The athletics team had a most successful day at the Adelaide Oval. P.A.C. won the championship cup, and also the cups awarded for first place in the senior and intermediate divisions. The team was a well balanced one, and great credit is due to the chief coach, Mr. Crawford, and the masters who assisted him.

We congratulate S.P.S.C. on their success in the Head of the River races. Congratulations to our Under 15 crew upon their victory. This was the only event not won by S.P.S.C. More boys than ever before are playing for the school on Saturdays in the second term. Seventeen football teams, nine basketball teams and one rugby team from the Senior School are playing regularly, and as many as three teams from the Preparatory School.

The mid-year Church Service on 27th June was well attended, and the chaplain's address much appreciated.
