Just within the last couple of weeks, I have enjoyed the opportunity to share stories with current boarders and families, future families and old scholars. Throughout my first 12 months as Director of Boarding, I have toured a range of communities across SA, NSW and the NT, led many tours for potential new families and connected with old scholars at field days, and reunions including the classes of 58, 62', 2001 and 2011. Two things that Prince's families have in common are the enduring memories and friendships developed through the College and the great stories that are shared. Over my 20 years working in education, one of the greatest rewards is being involved in the sharing and building of new stories and allowing each individual student and boarder the opportunity to do the same for others. The Old Reds touring the Boarding House were amazed by our facilities (particularly the room size and hot showers!), the academic support and the weekend activities on offer. Whilst they marvel at the difference to their own experience, this doesn't dampen the enthusiasm for sharing fond memories and stories from asked questions and reminisced about their own experiences, the good, the challenging, the rewarding and the moments that shaped their Prince's experience. Without an awareness of it, current Boarders are making their own memories every day, to proudly reminisce on in their future.

Any of my students will tell you that I like to tell stories and listen to others share their own experiences. In a classroom context, we discuss how these moments can be used to

shape and contribute to the lives of others. While each of us has different dreams, goals and life experiences, the one thing we all have in common is the ability to impact others and their stories and the boarding story is one that I love being a part of. It is important that we are mindful of this impact and always look to make those connections and lasting memories ones that we can be proud to share and have shared into our futures. Looking outwards, beyond our own experience and view of the world is an important part of learning about ourselves and the world around us. I regularly encourage our boarders to read, learn and engage in the range of opportunities available to them, and in doing so, they will make more memories with more people, creating rich stories of their experiences and adding value to the stories of others.

Our children are attending Burnside Early Learning Centre, one suburb away from Kent Town, and are now established with the educators in this centre. Staff, we trust the students to act with integrity, to be honest, respectful, and caring in all that they do - for we can ask no more than this - and we trust parents in the support and collaborative approach we all take to caring for your boys. Ultimately, we are all grinding the same wheel toward separating the developmental chaff from the seed and propagating this seed into conscientious, worldly, and productive young men.

I want to thank the Princes Community for the warm welcome we have enjoyed. It has been fantastic to witness the school's culture in its current form, and I look forward to working with the staff and boys toward everything the College has in its future.

When I spoke to some of our boarding parents at their committee meeting at the start of this term, I provided a little of my background that included seven years as head of a boarding house at Geelong Grammar and further experience in boarding at the Timbertop campus and Melbourne Grammar. I understand deeply what is required to ensure a successful and inclusive culture exists in a boarding house and I am committed to doing all I can to ensure our boarders can succeed during their time at the College.

We know that well-considered routines and structures support boys in the boarding house environment but the desire to do well and put in effort must first come from the boys, and be supported by family expectations. We must see from our senior boys the behaviours that support a culture where boys are admired for giving their best effort in and outside of the classroom.

Boarding can be challenging as our boys can be away from their families for extended periods of time and can also be lonely; however, for others it is the opposite as they struggle to find time to themselves.

In the last 10 years, laptops and phones have fundamentally changed the social dynamics that can exist in a boarding house and as such the routines and expectations that manage these devices have become even more critical to ensure the boys develop the social skills and build the friendships that are ultimately what boarding is all about. I look forward to spending more time in the boarding house and getting to know more of our boarding families.

proven to be a catalytic year for the Boarding House. It was never going to be a small feat, regaining momentum after the setbacks and restrictions that COVID has posed, especiallv the following the late onset towards the end of last year. This year, however, has been the first full year with Mr Noble as Director of Boarding,

and his leadership has certainly contributed to this positive momentum.

A key focus has been promoting and building upon boarding culture, to deeply connect each boy with the character values of the college. Introducing new boys into boarding life, to give them a taste of this culture as early as possible was a key focus for the beginning of the year. The Boarders' Team Building day on February 6th allowed for this experience to be achieved and kicked the term off well with the boys getting the chance to start building relationships early.

Moving forwards, several changes to build on boarding life, which have been driven by Mr Noble, were implemented. This includes the regional themed formal dinners and more structured approach to Sunday wing clean ups. The regional themed dinners have been a resounding success, providing boys with the opportunity to learn about the different areas that boys in our community come from, in a formal setting which brings us together. The wing clean ups have built upon pride and respect for the boarding spaces we use and have maintained a higher standard of cleanliness which will preserve the quality of these spaces for future boarders.

Another key change in 2022 (at least since the start of the pandemic) is that the Boarding House has been able to close over the term breaks, giving the staff a chance to spend well deserved time on holiday. The International boys were also able to spend some time out of the Boarding House with local families, friends, and homestay families.

This year has also been momentous in the retirement of Mr Fenner, who was an especially passionate supporter of the Princes Boarding Program, and who we wish all the best for the next chapter of his life. We are also looking forward to working closely with Mr Roberts as the new Headmaster of the College, with his early interest in improving the boarding experience only increasing our optimism towards the future of boarding at PAC.

Term 3 is set to be the biggest for the boarding community, with Boarders' Week featuring the Young Boarders Challenge, Rushton Cup football match, Boarders' Assembly, and the Agriculture Careers Day. The Boarders' Herald will also be finalised and published over this term, and the Year 12s of the boarding house will be completing their revision for their final exams next term.

It has been an honour to work with the staff and Boarding Prefect body who have managed to work in harmony throughout this year to achieve some great outcomes. Particularly noticeable has been the work of Angus Hawkins as Vice-Captain of Boarding, who contributed a large effort in designing the Year 12 jumpers this year.

The Boarding House has become a home-away-from-home for me. It is difficult to not feel part of the community, and I wish the best for every boy undertaking their schooling here, whether they are current or future boarders. I hope this community continues to grow and that I get to leave it in an even better place than when I started here.

A Final Word from Mr Fenner

As my time as Headmaster at Prince Alfred College draws to a close, it is appropriate to provide some parting comments about boarding at the College. As there have been boarders at PAC since the year the school began, it is fair to say that boarding is part of the DNA of the College. Moreover, we are now up to sixth generation boarders from some of our long-standing families, providing continuity and community.

My time at PAC has seen significant development in boarding in a number of respects, indicating the priority that the PAC Council and senior staff have placed on our boarding program. A statement that has been made regularly during this time is that we want to be a boarding school, not a school with boarders. This reflects the belief that everyone in the school benefits from a strong and flourishing boarding program.

We aim to have a student population that broadly reflects the overall Australian population. A diverse boarding house, with its mixture of rural and regional students, interstate and expat, indigenous and urban, as well as international students, assists us in achieving this.

PAC's commitment to boarding can be seen in the major investment in recent years in the construction firstly of new dining facilities and then a new, state-of-the-art boarding facility. This has also increased our capacity, making

us the largest boys' boarding program in South Australia by a significant margin.

The College's commitment to boarding has been seen in other ways, in the expansion of our boarding scholarships offering, supported by some wonderful benefactors. We have also seen the establishment of other endowment funds to support boarding activities and projects.

We have been blessed during this time to have had excellent leadership from successive Directors of Boarding, Darren Roylett, Zac Savage and Phil Noble. Each have made their own mark on boarding at PAC and have assembled a superb team of staff to supervise and care for the boys. A feature of their work has been an excellent activities program, which is enjoyed by the boys.

Another feature of our boarding program is the parent community, which I have always found to be highly supportive and engaged. Their organisation of some wonderful social weekends has contributed greatly to welcoming new parents into the fold and developing lasting friendships.

I believe that we have a boarding program at PAC that we can and should be proud of. But we are always a work in progress, and I have no doubt that there will be further refinements and improvements moving forward. I am sure that the new Headmaster David Roberts, with

Boarding Prefect Achievements 2022

2022 has marked the first full year that Mr Phil Noble has held the role of Director of Boarding at Prince Alfred College. We also welcomed Mr Will Mercer as our new Assistant Director of Boarding as well as many other new staff members into the boarding community. Together, they each set the ball rolling and have formed a strong partnership despite the constant threat of COVID-19 impacting the boarding house this year. Mr Noble and Mr Mercer have both displayed that they will only strengthen the boarding community, which has been a key pillar of the College since its formation in 1869.

Along with these key appointments, the Boarding House elected a group of Year 12 prefects to lead and represent PAC Boarding for 2022. These positions were awarded after a rigorous interview process with Mr Noble and other key staff, as well as by the boarders themselves. At the beginning of the year, the prefects set out a plan, specifically aiming to improve the interaction between senior and junior boarders within the house. While initially we were restricted by COVID-19 restrictions, including separate meal sittings for different year levels and rules on how many boarders could be in each other's rooms, this goal has slowly been fulfilled, particularly through the revitalisation of formal dinners. Traditionally, these occurred each week on Monday night, however, as a way of developing a more 'special event', they now take place once a term. Also, to increase the student interaction, a new model was implemented by the Prefect team, along with the guidance of the boarding staff, where students from a particular region host a dinner throughout the year which includes the selection of a two-course meal and a quiz about the region. While this has only occurred for a short time, these shared events together have proved popular amongst the boys and have improved the boarding culture dramatically. It is anticipated that events like these will only prosper further in years to come, which will be exciting for both current boarders and future students who will join the College's boarding program.

Along with this, the prefect group made the most of their leadership opportunities through the expansion of student held portfolios and boarder representation within the house. Each fortnight the prefects met in the Max Wellington Room to discuss the pressing issues in the house. This provided an invaluable opportunity for the boarding leaders to raise concerns with Mr Noble and Mr Mercer to make the house as exciting and friendly as possible. Also, throughout the year, the prefects were the key drivers behind many events and initiatives, such as the composing of the Boarders' Herald, Boarders Week celebrations including Young Boarders Challenge, Rushton Cup football match and boarding assembly, Food Committee, Activities, Wednesday Sport Competitions, Boarding Activities, Agriculture Careers dinner, and Academics. While as a prefect group we carried on the initiatives of past leadership groups before us, we have tried to incorporate our own initiatives which will hopefully last for years to come and hold the boarding house in good stead into the future.

Leading the boarding community as a prefect has been an honour, and I would also like to commend the work of other prefects and Year 12's who have played a part in the success of boarding for 2022. To any younger boarders who are unsure whether to apply for boarding prefect, I highly recommend it as a way of giving back to the community in their final year.

Also, as one of the Vice-Captains of Boarding for 2022, I was also allocated the job of designing the Year 12 boarding hoodies. This included assembling initial designs with help from the clothing company and College uniform shop and seeking feedback from other Year 12's. While the jumpers took slightly longer to arrive than first anticipated, the boys were very pleased with the outcome and will serve as a memento for years to come once we finish our time in the boarding house.

Remembering Ken Lord (1944) 1926-2021

With the death of Ken Lord the College lost a visionary member of its community. In 2009 Ken conceived the idea of a scholarship for boys for whom remoteness had been a factor in their education, as it had been in his own seventy years earlier. Thus, the Ken Lord Family Boarding Scholarship was established, and the first of twelve recipients commenced.

As the scholarship grew Ken knew he was making a difference. But what transpired was that whilst he knew the boys were the beneficiaries of his generosity, he realised how much pleasure he was gaining from knowing the boys and their families. He fondly referred to the recipients as 'My Boys' and nothing gave him greater pleasure than hearing of their achievements, an email about life on the land from their parents, or an update from a past recipient on their post-school life.

During Ken's last visit to the College

for his 94th birthday, he recited these words by Banjo Paterson to 'his boys', and so it is fitting that we farewell him with words he'd appreciate:

"And the bush hath friends to meet him, and their kindly voices greet him In the murmur of the breezes and the river on its bars, And he sees the vision splendid of the sunlit plains extended, And at night the wond'rous glory of the everlasting stars."

Through the Ken Lord Family Boarding Scholarship endowment Ken's successes in life will be shared by boys from the bush for many years to come. Lads like the young Ken who came to PAC in 1940.

If I asked you the question you might say it has something to do with numbers, letters, equations or shapes, but I asked my peers and professors in the engineering and maths faculty at uni, and we all came to a quick consensus.

Of course, you're wanting to scream at the paper because almost nobody will ever need to solve a transfer function. You're right. Nor will anybody ever use Pythagoras after school. You definitely won't need quadratics either. But what you're really varied problems as possible.

The same is true for every other subject at school but it seems so much more obvious. English isn't all about Slyvia Plath and Shakespeare, it's about learning to communicate and express your thoughts, and about better understanding other people when they're trying to talk to you. History isn't all about WW2, or the fall of the Holy Roman Empire, it's about looking through evidence and stories, making sure that you analyse them and assess their credibility before employing them in an argument. Physics isn't about projectile motion or magnets, it's about studying the way the world interacts with itself, proposing hypotheses and trying to disprove them.

Maths is so much more than numbers and equations. It's so much more than compound interest

The reason we all arrived at this conclusion so learning in maths class isn't quadratics, it's a way and logarithmic curves. Maths more than any other when you get back a bad test result in maths, or you're struggling with your homework, as tricky as it is, you should try and push through. Not because it's really important that you learn the topics, but because maths develops your resilience and problem-solving skills better than anything else. While you won't likely encounter any hardcore maths equations after school, you will invariably encounter a slew of problems that all need solving. And just like transfer functions, when you get to these ugly problems in life, you can find solace knowing that you've practiced your resilience, and you know how to solve unfamiliar problems.

"The feeling of being in control of the plane was indescribable. You are fixed into a seat, but you still feel like your free. The opportunity to be able to fly a plane is unreal and the people at the Aldinga airfield helped run us through the whole process of advancing in the aviation world. We got an hour in the air flying and experiencing the world from above, and my instructor gave me much freedom and encouraged me to be confident in

myself to be in control of the plane. This experience was eye opening and made me consider pursuing future opportunities, especially how developing these skills can be beneficial at home in the Mid North." – Will Manuel, Year 10 Boarder.

"Just three words: Freaking. Amazing! The experience was incredible from the moment we arrived and were able to watch all the planes taking off and landing. Carl, the pilot who took me, was deeply knowledgeable and made it a comfortable experience for me by showing me what buttons and switches did what and pointed out the landmarks when we were flying over. When I took over the flying, it was like driving a car along a bumpy road, but in the air across the coastline. The trial flight was amazing, Ilearnt a lot even in the 1-hour and am keen to look at continuing if I can." – Jack Hobbs, Year 11 Boarder.

Roseworthy Ewe-niversity; Wool Classing and Shearing

Towards the end of last year, a group of boarders travelled by bus 50km, north of Adelaide to Roseworthy Ag College, Australia's oldest agricultural college established in 1883. I was very excited to visit the campus as a lot of boys' fathers had gone there. We were very lucky to be offered this opportunity from the boarding house as a weekend activity, with funding provided through the College's Mundulla Fund.

When we arrived, we learned how to do all the jobs in a shearing shed, from maintenance on a handpiece to operating a wool press. Following a demonstration from a member of the Ag College, each boy got to rotate through the different roles in the shearing shed. My favourite task was shearing a Merino sheep because it was fun, and I can keep practising it on the farm with Dad. On our properties between Gulnare and Booborowie in the Mid North of SA, we run around 12,000 Stud Merino and Poll Merino sheep at Ashrose.

This experience at Roseworthy was valuable as I was able to get another perspective on how other people might run their shearing sheds. I think it's important that the boarding house continue this annual activity to extend boys knowledge while they are away from home. I will definitely be signing up again next time.

The Wool Classing course was a great opportunity to get out of the boarding house and do something that showed us skills that we might not have been shown before. There were roughly eight of us that attended. During the day we learnt how to set up a handpiece and its basic maintenance requirements. We also learned to decipher the different areas of a fleece by placing labels on the fleece. Some other skills that we were taught were how to title a bale of wool and understanding how to load the wool press.

The shearing started off by distinguishing the two breeds of sheep that were present in the

shed and how to manoeuvre the sheep onto their backs ready to be dragged out and shorn. We were then given a short demonstration before we were allowed to shear with some guidance. Once a sheep was shorn one of us would pick the fleece up and throw it onto the table where it then had the skirtings taken off, and the fleece was then ready to be pressed. Once all the sheep were shorn, we then said our goodbyes and headed back to PAC. The skills that we learned will come in handy as they could be pursued in the future.

Well done to all the boys involved in the win, and thank you to Mr Parker, Will Daymon, and Sam McKenzie for their support over the season.





One in seven Australian men experience depression or anxiety or both in any year.
