School Notes

More complete accounts of happenings within the school since the publication of the May Chronicle will be included in the next issue in October.

We welcome to the staff Mr W. J. L. Gurner, a third generation Old Boy. At the same time we express our appreciation of the assistance given us by Mr Gordon Haskard during first term.

Our inexperienced crew improved considerably in the last few weeks before the Head of the River, and though defeated in the heats it performed creditably.

Congratulations to Adelaide Boys' High School on its victory in the Combined School sports. P.A.C. finished third just behind Rostrevor. This is the first occasion since P.A.C. entered the competition in 1955, that a school other than Rostrevor or P.A.C. has been successful, Rostrevor having won six times and P.A.C. seven.

Up to the time of this being written, the first XVIII has defeated Scotch and Pulteney and lost to Rostrevor. The match against Wesley College, Melbourne, is to be played at P.A.C. on the afternoon of Friday, 11 July.

Further functions in connection with the Centenary were held on 21 and 22 June. These dates were chosen as the central portion of the main building was officially opened on 22 June, 1869. This was a public holiday celebrating the accession of Queen Victoria.

On the evening of 21 June, a most successful dinner dance was held in the South Australian Hotel. On the afternoon of Sunday, 22 June, older boys in the Preparatory School, under the direction of Mr L. Davies, gave a presentation (in the Assembly Hall) which first depicted some of the problems connected with education in the early days of the colony and concluded with a re-enactment of the official breakfast and opening.

Great progress has been made with the construction of the four new laboratories. They are to be opened on 24 July, the Thursday of Old Boys' Week, at 2.15 p.m. by Mr I. J. W. Bissett, M.Sc., a senior executive officer of the Department for Education and Science. Mr Bissett has been responsible for the direction of the work involved in the programme for Federal Aid for laboratories in both independent and State schools. We are pleased to recognize in this way the fine work that he has done.

President's Message

This issue of the Chronicle contains, in addition to other matters of interest, the customary details of Old Boys' Week to which I particularly wish to draw your attention. In this Centenary Year I sincerely hope that all old scholars will endeavour to visit the School and to attend as many functions as possible. I would particularly draw your attention to three of the main events. Firstly, Old Boy's Day, when the science laboratories will be officially opened at 2.15 p.m. and afterwards available for inspection. Secondly, the Annual Dinner on Friday evening with Mr Alex Ramsay, C.B.E., as guest speaker, and thirdly the Service on Sunday. I appeal to you to bear in mind that at the end of this year our Headmaster Mr J. A. Dunning retires, and a good attendance on all these occasions is a tangible way of

expressing our thanks and gratitude for the loyal services he has rendered and for the undoubted continuing success of the School during his long term of office.

For your convenience a tear off slip is attached listing all details for the week, and you will greatly facilitate the work of the various conveners if you would complete it and return it to the Association Office as soon as possible.

To all our members I send the best wishes of your Committee and myself, and we look forward to your continuing interest and support both for the School and this Association, as 'Alma Mater' enters its second century.
