School Notes

More complete accounts of happenings within the School since the publication of the last Chronicle will be given in the October issue.

Work is proceeding rapidly on the Centenary Buildings despite interruptions caused by the very wet weather in the early weeks of this term. Some of the new senior school class rooms will be in use in September.

The Commonwealth has approved the construction of four new laboratories in the 1968-71 triennium. Work on these will commence before the end of the year. We thank the Commonwealth Government for this continued assistance.

There are no changes in the teaching staff this term but Sister McKenzie from the Senior School left to be married. In her place we welcome Sister Jenkins.

Mr Dennis is enjoying his leave. He found life in Paris most interesting but he left the Latin Quarter before the riot position became too dangerous.

Our chaplain has recently been awarded the Australian Efficiency Decoration awarded to those with seventeen years' service as commissioned officers. Congratulations to Rev. R. K. Waters, E.D., B.A.

Unfortunately in the 1967 Prize List in the last Chronicle the fact that the first prize for the second upper sixth form is now the W. A. Harbison Memorial Prize was not listed. This prize is presented by Broken Hill Old Boys in memory of the late W. A. (Bill) Harbison who did so much for the Broken Hill Branch of the Old Collegians' Association.

The athletics team did very well in the Combined Sports, but finished second, 8½ points behind Rostrevor whom we congratulate. We have been successful seven and Rostrevor six times since we entered the competition thirteen years ago.

Our first eight was a strong crew and finished second in the Head of the River with a very good Pulteney crew the winners. We retained the Blackmore Shield by finishing ahead of St Peter's College.

I. S. Johnston, already captain of cricket, has been elected captain of football. A. W. Smith, captain of tennis, is the vice-captain.

Old Boys will be interested in the enrolment position as it stands at present for 1969. For day boys in the Preparatory School, there are from two to four vacancies in each of grades 1, 2, 3, 4 and 6, with names on the waiting list for grades 5 and 7. In the Senior School there are no names on the waiting list so that any transfers interstate or any unexpected withdrawals will allow late applicants to be accepted. The position for boarders is not so clear as it depends on the number of boarders leaving at the end of the year, but it seems that there could be room for about five more new boys.

The date is again Football Grand Final night, 28 September. Members are reminded that bookings will be available during Old Boys' Week, and will remain open until some time in September. Finally, I wish a successful and rewarding Old Boys' Week to all members who attend, and for those of you who cannot, whether you may be in the city, the country, interstate or overseas, I send my best wishes, with the hope that your thoughts will turn to your old School at this time.

The winter season is under way with our athletes claiming more successes than usual.

In the winter cross country events Les Cleland has so far won the Adelaide Harriers 5-mile event, gained second place in both the State 5-mile Championship and the Enfield Harriers 5 mile, and a third in the State 10,000 Metres Championship.

Robert Hill ran second in the State Junior 5000 Metres Cross Country Championship. Also seen striding out over difficult terrain have been Dick Cleland, Colin Siegert, Paul Hilbig, and Peter Brebner.

Highlights of the winter cross country walking events include Peter Whitham's second place in the State 10,000 Metres Championship and Andrew Close and John Russell as captains of the State A and B junior teams competing in the interstate competitions for the Robinson Shield. Graham Evans and Don Telfer (Westminster) have added to the strength in our walking division.

Trevor Siegele was elected a vice-president at the recent annual general meeting of the S.A.A.A.A.

Our annual general meeting will be held late in July or early August; the date and place will be advised to members in due course.
