# School Notes

Full accounts of many of these items will be included in the third term issue of the Chronicle.

Mr. F. G. Jones resigned from the staff at the end of June to take up a position at Wesley College, Melbourne. His place has been taken by Mr. Ian H. Gray, an old boy who attended from 1954 to 1958.

The new senior physics and chemistry laboratories were opened by Mr. L. C. Robson on 28th April. Mr. Robson who was headmaster of Sydney Church of England Grammar School from 1923 to 1958 is the chairman of the Committee of Advice of the Industrial Fund for the Advancement of Scientific Education in Schools which gave such generous assistance towards the cost of the building.

Work has commenced on the new Sea Scout building at Goolwa. This fine project, which will cost more than £5,000, will prove of great value to our scouts.

J. M. Tilbrook won the senior cup at the school sports and G. J. Houston the championship cup at the Preparatory School Sports. P.A.C. finished in second place to Rostrevor at the Combined School Sports.

At the Head of the River, we were successful in the under 15 fours, with S.P.S.C. winning the other events including the Head of the River.

J. R. Blake has been elected captain of football and J. M. Tilbrook vice-captain. We defeated Sacred Heart College by one point in the first game of the season, and since then we have defeated Concordia and Adelaide Boys High School. First Eighteen matches for the rest of the season are:
