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At the time of writing, I am inside my last month as Headmaster of Prince Alfred College, so it is an appropriate time to provide some reflection on my time here and the College itself. The end of this term will bring to an end forty-two years working in eight fine schools, in four Australian states, as well is in Northern Ireland and New Zealand.

I commented at a recent Heads' gathering that I am always humbled when I hear people talk about how much they value their connection with our school. Whether this be a current or former student, or current and former parent talking about their child, it is always gratifying to hear that people believe they have benefited significantly from the education we provide and the enduring connections that come about through attending a school such as ours.

I have often remarked that the great benefit of a school like PAC is that it gives our students an understanding of being part of something that is bigger than they are. The school has been here long before any of us and will be here long after we are all gone. We know how important it is for adolescents to get a sense of connection and something they identify with, to assist them in developing their sense of place in the world. Moreover, we know that the connections and networks that our students establish whilst at school will in most cases remain with them for the rest of their lives, providing friendship and support.

One of the highlights of my time at PAC was our various sesquicentenary celebrations. As well as the major events, such as the Royal visit by HRH Prince Edward in 2018 and the wonderful Gala dinner in 2019, our 150th Anniversary

celebrations provided us with an opportunity to reflect on our history, our heritage and our institutional values. This was not done solely to celebrate our heritage, but also to provide us with a sense of purpose looking forward. I believe that as an institution we are not excessively focused on our past, but we should look to our founding and enduring values to provide us with directions into the future.

One example of this is our founders' vision that Prince Alfred College should be a school welcoming people of all faith backgrounds. This commitment to diversity from our very beginning has been articulated and extended in our current strategic plan, committing us to "promote a culture of inclusion where diversity in all its forms is valued and celebrated".

Earlier this year, we referred back to this strategic direction in supporting our first transgender student to complete Year 12 at Prince Alfred College. As I noted at the time in a media interview, strategic commitments such as this should never simply be words on a page, but bring with them a genuine, ethical commitment to advance the stated direction. Whilst we recognise there will be different views on contentious matters, we have tried at all times to focus on what is best for the students of the College.

In conclusion, I would like to thank all members of the Prince Alfred College community for the way that I have been supported throughout my time at PAC. As I hope has been evident, I have loved being Headmaster of PAC and have always felt that I identify strongly with the College's ethos, traditions and character. I wish my successor, Mr David Roberts, a similarly happy and rewarding time at PAC, just as I wish the College every success in the future.



DEVELOPING EMOTIONAL KNOWLEDGE IN THE EARLY YEARS

At Prince Alfred College Early Learning Centre, the development of social and emotional knowledge, regulation and competence is seen as a core attribute that supports children's further academic learning. The ability to recognise and label emotions is key in facilitating positive social interactions, emotional self-regulation, wellbeing and self-confidence.

In the early years we believe that working collaboratively, sharing and listening to ideas and challenging and clarifying our knowledge in groups, leads to greater understandings than when we work on our own. Therefore children are actively encouraged to work together to find out more about their world. For this to work, reflection on, and direct teaching of social and emotional skills and strategies, is necessary and constant.

Quality educators play an essential part in this process. In the first instance, PAC ELC educators have a firm belief in children's potential to regulate their own emotions and read the emotions of others. They believe children are on a continuum of understanding and are supported to use their skills to interact respectfully and understand their own strengths and challenges.

For our youngest children, educators who interact with them in a caring and empathetic way, not only model positive and responsive emotions, but also assist children to co-regulate more challenging emotions such as anger, jealousy and disappointment. Proactively exposing students to literature and stories about feelings and appropriate ways to respond to them, builds children's armoury of emotional strategies.

For older children, space in the classroom that documents children's ever growing emotional vocabulary that can be revisited and refined throughout the year is essential. Children are encouraged to add to the classroom repository of feelings, not only through first-hand experience, but also through examples that they observe in the play of others, in books or on the screen. Children are taught that there is no such thing as bad feelings. All feelings are important and serve a purpose – some just make you feel better than others. Our aim is to work out strategies that help us move from feelings that don't feel so good, to feelings that make us feel better.

Children are supported to put these strategies into practice in play through the process of restorative justice. When disagreements occur the process of restorative justice allows all parties an equal voice and compels the children to work together to find a solution or restoration that has been negotiated and agreed by all. This way children are able to better understand the emotional consequence of actions, work to solve the issue without blame and develop resilience and self-confidence.

Social emotional knowledge, regulation and competence are essential lifelong skills that must be viewed as a priority in young children's education. At Prince Alfred College Early Learning Centre we strive to develop emotionally knowledgeable, resilient and responsible citizens who are able to understand their own feelings and respond with care to the feelings of others.

A NEW VISION FOR LEARNING

High ceilings, dim lights, stacks of books rising to the ceilings, narrow pathways, the smell of leather, paper and dust, floors revealing the patina of age. Palaces of knowledge, mystery and silence, the libraries of yesteryears. While libraries have long held an important role in society since the seventh century BCE, their look, feel and the services they provide have significantly changed throughout history.

Today, libraries are no longer book repositories and librarians are no longer guardians of books. They are welcoming, light-and-airy, open concept, agile and dynamic spaces where librarians guide students to develop their reading identity and teach them how to navigate the information superhighway by developing students' information literacy skills.

The PAC library was designed to be a warm, sophisticated, and inspiring space to support various teaching and learning modes, and specifically to nurture the development of our students to become motivated and independent learners. During the design process, our main goal was to create distinct areas that support a variety of student activities such as independent reading and research, collaborative learning, and creative thinking.

The entrance to the library is an inviting, highly interactive social zone that houses our help desk, various library displays, and features a stunning 7-metre-long abstract mural titled 'The path we choose' created by local artist Kellie Fergusson.

Adjacent to the dynamic entrance, the library offers two study cubicles with white boards, and fitted with acoustic wall panels to block out noise and allow individual or small group work. These flexible spaces are in high demand and are well used by our senior students and external tutors.

The teaching space is equipped with a large projector and is furnished with contemporary modular seating conducive not only for teaching but also for meeting, discussing, and learning collaboratively. The modular seating is called 'Dulili', an Indigenous word for 'together'. An additional collaboration zone has been created in the centre of the library, surrounded by books to create a warm feeling and a space where resources are within easy reach.

Ideal for individual study, the library provides not only single carrels with beautiful views of the Adelaide Hills but also over 25 seating spots where students can recharge their laptops while studying. This quiet zone is abundant with natural light, connecting students with nature.

The intent of the library design has been well executed to produce a vibrant space which supports the full spectrum of students' learning needs. We believe that the space and the environment we have created will encourage many future generations of students to spend time in the PAC library and that they will benefit from the experience.





BUILDING ON SUCCESS IN THE IBDP

The Prince Alfred College International Baccalaureate (IB) Class of 2021 scored the highest average IB score in the history of the programme at PAC. Not only did the boys surpass our previous best results, but their average of 40 is significantly above state (36), national (37) and world (32) average results.

It is no exaggeration therefore to say that our boys are among some of the top performing IB students in the World. Our IB teachers are extremely proud of the achievements of the Class of 2021 and are looking forward now to building on the successes of last year as we continue our programmes in 2022.

The International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme (IBDP) is often described as the 'gold standard' of secondary education. It is more than simply a qualification; it is an internationally respected, holistic educational experience, designed to give students the very best opportunities and pathways upon graduation, opening doors to the top universities in Australia and around the world. Recent research in the USA has found that IB graduates are 40% more likely to complete their university degrees compared to the national average¹. Research also suggests that they are more likely to achieve first class honours degrees and go on to further postgraduate study². Australian universities also value the IBDP, reporting that IBDP graduates have higher capacities for 21st century skills, such as cultural sensitivity, global mindedness and leadership³ – all vital in the modern workplace.

Our IBDP students select six subjects to study throughout Year 11 and 12 and provides freedom for them to choose which areas to study in more depth at Higher Level. It is a flexible programme that is accessible to all motivated students, not just those who are considered academically gifted. Over recent years, many of our SACE students have picked to study a single IB subject in areas such as Sports, Exercise and Health Science or Film Studies. These students have also achieved outstanding results in the Programme, which has helped to improve their overall ATAR scores for university entrance.


At Prince Alfred College, our IB classes are small, creating opportunities for teachers and students to develop strong relationships and engage in topics and discussions at a much deeper level than they might previously have experienced. Our IB teachers are trained by the IB in their respective subject areas and are all extremely passionate about the programme. We believe that many boys will benefit from the personalised, rigorous and internationallyminded IB Programme at PAC, not just the select few and hope to build on the outstanding achievements of our 2021 cohort as more boys choose IB as their pathway in the future

SERVICE IN ACTION

One of the major strategic directions of the Prince Alfred College Strategic Plan for 2021-24 was to establish a diverse service program that challenges our boys to be outward looking and enrich the lives of others. In 2021, the College implemented a broad range of development opportunities that teach our boys to look beyond themselves and discover the value of making meaningful contributions to society.





Birdbanding

A group of our Middle School boys participated in a bird banding program with renowned ecologist Dr David Paton and volunteer researchers at Frahns Farm, Monarto, a significant Bio·R restoration site. A total of 40 birds were banded including 18 different species. The boys recorded the intricate feeding habits, physiological features and glorious colours of native birds. The data will all be fed into the national data base managed by the Australian Bird and Bat Banding Scheme (based in Canberra) that will enable understanding of bird demographics, survival rates, species loss or recovery.

Possum Boxes

As part of a community service initiative a group of our Year 10 boys have been making possum and bird boxes to provide homes for the Australian Owlet-nightjar and Ringtail Possum.

The money to build the boxes was obtained through grant funding provided by Upper River Torrens Landcare Group Inc and will be distributed to properties impacted by the 2020 bushfires.











Forktree Project

A group of Year 12 students and staff volunteers took part in The Forktree Project on a former pastoral property on the Fleurieu Peninsula. Ten students and a range of committed staff made the College's initial volunteer contribution to this significant sustainability and biodiversity endeavour led by Tim Jarvis and Elizabeth Blumer.

Initiated by Ms Melody Marshall with her Year 12 Tutor Group, the Project offers much in the way of curriculum opportunity; the sheer breadth of aspirations for the property connect with ecology and species loss within Science, and Economics and Geography represented with the land degradation and recovery and management of the commons.

As our first foray, over \$2000 worth of bricks were salvaged from waste previously dumped on the property and enough rubble was "cleaned" to provide material for 30 metres of compacted farm tracks, necessary before the onset of winter - some excellent "circular economy" in action. It is exciting for our staff and students to join the many volunteers, from all walks of life that establish and maintain thousands of trees planted annually at Forktree.

Wambana Service

In Year 9, students undertake a 35 day extended stay program known as 'Wambana', meaning knowledge and wisdom in the local Narungga language. Included in this program are community service initiatives, like the Minlagawi Gum Flat Restoration Project - a significant environmental and community project on the Southern Yorke Peninsula.

The project, which has been part of the Year 9 'Wambana' extended stay program for the past six years, sees our boys work with the local council, residents and community groups, including Yorke Peninsula Council, Nharangga Aboriginal Progress Association Inc, Minlaton and District Progress Association, Minlaton District Kindergarten and Southern Yorke Peninsula Landcare Group, to restore the biodiversity of the Gum Flat Reserve by removing introduced weeds, planting endemic species and building walking and cycling trails... and the occasional cubby house for the local Kindergarten students!

STRIKING A CHORD

Learning a musical instrument and playing in an ensemble is a worthy pursuit in itself, with more scientific studies emerging every year evidencing just how playing music benefits our brain and associated social, emotional and intellectual intelligence. And so, it is with good reason that many boys at the College engage in curricular and co-curricular music offerings, and enjoy the balance that it brings alongside their sporting and academic pursuits. While staff celebrate excellent results in competitions and top grades in Year 12 Music, it is a lifelong love of music and the arts that we feel most passionate about; tangible skills and perspectives that can enrich one's life for many years. For some young men, they are not waiting to finish school to put their talents into practice; they are out there across Adelaide making their mark on the music landscape right now.

Although these students are not the first Princes Men to engage in the wider music industry while still at school, the number of young men taking music beyond the College in recent times and the quality of their endeavours, certainly brings a sense of satisfaction to Music staff. While staff provide a foundation of skills and a supportive environment, it is boys like these featured here who set the tone and model for what is possible when you pursue any interest with courage and passion. Whether it is experiencing a live concert or enjoying a few chords at the piano years after school, a career in music or a bit of cash while studying, a lifelong connection to the arts is what we are after – and as you can see, many of our boys are well on the way.



RUNNING WITH SCISSORS

They might be referred to as 'Rock Band Blue' at school, where these students started jamming together, but it is hard to be at PAC for long and not hear about 'Running With Scissors'. This is partly because their stickers have appeared in all manner of places across campus (to the ire of staff at times), but it is mainly due to their energetic brand of rock, which the community have been fortunate to hear at numerous assemblies and concerts since 2018. They have performed at venues such as the Hotel Metro, Adelaide UniBar, The Jade, Crown and Anchor and more, and in June 2021 they released their self-titled debut EP (available on Spotify). Beyond school, Angus Porter (Year 12), Patrick Femia (Year 12) and Henry Norton (Year 11) aim to continue writing, recording and performing, with regional and interstate tours already in the pipeline.



ANGUS BRILL REED

For anyone who saw PAC's 2017 production of Oliver!, it was clear that a young Angus Brill Reed could command your attention on stage, with his vocal talents as the orphan Oliver wowing audience members. Now in Year 12 and a stalwart of Performing Arts at the College, Angus has been producing original music and performing in the broader community for many years. As an instrumentalist, vocalist and DJ, he traverses a wide range of musical styles and professional settings, and in 2020 he was the EDM Winner of the UK Songwriting Contest. With success in a host of original music contests in SA and abroad, Angus always has creative projects on the go (you'll find his music online) and looks forward to traveling with this music after graduating from PAC.



THE LANGLEY QUARTET

From rock to pop and now jazz, 'The Langley Quartet' was formed in January 2021 with Archie McEwen on saxophone, Max Thomas on keys, Henry Brill Reed on drums, and Ben Spitty on bass. Initially developed to work on traditional "trad" jazz, the group has expanded to play more modern standards, bossa nova and funk tunes. Over the past year, they have played at numerous venues, including the Capri Theatre, Southern Jazz Club, and the Adelaide Symphony Orchestra Grainger Studio. For these boys, the Quartet allows them to explore more music styles, to get paid work as entertainers, and to gain experience in the professional music industry. For quartet member Ben Spitty, his explorations in jazz composition led him to a first place in the Large Group Composition section of the ASME Young Composers Award in 2021, showing how opportunities and recognition can unfold for students once they take the leap to explore their creative interests beyond the classroom.




TONIX



JUST LET THEM PLAY...

One of the most notable memories I have of my childhood is discovering the emotions of sport. All of the emotions the joy, the glory, the pain...all of it!

From as early as I can remember, my brothers and I would envelop ourselves in games that helped us to develop as people. Not that we knew it at the time, but the games, played out like our lives depended on them, forged our character in a deep and meaningful way. Test matches, grand finals, moments we had seen on TV, and moments we made up ourselves.

Interestingly, our parents did not need to be present, in any mode, other than supervision, for this to be effective. Sure, they occasionally got drawn in to make a call (halt a brawl!) but rarely did they let their perceptions ruin what was a critical opportunity for us to learn skills of negotiation, dominance and submission, fair play, determination and most important of all, winning and losing.

Whether by design or otherwise, our parents let us sort things out. They let us succeed and they let us suffer. I cannot remember a single time that mum or dad made a decision to protect us from reality. Whether cutting or kind, we were told simply to "get on with it". Suffice to say there were no clean knees, no bruise-free encounters. We umpired ourselves and there were no cameras to catch or share the moments. Now they are just memories....but special ones.

It used to be about kids playing with kids. Now it seems to be about parents playing parents, through their kids. From what I can see, there are far too many parents who get over-involved in youth sports. And from a young age! Kids as young as five are being 'developed' to be elite athletes, with scant regard for natural and timely exploration and progression. Is it any wonder we have increasing levels of 'dropout' from sports.

I am not necessarily questioning the motives of parents. I am sure it is deep seated love that drives them to force the extra trainings ("if two is good, surely four is better!") and the longer seasons ("the pro's play all year round!") but the potential for burnout, both physical and (more importantly) emotional, is significant.

Do you need more convincing? It's everywhere! The next time you see kids playing sport without adults, stand back, watch and listen. You will notice that they pick even teams, develop highly complicated and unique rules, they sort out misdemeanours and umpiring, they play with spirit unbridled and for all the right reasons.

They argue, they fight, they disagree, then they connect, they laugh, and they fall in love with the game.



Acts of Kindness Project

On Friday 18 March, we had a getting-to-knowyou session for the Aboriginal student team, as we embarked on an Acts of Kindness Project. The Aboriginal students in the Preparatory School were able to meet the Middle and Senior School students, listen to music, and share a meal together. 

John Keeves (1977-1981)

John Keeves followed his father and other family members to Prince Alfred College and was a boarder from Mount Gambier from 1977 to 1981. He excelled academically during his time at school and won a number of prizes, including for overall academic excellence.

After school John completed degrees in Law with Honours and Economics at the University of Adelaide. He then pursued legal practice with Finlayson's, whilst also tutoring at university. Since 1993 he has been a partner of Johnson, Winter and Slattery, working as a Corporate and Commercial Lawyer. He has worked across a range of industries specialising in large and complex merger and acquisition transactions as well as a range of corporate governance and practice matters.

As well as being an Old Scholar, he is also a past parent, with sons James and Charles having attended the College. John served on the PAC Foundation Board from 2002 to 2009 and on the PAC Council from 2010 to 2020. This included six years as Chair from 2014 to 2019 inclusive.

John's combination of a formidable intellect, and his lawyer's training and experience, meant that he was always across the detail of whatever issue was being discussed. At the same

time, a good Chair does not dominate meetings, but ensures that every participant is not only allowed, but also encouraged, to make their own contribution. John would then sum up issues in the best possible way leading to agreed outcomes by consensus, without having to resort to voting.

John's passion for Prince Alfred College, and his ambition for the school, were always evident. He never shied away from the bold decisions that would best serve the College in the long-term.

John is another outstanding example of the best Princes Man. He is the best possible blend of principles and pragmatism. He is genuinely humble and grounded, and never motivated by ego.

Highly capable yet humble, understated but passionate about the things he believes in, Prince Alfred College is fortunate to have attracted the loyalty and dedication of this gentleman. John Keeves exemplifies the finest characteristics of the Princes Man and we are proud to acknowledge him.



Tom Keene (1989-1996)

Tom Keane attended Prince Alfred College from 1989 to 1996, following in the footsteps of cousins and family members across multiple generations. Tom was active in sport, in particular rowing and football, and in the performing arts. Tom's contributions were recognised with Arts Colours in 1995 and 1996, as a result of his work in leading the Tech crew of his time.

While at Princes, Tom's interest in technology began. Shortly after a Microsoft Windows 3.1 arrived at his house, on five, 3.5-inch floppy disks, Tom began to experiment. He learned to build applications on this operating system, which made it easier for friends and family to use computers.

This experience fuelled his interest in computer science, leading him to study for a degree in that discipline at the University of South Australia. Upon completion, Tom embarked on a career in Australia, building software for companies on top of Microsoft technology. Tom's career then led him to the United Kingdom, where he joined Microsoft Corporation, and, following several years in London, Tom moved to the United States, to continue building technologies for the company that he had loved as a child.

Today, Tom builds technologies that play a leading role in some of the planet's most complex, mission-critical, fullspectrum challenges, no matter where in the world they may exist. On any given day, those challenges might range from ensuring the security of data for national security agencies, to facilitating the faster movement of financial data across global markets.

Tom serves as the Corporate Vice President for Microsoft Azure, as one of Microsoft's top executives for Cloud Computing. In this role, he leads a rapidly growing organisation of several thousand engineers located across 25 countries worldwide. Tom and his team contribute to building and operating Microsoft's global collection of datacenters, computers, network fiber and gigawatts of energy to create the Microsoft Cloud.

Today, Tom lives in Seattle with his wife and two children. Amongst other personal passions, he actively works to advance medical research and provide support systems to help those impacted by cancer.






Old Reds Mentoring Program

One month after graduating from the College, I moved to the Gold Coast and accepted a place at Bond University in Exercise & Sports Science, planning to progress into the Doctorate of Physiotherapy Program. However, throughout the two years that succeeded this decision, my career vision changed more times than I've been surfing! What was physio, became psych, and then before I knew it, I was interviewing for postgrad medical school.

Now, I am completing my Masters in Science by research, launching a tech-driven mental health start-up, teaching, and podcasting... Managing this balance and the importance of doing so is just one lesson, amongst a plethora of others, which I have been so lucky to learn throughout the past two years outside of the classroom or my workplace. Such lessons predominantly emerged from my personal and professional mentors whose influence has been transformative. Learning from people, and not just paper, has been invaluable in my growth.

I hope you will consider the possibility of being involved, not only for the opportunity to remain connected to our Princes family, but also for the significant impact that being a mentor, or a mentee, can have on your life, and the lives of others.



CHESTER CLARKE

Since finishing my secondary education at Prince Alfred College, I took a unique journey of career choices in the form of Archaeology where I graduated from Flinders University in 2019. During my years at University and afterwards, I participated in contract Archaeology around the world working with indigenous people to protect cultural heritage in places such as the Amazon Rainforest in Brazil, Mongolia, Cambodia, Peru, Bolivia and Scandinavia/Europe.

In 2020, I won my dream role in Arnham Land, where I have been working in the stone country with traditional owners and indigenous rangers protecting and maintaining rock art sites. I work for Warddeken Land Management which supports three ranger stations and operates to protect 1 million hectares of indigenous controlled land. Not even 1% of this land has been surveyed for rock art sites so there is still a lot more work to do!

In my current role as Rock Art Project Officer, I work together with traditional owners and indigenous rangers to survey areas of interest for previously unrecorded sites using helicopters, Toyota troop carriers and Polaris: all-terrain

vehicles. It is believed that thousands of sites exist in the area in which we operate, and once each are rediscovered then it could present one of the greatest amass of cultural heritage in the world.

For indigenous people rock art is at the crux of the land and conveys stories and knowledge from thousands of years ago. The art paints pictures of species now extinct such as the Tasmanian tiger and holds meaning far beyond that of western conceptions. Working with such incredible people and community has been one of the best things I have ever done, and I look forward to working in the Northern Territory for as long as I can.

I look forward to my involvement in the Old Reds Mentoring Program.






Notable performers with the ball were James Cleggett with 3/30 and Charlie Griffin with 2/30.

It was a good season for the Cricket Club as a whole, with the D Grade also making their grand final, the A Grade making finals and the Division 3 T20 side also winning their competition earlier this month.

On field success was matched with a great season off field. The Adelaide Turf Cricket Association awarded PAOC the title of 2021/22 Club of the Year. Typically dominated by community clubs that also field junior teams, PAOC's win this season is the first time this award has been presented to an old scholars club.

The path to success

Jack Schipanski (2010) has travelled around the world playing tennis at the top level as a junior, and attended the University of Tennessee, one of the top 10 ranked tennis colleges in the US. These experiences have been enjoyable and eye-opening but one he regards as being his favourite was most recently being Ash Barty's hitting partner at this year's Australian Open.

Since Jack's junior tennis days he had known Ash as they competed in National tournaments and represented Australia at many international events. "The opportunity came about in 2020 during the Adelaide tournament when I bumped into Ash and her coach Craig Tyzzer by chance. I had grown up representing Australia with Ash in junior tournaments, so I had known her for a long time. On this occasion she had asked me to have a practice with her to help prepare for the upcoming tournament. This continued throughout the week, and after she won the 2020 Adelaide International, they asked me to join her team at the Australian Open in an official capacity. I was fortunate enough to continue with her team during her Adelaide international and Australian open campaign most recently in 2022."

Jack has recently completed his Level 2 Tennis Australia coaching accreditation and has been working on building a strong tennis culture across a number of standards at Prince Alfred College. "Coaching for me has provided more insight and a greater understanding of the game as a whole. Most recently, being a part of Ash's team was a great opportunity to gain insights for how the top tennis players go about preparing for matches, and to learn about their approach to competing and dealing with the pressures involved. Typically, Ash is a laid back person and is a pleasure to

work with. This is something that I find admirable considering the weight of expectation she carries, and the number of distractions she faces, particularly when playing in Australia. In every interaction she is kind with people and generous with her time, and always keen to have a chat.

Ash had a team of six people, including her coach, physiotherapist, mindset coach, fitness trainers and hitting partner. "My role as the hitting partner was to warm-up Ash on her match days, and to practice with her on the days between matches. To prepare for a match, we did a 20 minute hitting session two hours prior, followed by a customary game of cricket right before she plays. On an off day, we normally practice for 30 to 45 minutes, where we would work on strategies for Ash to use against her next opponent. During tournaments the priority is recovery, limiting the time on court to only what is necessary. By the time a major tournament comes around the hard work has been done, and it is a matter of finding the right mindset to be able to perform to near the best of her ability."

Prior to Ash's recent retirement, she became the first Australian since Christie O'Neil in 1977 to win the Women's Australian Open on home soil. "Sitting in the player's box as Ash won this year's Australian Open was an incredible experience. To see her create history, and to bring so much joy to everyone in the arena and watching at home was a special moment. Ash's success is a result of hard work and dedication over a long period of time, and to share these moments with her and her team, I consider myself very fortunate."


