength that might not be as easy to identify during whole-group lessons.

Research tells us that boys thrive when they are provided with extension and challenge opportunities. The success of our extension and enrichment opportunities for all boys was seen in our recent Awards Assembly with awards being split over two assemblies due to the considerable amount of high achievement. Unfortunately, we were only able to publicly acknowledge the highest of achievers, however all boys who sat and participated in one or more of competitions should be proud to have been brave enough to place themselves on both national and international playing fields to compete against 'the best of the best'.

As we look to the year ahead, the variety of opportunities for every boy to be successful and achieve his best is making a real difference in the lives of our students. The real success is the students themselves, the willingness to ask for help, to be brave and have another go, to take risks and attempt new things and to strive to work hard and be kind, always.

EduKart

EduKart is an innovative educational program designed to engage Year 8 boys in hands-on learning through the building and refining of electric karts. Combining engineering, teamwork, and sustainability, this program provides an opportunity for students to develop technical skills while fostering creativity and collaboration.

Over one week, boys worked in small groups to assemble and improve their electric karts. Guided by experienced mentors, they were introduced to concepts such as electrical circuitry, mechanical engineering, mathematics and physics. The program emphasised observation, with students encouraged to test their karts and identify areas for improvement. This process not only honed their problem-solving abilities but also instilled resilience and a growth mindset as they navigated challenges.

One of the highlights of the program was the focus on sustainability, with students learning about the environmental benefits of electric vehicles. They explored the principles of energy efficiency and incorporated innovative solutions to optimize battery performance and reduce energy consumption.

Feedback from the boys was overwhelmingly positive, with many expressing pride in their accomplishments and a newfound interest in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics) fields. Mentors and parents noted the program's impact on developing critical skills such as teamwork, communication, and time management.

EduKart not only provided a memorable educational experience but also inspired a new generation to embrace sustainable technologies and engineering careers. It stands as a testament to the power of experiential learning in shaping confident, capable, and environmentally conscious young men.

One of the great things about being part of the Scotts Creek campus and team is the wide variety of programs and camps we get to be part of. Except for year 9, the Scotts Creek team work with PAC boys from Years 2 to 12. Whether it's an introductory night away from home on the Year 2 Zoo Snooze, a first challenge camp at Scotts Creek for Year 5, or supporting a year 12 Self Reliant bushwalk in Deep Creek, we get to make the most of what outdoor experiential learning can offer.

In addition to our year level camps, in 2024 the Scotts Creek campus also hosted the PAC rowing team, the school band on their Riverland tour of 'Music Royalty', and the newly elected College Captains and Prefects for a leadership development weekend.

Working with people with disabilities, kindy kids, environmental groups, progress associations and volunteer organisations, demonstrates that our motto of 'others before self' is recognised and appreciated. Developing short term goals and a training program that is incremental helps to set up our boys for success. This year was a particularly challenging year. 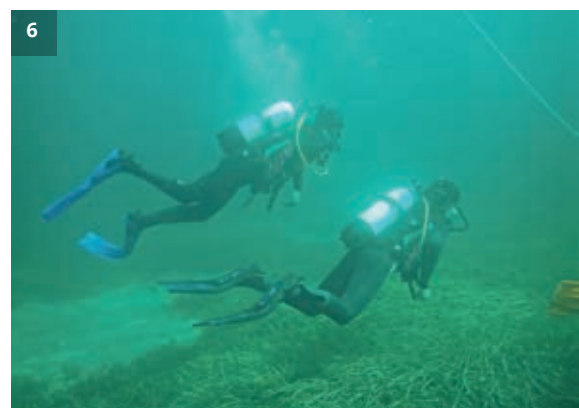
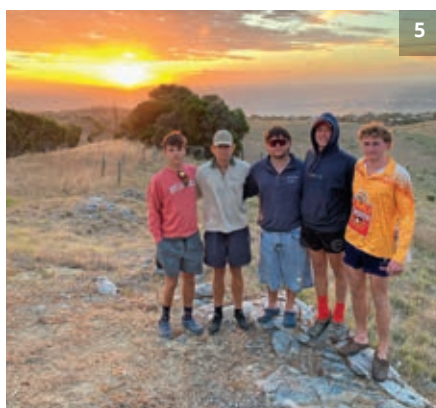

Humanities



Opportunities have abounded for Humanities students in 2024.

Geography students have put their skills to the test, embarking on fieldtrips from Years 7-12. For the first time, our Year 7 students headed to Myponga to join forces with the powerful Forktree Project. The Forktree Project seeks to re-wild a significant piece of ex-farmland in Myponga, helping to mitigate the effects of climate change in the process. The Year 7s got their hands dirty, clearing bush, planting trees, and feeling good about contributing to real world solutions. Our Year 8s investigated the Karrawirra Parri (River Torrens), while our Year 10s headed to the coast to evaluate management practices of our beaches. 2024 saw Geography appear at Wambana for the first time, with dedicated lessons being run by Geography teachers. Students embarked on a study of The Great Southern Reef, an extraordinary system of reefs that runs past Point Turton. They learnt about its significance and how to protect it, all the while enjoying its beauty.

This year, History students continued to expand their perspectives and understanding of the past through experiential learning. Year 8 students explored the Adelaide Gaol as part of Adelaide week, learning about the different iterations of the gaol and how it has reflected the changing societal norms of Adelaide over the decades. Year 9 students visited Bublacowie Military Museum while at Wambana, delving into the storied military history of our nation.

Uncle Moogy, a Kurna and Ngarrindjeri Elder, graciously shared his culture and knowledge with Year 10 students. Students gathered in Yarning Circles to speak with Uncle Moogy about his experiences as an Indigenous man over the past 70 years, in the process growing empathy and understanding of the Indigenous Civil Rights movement.

A highlight of 2024 were the vaulted achievements of students in national History and Geography competitions. Joshua Wang, Year 7, and Henry Fan, Year 9, were State Champions in their respective year levels for the National History Competition. Harry Paholski was State Champion for Year 9 in the Australian Geography Competition. Beyond these superb results, students also achieved 28 High Distinctions and 42 Distinctions across the two competitions, showing the breadth and depth of Humanities students skill in the school.

In addition to these achievements, Caleb won the Oliphant Trophy for 2024 for his outstanding science content (*To what extent does different coloured light affect the bacterial growth of Staphylococcus epidermidis measured in terms of the colony size (CFU/mL) after 30 minutes of light treatment under each colour*). The trophy was presented by Monica Oliphant, followed by an acceptance speech from Caleb who acknowledged the support of his teachers and school.

The last time the trophy was won by a PAC student was in 1996 by James Messner. This was an historic moment for Caleb and for PAC, and for the Oliphant Awards.

Aryan Parwal, Year 11, received Second place in the Science Writing Category (*Anti-aging*), sponsored by Flinders University.

Keshav Balachander, Year 6, received a Highly Commended award for his Science Writing (*Space Junk*).

Elon You, Oliver Raeside and Charles Yin, Year 2, received Highly Commended awards for their Crystal Investigation (*How to grow high quality crystals*).

Science

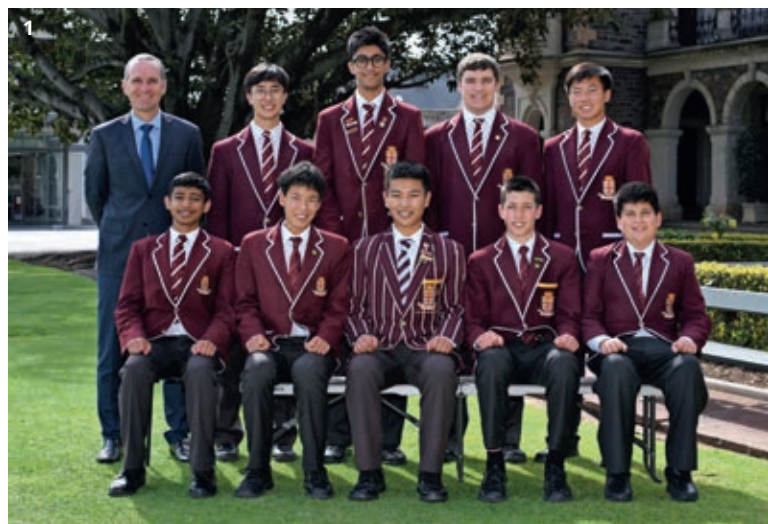
2024 was a busy year in our Science program. Several new initiatives included Agricultural Science being formally taught for the first time in the Senior School. All Year 9s were taught a short unit related to the wool industry and our Year 10s completed a full unit of work linked to plant science, the technology of agriculture and Agribusiness. Keen to forge stronger links between the Preparatory and Senior Schools, our Year 4s, 5s and 6s gained some practical experience in the senior school laboratories and the Preparatory boys were treated to some 'explosive' science across their lunch breaks during Science Week.

This year also marked the 80th edition of the Science Journal. This year's theme acknowledged this milestone with the theme "80 Years of Discovery." Veteran journal committee member, Year 12 Caleb Tang as Chief Editor, guided the boys through the process of formulating the journal. Molecular Biologist Dr James Miller was the guest author with his article reflecting on how the significant advancements over the last 80 years have shaped his in his field of scientific endeavour.

Each year we have several boys awarded High Distinctions in various national and international competitions and 2024 was no exception. Competitions where boys achieved this exceptional level included the National Chemistry Quiz and Big Science Olympiad Examinations. Three of our Year 11s, James Cree, Rijak Dhingra and Jack Zheng were acknowledged as an "Excellent team", which is the highest honour awarded in the National Titration Competition. Year 7, Ellis Twigge, won the Year 7 category of the state-wide Science Investigation Awards with his inquiry into the concept of photosynthesis. A highlight this year was Caleb Tang (Year 12) being the first Prince Alfred College student since 1996 to be awarded the premier Oliphant Science Award prize – the Oliphant Trophy – a truly fine effort.

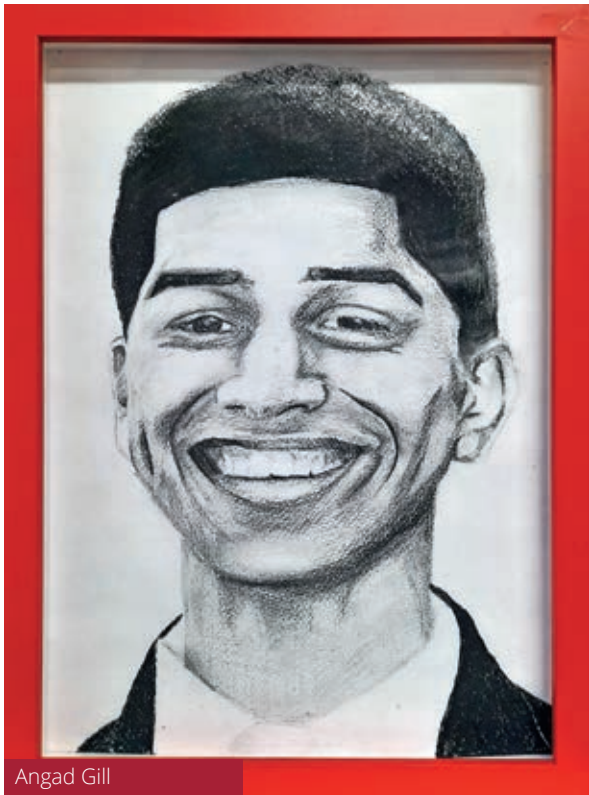

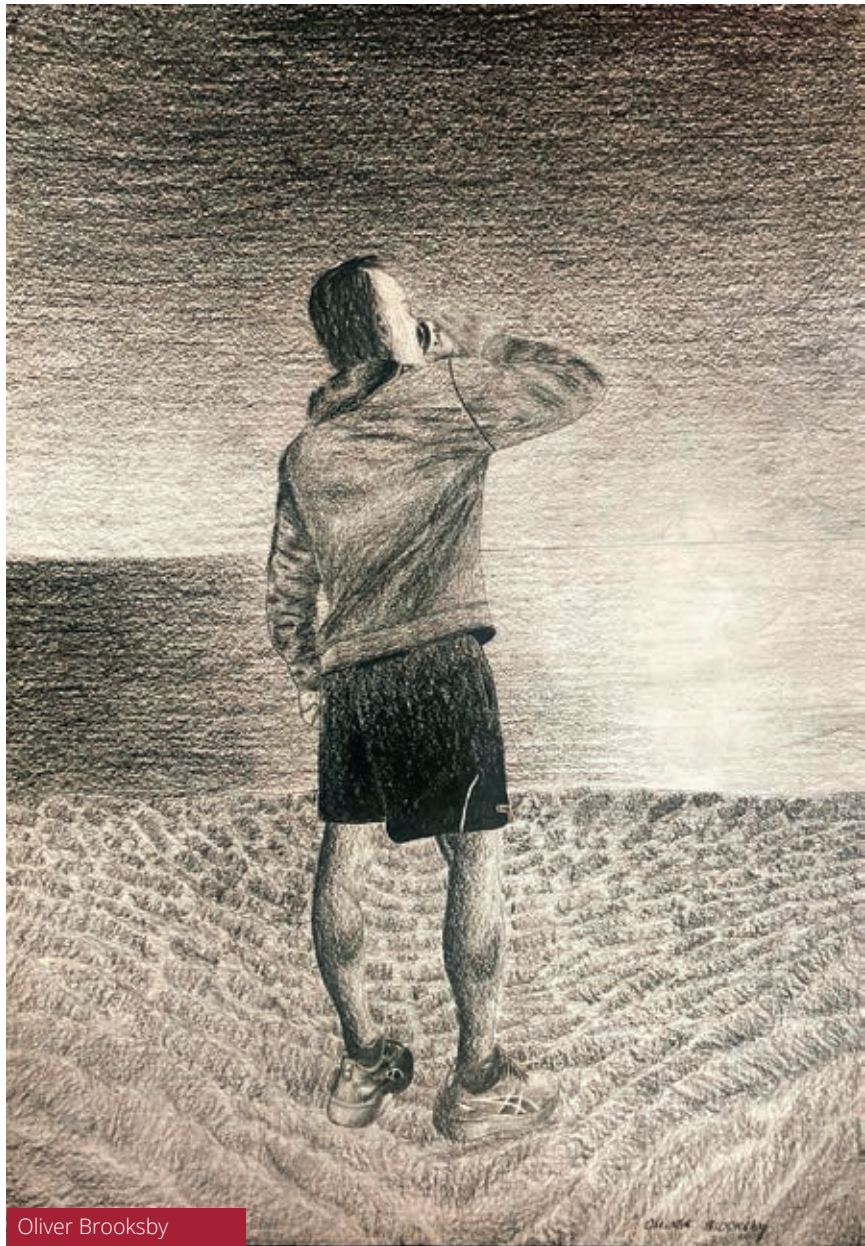

Academic Support

In 2024, the Academic Support Team played a critical role in ensuring that all students, particularly those requiring additional assistance, had access to high-quality, inclusive education. The team's efforts focused on academic growth, fostering an inclusive learning environment, and preparing Senior students for their future pathways, while also addressing students' social and emotional wellbeing. This holistic approach reflected a commitment to continuous improvement, collaboration, and student success.

A key achievement was the successful delivery of a reading program for students needing additional intervention. Recognising the diverse literacy levels within the student cohort, the team implemented an evidence-based program focused on phonetic understanding and reading fluency. This approach led to significant improvements in reading proficiency, as well as increased student confidence. This success demonstrated the effectiveness of targeted, evidence-based interventions.

In addition to academic support, the team worked closely with classroom teachers to ensure the integration of inclusive practices across the College. By collaborating with teachers to adapt teaching methods, resources, and assessments, the team created an environment where all students, regardless of their needs, had access to a meaningful curriculum. Providing ongoing assistance to teachers helped them implement differentiated strategies effectively, strengthening the overall inclusive atmosphere of the school.

The Academic Support Team also focused on social and emotional support for students, recognising the importance of mental wellbeing in academic success. The team facilitated student mentorship programs and provided a dedicated space for students to seek support before school and during lunch breaks. This safe and supportive space allowed students to connect with peers, access guidance, and receive emotional support when needed.

Additionally, the team worked closely with Senior students to help them prepare for post-school pathways, tailoring support to each student's unique needs and aspirations. This included career exploration and work experience, ensuring students were equipped to make informed decisions about their next steps.

Overall, the Academic Support Team's work in 2024 was defined by targeted academic interventions, collaboration with teachers, social and emotional support, and a focus on student success. Their efforts helped create an inclusive environment where all students could thrive academically, emotionally, and personally, fostering an educational atmosphere in which every student had the opportunity to succeed.

Wellbeing Support Services

The Wellbeing Team had a dynamic and innovative year, implementing several new initiatives to enhance the quality of support provided to students.

The wellbeing program aligns closely with the Prince's Man Program and broader Pastoral Care initiatives. In collaboration with the Heads of House, the Wellbeing Team works to effectively support students requiring assistance. The introduction of a 24/7 online booking system enables students to schedule individual counselling sessions at their convenience, with appointment availability from 7:00 am to 4:00 pm. Parents also have access to this system to book appointments with the team.

Throughout the year, a wellbeing team member visited the boys at Wambana during each rotation, delivering sessions on conflict resolution, empathy, and stress management. To further personalise support, quantitative data was gathered before and after each Wambana rotation to measure changes in empathy, aggression, stress, and anxiety.

Additionally, virtual reality technology was introduced to the wellbeing space to help students develop skills in emotional self-regulation. The team is collaborating with one of the leading universities in Adelaide to create programs specifically aimed at fostering empathy.

A strong emphasis was placed on R U OK? day this year, featuring structured conversations in tutor groups, impactful videos, and visible displays throughout the school to promote mental health awareness.

For Year 6 students transitioning from the Prep School, a morning tea event was organised, where they were introduced to the senior school Wellbeing Team and familiarised with the wellbeing facilities.

This year, the Wellbeing Team also worked closely with the boarding house staff to build supportive counselling relationships and meaningful connections with all boarders, enhancing their emotional and social wellbeing. Recognising the unique challenges that boarding, especially for international students, can present—such as adjusting to a new culture, school environment, and language—emotional and mental health support remains a priority. Studies demonstrate a strong link between wellbeing and academic performance, which underscores the College's commitment to dedicated wellbeing support. Alongside pastoral care from boarding house staff, a wellbeing counsellor is available one evening each week to provide confidential counselling services for boarders.

Careers

I have had the privilege of being the careers advisor at Prince Alfred College for almost 15 years. I am impressed with the vast number of bespoke PAC educational opportunities offered to all students including history tours overseas, outstanding performing arts showcase events, highly prized debating competitions, boarding house adventures, meaningful community service activities, science excursions, an excellent Indigenous student cultural program, design and visual art exhibits & awards, countless sporting options, valued student contributions in publications, a rich and varied international student program, a library focused on contemporary learning, and so much more.

The offerings listed above, when connected with careers guidance, provide an integrated career education which complements future pathways decisions. For many young people, regardless of what school they attend, working out a career path can sometimes feel like standing at a crossroads without a map. I am delighted that Prince Alfred College invests in a PAC careers program (akin to a BIG map!) which helps build awareness, aspiration and agency. This investment and acknowledgement have allowed me to put together a framework aligned with the Australian Blueprint for Career Development which helps guide positive career conversations towards meaningful outcomes.

In 2024, the Careers Office provided big and small career events, tailored classroom career development activities, one-on-one careers counselling, shared activities with Frank Palladino (VET Coordinator), the facilitation of work experience placements, and specialised support (including Med/Dentistry interview coaching, scholarship and USA athlete pathway applications). These have been exceptionally well received by students, staff and parents.

The 2024 Prince Alfred College Mega Careers and Employment Expo in April included, once again, a large number of Seymour College

girls and their parents. This combined audience of Year 9 – 12 students proved attractive to our many guest exhibitors and guest speakers (many PAC Old Scholars and Seymour Old Collegians) who represented local and national educators and industry stakeholders. Exhibitors included ANU (ACT), ADF, Bond University (Qld), our local universities, University of Melbourne & Marcus Oldham Agricultural College (VIC), SA Police, TAFE, Fulton Hogan and so many more. There was free food for the hundreds who attended, door prizes and most importantly and palpable excitement for the careers learning.

Year 11 students enjoyed their special Career Development Day on Tuesday 26 November. In addition to local universities, students heard about applying and studying at national and international universities. This included a talk from Education USA (US Consulate) and PAC Old Scholar Stuart Floyd Director: International Recruitment, Scholarships and Awards at the University of British Columbia, who gave a glowing recommendation about studying in Canada. The students were able to choose 3 electives to attend (out of 7) and they included 'Uni Life', 'Gap Year', 'Apprenticeships', and 'Scholarships/ Med/Dentistry/Music auditions'. 16 business professionals attended our Business Pizza Luncheon, and each hosted a student table as a mock interview coach.

A highlight for me every year is the generous continued contribution of time by PAC Old Scholars and PAC parents who attend the careers events to affirm, coach and share their wisdom with the students who are very appreciative. Thanks to them and to my 2024 Careers Team Leaders: Joe Arkwright, Joe Menz, Aiden Obst, James Searle, Louis Annetta, Chewa Maurici, Ridha Ismaeel and the others who helped out at various events.

International Students

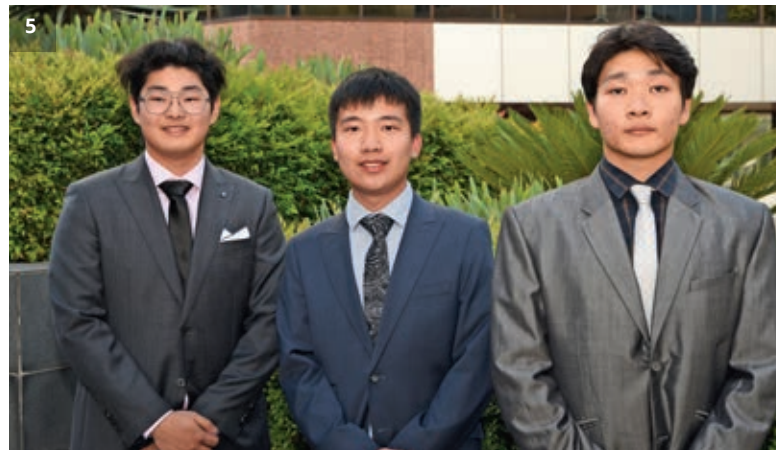
Our international students have continued to excel in both academic life and extracurricular activities. Tony Xiang (Year 8), Thomas Yu (Year 11), Tom Xu (Year 12), and Eric Sun (Year 12) achieved outstanding results in the HSMC (Hamann School Mathematics Competition). Ivan Ng was honoured with the College Prize for Global Citizenship,

a testament to his exceptional ability to foster connections across cultures. Additionally, musicians such as Tom Xu and Sam He consistently impressed with their performances at major campus events. Looking ahead, our 2025 International Student Captains, Tristan Wong and Alex Fan, are ready to carry on the tradition of leadership and community support set by their predecessors.

The academic success of our international students has been outstanding, with many earning accolades in subjects such as Maths, English, and Chinese. Many of our IB students attained exceptional ATAR scores above 95, securing places at world-renowned universities and showcasing their hard work and dedication to excellence.

A key part of our international program is the International Student Transition Program (ISTP), designed to build students' confidence in English and prepare them for the academic expectations of an Australian school. This year, 14 students from Years 7 to 10 participated, working on a range of skills including writing opinion essays and research reports, refining their grammar, and gaining familiarity with the language of Maths and Science. Additionally, the program exposed students to various cultural texts to deepen their understanding of English. They also studied Chinese, Physical Education, and Drama.

Throughout the year, we were fortunate to host several guest speakers, including Mrs Redelinghuys and Mr Giffard, who led discussions on wellbeing, and Simon Liu, our 2023 International Student Captain, who shared insights into his role and offered advice on succeeding in mainstream classes. The students also had the



opportunity to interview Ms Stockdale from Student Services as part of an investigation into the effectiveness of the school's phone policy. Later, in Term 4, Year 10 EAL students worked with the ISTP cohort to assist with their writing as part of their Personal Learning Project.

Units of work in Science have included components of chemistry, biology and physics. While the focus has been on the learning and interpreting of the broad range of new vocabulary and language introduced in these topics, students have also been involved in content learning, laboratory practice and associated report writing. They have learned how to interpret and discuss the information presented, to actively listen with understanding and to summarise using sound grammatical techniques when presenting their findings. Topics studied in Mathematics have been at an advanced level for their cohort, using a vast amount of new language to display students' understanding of their mathematical investigations and problem-solving techniques.

In 2024, we welcomed over 20 new international students from five different nationalities, spanning across Reception to 10. These students participated in a variety of activities, including career evenings and sporting, music and social events with other schools, including St Peters Boys' School, Seymour College, Wilderness School and St Peters Girls' School. We also celebrated our cultural diversity with international student receptions, special luncheons, and the Year 12 farewell dinner to mark important days on our international calendar.

Our international students are fully integrated into the life of the College. They participate in Tutor groups and House teams, engage in

sports, music, and co-curricular activities, and take part in interschool competitions and carnivals. Their involvement has been remarkable, with notable achievements in squash, badminton, basketball, table tennis, and music.

As we move into 2025, we continue to welcome international students, guided by our new 2025–2028 Strategic Plan. At Prince Alfred College, we are committed to our values of fostering Respect, Excellence, Belonging, and Endeavour, inspiring our students to strive for success and develop as well-rounded young men of character as Princes Men.

Indigenous Program



In 2024, Prince Alfred College has made significant strides in its Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Program, fostering a deeper understanding and appreciation of Indigenous cultures within the school community.

Uncle John Lochowiak and Uncle Moogy Sumner have been instrumental in sharing the story of Tjilbruke, an important part of the Kurna people and the Adelaide Plains. This story, which includes themes of compassion, character, and discipline, has deeply resonated with students and staff and will continue to guide the program and opportunities for students and staff to engage with the local community.

Highlights of 2024 include the establishment of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Knowledge Centre, situated next to the Keeves Library. This centre serves as a hub for cultural education, providing resources and a space for students to engage with Indigenous knowledge and traditions.

Another significant achievement is the completion of four large canvases, each representing one of the four Kurna seasons, led by Aboriginal students, and created by students in Watsford, Cotton, Taylor, and Waterhouse. These artworks will be displayed around the College at various times of the year, symbolising the connection between the school and the traditional land on which we are situated, as well as the unity among all students and staff.

We have also maintained an Elder In-Residence Program, working closely with Uncle John and Uncle Moogy. Their presence and guidance continue to enrich the cultural education of students, offering firsthand insights into Indigenous traditions and knowledges.

There were also memorable trips to Melbourne University, with a stay at Trinity Residential College, giving students a taste of university life and opportunities for future academic aspirations. Additionally, Year 10 students participated in The Smith Family Indigenous Youth Leadership Program Gathering in Sydney, which provided valuable leadership training and networking opportunities.



Looking ahead to 2025, we anticipate the re-establishment of its Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) with a consultative committee, marking a renewed commitment to reconciliation and inclusivity. Furthermore, a strong coalition of local schools has been formed, with regular social events for students and co-ordinator meetings for staff.

These initiatives reflect our dedication to creating an inclusive and culturally rich educational environment.

Student Voice Committee



Student leadership was an area reviewed under our broader pastoral changes in 2024. This led to an expansion of our student leadership model and the alignment of leaders to Houses. Every student in the Secondary School was given the opportunity to nominate for a position as a year level House Leader. There are two House Leaders per year level in the Middle Years and three per year level in the Senior Years. Together, the 48 students, selected via interview with their Head of House and House Captains, make up the Student Voice Committee (SVC).

The role description for our House Leaders states:

Prince Alfred College believes that students have the capacity for genuine leadership by advocating for their peers and working to create a cohesive and ever-improving school community. Moreover, PAC believes that students play an important role in making decisions about the daily operations of the College and our programs.

The 2024 House Leaders fulfilled their roles admirably, meeting twice per term under the direction of Prefects to address issues within our community such as maintaining school grounds, offering feedback on the Approach to Learning process, assisting with the development of the Princes Men Charter and selecting the theme for House

Music. In addition, House Leaders also led their year levels at House events and represented the views of their Tutor Groups at meetings. Opportunities to lead Middle Years assemblies were given to the Year 9 SVC leaders and the Year 8 SVC leaders met up with leaders from other schools at the Positive Education Schools Association "Connect. Create. Lead." Year 8 Student Wellbeing Symposium.

In 2025, the Prefects responsible for the SVC portfolio also plan to introduce leadership training as part of regular SVC meetings, so that students are not only doing leadership but also *learning* about how to do it better in the service of our school. They will identify members of our community with leadership experience to come and talk to students once per term.

Outside of the SVC, we had students from Year 7-12 demonstrate leadership through being camp buddies, assisting at Preparatory School carnivals and acting as hosts for our guests at tours and functions.

The first year of a revised student leadership model has been very positive and we look forward to seeing further growth in the SVC and House Leadership over the coming years.

Performing Arts



Curricular Drama

Our Drama program remained strong in 2024. We maintained our focus on delivering an inclusive curriculum where every boy feels valued and inspired. The boys enjoyed exploring diverse practitioners and styles including World Theatre, Stage Combat, Theatre Design, Commedia and Shakespeare with a focus on developing their social skills and artistic voice.

Throughout the year the Drama boys attended numerous professional performances and workshops as well as sharing their work with each other. We were fortunate to view shows in the Adelaide Fringe, Adelaide Festival and State Theatre programs. Some highlights were the magnificent *Baleen Moondjan* performed on Glenelg beach, the stirringly poignant *Goodbye Lindita* and an innovative and visually brilliant version of Brecht's classic *Three Penny Opera*. There was also opportunity this year for students to view and review each other's performance work. This included Year 9, Year 11 and 12 major productions and the co-curricular production. Attending live theatre provides the boys with the opportunity to evaluate theatrical practice for assessment but it also broadens their experience of dramatic style and inspires their own performance work.

Collaboration with industry experts enhances our program in middle and senior Drama. The Year 9 students again learnt Stage Combat with Martial Arts experts Ruth Fallon and Nino Pilla. Boys in various year levels also experienced the knowledge and expertise of a range of guest artists such as Mark Hill (Physical Theatre Artist), Andrew Crupi (Commedia) Georgina Harris (Choreographer), Oliver Lagoon-Williamson (Designer) and Britt Plumber (Clowning).

A highlight was the Year 9 performance of *It's Getting Hot in Here*. Supported by the Neil Smart Environmental Education Fund, the boys devised and performed an original play in collaboration with *Slingsby Theatre Company*. This Theatre in Education project explored the environment and sustainability, focusing on the climate crisis, consumerism, and the lifespan of objects. During the devising process the students took on roles as performers and creators,

including designing the technical aspects of their piece. They had an opportunity to learn about *Slingsby's* theatre techniques including shadow puppetry, narration, highly inventive theatrical languages, and world building. Importantly, they had the opportunity to learn how to make their own theatre practice sustainable by considering and planning a production which has minimal impact on the school's resources and environment in general.

The Year 11 IB and SACE Drama students took on the challenge of a devising their own piece of Physical Theatre *Kikai no dansu* (Dance of the Machines). An intensive Physical Theatre Boot Camp with Artist in Residence, Mark Hill, exploring the unique styles of Butoh (Japanese Dance), The Viewpoints and Suzuki Actor Training underpinned their creative process. We explored the impact of technology on our lives in a challenging process where the boys pushed their bodies and creativity to the limit. They demonstrated courage, kindness and determination in this process. Each boy brought individual gifts and perspectives to what was a unique and transformative performance.

This year our first group of IB Theatre students successfully completed their two-year study of theatre theory and practice. Their exploration of a range of theatre styles culminated in the presentation of innovative and engaging solo and collaborative theatre pieces. Under the expert guidance of their teacher and Director, Rebecca Hassam, the Year 12 SACE boys collaborated to produce a confronting and expertly acted production of Sam Shepard's *True West*. Through the depiction of a dysfunctional sibling relationship, this deeply layered black comedy thrilled and challenged audiences with an exploration of toxic masculinity. Thank you to the Year 12 boys for their contribution to our program, especially our Drama Captains, James Kellady and Miles Falahey. I wish them all the best in their future endeavours.

A successful Drama program is only possible with the support and contribution of many. Thank you to Martin McKinnon (Director of Teaching and Learning) for his continued support of our curricular program. To our Drama Assistant, Chelsea Pyman, I want to say

thanks for her continued passion, creativity and guidance of the boys. Heartfelt gratitude goes to Drama Teacher, Rebecca Hassam, for her ongoing energy and commitment to providing the best outcomes for our students. Most importantly, thanks to all the boys who have been part of Drama this year. We have enjoyed the opportunity to work alongside you and watch you shine on and off the stage.

Co-Curricular Drama

Co-curricular Drama continues to grow and engage boys across year levels with a range of opportunities. The Co-Curricular Tech Crew boys continued to hone their skills in film, lighting, AV, Sound and Stage Management. Led by Nivven Barlow and Dan Woolford, they supported numerous school events, assemblies, concerts, and productions throughout the year. It was fantastic to see several younger boys join the group this year.

In Term 1, a small group of Drama students from Year 10, 11 and 12 travelled to Sydney to participate for our first Drama Immersion Trip. Over three days they participated in numerous workshops and saw shows to support their learning in Drama. The workshops started at the National Institute of Dramatic Art. This is the most prestigious acting school in Australia, and they were lucky enough to do two workshops on voice and acting as well as a tour of the amazing learning environment where professional actors and theatre makers are trained. The next day, the boys had an amazing experience visiting Belvoir to explore a professional theatre set including backstage tour, followed by a theatre making workshop. The highlight of everyone's trip followed with a workshop with acrobatic company Legs on the Wall. The boys were all challenged and exhilarated with learning how to use acrobatic silks and putting on harnesses and climbing sideways on walls. The trip included invigorating and diverse professional



theatre shows such as Belvoir's *Holding the Man*, Sydney Theatre Company's *No Pay No Way* and the musical *Grease*.

Co-Curricular Drama this year provided an opportunity for boys from Year 7 to 12 to be part of the College Musical production *Urinetown*. Set in a dystopian future where water is scarce and private toilets are outlawed; the story follows the characters' struggle for the right to pee for free. The musical cleverly critiques capitalism, social irresponsibility, bureaucracy, and corporate mismanagement while paying homage to the great traditions of musical theatre. With its complex musical score and unique brand of satire this show set a new challenge for our boys.

Following a rigorous audition process which cast the net to our sister schools for female performers, we commenced a six-month rehearsal process. Everyone honed their dance, vocal and acting skills, embracing the difficult score and script with gusto. It was a unique process where boys were able to connect with girls from other schools and engage with boys across different year levels. Over time we built a cohesive and focused ensemble.

The success of *Urinetown* is owed to a dedicated team of staff and guest artists who expertly guided our boys through the process. Thank you to Troy McKinnon (Director of Co-Curricular Activities) for his advice and encouragement throughout the process. To Oliver Lagoon Williamson whose epic vision has transformed our cast. I want to give particular thanks to Andrew Edge (Head of Music) for directing our musicians so expertly through a challenging score. To Barrett Law for creating an epic set which helped the actors transport the audience into the unique world of *Urinetown*. A heartfelt thanks to Oliver John and Georgina Harris who, as Musical Director and Choreographer, have been invaluable in guiding and inspiring the cast. And to our Production Manager, Chelsea Pyman, who has had a hand in almost every aspect of the show, I could not be more grateful.

Audiences were in awe of the mature and compelling performance. I want to give gratitude and admiration to the talented students who poured their hearts into bringing *Urinetown* to life. Each performer, musician and member of the crew embraced their role with dedication and enthusiasm. Theatre has the power to entertain and inspire, and I am proud we presented a production that did both.

Co-curricular Drama provides boys with a unique opportunity to find a place to flourish and belong. I look forward to seeing their growth and development as artists next year and beyond.

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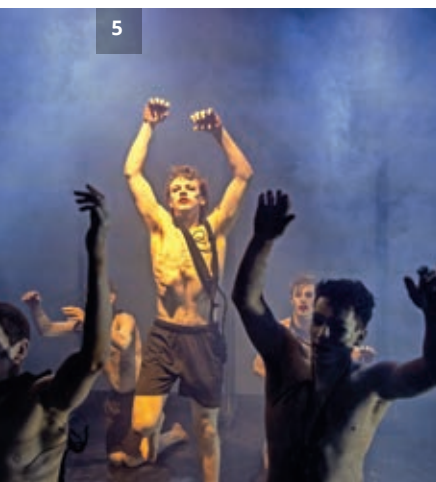

Music

The Music Program saw the departure of a formidable cohort of musicians at the end of 2023, so it would have been easy for Senior musicians and ensembles to lament the loss of talent and approach the year ahead with some trepidation. But not the 2024 Music Captains – it was like they had been waiting patiently and learning from the 2023 Year 12s, only to spring forth and bring their own brand of leadership that had the ‘team’ at the core. From *Live@Langley* in Term 4, 2023 through to *Music Retreat* to kick off Term 1 2024, Music leaders modeled commitment and passion for playing music that helped all groups start the year strongly.

The *Autumn Music Showcase* brings the whole school Music community together with a BBQ and live performance that raises funds for charity and celebrates the achievements of the term. With incoming Assistance Director of Teaching & Learning, Mr Corin Bone, at the helm of the new Intermediate Vocal Ensemble, it was a highlight to see the development of a group of confident and capable middle school singers. Another highlight was the excellent performance of Senior Concert Band despite barely being able to read their music as the natural light faded – not ideal, but a fun memory that will stick with those in attendance.

In Term 2, an exciting new venture with Wilderness School came to fruition – the *Ukaria Strings Concert*. As someone attending this renowned chamber music venue for the first time, I was very proud to bring my mother along for an afternoon in the hills and to enjoy the talents of our superb strings players. With the beautiful acoustics and hills vistas, the collaboration was a credit to both schools and the students and staff involved, and we certainly look forward to running this special event again in the future. *Generations in Jazz* once again delivered a weekend of inspiring performances, wonderful team building and some stellar personal achievements. The 60 boys in attendance supported every moment with gusto, and with two vocal groups in attendance this year for the first time, there was plenty of action to cheer on. The *Winter Music Showcase* unearthed a lovely new concert venue on campus – the Piper Pavilion. With round tables and mood lighting, once again some unique memories were formed as some students and staff shaved their heads mid-performance to raise money for the Childhood Cancer Association.

Princes Rock On Parade is a highlight on the Term 3 calendar each year, with the event doubling as a social occasion for international students from PAC and affiliated schools. The International Student Bands from PAC and St Peters joined the fun on stage, along with the other bands from PAC, Seymour and Wilderness. From hard rock to funk and everything in between, it was a wonderful display of skills and creative expression, with a special mention to outgoing rock players Hugo Evans, Tom Henchcliffe, Fraser Newman and Ivan Ng, who all

served the rock program so well over many years. With this year’s theme of *Music Royalty*, the major concert at the end of Term 3 once again showed what the Music Program can produce when we come together and pull out all the stops for a night of entertainment. With Miles Falahey and Owen Barkla as the ghosts of Elvis and Freddie Mercury (respectively) to host the night, and the marvelous Jackie Barnes as our guest, the quality of music from staff and boys on stage was staggering. While year after year the comment of “how will you top that next year?” comes up after the show, the students find ways to develop their performance craft and deliver memorable experiences for the audience.

Term 4 started with 35 boys and 4 staff heading off for the *Riverland Music Tour*. With Scotts Creek as our base, the group took the *Music Royalty* concert music on the road, delivering six shows in just three days. The communities of Eudunda, Waikerie, Morgan and Tanunda welcomed us warmly, and in exchange our boys had them singing and dancing along to some wonderful music. With strangers helping out with sets of guitar strings and local clubs putting on BBQs and more, it was a reminder of music’s power to bring us closer together. We then had record numbers at the Week 4 *Instrumental Music Recitals*, with over 50 students performing solos on stage in the Chapel. The Drum Corps delivered Christmas cheer at the annual *Norwood Christmas Pageant*, while other ensembles performed for a host of end of year performances. With the 2025 Music Captains just announced, 2025 ensembles rehearsals, it’s hard to believe another year is wrapping up and that excitement is building already for what the next year will bring.

I’d like to thank all Music staff and tutors for their many contributions in 2024, as well as Tech Crew staff Mr Dan Woolford and Mr Nivven Barlow, whose team of boys always ensure music events look and sound great. Special mention must go to Ms Fran Greenwood, who after five years of exceptional service as our Voice Co-ordinator, is moving on to a leadership role at St Ignatius College. Relentlessly kind and optimistic, organised and hard working, the growth in quality and quantity of the Vocal Program under her guidance is plain for all to see. We also acknowledge the 2024 Year 12 musicians who delivered one of the tightest Valedictory Assembly performances in recent memory (and perhaps ever!) – best of luck with your future endeavors, and we hope to see you in the audience soon.

Strings

2024 has been a year full of fantastic opportunities and learning experiences for the boys involved in the String Department at the College. The year began with Senior Strings, along with the other senior music ensembles, participating in the *Music Retreat*. Participation in this retreat really demonstrated the boys' level of commitment to the String Program, as not only was it hours of rehearsals preparing for the year ahead, but it was also time taken out of their last day of school holidays. The first performance of the year was the *Autumn Music Showcase*; this concert was a highlight for many, as its outdoor setting and the inclusion of the barbeque creates a welcoming and cohesive nature within the music department. Senior Strings performed a modern piece by Soon Hee Newbold, '*Battle*', featuring our Strings Captain, Roshan Ediriweera. This piece was something different for the boys, as it experimented with more percussive and modern string techniques, such as *Bartok pizzicatos*, *col legno*, and using the instrument bodies as a percussion. The musicianship the boys demonstrated with this new work was outstanding, as their sound and musicality effectively depicted, and painted the story, of soldiers marching into battle.

Term 2 was most definitely a highlight for the String Department. For the first time at PAC, the Senior Strings had the opportunity to perform at the prestigious venue, Ukaria Cultural Centre in Mount Barker. Combining with the Wilderness School String Ensemble, the students performed an hour recital of classic chamber orchestra repertoire. The audience was immediately captivated by the opening piece, '*Andante Festivo*', by Jean Sibelius. This piece is a staple in chamber music repertoire, and really provided the opportunity for the students to explore the full potential of their sound. The rich and full sound of the string orchestra immediately filled the hall and was accompanied by the exquisite and picturesque view of the Adelaide Hills and Ukaria Garden. Following this, the ensemble performed a range of different works, varying in composers from Bach and Telemann, all the way to 20th Century composer, Shostakovich. A highlight of this concert was the performance of one of the most famous classical works for violin, '*Spring*' from Vivaldi's '*Four Seasons*'. This featured Year 11 student, Apollon Velonakis, who demonstrated a high level of instrumental mastery and musicality. Whilst this concert was the end of a very busy Term 2 for most, the PAC Piano

Trio remained hard at work, preparing their entry at the *Adelaide Eisteddfod*. The Piano Trio was entered into an 18-years and under chamber group category, which meant that the competition was high. Despite this, the boys performed incredibly well and came away with Second Place, a huge achievement which was accompanied by wonderful praise from the adjudicator, who stated that she was "very impressed" as the trio played with "style and flair".

Term 3 was, once again, one of the busiest terms for the whole Music Department. This year, the theme for the Term 3 Music Showcase was *Music Royalty*, which featured music from artists such as Queen, the King of Rock - Elvis Presley, Prince, and the Queen of Soul - Aretha Franklin. Coinciding with the overarching theme of royalty, Senior Strings performed the iconic hits '*Can't Help Falling in Love*' (Elvis Presley) and '*Don't Stop Me Now*' (Queen), which featured the guest artist, Jackie Barnes, who was able to give insight and encouragement for performing pop classics as instrumental arrangements. This was followed by an incredible arrangement of '*Bohemian Rhapsody*' for piano, solo cello, and string quartet, which featured students Jonathon Wong (Piano), Keir Nairn (Solo Cello), Roshan Ediriweera (Violin 1), Joe Arkwright (Violin 2), Apollon Velonakis (Viola) and Isaac Yu (Cello). Although extremely complex, these boys pulled off the iconic melodic lines and epic guitar solo transcriptions and would have made Queen proud!

2024 has been a huge year for the String Department, and I am incredibly proud of the growth as musicians and individuals from the Senior Strings boys right down to Junior Strings. As the year comes to an end, I would like to particularly thank our Strings Captain, Roshan Ediriweera, who also happened to be our only Year 12 string player, for all his hard work leading Senior Strings this year and being a supportive and encouraging role model to the other members of the ensemble. I would also like to sincerely congratulate each and every other member of string ensembles; the improvement that each boy has made individually, and collectively in ensembles is outstanding, and I am thoroughly looking forward to what 2025 has in store.

A powerful visual statement, the vast chorus of singers exemplifies the change we have seen in our Performing Arts culture in the Preparatory School and the Music Program.

Nurturing this budding spirit, this year Junior Primary Choirs welcomed regular performance opportunities with the ELC, allowing them to see the pathway and progression of learning from year to year. Unified by their shared passion, Year 3 Choir gifted some of the year's most vibrant performances, lighting up the stage with enthusiasm and their creative ideas. Young Voices continued to thrive under the direction of Mrs Sophia Butler, evident at The College Green Carols. From our youngest to our eldest, ELC Choir, Young Voices and Prep Small Vocal spread the Christmas joy, delighting Eldercare residents in their first community performance. Harmonising the classic *'Silent Night'*, unaccompanied and on point, Prep Small Vocal concluded the festivities in what would be their final performance together as preparatory students.

Similarly, Choirs and Vocalists in the Secondary School have begun their own transformation, a subtle but perceptible shift. Unapologetic pride and passion in the pursuit of their craft now typifies the atmosphere as vocalists take the stage. With a substantial number of ensemble vocalists now studying voice, students stand confidently and in command of their instrument, shoulder to shoulder with their music peers. Ambition, diligence and commitment have revealed some remarkable talent, with exceptional solo performances by Jack Elms, Stefan Drusian, Ivan Ng, Harrison Thomas and Ellis Twigge. It is this collective dedication that has become our biggest strength.

Competing in one of the nation's largest music competitions, both Small Vocal 1 and Small Vocal 2 placed 4th in their respective divisions at *Generations in Jazz*, impressing with their vocal talent and consummate performance acumen. Alongside Small Vocal 2's debut appearance, Senior Vocal competed in the extremely competitive large division, a first in the College's history. One of the strongest Middle School cohorts to date, Intermediate Vocal's talent were on full display during the *Middle School Riverland Tour*. Showcasing highlights from the *Music Royalty Concert*, vocalists took centre stage in a program rich with vocal music. Each concert saw Intermediate Vocal improve its collective sound and hit a new high, producing some truly exquisite acoustic harmonies, as soloists and small groups captivated audiences with their stage craft, expression and vocal maturity.

Bands

2024 has been a busy and successful year for our Bands program with many tremendous performances dotted throughout the year. In addition to our regular events throughout the year, we had the pleasure of playing a large role in the 3-day Middle School Riverland tour at the beginning of Term 4 with boys from the Middle School making up the personnel for a Middle School Concert Band and a Big Band which toured in the Riverland around Morgan, Monash, Waikerie, Eudunda and Tanunda.

Our wonderful year of performances began with the Autumn Concert at the end of Term 1. An outdoor concert in the Fisher Courtyard. Featuring our four Concert Bands across the College was their first chance to showcase some wonderful playing. There was collaboration between the different concert bands with some wonderful mentorship from the older boys.

Our focus shifted to the Big Bands at the beginning of Term 2 with all Big Bands in the Senior School experiencing *Generations in Jazz* in Mount Gambier. It was a privilege to be part of the wonderful cohort of boys and staff participating in this year's national event. Once again, a very successful year with superb results. Big Band 3 performed well in Division 4 and came a gallant 13th in what proved to be a very competitive section with many bands staging much older boys than them. Big Band 2 were fantastic, making a huge impact on the adjudicators in Division 3; so much so that they came 3rd overall. Big Band 1 were outstanding, coming 5th in what was a closely contested section once again. All bands playing difficult professional-level repertoire and made the task of adjudicating challenging for the judges. We also come away with some incredible individual awards. Hugo Evans and Owen Chen on guitar and piano respectively, received Division 1 Superband selection. Tom Xu on trombone receiving Division 3 Superband selection. Nathan Thomas was awarded Future Finalist selection for his outstanding drumming - one of only a few students selected from the 4,000 that participated in *Generations in Jazz* this year.

PAC had three of its concert bands prepared for this State-wide event across three different divisions. The focus, dedication and passion shown by the boys in each band is testament to the strong results, continuing their consistent high level of musicianship across this event. Senior Concert Band were awarded gold in the Advanced Concert Band section, once again showing why they are one of the leading school concert bands in South Australia. The Intermediate Concert Band continued their successful campaign, receiving a gold award in the Intermediate Concert Band division while the Junior Concert Band received a silver award in the Junior Band division. Overall, our concert band program continues to punch above its weight in the South Australian school community.

We were also heavily involved in our annual September performance in conjunction with the Theatre Organ Society of South Australia at the Capri Theatre with 2 Big Bands putting on a great show. This was a highlight for the Prep Big Band musicians. This year saw Big Band 1 fill the other spot which is the first time in at least 10 years. The Year 12 boys shined brightly, knowing this was their second to last performance, which was very well received by the Capri Theatre community.

Term 4 saw the newly formed Big Bands for 2025 get a chance to perform in the *Live @ Langley* gig, showcasing the depth of talent and excellence the band program continues to uphold. They are all looking forward to beginning their preparations on the repertoire for *Generations in Jazz 2025*.

A big thank you to my fellow band director, Mr Andrew Edge, for his unwavering support in upholding the culture and professionalism within the Bands Program.

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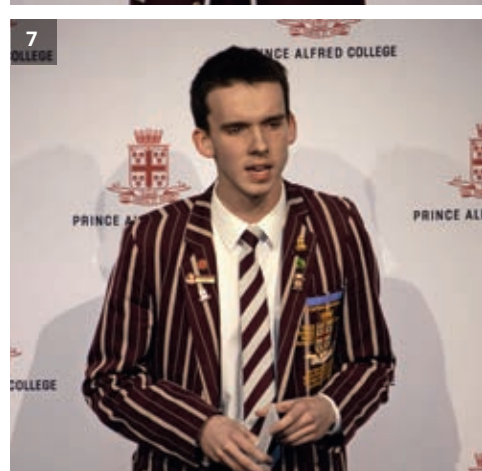
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Debating

Once again, we were well represented in all six divisions, with all boys going over and above the call of duty with their commitment and skill levels, leading to another highly successful season. In Senior A, looking to add to PAC's hat-trick of State Championships, PAC 1 dominated the preliminary rounds and remained on top of the ladder, winning all debates except for the Grand Final. In their second rematch after St Peter's took back the John Bannon Shield during the Intercol, both teams put on an excellent display of skill and general knowledge, with PAC ultimately taking home the Runner Up trophy for 2024. In similar circumstances, our Intermediate A boys in the PAC 1 team also made it to the Grand Final after being on top of the ladder all season. They were similarly unlucky to miss out in a split decision, joining Senior A in taking home the Runner Up trophy for their division. A special mention to Devesh Anavkar, who was voted best speaker in the Intermediate A Grand Final, and also to Ansh Tiwari, who's commitment to debating earned him the coveted Most Valuable Debater award within SADA's Intermediate B division. Whilst no longer holding the mantle as State Champions in the Senior School divisions this year, all boys can be proud of their efforts, the accolades they have earned, and their contributions to a Debating Society which continues to go from strength to strength each year.

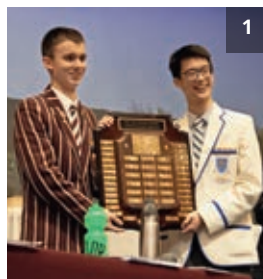

Rowing

The Boat Club devoted its pre-season to a process-driven approach with the Senior rowing squad - emphasising skill development over immediate results. As the other squads began their pre-season, ownership of this cultural cornerstone passed on to them. The Head of the River proved to be another exceptional day for the club with success spread across all crews. Although the 1st VIII race remained just out of reach once again, the team left the course confident they were heading in the right direction.

We have since zeroed in on the details that define our standards for a PAC oarsman. Our approach centres on the individual while simultaneously embracing the idea that the club is larger than any one person. Guided by a "bottom-up effect" philosophy, we believe that when every team member strives for personal bests, they inherently hold one another accountable, thus uplifting the entire group. Our goal is to ensure every student enjoys an experience on par with that of their teammates.

A key pillar of the student experience is access to high-quality equipment. The Boat Club is fortunate to stand on the strong foundations laid by those before them - a fact that many admire. The College and the Rowing Parents Support Group (RPSG) continue to provide extensive support in resource allocation and community building, ensuring the Boat Club continually evolves for the benefit of our students.

A significant strategic move this season was the reinstatement of the "Boatman" role, now renamed the "Boat Club Facilities Officer." We are delighted to welcome Wayne Severin into this position. Wayne, a skilled boat builder and former national rower for South Africa, is a familiar face, having coached our 1st VIII back in 2008. His return is both exciting and inspiring for the club.

The beginning of the season also saw the addition of several new coaches. Notably, we are proud to introduce our new 1st VIII coach, Nathan Bowden. Nathan joined us following a successful coaching tenure at St Peter's College and after a distinguished professional rowing career for Australia - including participation in multiple World Cups and World Championships. His deep respect for the coach/athlete relationship and unwavering commitment to our standards signal an exciting new chapter as he takes on the role of 1st VIII and Head Coach.

For the first time in years, rowing camps moved back to the Scotts Creek Campus, and every camp was a success. This facility, established by our predecessors, provides a safe space where athletes can risk failure and, in doing so, learn invaluable lessons for growth. In Term 4, we focused on building depth, developing robust student-athletes, and fostering the resilience needed to overcome adversity - a challenging yet essential process that saw genuine commitment from all involved.

Season Highlights & Events

After a year's hiatus due to record flooding, the Boat Club returned to the Riverland for the annual regatta. We also established a new partnership with the Berri Football Club, which graciously hosted our Riverland dinner and catered to the Intermediate and Senior Squad squads also on camp.

Returning to school in Term 1 marked the season's climax with the Head of the River and the National Rowing Championships. With regattas scheduled every weekend for all squads, logistical challenges - like sourcing enough food to fuel our rowers were met seamlessly, thanks in no small part to our dedicated parent volunteers.

At the Head of the River dinner held at the College, we celebrated with a combined prize-giving ceremony attended by 320 guests. The evening was filled with inspiring speeches, great weather, excellent food & drinks, and a strong sense of community - all testaments to another successful rowing season.

A notable milestone was the trip to Sydney for the Australian Rowing National Championships. Fourteen Senior and five Intermediate rowers, along with their coaches, travelled to compete. Their hard work was rewarded with silver medals in the Under-19 Men's VIII, Coxless IV, and U17 Men's Double Scull events.

Strong leadership is the backbone of any successful club. This season, Captain of Boats Elijah Roberts, along with Co-Vice Captains Sam Stunell and Charlie Wundenberg, set a lasting example for the entire Boat Club. A big thank you goes out to them and to all the coaches who consistently go above and beyond in guiding our students. We also extend our sincere appreciation to the RPSG, led by Alex Freemantle, whose efforts in fundraising and community engagement have inspired every member to get more involved.

Sailing

The 2023-24 season began auspiciously with our home base of Adelaide Sailing Club preparing to host the International Laser Class Association or ILCA Australian national, Masters and World championships. Joshua Zhang and William Spitty took part in pre-season youth coaching clinics and competitions, leading up to competing in the nationals in January, within the ILCA 4 youth category. The senior men's ILCA 7 national and world championships were eventually won by West Australian, Matt Wearn, who went on to win his third gold medal at the 2024 Olympics in Paris.

After putting on such major events, ASC hosted the double regatta Metropolitan Championship for secondary school team sailing, on the consecutive Sundays of 17 and 24 March. 15 teams from 9 schools (Concordia, Immanuel, Investigator, Ocean View College, PAC, St Peters, Sacred Heart, Walford, and Westminster) competed across 11 rounds, sailing over 50 races.

Both days saw some good racing, with our first team skippered by Tom Henchliffe, Pete Cole and Josh Zhang, with Will Spitty in reserve, eventually finishing mid fleet out of 14 teams. Our second team, ably led by Stephen Wang, and supported by Ivan Ng and Tony Xiang, with Tony Jiang in reserve, had some good competition with Walford and Concordia's second teams. Our full complement of crews consisted of Harry Hu, Zhao-Kai Wilcox, Keith Ng and Darcy Sandow in the firsts, and Xavier Chen, Thomas Yu, James Yang and Stanley Jia in the seconds.

Following last year's exhibition event, the first official Sailing Intercol was programmed as the best of three races at the end of the final day. Unfortunately, a strengthening sea breeze that had begun shortly after midday saw the regatta terminated before final rounds could be raced, including the Intercol. The championship was decided on final

standings and went to Sacred Heart, while, based on prior agreement, PAC 1 came out two places ahead on the ladder of St Peters 1, giving us the inaugural Intercol victory. This generated some controversy as, while the two teams did not meet on the first Sunday, they did have three races together during the second day's rounds, which included a few controversial umpiring decisions resulting in two wins for the St Peter's team.

Disappointingly, the annual team sailing highlight of the State Championship, scheduled for the April holidays at Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club, was cancelled due to a major blue-green algae outbreak in the lower lakes affecting that part of the Murray River.

Some consolation did come in the form of our first official end-of-season event, in honour of the sport's first official Intercol. This was held as a cocktail evening in the Ashton Room and gave an ideal opportunity to farewell our departing Year 12s, especially Captain Tom Henchliffe, who capped off an amazing 7 years in the sport. His exemplary commitment to Sailing at PAC will leave a wonderful legacy that we hope to build upon in future years. Finally, a huge thank you must go to the many supportive parents, who transported, fed, watered and encouraged the boys over so many hours of sailing.

Volleyball

The 2023/24 Volleyball season was again a leap forward for Princes Volleyball. Term 4 2023 saw 41 registered players arrive for our preparations, jumping straight into fixtures from Week 1. Mixed results from all teams provided learning for coaches and players alike, with all teams progressing in terms of tactics and skill, putting our newest Volleyballers on a fast track to improvement. Term 1 2024 saw an increase to 54 players and the inclusion of a fifth team, the Open Cs, bringing more court time for all players across the program.

This season, for the first time, we sent a team to the South Australian Volleyball Secondary Schools Cup, an all-schools divisional competition held over three days during Term 3. As a result, the Open As hit the Term 4 fixtures with more experience, more confidence, and a greater understanding of the nuance of competitive Volleyball.

Intercol week again saw, for the second time ever, an Official Open A Intercol. The RED Centre transformed into a dedicated Volleyball space on par with any high-level competitive Volleyball in Australia. While the Intercol results were certainly not what we had hoped for, they were a clear indication of the positive direction our program is heading. We also saw the inclusion of Intercol fixtures for teams beyond the Open As, with almost all teams enjoying the long-standing rivalry with St Peter's College. Our 2023/24 Volleyball captains summed this experience up most succinctly in their end-of-season address: "To briefly speak on behalf of all the players, the Intercol crowd was loud, energetic and supportive... Intercol wouldn't have been the same without you."

Overall, PAC Volleyball is moving in the right direction, and we are all looking forward to the next season and even greater involvement and success.

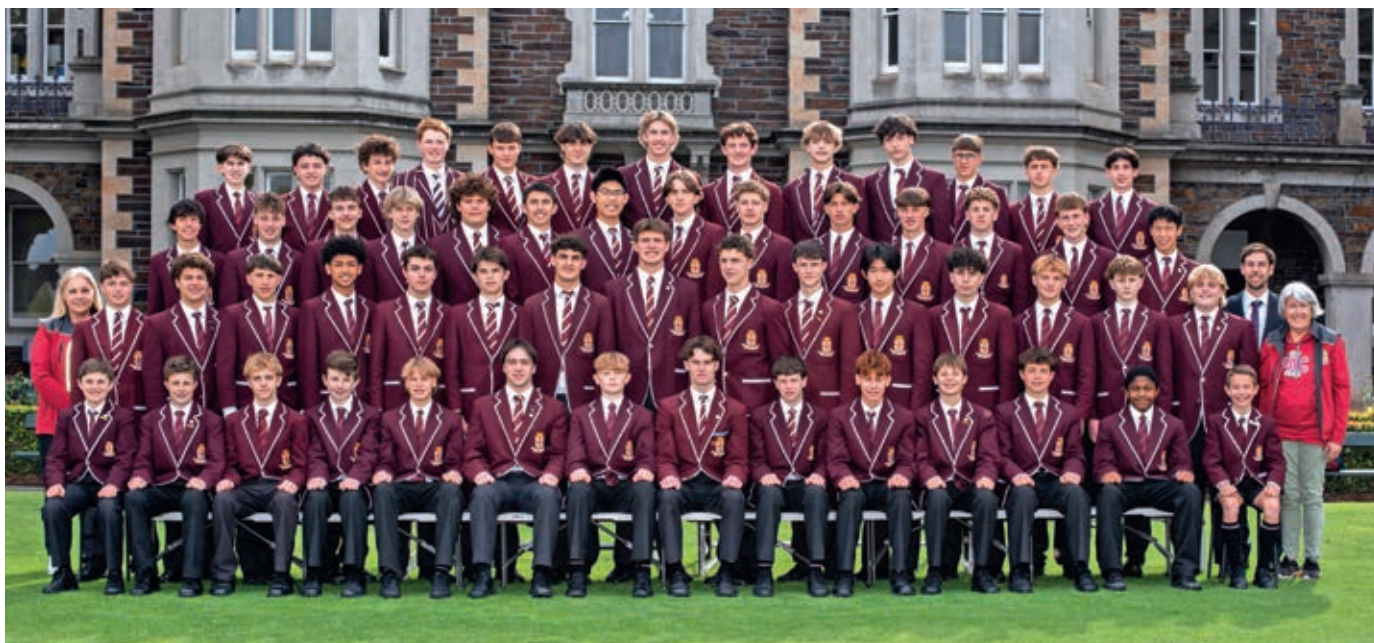

Chess

Secondary School

It has been another strong season for our chess program, with a record 65 players across 13 teams. In terms of results, PAC 1 Red, consisting of Ethan Retnaraja, Tharan Balachander, Oliver Fenton and Clynton Vuong, had another strong season, finishing 5.5 points ahead of their nearest challenger, completing our 15th straight Division 1 title, and 43rd overall. PAC 1 White and Gold also had good seasons, both coming equal 5th, despite being the two youngest teams in the division.

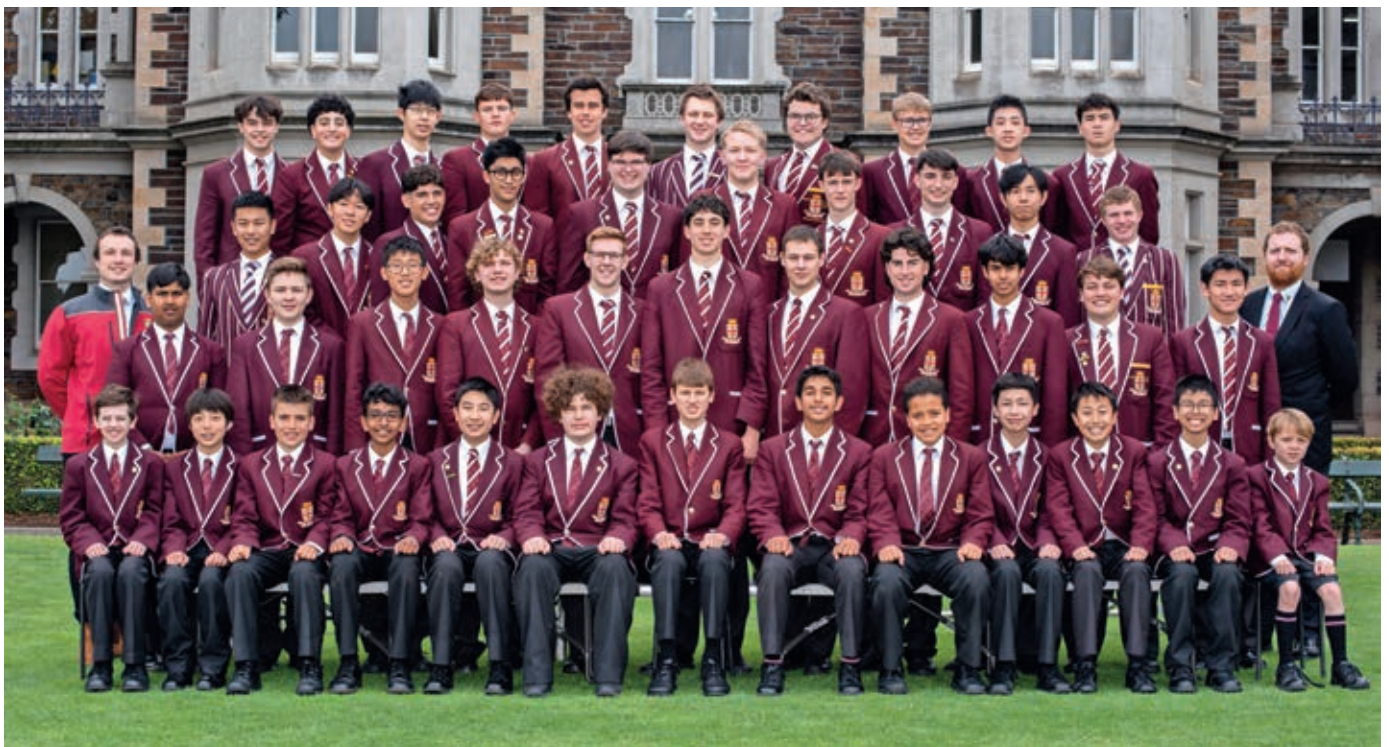
There were also a number of strong performances in other divisions, with us entering 10 teams across Division 2 and 3 competitions. PAC 2 White, an entirely Year 8 team, stepped up from Division 3 last season to finish 4th in Division 2 at the Chess Centre. PAC 2 Gold and PAC 2 Green both finished equal 10th, with these teams being entirely Year 10 and Year 7 respectively, save for Year 2, Arthur Kerrigan, filling in for a night. In Division 3, PAC P White would go on to be Champions on the final match day, with Hugo Spears rallying the troops, and helping the side overcome a 2 point deficit going into the final night. Division 3 also saw two Year 12 teams, PAC P Red and Orange, compete, and while whole articles could be written of their exploits, the real value of these teams was the entertaining, though sometimes mildly terrifying, brand of chess they brought to the table.

The College also won the annual Intercollegiate Chess match for the 15th straight year, defeating St Peter's College 8.0-2.0 at St Peter's, in a match that was closer than the scoreline suggested. For the first time two preparatory school players were named in an intercollegiate lineup, with Year 6 Keshav Balachander at board 5, and Year 5 Patrick Yan at board 10. Patrick Yan would win his game, having already represented the College in Table Tennis earlier in the day. Even beyond this though, our side was remarkably young, with over half of the team being in year 8 or below.

There were a number of notable individual achievements over the season. Ethan Retnaraja has had another remarkable year, coming 4th in the Australian Reserve Championship, 2nd in the Checkmate Open and winning the South Australian Blitz Championship. Alistair Maria came 2nd in the State U16 Championship and equal first on points in the City of Adelaide U21s. Tony Xiang came 2nd in the October Junior 25, after a remarkable rise in the last 12 months. Connor Caruso also had a remarkable first season with our program, coming 2nd in the October Junior 60 U15 section, 3rd in the City of Adelaide U12s, and the best U1000 in the Hosworth High-Flyers.

This year, we hosted the Richard E Thorne Shield and House Chess together during the Athletics Carnival. Watsford would win the Middle Years House Chess, while Taylor would win the Senior Years. Alistair Maria of Watsford won the Middle Years Richard E Thorne Cup, ahead of Xavier Lim in 2nd and Tony Xiang in 3rd. Oliver Fenton of Waterhouse pulled off the miracle to win in the Senior Years, ahead of Ethan Retnaraja in 2nd, and Tharan Balachander in 3rd. The final for the Shield was played on a digital board, and played live to everyone on the front oval by the big screen, with a large crowd also present within the Piper Pavilion. Alistair, with the black pieces, defeated Oliver in what was a closely fought match, making Alistair Maria our Secondary School Champion for 2024.

Co-captains Ethan Retnaraja and Caleb Tang, and vice-captain Lachlan McKay, are to be congratulated on their excellent leadership this year. Mr George Bartley again coached our division 1 boys, and his influence was particularly important in the development of a number of our younger players this year. Mike Hill was again instrumental, and I thank him for his 4 years with the program; while he himself would describe himself as just 'bringing the fun', few students would describe his merciless performances in practice matches that way,

Preparatory Chess

It has been another strong year for Preparatory Chess at the College, with 41 players from Years 1 to 6 represented the College. In terms of results, PAC A Red, led on board 1 by Keshav Balachander, alongside Patrick Yan, Joshua Sam and Ashton Gerecke, finished 2nd overall in Primary A, behind East Marden Blue in first place. PAC A White performed admirably this year finishing 7th out of 8 teams. In the EK Shield, we finished 2nd, our best performance in many years.

Players in B and C Grade have also gone from strength to strength this year. PAC B Red had a strong season, coming 4th, half a point behind third, and being invited to the B Grade finals. Our three B Grade board 1s, Joseph Huang, Nicholas Pizzino and Fengshun Zhang set the standard throughout the season, while the remarkable improvement of Tommy Hodgson saw PAC B White have a late surge. Two of our C Grade teams, Red and White, were also involved to the finals, and would finish 9th and 12th respectively out of 22 teams, with Tom Dickson, Ishaan Hossain and Leon Chang being standouts. Aidan Wei (3.5/5) and Year 1 Humphrey Duckworth (2.0/2) also had strong seasons.

We also hosted the traditional House Chess and Richard E Thorne Cups this year. In the Reception to Year 3 section, Year 2 Arthur Kerrigan came 1st, winning all 5 of his matches, while Nicholas Pizzino and Thomas Yan came equal 2nd. In the Preparatory School competition, Keshav Balachander won with 5.0/5, while Patrick Yan came 2nd, with there being a three way tie for 3rd between Harrison Duckworth, Ashton Gerecke and Joshua Sam on 2.0/5. In House Chess, it was a tight competition, with Taylor and Waterhouse both finishing on 11 points, half a point ahead of Cotton. In the end, it came down to a bullet tiebreak between Keshav and Patrick, with Patrick winning the competition for Waterhouse.

In state competitions, a number of students achieved impressive results. Patrick Yan went from strength to strength over the course of the season, winning an incredible 24.0/24 in the July Junior, before going on to win the U11 State Title in October. Patrick, Year 5, would also go on to be our youngest ever player to win in an Intercollegiate

We had over 400 boys and 16 teams playing football from Years 3-12, and we were able to expand our coaching group to 37 coaches this season, allowing the boys to continue to grow as players. We also had a Friday night Auskick program for younger boys which was run brilliantly by Mr Barton and assisted by the First squad players.

This year we combined with soccer to take a group of Year 8 footballers and Year 8/9 soccer players on a tour to Melbourne. This was the first tour of its kind for the school, and the first for Year 8 football since 2019. The boys went on a tour of the MCG, a team dinner at Leo's spaghetti bar, a tour of the Melbourne Demons, Melbourne Victory and Melbourne Storm facilities which was run by past Old Scholars and current Melbourne Demons, Kade Chandler and Tom Sparrow. We also saw the Crows beat the Bombers by 2 points in a high scoring encounter, and we played against our friends in Melbourne, Wesley College.

The First XVIII had our turn this season hosting Wesley College, where we played them on the final day of Term 1. It was a great opportunity for the team to put what they had learned from new coach David Oatey into practice in front of a large crowd at lunch time. We went on to win the game comfortably as the First XVIII began their undefeated season. The First XVIII had a tremendous year which saw the team play on Adelaide Oval against Sacred Heart College in the SAAS grand final. The boys started strong and held the lead all game to win 10.12.72 to 7.8.50. Jay Polkinghorne was awarded with the best on ground for the game.

The Second XVIII also had a wonderful year, finishing very strong. Starting in the Division 1 competition and getting valuable experience against the top-level teams, before qualifying for the Division 2 competition where we finished 3rd. Having two teams in the best 10 teams in school footy this season is an amazing effort.

The Year 10's are the final team that play in a competition with finals and these boys played at a consistently high level across the season to win both the School Sport SA knockout final and SAAS grand final both against Sacred Heart College.

Across the football program all teams showed great improvement, with most teams playing considerably better the second time they faced an opponent during the season. This helps to see the growth that each team had over the course of their season.

I believe our best highlight for the season and best example of what it means to be a PAC footballer came from our Fifth XVIII, who, in their final game for the season, kicked the ball 'accidentally' to a couple of Rostrevor players so they could kick their first ever goals. The parents from both teams were so proud of the boys with one opposition parent saying, "that's the sweetest game of football I've ever seen."

I would like to thank all the boys, coaches, staff and families involved in the football program. You have been fantastic to work with, bounce ideas off and continue the growth and improvement of the football program. I look forward to working with everyone again in 2025 as we look to continue the growth of the program.

Rugby

Table Tennis

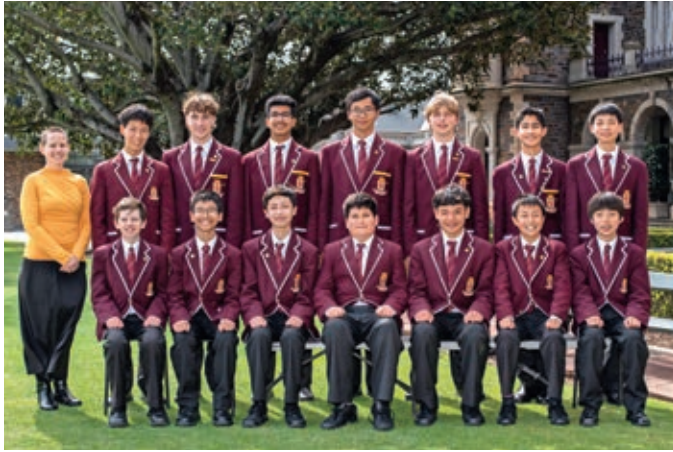

Participants learnt topics outside of the Australian Curriculum, such as number bases and telescopic sums and prepared for the challenging Da Vinci Decathlon and the Australian Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad.

Athletics



Jack Rayner

Relatively new to the sport of Athletics, Jack has already demonstrated remarkable potential and talent. He was awarded the U/16 age champion at the 2023 House Athletics. In an extraordinarily short period, he has also excelled beyond expectations. At the Achilles Cup last year,

he achieved first place in the U16 100m, 200m and 400m sprints and set a new 400m record, in a time of 50.67 seconds (a record that had previously stood for 24 years). In 2023, at the All-Schools State Championships, Jack achieved first place in the U17 100m and 200m, and second place in the 400m. Jack was then selected in the SA team for the All-Schools National Competition. Jack is the current U/18 400m Champion and second fastest in the state, in the 100m and 200m. In a space of only 6 months, Jack obtained selection and represented South Australia at the Australian Athletics Championships.

Cricket



Dylan James

Dylan is an exquisite timer of the ball, scoring freely against both pace and spin and has a determined presence at the crease. He scored two brilliant centuries in England and has a knack of scoring runs when the team needs them most. In the field, Dylan is exceptional. Without a doubt,

the standout fielder in the First XI, he hunts the ball in the inner circle pouncing on anything that comes near him. He is a highly valued team player who gets better with each passing game and has left a legacy on younger players of professionalism and high work ethic.



Matt LeRay

Foundation

In 2024, the Prince Alfred College Foundation celebrated its 50th anniversary. This milestone provided us with a chance to reflect on the achievements and all that the Foundation has achieved for the College community over the past 50 years.

The story of the Foundation over these past five decades is one of vision, partnership, and commitment. It all began with a group of forward-thinking Old Scholars and parents who saw the need for a dedicated body to 'preserve, develop, and maintain the standards and facilities of the College into the future'. It was the first of its kind among independent schools in South Australia – an idea that was ahead of its time and one that has shaped the College ever since.

From that very first project – securing 150 acres of land for what would become our Scotts Creek outdoor education centre – the Foundation has continually demonstrated its passion for enhancing the experiences of our students. Over the years, it has supported projects that have transformed our campus, created scholarships that have changed lives, and helped build an environment where students can truly thrive. The relationship between the College and the Foundation has always been about more than just bricks and mortar; it has been about making sure our students receive a holistic, enriching education that sets them up for life beyond the classroom.

The fine work of the Foundation and its members continued in 2024. With the Endowment fund sitting in a healthy position, we turn our eyes to the bold program of Capital works that will re-invigorate our beloved campus over the next decade.

Throughout the year, we hosted events for our members and the broader community, ranging from the Scholarship Morning Tea in February to the 50th Anniversary Cocktail Party for members in November, which we celebrated with a 'Touch of Gold'.

At the AGM in May, we farewelled our President, Mr Nicolas Heard, who held the role from 2018- 2024 and was previously a Board

Commemorating Our Old Scholars

Prince Alfred College is committed to honouring the memory of our Old Scholars who lost their lives in conflict. On ANZAC Day 2024, we held the inaugural Field of Remembrance Service, marking 100 years since the dedication of the Memorial building established in 1924. In a poignant ceremony, 263 Year 11 and Year 12 students placed white crosses in the front oval, each bearing a plaque with the name of an Old Collegian and the conflict in which he served. This initiative was part of a comprehensive research project by the Archives, which documented the profiles of these young men, some as young as 18 at the time of their sacrifice. The event left a profound impact on all attendees, including distinguished Old Scholars such as Brigadier David Smith and Major Tom Radford. Due to its success, the College is committed to making this service an annual tradition. The Archives will continue to research and add more crosses to honour those who fell in the Boer War and post-1945 conflicts. We have also launched a dedicated webpage featuring their biographies. **LEST WE FORGET.**

Enhancing Our Facilities

• The Colton Wing

At Prince Alfred College, one of our strategic priorities is to provide inspiring facilities. The Archives proudly contributed to the design of a beautifully refurbished space in the Colton wing of the main building, showcasing a selection of the College's artwork in a Salon Hang feature.

• Preparatory Rose Garden

As we prepare for our new Preparatory buildings, we have carefully transplanted the original roses into the garden at St. Jacques, the former residence of the Headmaster on Flinders Street.

• Student Contributions

Year 12 Prefects Caleb Tang and Nic Marino completed internships in the Archives, providing valuable student perspectives for the House Structure Project and the 2024 ANZAC Day Project, including the inaugural Field of Remembrance service. They shared their insights with Year 2 and Year 7 classes and were honoured at the Year 12 Special Prizes assembly, receiving the Brian S. Baldwin Archives and Museum Prize.

• Remembrance Day

On November 11, our 2025 Captains—Petey Flower, Noah Mennillo, and George Marks—exemplified our College values of Respect, Excellence, Belonging, and Endeavour at the St Peters Heroes Memorial rededication service. In the presence of Her Excellency the Honourable Frances Adamson AC, Governor of South Australia, they solemnly read the names of fallen soldiers from the local area, including those who attended Prince Alfred College.

President's Report 2024

Our annual Old Scholars' Week held in the last week of July included our famed Old Old Boys' Assembly attended by 209 Old Reds, with the oldest being Dr Graham Wicks who commenced at Prince Alfred College in 1940. Later that evening, we hosted our Annual Dinner at the Adelaide Convention Centre with over 320 Old Reds in attendance, where we were privileged to hear from Australia's first Olympic Gold Medallist in the Winter Olympics, Steven Bradbury OAM.

Our Intercol competitions remain a highlight, with enthusiastic participation in sports ranging from Football, Tennis, Basketball, Cricket, Golf, Chess, Bridge, Water Polo, Lawn Bowls, Hockey, Squash, Badminton, Bridge and Snooker. Next year we will be expanding our offerings, adding Texas Hold 'Em and Clay Target Shooting to the program.

The 24th Vintage Reds' Luncheon was held at the College on Friday 18 October where we welcomed 273 Old Reds. This event exemplifies the enduring spirit of the Old Scholar community, bringing members together to share stories and memories while strengthening the Association's network.

The commitment and energy of our sporting clubs, committees, and members ensure our teams stay competitive in their respective sports, fostering the best level of competition.

In the 2024 Australia Day Honors, we congratulated Dr Christopher Lex Watson (PAC 1948-1952) for service to the community of Belconnen in the ACT, in particular Community Conservation.

Congratulations to Dr Brett Gooden (PAC 1953-1960) who was inducted into the Princes Men Gallery in April.

The PAOCA Management Committee meets each month to consider ways to support and advance our community, guided by a commitment to benefit the wider scholar community. We aim to promote the participation of Old Reds as mentors for recent school leavers, current university and TAFE students aligning with our mission of fostering guidance and leadership across generations. The PAOCA Mentoring Program allows mentees to be mentored for a six-month period by an Old Scholar as a way of providing guidance, support and further strengthening their network and connection with our great College.

Fran joined the Music Team at the start of 2020 – just in time for the onset of the 'COVID era'! Singing was an activity that received a high level of scrutiny in this period, with discussions on 'aerosols' and 'safe singing distance' being a regular occurrence, along with the battle of trying to teach singing with masks on

and/or via Zoom. It was this baptism of fire that showed us the sort of asset we had in Fran; relentlessly kind and optimistic, organised and hard working. With her background as an experienced jazz vocalist and primary music classroom educator, she quickly brought a sense of order but also fun to vocal ensembles, which set the tone for 5 years of positive growth under her guidance.

Building the quantity and quality of singing across the College was a key goal for Fran, and she has done just that. In the Preparatory School, the Junior Voices Year 3-6 ensemble has doubled in size with around 40 members, with the new Young Voices (R-2) at 28 boys, plus the auditioned Prep Small Vocal group that features top quality singing and movement in the 'boy band' style. In Secondary, all ensemble singers are now receiving individual vocal tuition, and in 2025 there will be three groups competing at Generations in Jazz – up from two in 2024, and just one for many years before that. Her impact has also been tangible on Prep Arts Hour, several musical productions, House Music and the onset of outstanding solo vocalists, along with the broader culture of the Music Department.

We wish Fran all the best in her exciting new role as a Leader of Learning: Music, and we look forward to building on the exceptional foundation she has provided the Voice Program in her 5 years of wonderful service.
