School Notes

More complete accounts of happenings within the School since the publication of the last Chronicle will be given in the October issue of the large Chronicle.

Mr. Graham J. Crawford leaves at the end of July to gain experience overseas. We shall miss him in the class room and as coach of athletics, and we look forward to having him back with us in 1969.

The first half of 1966 has been an extremely busy one for all those old boys and friends of the School who worked so hard during the intensive phase of the Centenary Building Fund Appeal. By the end of June a total of \$427,000 had been donated or promised, and further donations and promises were being regularly received.

Early in August we shall welcome Robert Close and Geoffrey Martin on their return from U.S.A. where they have been spending a year as American Field Service Scholars. A few days earlier our two 1966 Scholars will be departing. They are W. S. DeGaris who will study in Connecticut and Heywood-Smith who goes to Oklahoma.

The Athletics Team is to be congratulated upon its win in the Combined School Sports. The track was so wet and slippery that the hurdles events had to be cancelled. We had the usual keen contest with Rostrevor, and were successful in the Senior and Intermediate divisions and were beaten in the junior section by a point.

In the Head of the River, we were drawn against St. Peter's College in the first heat, but we were not able to repeat our win of the previous Saturday when we defeated our rivals in the Metropolitan Regatta. We congratulate King's on their fine win in the final.

Teams playing on Saturdays this term are as follows—Football: 16, occasionally 17 Senior School and 2 or 3 Preparatory School; Basketball: 12 Senior and 2 Prep.; Rugby: 1 Senior.

The enrolment position for 1967 may well be of interest to Old Boys. It is not possible to accept all boys who wish to come to P.A.C. For day boys, there are a few vacancies in Grade II of the Preparatory School and in the third, fourth and fifth year secondary forms. The position for boarders is not so clear as it depends on the number of present boarders who leave, but it seems probable that places are still available for from four to six boarders at any stage above Grade 5.

President's Message

The year 1966 will go down in history as the year of the Centenary Appeal, a year of preparation for the School's Centenary in 1969.

Your committee has 1969 well in mind, but in 1966 we have planned an Old Boys' Week well up to standard and full details are shown on the next page. However, I would like to bring to your attention several minor alterations from previous years.

The annual Golf match with Saints is once again in Old Boys' Week and will be held on Tuesday, 26th July, at Royal Adelaide.

For several years we have held the Annual Dinner in the Helen Mayo Refectory at the University of Adelaide. This has been an ideal location and we have been more than satisfied. However, because of increased attendance in recent years, your committee has been forced to seek a new venue, and I am pleased to announce that this year the dinner will be held in the very excellent staff dining room of Chrysler Aust. Ltd. at Tonsley Park. This, we feel, will be an ideal location, as not only will it handle the numbers, but it also has the advantage of adequate car parking, first class acoustics, and full airconditioning.

Mr. Bert Kelly, M.H.R., the Regional Chairman of the Centenary Appeal, will be our guest of honour and will propose the toast to the School.

Over the past few years the committee has had difficulty in finding a suitable Hall for the Annual Ball which is traditionally held on the Friday night. This year we have booked the Olympic Hall on West Terrace, which we consider to be ideally suited to the occasion.

Since the new Assembly Hall was completed, the Annual Old Scholars' Service has been an outstanding success. Again we look forward to meeting many Old Boys for a re-union at 10.30 a.m. prior to the commencement of the service at 11 a.m. The improved attendance in recent years has been most heartening and I hope this year it will at least be maintained and possibly increased.

The Centenary Appeal has stimulated wide interest in the School and the Association, and the committee looks forward to record attendances at all functions during the week. In order to assist our Secretary, bookings should be made as soon as possible.

I especially welcome all Old Boys from the country and hope that as many of you as possible will avail yourselves of the opportunity to be present and meet your friends and contemporaries.
