



SCHOOL NOTES

It is with deep regret that we record the death on 30 May, 1973, of Mr T. G. Luke, who retired from teaching at the school in 1971 after 53 years of continuous service on the staff. We extend our sympathy to Mrs Luke and her family.

We have welcomed Mr Don Millard and Mr Michael Cutts to the full-time teaching staff this year, and also Mr Mel. Waters as a part-time teacher.

We offer congratulations to Mark Waters, both on his appointment as Captain of the School and on winning an American Field Service Scholarship which he will be taking up in the later part of July.

Enrolments of both day and boarding students were slightly up in 1973, and entries for 1974 are most encouraging.

Overall results in the P.E.B. examinations in 1972 were comparable with previous years, and we congratulate C. T. Martin in particular for winning the Tennyson Medal for English at Matriculation level.

We congratulate Simon Harvey, Tim Cooper and Tim Moffat on taking the top three places in 4 Cadet Brigade Cadet Under-Officers Course in January of this year.

A school Charities Sub-committee ran a Charities Week at the end of first term and raised approximately \$500, to be distributed for work amongst aboriginals at the Port Adelaide Mission and other charities.

A combined cast of students from M.L.C. and P.A.C. put on a most enjoyable production of 'The Merchant of Venice' in the P.A.C. Assembly Hall early in June.

The Preparatory School camp for Grades 6 and 7 was held at Walker's Flat again this year, and was particularly successful, with students choosing most of their activities from a wide group of electives.

We offer our congratulations and best wishes to the P.A.C. Scout Group on reaching its Jubilee this year, and we wish the Group every success in its many current plans for development, and for a very prosperous second fifty years.

This year, for the first time, on Wednesday afternoons a series of elective courses and cultural activities has been

arranged jointly for the Matriculation students at M.L.C. and P.A.C. Activities take place at each of the schools and some students commute.

The College Council has purchased a twenty acre block of land on 'Roonka' Station, four miles north of Blanche Town. This land has a 13 chain frontage to the River Murray and an irrigated area above flood level. It is planned to develop the area as a semi-permanent camp site for academic and recreational purposes for groups from the school.

Planning is progressing well for the construction of a Library Resource Centre and Lecture Theatre during 1974.

Over the past few months a large number of minor developments and items of maintenance have taken place. These include the creation of three new lawn tennis courts on the corner of our property next to Pirie Street and the Parade West, the conversion of the dining hall into a light and attractive cafeteria style dining room, and the carpeting of some of the oldest class-rooms (as an economy measure, of course).

Since the publication of the last 'Chronicle' a good and exciting victory was gained in the Intercollegiate cricket match, and the tennis match was won, as darkness fell, by the narrowest of margins.

Life-saving competition results have been outstanding, in the Combined Athletic Sports we again came second to a brilliant Rostrevor team, but unfortunately in the Head of the River races we had little tangible success, despite great efforts.

This term Hockey has been introduced to the school under the enthusiastic guidance of Mr Cutts. We now have one Hockey team in the Preparatory School and three in the senior school, and are grateful to Clubs and Schools for the loan of pitches.

The overall number of boys playing competitive sport on a normal Saturday for P.A.C. is now greater than ever before, the number being well over 500.

The Intercollegiate football match will be played this year on the main oval at St. Peter's College at 2.30 p.m. on Saturday, 28 July.

OUR PRESIDENT

John Goode Bunday is one of four sons of the late F. L. (Les) Bunday, and grandsons of George Bunday, a foundation scholar of PAC. John played in intercollegiate athletics and football and was Captain of the School in 1941.

During his medical course at the University of Adelaide, he played football for University and then in the 1946 Prince Alfred Old Collegians first-ever premiership side. He took the field again this year in the veterans' team on the football club's picnic day, playing against a

team which included his son. His only kick was noted to be straighter than in school days, but he showed no improvement in pace!

After hospital appointments in Adelaide and Broken Hill, he was in general practice in Cleve and Mildura. Following postgraduate study in England, he returned to consultant practice in obstetrics and gynaecology in Adelaide at the end of 1962. He is a visiting obstetrician at the Queen Victoria Hospital.

John is a member of the Adelaide Rotary Club, the Public Schools' Club and Royal Adelaide Golf Club. He has retained a link with Mildura by acquiring an interest in a vine and citrus property.

Since being elected to the committee of this Association in 1965 he has, at various times, been an athletics club committeeman, chairman of the cricket club and chairman of the sports subcommittee. He was elected President at the Annual General Meeting last November.

He is married and has three daughters in addition to his son Bill, who left the school last year.

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING

The Ninety-fourth Annual General Meeting of the Association was held in the Masters' Common Room on Thursday, 16 November, 1972 at 7.45 p.m.

Dr J. G. Bunday was elected President, duly installed and congratulated by his predecessor Mr E. V. Cox. Mr Cox, in moving the adoption of the Annual Report and Statement of Accounts, referred to the foundation of subcommittees and the appointment of a new Secretary Mr Peter Buttery. He referred to the highlights of his term as President, with the Old Boys' Assembly being a particularly memorable occasion.

The President also referred to the retirement of Mr Ross Johnston as the Association Secretary after a period of 21 years. It was reported that during his term of office he had attended all committee meetings, Executive meetings and Country Dinners with the exception of two. The S.P.C.A. committee also paid tribute to his loyal service and co-operation by holding a dinner in his honour. On the motion of Dr M. W. Evans, a special minute was recorded of the appreciation of the members for Mr Johnston's service to the Association.

The President also thanked the Headmaster and school authorities for making the school facilities available to the sporting clubs.

The Treasurer, Mr Colin Newbery, in seconding the motion commented on the financial accounts, which revealed a surplus of \$394.99. There was a gratifying response from Life Members' Voluntary Contributions, the sum raised being in excess of \$8,000. The Finance Committee had invested the majority of these funds.

Following the adoption of the accounts, the meeting proceeded to the election of officers with the exception of the Patron (who is automatically the Headmaster) and the Secretary (who is appointed by the Committee). Elections resulted in the following appointments: President, Dr John Bunday; Senior Vice-President, Dr Brian Hobbs; Junior Vice-President, Mr Brian Potter; Treasurer, Mr Colin Newbery; Auditors, Messrs Murray Aitken and Robert Hunwick.

As only seven nominations were received for eight vacancies on the committee, the President declared the following elected: Dr M. W. Evans, Messrs D. N. Angel, R. J. Byrne, R. J. Clarke, D. C. Johnston, M. B. McLachlan and R. M. Wilson.

The President moved a vote of thanks to the retiring President, Mr Eric Cox and his wife. Dr Brian Hobbs moved a vote of thanks to the Headmaster and Mrs Bean. Mr John Tucker moved a vote of thanks to the retiring committeeman, Mr K. J. Parkinson. The votes of thanks were carried with acclamation and suitable responses were given.

There was general discussion on the quality of the paper and printing of the recently published Annual Chronicle. On the motion of Mr R. C. Johnston the question of format and quality of the publication was referred to the incoming Committee.

Following supper, Mr Don Brebner, President of the S.A. Football League, addressed the members on his recent trip with the Carlton Football Club and the Australians All Stars Team. He highlighted the various games played and the personalities of the trip. Although a game was played at 'The Oval' the turf was treated with such respect that the wicket area was completely covered with pegged down coconut matting. For a period of over an hour after the game the pro-Australian crowd of some 12,000 people spilled on to the ground renewing friendships. The game in Athens was played with 11 a side on a Soccer oval and was not a success, as most players could kick over half the length of the oval.

The new Junior Vice-President, Mr Brian Potter, proposed a vote of thanks for the interesting and amusing address.

Football

A particularly notable occasion was the opening of the Club's licensed premises at 245 The Parade, Belulah Park (behind Clayton Congregational Church). team-men were Rick Jacobs, Craig McIntosh and Mike Waterson. Richard Viner Smith was most improved player. Life membership was awarded to Dean Bowen and Ian Kerr.

Our thanks to our Vice-Presidents, trophy donors and supporters who have helped and have, we hope, been heartened by the Club's success. We welcome all interested, particularly new players, to even bigger and better things next season.

Athletics

The Athletics Club had two teams in senior interclub competition during the 1972-3 summer season — one in 'B' grade and the second in 'C' grade. He also won the State junior high jump title in February, was runner-up in the senior title, and gained second place in the junior long jump. Further, he was placed second in the junior high jump event at the Australian championships in Sydney.
