HEADMASTER'S REPORT

Our 2017 Year 12 results provided us with a third year of improvement, with a median ATAR of 87.55. This was a 1 percentile point increase on the previous year, consolidating our position amongst the leading boy cohorts in the State.

Similarly, our 2018 NAPLAN results improved across all years of testing - Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. Our overall improvement of 3.6% exceeded our targets and similarly positions our results well in relation to our competitor schools.

As one of the six objectives in our current Strategic Plan is to "raise academic expectations and performance across the College," these results are particularly pleasing. But these improvements did not come about by chance - they reflect a great deal of work by all of our teaching staff, and particularly Director of Teaching and Learning, Ben Evans, and his team of Assistant Directors and Academic Leaders.

Another of our strategic objectives is "to be a globally recognised leader in boys' education". This year we commissioned research into gender outcomes in the South Australian Certificate of Education. It demonstrated that, while girls outperform boys overall and across all subject areas, boys in boys' schools perform significantly better than boys in coeducational schools. Moreover, PAC's results place us at the top of the scale.

In line with this strategic objective, we utilised a bequest from an Old Scholar to establish the Max Lawton Boys' Education Endowment Fund. This fund will be used to support a range of projects specifically related to boys' education. In 2019, it will fund our first Max Lawton Visiting Fellow, with a visit from an American expert in boys' development and education, Dr Andrew Reiner.



Our enrolment numbers remain strong, with over 1,100 boys enrolled from Reception to Year 12. We have seen steady growth in our Secondary School over the last four years with an increase of 100 students to around 800. This has created some challenges in terms of space and classrooms, which we are currently addressing through planning for further development of our facilities in this area.

As I outlined last year, we have made some significant changes in the pastoral program in the Secondary School, as follows:

- The appointment of Shaun Oakey as Dean of Students to oversee wellbeing and pastoral programs throughout the Secondary School.
- Reduction in the size of our key pastoral care units, tutor groups, to between 12 and 16 students, to enable greater individual attention for each student.
- Further development of our taught curriculum within our pastoral care program to provide continuity, consistency and coverage of all key pastoral topics.

Our Co-Curricular program has continued to develop, with many successes in both sport and the performing arts. We won 10 of the 14 Intercollegiate sports in our traditional fixtures with our great friends and rivals, St Peter's College. Our teams also won, or finished runner-up, in a number of external competitions, including State Championships or equivalent. The redevelopment of the Prince Philip Theatre has seen a number of excellent



performances take place, including a fine production of the iconic play "Our Town" by Thornton Wilder.

2018 also saw the majority of the construction of our new boarding facility, on the other side of The Parade West, together with the installation of the new footbridge connecting the Boarding House with the main campus. The new facility, with accommodation for 150 boarders and seven staff, is a marvellous, state-of-theart extension to our campus facilities. It also facilitates opening up the campus with the demolition of the existing boarding houses to take place later next year.

The ANZAC Hall is currently being renovated, with new seating, upgraded audio-visual facilities and improvements to the stage area to enhance performances. We are also expanding our facilities at Wambana with the construction of a new staff unit and first-aid centre, together with upgraded staff facilities.

Preparations for our Sesquicentenary year in 2019 have continued, with a program of events scheduled to celebrate this significant milestone. Our aim is to provide a range of activities and functions, which will engage as many of our wider community as possible. In April 2018, we welcomed HRH Prince Edward to Prince Alfred College, the fifth generation of the British Royal family to visit the College or attend one of our major events. This was a marvellous occasion which saw all sections of the school community and staff work together to provide an outstanding and memorable event.

As we now complete the third year of our five-year Strategic Plan, the College Council and Executive have recently reviewed our progress in achieving our strategic objectives. This process has affirmed our current Strategic Plan, whilst also developing additional strategies to achieve our key objectives.

In conclusion, I would like to acknowledge the Prince Alfred College Council, under the leadership of Chair, Mr John Keeves, for its outstanding leadership and governance of the College, which sees us in a very strong position and in good heart. I would like to acknowledge the College Executive Team for their leadership of their respective areas within the College, as well as working together in progressing our directions. I would like to thank and acknowledge our students and staff for an industrious and purposeful year, which sees us with much to celebrate in 2019.

Most of us want to be successful. We want to be a good student, good sportsmen, good musicians and good artists. Later on, we dream of having good jobs, driving the best cars, owning nice houses, going on great holidays etc. But if we don't put in the effort, sweat and tears and prepare for what we want to achieve, how could we possibly achieve these things?

So, why is preparation so important?

- It helps to start well. When you prepare well, starting well is easy because you have put some work in before you start
- It helps you understand the things you need to do and to work out where you need to improve, what you need to change or do differently. Sometimes it is also important to reflect on the work you have done or any setbacks that have occurred. This is preparation and planning for the future.

It's not just enough to prepare - preparing well is also important. So how do we prepare well?

- 1. Give yourself enough time
- 2. Understand what you are preparing for
- 3. Note all the things you have to do if you have it written in front of you it makes it a lot easier to work on it
- 4. Set SMART goals set specific realistic and timely goals that will help you achieve what you need
- 5. Focus and be disciplined about it: set a plan and set out to achieve it
- 6. Put as much detail in your plan as possible

To finish off, I would like to leave you with a thought from Oprah Winfrey, who said "I believe luck is preparation meeting opportunity. If you hadn't been prepared when the opportunity came along, you wouldn't have been lucky."

2018 saw us focus heavily on preparation. In the ELC and Preparatory school, our teams have worked hard to ensure no stone is left unturned in our preparation and

Preparatory Staff have worked hard to revisit our curriculum expectations and review the programs we offer over the last two years. This year, the outcome of that preparation was clearly evident in NAPLAN results and in the work the boys have produced throughout the year. The success of our academic progress has been consistent across all year levels.

There have been many highlights that show the pride the boys have in their school and themselves. In the next few pages, a photographic recount of some of these is on show. Events such as sports days, swimming carnival, exhibition and artsPACes provided highlights for some of the boys. For others, it was the performances at Assembly and Chapel or the school musical. Single studies music, choir and end of term band performances also provided highlights for the boys and parents.

We also celebrated the success of boys in a multitude of sport and Co-Curricular activities. These included a wakeboarding world champion, State Chess champion and IPSHA Poetry Recital champion and finalists. There were outstanding results in National Mathematics competitions and a number of State Literacy and Numeracy awards collected. We also had representatives at State and National level in swimming, indoor cricket, tennis, football, softball and cricket.

This year we introduced Arts Hour for Years 5 and 6. Boys learnt and performed Hip Hop, Tap, Theatre Sports, Singing, Ballroom Dancing and Stop Animation on a rotation and showcased their new-found skills to admiring audiences of parents and fellow students.

A special mention is deserved for the outstanding role that Director of Bands, Andrew Newhouse, has played in the advancement of bands and music in general over the last seventeen years. We wish Andrew well as he takes on a new challenge at Wilderness School in 2019.

We introduced a new sport and after school skill development program for our junior primary boys. This program was widely enjoyed by the boys and over the next few years, coupled with a specific focus on developing core strength capabilities, it will, I am sure, see more able athletes and students.

Late in the year, 1968 Preparatory School Captain, Dr Mark Ward Newman, visited the College and spoke to our boys about his time at school 50 years ago. He shared stories and even comments from his report card that outlined what school life was like for him and his peers. A highlight was Dr Newman sharing his cap with the boys and reflecting on how the lessons he learned at PAC have driven him during his life. His closing remarks were a reminder of the privilege it is to attend such a school:

As I get older, I often think how lucky I was to grow up in Adelaide and in particular how fortunate I was to go to school at PAC. We live in a country that offers us many more opportunities than in a lot of other countries, and this school is one of the very best in the country.

I loved my days at PAC. I am so grateful to my parents for providing me with the opportunity to attend this school. I hope that you enjoy your days at PAC as much as I did. Life in another 50 years from now will be different again. Be prepared for change, as nothing ever stays the same.

Your school years provide the foundation for you to be a better person. The lessons that you learn today should guide you right through your lives, whether it be your workplace, a sporting team or association, or with your relationships with your family and friends.

For the third year running, the results of our annual wellbeing survey showed our boys to have strong emotional health and wellbeing. With extra emphasis on developing the Princes Man, being your best and giving of your best, we continue to see boys learning how to be successful and enjoying the emotional health this brings.



Our Early Learning Centre (ELC) also enjoyed a full and engaging year. For those families in the ELC, we have produced a wonderful pictorial coffee table book as a lasting treasure of the year that was. This has been a labour of love for Teacher, Mel Bishop, and her efforts in producing the publication are to be commended.

So much credit must go to the strong and enduring leadership of the teaching staff in the ELC and Preparatory School who care deeply for the boys and their learning, no matter the activity. They are passionate and committed to the wellbeing and learning of every child.

The strength and support of our leadership team in Mr John Shackleton and Lisa Foster in the Preparatory School and Mrs Melanie Garland in the ELC have ensured the programmes we have implemented along with the day to day operations of the school have been well prepared and managed.

After two years of leave to care for her ageing father, long-serving Chinese teacher, Lihwa Chu, has resigned and relocated to continue to support him and her family. We thank Lihwa for her service to the school community and wish her well.

received. The secondary school also acknowledged the National Day of Action against Bullying and Violence on 16 March. In March, the College also hosted Steve Biddulph, world renowned speaker and author whose book "Raising Boys" has helped many parents and educators understand the stages of boyhood and how to raise boys who are gentle, caring and engaged.

In 2018, there have been many things that have taken place within the Secondary School at Prince Alfred College, and which give us cause to acknowledge and celebrate. The boys have once again participated in a multitude of events and activities with great enthusiasm and spirit. In doing so, they continue to embrace the journey of the Princes Man, which it is hoped will provide the foundations necessary for life beyond school. The College continues to evolve with a very healthy enrolment of over 1,117 boys this year; an increase on last year. Irrespective of where each boy comes from, the College welcomes boys of all backgrounds and it is this diversity and inclusivity which adds to the wonderful fabric of a Princes education.

Following the Pastoral Care review that was undertaken in 2017, several key changes were made to the structure of the Secondary School with the appointment of Mr Shaun Oakey (Dean of Students), Mr Jeremy Rylatt (Head of Operations) and Mr Mark Dell'Oro (Head of Student Leadership and Management). These appointments have provided greater consistency in the delivery of pastoral care, school operations and student leadership this year. Furthermore, there has been a specific focus on the role of the Tutor as well as the taught wellbeing curriculum called the Princes Man Program. These areas will continue to provide us with a specific point of focus in 2019.

The year commenced with many boys returning to the College as well as many new boys, and their families, who were joining for the first time. A specific event was held called 'Meet the Tutor' day, which allowed families to establish a connection with their son's tutor at the start of the new year. This also provided an opportunity for the Tutor to hear about the student's hopes for the year and all the Tutors to share their own expectations. Several other key events provided an opportunity for parents to mix and socialise with the Middle and Senior School social evenings held in the garden of St Jacques.

At the start of the year, the whole school acknowledged Safer Internet Day by hosting cybersafety expert Susan McLean. Susan delivered several workshops to students about how to behave and act respectfully whilst online. As part of our ongoing commitment to supporting parents in this space, we engaged Susan to deliver a parent's masterclass on the risks and challenges of IT, mobile phones and social media, which was well

Several other key events were also held early in the year. As is tradition, the Emeritus Assembly was held in Week 2. At this event, we invite our Year 12 leavers back to the College to present significant academic prizes following their examinations last year. This was once again an outstanding assembly with Anthony Rositano and Douglas Gerard being named joint Dux of the College. The Red and White Formal was held at the end of Term 1 and this was a stunning evening for our Year 11 and 12 boys, as well as their partners. Held again this year at the Adelaide Convention Centre, the theme was 'Carnival' and \$2,530 was raised for the chosen charity, "Hutt Street Centre", which was an outstanding achievement.

The College's cross-curricular and outdoor education program once again figured prominently in the lives of the boys at the College, particularly those in Years 7 to 9. Our Year 7 students again participated in the excellent eduCook program at 'Sprout', whilst boys in Years 7 and 8 enjoyed the stunning outdoor education program offered by Micha Jensen and his team at Scotts Creek. This included water-based activities and team challenges, adjacent to the Murray near Morgan.

Under the watchful eyes of Mr Dale Hobbs, Director of Wambana, our Year 9 students also participated in the Wambana experience at the College's Point Turton campus on the Yorke Peninsula. This unique program provides boys with an excellent experiential learning opportunity over a five week period and places a strong emphasis on character building activities. The boys completed a range of activities including a solo hike and reflective journal writing. Dale is working closely with the College to implement the recommendations outlined in last year's Polley review, and this includes some capital improvements that will take place next year. The details of this review continue to provide us with some key focus points to improve and develop the Wambana program.

A significant highlight for the College this year was the Royal visit by HRH Prince Edward, Earl of Wessex, in April. Whilst here to largely promote and celebrate the Duke of Edinburgh's Award scheme, he visited the College to unveil a marble plaque on the front of the main building. This was the fourth Royal visit to Prince Alfred following Prince Alfred in 1867, Prince Albert and Prince George (the future King George VI) and the Duke of Edinburgh, Prince Philip, in 1992.

The Princes Players Theatre Company this year presented 'Our Town' which is a 1938 metatheatrical three-act play by American playwright Thornton Wilder. The play, which was a stunning success, tells the story of the fictional American small town of Grover's Corners between 1901 and 1913 through the everyday lives of its citizens. Congratulations to all staff who contributed to this outstanding production. The Music Department also held several events including 'Princes Rock' Concert in August as well as the Mid-winter Music Night for our student performers.

This year, our swimming and athletics carnivals were well attended and supported by our boys. The boys also participated fully in the Summer and Winter Intercollegiate fixtures against St Peter's College. Once again, our boys acquitted themselves very well and displayed great sportsmanship across all age groups and games. Outstanding sporting and Co-Curricular achievements were acknowledged at several Honours and Colours assemblies throughout the year as well.

Early in Term 3 we held the annual 'Old Old Boys' assembly in the RED Centre. This outstanding event salutes the College's Old Scholars in a moving and heart lifting assembly. The process for selecting the College student leaders also commenced in Term 3. Under the guidance of Mr Mark Dell'Oro in his new role as Head of Student Leadership and Management, a thorough selection process took place resulting in the selection of 22 Prefects, each of whom were inducted at assembly. The boys, since their appointment, have been working tirelessly on several 'portfolios' which seek to support all students in the College. The selection process also resulted in three College Captains being appointed for 2018/19 they are:

- College Co-Vice Captain Blake Favretto
- College Co-Vice Captain Samuel Bennetts

This year the College has continued to implement the Narragunnawali Reconciliation Action Plan under the guidance of our Indigenous Co-ordinator, Monica Magann. The 'Yaita Tita' group was established last year to provide an opportunity for our indigenous students to engage in educational activities including leadership development whilst at the same time mixing with

indigenous students from other schools. This program continues to develop and has resulted in several key events this year.

Prince Alfred College has always had a proud history of embracing international students. Under the careful guidance of Ms Mani White, our international student program has again flourished with over 17 students from China, Hong Kong, Saudi Arabia and Thailand. We greatly value the diversity that our international students bring to the College and they provide an enriching experience for all with whom they come into contact with. Harmony Day was also held on 22 March 2018 to celebrate the College's cultural diversity. A special assembly was held and there were several outstanding presentations from our international students.

The start of Term 4 also provided us with the opportunity to farewell our Year 12 students with a Valedictory Chapel service, assembly and dinner. Held at the Adelaide Oval, the evening was a lovely event and a fitting farewell for our senior students. At the event, College Captain Max Kirkby was awarded the Headmaster's medal and Luke D'Ortenzio delivered the Valedictory address. We wish all boys the very best for their final examinations and their future endeavours.

The Years 7 to 11 Prize Giving also occurred on the last day of Term 4. This is a major event on the College calendar and provides an opportunity to acknowledge and recognise outstanding student achievement. The event also included a Year in Review video as well as several outstanding performances by some of the College's brilliant musicians.

As 2018 draws to a close, it is appropriate to reflect on the diverse events and activities that have taken place and in which the boys at Princes have engaged. A Princes education is comprehensive in every way and it is a thrill to see so many embrace the opportunities that are available to them. There is an expectation on all boys to do their very best and to aspire to achieve high standards. Knowing what excellence looks like is important for all boys and it continues to be our pleasure to support students to achieve these objectives. I wish all boys the very best for the Christmas break and the commencement of the New Year.



ACADEMIC REPORT

We are pleased to report on further improvements in academic performance for our graduating students, as well as many examples of academic success and endeavour from boys throughout the College.

The 2018 median ATAR score was 88.80, representing a fourth successive year of growth in this key academic measure. The median ATAR now stands a full six points higher than in 2014, meaning that academic results at Princes compare favourable with any boy cohort in the state

Shine Wang was named as Dux of School for a perfect ATAR of 99.95 and was also awarded the Sir Thomas Elder Prize. In addition, Shine received six subject merits. Dejun (Jack) Cai was awarded the E B Colton Prize (Proxime Accessit to Dux of School) for an IB score of 44 (out of a possible points) an ATAR of 99.85 and six subject merits. Jack achieved the perfect score of seven in all of his academic subjects. 2018 School captain Max Kirkby received a Tuckwell Scholarship from ANU, with vice-captain Connor Kioussis and Ethan Lawson both awarded Excellence Scholarships at Bond University. Our co vice-captain Noah Miles is likely to take up a place at Harvard University, or another Ivy League destination.

The number of subject merits awarded to the Year 12 cohort also increased for the fourth successive year, with 63 merits achieved in 2018. This contrasts with 61 merits the previous year, 49 in 2016 and 39 in 2015. An increase of almost two thirds in the number of subject merits over a four year timeframe is an outstanding achievement and one that emphasises our commitment to genuine academic excellence and mastery of subject content.

I wrote a year ago that 'our mixed 2017 NAPLAN scores prove that this remains a work in progress' and that 'it can take a little time for improved process to lead to improved results'. We are delighted to report that the NAPLAN results for 2018 are very pleasing. Each of the four year levels tested showed improvement from 2017, with particularly significant increases in Years 3 and 5. The Year 3 results are the College's best ever, as are the Year 5 results. The Year 7 results are the best since the first year of NAPLAN (in 2008) and the Year 9 results are the third best ever.

Two years of progress in the areas of Maths and English are represented by between 39 and 78 'NAPLAN points'. We have increased scores in Years 3 and 5 by around 30 points in 2018, and this places our academic gains in the correct context. We can improve NAPLAN scores by concentrating primarily on effective teaching and on test preparation and a commitment to the seriousness of the tests as secondary measures. NAPLAN testing should never be invasive, but it remains a useful metric to judge student progress in the key areas of English and Mathematics.

We introduced weekly tutor group reading in 2018 with the aim that all boys should read around 25 more books during their time in the Secondary School than may otherwise be the case. The books are selected to be of genuine literary merit and also to represent texts and authors that boys may not come across in the ordinary scheme of things.

To quote cognitive scientist Daniel Willingham, 'Reading tests are often just knowledge tests in disguise'. Indeed, fluency in reading and understanding comes from the ability to understand context and pick up on allusions. We have expanded our approach to academic enrichment in 2018, and now have over 150 boys enrolled in the program. A dozen or so teachers are responsible for delivering the program, which enables boys to make natural connections between various subjects and areas of knowledge.

During our 2019 extension program, a selection of our Year 8 boys will be studying the 'Banality of Evil'; the art of Stanley Spencer; the siege of Leningrad; European modernism; Why sport matters; the Weird Tales of H P Lovecraft and the Beauty of Death. One of our Year 12 groups will be introduced to, and explore for themselves, the science of addition and memory; the photojournalism of Hoda Afshar; collaborative poetry; Beckett's Godot; Ian Curtis and Joy Division and the relationship between art and mental illness with a case study of van Gogh. Learning is always more joyful when there is no assessment task attached. Our youngest boys possess an insatiable curiosity and providing structure and rigour to channel this curiosity is essential. As boys get older, we need to work hard not to allow their natural curiosity to become submerged by an overly pragmatic view of education. Means are at least as important as ends.

Our students have achieved considerable success in academic competitions, and the following selection highlights a breadth of achievement in Mathematics, Science, Humanities and the Arts.

The Australian Mathematics Olympiad (AMO) Competition is a four-hour senior examination open to students by invitation only from the Mathematics Olympiad Committee, with no more than one hundred students being invited nationally. Steve Wu received a bronze medal and Andy Wu an Honourable Mention in 2018; Preshaan Thavarajah and Steve Wu have also been invited to sit this year's AMO in February.

The Australian Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad (AIMO) is the most challenging mathematics competition offered to Australian students in Year 10 or below. In 2018 Preshaan, Dinan Perera and Dongwoo Shin were all awarded distinctions.

In the Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC), Preshaan was awarded a prize for the top performing student in South Australia, with Mark Jiang and Hoon Kang (Years 7 and 8 respectively) being recognised in the top three in the state of their divisions. Oscar Wang in Year 6 earned a highly coveted prize for being placed equal sixth.

Students from Prince Alfred College have received 83 credits or better in the AMC over the last two years, an increase of around 50% on preceding years. It is also pleasing to note that the number of boys in the Preparatory School awarded distinctions and credits has increased markedly in the last two years, tallying with our recent NAPLAN improvements.

Harry Edwards in Year 6 was named as a finalist in the Young Writers' Award for 2018. His short story, *Harry and the Time Machine*, was worthy of H G Wells himself.

Boys from Years 5, 6, 7 and 9 once again competed in the Da Vinci Decathlon, the state's premier competition for academic agility. The Year 9 boys were placed second in Art and Poetry and third for English. The boys in Year 7 were placed first for Science and second for Mathematics. The boys in Years 5 and 6 were placed fourth for Mathematics. We aim to reclaim our state title (in at least one age category) in 2019.

Fifteen boys across Years 7 to 10 were awarded High Distinctions for their performance in the online Big Science competition, with Dylan Holland in Year 9 scoring the highest individual score of 28 out of 30.

There were over 1,000 entries for the science investigation awards and three boys from Year 7 (Aditya Ghai, Max Thomas and Henry Pontifex) were awarded prizes for their investigations and accompanying posters. Aditya was placed first for his expertly designed and realised *Sun Tracking Solar Panel*.

13 boys received High Distinctions in the Australian National Chemistry Quiz, a competion for Year 11 students. William Smart received the highest mark overall, being placed in the 99th percentile in the state and 98th percentile nationally when compared to all participants.

Harry Shum (Year 12, 2017) was announced in February as the winner of the Bright Awards graphic design section, a nationwide design competition for senior secondary students.

The National History and Geography Competitions are the major competitions in these subjects for students up to and including Year 10. Year 9 student Rory Rasumussen excelled in the History competition, achieving a High Distinction (88%) and being placed equal first in South Australia. Not to be outdone, Jason Gong in Year 10 was judged top of the state in the Australian Geography Competition.

2018 saw the awarding of the inaugural Helpmann Prizes for the best performances in academic Drama. The twin recipients were Angus Brill-Reed of Year 8, for his portrayal of Algernon Moncrieff in Oscar Wilde's *The Importance of Being Earnest*; and Dylan Holland of Year 9, for his performance as Claude Riviere from *Is He Dead?* by Mark Twain.

The standard for 2018's King's Speech Competition was very high, and after twenty speeches from students across the age range, the finest orators (and winners of the Lionel Logue Awards) were judged to be Nicholas Henchliffe, Anthony Pham and Jackson Miller for the Preparatory, Middle and Senior School divisions respectively.

Thomas Dodsworth and Luke Bardy (both Year 12, 2018) represented PAC in the UN Youth South Australia Evatt competition. The boys progressed through the preliminary round in August and the semi-final in early September. On 15 September, they represented Poland in the state's Grand Final and were placed second in the state overall. They were also selected as one of three teams to represent South Australia at this year's National Evatt Competition at the very end of the year in Hobart.

2018 has been an exciting year for Pastoral Care and Student Wellbeing with continuation of many of the traditional Middle School pastoral activities such as eduKart and eduCook, (Years 7 and 8) the Scotts Creek Camps (Years 7 and 8) and Wambana, (Year 9), but also the introduction of new initiatives and guest speakers including a visit to the College by Steve Biddulph.

Our Senior School students were treated to the wit and good advice of Paul Dillon on themes such as 'Safe Partying' and 'Drugs and Alcohol awareness.' CHAPLAIN'S REPORT

One's journey through life is marked by events which shape the life for that person. This so for each of us. It is the also the same for chaplaincy within the College. There are events that come and go, some of them run-of-the-mill and others unique and individual, that mark the year. Each of them leave their own impact and contribute to the shaping of lives, but not always in ways that can be seen.

Alongside assemblies, Chapel services serve to bring the community together either in its entirety, such as with the Easter Service, or sections of the College, such as the End of Year Chapel Service for the Secondary School. In the Preparatory School, the commencement and ending of each term brings all the boys together in the chapel to mark the occasion, while throughout the term the Junior boys, Reception to Year 2, and upper primary classes, Years 3 to 6, gather separately each week for a service that incorporates a class-led, values-based message.

Special occasion services include National Reconciliation Week, ANZAC and Remembrance Day commemorations, the Prince Alfred Old Collegians Association Annual Service, Victory in the Pacific Day commemoration (formerly the Ex-Prisoners of War Association of SA service), the Lessons and Carols Service in the last week of term, and others.

With the refurbishment of ANZAC Hall taking place in Term 4, the Reception to Year 2 Nativity was held in the Wesley Kent Town Uniting Church this year. With the backdrop of the organ and pipes, built in 1898, this annual event continued to be a much-loved presentation of the nativity story by the boys. In conjunction with this event, a presentation of donated food items was made to Ms Sue Pastro, the Emergency Relief Co-ordinator at UnitingCare Wesley Bowden. UCWB welcomed our support in anticipation of assisting over 300 families with food hampers in the lead up to Christmas.

A personal highlight for me as College Chaplain was the opportunity to attend the triennial conference of the Asia-Pacific Association of Methodist-related Educational Institutions in Lucknow, India. The theme of the conference was Building Communities for Peace; Making Peace Peacefully. Bringing together educators from schools and universities, this provided an opportunity to network with delegates throughout the region, and extend friendships established with people I met last year at the International Association of Methodist Schools Colleges and Universities conference.

EARLY LEARNING CENTRE

Langley Room

The Langley children undertook a project of exploration based on colour in response to their musings. The children were provided with a variety of provocations aimed to deepen their connection to colour in the world around them. They were offered a variety of puzzles, texts, sensory and cooking experiences, and art and science investigations to explore in an open-ended way. The artsPACes event offered an opportunity for the children to showcase some of their individual and collaborative pieces of visual art.







Wilkins Room

In the Wilkins Room, we weave our Units of Inquiry through and around the focus books we read each week. The curriculum evolves around the lens of the shared story and many children extend upon these ideas in their play. We read for information like learning more about our class Monarch butterfly, know more about a recipe for cooking or imagining a different world. Our favourite books to read are 'We're Going On A Bear Hunt', 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' and 'The Green Sheep'. Many children find comfort in our reading area to relax and flick through a book or two helping their minds and bodies transition into sleep.

Cooper Room

The Cooper children worked on a collaborative art project in Term 3, sparked by an interest in rainbows and subsequently sea creatures in particular the 'Colossal Squid', drawn by Liam W. We inquired into what makes sea creatures thrive in the ocean and used every step of

the project to engage our senses through the offerings of process art, nature walks, family projects and science experiments. We proudly chose to showcase this piece for artsPACes 2018.

Mead Room

This year the Mead children have shown a strong interest in colour and colour mixing. The children thought scientifically as they examined colours, testing out their hypothesis and recording their findings when they mixed colours together. We created a graph to record discussions about their favourite colour and to determine what the most popular colour in the class was. To extend the children's thinking further, we introduced the concept of shades of colours with a focus on lighter and darker. We explored how to make colours lighter and darker and engaged with a range of opportunities to match, sort and identify shades. To support this investigation into colour, we used the book "Mix It Up" by Herve Tullet.



Mattingley Room

In the Mattingley Room, our interest in Sustainability was piqued when we noticed that we were running out of paper towel in our bathroom over and over again. We observed that sometimes Mattingley friends were using A LOT of paper when they dried their hands. Did we need to use so much paper? What could we do? We collectively decided to just use one each! Our 'One Paper Challenge' sparked an interest in how we can be more sustainable in our ELC environment. We began to notice the recycling symbol as we discussed how recycling 'changes something to something else' and then we use it again, (Ava, aged 3.6). We fed the chickens with plants grown in our ELC garden, scraps from the ELC kitchen, and collected their eggs as well. The drought experienced by farmers in our rural areas added a strong

desire for many children to articulate their ideas and strategies to save water. In these hands-on experiences our youngest citizens were demonstrating awareness of their impact on the environment and ways to minimise it.

Edgerley Room

The Edgerley children wondered why we have a College crest and what it means. Some children offered different suggestions such as "it is a symbol", "it is the ELC's symbol", "it has a crown which means the king", "it has a cross, and sea shells", "it has numbers to say how old it is". We explored the College grounds to see if we could find any more. What alert eyes we had! We found symbol on signs, buildings, flags and even on school staff's uniforms. This led us into thinking about what our crest symbolises and the children decided it meant we are all part of the Prince Alfred College community. They soon realised they also belonged to many different communities such as the Edgerley class community, other Kindy communities, swimming lesson communities, families, and sporting house communities. We concluded that being part of a community meant being kind, helpful and welcoming to others.

Chapple Room

In the Chapple room we aim to prepare the children for school, whilst still giving them the opportunity to be four. We use the ideas of Belonging, Being and Becoming from the Early Years Learning Framework (EYLF) and structure the experiences so that they are enjoyable for the children whilst at the same time developing their learning. Throughout the year the children developed their phonetic awareness through rhyme and initial sounds. They made turtles and giant ants, acted in front of a green screen, engaged in cooking experiences, and wrote a class book following Mr Andary's provocation to the class - "Do snails smell?"














































PREPARATORY SCHOOL CAPTAIN'S REPORT

This culminated in our amazing presentation of 'Find Your Feelings' at artsPACes, where we shared our interpretation of our inquiry into how The Arts enables people to discover and express themselves. For now, we look towards Year 2 and another year of growing!





The Preparatory School Student Success Team

Every year we take great pride in, and love making a difference to, boys' learning. We work hard to ensure all students are part of an inclusive, vibrant and exciting learning community where high expectations are maintained. In partnership with class teachers, we make sure that individual learning styles are identified and programmed for. We have especially treasured working in collaboration with families in our persuit of success for each child

Over the year we have provided excellent enrichment opportunities for academic extension, for boys who are having challenges accessing the curriculum, and for those students who do not speak English as their first language.

There have been many wonderful celebrations as boys move forward in their learning. Before school, explicit reading intervention programs were successfully implemented this year which have allowed boys to spend more time in class. The boys happily come into school at 8am, four days a week, to work on developing their reading skills. The Student Success Team facilitated the evidenced based MultiLit program to help the boys to develop basic decoding and reading skills. We were delighted to have the Year 11 CAS students join the team each morning to work with the younger boys in Book Club where they encouraged reading fluency, comprehension and confidence in reading.

With the introduction of iPads to all classes, Speech to Text and Text to Speech technology became readily available and has helped our students to access more

literacy experiences. Through this medium, we saw the boys showcase their learning with enthusiasm and confidence. Furthermore, online skills programs such as Literacy Planet, Nessy, Mathletics and Maths Invaders have provided a marvellous incentive for boys striving to measure their accomplishments and achieve their goals.

Across the Preparatory School, we saw the introduction of our new Academic Extension Program. Selected boys from each year level progressed through Literacy and Maths challenges aimed at their academic level. We encouraged like-minded boys to work together while nurturing individual learning and allowing their unique talents to shine.

Throughout the year we have placed great importance on supporting the boys not only with their learning needs, but also with their social and emotional needs. The Sea Cave was used as a quiet, safe place for the boys to come and relax, play games or hang out during lunchtimes.

The Student Success Team has developed strong relationships with many boys giving them the courage to focus on their learning. The boys have shared time together, told many wonderful stories and felt supported even when life is a little challenging.

We are all looking forward to an exciting 2019.














artsPACes

In 2018 we welcomed 30 new boys to the Year 8 cohort. In quick time these new boys were welcomed and settled into their new school. Initially, beyond establishing normal school routines, the start of the year saw all boys at the pastoral camps at Goolwa/Hindmarsh Island where time was spent together in a casual, relaxed atmosphere while completing a number of active water-based activities with surfing a highlight. Time was also spent refining kayaking skills for the Scotts Creek camp later in the year (including the all important capsize drill) and in planning for the extended expedition along the river.

All boys mentioned a highlight for them over the year was the eduKart program. Reports of "I didn't think my group would be able to actually build the kart" were common although all were eventually successful with their kart build. Boys spoke of relating various gear sizes to speed and velocity along with making links to ratio in maths and were somewhat surprised at how theoretical learning at school was related to the real-life problem of building a kart to race.

Many of the Year 8 boys continue an active involvement in the Co-Curricular program. We saw participants in the arts with My Town, Generations in Jazz, assembly performances and the musical showcase concert of older Rock n Roll bands. We also had very successful Year 8 team members in a vast array of other activities including water polo, football, soccer, cricket, tennis, rowing, badminton, table tennis, hockey, basketball, debating, volleyball and chess.

Throughout the year in tutor time the Princes Man Program saw us tackling issues of personal organisation, general knowledge, cybersafety, digital citizenship, study skills, self esteem, reconciliation along with character virtues of courage, kindness and empathy. Tutor time also saw the introduction of a regular reading time each week where a range of different novels were read and discussed within tutor groups and linked to issues being addressed in relation to character.

In 2019 we will welcome nine new boys to the group and despite some fears of living away from home for a lengthy period of time, we are all looking forward to what the Wambana Extended Stay Program will have to offer

eduKart 2018

2018 was the eighth year of eduKart at PAC, and again the Year 8 boys have shown their enthusiasm for this unique program. For every group, the excitement at the start of the week was tangible, but with it was apprehension about the task that confronted them. As the week progressed the excitement grew as the chance to drive their karts became a reality. By the end of the program, apprehension had been replaced by exhilaration and confidence that the seemingly impossible had been achieved.

Whilst on the surface the program seems to be all about building and racing a kart, it is, in reality, much more. eduKart is delivered in a minimally guided environment, by which I mean that the boys receive very little instruction regarding the construction of their go-kart, but rather need to work out what to do by examining a completed kart. They need to work as a team and each night are asked to write a reflection on their day, focussing not on what they did, but rather on what they learned and how they felt when confronted with challenges.

The staff involved in the delivery of the program have, for some time now, said that the acquisition of social and emotional skills (commonly referred to as 21st Century skills) has been the great strength of the eduKart program. The teamwork (collaboration) and overcoming challenges (resilience) are often highlighted in the boys' reflections.

At the same time, because of the close links to the disciplines of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM), eduKart is an excellent example

of what the Australian Curriculum refers to as authentic or real-world problem solving. Within the program, the boys explore the science of lead-acid batteries, the workings of an electric motor and work with cogs and gears to investigate the effect they have on the performance of the vehicle.

For many boys eduKart was the first time that they had used spanners, screwdrivers, washers, spring washers and Vernier callipers. It was also the first time that most had driven a powered vehicle! At the end of the day, eduKart 2018 provided the boys with an experience that they will long remember.

eduCook is always a highlight in Year 7. All Year 7 students have the opportunity to explore and learn about food and nutrition, this included skills and knowledge that will develop further in the future. eduCook is a dynamic practical experience which is more than just learning how to cook, it fosters the individual's self-esteem and is challenging for the students.

eduCook is collaborative learning set in a cooking context. Students produce meals and menus throughout the week, from the simple to the complex. It develops life-long skills in teamwork, learning from mistakes and problem solving.

eduCook has been developed in collaboration with Themis Chryssidis (PAC Old Scholar and an accredited practicing dietician) and Callum Hann (Celebrity chef and MasterChef contestant). Themis and Callum work with our students and staff to provide guidance and expertise.

The program incorporates the following elements:

- How to work in teams and co-operate with each other
- How to learn from mistakes and problem solve

- The correct use of kitchen utensils
- Budgeting
- Food handling
- Healthy eating choices
- Identifying and purchase of fresh produce
- Writing and analysing recipe
- Food safety and hygiene

As a finale on the final day students prepare a three-course meal for someone special. The students worked hard to display their new skills and were very proud to show what they had learned and produced.

The Adelaide Central Markets tour was a valuable experience that included trying the local produce and talks from stall owners. The students all enjoyed the delightful sights, smells and tastes whilst visiting the markets, and tasted some of the samples along the way.

This year we celebrated our 50th Wambana program. We have achieved so much over this time and continue to see new boundaries pushed with each new term and group of boys. Throughout 2018 there have been some great successes in the 11km run, which takes place quarterly. Although the fitness program is about personal improvements and achievements, we have noticed an increased level of physical ability coming through Wambana and are very proud of how hard the boys are pushing themselves, realising what they are capable of, and often surprising themselves with their accomplishments.

Students at Wambana have been helping out the local Point Turton Progress Association for a few years now, with 2018 making a major impact on the local playground. Throughout the four terms, students dismantled the previous playground and structures, and have helped to rebuild a nature play space in its place. Boys have replaced all the sand in the area, built a walking trail and also helped to design and start the construction of a mountain bike track. COMMUNITY SERVICE

While the day after the last day of term was the start of the holiday break for students, for ten boys from Years 10 and 11 it was the start of a two week trip to Cambodia. They were accompanied by staff members Lizzie Gregory, Beau Muzik, Anna Thomson and Mark Dickens, and a group of students and staff from St Peter's Girls School. This opportunity has established itself on the school calendar, being the eighth trip undertaken since 2010.

The enduring relationship with the New Hope for Cambodian Children Village, located in Kampong Speu Province and home to approximately 170 children with HIV, sees the group warmly welcomed. For five days the group assisted in the Village School, undertook maintenance tasks, painted murals, and engaged in games and much conversation with the children.

In Siem Reap Province the group was similarly welcomed back by the staff of Volunteer Building Cambodia to assist in the building of three houses in a small village located half an hour from the city of Siem Reap. With no previous experience necessary, split into three groups, everyone was engaged under the direction and guidance

of the local VBC builders, sawing and hammering for four days. After a blessing ceremony performed by local monks, handing over the completed houses to the families was truly a moving experience. The gratitude and heartfelt thanks expressed will be a lasting memory for all involved.

Other activities across the course of the trip included visits to Tuol Sleng, a former high school which was utilised as an interrogation centre and holding facility during the Pol Pot – Khmer Rouge regime of the mid-1970s; the Choeung Ek Killing Fields, one of many such places throughout Cambodia during the period of the regime where approximately 1.5 million people were killed; a boat trip to Tonle Sap Lake, the largest freshwater lake in Asia; the Ta Prohm, Bayon, and Angkor Wat temple ruins; a cooking class in a local restaurant in Siem Reap; and the APOPO Visitor Centre, learning about the landmine clearance work being undertaken utilising scent detection rats, nicknamed 'HeroRATS.'

New Zealand

CHRONICLE 2018

Prince Alfred College recognises the importance of providing a range of career learning options to help students with planning their future pathways. The Careers Office works collaboratively with Year 9 – 12 students, their parents, and teachers to address student needs, educator insights, parent concerns, economic and industry imperatives, to assist students with subject and career decisions. The benefits of a holistic program are many and include:

- Better understanding and awareness of self
- Stronger confidence of the student
- Less angst regarding the future
- Stimulating work environment cognisance
- Connecting relevance and meaning to classroom studies
- Promotion of life-long learning
- Building a competitive edge for our students including jobs and scholarships

In 2018, students and parents accessed a 'yum cha' (buffet) of unique offerings. Year 10s were able to complete an online profile resource MyCareerMatch (with the assistance of UniSA) that helped explore subject preferences, interests, skills and career interests. This helped link their current studies to their futures, and started the process of developing a realistic understanding of further study and careers.

The annual Careers Expo offered to all Year 9 to 12 students and their parents was the biggest careers event of its kind at Prince Alfred College. Students were able to research top career interests by speaking with 30 exhibitors in attendance, including the 'Group of Eight' universities, and chose to hear from 30 guest career speakers to learn specifics about job pathways.

Our guest list of Old Scholars has been extensive and we believe the learning connection between current and past students will continue to grow.

Year 11 students were given the opportunity to look at workplace communication, employer expectations and interview guidance as the annual Year 11 Career Development Day was held on Monday 17 September in Piper Pavilion.

In addition to our fabulous local universities visiting, we welcomed two very special guests from the United Kingdom. Representatives from two of the highest-ranking UK universities shared insights with our students. Durham and St Andrew's universities are steeped in tradition yet have a modern global outlook. Students enjoyed hearing about their flexible degree structures, as well as hearing about the very best of British education and culture. Our students' interest in national and international universities continues to grow.

Interested students attended several information sessions on Med and UMAT/UCAT pathways this year, and for the eighth year in a row, the Careers Office offered a three-tiered interview workshop to prepare the students for interviews. The Careers Office also held an Elite Athletes afternoon tea with UniSA to talk about how universities can help students juggle elite sports with university studies.

These are just some of the highlights from the Careers Office at Prince Alfred College in 2018.



INDIGENOUS STUDENT PROGRAM

As I write this Chronicle reflection on the Indigenous Student Program at Prince Alfred College, a survey is about to be sent out to all staff to get feedback on how our Community is faring with the implementation of the Narragunnawali Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) (launched May 2016).

As with any successful teaching and learning, engagement is the key, and everyone's voice is important as we seek to honour our commitment to support and foster a higher level of knowledge and pride in Australian Indigenous histories, cultures and contributions.

Consulting Aboriginal Elder, Uncle Ivan Tiwu Copley shared recently with Prince Alfred College leadership that he has seen great growth at the College with a wider net being thrown out to include other students from other schools. He reiterated the significance of the RAP actions empowering the Indigenous community but also specifically wanted to point out the empowerment of our non-Indigenous community. He remembers as a highlight from 2018, a powerful video of Aboriginal children singing at the Primary School during Reconciliation Week and said "that kind of teaching empowers not only the students but the teachers and this makes better teachers. This makes a better place, and better people." His future recommendation is to continue to implement the RAP with the view to 'stretching' the RAP, as it is ongoing and should not get lost.

Our RAP Student Team has had regular meetings this year with all the Indigenous students at the school as well as non-Indigenous Year 12 students Noah Miles, Hugo Lidums and Angus Brosnan. Together we planned a great National Reconciliation Week and saw cultural learning implemented from the Early Learning Centre right through to Year 12. Staff have undergone vital cultural competency training this year, with a genuine interest in learning more. And there is so much to learn! If Aboriginal presence in Australia was measured by being here for 24 hours, then the first fleet arrived just five minutes and four seconds ago! People get so excited about old heritage buildings around the world, but to learn about Australian Indigenous cultures and histories (over 65,000 years old) is really precious.

Our Yaitya Tita Aboriginal Youth Connect Program has been exciting this year. In addition to the more serious goals of leadership development and building connections between different schools, students have had a chance to find a safe place to paint, play sport, make friends and start thinking about their futures. In 2018 the students were honoured to meet the Governor of South Australia, the Honourable Hieu Van Le as well as receiving a visit from the Premier, Steven Marshall. We anticipate our outreach to the other schools in the

Eastern Suburbs will grow in 2019 and beyond. While there are limited places around Australia where you can go to have didgeridoo lessons, PAC is in a unique position where students from Years 7 to 12 can experience learning this instrument directly here at the College. The didgeridoo learning program came to fruition after Mr Adam Mason performed on didgeridoo in several official events as part of the Reconciliation and NADOC weeks in 2014. At that stage Mr Mason was the assistant to the Director of Bands and teaching low brass across the college. Due to this exposure of the didgeridoo, Mr Mason had received interest from a student wanting to learn the didgeridoo and this is where the program all began. Mr Mason began to structure a curriculum for the program which was trialled during the following year with James Saunders, the first student to learn didgeridoo at PAC. With performances by both James Saunders and Mr Adam Mason at both school and public events over the following two years, the potential for more boys to learn the didgeridoo became more apparent. This was strengthened by the College increasing its exposure of its support to Indigenous recognition and reconciliation. Through demonstrations to Year 6 Music classes surrounding the cultural and performance aspects of the didgeridoo and its indigenous heritage, the program began in earnest with another student beginning in 2017 and then another five beginning in 2018. With numbers set to increase again for 2019, Mr Mason is set to hopefully begin a didgeridoo ensemble involving his more experienced didgeridoo players. This will take the program to a whole new level with students having to work as part of a team playing the didgeridoo as well as the tapping sticks, cajon and stompbox.

In conclusion, to our awesome Indigenous students Jason Coleman, Ahzali Bin Omar, Jake Dodd, Kozzy Kropinyeri-Pickett, Isaiah Dudley, Samson Andrews, Tex Wanganeen, Eamon Peisley, Ky Bishop, Zac Bishop, Caleb Thomas and Oliver Wentzel – we say a big thank you to you and your families for everything you have contributed to Prince Alfred College, especially in the realm of cultural sharing. We are delighted to have you here. Good luck and all the best to Jason, Ahzali and Jake who are finishing Year 12. To Mr Darren Roylett and Reverend Mark Dickens, you are a great team to work with and thank you for all of your support.

STUDENT SUCCESS TEAM

The open to all student access has seen another busy year in the Wellbeing and academic support areas. The supporting staff in the academic team, Mrs Sally Persian, Mrs Angela Spitty and Mrs Debbie Hulme have provided exemplary support to boys in all year levels.

Mrs Spitty and Mrs Persian have temporarily filled the Co-ordinator role this year and have worked diligently carrying out the role with aplomb. Mr Damien Coats will return to the Co-ordinator role in 2019 and staff and students welcome him back to Princes.

The wellbeing space has reaped the benefits of having Ms Rachel Tarn working with students in her role as mental health professional this year. Ms Tarn will continue in this role in a part time capacity in 2019 and I, Janine Tuffery, will continue in the full-time role as Wellbeing Coordinator.

Both teams will nominate two students to be academic and Wellbeing Captains in 2019.

The nominations are made after carefully considering the current Year 11 boys who access and who have

utilised the support available. These boys have also shown a willingness to support other students and have ingenuity and solid commitment.

The Year 12 students will have a mentoring role and also be proactive in initiating and supporting further education. This peer support approach encourages students to develop an acceptance of accessing support. Student support is a team approach at Princes and begins with teachers, Tutor and Year Level Co-ordinators. The academic and wellbeing support teams complement pastoral care to develop a bespoke support for each boy.

As the school year ends, the academic and wellbeing spaces at the top of the Wilfred Cooper building will have a facelift. Academic support will remain in W22 but will be extended to include a meeting room and office. Wellbeing support will move into W23 and incorporate two office spaces. The spaces are open and welcoming to all students and are centred in the Secondary School making them visible and accessible.

STUDENT LEADERSHIP

Prefect Report 2019

The 2018 Prefect group has excelled in our tenure as leaders of the College. Our trademark this year outlined the basic principles we abided by - to Serve, Strive and Inspire. The various portfolios divided amongst the group showcased our diversity across a range of areas and illustrated leadership at a high level.

Service and Fundraising became a large facet of the team's effort, with our annual involvement in the Leukaemia Foundation's World's Greatest Shave. All 23 prefects and a number of Year 12 boys raised funds and awareness for the Leukaemia Foundation. They were brave enough to have their heads shaved to a crisp number two setting for this wonderful cause. The original goal was set at an ambitious \$15,000, however by the end of the campaign the team was ecstatic when a \$32,000 cheque was presented to the ambassadors of the foundation. This was a record for the school and a quarter of the total amount raised in the State, which is an incredible effort from everyone involved.

The Prefects have also initiated steps for Prince Alfred College to become a White Ribbon School. This involves a two year program where staff and students undertake workshops within the College to open discussion on stopping and preventing Domestic Violence against women. The hope is that the Service and Fundraising Portfolio will continue working towards the goal of becoming ambassadors for this foundation.

Interschool Relations were strengthened this year with initiatives being driven alongside Wilderness as well as St Peter's. A group of this year's Prefects worked with student leaders from Wilderness School and developed a program to promote gender equality in both schools. This initiative was established by last year's Prefects, with us continuing the trend. We focussed on enlightening the two schools on the concept of unconscious gender biases, which are the phrases and ideologies which we as a society propagate without even realising we are doing so. This initiative, along with our relationship with Wilderness School, is something we would like to see developed further over the years and is an exciting prospect for the future.

A new initiative this year developed by the Captains and Vice-Captains of both Prince Alfred College and St Peter's College, was the intercollegiate Code of Conduct.

We worked closely with our counterparts to develop a set of principles detailing the expected behaviours of the students throughout the fixtures. PAC presented five pillars of conduct representing the Princes Man, those being: Men with Identity, Men with Duty, Men with Courage, Men with Positive Legacy, and Men with Passion, as the guiding principles for expected conduct on and off the field. Overall there was a significant improvement in behaviour and sportsmanship with the exception of a few minor incidents. The Prefect Body wishes its continuation and improvement with each year.

In the Preparatory and ELC portfolio, various leadership workshops were conducted for Preparatory School Leaders and explored goal setting, leadership styles, traits and team building. This was a highly rewarding experience for the prefects and strengthened relations between the year levels.

The leadership group in the Boarding House ran a successful sausage sizzle on Boarder's day to raise funds for Rural Aid's Buy a Bale initiative to help with drought relief. Many of the boarders have a close tie to farming so it was a fantastic way for the PAC community to donate to this worthy cause.

While the Prefects are openly recognised as leaders of the College, other leadership positions were held in areas such as House, Sporting and Boarding to name a few. The Year 12s were also encouraged to 'give back' to the school and had a positive involvement on the year's events and demonstrated their true passion for the College. Princes has embedded leadership into its curriculum by offering countless opportunities for students to demonstrate and develop the fundamental skills needed. It is a skill that we are truly grateful to have harnessed and utilised in our final year of serving the College. As both Prefects and Vice Captains of the College we are very proud and honoured to have worked beside such a cohesive team of boys to achieve our goals this year.

Finally leadership is ultimately not about instructing your peers, rather it is about creating a space of opportunity for others to harness their full potential. Princes has embodied this to a great extent and as a result, is producing cohorts of driven young men.

BOARDING

2018 has been another remarkable year for the boarding community with so much achieved by so many boys. Each boy has been challenged academically to enjoy the wide array of experiences offered through the College's vast Co-Curricular program which is enhanced by our boarding community activities program.

Boarders have again featured in many Firsts sporting teams, from AFL, soccer, cricket, table tennis and badminton. With sport at the core of many of our boys' lives, it is no wonder that the annual Intercol games are much anticipated, courageously competed in and enthusiastically supported by all within the boarding community. During Intercol week it is truly an emotional roller coaster in the boarding house, with every bruising bump, goal, victory and/or loss closely scrutinised by the boys. Importantly, much character development occurs during these times and it is certainly amplified in the collective community of the boarding house.

One of the year's standout achievements was the 2018 Boarders Day. Ed Downing (Captain of Boarding) thought it was time that the boarders put their support forward to assist with the drought which is affecting large parts of Australia and some farming families within the PAC boarding community. Through the Buy A Bale

campaign the boys were able raise in excess of \$4,000 for drought relief through a uniform free day and also the fundraising BBQs. Ed was able to muster support from the Preparatory School who came on board with their own *Wear A Flanny for a Farmer* Day, which saw the Preparatory boys enjoy a uniform free day and make a significant contribution to the cause.

Another highlight of 2018 has been our team of staff (myself and *Mr Marathon Man* – Noble) and students which entered the City to Bay. At Princes, our boarding program offers extensive residential care for over 140 boys, catering for their individual needs, as well as ensuring that they feel part of a community. Our services run from accompanying boys to physio appointments, to replacing a lost text book, or organising the ever-popular weekend activities program. The structure and tradition of the boarding house ensures that all boys are offered the support and mentoring to achieve success at every level.

As I have previously said, structure helps boys succeed, and PAC's unique weekend activities program appeals specifically to teenage boys. By being fully engaged on the weekends, the boys are kept active, and become better organised. The program isn't just about fun and adventure, it's about being balanced. Our activities program enables our boys to engage with the world around them, and benefit from the multitude of learning opportunities that present through new experiences. PAC boarding activities range from training for specialist qualifications such as scuba licences or first aid, to baking and cooking classes with Mrs Toh; and there are always plenty of opportunities to socialise with the girls' boarding houses and community service activities. Giving the boys a solid background outside of academic achievement is as important as their academic program. We want boys to develop their leadership skills, and for them to make valuable contributions to their local and global communities when they complete their time at PAC.

At PAC, we are very proud of the talented sportsmen that we have within our community. But we are not wholly focussed on pursuing success on the field, court, or stage. Our boarding program is structured to enable boys to develop character and to be their personal best – in every aspect of their lives.

On the first Sunday in February we had our boarding community BBQ and team building event which was thoroughly enjoyed by all of the new boys and current boarders. The goal for the day was to create an event where all boarders could get to know each other better in a fun and relaxed environment with staff. After lunch, all boarders then went to the RED Centre, where boarding prefects led activities with groups rotating every 30 minutes. Activities included *Pictionary*, water polo, volleyball and indoor soccer. The focus of all the activities was having fun and making new friends. Our new boarders threw themselves into all the activities and our existing boarders and prefects had an opportunity to practice their leadership skills.



INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

The College has welcomed students from mainland China, Hong Kong, Macau, Vietnam, Thailand, Malaysia and Saudi Arabia. Some have entered the mainstream upon arrival and others have joined the International Student Transition Program (ISTP). This year, we have had almost 20 students in the program including girls from our sister school, Wilderness.

In the ISTP, students study English for Academic Purposes (EAP), Science, Mathematics and Physical Education. They build confidence in using the language and develop their awareness of the expectations of an Australian school. In the chemical and physical sciences, and in mathematics, students are exposed to the learning of the content of these subjects as well as the learning of English. After two terms of integrated content and English learning, they are able to partake in the mainstream science and maths exams. Our students report feelings of real achievement when they can cope with and write and talk about such complex material in English. This year in the EAP course, students have explored topics related to health, technology and the environment. They have written paragraphs, essays and reports, and have delivered several oral presentations. Through the ISTP, students' sense of place is enhanced through tours of the city and surrounding areas. Students have not only explored the cultural landmarks of the city but have also visited Cleland Wildlife Park and Mount Lofty, and will soon tour the Japanese Gardens and the Haigh's Chocolate factory.

The international cohort has engaged with the College community through a variety of interclass activities which have helped develop camaraderie across ages and subject areas. At the start of the year the Middle School international students conversed with the Chinese second language students in informal lunch time language exchanges. The ISTP and Year 10 EAL classes attended a show in Term 1 as part of the Adelaide Fringe with Leo Hu and Chris Wang bravely volunteering to be part of Isaac Lomman's Hypnosis Show. In Term 3 the ISTP and Year 10 EAL classes took part in shared lessons, posing discussion questions and giving personalised feedback to their peers. These kinds of interactions build stronger bonds within the College community and provide opportunities for older students to mentor their peers.

Our international boys experience a very holistic education at Prince Alfred College. They are involved in the life of the entire school. Boys are placed in Tutor Groups and House teams. They attend assemblies and are strongly encouraged to take part in Co-Curricular activities including sports, music and art. Our international boys have made us very proud through their participation and achievement in a range of College activities including badminton, basketball, table tennis,

debating and musical bands. Our international boarders even performed the Lion Dance at the Early Learning Centre during Chinese New Year.

We believe that our International Student Captain's speech sums up the experiences and thoughts of most of our students. The following is a series of excerpts from Jack Cai's final address at the International Students Farewell Dinner in October:

"I still clearly remember the time when I first came to PAC in Term 3, 2016: I could not find the classroom independently, I felt extremely nervous when speaking English, and I felt a strong sense of homesickness during the night. I believe everyone has such challenges during the transition to our college and I really want to thank everyone who has supported me along the way. Looking back on my journey at PAC, and especially my experience as International Captain, I have been thinking about what an international student can do – and does do - for the school community. It is obvious that lots of our international valedictorians have brought fresh blood to sports teams and show their competitiveness on the sports field, in sports such as badminton, basketball and soccer. We also have had different academic achievements throughout the year, both school-based and outside the school. We look at things from different angles and give new perspectives. We reflect on our life and understand the culture of Australia. We try to break down all kinds of stereotypes by sharing our own experiences with people from other backgrounds. All these small things converge into a mighty current, which is cultural diversity, and this is something that makes PAC exceptional from other colleges in Adelaide."

This year, there are 17 international students who have completed SACE or IB courses, with most of them spending at least three years in the College. This group of intelligent, aspiring, creative and hardworking students have enriched our culture. We believe that they will carry the values and morals of a "Princes Man" to wherever their life journeys lead.

PERFORMING ARTS

There is much emphasis in current educational discourse on STEM subjects (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics). The popular perception depicts a rapidly changing, digitally disrupted world where a twenty-first century society values the 'hard' sciences above all else - perhaps becoming the kind of dystopian world memorably visually portrayed by Ridley Scott in the first incarnation of *Blade Runner* (1982). This approach to curriculum is missing one of the key purposes of education. Education exists to equip students with deep knowledge of every aspect of life; it has always existed for this reason. To my mind the Arts inform the Sciences. Artistic endeavours like *Blade Runner* act as a warning of the worst of what may come if we deliberately devalue the Arts in favour of progress in the Sciences.

Imparting knowledge and appreciation of the Arts underpins our philosophy. Students are aware that all styles of music naturally feed into each others. This generation knows the pop songs of Adele, but they may not yet know why her music owes everything to Schubert and why sampling wouldn't exist without Dvorák. Indeed, the beginnings of what is now recognised as original Australian theatre in the canon aren't officially recorded until Ray Lawler's *The Summer of the Seventeenth Doll* (1955), but of course it existed long before then in Louis Esson's plays and the voices of Indigenous stories. Arts education has a unique purpose in developing the intellect of our students and that is our guiding mission at PAC.

To be human is to be more than an economic producer.

Before we rush to pressure and push our sons (and daughters) out of the Arts and into STEM courses in their senior school years, we should think more carefully and listen more attentively to the voices and hearts of our young people. Let us ignite and fan their passions and encourage a broad liberal education that values them as the next generation - with hearts as well as minds, dreams as well as ambitions. They deserve to know and to ponder the very best of what has been composed and scripted if they are to be truly well-rounded young men.

2018 has been an exercise in building on the foundations of knowledge laid in 2017. Our Director of Music, Andrew Edge, has co-ordinated a number of high-profile musical events with the Music staff where College musicians have performed not only for families and friends, but also for royalty. Michael Oomens has continued to work extensively with Years 10 - 12 Film students achieving myriad successes in the realms of external and interstate film competitions.

In January, Drama students returned to school to beautiful new surroundings in the Prince Philip Theatre which has been restored and modernised with state of the art technology. We began the year with an interstate trip to Sydney for OnStage Week in February, an annual showcase of the best Drama performances across the state in the previous year's HSC. Our students attended three different productions including a Stage and Screen Writers' workshop. The high standard of OnStage work as live examined performances of devised drama is as close to professional as a student production can be, and the boys who attended have integrated new ideas and techniques in staging, characterisation and physicalisation in their classroom work throughout the year. Acting workshops at NIDA and a backstage tour of the Sydney Opera House completed a memorable

weekend for all. This interstate trip will occur biennially with the next slated for Year 11 Drama students in 2020.

New opportunities in the theatre in 2018 also began with the offering of Speech and Drama graded examinations from Trinity College London by Alicia Zorkovic. Alicia has worked expertly with the Preparatory School students in different areas of Speech and Drama including Performance Arts, Poetry, Rehearsed Readings and more. Students in Years 1 to 6 performed for an external examiner who travelled from London and will soon receive certificates in their respective grades, like music examinations. I am pleased to confirm that these courses will continue in 2019.

Also in the Preparatory School, a new initiative aiming to offer boys broader experience in different forms of the Arts was instituted weekly on a Wednesday afternoon. It became known as 'Arts Hour'. Boys in Years 5 and 6 took instruction for one hour a week in hip-hop from Pure Funk Dance studio, in tap dance from Mel Brister, in samba/cha-cha from Australian national competitor and champion Jason Coleman, in green screen filmmaking from Kellie McCauley, in singing from Ross Burford and Mandy Bell and in Theatresports from Kirsty Wigg and Marshall Cowan. Just one hour per week in each term of 2018 has cultivated talent through direct instruction in each of these expressive art forms. In these sessions, students learned to think, move, speak and act with confidence. In making and staging performances they learned how to be focused, innovative and resourceful and how to take on responsibilities for drama presentations. They were excited by exploring their imagination and taking risks in storytelling through role and dramatic action. The program primarily focused on the basic skills of dance, filmmaking, improvisation and singing which will in turn be used to extend boys in 2019. Ms McCauley's work with stop motion animation with Years 5 and 6 has been a unique insight into how creative students can be in this area and was a highlight in a successful program this year. My sincere thanks to all the tutors and classroom teachers who worked extensively on this weekly program which culminated in termly showcases open to parents.

Throughout this year, Theatresports continued to be a weekly Co-Curricular activity for Middle School boys. Coached by *ImproNow!* we competed against specialist Arts school Brighton High School and Mitcham Girls in what was a competition of high standards. We faced Wilderness School in Term 2 in our second major interschools competition. In both events, our team of Years 7 and 8 boys practised with gusto coming in quickly with effective offers and extending the narrative of scenes where they could. These teams will continue in 2019 with new members always welcome.

The Prince Philip Theatre was unveiled in a wonderful night of music and song in June. The rebirth of this historically important place and its significance to the College, in the heart of the school, was marked with the sounds of our talented ensembles playing together. Among others, we heard from the Senior Concert Band welcoming midwinter with a storming *Game of Thrones* theme and the Festive Overture by Shostakovich, conducted by Andrew Newhouse; the Street Jazz Band, fabulously conducted by Lizzie Gregory who also played the tuba as part of the group, and the new Motown Vocal Group who serenaded the audience beautifully from the grand piano accompanied by Ross Burford.

The Piano Trio of Edmund Black on piano, James Monro on cello and the fortuitously named Shine Wang shone in a finale of epic proportions, playing *Meditation* by Massenet and *Dance of the Comedians* by Smetana. It was a spectacular night of the very best of student performances.

Our Town

In September, the Princes Players Theatre Company followed up the roaring success of last year's musical production of *Oliver!* with this seminal play written in 1938 by Thornton Wilder. Chosen for its significance on the eve of the College's sesquicentenary, the play enabled our young talented cast to immerse themselves in classic literature for five months; something which we all enjoyed. The cast, comprising PAC boys from Years 5 to 12 and featuring girls from St Peter's Girls' School and Seymour College, was bolstered by cameo appearances from Old Scholars Seb Walker, Fergus Teh and Thomas Fenner. It was marvellous to work with these Old Boys again. Their leadership, in particular, inspired and connected the cast remarkably, forging bonds of friendship that will undoubtedly continue.

One of the many joys of teaching is being able to introduce students to work one admires.

Since you can never relive the experience of seeing, hearing or reading a memorable work of art for the first time, you can do the next best thing: you can teach it. Through the discoveries students make you can recapture vicariously some of the exhilaration that accompanied your own discovery of that work long ago. This was my experience working on *Our Town* with the Princes Players.

It is important to note that *Our Town* is a great American play. Possibly, *the* great American play.

Like many works of art, the greatness of this play can be deceptive: a bare stage, spare language, archetypal characters. Wilder begins the play with clear stage directions, 'No curtain. No scenery.' Stripping the stage bare of fancy artifice, allowing two ladders, a few chairs, minimum props, Wilder directs that 'this play must



establish a value for the smallest events in our daily life.' That in itself was a challenge to which the young cast rose; they approached scenes which required detailed mime work with gusto, carefully practising making bacon and coffee in what was nothing more than wide empty space. In this regard Michelle Rupert (Mrs Gibbs) and Amelia Provan (Mrs Webb) excelled.

The perfection of this play starts with its title. Grover's Corners could be anywhere; is indeed anywhere, and it belongs to all of us - it is *our* town. The play is a microcosm of the human family and in that specificity it is also all of us. All towns, all cities, everywhere, including Adelaide. The play's success across cultural borders around the world attests to it being greater than an American play; it is a play that captures the universal experience of being alive.

Living in Adelaide after so many years in Sydney has reminded me of the beauty of a slower pace of life, of the strong bonds of old friendship, family and traditions - all of which encompass our College community. I grew up in a very small, close-knit town in which many of the characters in the play were regular fixtures. You will know them too: we all know a Louella Soames, the pillars of our communities like Doc Gibbs and Constable Warren and we may identify with the life experiences of George and Emily (played with intrinsic awareness by James Walters and Georgia Theofanous) as they navigate high school and progress down their life path.

There is wry comedy in the irony of our recognition when Mr Webb (Thomas Dodsworth) tells us that the residents of Grover's Corners 'note the change in seasons, and the birds - yes, we pay a lot of attention to *them*', and when the Stage Manager (Angus Porter) notes that 'we like to know the facts...about everybody', we laugh at what we know to be the humour of our humanity.

Yet there are darker moments too. Old Scholar Seb Walker brilliantly played Simon Stimson, the alcoholic choirmaster, with ease. He is a unique creation - buffoon and tragic figure all at once. Simon is not a stumbling town drunk designed for easy laughs although he may get them; rather, he is a tortured, self-destructive soul whose cries for help are ignored by a provincial people steeped in denial. In the tragedy of Simon Stimson, Wilder illustrates the failure of a society to help its own and the insidiousness of systematic ignorance. Likewise, the simultaneity of life and death, past, present and future pervades Our Town. As soon as we are introduced to Doc and Mrs Gibbs, in the first five minutes of the play, the Stage Manager informs us of the exact details of their deaths. Already the long shadow of death is cast. With the spectre of mortality hovering, the mundane daily business of the people of Grover's Corners attains a grandeur - the life lesson Wilder teaches us all. The small moments matter.

In 2019, our community celebrates the 150th anniversary of the opening of Prince Alfred College. This is a significant achievement; one which gives us ample opportunity to reflect on the rich history of our College and the rites of passage which it has witnessed in the thousands of boys who have been educated here.

'The cottage, the go-cart, the Sunday afternoon drives in the Ford, the first rheumatism, the grandchildren, the second rheumatism, the deathbed, the reading of the Will,' - it's all there, in *Our Town*, all the passages of life.

My thanks to Professor Donald Margulies whose work on this play inspired my own, and the tireless work of Nick ladanza and Laura Townsend, the best stage managers the Princes Players could possibly have. Thank you to the entire staff team who worked on this production this year. We numbered eleven - a diverse group of talents brought together to create something special. Particular thanks are due to Troy McKinnon, Pat Noonan and Jayne Porter and their teams for their unwavering support and assistance in staging this production.

If you are new to *Our Town,* I envy you. A joyous discovery awaits.

"The response we make when we believe a piece of work of the imagination is that of saying: 'This is the way things are. I have always known it, without being fully aware that I knew it. Now in the presence of this play or novel or poem (or picture or piece of music) I know that I know it.' It is this form of knowledge which Plato called 'recollection'."

Whether it is a brass fanfare to welcome His Royal Highness, Prince Edward to the College, our drummers setting the scene for battle as our First XVIII take the field against St Peter's College, or the Piano Trio receiving a standing ovation from their peers at an assembly, 2018 has been another year where dedicated Music staff and students have produced high-quality performances for all occasions. While the awards and applause of the crowd are rewarding, it's in the rehearsals, the sharing of great recordings and the long bus journeys together where relationships are formed and the true value of music is felt. It is always encouraging to see new scientific evidence of how learning music benefits the brain but apart from the individual growth that our music students experience, it is the music culture and camaraderie that most enriches the lives of our boys and the wider community.

A focus this year has been on expanding our musical offerings to ensure that boys of all interests and skill levels are catered for in our Department and that we have an ensemble fit for any occasion. This has led to the introduction of the Street Jazz Band and Motown Vocal Ensemble, the expansion of our Rock Band Program, and the running of class ensembles in all streams of classroom Music from Years 7 to 10. In 2018 we have added Jack Degenhart (saxophone), Sam Cagney (guitar), Jordan Lennon (drums/rock bands), Ross Burford (voice/choirs), Katia Labozetta (voice/piano/accompanist) and Graeme Quinn (accompanist) to our outstanding

team of expert tutors. We have also welcomed Music Teacher Lizzie Gregory to the faculty; she has instantly had a positive impact on staff and students alike as a result of her musical expertise, versatility and wonderful character.

A welcome challenge for the Music Department when the year commences is the series of events in the garden of St Jacques. A variety of ensembles and soloists impressed guests in the Headmaster's garden at the start of the year including our brand new Street Jazz Band which, at the time, was only two weeks old. Term 1's Autumn Concert has traditionally been about showcasing the breadth of our Co-Curricular Music Program which presents a logistical challenge. With a huge range of music styles, ensembles and soloists on display, the night celebrated the collegiality of the 2018 Music team in producing a high-class concert. After the long eleven weeks of Term 1, most of the College community were able to relax, but not the musicians. It was all-hands-on-deck preparing for the Royal Visit in the April holidays which was a highly memorable experience for all involved.


Term 2 begins annually with the hurricane that is Generations in Jazz. The storm brews in Term 1, with boys frantically learning their difficult parts and directors working overtime to get the pieces working; it then ramps up with holiday rehearsals and the Gearing up for Generations concert at the start of May. By that first Friday in May, the wind hits full force. This year, eighty boys and seven staff travelled to Mount Gambier along with 5,500 other students from around the country. As











we have come to expect our students achieved excellent results and represented the College superbly on this public stage - including having a band in the Small Jazz Combo division for the first time.

Following GIJ, the big bands' performances at Norwood Live at the end of Week 5 was a remarkable concert - with boys from all year levels jumbled up into four even bands alongside a staff superband. The music performed that night was the result of fewer than four weeks' rehearsals and was testament to the versatility of our musicians. Although we had heard two wonderful Strings Showcases and a SACE Solo Performance night in the Prince Philip Theatre by this point, the Midwinter Music Night at the end of June was the official launch of the recently refurbished Prince Philip Theatre. The marvellously decorated room and music of the highest calibre took the guests away to other times and places, from Westeros to a Russian Theatre and many places in between.

The inaugural Princes Rock Concert in Week 3, Term 3 saw numerous rock bands from PAC, Seymour College and Wilderness School hit the ANZAC Hall stage which looked more like Wembley Stadium for this occasion. The concept of a rock concert for the boys is one which

we will pursue again in 2019. The students enjoyed the bright lights, full sound and rock star treatment from the crowd. We look forward to making this event bigger and better next year. In Week 4 of this term, a larger-scale vocal concert, Voices of PAC, featured the wonderful talents of our vocalists and choirs. There were excellent performances from stand-out soloists and all ensembles delivered polished performances that left the crowd entertained and excited for the future of singing at the College.

The Drum Corps made its debut at the ABODA Band Festival in August this year while concert bands and Chamber Strings achieved outstanding results. The premier concert for the year, All That Jazz, was highly anticipated once it was announced that instead of one guest artist we would host a whole band. The Sydney Conservatorium Jazz Orchestra and their esteemed director Mr David Theak were extremely generous with their time, demonstrating the craft of big band jazz. With their help, the Music Department staged a jampacked concert which included wonderful collaborations between our bands, strings and voice students on some memorable Frank Sinatra hits.

With a string of concerts and events planned for Term 4, the Music students and staff will no doubt continue to work together to produce excellent performances right up to the last day of the year. We look forward to the final concert in our outdoor series, Reds on the Green, to celebrate the start of summer. Whether it's listening and watching as an audience, singing in a choir, playing trumpet in a concert band or belting out some classic rock guitar, I thoroughly hope that on or off the stage you have enjoyed being a part of the fantastic music culture at Prince Alfred College. It is a culture that includes families too, and without your support the early morning rehearsals and the big concerts and tours don't happen. Lastly, thank you to all Performing Arts staff for their outstanding work in 2018, with a special mention to Mr Andrew Newhouse, outgoing Director of Bands, for the enormous contribution he has made to Music at the College during his tenure of 18 years.

Bands

2018 has been another exceptional year for PAC bands. The Autumn Concert in Term 1 featured our four Concert Bands, including the Beginner Band, playing confident sets after fewer than ten weeks learning their instruments. A highlight of the evening was our collaboration with St Peter's Girls' School Senior Concert Band and the huge sound that our combined group produced. The big bands hit the ground running in preparation for Generations in Jazz, with PAC being one of a handful of schools which have bands competing in all Divisions 1 to 4.

Against fierce competition from some of Australia's best music schools, Big Band 1 earnt an Honourable Mention for their fifth place in Division 1. They were the only band from a South Australian independent school to compete at this elite level. Big Band 2 also continued their winning run, receiving an Honourable Mention and placing fourth against many other schools' first bands. Our students were also recognised individually with Max Thomas, Sam

Wong and Steve Wu being selected in the Division 4, 2 and 1 Super Bands respectively. In August, Big Bands 1 and 2 were at it again, delivering high-level performances and receiving the praise of judges at the Essentially Ellington Festival.

The ABODA Band Festival - also in August - is another annual highlight for our bands. Ensembles are awarded Gold, Silver, Bronze or Merit Awards. The Junior and Intermediate Concert Bands played very well to receive a Silver Award, while the Preparatory Big Band won Bronze despite being a lot younger than the other bands in the division. Up against some very tough competition (including Brighton Special Interest Music School), the Senior Band continued their run of Gold but this time also took out the overall first place award. The adjudicator was so impressed by their unique performance of his test piece that he requested a recording of our performance to be used as a definitive version of his work.

In previous years, we have enjoyed hosting some very special guest artists for *All That Jazz*, but this year we were fortunate to host 18 players from the Sydney Conservatorium Jazz Orchestra. Drawing on the ideas from our mentoring system here at PAC, we decided it would be best to have the whole band play against our guests. For the players in Big Band 3 to swing as hard as the SCJO was going to be a challenge. Fortunately, the boys put in an exceptional amount of work in the lead up with the help of our superb senior students. All five Big Bands and the Senior Band blew the audience away. The featured set by the SCJO will not soon be forgotten by our musicians, particularly with Old Boy Anthony Rositano (Class of 2017) featuring in this renowned guest band.

Farewells to Year 12 students are always an emotional time as we remember the contribution many of these players have made both as musicians and as leaders over nearly a decade. This year our farewells had added poignancy as I announced my plans to leave Princes at the end of Term 3. The music on the night was wonderful, but one of my most vivid memories will be of the heartfelt speeches from the boys and staff. Thank you for reminding me of the positive effect we can have on so many students in our vocation.

In Term 4 we formed the new bands which will uphold our exceptional reputation in 2019. These are amongst the strongest I have seen in my time at the College. With such talent and a remarkable team of conductors, I believe that the best years are still to come for bands at PAC.

Strings

Our strings ensembles and performers had a very successful 2018 with some excellent performances presented. All ensembles had a chance to demonstrate their newly acquired skills during termly concerts and a few boys also had the opportunity to get out from the comfort zone of ensemble playing and to perform solo throughout the year.

The youngest group - the Junior Strings Ensemble, with leader Leon Thorne - has shown themselves as eager and enthusiastic young musicians, while the Intermediate Strings Ensemble led by Apollon Velonakis has set the benchmark for the junior boys to aspire to. The Chamber Strings, led and inspired by the talented Shine Wang, has been a superb group this year. They celebrated their first ever Gold award at the ABODA Festival in Term 3. This group has also learned to play without a conductor, where stylistically appropriate, as was done in the Baroque and early Classical Periods - a true test for the listening skills of each and every player!

The Camerata String Quartet continued to learn some beautiful works while sharing their music at concerts and, on occasion, as background music during major College events. After an inspiring performance of *Bohemian Rhapsody* at the end of 2017 the Piano Trio kicked off the new school year with a performance in the garden of St Jacques early in February at a Heads of School gathering. They also learned and performed several standard repertoire trios of which the Dumky Trio by Dvorák was the highlight. This group also had the honour to perform at Government House in April during the visit of His Royal Highness the Prince Edward, Earl of Wessex.

As I write this almost at the end of another year I feel very proud of the strings musicians at Prince Alfred College. They have again shown that PAC is a school steeped in musical excellence.

Choirs

2018 has seen many fine performances from our choirs and solo singers at Prince Alfred College. These have included Generations in Jazz, All That Jazz, Autumn and Winter Concerts as well as regular assemblies and Chapel services. Vocal students have continued to embrace all styles of vocal music including pop, rock, classical and jazz with more boys putting up their hands to volunteer to sing solo. 2018 Head Chorister, Max Batt, has been an excellent leader and has contributed to the Princes Choir, Senior Vocal Ensemble and the Motown Group, as well as attending Junior Choir rehearsals to support our younger boys with honest feedback. Our new vocal tutors, Ms Katia Labozzetta and Mr Ross Burford, along with accompanist/vocal coach Mr Graeme Quinn, have been welcomed warmly by the boys and in turn have given great support to their vocal development.

Jack's high level of achievement on the violin can be seen also in his recent completion of the AMEB Grade 8 Violin Examination. He has led the Camerata String Quartet this year and continued his key role in Chamber Strings. Jack's musical talent has been rewarded by selection in the Invitational Big Band Workshops this September, following his work in the Division 1 Superband in 2018. Jack's excellent improvisation skills are also a feature of the new Street Jazz Band which he

demonstrated to great acclaim last week, playing with the Sydney Con Jazz Orchestra, the premier national young jazz orchestra.



Steve Wu, Year 12 – Steve studies IB Music and excels in composition, one of the most difficult aspects of studying music. Steve plays multiple instruments including the guitar, banjo and tenor saxophone, which enables

his involvement across numerous ensembles in the College. Steve's high standard of musicianship was rewarded by his selection in the Division 1 Superband at Generations in Jazz in 2018, recognising him as the top big band guitarist at a national competition with over five thousand competitors - effectively, he is the best young band guitarist in Victoria and South Australia. On top of this, Steve has also been selected in the Adelaide schools' Invitational Big Band Workshops this month. Apart from his top-level guitar and banjo playing in Big Band 1 and Street Jazz Band respectively, Steve is also an integral part of Big Band 2 on the tenor saxophone. He regularly mentors a Year 9 group of guitar students achieving exceptional results with his teaching. Steve was also recently asked to work alongside David Theak, the section leader of the Sydney Con Jazz Orchestra.



Shine Wang, Year 12 – Shine completed the AMEB AMusA Diploma (Associate in Music, Australia) in 2015 when he was in Year 9, which is a prestigious award seen as the equivalent achievement of a tertiary qualification in Music. Shine has

led the Piano Trio and Chamber Strings in 2018, including the Trio's performance for royalty at Government House to celebrate Prince Edward's visit to the College. Shine's virtuosic violin playing earned him a merit award for SACE Stage 2 Performance Special Study as a Year 11, and he is on track to receive another merit in Stage 2 Ensemble Performance this year. Shine's natural talent straddles the professional life of an artist through staging private concerts around the city. He is recognised as one of the best young violinists in the state.


With a focus on enrichment, the students have participated in many activities outside the scope of the regular science curriculum this year. As always, central to these activities was the 74th edition of the Science Journal themed "Standing on the shoulders of giants" – in recognition on how the success of our future scientific endeavours relies so heavily on those that have come before us. The journal was launched towards the end of Term 4 at an evening function attended by students and their families. Guest speaker on the evening was Dr Timothy Barnes, a nanotechnologist from the University of South Australia. Dr Barnes was also the guest author for this year's journal.

We also had several boys from all year levels, 31 in total, awarded high distinctions from a range of competitions held across the year. These competitions included the Big Science Competition, the Australian National Chemistry Quiz and the Physics, Chemistry and Biology Olympiads. In addition to these awards, we also entered two teams of Year 8 boys into the Aurecon Bridge Building competition and as always, our Year 10s represented the school admirably at the Science and Engineering Challenge at Flinders University this year.

In a new activity this year, our Year 7 cohort designed, conducted and presented scientific investigations as part of the Food and Fibre Science Investigation Awards. We selected a group of 20 boys to present their investigations at the state final of the event at the Royal Adelaide Show. As a result, three of our boys, Aditya Ghai, Max Thomas and Henry Pontifex were awarded first, second and third prizes respectively in the state in this competition.

As always we were well represented in the Oliphant Science Awards with Year 7s Aditya Ghai and Anthony Huynh awarded first prize in the Years 6 to 7 Computer Programming and Robotics category. These two boys came second overall with Oliphant's highest award - the Department of Education Young Scientists Award. Dinan Perera won second prize in the Years 9 to 10 age group of the same category and Regan Nelsen (Year 7) was awarded second Prize in the Models and Inventions category. He based his entry around a waste management system he designed and in recognition of his work, Regan's project was eligible to be entered into the National BHP Billiton Foundation Science and Engineering Awards.

A keen group of Prince Alfred College students including six boarders and two staff chaperones took an incredible journey in April that encompassed a fascinating exploration of battlefields, museums, archaeological digs and historic landmarks in France and Belgium. The 2018 Battlefield History Tour was undoubtedly a great success for all concerned.

Our first port of call was the historic and beautiful city of Paris for four days. Averaging 12km a day, the boys walked up and down and in and around the left and right banks with Notre Dame, the Eiffel Tower, Napoleon's Tomb and the Arc de Triumph highlights. Skills in French language, culture and cuisine were developed in addition to historical lessons on the French Revolution, Napoleon and the Third Republic.

The warm French reception reserved for Australians was undeniable but became even more obvious once we departed Paris and headed into rural France! The guided tour of Normandy was memorable for us all from the inspiring 360 degree museum at Avranches to walking the infamous Omaha Beach. Bright sunshine seemed to greet us at almost every location but it was the inescapable influence of history on the landscape that astounded us all.

Our main focus was World War One battlefields and the experience was profound! From our first investigation of the battle of Fromelles, the boys were captivated as they contemplated exactly what had happened here 102 years ago. Certainly, looking up from the Australian lines to 'the Sugarloaf', which in 1916 was full of German machine gun placements, it made for some sombre and thought provoking reflection. Almost 2,000 young Australians lost their lives here in just over 24 hours! An infamous German corporal, Adolf Hitler was involved in this battle too. A number of boys discovered bits of shrapnel and bullet casings on this battlefield before we bunked down in Ypres for a few nights.

Each student had researched a fallen Old Scholar and then paid tribute to them at their grave or memorial and these tributes began in Belgium. The Menin Gate ceremony at Ypres has been held at 8pm every single night, 365 days a year – since the 1920s! It was here that boarders Cameron Smith and Ed Cunningham marched up to lay a wreath from the PAC community. The Ypres museum, *In Flanders Fields* offered a poignant look at the horrors of war and how this town had been devastated by it. On Tuesday night Tom Jenner read John McCrae's famous poem of the same name.

The final stage of our tour took us to Villers Bretonneux for the Dawn Service on ANZAC Day. It commemorated 100 years exactly since this stunning victory where 4,000 Australians in the 13th and 15th Brigades bravely forced the Germans back. Our group were all up at 2am to get to the service on time along with around 8,000 other Australians including Prime Minister, Malcolm Turnbull. Appropriately the rain came down on this chilly April morning but the words and images were quite inspirational for us all. Luke Bardy and Kadina lad, Connor Craigie were given the duty of laying a PAC Community wreath. Later that afternoon, we visited the Primary School where the sign, **DO NOT FORGET AUSTRALIA** has remained for many years.

The long journey home was a time for reflection and deep contemplation. Studying, living and breathing history tends to do that. The boys had a wonderful experience with many stories to tell and photos to share. Thanks must go to my colleague, Mr Ashley Hutchings who made an invaluable contribution to the success of this study tour and to the seven young men who joined us and were outstanding travel companions and commendable ambassadors for the College.

Premier's Reading Challenge

The Premier's Reading Challenge has been a huge success this year, with the introduction of the Tutor Group Reading Program, greatly assisting boys in reaching the goal of 12 books. Middle and Senior School recorded the highest number of participants since the program's inception in 2004 with Year 12 student, Joshua Harris, making College history in becoming the first PAC student to be awarded the '13 Year Reader for Life Certificate'.

2018 has also been another great year for the Preparatory School boys with 286 students from Reception to Year 6 successfully completing the Premier's Reading Challenge. Of these students, 23 achieved "Hall of Fame" medals which means they have completed the challenge for seven years. This year there are three "Readers for Life", meaning they have completed the challenge for eight consecutive years.

Children's Book Week

The theme for Book Week 2018 was "Find Your Treasure". Students had the opportunity to listen to guest speakers from a few of the countries closest to Australia and discover what treasure means to them. Guest like Gima, from Papua New Guinea, spoke of where he is from in Papua New Guinea and explained traditions of his culture. Dancers from Sampaguita Dance Group Inc, demonstrated traditional Filipino dance celebrations.

The Book Week Parade was held on Friday 24 August. This year, classes were challenged to celebrate an author, a title, theme or series. The titles shortlisted by the Children's Book Council of Australia were celebrated in

the library in the five weeks leading up to Book Week. The children in the Reception classrooms worked together to adapt the shortlisted book "Mopoke" by Phillip Bunting and performed it to the Preparatory School.

Inquiry into Animals

Each week in Term 2 the Library had a different collection of resources from the Nature Resource Centre. Students from the Early Learning Centre through to Year 6 were able to get "hands on" with these special resources.

Reconciliation Week

Ngarrindjeri Elder and Medicine Man, Uncle Moogy visited the College with the Talkinjeri Dance Group who took our Preparatory boys and ELC children on a journey of ceremony, stories, dance and song. During his performance he spoke about the traditional ways of the Ngarrindjeri people and the importance of connection to the land. In the Library students learnt about Kaurna language with Peramangk/Kaurna man, Ivan Copley.

Princes Poetry Slam

During June, our Year 9 boys participated in a series of poetry workshops with poets from Spoken Word SA. After three weeks of prose, poetry and workshops, PAC Year 9 students participated in the inaugural Princes Poetry Slam. Hosted by Spoken Word SA and Director Kami McInnes, our boys delighted the audience with insightful, inspiring and witty poetry. After some deliberation, a winner was announced by the Judges Panel. Bailey Lock, was awarded the 2018 Princes Poetry Slam Trophy for his poem, 'The Life of a Procrastinating Student'. Runners up were Anthony Pham, Alex Henchliffe, Dhwarakesh Rajaram, Eric Luksch and Mitch Miller.


Two athletes represented us at the National Open Water Championships with one swimmer achieving a Top 10 placing in his age group.

2018 has been a year of great participation and some outstanding performances – both on an individual and team level. There was a huge success with Intercollegiate sports in both the winter and summer series', a continued high-quality music program and a vastly improved drama landscape. We have much to be proud of and thankful for.

The benefits to students in an immersive and developed Co-Curricular program are well known to higher education researchers. Many empirical studies suggest that the more involved that students are in the sporting, cultural and social aspects of campus life, the more they benefit in terms of academic learning and personal development.

The wider concepts of student connection and school culture was a critical aspect of Astin's (1984/1999) 'student involvement theory', Pace's (1984) 'quality of effort' concept and many other studies of student outcomes. These and many other detailed studies, highlighted the distinct benefit that Co-Curricular undertakings have on both learning and personal development. In fact, student involvement (in Co-Curricular exploits) was found to distinctly and positively affect the educational gains (Mackay and Kuh, 1994) and academic achievement and retention (Hoffman 2002).

What we do know about life is that busyness has become the new normal – with a serious squeeze on time meaning that our children are far less likely to be given opportunity to 'just play'. Smaller backyards, conflicting interests, the ever-presence of social media platforms and parents working longer hours have had an impact on the likelihood that our children will engage in healthy pursuits such as music, sports, the arts and everything in between.

It is for these reasons and more that the co-curriculum at Princes remains an unequivocally critical aspect of your son's education. Yes, historically, Princes has been well known for the way in which it values its great sportsmen and musicians, but what is often overlooked is that we ultimately aim to ensure that every boys' wider interests are matched by quality offerings in co-curriculum. This means that, no matter the age or the level, our aim is to have consistent, high quality instruction, high standards and a consistent aspiration to improve.

In 2018, our boys have shone brightly and proudly, across a vast array of sports, music, arts and drama programs. We are proud of the boys and what they have achieved and we urge them to continue to place a high value on playing in a team, playing/singing in a band, acting in a play or simply coming to watch any, or all, of these. With Term 4s addition of the 'Junior Blasters' program for Reception to Year 3 boys, we now have every year level at the College participating in some form of cricket.

With the early origins of cricket dating back to 1550, and many claiming it is struggling for relevance in the modern age, it is terrific to note that close to 250 boys across multiple age groups are engaged by this great game and are drawing benefit from the many lessons in teamwork, decision making, patience and concentration that cricket provides.

Undoubtedly, it is a sport that requires considerable character and its parallels with the values of the Princes Man are clear for all who have ever played.

Our cricketers enjoyed many opportunities to host visiting schools and take part in some closely fought exchanges over the past year.

Our Year 8 students hosted Haileybury College whilst our Year 9s had the opportunity to travel to Melbourne to play two matches against Haileybury in what has now become a fantastic annual event for our Middle School cricketers. It is an event which challenges our players on the field whilst also building lasting friendships off the field with their Haileybury counterparts.

There is no greater occasion to host visiting interstate and international schools than our sesquicentenary cricket festival. Rowing

The members of the Prince Alfred College Rowing Club performed well throughout the 2017-18 season concluding as clear winners of the South Australian School Boy Premiership ahead of St Peter's College. This is a great achievement and a representation of the strength of the whole club rather than one particular crew alone. The Rowing Club was this year led well by Captain of Boats Charles McInnis and Vice-Captain Harrison Cerchez.

Throughout the season our rowers demonstrated fantastic commitment to their rowing witnessed by high attendance rates throughout the preseason and midseason camps. The season began well with some strong performances early in the season followed by a fantastic Riverland Regatta in Renmark. An opportunity for rowers across all levels to work well together and represent the club with pride, the regatta was a great demonstration of a strong club both on and off the water.

Moving into Term 1, the competition intensive portion of the season, we once again witnessed some great performances and a well-disciplined club. Throughout the Schools Premiership Series all crews performed well, retaining the School Boy Premiership for the third year in a row and now totalling seven wins in the last 10 years. Further, we witnessed throughout the season some strong results within our younger levels almost always

qualifying A, B and C crews for A finals throughout the West Lakes Regattas.

The 2018 Head of the River (HoR) brought mixed results for the crews of the PAC Rowing Club. From the 18 crews starting, seven claimed the trophy for their division, while a further five finished on the podium. The highlight for the day was certainly the dominance displayed by our Year 9 crews who achieved a clean sweep of their events.

Our First VIII would meet an incredibly strong St Peter's College crew throughout the season. Making a good start early in the season, our young crew developed well and worked hard throughout the season. Unfortunately the Head of the River was not their day. After consistently performing in the top three all season a bad start, poor conditions, together with some simple errors made for a fifth place finish. Our Second VIII rowed well however and ultimately were over-powered in head wind conditions by a strong St Peter's crew who claimed the event by a large margin over PAC, who again led Unley by a large margin. Once again this year our Second IV raced in the First IV division and rowed a good race to place sixth overall. A great effort particularly given two members of the crew were introduced to sweep rowing only weeks earlier. Our First IV certainly produced their best race of the season on the day. Up against two crews from schools not contesting the Eights events, along with a strong St Peter's crew, our four executed a great race to finish second.

This year's Year 10 Squad completed a good season overall which, I have no doubt, will have prepared them well for the step up into the Senior Squad next season. Our A crew showed great early strength with some great racing results. Come Head of the River, they managed a good start however, like many other crews, found the tough conditions challenging. In the final 500 metres a strong Scotch crew capitalised in leeward conditions with a push to the line ultimately getting ahead of our crew. Our B and C crews also developed well throughout the season, and both finished fourth in their events.

Our large Junior squad of no less than 11 Quads this year performed well over the Years 8 and 9 Divisions. Our Year 9 crews had a fantastic season of often close racing. The A crew demonstrated great ability all season during some very close racing. Our B and C crews showed great strength and ability all season and did not disappoint. While our D, E, F and G crews all raced in the same race the strength of the squad was evident by each one of the four PAC crews beating all other D crews in the race. Each of our Year 9 crews were victorious on the day.

With four Year 8 crews taking to the water during the Head of the River our numbers were slightly down on last year however their spirit was not. Our A crew, complete with a rower new to the sport in January of the same year, performed very well in the lead up and during the regatta to finish in fifth place. Our B, C and D crews despite some last minute changes due to injury raced well finishing third, second and third respectively.

Again last year the academic achievements of the senior boys in the Rowing Club were noteworthy, with more than half of graduating rowers achieving an ATAR of over 90 for the third year in a row, while four joined the Over 95 Club. Of the 36 Diploma Program Merits achieved in 2017 ten of those were achieved by members of the Rowing Club. 2016 and 2017 First VIII member Douglas Gerard, concluded his time with PAC achieving a fantastic ATAR and being awarded Joint Dux of School.

Our Old Scholars also continue to excel with three selected in the 2018 Australian Team while one was selected to represent Germany. Five of nine members of the 2018 Kings Cup crew were PAC Old Scholars and two current students were selected within the Rowing South Australia Pathways crew, while one Old Scholar was selected as a state team coach.

The 2017-18 rowing season was another strong season for our Club and a great sign for the future of the Rowing Club. While there were crews who may not have concluded their season with the results they had hoped for it is evident that we have great depth and ability within our Rowing Club.

On behalf of the boys and myself, I must thank our many coaches for their tireless and dedicated work, Debi Wilson and Ross McDougall for their significant contribution, and the Rowing Parents Support Group for their continued support for the program through camps,

regattas and successful fundraising. And finally, a thanks to the College and staff for their support of our rowers throughout the season in so many different ways.

Sailing

The 2017-18 season saw Prince Alfred College enter South Australia's secondary school Team Sailing competition officially for the second time. After the trial and regional regattas, we entered two teams in the state championship regatta from which South Australia's top teams are chosen to compete in the Australian nationals.

Our first Metropolitan Trials Team Sailing Regatta took place on 18 February, where we came 13th out of 16 teams, ahead of Immanuel B, Walford 2 and St Johns, completing four races with one win and three losses. All six boys sailed well, but our best skipper was Henry Turner, with a special mention for Frederick Sands helming in his first event.

The year's second regatta took place in ideal conditions, with steady breezes beginning with an 8kn southerly in the morning, strengthening to 16kn sou'west by late afternoon. Out of 16 teams from eight schools, PAC 1 came eighth overall with four wins and PAC 2 came ninth, also with four wins. All the boys sailed well, especially with so many new inexperienced sailors. Best Skipper was Henry Turner, but the most improved was Cooper Johns. Competing in his first regatta, Cooper came first in one race and played a key role in the team's winning of at least two other races.

The State Championships at the end of April were held this year in Goolwa. The overall result for our two teams was 20th and 21st respectively for PAC 1 and 2 out of 27 teams.

This is six places ahead of what we achieved at last year's states. During the regatta, PAC 1 reached 12th position on the Friday, after hovering around 15th, but an unfortunate loss to Walford 1 on Saturday morning sent them down to 20th and there were not enough races scheduled on that last day to work their way back.

All boys sailed well, with Henry Turner our best Skipper, Angus Pointon and Frederick Sands showing great leadership in their respective teams, while a special mention should go to Lloyd Rasmussen. He moved from crew to skipper in the week before the regatta to fill a gap in the team and helmed in his first races with distinction. Cooper Johns also showed remarkable improvement, having moved from the second to the first team.

It is worth noting at a broader level that the Westminster team, which won our state championship, went on to make history by being the first Australian team to defeat New Zealand on their home turf at the October inter-dominions.

The new season began in November with a reduced number of Skippers, though we did recruit a few new boys. As a result, we only entered one team with seven sailors in the trial regatta at Port River on Sunday 11 November. Rotating Skippers throughout the three boats for each of our races gave the boys valuable experience sailing across the team. Struggling to get into gear for light weather sailing, the boys began having success late in the day, with some very close results being decided on the finish line. Starts needed more work, but Angus

Pointon showed great leadership with some copy book displays of tactical manoeuvres or 'pass-backs'. Other Skippers were Cooper Johns, Frederick Sands, Lloyd Rasmussen and Thomas Brand.

I owe another debt of gratitude to the wonderful parents who supported their sons so well throughout the season, from Sunday transport to catering to spectating throughout the four days of the states. A special thankyou should also go to Mr Mike Steer, who helped with weekly transport in Term 1.

Development of players for the future was our paramount goal and we thank Mr Brett Gilbert, especially for his quality work developing the Middle School players.





Basketball

2018 saw a number of key changes to the basketball program at Prince Alfred College. Led by a new director of basketball, David Ingham, and a range of new senior coaches, the PAC program had one of the most successful years to date. Senior Coaches Paul Rigoni, Jimmy Alexander and Tom Hilbig are all currently working within the SA Metro program, with Paul recently coaching the SA Under-20 men's team to a silver medal at the National Championships. We were pleased to retain many of our old scholar coaches and appointed a number of new coaches as well. The profile of Basketball at Princes has certainly improved, and the College committed some large investments to improve our equipment and facilities (with immediate results). The RED Centre has also hosted a number of significant events in 2018, most notably, two National Wheelchair Basketball League (NWBL) games and an elite junior coaching clinic run by Cleveland Cavaliers Assistant Coach Mike Longabardi, of which six of our senior boys attended.

We fielded a record 12 teams across the Middle and Senior School this year and all have had successful seasons. The five Senior School teams fielded a range of new players from Year 10-12, all of whom contributed to the positive culture and atmosphere that is continually developing around basketball at PAC. The Open A, Open B and Open C teams had outstanding seasons, recording a combined 24 wins and only nine losses. The Open A team posted a particularly impressive season, finishing second in both the ISSA and State Knockout competitions, our strongest result in 37 years. No doubt they will be looking to go one better in 2019. A memorable 45-41 Intercol victory in overtime was a fitting way to end a brilliant season. Our Senior 2 and Senior 3 teams competed to the best of their ability every week, and special mention must go to the Senior 3 boys for their undefeated season. There was certainly a strong sense of spirit and pride across the Senior School teams and our outgoing Year 12 boys have left a great legacy for our Year 10 and Year 11s to follow.

We had a record number of Middle School players spread across seven teams and all teams recorded some impressive wins and were competitive against any opposition. The Middle A team made it through to the ISSA Grand Final, but were defeated by a stronger Trinity team. We had four Intercol victories out of seven games in the Middle School, but some significant wins in the Middle A and Middle C games and a thrilling last-minute win in the Middle B game. All Middle School players have represented themselves well during the 2018 season.

Now a fixture of the Preparatory competition, Prince Alfred College hosted the Friday afternoon Year 5 and Year 6 league. The PAC teams have been well coached by our senior leaders – Noah Miles (Captain of Basketball) and Luke McCauley (Vice Captain). With Blake Cranna (Vice Captain) heading up the Friday afternoon referees, all three boys have done an outstanding job working with our younger players on Friday afternoons.

There were some outstanding individual performances throughout 2018 which should also be acknowledged; Riley Stasinowsky, Oscar Clark, Matthew Thomson and Josh Clifton were selected in the SA Country Under-18, Under-16 team and Under-15 teams respectively. Ethan Bryan and James Ingham were selected in the SA Metro Under-18 and Under-16 teams respectively. Following their performances in the National Championships, James Ingham and Matthew Thomson were selected to the Australian Under-15 team and are the only two South Australian players in the National team - an outstanding achievement! Matthew and James will represent Australia at the FIBA Under-15 Oceania Championships held from December 3-8 in Port Moresby, Papua New Guinea. All of these boys will return to play for PAC in 2019 and will be key members of what is certain to be a strong group in the future.




PAC won the annual Intercollegiate Chess match for a record ninth consecutive time, convincingly defeating St Peter's College 8.5 – 1.5.



Squash

Squash is a distinct sport for us here at Prince Alfred College. There is no other sport like it, and there is no other school in SA that does squash like we do. Our four courts are used each weeknight for most of the year, and besides competing in the High School Team Competition and Individual High School Tournaments, we hold our own inhouse Current Scholar versus Old Scholar tournament in Term 1, and to end the season the competitive PAC Open and Year Level Championships are contested.

With three new 'teams' (Preparatory, Middle and Senior School) meeting for weekly training sessions in Terms 2 and 3, under the guidance of myself, John Shackleton (Deputy of the Preparatory School), Mike Steer (Senior English and Drama teacher) and Patrick Bourke (experienced trainer in public speaking from the Rostrum organisation), students joining this club now have the opportunity to further develop their skills and confidence in oral communication, within the context of a supportive and sequential program spanning from Years 5 to Year 12. For those with an interest in competing, this club also offers support in the planning and development of speeches tailored for the various competitions which make up the Public Speaking calendar, including the King's Speech Competition.

2018 King's Speech Competition

After an initial field of 25 students battled it out in their respective heats, the Finals for the King's Speech Competition took place on Tuesday 12 June. As with previous years, there were a wide variety of speech topics in this year's competition, ranging from wellknown environmental and social issues such as pollution and technology addiction, to more complex issues such as the Paradox of Time and The Bystander Effect. The results from this year's King's Speech Competition were as follows: from the Preparatory School, Nicholas Henchliffe won the Lionel Logue Award for best speaker, with runner up Alex MacDonald and third place tied between Arjun Dosanjh and Mustafa Al Fayyad. From the Middle School, the Lionel Logue Award went to Anthony Pham, with runner-up Alexander Henchliffe and third place Dinan Perera. And from the Senior School, the Lionel Logue Award went to Jackson Miller, with Runner-up Preshaan Thavarajah and third place awarded to Ethan Hayes.

The Lodge Short Talk Goes Co-Ed

As an added incentive for our Preparatory and Middle School boys in Term 3 this year, another new initiative was launched. Actually, it was the reshaping of an existing 'in house' competition into a new 'intercollegiate' competition with Seymour: the new PAC-Seymour Lodge Short Talk. With thanks to ongoing financial support from the old PAC Masonic Lodge, this competition (previously open only to PAC boys in Years 6 and 7) has now become an annual competition between the best Junior speakers from both PAC and Seymour. In 2018, its inaugural year, four boys from PAC and five girls from Seymour were invited to showcase their skills in an open topic competition, presenting a mixture of persuasive and informative speeches to a panel of two experienced Rostrum adjudicators: Mr and Mrs Bourke. Whilst first and third places were both taken by Seymour this year, Max Thomas (Year 7) made PAC proud by securing second place in what everyone agreed was a strong field of excellent young speakers.

Other Competition Highlights

As with previous years, boys this year were also invited to develop their oratory skills through involvement in a range of other internal and external competitions, including Mock Trials, the Legacy Junior Public Speaking Competition, the IPSHA Poetry Competition and the UN Youth's Evatt Trophy competition.

In the Law Society's Mock Trials competition, two PAC teams entered this year. There was a total of 16 students from Years 10 to 12 working together as barristers, solicitors, witnesses and court officials, arguing mock civil law cases against teams from 26 other schools around Adelaide. Adding to the realism of their experience, these court cases were judged by practising Law Society judges, with the second round even taking place in Adelaide's District Court. Although unsuccessful in the finals, both teams performed admirably and were well supported by Coaches Mr George Gardener (PAC teacher and himself an award-winning ex-Mock-Trials competitor), Will Gray (Old Scholar and practising lawyer), and PAC Legal Studies teacher Mr Chris Nicholls, who helped to forge new bonds between curricular and Co-Curricular activities this year by building a new team from his Legal Studies class.

Also active in forging bonds between the classroom and Co-Curricular activities was Preparatory School teacher Lisa Lacy, who this year co-ordinated the IPSHA Poetry Competition. Following on from individual class heats, in which all PAC Preparatory School boys were asked to learn and recite two poems each, place getters from the ensuing PAC year-level finals included: in Year 4, Daniel Teng (winner) and Christian Smith (second); in Year 5, Alex Hamood (winner), Owen Chen (second) and Seth Rocca (third); and in Year 6, Alex MacDonald (winner), Mustafa Al Fayyad (second) and Arjun Dosanjh (third). The three winners from these PAC finals then went on to compete in the interschool Grand Finals, with Alex MacDonald ultimately placing third out of 13 competitors and Alex Hamood winning an impressive first place among 16 competitors.

In the Legacy Junior Public Speaking Competition, the school was also well represented this year, with Anthony Pham, Henry Grey, Henry Pontifex and Max Thomas all speaking well on their respective topics relating to the Legacy ideals of voluntary service, social justice, caring, personal sacrifice and/or mateship. Anthony Pham's speech was a particular highlight in this competition, winning him the right to compete in the State Finals.

A special mention must also be made of Year 12 boys Thomas Dodsworth and Luke Bardy, who chose to compete in this year's Evatt Trophy Competition – a UN Youth competition in which pairs of students from around the state take on roles as international UN delegates within mock UN Security Council meetings, arguing from their allocated country's perspective on contentious mock UN resolutions. After successfully making it through the Preliminary, Semi and Grand Final rounds, in which these boys represented the USA, China


and Poland respectively, Thomas and Luke were judged second in the State, winning the right to represent South Australia in the 2018 National Finals in Hobart. This effectively placed Thomas and Luke in the top 30 teams from Australia and New Zealand and we congratulate both boys on their excellent achievement in Public Speaking.

We were also pleased to invite the Rowing community to provide the BBQ in support of their fundraising efforts.

In September we ran our first ever Father's Day Stall in the Preparatory School. A fantastic group of Mums from across the Preparatory School got together one morning and wrapped hundreds of gifts ahead of the stall. Being Mums, we could multi-task and chat and drink coffee at the same time and everyone enjoyed the opportunity to catch up. On the day of the stall our volunteers carefully demonstrated and explained the gifts on offer to each class and boys then made their selection for their Dad or other special person. It was lovely to see the excitement on the boys' faces and the pride and care they all took in choosing their gifts.

Our other major social event was 'Livvy and Pete', held in the Prince Philip Theatre on 19 October. Featuring Adelaide's own cabaret superstars Amelia Ryan and Michael Griffiths, those in attendance had a great night of laughs, singing along to the songs of Olivia Newton-John and Peter Allen. The audience included current students right through to Grandies, truly reflecting our aim of an inclusive College community event.

In addition to these events we have continued to support the boys and the College in several ways, including our ever-popular cake stalls and BBQs at the swimming and sports carnivals, meeting prospective new parents at school tours and assisting at the Careers Expo, Welcome Back Morning Tea and Parent Social Events held at St Jacques at the beginning of the year.

Funds raised this year have been put towards our annual gift giving to boys graduating from the Preparatory, Middle and Senior Schools and the New Boarders pack. The Preparatory School Easter Raffle was a great success with 48 prizes available for the boys, as well as three huge hampers of eggs donated to Uniting Care Wesley Bowden. One lucky Year 9 boy was the winner of a 10kg block of Cadbury chocolate in our Middle and Senior School Easter Raffle! The Cancer Council's Biggest Morning Tea moved venue this year to the elegant surrounds of the Prince Philip Theatre. This year's sold out event was again held on an exeat weekend and we were delighted that several Boarding parents were able to attend which helped us raise around \$2,000 for the Cancer Council.

In October we launched an exciting new fundraising concept at the College – the FoPAC School Fees Lottery. At a cost of \$100 per ticket, one lucky winner will receive a \$15,000 fees credit at PAC in 2019. With only 300 tickets on sale the odds are fantastic and we can't wait to announce the winner at our meeting in early 2019.

This year the Chair of the College Council and Headmaster, as well as other members of the leadership team, have regularly attended FoPAC meetings to share information and provide updates on what is going on at the College. We appreciate their support and thank all our Committee members who have also made time to attend. The meetings are a great opportunity for feedback and discussion between parents and the College leadership team and I encourage you all to come along to these and other FoPAC events to get to know others and help us build our College community.





FOUNDATION

Last year we celebrated the 150th anniversary of the laying of the College's foundation stone and in 2019 we will celebrate the opening of the College. The one thing which predates these important dates is the philanthropy which provided the confidence to proceed with the concept of what became Prince Alfred College. What vision and generosity those who gave money had, and in doing so they established a tradition of giving which continues to this day.

2018 has been a particularly strong year for philanthropy, and it is testament to the strength of the College that over \$2,150,000 has been received this year. In looking at the past four years of fundraising, 2018 is some \$470,000 more than the next-most successful year of 2016.

The College is indeed lucky to have the philanthropic support of men and women who share in the vision of a world class school for boys.

Foundation Scholarship Fund

The Foundation Scholarship Fund continues to go from strength to strength. At the end of its first decade the Fund achieved the value of \$7,000,000 and the realisation of two significant bequests in 2019 will see this double. Hard work and generosity has enabled this to occur, and all donors share the vision of providing a Princes education to students who may not have otherwise had the opportunity,

The Fund was pleased to be able to support students on new scholarships including the Jim Lang Scholarship and the Bruck and Betty Wheeler Scholarship. The establishment of the Geoffrey Bean Boarding Scholarship also occurred and has generated significant interest amongst the Princes community, especially those whose lives were directly influenced by Mr Bean during his Headmastership.

The Fund also continued to appreciate the commitment of Mr Ken Lord which started a decade ago. The Ken Lord Family Boarding Scholarship supported four boys this year and will help a further two recipients in 2019. Ken's regular visits to the College and interaction with staff, recipients and their parents, are enjoyed by all.

The Fund is ably overseen by the Foundation President Mr Nick Heard, and members Mr Bradley Fenner, Mr Ashley Miller, Dr Brett Gooden, Dr Janet Young, Foundation Treasurer Mr Craig Tasborski, and the Foundation Executive Officer Mr David Cornish.

Library Fund

For many years the Library Fund has had a group of dedicated regular contributors who support its work. This year the Fund was the beneficiary of a major gift from a family who appreciated the role the library and its

staff has played in the education of their son. This gift and existing funds will enable further work to develop the College's library services to occur.

\$50,000 allocated by the Library Fund for new shelving and furniture was implemented in early 2018.

Building Fund

Throughout the year donations to the Building Fund were directed to the Boarding House project. Gifts to the Fund through the Annual Giving program will assist with the provision of new seating in ANZAC as a part of its refurbishment, which will be completed in the first part of 2019.

Bequests

During the course of the year the Foundation was delighted to be informed of a multi-million dollar bequest to the Scholarship Fund. Further details of this will be announced during 2020, suffice to say it will enable the significant expansion of an existing Fund scholarship and consequently the lives of more young men.

2019 will also see the realisation of the estate of the late Mrs Torrie Chapman (nee Hunt) of Mundulla who died in 2016. This major bequest will enable the implementation of a new boarding scholarship, and other initiatives with a focus on the primary industries sector. Mrs Chapman's generosity will provide many opportunities well into the future.

Grandies Club

Thirty years ago in 1988 the College introduced Grandies Day and welcomed Grandies of current students at an open day. This initiative was a way of acknowledging the significant contribution Grandies make in the lives of our students, and involving them in their education.

The College also has a Grandies Club which meets throughout the year. This year the group visited Scotts Creek Outdoor Centre, enjoyed morning tea in the recently refurbished Prince Philip Theatre, and celebrated the end of the year and Christmas with a lunch in the Piper Pavilion.

This active group welcomes new members and in 2019 will offer a similar program, including a day trip to the College's Wambana extended stay campus.

Sporting Endowment

During the year the Foundation continued its relationship with the Australian Sports Foundation and members of the College community are encouraged to donate to their favourite sport. Further details are available at www.asf.org

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT

Thomas W Lambert (2004) **President 2018**

The Prince Alfred Old Collegians' Association (PAOCA) turning 140 years old made this year that little more special. Over the past 140 years the Association and its members have remained engaged with, and committed to, supporting the operation and development of both PAC and our Old Scholars' community. This remains both our biggest objective and challenge, especially in a fast paced, new age world - to ensure we offer all our members, regardless of their stage in life, an opportunity to remain connected with the College and fellow 'Old Reds'.

A highlight in a very busy year was our famed Old Old Boys' Assembly and it was a privilege to sit on stage once again as President, and to meet many of the 188 Old Old Boys in attendance over morning tea. This is a truly Princes occasion, and I was proud to share it with my grandfather, Geoffrey Marshall, who is also a former PAOCA President.

Another highlight was the Annual Dinner held at the Adelaide Convention Centre on Friday 27 July. All 411 guests (the largest number for some time) were captivated hearing from guest speaker and former Australian Cricket Captain, Steve Waugh AO, in an 'on the couch' hosted by Ben Hook. It was a fantastic evening and the feedback was overwhelmingly positive, with the all-inclusive package providing a revitalisation of our flagship event. A big thank you also to all our invaluable sponsors for their support.

The Association hosted seven reunions in Adelaide as well as dinners in Melbourne, Sydney, Perth, Brisbane and Canberra – with all dinners continuing to grow, and I sincerely thank our interstate convenors and members for their support. We also held dinners in London, Los Angeles and New York, with the London contingent holding top spot as our strongest network abroad.

As you will read in their reports, our sporting clubs continued to prosper, and enjoyed Intercol successes in badminton, bridge, chess, hockey, squash and wine tasting!

I am also pleased to inform you that the PAOCA has pledged \$50,000 to the new PAC Boarding House project which is due for completion in 2019.

Excitingly, 2019 marks the College's Sesquicentenary. The Management Committee, after much deliberation, agreed to step away from our tradition of an Annual

Dinner and will join with the College for a Gala Dinner, to be celebrated at the Adelaide Convention Centre on Saturday 20 July. This decision was not taken lightly, but I remind Old Reds that we are not two separate communities but one unique community, and that the 150th Gala Dinner will be an opportunity to celebrate the College and its history, together with your partner, your friends, and the Princes' community at large. The PAOCA Annual Dinner will return in 2020.

With regards to the general administration of the Association, I am pleased to provide an update on a number of key strategic initiatives that were completed in 2018, ultimately placing the Association in a stronger position across the key areas of finance, administration and governance. These include:

- reviewing our Investment Policy to better manage our investment corpus, risk management and oversight prompting the Management Committee in consultation with its advisors to undertake a significant readjustment of our investment portfolio to fall in line with our renewed investment policy, financial objectives and risk profile;
- the review and restructure of our membership fees and Life Membership fees which whilst also building out our annual sponsorship prospectus, securing a new range of Platinum and Silver sponsors including Shaw & Partners, Solitaire Automotive and AusCold Logistics;
- review and adoption of our new Strategic Plan 2020, as well as commencing work on a PAOCA Annual Report, to be available in 2019; and
- increasing our exposure on social media by creating an Instagram account.

Finally, I would like to thank the PAOCA Management Committee for their contributions this year.

In particular, I wish to thank Andrew Clarkson for his invaluable service to the Association, who retired from the Committee at our AGM.

As President of the Association in both 2008 and 2009, and a highly respected Committee member since 2005, Andrew's input and guidance has seen the Association continue to flourish, including the implementation of the Executive Officer's position in 2009, and transforming the way the Association conducts its day-to-day operations. In addition, Andrew's continual support of the Prince Alfred Old Collegians' Hockey Club, and more

recently his contributions to the Princes Men Gallery Committee, is appreciated by the Association and the College respectively.

Writing this report each year is a wonderful point of reflection and recognises just how much we do as an active Old Scholars Association. This Association is so much more than a few dinners here and reunions there, and we can be very proud of what we achieved this year.

The Hockey Club in 2018 competed in the Metro 2s division of the HockeySA competition. In the previous season in 2017 the team had finished on top of the ladder but then proceeded to be knocked out of the finals in straight sets at the hands of Grange and Adelaide. Knowing that we were good enough to win the competition, the team was eager to make amends for the disappointing finals campaign of 2017.

Excitement was added to eagerness in January and February 2018, when news started to filter through the playing group that prodigal son Mark Gobolos (1997) was returning to the Reds for this season. Mark had departed the club for Adelaide in the early 2000s to pursue a wildly successful Premier League career, and more recently played a big hand for Adelaide in knocking us out of the finals in 2017.

It was a big coup for the Club in luring such a player back to play with the Reds. The unknown bonus was that Mark would in turn recruit to the Club himself a further two gun players in Damen Guest and Sam Pearse. Add to that the recruit of defender Ken Body out of retirement and Old Red Michael Staak (2010) from NEHC, it meant the team had undergone quite a transformation in playing personnel from the season prior. The transformation wouldn't stop at just the cattle on the pitch, with Mark Gobolos and others deploying a new look playing formation for this season. An overdue update to the system we had been using since the late 1990s.

The early start of the season was a bit mixed with some good performances mixed with some weaker ones. Despite that, we were still undefeated after six rounds with three wins and three draws. From there, the team started to hit their stride and gel more. Rounds 7 through 12 saw a streak of six wins on the trot including a stand out performance of an 8-0 win against top four team in Westminster. This was perhaps a marker of how well the team had developed across the season, as our Round 2 clash with Westminster was a 6-6 draw. This result, however, gave us belief that we could win a game from any position, no matter the score.

We finished the minor rounds undefeated, in top spot on the ladder with 14 wins and four draws. We would be taking on second placed Port in the qualifying final. It was a very tight game, with the score 2-2 after regular time - Henry Kitto (2011) and Samuel Tyler (2001) were the goal scorers. In extra time, we dominated most of the play but unfortunately couldn't make it count on the score board. Sadly, this led to us going down in a one-on-one penalty shootout with Port going straight into the Grand Final and we would have to take the long route there. This would mean overcoming Woodville in the Preliminary Final, which we managed to do with 3-1 being the full-time score (James McGregor, Michael Staak and Samuel Tyler, the goal scorers).

The Grand Final saw us pitted against Port again, with the record against them for the season at that stage being one win, one draw and one penalty shootout loss. It wasn't a great start, with Port scoring the first goal of the game to take the lead. The Reds came back with a vengeance though, scoring two goals in three minutes (Alex Chapman and Derek Lee, 1998, the goal scorers) to snatch the lead from them about 15 minutes into the first half. From this point, it was a tense battle for the

remainder of the game. A few green and yellow cards started to be brandished by the umpires to both sides. Neither team could break through to score. A nervous moment or two occurred when it looked like Port had equalised through a short corner. But the shot was deemed too high and was correctly disallowed to ensure the Reds remained in front. No further goals were added in the tense final minutes, with the Reds erupting in jubilation at the final whistle as 2-1 victors.

It was a fantastic effort from the team across the season to remain undefeated in the minor rounds and win the Premiership in this division after being promoted to it in 2017. This makes it two Premierships in the last three seasons for the Club. The team scored 83 goals whilst conceding 26 goals in the minor round season. From a purely statistical point of view, this is the best attacking and defensive season the team has had in over a decade. The award winners for 2018 were Samuel Tyler collecting the Club Best & Fairest award for the third consecutive year with a division-leading 27 goals for the season, and Mark Gobolos being awarded the Best Club Man.

The Club wishes to thank Tom Ricketts (2004) for his ongoing support as sponsor through the Seven Stars Hotel. We encourage all to make use of the wonderful facilities and hospitality there. I would personally like to thank Andrew Baillie (2004) and Mark Gobolos for their help across the season in administration and coaching.

Next season gets underway in April 2019. We anticipate again fielding a team in the Metro 2s division, and continuing our affiliation with the SPOC Hockey Club. Athol Murray Olsson (1944-1946) – died aged nearly 90 years on 10 April 2018. Murray served as a member of the PAOCA from 1976 and as President in 1983 and again in 1996. He was also a member of the PAOCA Lodge from 1973 and served as Master in 1994-1999.


He was a long standing Board member of the PAC Foundation (1995-2010), a joint instigator of the Vintage Reds luncheon, an initiator and contact for both the Lodge Prize and Short Talk Competition in the Preparatory School, until present, and an initiator and advocate of the John Olsson Freemasons Memorial Scholarship for a boarding student (2004-2017).

The PAOC Cricket Club awarded Murray Player Life Membership (1965-1966) having played in 214 two-day games in 20 seasons between 1946 and 1978, and having served as the Club's President, Chairman and C Grade Captain. He held the distinction unique record of having played a game for the Club alongside his two sons Andrew and David in season 1971/72 (while they were still at school).

Murray was also a valued member of the Old Reds Football Club having played in 54 games across three seasons in 1947, 1948 and 1950, having been President in 1983 and 1996.

As a result of Murray's tireless efforts in the Old Reds and the College community, he was awarded Honorary Life Membership of the PAOCA in 1999.

The PAOCA gives thanks for the long life and contribution of Murray Olsson, and extends sincere sympathy to his children, Jenny, Andrew and David, and their families.



David Harris Prest AM – The life and contribution to Prince Alfred College and Wesley College of David Prest AM (1944-1949) was honoured four days after his death at the annual PAC and Wesley match at Wesley. David was Captain of the School and Dux in 1949, served on staff 1958-1962, and was Principal of Wesley College from 1972-1991. David's funeral was held in Adamson Hall at Wesley College on Tuesday 17 April 2018.
