School Notes

More complete accounts of happenings within the School since the publication of the last Chronicle will be given in the next large Chronicle to be published early in November.

Mr. C. N. Kurtz and Mr. G. F. Connell resigned from the staff at the end of the first term.

New members of the staff this term are Mr. E. S. Ashenden and Mr. J. A. Dally.

Mr. A. H. Dennis has been ill since the first week of term. While he is absent we are indebted to Mr. B. Guerin who is taking the leaving honours and leaving Latin classes, and also to Mr. Mutton who was teaching half time in the first term but now has two additional classes each day.

We congratulate J. H. Loxton of 5UA who was awarded the first prize in the Mathematics competition for Intermediate boys organized by the Mathematics Association for prizes donated by I.B.M. D. F. Cooper of the same form gained fourth prize.

We pay tribute to the fine work done by Mr. Kurtz for many years in organizing the annual athletics sports and by Mr. Connell in his coaching of athletics.

P.A.C. gained third place in the combined school sports. We were a close second in both the intermediate and junior divisions, but our senior athletes were below our usual standard. P. J. Dalwood's performance in the under 15 high jump at both our own sports and the

combined sports was a remarkable one. He cleared 5 feet 11‡ inches at our sports and almost repeated the performance with a leap of 5 feet 11 inches at the combined sports.

At the Head of the River the first eight was defeated by Christian Brothers College in the heat on Friday afternoon. The next day it won its heat against A.B.H.S. in the losers semi-final, but was beaten by half a length in the losers final by Pulteney Grammar School in a time that was the fastest of the day.

W. G. Tasker is captain and D. R. Wagner vicecaptain of football. In the first three matches P.A.C. defeated Sacred Heart and Concordia College, but lost to A.B.H.S.

The Assembly Hall is rapidly taking shape and as mentioned elsewhere will be officially opened on Sunday, 29th September, at 3 p.m.

Our architects are now preparing working plans and specifications for a new block which will comprise a senior physics and a senior chemistry laboratory, a lecture room, some research facilities and other necessary accommodation. We are grateful to the Industrial Fund for the Advancement of Scientific Education in Schools for the promise of £15,000 towards the cost of the building. It will be erected on the Capper Street side of the present junior chemistry laboratory, and it is hoped that it will be completed by April 1964.

The entrance to the Refectory is in Victoria Drive opposite the University footbridge and it is anticipated there will be ample parking space in this vicinity. Your Committee has carefully taken into account any previous suggestions and hopes this year will see a record attendance.

The Old Scholars' Service, to be held on Sunday, 28th July, could well be the last official Association function held in what is now known as the Old Assembly Hall. Naturally we are all looking forward to the completion of the New Assembly Hall. However, as a tribute and a last farewell to the Old Assembly Hall, both the Headmaster and my Committee would be very thrilled to see a really excellent attendance. I make no apologies for stressing the fact that we consider this service to be one of the most important functions held in our Old Scholars' Year.

Finally, will you all please make every endeavour to give your full support to Old Boys' Week, 1963, and I look forward to personally meeting many of you at that time.
