2024 Year 12 Results

The academic year finished on a high with strong Year 12 results.

The 2024 cohort built momentum strongly throughout the year and delivered a median (midpoint) ATAR of 87.96. Overall, these were historically amongst our best results and a wonderful follow up to our exceptional results in 2023.

Excellence was seen across both SACE and the IB Diploma (IBDP) in a wide range of subjects, with 70 merits achieved by students, along with 13 University HDs (via the University of Adelaide Headstart program, Flinders University Extension Studies and University of South Australia). In short, we can be confident students can excel and prepare for university study in both the IBDP and SACE academic pathways.

Michael Cook was awarded the Thomas Elder Prize Dux of School, achieving an ATAR of 99.90. He achieved merits in, Mathematical Methods, Specialist Mathematics and Physics, and High Distinctions in Programming and Object Orientated Programming (University of Adelaide). Michael will study a Bachelor of Computer Science (Advanced) at the University of Adelaide.

Jesse Rothgrew was awarded the E
B Colton Prize (Proxime Accessit to
Dux of School) with an ATAR of 99.90,
with subject merits in English, General
Mathematics and High Distinctions
in Human Anatomy and Physiology
and Introduction to Forensic Science
(University of Adelaide). He will now take
up a place to study Medicine at Griffith
University.

At the Year 12 Emeritus Assembly held on 6 February, Michael Cook had the honour of delivering the Dux address to the Secondary School where he gave the boys some great advice for their academic journey including the importance of keeping things simple, enjoying the learning process and remaining balanced. He finished his speech by noting that,

"The most vital thing I will take away is the necessity of ambition. It took time for me to actually set ambitious goals in Year 12 as it takes courage. You put yourself in a vulnerable position of potential disappointment. However, being ambitious is certain to extend you further than expected, and is simply making the most out of your time at the College."

The 2024 cohort was characterised by a diverse range of post school interests and potential careers, including university degrees such as Bachelor of Music Theatre, Bachelor of Archaeology, Bachelor of Construction Management, PPE and Finance, International Security Studies along with apprenticeships in carpentry, electrical and station work.

On that note, we thank the 2024 graduates for their contribution to the College and we wish them all the very best in their future endeavours.







Read widely. Engage in study. Embrace setbacks. Support others in the manner in which your growth has been best supported. Work hard. Be kind.

What are you most looking forward to in your new position at PAC?

Learning from the students about the

experiences, traditions and rites of passage at PAC that matter most to them: this will inform my view about how I can best support members of the community, and add value to the delivery of our strategic priorities.

What book left a lasting impression on you and why?

In my law studies, I encountered Ronald Dworkin's book *Justice for Hedgehogs* (2011). Dworkin uses Archilochus's paradox: "a fox knows many things, but the hedgehog knows one big thing," to illustrate that society favours the cunning, adaptable fox over the ethical, coherent hedgehog. The hedgehog connects theories, decisions, and responses to its moral values. I believe schools play a crucial role in developing young people who think and act according to their values when faced with challenges. Dworkin states, "if we want to live well, we must do for and not do to other people" (p. 1, 2011).

Our own internal analysis of current and historical student NAPLAN results using PowerBI allows us to benchmark student progress (by percentile). This ensures we move beyond headline year to year cohort results and provides meaningful insights into student and cohort progress.

In the Preparatory School, individual student results are analysed each year by pedagogical leaders and classroom teachers via the NAPLAN Assessment tool and internal analysis using PowerBI. This information is triangulated with PAT or Dibbles testing and class assessments to ascertain where areas of development for each student lie. Where necessary, in partnership with parents, we support students in accessing our curriculum.

In the Secondary School, key Mathematics (Mr Anthony Harradine, Mr Chris Drew) and English Academic (Mr Nick ladanza, Ms Beth Christie) staff also review the data at the cohort level to identify areas of weakness by theme or question types. This is a very important reflection that allows for subtle program

adjustments based on the needs of students. In mathematics, ongoing analysis identified key areas which are now being more explicitly taught.

In English this has led to a fundamental shift in our Year 7 - 9 teaching programs, with grammar and language conventions now given greater emphasis. Overall, this is a change we believe will lead to boys being more capable of excelling in written assessments during Years 11 and 12.

In 2024, our NAPLAN results were pleasing and there was clear evidence of the positive impact of our data-driven approach and curriculum development in this area. The highlights being the clear gains made in Year 3 and 5 under the leadership of Deputy Headmaster/ Head of Preparatory School, Mr Jon Gelsthorpe and Assistant Director of Teaching and Learning - Preparatory School, Mrs Lisa Clemente. We look forward to building further momentum as explicit and direct instruction is embedded. We are confident that our boys will benefit from the structure

provided through this teaching approach in the coming years.

It was also exciting to see Prince Alfred College, for the first time, crowned the top school in the state in Mathematics at Year 9 - a fantastic achievement, of which our boys should be very proud. It is important to note these results have been 2 – 3 years in the making and involved fundamental curriculum pathway adjustments including the establishment of the X_Mathematics program, an increased focus on nonroutine problem solving and important adjustments to the assessment framework.

Overall, from Reception to Year 9, our teaching programs, while aligned with the Australian Curriculum, are explicitly geared to give our boys the Mathematics and English language fundamentals required to be successful in their schooling, and beyond. NAPLAN testing provides an important data point for reflecting on the effectiveness of our teaching, curriculum and the academic progress of our young Princes men.

Navigating the Digital Age:

Social Media and Smart Device Use

Over the past six months, the College has been researching, consulting staff and parents, and developing programs to address smart phone and social media use among students. This initiative is driven by data linking these technologies to adolescent mental illhealth and child safety concerns.

According to the Lancet Psychiatry Commission, mental ill-health has become the leading health and social issue impacting the lives and futures of young people globally. The report emphasises that the rise of unregulated social media and smart phone use has been one of the key factors contributing to this decline, particularly in highresource settings like Australia.[1]

Research indicates that excessive social media and smart phone use during adolescence can impact brain development, affecting attention span, memory, information processing, social and emotional regulation, and cognitive function. The complex relationship between technology and brain development suggests that social media and smartphone use can potentially alter brain architecture. Concern such as this led the Australian Federal Government to recently legislate a ban on social media for children under 16 years of age.[2]



We know that decreased time engaging with devices and social media results in increased engagement in healthier activities such as reading, music, outdoor play and time with family. We also know that many of the boys who have access from an early age to social media and smart phones are being exposed to inappropriate content they are simply not yet emotionally equipped to manage. This can manifest itself in the use of language, literacy skills, attention span, challenges with multitasking, as well as responses and behaviours which can be damaging to themselves and others.

The research is confronting and the support from our parent community as evidenced through our parent survey (October 2024) means PAC has adopted a stronger position through our policies and procedures with respect to social media exposure and the provision of smart devices to the boys. 78% of our parents surveyed from Years 2-10 believe the decision to provide access to social media and smart devices is a shared role between parents, school and government.[3] We know that limiting the use and exposure to these technologies during the school day and at home is a

crucial step in protecting our students' mental health and fostering a healthier developmental environment.

The College recognises that it is ultimately a parent decision as to the age a smart phone is provided, and social media access is granted. The College also recognises that preparing our boys to use social media and smart devices responsibly is essential in the context of modern Australia.

The positive benefits of limiting screen time and device use includes academic, social and physical development. We want our boys to read more and engage with physical and social activities, and outdoor play that supports their social, emotional and physical development. We also want them to sit at the dinner table, at restaurants and in social settings with their friends and adults and actively engage in conversations that challenge their world views and force them to critically think.

While fostering education and mutual kindness remain our core priorities, our approach is designed to protect our students from the mental health and safety risks associated with smart device and social media use.

Progress Update

At the start of Term 1, the new smart device policy and procedures were successfully rolled out. Following a couple of weeks of reminders, our boys have adapted to the changes in smart device use. Boys are leaving devices at



In early March, our first Social Media & Smart Device Parent Masterclass was held featuring Madhavi Parker. Attended by more than 100 parents of students in Years 2-8, Madhavi provided practical tips for parents to better manage their son's device use including enacting parental controls native within both Apple and Android devices.



88% of Preparatory parents and 80% of Secondary School parents believe it's appropriate for PAC to adopt a stronger position in regards to smart phone and social media use

parents. Support for Android device users is being investigated.

For our students, responsible social media and smart phone use is integrated into our Princes Man Program through explicit instruction and ongoing education.

The strong support from our parent community demonstrated in the parent survey, the quick adoption of the new processes by students and ongoing conversations with parents, gives us confidence that, together, we are making a material difference to the wellbeing of our boys.









Preparatory School Students:

- 1. Must not have a smart phone, smart watch, or mirroring technology on College grounds. An exception is granted to help manage a medical condition, disability or learning difficulty.
- 2. Any 'dumb' phone and any watches with communication capability must be handed to the teacher at the start of the
- 3. The College recommends that no electronic devices be kept in bedrooms overnight.
- **4.** The College encourages parents to delay the provision of smart devices until a time in secondary school when you believe your son is of an appropriate age and maturity.
- 5. The College encourages parents to delay access to social media for all Preparatory School aged boys in line with government recommendations.
- **6.** Students will not be allowed to use school iPads while waiting for pick up.

Secondary School Students:

- 1. All phones will remain in students' lockers during the school day. Teachers can provide permission for them to be used for specific education related tasks.
- **2.** Smart phones cannot be used for payment at the Tuckshop. Students may use cash, physical debit/credit cards or Flexischools to make a purchase.
- 3. Secondary students found with phones on their person during the school day will need to sign their phone into Student Services and parents will be notified.
- **4.** The College recommends that no electronic devices be kept in bedrooms overnight.

Service Learning at Prince Alfred College

Since its establishment in 1869, Prince Alfred College has been founded on the principle of serving others. Throughout the College's history it has been the school's aim to provide students with a first-class education and developing young men of character who are willing to focus on helping and serving, rather than on individual accolades alone. Headmaster, Mr Geoffrey Bean put it best back in 1971 when discussing how character should be judged,

"I would like to think that we at Princes are not going to be judged solely by the success of our First XVIII or by the number of boys whose names appear in the General Honours List, but rather by the quality of the personal characteristics of the boys who leave the School, and by the service which they offer to the wider community after leaving us." (G.B. Bean, Speech Night, December 1971)

Today, our College values have evolved into Respect, Excellence, Belonging and Endeavour. This year we are linking these values into the service experiences we offer. We will continue to challenge our boys to think critically about the world in which we live.



Service has long been a defining aspect of a Princes education, with programs through Wambana, Scotts Creek, Boarding, CAS, and various staff-led passion projects providing our boys with opportunities to contribute in meaningful ways. Our service learning program is designed to engage more of our students through formalised service initiatives, building upon this culture to reinforce what it means to be a Princes man.

Why is Service Learning Important at PAC?

Service learning is more than a responsibility for those that can serve, it is an essential part of developing as a well-rounded individual. It provides students with opportunities to actively engage with real-world challenges, developing a sense of purpose and social responsibility. Students build empathy, develop leadership and teamwork skills, and gain an understanding of different perspectives within the society in which we live. One of our 2025 Service Prefects, Charlie Waltham, spoke to our Cotton House boys about service learning early in

What's Changing in 2025?

This year marks an exciting transformation in our approach to service learning. In 2025, we have introduced some new initiatives that all fall within our categories of service learning. These categories are: Community, Nature Wellbeing and Education. Each of our four Houses will be aligned with one of these categories

- 1. Students participating in the Linde Community Garden service initiative
- 2. Cotton House students and staff setting up breakfast with Kickstart for Kids

and take turns in running service initiatives, allowing students to engage in targeted, student-driven projects that create lasting impact on them and others in the community.

Additionally, we are offering students the chance to sign-up to service activities through the Co-Curricular portal, Clipboard. This will provide boys with more opportunities to participate in meaningful projects they find relevant to them.

Recognition of student involvement will also become a priority of the new program. Although service is not about recognition, as we begin to strengthen our culture of giving back, service learning achievements will be acknowledged formally, ensuring that students' contributions are celebrated alongside academic and co-curricular successes. This opportunity to recognise the efforts of our students aims to reinforce the significance that we, as a College, place on serving our community as an integral component of student development.

What's next?

In Term 1, we partnered with Kickstart for Kids. KickStart for Kids is a South Australian charity dedicated to supporting disadvantaged children by providing breakfast programs, mentoring, and basic necessities to help them thrive at school. Our students contributed to a breakfast service and reading program at local primary schools in Adelaide, building relationships whilst also experiencing the positive impacts of giving back to the community.

Unlocking Cultural and Academic Opportunities for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Students at **Prince Alfred College**

Prince Alfred College is committed to creating a safe and supportive environment where Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students can develop a strong sense of belonging.

While the College's academic and boarding programs provide valuable opportunities, additional pathways enable students to engage deeply with their culture while earning credits toward the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE). These initiatives not only strengthen students' connections to their heritage but also enhance their academic success.

The Recognition of Aboriginal Cultural Knowledge and Learning initiative formally acknowledges the cultural knowledge Aboriginal students bring to their education, allowing them to earn SACE credits while deepening their connection to land, community, and culture. Piloted at the College for the past two years, this initiative offers a co-developed, self-directed, and community-led pathway, enabling students to explore language, art, storytelling, and traditional practices. Through studies in land management, songlines, kinship systems, and environmental stewardship, students can integrate cultural identity with academic achievement. Ensuring Aboriginal knowledge is valued and recognised, the program enhances

students' education and opens pathways for the future.

Students can also participate in the South Australian Aboriginal Secondary Training Academy (SAASTA), a program designed to support Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students by incorporating cultural identity, leadership development, and career pathways into their education. Participation in SAASTA provides students with opportunities to connect with Aboriginal peers across South Australia, engage in elite sporting programs, and access industry partnerships that lead to employment and higher education pathways. By combining PAC's strong academic foundation with SAASTA's specialised support, students build confidence and develop lifelong skills.

For students with a passion for the arts, the Aboriginal Pathways Creative Arts Program offers a culturally safe and responsive learning environment for Years 10, 11, and 12. This program fosters leadership, confidence, and cultural identity while supporting students in exploring creative pathways toward SACE completion. Through exposure to industry professionals, hands-on experiences, and mentorship from Aboriginal artists, students develop their artistic skills and gain insight into post-school opportunities in the arts.

Many of these opportunities have been made possible through the newly established Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Knowledges Centre, a dedicated space for students to connect, learn, share, and celebrate their culture. The Centre provides access to resources, artefacts, and community-led initiatives while also serving as a hub for mentoring, pastoral care, and family engagement.

By embedding cultural education within the broader academic framework, Prince Alfred College empowers Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students to take pride in their heritage while excelling in their studies.

The College remains dedicated to providing a holistic and enriching educational experience that values both academic success and cultural identity.



Summer Intercol

The Intercollegiate Summer Series, across eight sports, are a quintessential feature of student life at Princes and Saints. These matches represent the culmination of a season of effort, commitment and connection to something bigger than themselves. Here we share the highlights of the Summer Series.

The 2025 Head of the River and Rowing Intercol was a fantastic day for our Boat Club, PAC was successful winning most of the underage races on a very hot day at West Lakes. The Senior crews were dominant with the 3rd VIII taking victory and the 2nd VIII taking silver. It was left to the 1st VIII to finish a special day and that they did, gaining the lead early in the final race, the boys powered through the water and maintained a solid lead right through to the winning post, winning by about a boat length. PAC won the Head of the River trophy for the first time in 11 years and won the Intercol trophy for the first time in 10 years.

Our PAC Swim team entered the SAAS Swimming Finals and Swimming **Intercol** fixture as a clear underdog but were prepared for the fight. PAC were dominant in the U/14 and Open age groups winning a number of the races. The U/15 and U/16-year groups battled for every point and this effort ultimately kept PAC in contention.

Final results saw PAC finish 3rd overall (of the 8 schools), with Saints finishing 4th meaning PAC were victorious in the Intercol, taking home the Intercol trophy.

PAC also broke 3 records - Fred Hassell in the Open 50 Free, Lucas Pizzino in the U/14 Breaststroke and in the Open Freestyle Relay.

PAC were chasing our 19th consecutive Tennis Intercol victory, and we were successful! After the first round of singles, PAC led 3 games to 1. The second singles were closely contested with 3 of the games going to 3 sets and, as per usual, the PAC boys were able to fight to the end and win all 3. Final score 9-3 PAC. This result is a credit to the those involved in the tennis program, particularly Coordinator Josh Gregg and Tennis Coach Jack Shipanski.

Our **Badminton** team went into their Intercol fixture with their usual never-saydie attitude. With the round of doubles extremely close, PAC were unable to close out three of the games which went to 3 sets. After the doubles matches Saints took control going up 3-1.

The quality of the singles matches continued to improve with games closely contested. Saints were able to win 6 of the 8 singles leaving the final score 9-3. A scoreline not reflecting the level of effort displayed.

Our PAC Volleyball Intercol team fought hard against a stronger and more experienced Saints team. A very vocal crowd inspired the boys in the second set, but it was not enough to get them over the line in the set. Final score Saints def PAC, 3 sets to 0.

Two very strong **Water Polo** teams took to the pool to contest the Intercol fixture. With confidence high, PAC got out to and early lead 4-1 at quarter time. Both teams traded goals in the second quarter, PAC leading 6-3 at half time. Saints upped the pressure and levelled the scores with only minutes to go in the match. Saints then scored a late goal and then managed to hang on to claim a 10-9 victory.

Water Polo Captain, Charlie Waltham, deserves credit for the way he has led his team this year and the way he conducted himself and represented the College in his post-match speech.

Chasing 270 to win in the final innings of the Cricket Intercol, PAC managed to chase it down with 13 overs to spare. Blake Vause was outstanding, scoring a sensational 114. He was ably supported by Jamie Selvanayagam, Colby Marr and


























Jesse Laing. Cricket Captain, Jesse, capped off an outstanding game by being out in the middle to hit the winning runs.

Archives: Honouring Legacy Through Prizes

Prince Alfred College has a rich tradition of commemorating the achievements and contributions of its community members through named prizes. These prizes not only celebrate academic and co-curricular excellence, they also award good character and service to the College. This allows us to continue honouring the legacies of those who have made significant impact on the school and beyond.

We hold special assemblies throughout the year and award named prizes along with College prizes to acknowledge students who have excelled. These prize giving assemblies are special events for the boys and their families, but they also serve as inspiration for all boys to aspire towards prizes as they continue through their schooling.

A prize is a thoughtful way that members of our community have been honouring their loved ones for more than 100 years. Two of our most recent prizes were established in 2024:

The Henchliffe Family Prize, named after three outstanding recent Old Reds who all displayed exemplary leadership within the Debating community during their time at the College.

The Gibbs Family History Prize

is awarded to a Year 7 student who shows passion and talent in History at a young age. This prize was established in honour of Mr Ronald M (Ron) Gibbs AM 1955, by his family.

Some of the notable College Prizes and their history are shared here:

F I Grey Memorial Prize for Geography

Named after Frank Isaac "Dolly" Grey, a Mathematics and Sports master who served from 1902-1929 and contributed significantly to the school's infrastructure.

Ray Smith Memorial Prize for Physics

Established in memory of Raymond Smith, a Senior Science Master from 1937-1974. Smith inspired the first edition of the Prince Alfred College Science Journal.

Leo Buring Prize for Chemistry (PAC 1884-1893)

Named after Hermann Paul Leopold (Leo) Buring, an alumnus and renowned winemaker who was instrumental in exporting Australian wine globally.

Smith Prize for Modern History

Established by Sir Edwin Thomas


Smith in 1881, this is the oldest prize in the school's history. Smith was a local entrepreneur who generously supported the College.

ASH Gifford Prize for Economics (PAC 1908-1912)

Named after Alfred Silva Harril Gifford, a distinguished alumnus and WWI veteran who established the prize in 1938.

George Thorburn Melrose Prize for English Studies (PAC 1870)

Established in 1929 by George's



brother, in memory of George who was a keen scholar of Elizabethan Literature.

Christopher Branson Prize for Legal Studies (PAC 1986-1990)

Named after Christopher Branson, an alumnus and successful lawyer, this prize was established by his friends and colleagues.

Colton Prize for Humanities and Language

Named after Sir John Colton, a founder of the school and a prominent politician and philanthropist.

Sir Thomas Elder Prize and Dux of School

Established in the name of Sir Thomas Elder, a prominent businessman, politician, and philanthropist.

E.B Colton Prize (Proxime Accessit to Dux of School) (PAC 1869-1876)

Named after Edwin Blackler Colton, one of the first students of Prince Alfred College and a respected solicitor.

HJ Priest Memorial Prize for Specialist Mathematics (PAC 1897-1899)

Named after Herbert James Priest, an alumnus and former Dux of the College who later became a respected lecturer in Mathematics.



Hobbs Prize for Biology (PAC 1911-1916)

Named after Alan Frank Hobbs, an alumnus and honorary surgeon known for his compassion and service during WWII.

JD Iliffe Memorial Prize for Physics (PAC 1882-1885)

Named after James 'Jimmie' Drinkwater Iliffe, a highly respected Science Master who served the school for 51 years.

Kenneth Harley Prize for English (PAC 1932-1940)

Established in memory of Kenneth Harley, an alumnus and Flight Sergeant who died in WWII.

Longbottom Prize for Mathematics (PAC 1869-1871)

Named after William England Longbottom, one of the first students of Prince Alfred College, celebrating excellence in mathematics.

Malpas Prize for Science (PAC 1882-1889)

Founded by Henry Malpas, father to Godfrey (PAC 1882-1884) and James Stanley (PAC 1886-1889) Malpas, celebrating excellence in science.

Professor Shephard is the Founding Director of the International Centre for Point-of-Care Testing at Flinders University. Mark also holds the unique honour of being a dual recipient of a Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) (2006) and an Australian of the Year Award (2004), with both awards recognising his 'contribution to medical research through POC testing'.



Milton was a consummate professional, a well-read educational academic, and an innovator. He was a staunch and loyal steward of Princes' culture, embodying the true essence of a gentleman. Even after his retirement, Milton remained closely connected with the school, attending new Headmaster inductions, Princes Men Gallery Assemblies, and Speech Nights. He loved coming along to our PAOCA reunions, when he was well, with Mr Bean. His pursuit of knowledge continued as he completed a PhD in his retirement.

Milton will be fondly remembered for his firm but fair grip on senior school culture and operations, his engaging professional learning staff newsletter "Paedegogis," and his passion for teaching Latin in Room W22. He was instrumental in developing a staff common room, fostering cohesion among faculties, and introducing the "Dimensions of Learning" framework, which challenged both teachers and students to reflect on their methodologies and learner profiles.

His colleagues recall his professionalism, enthusiasm, and unwavering support.

He is survived by children Jim (1969-1975), Libby and Sue and family.

We extend our heartfelt condolences to Milton's family, friends, and all who had the privilege of knowing him. His legacy will live on in the hearts of the Prince Alfred College community.
