# Headmaster's Report



We are living through one of the most disruptive periods of student learning in recent history – artificial intelligence and social media are having a profound impact on the way our children grow, learn and interact with each other. Despite all of this, the 2025 school year at Prince Alfred College was an excellent year. We have continued to focus on our College purpose of nurturing each boy to develop into well-rounded young men of good character, who

are ready to make a positive contribution to society. To deliver on this purpose, we have focussed on some key areas, including:

**Princes Men Charter** – leadership, reward, acknowledgement of effort; these are all things that matter for our boys as they speak to what our community values. The Princes Men Charter and Approach To Learning (ATL) data has helped us work with our Secondary boys to raise the academic expectation and standards across the College.

**Artificial Intelligence** – The College's AI Steering Committee completed a significant amount of work this year preparing the AI College Guidelines document that will continue to support our staff and students through what we all know is a disruptive time in the delivery of education and the assessment of student knowledge and achievement.

**Smart Devices** – At the beginning of 2025 we created an environment on campus that withheld the use of smart devices in the Preparatory School and reinforced the restricted access already in place in the Secondary School.

**Co-Curricular** - We were incredibly proud of our boys' engagement and performances across the summer and winter co-curricular seasons - the expectation and messaging for our boys to display dignity and humility remains omnipresent.

Within the Secondary School we have sought to impact our boys' social consciousness through the increased engagement in Service Learning. Stage 1 of the Secondary School Curriculum Review has been delivered and sees increased flexibility and opportunities in 2026 for the Senior Secondary students, including the offering of a university subject, inside our own curriculum, offered in partnership with Adelaide University. We will also see extension Science and History incorporated into the Year 10 program of study in 2026. Our Year 9 cohort were the top performing boys in the state with respect to their NAPLAN performance and are well positioned for their senior studies because of the exceptional work done by our teachers in Years 7-9.

Two highlights amongst the many exceptional performances in the co-curricular program was our intermediate state debating champions and the Head of the River winning First VIII rowing crew.

Within the Preparatory School there has been a major focus on deepening the teaching practices of Explicit Direct Instruction; this has been achieved through professional learning and coaching and is having a significant benefit on the boys' learning.

In 2025 we welcomed to the College, Ms Georgina West, our new Deputy Headmaster/Head of Secondary School. Ms West came to us from Walford where she was the Head of Secondary and prior to that she taught at the Wilderness School.

The class of 2025 and their teachers should feel immensely proud of their academic achievements. The Class of 2025's Median ATAR

was 88.85% (mean 86.03%) with 7 (4.67%) students scoring above an ATAR of 99, 28% were above 95%, and 44.37% scored above 90. The Dux of the College was Owen Chen who achieved a perfect score of 99.95 with 5 Merits and 2 High Distinctions in his University subjects. Congratulations to the students who obtained 49 Merits between them and to the students who achieved 25 High Distinctions between them in their University of Adelaide, Flinders University and University of South Australia Headstart subjects.

Our enrolment numbers have remained steady with 1,132 students enrolled from Reception – Year 12 at the conclusion of the 2025 academic year. Our Boarding house was also at capacity with 152 boarders in residence through the year with the villas being used for the increased numbers in Semester 2.

The Preparatory School was in part required to decant into demountable classrooms that were placed on the Front Oval area next to the library whilst the building works, that commenced in early Term 1, took place. The boys were able to watch the progress of the build throughout the year and undertake activities and projects that were related to the building works. At the conclusion of the academic year the build is on target for completion during Term 1 2026 in readiness for our boys to be in their new rooms for the start of Term 2. We thank our architects Walter Brooke & Associates and our builder Marshall & Brougham who have been very accommodating during the year.

I would like to acknowledge and thank the College Council members for their dedication as 2025 saw the planning and delivery of several major projects. Mr David Sanders commenced as the Chair of Council at the start of 2025 and has been involved in several key appointments to ensure the strategic acumen of the Council. We are grateful for his dedicated service and governance skills he brings to his work with Prince Alfred College.

Our Secondary School leaders Petey Flower (College Captain), Noah Mennillo and George Marks (Vice-Captains) and the Preparatory leaders Jawad Ismaeel (Captain) and Hamish Hewitt (Vice-Captain)

were exceptional role models, and we thank them for their leadership throughout the year.

My thanks to the Executive team, teaching and operational staff, Old Scholars and our parents for their dedicated support of our boys this year. I wish the class of 2025 all the best for the next chapter of their lives, and as I stated to them at the Valedictory Dinner – they do not need to be the richest, the smartest, the best looking or the funniest, they just need to be good men and good partners and they will make their College proud. I do hope they will remain connected to the school through the Prince Alfred Old Collegians Association.

# Preparatory School Report



2025 has been a year of growth, innovation, and shared success in the Preparatory School. As we reflect on the past twelve months, I am filled with pride and gratitude for the remarkable achievements we have accomplished together – students, teachers, and parents united in partnership and purpose. Every school year is a journey, and this one has been no exception. We have embraced challenges, celebrated milestones, and strengthened the

bonds that make our community so special.

Education is most powerful when it is collaborative, and this year has shown us the incredible impact of working hand-in-hand with parents. Together, we have created an environment where learning extends beyond the classroom – where conversations at home reinforce our values of Respect, Excellence, Belonging, and Endeavour, and where parents are active partners in shaping their sons' academic and personal growth.

One of the key opportunities that has allowed a unified language and approach between school and home has been the introduction of the Princes Men Charter. The clarity that this has provided for all members of the community has been beneficial, particularly in the Preparatory School where, due to the age of the boys, some implied behaviours may not be understood. The simple language has enabled boys to further develop their conduct.

The College has also invested heavily in developing the PAC Wellbeing Framework. Prince Alfred College has established a strategic partnership with The Wellbeing Distillery (TWD), The University of Adelaide's WILD Lab, and Resilient Youth Australia to support the development of a comprehensive wellbeing framework and strategy. This initiative has been informed by the perspectives of more than 750 stakeholders – including leaders, educators, support staff, students, and families – through anonymous PAC Wellbeing Compass surveys and two structured rounds of focus group consultations. As this framework becomes embedded into the Preparatory School in 2026, it will further the partnership between families and staff as we work together to develop the wellbeing of our boys, and each other.

At the start of this year, we implemented a new approach in dealing with smart devices and social media. In the Preparatory School students are not permitted to bring smart phones or smart watches on campus. This decision has had a profoundly positive impact on students and their learning. Parents have been highly supportive, refraining from social media engagement by their sons, which has prevented exposure to inappropriate online behaviours and forums that they are not developmentally prepared for. This measure has also improved learning both in class and at home by reducing distractions. With the introduction of legislation prohibiting children under 16 in Australia from accessing social media platforms we believe our own approach supports the wellbeing of our youngest students.

A significant emphasis has been placed this year on advancing our Explicit Direct Instruction (EDI) within our teaching practices. This focus has been supported through targeted professional learning programs and ongoing instructional coaching, ensuring

that educators are equipped with the skills and strategies necessary to deliver highly structured and effective lessons. The impact of this initiative has been substantial, resulting in measurable improvements in student engagement, comprehension, and overall academic achievement.

With sustained attention on developing boys' behaviour and focus, alongside pedagogical enhancements, there has been a notable transformation in classrooms across the Preparatory School. These heightened expectations are being met by the boys, as evidenced by increased academic progress and achievement, including some of the highest Year 3 and 5 NAPLAN results in the College's history.

I frequently draw upon the high-jump analogy when discussing boys' achievement. While boys are naturally motivated to reach goals and meet expectations, they often exert only the effort required to clear the set standard – scraping the bar as they pass over yet successfully completing the jump. It is incumbent upon us, as parents and educators, to raise that bar deliberately and ambitiously. By setting high expectations, we empower our boys to strive for excellence and realise their full potential. This year, such an approach has been clearly demonstrated through their outstanding accomplishments across both academic and co-curricular domains.

Our students have access to a wide range of academic competitions designed to remove traditional constraints and provide rigorous challenges that encourage them to extend beyond their current capabilities. These opportunities allow them to compete at both national and international levels, fostering resilience and intellectual growth. Among the most notable competitions are the APSMO Olympiad, the Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC), and the International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (ICAS), which span six subject areas.

We are delighted to report that the number of Distinctions (top 10%) and High Distinctions (top 1%) achieved by our students in these competitions has continued to rise this year. Furthermore, for the first time, our school has been awarded multiple ICAS Medals – an honour reserved for the highest-scoring student in the state. These accomplishments reflect the dedication of our students and the unwavering support of our teaching staff and families.

It has been a privilege to witness our boys performing at the highest levels across a variety of sporting arenas – whether at National, State, District, or House events. Their commitment to training and perseverance has enabled them to push beyond personal limits, break records, and set new benchmarks for excellence.

Equally inspiring has been the flourishing of the arts within our community. The breadth and depth of musical experiences continue to expand, providing rich opportunities for creative expression. This year, the Concert Band proudly achieved a Gold placing at ABODA. Our Voice program also continues to thrive, with boys confidently performing before large audiences, showcasing both skill and courage.

It is deeply rewarding to see every boy discovering his unique strengths – whether academic, sporting, or artistic. These opportunities are made possible through the dedication of our staff, who deliver a diverse range of high-quality experiences that support the development of well-rounded young men.

Throughout this year, the buildings of the new Preparatory School have emerged from the ground. Behind the screen that we have become accustomed to, building has progressed at an impressive rate and has involved:

- 2678 tonnes of waste delivered to recycling providers
- 22,026 hours worked on the project from mid-December 2024 to the end of November 2025
- 145 individual site workers to mid-November
- 63 tonnes of structural steel
- 124 tonnes of reinforcing steel (in concrete)
- 820m<sup>3</sup> of concrete
- 104 external precast panels
- 1230m<sup>2</sup> of Australian Bluestone to external facades and paving
- 3,830 lineal metres of services cabling.
- 73 solar panels to be installed (50kW system)
- 747m<sup>2</sup> of feature timber ceilings
- 11 new outside play equipment items
- Approx. 1268 new plants planted
- Approx. 80 new trees planted

As we look towards 2026, the excitement of inhabiting these new buildings becomes a reality! They will provide a wonderful environment as the Preparatory School continues to build, in every sense of the word.

# Secondary School Report



It has been a tremendous honour to join Prince Alfred College this year. I set out to learn from students what matters most to them, believing this would inform my view about how I could best shape the delivery of strategic objectives. The students met the brief! It has been a great joy getting to know boys in the Secondary School through a broad range of experiences including camps at Scotts Creek and Wambana, musical performances, stage plays, sporting

contests, debates, chess games and classroom settings. Students have generously shared their ideas and aspirations, and they have extended a genuinely warm welcome.

My understanding of how we nurture the development of boys was immediately aided by the launch of the Princes Men Charter, developed by Mr Troy McKinnon in consultation with students across the College. The Charter reinforces our values of Respect, Excellence, Belonging and Endeavour and sets a high bar for the way in which we treat one another. From the perspective of a Secondary School student, the Charter is a lens through which he might reflect upon the question of 'who am I, and who am I becoming?' As set out in the title of the Charter, the plurality of the term 'men' forms a clear indicator that there is no single mould for boys to conform to at Prince Alfred College, we want students to discover their strengths and pursue their interests and we believe that in this journey, the Charter is an anchor point in developing young men of character who are prepared to contribute positively to society.

A second, important shift occurred at outset of the academic year. A strong body of research was showing that excessive social media and smart phone use was harmful to the development and wellbeing of adolescents. Based upon extensive research, parent survey data and

the approaching Federal legislation to ban social media for children aged under the age of 16, the College introduced a policy to restrict use of smart phones in the Secondary School, requiring these devices to be placed in lockers for the duration of the school day. Further consultation with Year 7 parents (for 2026) indicated overwhelming support for withholding the introduction of smart devices and for Year 7 students to attend school without a smart phone or smart watch. We believe these steps establish an environment that protects adolescents against disruption to their development and furthermore, enhances the capacity of our students to build strong interpersonal relationships with their peers and teachers, with 'un-plugged' interactions characterising daily routines.

In alignment with our mission to develop young men of character, a significant strategic project we have started this year is developing a wellbeing framework and strategy in partnership with The Wellbeing Distillery. Drawing on the voices of more than 750 community members (educators, students, support staff and parents), the College is taking an evidence-informed approach to shift from intention to impact. At this early stage, what we understand from our Secondary students is that they are navigating a world of high expectations, constant connection and complex social dynamics. Students have informed us that they want more candid conversations about screens, the pressure experienced in the adolescent years and developing a well-rounded, healthy sense of masculinity. This insightful feedback highlights the importance of involving students, along with staff and parents, in the delivery of this project, drawing on diverse perspectives to shape our practices as educators.

Prince Alfred College is an exceptional school. The priorities shared in this report have all been shaped with the input of a community who care greatly about the development of boys. I look forward to sharing this continued journey with you.

# Academic Report



The 2025 cohort built momentum strongly throughout year and delivered a mean (average) ATAR score was 86.03 and the median (midpoint) was 88.85. These were historically amongst our best results and a wonderful follow up to our strong results in 2024.

Excellence was seen across both SACE and the IB Diploma in a wide range of subjects, with 75 merits achieved by students. This includes

25 University HDs (via the University of Adelaide Headstart program, Flinders University Extension Studies and University of South Australia). We can be confident students can excel and prepare for university study in both of our Year 12 academic pathways.

Owen Chen was awarded the Edward Spicer Prize and Dux of School, achieving an ATAR of 99.95. He achieved subject Merits in Chemistry, Mathematical Methods, Physics and Music - Solo Performance, Activating Identities and Futures (AIF) and High Distinctions in Human Anatomy and Physiology & Introduction to Forensic Science (University of Adelaide). Owen will study Medicine at Adelaide University.

Aiden Foo was awarded the E B Colton Prize (Proxime Accessit to Dux of School) with an ATAR of 99.85, with subject Merits in Accounting, Chemistry, Mathematical Methods, and High Distinctions in Human Anatomy and Physiology and Introduction to Forensic Science (University of Adelaide).

At the Emeritus Assembly, Dux, Owen Chen gave the boys some great advice for their academic journey, including the importance of consistent effort, working closely with teachers and remaining connected through co-curricular engagement. He finished his speech by noting,

*“Don’t just visualise your success, but your struggles as well, and how you eventually overcome them. It doesn’t matter how big your goal is – if you can see it, and you have the courage to speak it, you can make it happen.”*

We wish all of 2025’s leavers the very best for their future endeavours.

Our NAPLAN results were very promising, with clear evidence of the positive impact of recent curriculum development, and we are confident of further growth to come. There were pleasing gains made in Year 3 and we look forward to more in the Preparatory School as the Explicit Direct Instruction (EDI) pedagogical model is embedded.

It was also exciting to see Prince Alfred College Year 9 students achieve our highest ever results, ranking 5th in the state. NAPLAN data across Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 continues to provide meaningful insights that offer a point of valid reflection for our teachers and boys, because as we know, growth in English and Maths proficiency is crucial to academic progress.

Our commitment to reading for pleasure and its clear academic benefits remains steadfast. Our Reading Program thrived in the new timetable with a number of new, exciting titles and resources added. This was complemented by excellent participation in the Premier’s Reading Challenge (PRC). Additionally it was great to see the ongoing success of the Wambana Reading Project. Reading is both a pleasure and an important foundation for academic achievement and we look forward to building further momentum in 2026.

Academic Extension took on a number of new themes in 2025 with new contributors, Ms Annie Matsouliadis, Mr Mark Wilde and Ms

Rebecca Hassam bringing fascinating perspectives outside of our taught curriculum, including, The Anthropocene and Literature: The Challenge of Representation, Chocolate – Cacao, Aztecs & the Cadburys, Blue zones – the secret to living over 100 years.

2025 was an exciting time in the Preparatory School with our state-of-art building development proceeding on schedule and the Explicit Direct Instruction pedagogical model gathering momentum. A revised timetable has provided more curriculum time in English and Mathematics along with enhanced specialist programs that provide purposeful, informed, knowledge-rich experiences, most notably in a newly established learning area of Science, Technology and Robotics.

Our academic programs foster deep thinkers and this was evident in 2025 through numerous exciting competition performances and developments. In mathematics our Preparatory and Secondary students continued to have great success across a range of competitions. It was particularly exciting to see Co-curricular Mathematics continuing to thrive on Sundays and Wednesdays led by our Coordinator in Mathematics: Non-routine problem solving and experiences, Ms Marta Matthews.

Under the stewardship of Anthony Harradine, the Team Competition has expanded to include Year 7 students, having previously involved only Year 8, while in Year 8 the wonderful addition of ‘Maths Battles’ proved a great success. This program culminated in an inspiring inaugural inter-school battle between PAC and Adelaide Botanic High School in which we prevailed.

We can now look forward to the expansion of this concept into the Preparatory School where Year 4 and Year 6 students will have the opportunity to hone their non-routine problem solving skills. These offerings are critical to ensuring that our talented passionate mathematicians have every opportunity to thrive.

In Science there was a continuation of its strong tradition of success, and there were many great results in the National Titration Competition, Australian Science Olympiad and Australian Science Innovations ‘Big Science’ Competition and Oliphant Awards. The Science Journal was an exceptional publication in 2025, with the standard of articles reaching a new high under the leadership of Mr Peter Hopkins and student editor, Aryan Parwal. Similarly, there were several strong results in the field of Humanities competitions such as the Australian History Competition and Australian National Geography Competition.

In the area of English, the 2025 Shades of Red Journal publication again reflected the high quality of student literary work while the Year 10 Poetry Slam has become a highlight of the year showcasing the boys insightful thinking, creativity and performance skills.

It was exciting to see highly successful academic tours to Europe in English (April 2025) and History (October 2025). Thank you to the teaching staff who brought these to life and the boys for their exemplary conduct and genuine enthusiasm. These tours have been valuable in building both belonging and our academic culture.

Overall, 2025 was an excellent year and we have much to look forward to again in 2026.

## Angwin Classroom

### Connecting with Kaurna Culture Through Palti Circle

Each morning, our Angwin learning community comes together in a Palti Circle—a Kaurna word meaning “gathering” or “meeting.” This practice is an important way for us to deepen our understanding of Kaurna perspectives and culture. It provides a space where every voice is valued, and where respect, listening, and sharing are at the heart of our interactions. When we sit in a Palti Circle, we can see everyone, listen carefully, and take turns speaking.

The children have embraced this opportunity with enthusiasm. They thoughtfully place natural materials within the circle to represent their connection to Country, and use timber figures to symbolise themselves within the space. Educators light a bush candle, filling the air with the scents of Country, creating a sensory experience that brings the land into our learning environment.

“It smells like the bush. I feel relaxing.” **Rebecca Yang**

“I love the smell and the grass.” **Avie Yap**

“I like about when we get the candle.” **Eli Georgiou**

“I love it! I think about the Kaurna people. I think about how the Kaurna people share their land.” **Azaria Connolly**

“I like putting my person in the middle. Two paltis, and then I count them.” **Hugh Jurek**

“We are a group... connected together.” **Albert Radford**

“We are a community.” **Kian Mahajan**

Through these shared experiences, we are building a deeper appreciation for the rich culture of the Kaurna people. The Palti Circle reminds us that learning is not only about knowledge—it is about relationships, respect, and belonging. By embedding these practices into our daily routine, we are nurturing a community that values diversity and honours the stories of the land on which we live and learn.

## Chapple Classroom

### The Value of Collaborative Play in the Chapple Room

“Play – especially social play away from adults – is how children acquire the physical, emotional, social and cognitive strengths that enable them to deal with the bumps in the road of life without falling apart.” – Dr. Peter Gray, American Psychology Researcher.

Collaborative play is a cornerstone of the Early Years Learning Framework (EYLF) because it nurtures a wide range of developmental skills essential for lifelong learning. In the Chapple Room, children are encouraged to explore diverse activities that broaden their confidence and help them make sense of their world through play. By following their own interests with gentle adult guidance, children engage more deeply and meaningfully.

When Chapple Room children play together collaboratively, they develop vital social skills such as sharing, taking turns, negotiating, and resolving conflicts. These experiences build empathy and emotional intelligence as children begin to understand others’ perspectives and feelings. Collaborative play also sparks creativity and problem-solving, as children work together to invent games, construct imaginative structures, and navigate pretend scenarios.

Language development is another key benefit, as children articulate ideas, listen to peers, and expand their vocabulary through interaction. This shared play fosters a sense of belonging, teamwork, and pride in collective achievements. In Chapple Room, we learn with each other and from each other—collaborative play is not just fun; it is a powerful foundation for growth, resilience, and lifelong learning.

### Seeds of Wonder: A Journey of Discovery and Growth

In Term 2, our children embarked on an exciting inquiry into seeds—starting with simple questions like “*Where do seeds come from?*” and blossoming into a rich exploration of fruits, vegetables, growth, and care. Their curiosity led them to investigate a variety of fruits and vegetables, discovering the fascinating shapes, sizes, colours, and textures of the seeds inside. From the tiny specks in a dragon fruit to the large, smooth avocado seed, each discovery sparked new theories about why seeds look the way they do and what they might become.

Through hands-on experiences—sorting, feeling, and observing seeds with magnifiers—the children developed a strong sense of wonder. These moments inspired thoughtful conversations about how seeds travel, what helps them grow, and why they are hidden inside different foods. Along the way, they built scientific vocabulary, confidently using words like *sprout*, *germinate*, *protect*, and *nurture*.

The inquiry naturally extended into gardening. Children planted some of the seeds they had collected and took responsibility for caring for their seedlings—watering, checking for sunlight, and noticing small changes each day. Watching the first shoots emerge brought a sense of pride and accomplishment, reinforcing the importance of patience and gentle care.

This journey has been more than a science lesson; it has encouraged reflection on the idea of potential—how something so small can grow into something strong and thriving. As the children continue to investigate, tend their plants, and ask new questions, they are building not only scientific understanding but also empathy, responsibility, and respect for living things.

## Edgerley Classroom

As the holiday season approached, the Edgerley children spent Term 4 exploring a wide range of celebrations and traditions from around the world. Throughout the term, they took part in whole-class, small-group, and individual learning experiences that deepened their understanding of why people celebrate and how different cultures mark special occasions.

Children shared personal stories about holidays such as Chinese New Year, Eid, Christmas, and Halloween. These discussions created meaningful opportunities to compare experiences, notice similarities and differences, and appreciate the unique ways families celebrate. As a whole centre, we also engaged in festivities together, including a lively Diwali Dance Party and a memorable performance of the Nativity, which encouraged children to reflect on the significance of these traditions.

Play-based learning further strengthened their understanding. In the home corner, children acted out birthday parties, prepared pretend feasts, and organised gatherings for their dolls and peers. They made playdough cakes, experimented with candles, and used recycled materials to design imaginative Christmas Pageant floats. Their conversations during this play revealed growing insights into the concept of celebration:

Through these rich and joyful experiences, the Edgerley children developed a stronger appreciation for diverse cultural perspectives and world views. They began to understand that celebrations can be big or small, traditional or personal, but all hold special meaning for the people who take part in them.

## Langley Classroom

The Langley children have engaged in a year-long inquiry, *My Feelings Matter*, where we have examined the range of human emotions and how they are expressed. As a provocation for this inquiry, we shared the story *The Colour Monster* by Anna Llenas. In this story, the monster's feelings are all mixed up and a friend helps to sort them out, identifying what they are and how they can feel in your body. Each of the feelings is represented by a different colour. The children have been deeply engaged with this narrative, making connections between the monster's feelings and their own, and aligning them with the colours.

As children grow socially and emotionally, recognising their own feelings, and understanding those of others, is an essential skill. With this in mind, we have been investigating how emotions are communicated through body language and facial expression. Together, we have talked about how all feelings are valid, and the children have practised positive strategies for identifying, expressing, and managing their emotions.

To deepen their understanding, we curated a range of creative experiences using different artistic and tactile materials. Through loose parts, drawing, and construction, the children were invited to represent themselves and their feelings in imaginative ways. Using mirrors, they closely examined their facial features, noticing how expressions change and how each of us look both similar and uniquely different. These rich learning experiences have supported the children in building emotional literacy, self-awareness, and confidence in sharing their feelings with others.

## Mattingley Classroom

### Our Journey into Mindful Observations

This year, our class explored the fascinating world of living things through conversations, research, and creative expression.

The children embarked on their investigation of living things using technology as they explored with the digital microscope and documented their observations through journaling and drawing. We noticed that the children were further developing their dispositions—not only to be curious but also to seek answers to their wonderings through research. Their research methods became more meaningful because of their hands-on nature, allowing the children to immerse themselves in a dynamic process that awakened their awareness of objects and artefacts from nature.

In the children's nature collection, they examined mulberry blossoms, gumnuts, bird feathers, and dried eucalypt flowers under the digital microscope. This gave the children a different perspective on these objects as they were projected and magnified on the laptop screen.

Children shared ideas about what the mulberry blossoms reminded them of:

"Aliens," imagined **Cassian Sabetzadeh**.

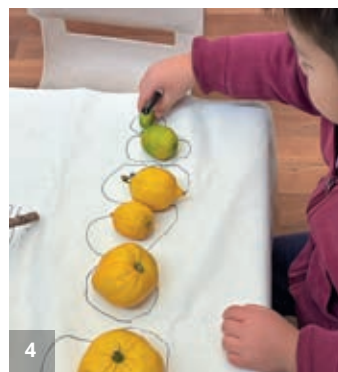
"It looks like flowers," **Chen Boyle** noticed, while **Xander Bois** added, "The berries are green."

## Wilkins Classroom

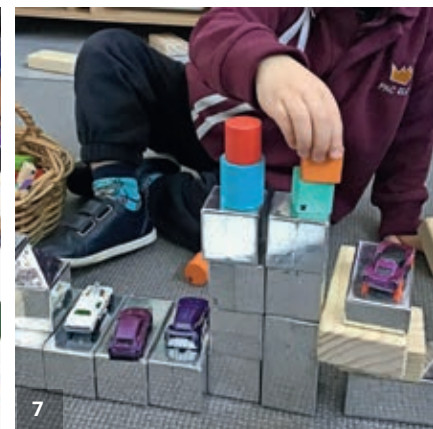
Throughout the year, the Wilkins children demonstrated a deep curiosity for small vehicles—cars, trains, and construction trucks—which sparked rich opportunities for imaginative and purposeful play. These familiar resources nurtured their sense of belonging and inspired collaborative projects across the learning environment. The small vehicles have been a valuable tool to foster children's sense of security, invitation into play and build on social emotional skills such as sharing, turn taking and co-constructing ideas.

Children integrated vehicles into diverse play scenarios, combining wooden and mirror blocks, magnetic tiles, recycled materials, loose parts and figurines to create complex structures and challenge individual thinking. Their play evolved beyond simple roads and tracks to include garages, ramps for exploring speed and height, exploring cause and effect and colour-matching experiences. Educators cultivated children's play ideas by observing and listening purposefully, providing opportunities for the implementation of additional materials and language to challenging thinking and aid interactions to build understanding, harmony and reciprocal play.

Through these explorations, children exercised agency and creativity, transforming everyday materials into opportunities for innovation and learning. They were able to explore their own concepts and inquiries using varied platforms and levels too, such as playing on floor level and below resources, higher levels such as tables or shelves, and open movement around the classroom. Through these lenses children were able to discover varied visual concepts through their lens of choice. These valuable play experiences continue to foster children's imagination, language development, problem-solving, and mathematical thinking, while encouraging persistence, absorption and confidence in their play.

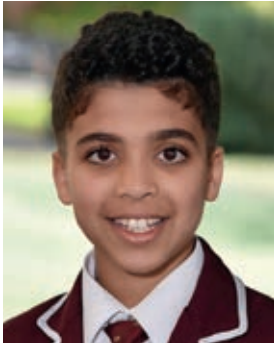

# OSHC and Vacation Care

At the start of 2025, the Preparatory School redevelopment began, resulting in the repurposing of our usual OSHC space into a Year 3 classroom for the 2025 school year. Consequently, OSHC was relocated to the transportable classrooms located on the side of the Front Oval. Although our available space has slightly decreased, the immediate access to the Galetta playground has been highly valued by the children, and we continue to make full use of the John Dunning Gym as before.

The relocation has resulted in a modest reduction in the available indoor space. Despite this change, OSHC continues to operate effectively within the transportable classrooms. The transition has encouraged innovative and flexible use of the facilities to maintain program quality and meet the needs of the children. In addition, the John Dunning Gymnasium remains a key space for indoor activities and program delivery. These facilities collectively support a diverse range of developmental and recreational opportunities for the children.

The closer proximity to outdoor play areas has promoted increased physical activity and engagement among the children. Throughout this transition, children, families, and staff have demonstrated adaptability and resilience. Importantly, OSHC continues to deliver high-quality programs despite the spatial adjustments.

Moving forward, ongoing monitoring of space utilisation and children's engagement will guide future improvements. Feedback from children, families, and staff will be actively sought to support continuous quality enhancement. Consideration will be given to optimising the transportable classrooms through layout adjustments and resource allocation, with safety and accessibility remaining key priorities until we return to our usual OSHC space in April 2026.

We look forward to moving back into our improved space once the redevelopment is complete.

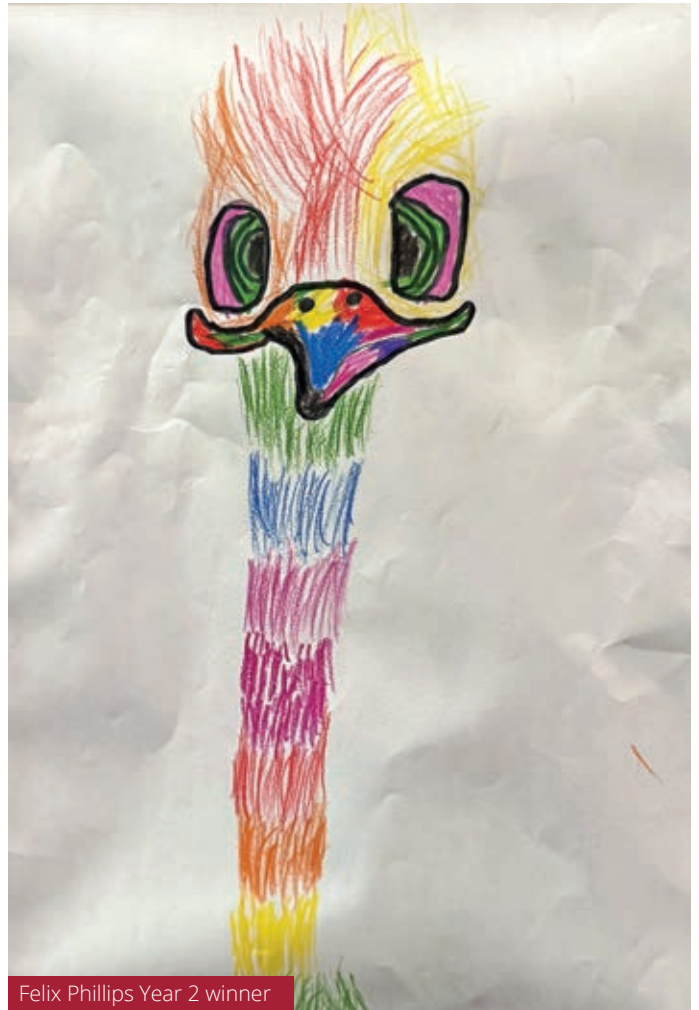

# Cotton House

2025 also saw the launch of our service initiative, KickStart for Kids. The initiative was a breakfast and reading club at The Pines School in Adelaide's North. This program launched in early Term 1 and ran through to the end of the year. The boys served breakfast before reading to students in Years 1 to 3, and returning to the College around recess. A massive thank you and congratulations must go to our Service Learning Co-ordinator, Mr Dylan Pippett, on a successful launch this year, and we are all looking forward to the program continuing in the coming years.

Participation was again the key in the major Wesley Cup events, with Cotton remaining strong to our culture. Notably, this culture saw Cotton narrowly win the inaugural House Cross Country, with high numbers of Cotton students choosing the race event and gaining extra points for their House. Marco Wirth's efforts on the day were particularly impressive, leading our Year 11 and 12 group to a strong overall performance. The Athletics Carnival again saw strong results for boys in Cotton, with Cotton track star Jack Rayner again winning Champion of Champions against a strong field of his peers. In House Chess, held on the same day, Cotton starred, winning the Middle Years competition, before winning the overall competition, defeating

Senior Waterhouse 6-1 in the final, led by strong performances from Tarush Jindal, Manav Karthikeyan, William Pan and Billy Ang.

House Music returned for its second year with Cotton as the incumbent. This year, the theme was songs from the 90s, and the House ended up split between two choices: *'Everybody'* by the Backstreet Boys and *'All Star'* by Smash Mouth. In the end, it was an exact 84 votes to 84, and so elements of both songs were included thanks to the excellent work of Miss Jessica Reppucci and Year 12, Jack Elms. As with 2024, the band got to work, and we were led from the front by the mercurial Liam Quinn-Fogarty. Despite strong preparation and a passionate performance on the day, Cotton would go on to finish third behind excellent performances by Waterhouse and Taylor. There was, of course, no shame in this, and as with the first year, there were four great performances, but only one can be declared the winner. It was great to see the growing culture of House Music, where all Houses can feel they won, despite the scores. All the boys displayed the House culture we strive for in alignment with our College values, particularly with belonging.

Our Co-Captains are to be congratulated, alongside our Student Voice Committee representatives, on what has been another good year for Cotton. The energy, organisation and the diverse talents of our students brought the best out of each other. The work of Marco in particular, however, must be acknowledged, as despite Max's best efforts, his commitments to national rowing meant he missed some key parts of the year. Marco, ever professional, was always able to ensure that the House never missed a beat. # Taylor House



In 2025, Taylor House continued to build our culture around challenging ourselves and supporting each other. Nowhere was this more evident than in the Taylor locker area and tutor group rooms, where students strengthened connections, enacting our House value of inclusivity. This took the form of exploring family histories, tackling social issues, solving the Wordle, collectively polishing shoes, or just checking-in with each other. Joseph Ng (Year 7) spoke to this sense of belonging, that allowed his tutor group to win the Secondary School tutor reading challenge. In our House meetings, we collaborated with Headspace to launch our service initiative for the year, participated in some whole House team-building and leadership, and celebrated our Unsung Taylor Heroes: Josh Balacco (Year 11), Charles Tang (Year 10), Tom Maynard (Year 9), Angus Tremlett (Year 8) and Miles Khuoc (Year 7).

Inevitably, our House spirit overflowed into the Wesley Cup, with Taylor winning the first major competition of the year, Athletics Carnival. This was spearheaded by high-achieving Year 12s including Champion Ben Barnard but was underpinned by the breadth of participation across all year levels with George Bougioukos (Year 7) breaking the College record for high jump. More importantly, Taylor continued an unbeaten run winning the Spirit Cup. This was the first time points were awarded for spirit, and each House carefully prepared chants to perform at designated times to be judged. However, House Co-Captain Kyle Prinsloo spent the lead-up not merely practicing chants, but mentoring a 'spirit team' and inspiring the House as supporters. It was that sustained spirit through the day that saw Taylor win.

A highlight of the Wesley Cup was an exhibition round of touch football against an equally talented Watsford, in which the predominantly Year 12 players put their own teams together. Led by Salvy Costanzo (Year 12), Taylor edged away in the dying minutes. The students took time to take combined team photographs, arm-in-arm, to mark the occasion they had shared. Taylor dependably competed and participated strongly in the Swimming and Cross-Country, with a stand-out performance in the latter by Charlie Camilleri (Year 7).

With the advent of each House championing a service initiative, Taylor led the Push-Up Challenge, partnering with Headspace to promote positive mental health in young people. Year 12s Charlie Waltham and Petey Flower led a burgeoning crop of Year 11 and Middle House Leaders to promote engagement and education. Their work led to over 550 students and staff participating, and in excess of \$15,000 being raised. The 23-day challenge saw some dubious Assembly flash mobs, Salt'n'Pepe *'Push It'* reverberating in the hallways, and push-ups done in every way and location culminating in a whole of Taylor push-up on the front oval. The organising students were proud of the way they were able to push getting involved as a core protective factor for mental health. A key need identified by these student leaders, was for students to hear from other students speaking earnestly about mental health. They ultimately created a video normalising discussing mental health that was played and discussed in all tutor groups across the Secondary School.

Taylor's campaign in House Music, the biggest competition in the Wesley Cup, began with House Co-Captain Stefan Drusian announcing that, "it's going to be a show!" Sam Schroeter (Year 7), David Yoon (Year 10), and Ethan Chen (Year 11), led by Stefan, formed our core 'boy band' delivering the lead vocals and harmonies of *'I Want it that Way'* by the Backstreet Boys. Year 10s Harvey Chapman and Kai Ivins, and Year 7s Henry Stirling, Ashton Gerecke, channelled the boy band exaggerated facial expressions and posing, starring in our recreated video clip. When the Year 12s embraced choreography at the outset, their 90's inspired dance moves gave everyone licence to get out of their comfort zone. As the entire House rose waving LED candles, and Stefan sang the final notes hoisted on the shoulders of Kyle, Petey and Ivan, we witnessed one of the great coming-together moments in Wesley Cup history. To paraphrase Mr Roberts in judging and awarding Taylor House the title of champions, Taylor weren't the best musically, we were the House that looked like everyone was the most involved and having the most fun. Nothing could better summarise Taylor's 2025.

The following excerpt is from a Year 8 eduKART student, addressing one of the evening writing tasks. I thought it appropriate to include in the Chronicle as it summarises the skills, emotions and learning that the program instils in each boy.

“EduKART turned out to be so much more than just a week off school. It became one of the most rewarding and memorable experiences I’ve ever had. At first, the task seemed unbelievably ambitious. Building a high speed kart in just two and a half days with a small Year 8 team. I honestly thought it was impossible and remember hoping I’d end up with someone ‘good at technology’. But once we started, I realised even the biggest challenges were really just small hurdles we could work through with persistence and teamwork.

The program pushed me to be independent and showed me that I don’t always need teachers to guide every step. We began with nothing more than a pile of metal, and slowly it became something meaningful, a symbol of our effort, problem-solving and determination. The instructors gave us very few answers, which forced us to think for ourselves, learn through trial and error, and take responsibility for both our successes and our mistakes. Along the way I discovered weaknesses I didn’t realise I had, but making mistakes didn’t feel negative, they were opportunities to understand what went wrong and why.

EduKART tested my ability to co-operate, communicate and work under pressure. It pushed me outside my comfort zone and required my team and I to genuinely rely on each other if we wanted to race our kart by the end of the week. The most satisfying moment came when we hit the accelerator for the first time, knowing we had built this ‘beast’ with our own hands.

Saying goodbye to the kart at the end of the week was surprisingly emotional, because the experience had brought us so close. Overall, I’d rate EduKART a 9.5 out of 10, though one more muffin would definitely make it a perfect score.”

## EduCook – Training for Life

EduCook isn't just about learning to cook, it's about learning for life. The program covers essential fundamentals such as food and kitchen safety while also introducing the concept of independent living. Whether preparing for university life or their own future homes, the boys begin by focusing on readiness for Wambana in Year 9.

At Wambana, students are expected to cook, clean, wash clothes, work as a team, and host guests. Through EduCook, they develop vital food and nutrition knowledge, learn about dietary requirements, practice converting measurements (e.g. cups to grams), and refine their cooking skills and techniques. They also master mise en place, teamwork, and social skills, all essential for working productively in a busy kitchen environment.

Every member of each group was assigned a specific responsibility each day, including roles such as host, hygiene (dishes and cleanliness), ingredient collection, and videographer/media. Throughout the week, photographs and videos were captured, and each group's Editor compiled a four-minute highlight video. These were showcased during a celebratory lunch attended by parents and special guests.

EduCook was delighted to welcome Melique Andrews, Year 12 SRV Prefect Representative, to the team. As part of his Community

Studies course, Melique set and achieved a range of personal goals focused on developing his literacy, public speaking, and leadership skills. He worked alongside various groups, supporting them in mastering delicious recipes before welcoming our guests, delivering the Acknowledgement of Country and being MC for the day, an experience that challenged him to step outside his comfort zone.

# Scotts Creek Outdoor Centre

## Building Character Through Challenge and Community

The essence of Wambana is best captured in the words of Term 4 student, **Levi Rossi**:

*"I want to become the man that is respected for my kindness and willingness to help others."*

Wambana is not just a program, it is a transformative journey. It challenges boys to step beyond their comfort zones, embrace responsibility, and discover the values that will guide them for life. In a world that often prioritises achievement over character, Wambana stands as a beacon of holistic education, shaping young men who lead with integrity, empathy, and purpose.

## Our Guiding Principles

At Wambana, education is more than acquiring skills; it is about shaping character. The program is built on four enduring pillars:

- Others Before Self
- Kindness
- Generosity
- Good Decision-Making

These principles underpin every aspect of life at Wambana. Of these, good decision-making is perhaps the most critical. Many poor choices stem from impulsive reactions in moments of frustration. To counter this, Wambana teaches a simple but powerful strategy, *"the 5-second rule"*.

Before responding or acting, boys pause for five seconds. This brief delay allows emotions to settle and logic to take over, reducing the risk of careless remarks or regrettable actions. Practicing this skill builds confidence and composure, qualities that speak volumes. As we remind our students:

*"You tell the world what you stand for when you open your mouth."*

## Reflecting on 2025

With the final program concluding in mid-November, we celebrate another year of growth and achievement. Since opening in March 2007, Wambana has become a defining rite of passage for every Year 9 boy at Prince Alfred College. This year marked the 19th year of our extended-stay initiative, with 78 groups having completed the program since its inception.

In 2025, students continued to make meaningful contributions across the Yorke Peninsula:

- Maintaining trails at Daly Head National Surfing Reserve alongside local volunteers.
- Supporting Leisure Options, an organisation assisting people with intellectual disabilities.
- Creating a community recreational space at Minlagawi Gum Flat Reserve.
- Restoring the delicate dune ecosystem of the Great Southern Reef.
- Connecting with local farmers to explore the diversity of Agricultural Science.

These projects teach empathy, responsibility, and the value of service—key elements of character education.

Living in a Wardli remains both a highlight and a challenge. Each boy brings unique experiences and personality traits, and together they learn co-operation, selflessness, and domestic responsibility. The goal: a harmonious, functional household—a microcosm of community life.

Outdoor adventure is at Wambana's heart. Students cycled the Yorke Peninsula, hiked the Flinders Ranges, and engaged in coastal activities such as snorkelling, surfing, and environmental research. These experiences foster resilience, teamwork, and a deep appreciation for nature.

Our structured fitness program builds strength of body and mind. The iconic 11km beach run from Hardwicke Bay to Point Turton remains a powerful symbol of perseverance and growth. Despite challenging conditions this year, the grit and determination displayed by our boys was inspiring. Pre- and post-program fitness data consistently show remarkable physical improvements.

A major addition to the Wambana Campus this year was the installation of a new wood-fired oven, which was quickly embraced by our Term 4 students. From mastering fire management to crafting pizzas, this addition brought creativity and camaraderie to Wardli life.

As 2025 draws to a close, we celebrate not only the milestones achieved but the character forged. Wambana continues to stand as a place where boys grow into young men who value kindness, generosity, and wise decision-making. Through challenge and community, they discover that true strength lies not in what they accomplish alone, but in how they contribute to others. The lessons learned here will echo far beyond Wambana, shaping futures, families, and communities for years to come.

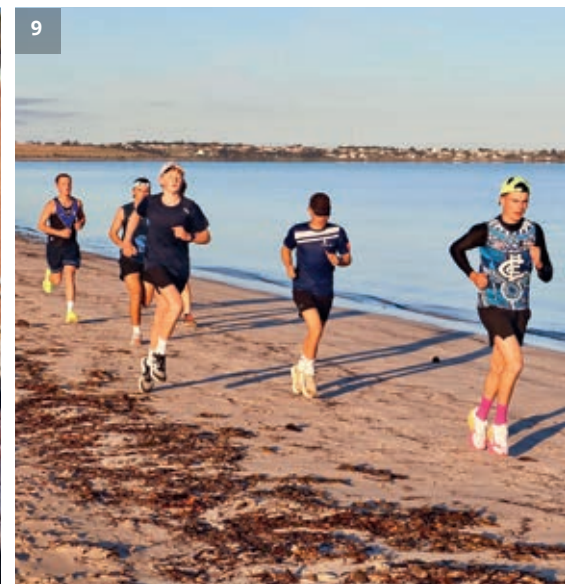

# The Oliphant Science Awards

## Preparatory School Visits, Science and Engineering Visit at Flinders University, and The Oliphant Science Awards

Our Preparatory boys kicked off 2025 with hands-on science visits to the Secondary School labs. Year 3 explored heat energy and transfer, applying theory in practical experiments that clearly demonstrated conduction, convection and radiation.

Year 4 put forces into action, studying different types of forces through a series of experiments that showed how pushing forces, gravity, electrostatic forces, magnetism and buoyancy work.

Year 5 boys investigated how light can bend, reflect, or refract. They completed a series of tasks using different techniques to explore these effects.

Meanwhile, Year 6 discovered that not everything dissolves in water. They tested various substances and found some that didn't dissolve in water but did dissolve in other solvents, such as methylated spirits. Under the topic "Soluble or Insoluble," the students learned how different chemicals behave under different conditions.

Following our Preparatory School news, 30 of our Year 9–10 boys attended the Science and Engineering Challenge Day at Flinders University. They were divided into small teams, with each team completing two activities. Some tasks were demanding, but that was part of the learning. The students enjoyed a wonderful day exploring the university grounds and taking part in a range of scientific experiments.

All of them worked tirelessly on their projects and produced excellent results. Their ideas, applications, and methodologies were impressive, and their project explanations were very thorough.

# Science

2025 was an outstanding year for our Science students in Years 7-11, with many successfully competing in national and international competitions. Among these were the Science Olympiad Examinations, a rigorous test of students' ability to apply scientific knowledge across diverse contexts.

To provide enriching experiences for students of all abilities, we entered a team of 32 Year 10 students in the Science and Engineering Challenge, where lateral thinking and teamwork were key to their success on the day.

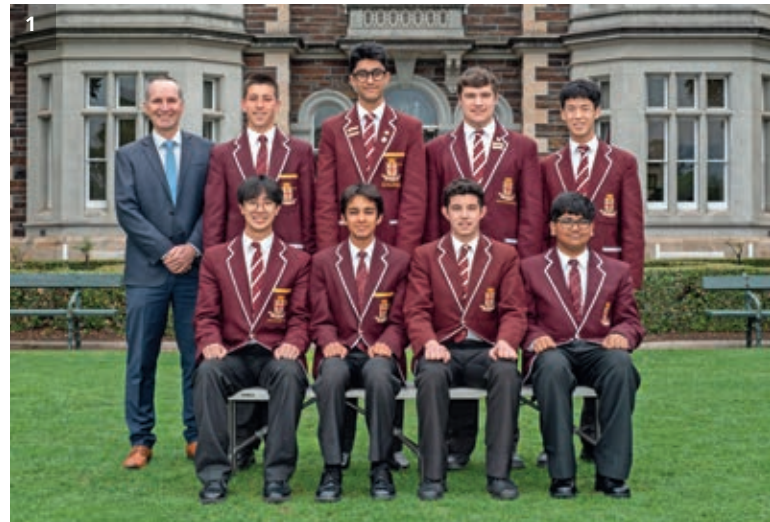
Our Agricultural Science program continued to expand, with the participation in the Royal Show Egg Laying Competition. Two teams of chickens, cared for over two terms by a dedicated group of students led by Year 12 poultry expert, Eddie Lock, represented the College. Eddie played a pivotal role in initiating the activity and guiding the team through every stage of the process. Their efforts were rewarded with a commendable 6th place finish out of more than 50 school teams.

This year also marked the 81st edition of the Science Journal, themed around sustainability: "Sustainable Science – Does Our Future Depend on It?". Year 12 student Aryan Parwal served as Chief Editor, and internationally renowned plant biologist and farmer, Professor Andrew Barr, contributed a thought-provoking article on how evolving farming methods aim to address global food security challenges.

We were delighted to see the Branson family re-endow the LJ Branson Prize for the best article in the Science Journal. This prize was first awarded in 1945 and honours Laurence James Branson (PAC alumnus, 1913), who was killed in action in 1916. This year's recipient was Year 8 student Lucas Clayton, recognized for his outstanding article detailing the development of the turbocharger.

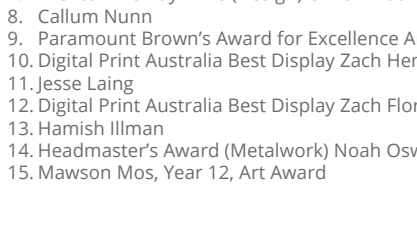
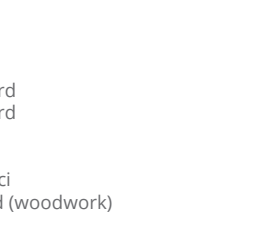
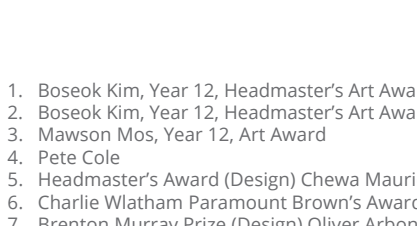

# Academic Support

In 2025, a notable initiative introduced was the Middle Years Mentoring Program, designed to promote students' understanding of expected academic requirements and strategies to improve upon these. The academic mentor, Mrs Debbie Hulme, worked closely with students to set goals, develop routines, and build confidence, helping bridge the gap between academic expectations and the developmental needs of younger adolescents. Early feedback highlighted strong engagement and meaningful student-mentor relationships.

Supporting students transitioning from the Preparatory School, as well as those new to the College, also became an important focus in 2025. The Academic Support Team worked closely with Year 6 staff, families, and the Preparatory School to ensure students experienced a smooth and confident transition into the Secondary School. This included early identification of learning needs, handover discussions with previous teachers, and tailored transition meetings where appropriate. Students new to the College were also supported through orientation sessions, check-ins, and ongoing monitoring to help them adjust to new academic expectations, routines, and social environments. By providing reassurance, clarity, and personalised guidance, the team helped students establish a strong foundation for success as they entered the next stage of their learning journey.

The team also played an active role in supporting students during learning experiences across the school. By accompanying classes, providing in-context scaffolding, and offering individualised explanations, the Academic Support Team ensured that students with diverse learning needs could participate fully and meaningfully in a wide range of curricular activities.

Collaboration with teaching staff continued to be a cornerstone of the team's work. Academic Support staff partnered with colleagues to develop accessible curriculum materials, adjust assessments, and implement differentiation strategies that supported a wide variety of learners. This collective approach strengthened inclusive practice across the school and ensured consistency in meeting student needs.

The work of the Academic Support Team in 2025 was defined by targeted literacy intervention, structured organisational support, meaningful mentoring, and strong collaboration with teachers. Through these combined efforts, the team fostered an inclusive environment where students were empowered to develop academically, socially, and emotionally, reinforcing the school's commitment to ensuring every student has the opportunity to thrive.

# Wellbeing Support Services

This year has been a remarkable journey for the Wellbeing Team, marked by innovation, connection, and a steadfast commitment to supporting every student to flourish. At the heart of our work is a simple yet powerful goal: to help boys feel good and function well—academically, socially, and emotionally.

## Innovating for Emotional Growth

Among the most exciting developments this year has been the introduction of **Animal Assisted Therapy (AAT)**, featuring our certified therapy dog, Bunji. She brings a unique dimension to wellbeing support, offering comfort, companionship, and a calming presence during times of stress for all members of the PAC Community. Students referred for AAT participate in structured sessions that may include caring for Bunji, walking her, or simply sharing quiet moments together. These interactions help reduce anxiety, build empathy, and foster emotional regulation. Bunji's work is carefully managed to ensure her welfare, and every session begins with clear expectations to create a safe and positive experience for both students and our four-legged team member. One of the most memorable moments this year was Bunji's role in the Boarding House—where she would joyfully jump onto beds to wake sleepy boarders, turning an ordinary morning into a moment of laughter and connection. Bunji also joined early morning Tutor Groups, where boys were introduced to her and learned about AAT and the range of wellbeing services available. These sessions sparked curiosity and conversation, helping students feel more comfortable reaching out for support. The joy and warmth Bunji brings to our community have been truly heartwarming.

## Connecting Beyond the Classroom

Our team continued its strong presence at Wambana, delivering sessions on conflict resolution, respectful relationships, empathy, and stress management during each rotation. For Year 6 students

transitioning to the Secondary School, we hosted a welcoming morning tea, introducing them to our team and facilities—a small gesture that makes a big difference in easing change.

We were also delighted to contribute to the 2026 **Prefect Leadership Camp**, where the Wellbeing Team led an interactive session titled “*Leading Well – Managing Stress, Spotting Red Flags, and Practicing Self-Care.*” Prefects explored practical strategies for coping with pressure, maintaining balance, and supporting peers. Through open discussion and reflection, we reinforced the message that asking for help is a sign of strength, and that self-care is essential for effective leadership. This session set a positive tone for the year ahead, equipping our student leaders with the tools to thrive.

## Supporting Every Student

Boarding students remain a priority, with a counsellor available one evening each week for confidential sessions. Our counsellors not only support students experiencing depression, anxiety, phobias, sleep and eating concerns, and family or relationship challenges, but also specialise in relational dynamics, loss, grief, and trauma management—teaching strategies to help them through the more difficult challenges. To maintain best practice, counsellors access independent clinical supervision and regularly attend professional development opportunities, including the counsellor networks to share strategies and management, and attending the **Australian Counselling Association National Conference**, ensuring our approaches remain current and evidence-based.

## Building a Culture of Care

Community engagement was front and centre during RUOK? Day. Tutor groups held meaningful conversations, supported by videos and vibrant displays across campus. These moments remind us all that asking, listening, and caring can change lives. Wellbeing staff also actively support other PAC programs, including the **Kick Start for Kids Service Learning Initiative**, which promotes literacy in South Australian primary schools. Bunji made a special appearance at this program, delighting young readers and helping create a positive, encouraging environment for learning. Her presence reinforced the message that wellbeing extends beyond our campus and into the wider community. Additionally, Wellbeing staff partnered with **Taylor House's headstart initiative**, supporting students as they participated in *The Push-Up Challenge*—a national mental health awareness campaign. This collaboration highlighted the importance of physical activity, peer support, and open conversations about mental health, strengthening our shared commitment to wellbeing.

## Responding to Growing Needs

Behind the scenes, our team worked tirelessly to meet rising demand. Wellbeing counsellors now provide around 220 counselling sessions per term in the Secondary School, reflecting the growing complexity of student needs. We actively participate in the Case Management Committee, ensuring coordinated support for students with high and complex needs. Our work extends beyond the school gates, as we collaborate closely with parents and the wider community to strengthen the network of care around each boy.

Every initiative this year reflects our belief that wellbeing is not an add-on—it's essential to learning and life. By combining evidence-based strategies with genuine care, we aim to create an environment where every boy feels supported, understood, and empowered to thrive.

# Careers

Jackson, Joe, Petey, Ollie, Levi, Erik, Harry, Lachlan, Toby, Apollon, Archie, Thami, Tom, Ethan, Tymek, Remy, Taine, Jack, Robbie, Gavin, Max, Matthew, Curtis, Andrew, Tiago, Aryan, Fred, Anthony and Ming. This year we had a total of 595 students in Year 9 - 12. When I think of the career development services and learning delivered to these year levels in 2025, I see before me, a vast number of wonderful faces, including those listed above, who represent primarily the Senior School, but also Year 9 students who accessed careers activities.

Prince Alfred College seeks to offer a comprehensive careers service to the students, understanding that consistently embedding quality career development into the fabric of the educational program, helps the students plan well for their career pathways in a modern, complex and changing world. Students benefit from learning about diverse and differentiated pathways as well as the requirements for them to possess transferable skills, along with the ability to interface effectively with humans and technology – at local, national and international levels.

It is evident that a focus on career development at the College positively impacts the career outcomes of our students with both immediate and long-term benefits, which is evident from the feedback that we receive from recent graduates and Old Scholars, many who offer to share their experiences, giving back to the current students, year after year. As part of the program at PAC, I acknowledge the fine work of Mr Frank Palladino, teacher and VET Co-ordinator, who works hard to bridge our students to VET learning and VET career opportunities.

At the time of writing this article, we have received early offers for our current Year 12s which include five scholarship offers at Bond University, an early offer for Bachelor of Music at Adelaide University, and Melbourne residential college offers from both Trinity and Ormond. Behind the scenes, the Careers Office works with students to ensure they are submitting quality, authentic and impressive applications. Professional interview coaching results in students gaining entry into Medicine, receiving scholarships, and receiving employment offers.

In reflection, my highlights for 2025 include student and parent appointments, as well as an increased careers focused contribution in classrooms. All Year 10 students received relevant guidance in completing personality/identity profiles, advice on competitive resumes, application letters, interview answers, subject selection counsel and commenced their own individual Career Development Action Plan. Many took the opportunity to meet with me to discuss their future plans.

Year 11 students were supported in accessing work experience placements. They were invited to make personal appointments with me for careers guidance and could access me for their AIF research projects. We held the Year 11 Career Development Day with over 20 industry and educational guests sharing expert knowledge with students (from ADF to hospitality, from entrepreneurship to music audition tips). Student feedback on what was helpful for them included:

“Getting to know the perspectives of industry professionals on their views regarding recruitment, interviews and what they do for their job was extremely insightful. My favourite segment of the day was definitely being able to interact with all of the professionals after lunch and practicing interviews as well as hearing their stories and jobs.”

“To find the university which best tends to the career I want to follow and go with your gut. I am now trying to do some research into what university is best for my career and lifestyle.”

“I really like the range of electives that we could pick from, a good range of universities were represented which gave all us boys a better idea of what we wanted to do after school.”

“I must admit, the food was good! I liked listening to a range of opinions from experts, not just regarding universities, but also people who run businesses and the things that they saw as valuable in employees. Overall, I think that it was an amazing day which offered great insight into many aspects of our future!”

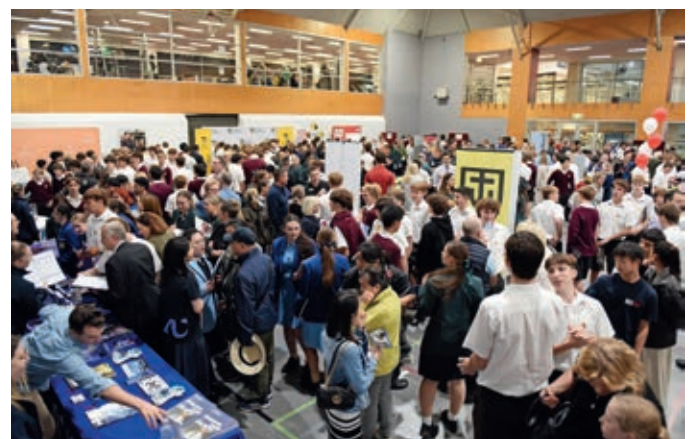
Year 12 students, our priority cohort, ensured the Careers Office was the busiest to date. I interviewed all Year 12s during Term 2, well in advance of university applications opening, and with enough time to plan for apprenticeship/employment opportunities as well as consider gap years. Medicine/Dentistry interview coaching – our annual 4+ tiered workshop – with special guests, was followed up with individual interview coaching to best prepare students for this very competitive pathway.

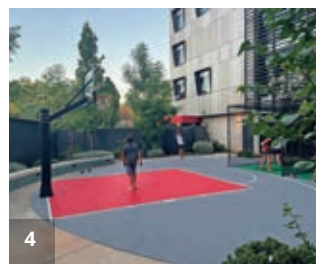

This year, we are incredibly proud of our Year 12 students for their unwavering dedication and for representing the College values. These 10 young men, from four different countries, are now prepared to embark on their next journey as Princes Men.

At the International Student Farewell Dinner, our boys took the opportunity to reflect on their time at the College, expressing heartfelt gratitude to the staff who have guided and supported them throughout their years here. Tristan Wong and Alex Fan, our International Student Captains, delivered their final addresses at the dinner, where they sincerely thanked their parents for their sacrifices in supporting their education abroad. The whole group also shared their memories of their challenging times and their highlights with everyone present. 10 families travelled great distances to celebrate their achievements and to see their sons graduate.

The boarding house has continued to offer exceptional support to our international boarders, including providing early arrival options, extended stays and care during school breaks. During these times, a variety of activities were offered, such as cooking classes and additional co-curricular training for events like diving, surfing and mountain biking. It was also encouraging to see international students challenge themselves in these activities.

Our international students have continued to excel in both academic life and extracurricular activities. Tony Xiang (Year 9), Andrew Lu (Year 12), and Daneil Yu (Year 12) achieved outstanding academic results. Tristan Wang was honoured with the College Prize for Global

Citizenship, a testament to his exceptional ability to foster connections across cultures. Looking ahead, our 2026 International Student Captains, Adrian Ho, Frank Sang and Natchanawee Soralekkitti are ready to carry on the tradition of leadership and community support set by their predecessors.

The academic success of our international students has been outstanding, with many earning accolades in subjects such as Maths, English, and Chinese. Many of our IB students attained exceptional ATAR scores above 95, securing places at world-renowned universities and showcasing their hard work and dedication to excellence.

The International Student Transition Program (ISTP) has been a key component of our English support offering. The program aims to equip students with the language and academic skills for mainstream studies. This year, 15 students from Years 7 to 10 participated, working on a range of skills including writing a range of academic texts, delivering oral presentations, and refining their grammar. Students also studied Physical Education and language-focused Maths and Science instruction. Film was a new and popular addition to the program this year.

Over the course of the year, we had a number of in-class activities which brought our international students closer as a community. Mr Giffard spoke to the students about wellbeing. Alex Fan, 2025 International Student Vice Captain, shared advice with the ISTP students on mainstream studies and English learning. The ISTP students sat in on the 10 EAL debate, while the Year 12 students

watched the 9 EAL motivational speeches and gave feedback on their work. As a new initiative this year, the Year 12s led a conversation on preparation for the English B program in the Senior School.

In 2025, we welcomed over 18 new international students from five different nationalities, spanning across Reception to Year 10. These students participated in a variety of activities, including career evenings and sporting, music and social events with other schools, including St Peter's College, Seymour College, Wilderness School and St Peter's Girls' School. We also celebrated our cultural diversity with international student receptions, special luncheons, and the Year 12 farewell dinner to mark important days on our international calendar.

This year, we initiated English Language Programs for our EALD Preparatory School boys, running two programs aimed at supporting the academic literacy of our younger students. These programs provided three to four hours per week of targeted language and skills development and will continue in 2026, ensuring our boys are better able to manage the learning demands of their mainstream studies as they progress through the College.

Our international students are fully integrated into the life of the College. They participate in Tutor groups and House teams, engage in sports, music, and co-curricular activities, and take part in interschool competitions and carnivals. Their involvement has been remarkable, with notable achievements in squash, badminton, basketball, table tennis, and music.

As we move into 2026, we eagerly welcome more international students, guided by our new 2025–2028 Strategic Plan. At Prince Alfred College, we are committed to fostering our values of Respect, Excellence, Belonging, and Endeavour, inspiring our students to strive for success and develop as well-rounded young men of character as Princes Men.

# Indigenous Program

The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Program at Prince Alfred College continued to strengthen its impact throughout the year, providing students with rich cultural, academic and leadership opportunities grounded in community connection and respect.

A highlight of the year was the continued involvement of students in the AISSA Mentoring Program, which offered a range of engaging cultural and social experiences. Through opportunities led by Maja Tongerie, students participated in cultural activities alongside creative and recreational experiences, including Bounce sessions, art classes, workshops, and collaborative canvas activities. The program culminated in a Student Forum visit to Port Lincoln, where students from five schools came together to discuss leadership opportunities for 2026, while building meaningful connections with peers and staff from across South Australia.

The RACKL program progressed from its pilot phase into a mainstream offering, with six students achieving accreditation for their learning. Facilitated by Uncle John Lecowiac in partnership with Prince Alfred College, students engaged in weekly didgeridoo lessons, cultural workshops, Welcome to Country ceremonies, and significant community events. The program was proudly showcased during a visit from the Attorney-General, the Hon Kyam Maher, and the Hon Blair Boyer MP, Minister for Education, who visited the College to see the program in action and engage with students.

Regular gatherings took place in the newly developed Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Knowledges Centre (M17), which continues to evolve as a culturally safe, student-led space. New initiatives included the creation of a family photo wall, the display of new artworks and artefacts, and the ongoing expansion of a growing library of cultural resources, made possible through the generous support of Old Scholars and community members.

Across the year, 15 workshops were delivered involving students from across the College. These sessions explored topics including connection to Country, colonisation and civil rights, traditional fire practices, and storytelling. Students also visited the APY Lands Gallery, where they participated in workshops and created a collaborative artwork alongside accomplished Aboriginal artists.

Whole-school engagement remained central to the program. NAIDOC Week and Reconciliation Week were marked by celebrations that included the creation of a large sand mural at the front of the College, didgeridoo lessons for students, and a fundraising barbecue that brought the community together in reflection and celebration.

Students also enjoyed celebrations and social events with partner schools across Adelaide through the Yaitya Tita Program, strengthening inter-school connections and fostering a strong sense of belonging.

A particularly special moment this year was the creation of a collaborative canvas to honour Anna Thomson, the College Nurse, on her retirement. Anna provided steadfast care and support to students for over 25 years, and her involvement in and support of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Program will be deeply missed.

Through strong partnerships, student leadership, and a commitment to cultural learning, the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Program continues to enrich life at Prince Alfred College and remains central to the College's ongoing journey of reconciliation.

# Library

The Keeves Library enjoyed a vibrant and enriching year in 2025, continuing to strengthen the reading culture while expanding opportunities for curiosity, creativity, and connection across the College.

We began Term 1 with the return of our Years 7-9 Reading Race, which once again ignited a friendly and fierce competition among our students, led by our committed tutors. Tutors logged their groups' weekly reading minutes, and the library updated the leaderboard each week. A commendable effort goes to Mr Greg Zheng and his Year 9 Taylor tutor group for their strong performance throughout the race. Congratulations to Mrs Melissa Brister and her Year 7 Taylor tutor group, who emerged as this year's champions with an outstanding final tally!

This year saw the introduction of an exciting new program for our Year 7s: LoveOzYA. Students explored the landscape of Australian young adult literature, learned about local authors, and the themes shaping contemporary young adult writing. During the library session, the students stepped into the shoes of authors themselves, writing creative pieces and drafting the first chapter of their own imagined novels. The session concluded with a scavenger hunt and some Polaroid selfies holding a young adult novel of their choice.

Throughout the year, we continued to strengthen our information literacy program for our Years 7-9, working closely with our History teachers to embed research skills early, and build strong foundations for locating and evaluating quality information. These sessions helped students feel more confident and independent when navigating print and digital resources.

The library continued the popular *Book Tasting and Wambana Letter Writing* programs this year and showcased a series of eye-catching displays. Among the most commented-on were the Bookflix display, The Book an Adventure display, and the Top 100 Books of the 21st Century, based on ABC Radio National's widely discussed list, which sparked wonderful conversations and plenty of new borrowing.

A standout achievement for 2025 was the College's exceptional participation in the Premier's Reading Challenge. Our students' consistent dedication was recognised at a special luncheon hosted by the Premier, celebrating the top 55 schools across the state for their outstanding commitment to reading.

At the beginning of the year, every student in the Secondary School had the opportunity to nominate for a position as a Year Level House Leader. Those elected served on the Student Voice Committee (SVC) - a group that represents student perspectives and helps shape the culture of the College. In each House, there are two SVC leaders per year level in the Middle Years and three per year level in the Senior Years, selected via interviews with their Heads of House and House Co-Captains.

The SVC plays an essential role in advocating for peers and contributing to decisions that influence daily life and College programs. SVC leaders worked closely with Heads of House, with oversight from the Heads of Middle and Senior Years. Under the guidance of the SVC Prefects, the committee met twice per term to discuss issues and initiatives aimed at strengthening our community.

Throughout 2025, the SVC engaged in a wide range of activities. Members attended the International Women's Day breakfast, joining a livestream of the keynote speaker, Rachel Perkins, who shared powerful stories about family, advocacy, and driving social change, before participating in table discussions. They also took part in a leadership workshop with Nova Peris, who shared her journey, providing each leader with a unique opportunity for reflection, insight, and action.

The SVC provided feedback on behavioural leadership and wellbeing surveys, participated in focus groups, and selected the theme for House Music. They represented the student body during a visit from Her Excellency, the Honourable Frances Adamson AC, Governor

of South Australia, and her husband, Mr R Bunten, contributing to discussions on service learning and building a college-wide culture of respect, inclusion, and belonging.

SVC members showed leadership in taking a stand against racism by supporting tutors in delivering planned conversations with their tutor groups, where they had the opportunity to share their reflections on why addressing racism is important. They also contributed to RUOK? Day through Chapel reflections, supported new students on Orientation Day, while the Year 9 leaders led Middle Years assemblies and the Year 7 leaders facilitated transition activities for the Year 6s in the Preparatory School.

From helping to shape wellbeing strategies to fostering inclusion, the Student Voice Committee demonstrated leadership and service throughout the year. Their efforts have strengthened the sense of belonging within the College, and we look forward to building on this success in 2026.

# Co-Curricular Activities Report



In 2025, co-curricular life at Prince Alfred College continues to shine as a defining feature of our community, embodying the values of **Respect, Excellence, Belonging, and Endeavour**. These activities provide vital opportunities for boys to discover passions, cultivate talents, and form meaningful connections. In a world increasingly shaped by emerging intelligences and the ubiquity of screens, experiences that foster resilience, teamwork,

leadership, and the ability to navigate both success and failure are more important than ever. Co-curricular opportunities remain a cornerstone of the holistic education we proudly deliver today.

At the heart of our offering lies a commitment to diversity, quality, and character-led experiences designed for the modern young person. Whether on the sporting field, the stage, or in academic pursuits, our boys are resourced with opportunities that challenge and inspire. Yet the true magic comes not from resources alone, but from the passion and dedication of our students and staff. Watching them live out our values—showing respect for others, striving for excellence, fostering belonging, and embracing endeavour—is a joy like no other, and a powerful reminder of how co-curricular life shapes the leaders of tomorrow.

Alongside the boys stands an exceptional team of staff whose guidance and leadership make all the difference. Our programs are shaped and sustained by the dedication of sports and activities leaders, including Head of Sport, Mr Paul Brown; Head of Sport – Preparatory, Mr Sam Barton; Head of Music, Mr Andrew Edge; and Head of Drama, Ms Sharon Reynolds. Their vision, expertise, and commitment, together with the many Directors and Coordinators, ensure each program is enriching and transformative.

In sport, our 1st and Open A teams delivered outstanding performances. Cricket saw PAC secure an 8-wicket victory through disciplined batting and bowling. The 1st VIII Rowing crew achieved a landmark win at the Head of the River—the first in over a decade—

through teamwork and endurance. Swimming triumphed narrowly (611–577), a testament to grit and determination. Basketball impressed with a thrilling overtime win (65–57), while Football's commanding 103–70 victory reflected both athletic ability and strategic teamwork. The Debating team also shone, securing a 2–1 win with articulate arguments and confident delivery. Even in narrow defeats, such as Water Polo (9–10) and Hockey (2–3), our boys displayed resilience, sportsmanship, and respect for their opponents.

In Drama, our students and staff presented *Long Tan*, a production unlike anything seen before at PAC. Based on true accounts from soldiers, Vietnamese voices, and families of the fallen, the play explored memory, trauma, and empathy. With a minimalist set and immersive soundscape, audiences were placed inside the soldiers' experience while reflecting on forgiveness and collective remembrance. Ms Sharon Reynolds deserves special recognition for her tireless commitment to the boys and the drama program, inspiring students to embrace the transformative power of theatre.

Music also flourished. At the Generations in Jazz festival, Jazz Combo 2 earned 2nd place and Year 12 student Apollon Velonakis received a Division 1 Super Band cap. More importantly, the boys demonstrated camaraderie and support for others, embodying the true spirit of music. In September, PAC's secondary ensembles, joined by guest artist Brenton Foster, presented *Piano Man*, a vibrant showcase of piano legends from Ray Charles to Billy Joel. The evening was a resounding success, highlighting the skill, energy, and dedication of our young musicians.

Our singing program has also transformed. Today, boys step onto the stage and sing with confidence, confronting challenges head-on and reaching for notes with courage, supported by a community that celebrates their growth.

As we can see from a magical 2025, a strong co-curricular program delivers benefits far beyond competition. It equips boys with essential life skills—teamwork, resilience, leadership, and the ability to handle both success and setback with grace. It fosters belonging and connection, ensuring every student finds a place to thrive. Most importantly, it develops character, preparing our young men to contribute meaningfully to their communities and to lead with integrity in a rapidly changing world.

# Performing Arts

## Curricular Drama

Throughout the year, the Drama students immersed themselves in a rich array of professional performances and workshops, while also showcasing their own creative work. We visited the Adelaide Fringe, Adelaide Festival, and State Theatre Company to see an inspiring selection of productions. Highlights included the electrifying rock cabaret *Hedwig and the Angry Inch*, Trent Dalton's deeply moving and cinematic *Love Stories*, and the raw exploration of men's mental health in *Why I Stuck a Flare up My Axxx for Britain*. These experiences not only broadened the students' understanding of diverse theatrical styles but also deepened their appreciation of performance craft, inspiring creativity, and enhancing their own dramatic practice.

This year, Drama students engaged in a dynamic and diverse program that extended well beyond the classroom. Year 9 students were thrilled to learn Stage Combat with Martial Arts experts Ruth Fallon and Nino Pilla, while boys across various year levels benefited from the expertise of guest artists such as Mark Hill (Physical Theatre Artist), Oliver Lagoon-Williamson (Designer) and Georgina Harris (Choreographer). Students also explored the technical aspects of theatre through mentorships with Sound Designer Sebastian Vivian and Audiovisual Designer and Multidisciplinary Artist Miles Dunne, gaining valuable insights into the creative processes underlying production.

In-class production work was a significant focus in the Middle Years, with students exploring mime, naturalism, and physical theatre through practical workshops and performance tasks. Year 9 students built on last year's climate change script by devising new scenes of their own, culminating in a collaborative performance shared with parents and visiting Prep School students.

Students from Years 10 to 12 enjoyed an unforgettable four-day drama immersion in Sydney. The program was packed with creative opportunities, including dynamic workshops with the renowned physical theatre company Legs On the Wall and an exclusive session with Sydney Theatre Company. Evenings were spent at world-class performances, including *Hadestown, MJ: The Musical*, and *Big Girls Don't Cry*. This trip offered students a rare opportunity to deepen their understanding of theatre through both practical engagement and exposure to professional productions.

The Year 12 Drama students began the year with their major production of *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time*. This visually stunning and emotionally resonant piece combined innovative staging and design with dynamic physical theatre to bring Christopher's world to life on stage. The production explored themes of trust and raised awareness of autism spectrum disorder (ASD), offering audiences a powerful and thought-provoking experience. Students undertook extensive training in physical theatre techniques to create an authentic and immersive performance environment. The acting demands were significant, requiring sensitivity and nuance to portray Christopher's unique perspective with honesty and respect. Each performer approached the work with care, ensuring the story was told with integrity and emotional depth. A spectacular audiovisual design by Artist in Residence Miles Dunne transported audiences into Christopher's mind, using light, sound, and projection to evoke his heightened sensory world and inner struggles. This combination of technical brilliance and heartfelt performance made the production an unforgettable highlight of the year.



Throughout the year, the Year 12s explored a range of styles and integrated these influences, along with inspiration from the professional shows they had seen, into their own artistic journeys. Later in the year, the boys built on their prior experience with Butoh-inspired work to create original pieces based on themes they selected. This exceptional group of students has contributed significantly to Drama at Prince Alfred College over many years, and I congratulate and thank them for their commitment and passion.

The Year 11s worked with remarkable cohesion to bring Finegan Kruckemeyer's *A Hymn to the Hateful to Life*, leaning heavily on ensemble techniques to communicate the play's emotional weight. They experimented with choral voice work, shifting between unified speech and fragmented lines to mirror the tension between collective anger and individual vulnerability. Physical theatre also played a major role: students built striking group images, using shared movement patterns to show how resentment can ripple through a community. The group worked as one to amplify the play's exploration of hostility, empathy, and the fragile connections between people.

A thriving Drama program is built on the dedication and passion of many individuals. I extend my sincere thanks to Martin McKinnon (Director of Teaching and Learning) for his unwavering support of the program. Our Drama captains, Liam Quinn-Fogarty and Luke Economos, have been devoted members of the Drama community for many years and have demonstrated outstanding leadership throughout their time at Prince Alfred College. A special acknowledgment goes to our Drama Assistant, Madison Russo, whose creativity, energy, and mentorship have been instrumental in delivering high-quality productions for our boys. Madison is leaving us at the end of this year, and I wish her every success in the future. I look forward to welcoming our new Drama Assistant, Charlotte Gow Smith, and to continuing to build on the program's strong foundations. I want to thank Drama Teacher Rebecca Hassam for her ongoing dedication to Drama at PAC. Her commitment to her craft and genuine care for her students consistently enrich our program and inspire excellence.

Finally, to all the boys who participated in Drama this year: your growth, enthusiasm, and talent have been a joy to witness.

## Co-Curricular Drama

One of the great strengths of our Performing Arts program is the way it brings together students with diverse interests, not only those who love being on stage, but also those passionate about the technical side of theatre. Our Co-curricular Tech Crew, led by Dan Woolford and Niwen Barlow, played a vital role in supporting productions and school events. Through this program, boys develop practical skills in lighting, sound, audiovisual, and film, gaining hands-on experience with professional equipment and learning how technical artistry shapes live performance. Their behind-the-scenes work is essential to creating the immersive experiences that define our productions.

Each year, I look for a production that challenges students creatively and emotionally, and this year's co-curricular drama production did exactly that. Verity Laughton's play, *Long Tan*, has an evocative soundscape and powerful verbatim script, drawn from veterans, Vietnamese witnesses, and grieving families. More than a retelling of the 1966 battle, *Long Tan* is a haunting tribute to courage, sacrifice, and humanity on both sides, reminding us of war's enduring human cost.

From the outset, I knew this production would demand technical precision, emotional depth, and physical commitment from the cast. To recreate the chaos of battle in a stylised and accessible way, we explored a range of performance styles, embracing physical theatre and ensemble work. The complexity of the action required intense focus, trust, and a willingness to take risks, qualities the boys embraced with maturity and determination. Watching them collaborate, adapt, and support one another throughout the process was a testament to their growth as performers.

The design elements played a crucial role in immersing the audience in this world. I wanted the stage to feel raw and elemental, so we transformed it into a vast sandpit that filled the entire performance space, evoking the harsh terrain of Vietnam. Towering trees, painted with extraordinary detail by scenic artist Wendy Todd, framed the action beautifully. Niwen Barlow's lighting design shifted the mood from the oppressive heat of day to the ominous shadows of battle. Sebastian Vivian (Artist in Residence) crafted an evocative soundscape that captured the tension of battle, surrounding the audience with the tension and chaos of *Long Tan*. These elements combined to create an unforgettable sensory experience.

Of course, a production like this is never the work of one person. I am deeply grateful to Barrett Law for his stunning set construction, Madison Russo (Drama Assistant) for her tireless support across all areas of the production, and Troy McKinnon (Director of Co-Curricular Activities) for his invaluable advice and encouragement. The resources and encouragement provided by Prince Alfred College were essential in making this production possible.

Most of all, I want to thank the boys who invested countless hours rehearsing, refining, and supporting one another. Our Drama program proudly welcomes performers of all experience levels, including many who stepped onto the stage for the very first time, and fosters meaningful connections across year levels. Their commitment to the story, their courage in performance, and their ability to work as a unified ensemble was nothing short of inspiring.

The Performing Arts offer boys a powerful space to express themselves, take creative risks, and build empathy and confidence. *Long Tan* was their story to tell, and they did so with great heart, generosity, and integrity.

With a much-needed refresh of the Langley Music Centre over the summer break, 2025 kicked off with excitement at the annual Music Retreat, with boys raring to play music together again and score a bargain from the pile of old instruments and books that had been put aside in the summer clean-out. Having said goodbye to the wonderful Year 12 musicians and toured the Riverland in early Term 4, a lot of positive momentum was brought into the new year. A fine example of this was the newly formed Jazz Combo 2, who had a full set of music ready to go by Week 3 to impress parents at the Middle School Parent Information Night in the St Jacques Garden. With various small gigs like this one and workshops with guest artists like Dr Jamie Oehlers, the term flew by, before the Autumn Music Showcase brought the full R-12 Music community together for a lovely outdoor concert and fundraising BBQ. It was the debut performance for many young musicians, particularly those in the Year 4 Beginner Band, who had been wowing Mr Mason with their focus and progress in just one term on their band instrument.

Generations in Jazz in early Term 2 was once again a memorable weekend away for the 72 boys and staff involved. With three vocal ensembles and two jazz combos competing, in addition to our usual contingent of big bands, it was exciting to showcase the breadth of our jazz ensembles at this national event. With a second place in their section, Jazz Combo 2 were particularly impressive, with a level of stagecraft and musicianship that bodes well for the future of small group jazz at the College. From the Strings Eisteddfod to Norwood Live, excursions and workshops, Term 2 culminated in showcases to evidence the boys' great work in our mentoring period. With a deliberate focus on mixing up ensembles to seat experienced players beside younger musicians, it was excellent to finish the term with cross-age camaraderie and music making on display.

The ABODA Festival was once again the focus for most ensembles early in Term 3, with another set of strong results. Despite having several players away at Wambana, some new percussionists joined the Senior Drum Corps to help them maintain their strong showing at ABODA and bolster the numbers in a group that offers wonderful rhythmic development and marching ensemble experiences for its members. With special guest pianist and singer, Mr Brenton Foster, and a run sheet full of crowd-pleasing songs to feature our talented students, the Term 3 major concert, 'Piano Man', once again upped the standard of what the Music Program can achieve together. While the concert was littered with memorable moments and feats of virtuosic brilliance on many instruments, it was our senior vocalists who helped take this show to another level. Jack Elms and Stefan Drusian, in particular, had led the way with the quality of vocal features in recent years, and at Piano Man, their final concert, they

left it all out on stage with performances that raised the bar on what vocalists can aspire to at the College. With the Prep Music Showcase and End of Season Lunch & Awards to finish Term 3, morale was at a high point as students and staff celebrated the achievements of the Year 12's while enjoying the growing talents of boys from Reception upwards.

Moved to early Term 4 in 2025 due to clashes with camps earlier in the year, Princes Rock On Parade once again saw a high standard of rock performances from our bands, while the great crowd at the Norwood Hotel also enjoyed the talents of the groups from St Paul's, Seymour and Saints Girls. The week after, 36 soloists took to the Chapel stage for the Instrumental Music Recitals, developing their live performance skills in the solo setting. Wet weather saw Live@Langley move inside, but nothing could dampen the spirits of the newly formed big bands, with all groups impressing the crowd with songs that had been learnt in just four weeks of rehearsals. With the Norwood Christmas Pageant for Senior Drum Corps and the many official school events with live music to finish the year, our musicians served the College community right to the last day of the year, with performances that brought joy and wonder to audiences.

A huge thank you and congratulations to the 2025 Year 12 music cohort. We're proud of you as musicians and young men of character, and we look forward to seeing you in the crowd in years to come. A special mention must go to the members of Small Vocal 1 – Jack Elms, Stefan Drusian, Sam Commons, Luke Economos and Joe Arkwright. Guided expertly by Ms Reppucci, these boys have led a significant positive change in the culture of singing at the College. From House Music to solo items and choirs, they've help shift attitudes towards singing and have paved the way for singing to continue thriving at Prince Alfred College. It has been a pleasure welcoming new Voice Coordinator, Dr Julian Ferraretto, into the Music Faculty this year. His positivity, wealth of knowledge in all areas and industry contacts are having a marked impact in the program already. A final thank you to all Music staff, tutors, parents and students – it is all a team effort, and we look forward to what we can all achieve together in 2026.

## Strings

2025 has been yet another incredible, rewarding and high-achieving year for the Strings Department. Due to the overflowing number of boys learning a stringed instrument and wanting to be involved in a string ensemble, a fourth core ensemble was added to the co-curricular ensemble list, offering two ensembles in Junior School and two in Senior School. All four ensembles worked diligently each term, and it was wonderful to see and hear their sound, tone, musicality and professionalism grow throughout the year. I am incredibly proud of the direction the String Department has taken this year, and I am grateful for the support from all the boys, parents and staff at PAC.

The first main performance of the year was the Autumn Music Showcase; this concert was a highlight for many; the inclusion of a barbeque and outdoor venue provided the perfect opportunity for parents and staff to watch and appreciate the outcome of all the hard work the boys had put in during the term rehearsals. To conclude the concert, Senior and Intermediate Strings combined forces and performed a rock inspired piece called 'Crazy Train'. This piece featured Year 12 violin student, Apollon Velonakis, who showcased his virtuosic and extremely impressive technical abilities, all whilst using an added distorted amplifier to help replicate an electric guitar sound!

Term 2 was where both Senior and Intermediate Strings really developed their chamber music skills. Both ensembles had significant growth in maturity which was considerably noticeable in their performance of 'The Planets - Jupiter' by Gustav Holst in the Winter Music Showcase. Their use of dynamics and Sul-G filled Piper Pavilion with deep and rich sounds left the audience in awe.

Term 2 also highlighted the hard work of the Piano Trio, which competed in the Under 18 Chamber Music category in the Adelaide Eisteddfod. This category had an extremely high standard with over twelve entries; however, the Piano Trio performed with incredible musicianship and flair and was awarded with the result of Second place.

Term 3 was one of the busiest terms for the whole department. In addition to their entries into the ABODA Music Festival, where all four core ensembles received Silver Awards, the Music Showcase - Piano Man was yet another exceptional production from all. A highlight

for many and one that brought tears to many eyes, was the string arrangement of 'Fix You' by Coldplay. This arrangement featured boys in both String Quartet 1 and 2, as well as our Strings Captain, Aryan Parwal on viola.

Whilst Term 4 was a quieter term for our ensembles, it provided the opportunity for instrumentalists to perform solos and showcase their hard work as individuals in our Term 4 Instrumental Recital. With the need to split this recital into two timeslots due to overflowing numbers, it provided a wonderful opportunity for boys across all year levels to appreciate and witness their peer's talent and hard work.

## Voice

Prince Alfred College is experiencing a positive cultural shift with singing emerging as an increasingly celebrated and valued art form within our Performing Arts landscape. This renaissance has been driven by a new generation of confident vocalists who are stepping beyond the choir to embrace solo opportunities in big bands and rock ensembles. This was most evident at the 'Piano Man' concert, where eight different soloists commanded the spotlight with powerful renditions of classics by Elton John and Billy Joel.

The enthusiasm for vocal exploration spans the College - from ELC Choirs and Young Voices to Senior ensembles. Junior Voices showcased their versatility, moving from the vibrant jazz stylings of Louis Prima to premiering 'Majestic Autumn Jewels', a new chamber work with lyrics by student Liam Thompson and music by Margaret Gunn.

Our senior vocal ensembles have also shone on the national stage. Small Vocal 1, Small Vocal 2 and the Intermediate Vocal Ensemble distinguished themselves at Generations in Jazz, tackling complex repertoire and placing highly across the fiercely competitive divisions - an impressive feat for all-boy vocal groups, which remain rare in this arena.

The foundations of this success are being laid early. The Year 3 Singing Program sparked a thirst for performance, with students showcasing their skills at assemblies and the Term 3 Prep Music Showcase. Their repertoire ranged from timeless classics like 'Lean on Me' to contemporary hits such as 'High Hopes', exploring harmonies and rounds with growing confidence.

Connections to industry have further elevated our profile. Year 12 vocalist, Jack Elms, represented PAC at the Botanic Gardens' Chihuly Nights series, captivating audiences with his elegant interpretation of 'Moonlight Serenade.'

This year we also experimented with a larger choir format bringing all the Senior School choirs and Prep Small Vocal together for the Winter Music Showcase, even welcoming staff members. This 'super-size' choir allowed us to explore bolder works and chase grander textures

and is something we look forward to developing in the future. It was also heartening to see the choirs combine with the other school ensembles to sing works on a larger scale, joining the string orchestra for a moving rendition of Mozart's 'Ave Verum', or together with Big Band 1 and Senior Strings for the finale of the Piano Man concert.

A heartfelt thank you to our voice tutors Aidan Foyel and Marcus Barricelli, accompanists Stuart Robison and Solomon Young, as well as directors Corin Bone, Jessica Reppucci, Sophia Butler and David Talens. I couldn't ask for a more invested and collaborative team. Most importantly, thank you to all the boys. The voice is an extremely personal instrument, and it takes courage to step into the spotlight. The boys have projected great confidence and joy as PAC choristers.

## Bands

2025 has indeed been another year of exceptional success for the PAC bands. Our first major concert was The Autumn Concert held at the end of Term 1. This featured our four concert bands and even included the new Year 4 Beginner Band which played a confident set after less than 10 weeks learning their instruments.

The big bands hit the ground running, with three bands competing at Generations in Jazz. This year PAC once again was one of the best represented schools with three big bands, two jazz combos and three vocal groups. One of the highlights was the return of the Big Phat Band from the USA; the boys definitely left inspired. The other component of the Mt Gambier experience is the individual awards, where we excelled once again with Apollon Velonakis selected as a member of the Division 1 Superband on Tenor Saxophone 1.

One of the highlights of the concert bands' year was competing at the SASBOF State School Band Festival. Bands are awarded Gold, Silver and Bronze or Merit standards. Both the Junior and Intermediate Concert Bands played very well to receive a Gold Award with the Intermediate Concert Band tied in first place, with the Senior Concert Band winning a Silver Award in the highest competitive level in the state, the Advanced Section. After this competition we had only four weeks to prepare for 'Piano Man', the pinnacle concert for the Music Department. This brought together all the bands in the senior school to be part of what was a memorable and successful concert on the calendar.

In Term 4, we formed the new big bands which will uphold our exceptional reputation in 2026 and at the beginning of 2026 we will see a shuffle of boys through the concert band program. Our Year 4 Beginner Band Program this year has shown a depth of talent that I have not seen in many years. We will hopefully see this continue to grow as those boys move up through the program in coming years. With such talent and a wonderful team of conductors, I believe that 2026 will be a strong year for the PAC bands.

Finally, I want to thank the remarkable guest clinicians that came to Prince Alfred College this year. We had the privilege of having Dr Jamie Oehlers, award-winning saxophone artist and Coordinator of Jazz Studies at WAAPA, workshop all of our big bands leading up to Generations in Jazz. Jeffrey Spenner, Assistant Director of the United States Coast Guard Band, also workshopped our Senior and Intermediate Concert Bands. What an amazing experience for the boys and staff to have such high-profile guests from around Australia and abroad. These clinics certainly added to the wonderful experiences for the boys in 2025.

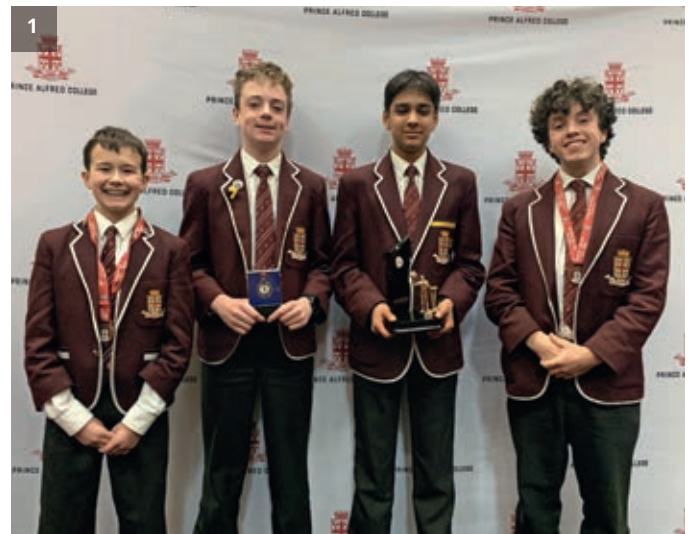

# Debating

In 2025, for the fourth year in a row, the number of students participating in Debating at Prince Alfred College has grown substantially, testifying to the popularity and success of our Debating program. This year, the College entered a record 15 teams from the Senior School and five teams from the Preparatory School, giving us a record 20 teams in the South Australian Debating Association's (SADA) prestigious Schools' Competition.

Within the SADA's competition, our boys have represented the college well across all six divisions. At the top level, our Senior A debaters once again asserted their dominance by repeating last year's excellent performance, with our Year 12s in PAC 1 remaining unbeaten and on top of the ladder throughout all five preliminary rounds, only to be narrowly defeated by St Peter's in the Quarter Finals. Also in Senior A, our Year 11s in PAC 3, who finished seventh on the ladder, were similarly unlucky to be defeated by Walford in the Semi-finals, narrowly missing out on their chance at the Senior A State championship. In Senior B, our Year 10 debaters in PAC 1 made the Grand Final this year, taking home the Runner Up trophy, whilst our Year 9 Intermediate A debaters in PAC 1 went one step further, earning the title of State Champions by defeating Seymour College in the Grand Final. Special mention must go to the captain of this team, Ansh Tiwari, who not only helped his team with the Intermediate A State Championship, but was also awarded best speaker in the Grand Final, as well as the Most Valuable Debater award for 2025 in this division. Our College was also well represented in the younger years, including the Preparatory School's Junior B division, with Prince Alfred

Gold making the finals after finishing fourth on the ladder. Well done to all our debaters from years five to twelve, and to their respective coaches and families for supporting them.

As with most sports at PAC, perhaps the most high-profile event for our debaters each year is the Intercol with St Peter's College. This year, led by our Captain of Debating, Nicholas Whyte, and Vice-Captain Owen Chen, our 2025 Debating Intercol team, also including Luke Economos, Toby Stothard and Isaac Yu, were proud to take back the much-coveted John Bannon Shield, winning the Debating Intercol for the third time in the last five years. Just as the profile of Debating at Prince Alfred College continues to rise, it has been wonderful to see the growth of interest and audience numbers attending this annual event, which has become quite the spectacle over recent years.

Congratulations to all debaters and coaches on another fantastic season this year and thank you to all parents and other members of our community for supporting this co-curricular activity. In a world where open and honest communication is becoming increasingly paramount, and where active listening and respectful debate are often sadly lacking, it is wonderful to see so many students taking up the challenge of developing these skills within our Debating program. We look forward to this trend continuing in years to come.

# Preparatory School Co-Curricular Sport

## Preparatory Sport 2025

The Preparatory School co-curricular program continues to provide valuable opportunities for our boys to discover interests, develop skills and challenge themselves beyond the classroom, and 2025 proved to be another highly rewarding year. Students participated enthusiastically across a broad range of activities, from traditional team sports to pursuits such as chess and debating. The boys consistently demonstrated enthusiasm, sportsmanship and pride in representing their school, with many teams enjoying strong results and memorable successes throughout the year.

Programs of this quality are built on the commitment of dedicated coaches and managers who set high expectations, support skill development and foster a positive team culture. I would like to extend my sincere thanks to our staff and the many external coaches who generously gave their time and expertise. Their passion, professionalism and encouragement played a vital role in the success of the program and in creating meaningful experiences for our boys.

## Sports Sampling Program

All students from Reception to Year 3 were involved in this weekly program, which gave the boys the opportunity to explore and enjoy a wide variety of sports throughout the year. The program allowed students to build skills, confidence and a love of physical activity in a fun and supportive environment. For our Year 3 boys, it also served as an important introduction to the range of sports available for school representation in the years ahead, helping them make informed choices as they move into the next stage of their schooling.

## SAPSASA

Throughout the year, a strong cohort of boys from Years 4–6 took part in the district swimming, cross country and athletics events. Many achieved excellent results, earning selection to represent the East Adelaide district and progressing to compete at the state carnivals.

Our school was also well represented in the East Adelaide district teams across football, soccer, hockey, cricket and tennis at state level. In addition, a number of boys were selected in state teams for cross country, athletics, swimming, touch football and football — a terrific achievement that reflects both their commitment and talent.

Our Year 5/6 boys made it through to the SAPSASA basketball finals, and for the second year running, we had a small team of students compete at the mountain bike championships.

## Running Club

Running Club on a Tuesday morning continues to be popular with our Year 3-6 students. Mark Howson, Deb Trengove and Jordan Neal provided the boys with a fantastic opportunity to improve their running technique while also building their fitness levels. It is no surprise that the majority of boys who did well at the cross country, attended Running Club on a weekly basis.

## Cross Country

This year saw a record number of Prep students compete in the SAAS cross country competition that was held on Wednesday afternoons across Terms 2 and 3. Our boys were very successful, winning a number of the Primary-aged races and coming a very close second overall for the season.

## Cricket

This year, we had two Year 6 and two Year 5 teams playing on Saturday morning and one Year 4 team playing on Friday afternoon. All teams had successful years, and it was great to see the boys grow in confidence and ability while consistently demonstrating excellent sportsmanship within their teams each week.

## Tennis

Tennis attracted strong participation this year, with boys ranging from beginners mastering the fundamentals to accomplished players competing at a high standard. We were fortunate to have the TennisEd coaches work with our teams each week at training, and the improvement amongst the boys was significant.

## T-Ball

For the first time, we had sufficient numbers to field three teams this year, and the addition of several new schools to the competition helped create a more exciting and competitive season. It was wonderful to witness the boys' growth, not only in their skill development but also in their understanding of the game.

## Volleyball

Volleyball continues to grow in the Prep each year. This year we were able to enter three teams in the Year 5/6 competition. For most boys it was their first time playing volleyball but they quickly developed their skills and learnt the rules. All three teams had some excellent wins throughout the year.

## Basketball

## Rowing

As in previous seasons, the Boat Club has focused on the process rather than the outcome, knowing that sport often delivers the “icing on the cake” when the process is followed, believed in, and respected. This bottom-up effect translates into performance across all crews at our grand final, the Head of the River.

There had been one race that had eluded our club for 11 years. Thanks to the buy-in to the process, the club broke that 11-year wait by winning the 2025 1st VIII race at the Head of the River in some of the toughest conditions West Lakes can muster: 37.9 degrees and a 30 km/h northerly headwind.

All crews raced well with 10 of 18 crews winning their event. The day was special for both the club and the school, with an outpouring of emotion, a mix of sheer joy and relief. Students, parents, and coaches all felt part of the success, and over 350 members of our community celebrated back at the Kent Town campus that night with speeches, awards, and plenty of laughter. A day to remember.

To reach the Head of the River and Nationals, we maintained the values that define our standards for a PAC oarsman. The individual remains the focus, while recognising that the club is bigger than any one person. We emphasize personal bests, not comparing ourselves to others, while kindly holding everyone accountable and ensuring all students have an experience equal to their mates sitting alongside them.

Pre-season began for all four squads in Term 3, with a gradual increase in training load to mitigate stress on growing bodies, allow adaptation, and progress under the guidance of our Strength & Conditioning team and rowing coaches.

Term 4 regattas were highly attended by all rowers, laying the foundation for summer holidays, which means camps. The first is our annual whole-club trip to Berri for the Riverland 2nd Grade State Championship regatta. The weekend away in Berri at the end of Term 4 is a season highlight, forging lifelong friendships for students and parents, especially at our Club Dinner held at the Berri Football Club.

The Berri Club Dinner is also our one and only fundraising event for the year, and we had a very successful night raising funds to keep the program at the forefront of school rowing. A huge thank you to the Rowing Parent Support Group (RPSG) and the entire community for their generosity.

Term 1 saw, for the first time, our Intermediate rowers travel to Sydney to compete in the NSW State Rowing Championships. Our target event was the U17 Men's VIII, and we also entered the Schoolboys Coxed Quad Sculls by splitting the VIII into two boats. The entire intermediate squad embraced the concept of being a high-performing traveling team and came away with a well-deserved bronze medal in the U17 Men's VIII.

We also sent a coxless pair from the senior squad, Max Garnett and Nick Christensen, to lead the intermediates and compete against some of the best U19 men in the country. They earned a bronze medal, and importantly, Max Garnett (Year 12) caught the eye of Australian Junior Team selectors.

Following our Head of the River success, 15 senior rowers plus coaches travelled to Tasmania for the Australian Rowing National Championships at Lake Barrington. The rowers left after a great trip with many lessons, the main one being that next season we need to find another level of preparation on and off the water to ensure we step up as a squad and become competitive on the national stage.

A successful club needs strong leadership, and this season our Captain of Boats, Oliver Smith, alongside Co-Vice Captains Max Garnett and Angus Freemantle, continued to build on the legacy of the previous season. Their focus on others and checking in on their mates has been the highlight of their leadership—well done.

A big thank you to all the coaches who go above and beyond to give students the best experience possible.

The RPSG, led by Alex Freemantle, has been a huge support again, raising the bar for fundraising and friend-raising. We are seeing a strong community grow and look forward to season 2025–26.

In August, we all had the pleasure of watching one of our own compete on the world stage wearing the green and gold. Racing in the Australian U19 Men's Coxless Four that competed at the Junior World Rowing Championships in Trakai, Lithuania. Max's crew finished fifth in the A-final—a fantastic result.

Adelaide Sailing Club again demonstrated its pre-eminent role as an international venue this year, by successfully hosting the 505 World championships. Too senior a class for our sailors, Joshua Zhang continued his commitment to the ILCA 4, competing in the Oceania and Australian ILCA Open and Youth Championships at the Royal Queensland Yacht Squadron, placing 54th. He continued throughout the year by taking part in the Frostbite, Zhik Youth Sail, and Sail Melbourne regattas. His best result was 3rd place in the U18 category for the State Championships.

ASC again hosted the double regatta Metropolitan Championship for secondary school team sailing, on the consecutive Sundays of 16th and 30th March. 15 teams from 8 schools (Concordia, Immanuel, Investigator, PAC, St Peters, Sacred Heart, Walford, and Westminster) competed across eight rounds, sailing over 40 races.

While our First team came out ahead of St Peters over the two days, strong weather on the second day prevented the completion of final rounds, as well as a play-off for the Intercollegiate sailing trophy. St Peter's and PAC had agreed beforehand that, if this happened, the State Championship in the April holidays at Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club would become the final decider. In the end, PAC's First team of skippers Joshua Zhang, Tony Xiang and Ziggy Tasci, supported by crews Jonas Bennett, Martin Qian and Oakley Cluse-Robertson, won sailing's second official Intercol.

In a "first" for the sport at PAC, Adelaide Sailing Club acknowledged our commitment to Saturday fleet racing competition by inaugurating a Pacer class championship for the 2024-25 season. This was deservedly won by Tony Xiang and his crew Martin Qian, who managed to juggle Sailing and Badminton throughout the season.

As always, a big thank-you must go to the many supportive parents, who transported, fed, watered and encouraged the boys over so many hours of sailing.

## Surfing (and skateboarding):

Surfing interest has grown this year to have 20 participants, mostly Senior School students who are experienced surfers. We have been lucky with the weather most weeks which has allowed us to surf with coaches and water safety to enjoy a range of conditions at both Victor Harbor and on the Mid Coast. The algal bloom has largely unaffected us, but we have had to be mindful of its movement along the coastline.

A typical surf session on the weekend would involve meeting at a surf location, and a quick briefing before entering the water. Depending upon the conditions, we can train for competition style surfing, and we can also concentrate on other technical skills that make a surfer a confident waterman. Our average student participation on a weekend is about 10 surfers. There is an excellent atmosphere amongst the surfers in the water as we all encourage one another to enjoy such a clean and raw sport. However, the ocean must always be respected and so we have a dedicated team of instructors, coaches and lifeguards to support the enjoyment of the activity. Our thanks go to Jack Bright, Angus Parker, Joe Erbe, Louis Cardone and Kristian Maynard for being so engaged and committed to the safety of the surfers and in promoting the development of each surfer. This attitude and commitment have been ably supported by our Term 1 student leaders in Pete Cole and Jack Scirripa, and in Term 4 by Finn Carey and Will Maynard.

This year our surf team made a concerted commitment to participating in surfing contests, namely, the MR Shield and the DECS state surfing tag team championships. In both events our surfers did not progress through to finals rounds but a lot of valuable experience was gained in a range of testing surf conditions. Catching waves and performing turns within a narrow time window and battling against water movement and wave energy is a difficult task, and so our boys gave their all but in the end we did not amass enough team points to progress through to major rounds. A lot of learning took place and so from this, we have built an important foundation for future competitive success.

An adjunct to our surfing program is our weekly skateboarding clinics held on campus. These sessions support our surf coaching and allow interested surfers to hone their skills on land. We skate with about seven participants, the youngest being Fred Ellis in Year 4. Benji Johnson, Archie Erbe and Tom Maynard have been stalwarts of the program and they bring a real energy and stoke to each skating session. Will Maynard has been inspirational in leading some of the sessions and instituting some of Kale Brock's surfing and skating

program into the school experience. The 7.30am Wednesday skate is a great way to break through hump day and we all end the session exhilarated and excited for our surf on the weekend.

The difference wasn't large, but they had a lot of depth.

Come Intercol our team had built some solid momentum and we felt we had the ability and the determination to be a more competitive unit. In a closely fought Intercol contest, PAC were the victors in perhaps what those not close to the team, might have considered an upset. However, our momentum was hard to stop and through swimmers giving their best to place in as many races as possible, and with some superior changes in the relays, PAC came away with a confident victory to regain the Intercol Trophy. Declan Lin, Lucas Pizzino, Fred Hassel, Louis Anetta, Harry Adams and Fergus Keighran all served their school with distinction on the day. Lucas Pizzino and Louis Anetta have also competed at State and National level events and Fred Hassell continues to impress Swimming Australia selectors at an elite level, including recent invitations to AIS training squads. We eagerly anticipate great swimming feats from these boys in coming years.

In a similar vein to water polo, the swimming culture is a hallmark of our program. Older swimmers helping younger swimmers, student leaders offering encouragement and an amazing coaching team including Luca Bacon and Deb King, allow the program to have a team atmosphere and to strike a balance between fun, inclusiveness and competitive spirit. ## Volleyball

However, for the first time in PAC Volleyball history, this playing group managed to take a set from St Peters — clearly a sign of things to come for PAC Volleyball.

As Coordinator, I am very much looking forward to continuing to work with all volleyballers toward building an even stronger program for the coming season. As we enter Term 4, 2025, we have consolidated skills and experience within our returning player group before welcoming a new cohort of volleyballers in Term 1 next year. We have also seen the delivery of refreshed equipment: new nets, ball trolleys, volleyballs, and brand-new post padding, all slated for Term 1. We cannot wait to see what 2026 — and a home Intercol — has in store for our boys.

## Basketball

In 2025, the basketball program at Prince Alfred College continued to build on the success of previous years and had a range of excellent individual and team achievements. We were delighted to appoint a new head coaching team of Daniel Wray, Ashlee Wutke, Zach de Wit and Matt Thomson across our Middle and Senior programs, as well as a number of our Old Scholar coaches.

There were some outstanding individual performances throughout 2025 which should also be acknowledged; James Matthias, Kale Matthews-Hampton, Henry Pedler and Josh Dartnall represented South Australia at the National championships. Following his performance in the National Championships, Kale Matthews-Hampton was selected to attend the Australian development camp at Basketball Australia's Centre of Excellence.

We fielded 16 basketball teams across the Preparatory, Middle and Senior Schools this year and all teams have had successful seasons. Once again, Prince Alfred College hosted the Friday afternoon Year 5/6 league and our PAC teams have been well coached by our Senior leaders – Sam Commons, Oliver Smith, Hugo Spears and Christian Smith. We had a large number of Middle School players spread across six teams and all teams were competitive against any opposition. Our Senior School teams fielded a range of new players from Year 10-12, all of whom added to the depth and positive culture of basketball at PAC. 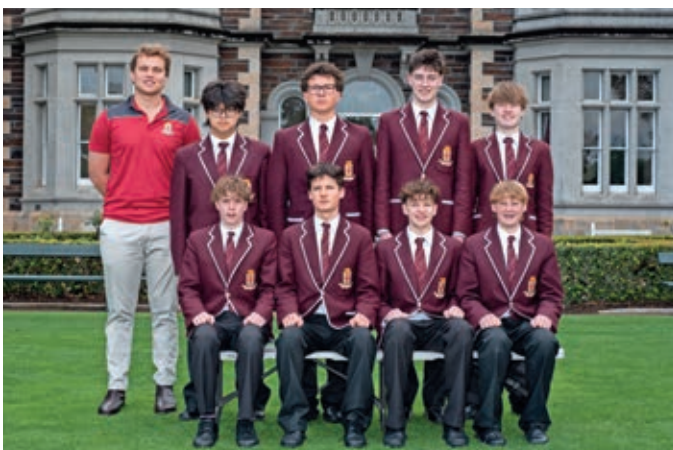

**Chess**

Chess has gone from strength to strength in 2025, with a new record of 113 players representing the College this season, 69 in our Secondary Program, and 44 in the Preparatory School. In all, 23 teams competed, with four in Division 1, the top secondary division, and 3 in Primary A, the top preparatory division.

In terms of leading team performances, PAC 1 Red came equal first in Division 1, making it 16 straight division 1 titles, though for this year it would be shared with Glenunga International High School. In A Grade, PAC A Red led the division for the majority of the season, only to fall short at the last. This was then followed up by a strong performance in the Evelyn Koshnitsky Shield, with PAC coming 3rd. In Division 2, PAC 2 Red finished equal 3rd in the Chess Centre division, while PAC P Red finished 2nd in the Piper Pavilion division. In Division 3, PAC P Silver finished 3rd, only 1 point off top, in the Piper Pavilion division.

It was also another excellent year for Intercollegiate Chess, with PAC picking up their 16th straight victory over St Peter's with a 7-3 win. While the overall result looked comprehensive, St Peter's put on their best performance in years, with almost every board going down to the wire. Much as with last year, it was Patrick Yan, now a Year 6, who opened the scoring for PAC. In the end, it would be Connor Caruso winning his rematch from the year before, that got us past the magical 5.5 point mark to secure the victory. It was another remarkably young team this year, with eight players being in Year 8 or below. Notably, CM Tarush Jindal, became our youngest ever board 1 in Intercol, and won his match. This match also included our first use of our new digital boards, and the top four boards were broadcast live to a viewing room for parents and friends.

In terms of individual interschool performances, CM Tarush Jindal won all eight of his matches for the College, while Charles Tang also achieved a perfect score in Division 1. High score awards went to Tharan Balachander, Alexander Oakes, Taine Meyer and Ryan Nie. In the traditional Richard E Thorne (RET) Shield competitions, Thomas Yan won the Reception to Year 3 competition ahead of Aadvik Mishra in 2nd place, while Patrick Yan backed up his win from Year 3 by winning the Preparatory School Open with a perfect score ahead of Harrison Duckworth and Tom Dickson. CM Tarush Jindal and Tharan Balachander also won the Middle and Senior School editions of the competition respectively, with perfect scores. Tharan would go on to win the Shield for 2025.

The College yet again qualified for the Australian Schools Teams Championships as South Australia's representative in the Secondary School Open. The team faced up against strong opposition, with two Candidate Masters, 2 FIDE Masters, a Women FIDE Master and even an International Master. Despite this quality of opposition, they performed well, with all matches taking nearly the full available time. In the analysis room, the theme was birds, whether it be Oliver's opening preparation, or Mr Clayton Pollard's team building activities. Overall, it was a successful trip, with the team finishing 6th out of eight teams, and Tarush defeating FM Rui Gen Teh in the final match to round off a good tournament.

House Chess was back and better than ever for 2025, with competitions played for the Preparatory School and Secondary School. In the preparatory school competition, while holders Waterhouse came into the competition as favourites, it would be Cotton who won in dominant fashion on the day, led by Tom Dickson, Arthur Kerrigan and Louis Pan on the top 3 boards, ahead of Watsford in second and Waterhouse in third. In the Secondary School, there was two separate competitions for Middle and Senior school, with a playoff between the winning teams from each. In the end, Cotton narrowly won the Middle Years competition ahead of Taylor, while Waterhouse won the Senior competition comfortably. This led to a showdown between a talented young Cotton side and the experienced campaigners of Waterhouse. Going into it, nobody

could have predicted the final score of 6-1 to Middle Cotton, but it was a well-deserved victory for the largely Year 7 side.

It was also a huge year for performances by players outside of the school, particularly for CM Tarush Jindal. Entire articles could, and already have been, written on his achievements, but as a summary: Achieved his Candidate Master (CM) title, won the City of Adelaide Open, became the U18 State Champion, won the City of Adelaide Junior, and won a range of other competitions. In terms of other performances, Manav Karthikeyan finished 2nd in the U18 State Championship, being awarded the U16 State Title, while Keshav Balachander became the U15 State Champion, with Connor Caruso coming second. Arthur Kerrigan came 2nd in the July Junior U9 section following him winning the U9 City of Adelaide earlier in the year.

Captain Tharan Balachander and Vice-Captains Oliver Fenton and Aryan Parwal are congratulated on their excellent leadership this season, as is Ishaan Hossain, our Preparatory School leader for chess. Angad Gill and Henry Yang's work with the Preparatory School boys was also notable, particularly in working with our youngest players one on one. In terms of our coaches, Mr Caleb Tang and Mr Peter Serwan did excellent work with boys in the Preparatory School and Secondary School across the season. Mr Lewis Montagnese's work with boys at lunchtime has continued to bring in new players and help them develop in a comfortable environment. Mr Clayton Pollard's work, particularly in team building, and coming to the ASTC, was also notable. Ms Kellie McCauley has yet again worked tirelessly to ensure that the preparatory school program runs smoothly.

A special thanks must also go to Sophie Davies, Kelly Logan, Nick Greb, Paddy Johnson and the rest of our invaluable Venue Operations team. The work they put in behind the scenes is what allows seasons like this to happen.

## Co-Curricular Mathematics

In 2025, the Co-Curricular Mathematics (CCM) program continued to build on the structure established in 2024, offering a rich and supportive environment for students seeking additional mathematical challenge.

The Junior program again operated with two teams, CCM Junior Red and CCM Junior White, attending Sunday afternoon training sessions led by Ms Harradine and Ms Zhang, who joined the team this year. Students explored non-routine problems, practised communicating mathematical reasoning, and prepared for the Hamann School Mathematics Competition (HSMC) and the Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC).

An exciting new initiative in the Junior program was the ExiQuiz, held on a Friday afternoon in Term 1. This event blended mathematical problem-solving with a campus-wide navigational challenge, as students moved between stations to unlock new tasks and clues.

Throughout the year, Junior students also participated in a series of Mathematics Battles, organised by Mrs Matthews and judged by Mr Harradine, showcasing their ability to justify solutions under friendly competitive pressure. The season culminated in a highly impressive and entertaining Grand Finale, where students once again emerged victorious from their battle against parents, teachers and guests.

The Intermediate CCM program continued to offer Wednesday afternoon enrichment for interested Year 7–10 students under the guidance of Mrs Matthews. Participants explored topics extending beyond the Australian Curriculum and prepared for the Intermediate divisions of the HSMC and AMC, as well as for the Australian Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad (AIMO). We are very proud of the students who trained for and sat these competitions, and we commend them for their outstanding effort and achievement.

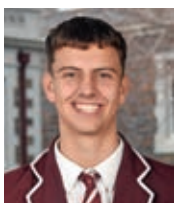
### Football

# Foundation

## Celebrating Philanthropy in 2025

This year has been another extraordinary year for philanthropy at Prince Alfred College. The generosity and commitment of our community have continued to create opportunities for our boys and enrich the College experience in meaningful ways.

## Building for the Future

The Preparatory School Campaign took centre stage in 2025 as we embarked on an ambitious plan to create world-class learning spaces for our youngest learners.

A highlight was the College's inaugural Giving Day in May, which united families, Old Reds, staff, and friends in a vibrant celebration of community spirit. Thanks to the generosity of more than 300 donors, we raised over \$528,000 for the Preparatory School redevelopment. Supported by an incredible team of volunteers, the day featured a coffee cart, a lunchtime sausage sizzle and a colour run that saw 648 students from ELC to Year 12 take part.

To date, just under \$1.5 million has been raised for the project. In November, a special supporters' tour provided a behind-the-scenes look at the exciting progress.

Earlier in the year, generous donations to the Voluntary Building Fund supported the refurbishment of the Langley Music Centre, including new carpets, fresh paint, improved audiovisual equipment and acoustic panelling. A vital resource for students across the College, the upgraded space now serves as a versatile venue for rehearsals, concerts and recitals. Later in the year, fundraising got underway for new golf simulators in the RED Centre, which will give students the opportunity to practice and receive coaching on campus.

## Opening Doors through Scholarships

The impact of our scholarship program is evident every day, in classrooms, on the stage and sporting field, and in the confidence, achievements and aspirations of our boys. In 2025, 33 students were supported through our Scholarship Endowment Fund.

We were delighted to announce the Tony Fricker Scholarship, generously established by Old Scholar Anthony Fricker (PAC 1971). This scholarship will provide life-changing opportunities for young men who might not otherwise attend the College and who have faced disadvantage due to personal circumstances.

In addition, gifts to named prizes continued to support excellence, with newly re-endowed prizes including the historic L.J. Branson Prize for Best Essay for the Science Journal and a new prize for Service to the College.

# Archives: Guardians of Our Heritage

## The Prince Alfred College Archive as an Educational and Cultural Resource

School archives play a critical role in preserving institutional memory and supporting educational, cultural, and community identity. On School Archives Day, March 12, attention is drawn to the professional work of school archivists, whose practice reflects and sustains the core College values of Respect, Excellence, Belonging and Endeavour.

At Prince Alfred College, the Archive represents one of South Australia's most significant schoolbased cultural collections. For more than 156 years, it has preserved records, artefacts, and creative works that document the College's development and its contribution to education. The Archive functions not merely as a repository

of historical material, but as an active scholarly and educational resource.

## Respect, Ethics, and Stewardship

Respect underpins all aspects of archival work. The Archive preserves key historical moments, including the 1867 visit of HRH Prince Alfred, represented by the Duke of Edinburgh Royal Visit Medal, the construction of the WWI Memorial Building in 1924 and the 2024 launch of the current College Master Plan. Equally important is the archivist's responsibility to manage privacy, copyright, and cultural sensitivity, ensuring ethical stewardship of records that carry personal, communal, and commemorative significance. This includes our student leaver records collections.

## Excellence in Professional Archival Practice of International Standard

The Prince Alfred College Archive reflects a sustained commitment to professional excellence. Its holdings include original enrolment registers, architectural drawings, and rare colonial-era artefacts that illustrate both the material culture and intellectual ambitions of earlier periods. Significant items include handdrawn plans by architects Daniel Garlick and Phillip Claridge, a Victorian cast iron fountain by Andrew Handyside, and a sterling silver trophy produced in 1883 by renowned silversmith, Henry Steiner.

The College's art collection further contributes to the Archive's scholarly value. Works by James Ashton (Art Master 1885–1925) and his son Sir Will Ashton (PAC 1885–1887), alongside pieces by Margaret Olley, Robert Hannaford (PAC 1960–1961), Sir Ivor





Hele (PAC 1921–1927), Henry Cockington (PAC 2013–2015), Gavin Wanganeen, and Sandra Pumani. Recent acquisitions through bequests and family gifts underscore the intergenerational relationships that archivists help to preserve and contextualise through rigorous documentation and interpretation. The College thanks sisters Suzanne Grano and Julie Schroder (née Grano) for their remarkable 2025 gift of thirteen original artworks by James and Will Ashton. Now known as the Aconley-Grano-Schroder Gift, this generosity is only matched by James Ashton himself in 1925; when he gifted the College a large selection of his and other artists' work upon his retirement as art master.

### Belonging and Institutional Identity

Archival collections support a strong sense of belonging by documenting the lived experience of school life across generations. The preservation of material such as photographs of Old Scholars enjoying a day of Golf at Kooyonga in the 1970s, photographs of students relaxing on campus in 1963, and records of contemporary events including the Anzac Service 2025, ensures that the everyday experiences of students are recognised as historically significant. When students encounter themselves and their peers within the archival record, they are able to situate their own experiences within a broader institutional narrative, reinforcing connection and continuity.



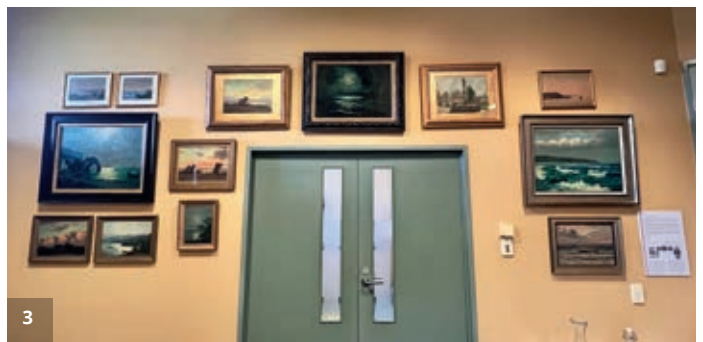

## Endeavour and Future-Focused Practice

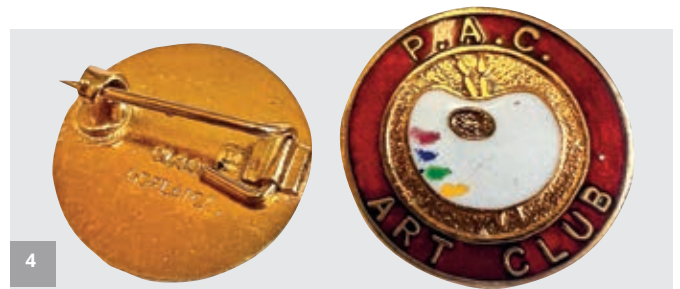
Archivists operate with a dual focus on preservation and future access. Maintained by professional archivists since the 1970s, the Prince Alfred College Archive continues to evolve through digitisation initiatives and the 2025 launch of a student-facing archival database, providing access to approximately five linear kilometres of archival material collections.

Student engagement forms an important component of this work. Our interns Harry Paholski and Charles Tang have contributed to projects such as the Field of Remembrance for Anzac Day and the Time Capsule, scheduled to be opened in 2044 for the College's 175th anniversary, and other displays. These initiatives demonstrate how archival practice supports experiential learning and historical inquiry. As College Archivist, I frequently emphasise, meaningful understanding of the future depends upon informed engagement with our school memory. This sentiment is emulated in our school song lyric, "We look to the future with eyes on the past."

By safeguarding the past, archivists enable future generations to learn from it, ensuring that the values and history of Prince Alfred College remain active and accessible.

## PAOC Cricket Club

In the 2024/25 season, the Club fielded three two-day sides and one one-day side, competing in A1, B1, B3 and LO5. Following the previous year's promotions from A2 and C1, the elevated grades presented a significant challenge. The A1 and B1 teams both finished 10th, successfully avoiding relegation in highly competitive divisions. The B3 side concluded the season in 12th position, resulting in relegation to C1. The LO5 team delivered a solid campaign, finishing 8th.

The A-Grade was competitive but unable to deliver at key moments throughout the season losing a number of games by less than 10 runs. Angas Marshall (2018) won the Ted Norman Cup for the most runs (464 runs at 35.69) while recruit Tanay Avhad won the Murray M Wellington Shield for the most wickets (30 wickets at 16.10) and also secured the Mark Schwartz Award for Best 21 and Under Player. William Daniel (2015) won the Olsson Family Trophy for A-grade Fielding.

Jaxon Schell's (2021) B-Grade side had its challenges throughout the year managing to notch up just the two wins, however, Cameron Pritchard (2014) was the only Club batsman to notch up a century (113). Jaxon Schell won the batting trophy (211 runs at 19.18) while English import Samir Jordan secured the bowling trophy (12 wickets at 20.83).

The C-Grade, having been promoted this year, was up against strong competition and in many cases was playing against B-Grade opposition. Captain Benjamin Lobban (1997) was the leading batsman (222 runs at 17.08). Antony Brabham (1983) ably led the C-Grade bowling attack once again, taking out the bowling trophy (11 wickets at 33.73).



The D-Grade, our highest placed side, had some success this season recording 8 wins. Bradley Weidenhofer (2001) wound back the clock, taking out the batting trophy (393 runs at 56.14). The Skipper Abhishek Sharma won the bowling trophy (20 wickets at 19.85).

In T20 the Club fielded four sides, with three progressing to the knockout stage. The A's were knocked out in the Round of 16, and the Crows' side in the Quarter Final, with Joshua Worrell (3/31) and Lachlan Sholl (5/19) securing hat-tricks during the Round stages. The Football Club side went all the way winning back-to-back Division 2 grand finals. Premiership player, Joel Thiele (2015) winning the T20 Player of the Year Award (232 runs at 38.67, 11 wickets at 11.82 and 4 catches).

Angas Marshall (464 runs at 35.69), and Samuel Vivian (448 runs at 40.73) jointly took out the Club's most prestigious award, The Redman. Samuel Vivian also won the Moffat Family Trophy for Best Club Man for his three years as Treasurer and leader of the social committee.

At the start of the season the Club held a Special General Meeting incorporating T20 games into the Club's Constitution and subsequently counting towards Life Membership qualification, this saw Simon Bean (2012), William Swale (2012), Nicholas Clayfield, Samuel Vivian and Thomas Simpson (2014) become eligible for Life Membership, while during the season Cameron Pritchard, John Gould, Paul Chapman, Brent Hillier, and Charles Marshall (2014) also became eligible for Life Membership, which were all ratified at the 2025 AGM along with Edward Thomas (2014) from the 2023/24 season.

# Obituary

## **Dr Milton Conrad Haseloff** **08/07/1934 - 13/01/2025**

It is with deep sadness that we advise the death of Dr Milton Conrad Haseloff, who was a cherished member of the Prince Alfred College community between 1968 and 1997.

Dr Haseloff served as Deputy Headmaster for several years, under the esteemed leadership of Dr Brian Webber and Mr Geoffrey Bean. His dedication and commitment to the College left an indelible mark on both staff and students. Milton was a consummate professional, a well-read educational academic, and an innovator. He was a staunch and loyal steward of Princes' culture, embodying the true essence of a gentleman.

Even after his retirement, Milton remained closely connected with the school, attending new Headmaster inductions, Princes Men Gallery Assemblies, and Speech Nights. He loved coming along to our PAOCA reunions, when he was well, with Mr Bean. His pursuit of knowledge continued as he completed a PhD in his retirement.

Milton will be fondly remembered for his firm but fair grip on senior school culture and operations, his engaging professional learning staff newsletter "Paedagogis," and his passion for teaching Latin in Room W22. He was instrumental in developing a staff common room, fostering cohesion among



faculties, and introducing the "Dimensions of Learning" framework, which challenged both teachers and students to reflect on their methodologies and learner profiles.

## **Geoffrey Bretherton Bean, A.M., M.A. (Cantab.), Cert Ed., F.A.C.E. 1934 – 2025** **Headmaster, Prince Alfred College 1970–1987**

We remember with deep respect the life of **Geoffrey Bretherton Bean**, a transformative educator and leader whose legacy continues to shape the Prince Alfred College community.

Born in Sunderland, England, in 1934, Geoffrey was raised in a family with strong Wesleyan and educational traditions. He attended The Leys School in Cambridge and later studied economics and geography at Jesus College, Cambridge. After national service and earning his Certificate in Education, he began his teaching career at Rydal School before returning to The Leys as Head of Geography.

In 1969, Geoffrey was appointed the 7th Headmaster of Prince Alfred College. Arriving in Adelaide, aged 35, in January 1970 with his wife Margaret and their three children, he led the College through a period of renewal, emphasising compassion, discipline, and character development.

Boarders from the Bean era remember him with gratitude, and Margaret is fondly recalled for her warmth and hospitality. Together, they created a nurturing



environment that shaped the lives of many young men.

Even after his retirement in 1987, Geoffrey remained a devoted supporter of the College. Geoffrey was awarded PAOCA Honorary Life Membership on 31 December 1996. In 2018, the Geoffrey Bean Boarding Scholarship was established in his honour, continuing his legacy of care and opportunity.

His philosophy of education was eloquently expressed in his 1971 Speech Night address:

*"I would like to think that we at Princes are not going to be judged solely by the success of our First XVIII or by the number of boys whose names appear in the General Honours List, but rather by the quality of the personal characteristics of the boys who leave the school, and by the service which they offer to the wider community after leaving us."*

Geoffrey Bretherton Bean's life was one of service, integrity, and profound impact. He will be remembered not only for his academic and professional achievements, but for the lives he touched, the values he upheld, and the legacy he leaves behind.

Geoffrey is survived by his children—Kathryn, Heather, and Nigel (PAC 1972–1983)—his grandchildren, and the many students, colleagues, and Old Scholars who carry forward his example.
