SCHOOL NOTES

More complete accounts of happenings within the School since the publication of the last Chronicle will be given in the next large Chronicle to be published in May.

The teaching staff in the secondary school will be unchanged when school resumes for 1965.

In the Preparatory School, Mr. J. Wolstenholme left at the end of 1964 to become Headmaster of St. Andrew's Day School, Walkerville. Mr. R. L. Smith, an Old Boy, will replace him.

The Right Honourable the Lord Mayor, Mr. J. S. Irwin, O.B.E., E.D., F.R.A.I.A., distributed the prizes on Speech Day. R. G. Jarrett was Dux of the School, and G. J. Houston of the Preparatory School.

The intercollegiate cricket was evenly contested and ended in a draw. S.P.S.C. had rather the better of the game in the early stages with P.A.C. showing much better form on the last two days. With four wickets in hand we required about 40 runs to win when stumps were drawn.

In December, the College purchased 18 and 20 Pirie Street.

During the long vacation, the roof of both wings of the main building is being replaced, and the exterior of the main building and kitchen block painted.

We had one of our best years in the Leaving Honours examination. Five boys were placed on the General Honours list—R. G. Jarrett (3rd), A. F. Wilson (11th), R. L. Payne (14th), R. S. Freeman (20th), G. C. Hopkirk (22nd). Woodville High School gained four places and no other school had more than two. Payne, Freeman and Hopkirk were granted three of the twelve Leaving Honours Bursaries awarded. Six of our Leaving Honours boys had won Leaving Bursaries and were not eligible to enter for the Honours Bursaries.

Payne and Wilson each had five A passes, and Freeman, Hopkirk, Jarrett and C. W. Slee four A passes.

M. P. Hardy had three A passes, and ten boys two A passes. In all we had 57 A passes.

- R. G. Jarrett won the B.H.P. Prize, which is awarded to the candidate with the highest aggregate in mathematics I and II, physics and chemistry, and the Shell Scholarship awarded at the Leaving Honours stage.
- G. J. Searle gained first place in Latin, A. A. Burdett second in economics, and Hopkirk second in mathematics I and equal first in mathematics II.

At the time of going to print, only results in individual Leaving subjects were available. J. H. Loxton has seven A passes. D. F. Cooper six (and a B), P. N. Gerrard, W. F. Heddle and R. L. Noble five. One hundred and twenty-three of our candidates were eligible for the Leaving Certificate. Ninety of these have qualified for it and sixteen who passed in three or more subjects will be able to sit for supplementary examinations to endeavour to complete the necessary qualifications. This is the best general result at least for many years.

INTERCOLLEGIATE BOWLS—On Wednesday, 3rd February, the match against St. Peter's will be played at South Park. This contest was first held in 1928, and except for the war years, and the cancelled match in 1952 when news of the death of King George VI was received shortly after the commencement of play, and last year's cancellation owing to rain, the contest has been held annually.

The match consists of forty-eight players on each side divided into teams of four. The standard is particularly good, often half our side being regular "A" Grade Pennant bowlers, and many in the opposition ranks as well.

Although the majority of these games have been closely contested, Princes have won 27 and Saints 4 (in 1946, '52, '56, and '59). In 1963 Princes won by the narrowest of margins (229-221), whilst the scores in the previous year were 278-204.
