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FROM THE HEADMASTER

Excitement. Trepidation. Determination. Enthusiasm. Nostalgia. Anticipation.

They are just some of the things I felt on learning I would be joining Prince Alfred College. Could I walk the walk? Would I be able to instil the principles I value in our students? How would my actions best reinforce PAC's values and traditions? Would I (and my family) thrive in a new city, new state, new school?

'Beginnings' are complicated. They unavoidably mean change, and some of us deal better with that than others. They might mean moving on from a comfortable, familiar place to somewhere that, well, isn't. They might mean learning new things, gaining new perspectives and fronting new challenges ... and the unknown can be discomforting for even the most confident of us.

But beginnings can also be exhilarating, and that is what I hope for our Year 12 students as they prepare to leave the school gates, our Year 6 students as they near their secondary school chapter, our Year 11 boys as they prepare for their final year and our 2023 Reception students as they start their journey in the 'big school'.

Certainly, what I've seen in the time since I arrived gives me every cause to be optimistic. Our boys, for the very great part, embody PAC's mission to create men of character, purpose and compassion. At each of the major events of the past eight weeks they have demonstrated the qualities needed to meet whatever 'beginning' might come their way.

Intercol was a week of willing intellectual and physical competition, but our debaters, footballers and chess players did not begin as spontaneous stars in their field. Over time, and with considerable effort and determination, they have learned to make flabby arguments unassailable, impossible marks possible and questionable strategies winners. They have learned even more important things along the way: how to embrace the spirit of an event, how to play hard and still play fair and the importance of encouraging their mates.

And yes, the performances in the musical *Rock of Ages* and the College's major concert, *The Story of Motown*, were simply outstanding. But what they really showcased were the results of hours and hours of practice and rehearsals, creative ingenuity, and collaboration. I am sure the beginning of these rehearsals was very different to the shows we saw at end!

Valedictory Day ends 13 years of schooling for Year 12 students, but it heralds new beginnings at university, in apprenticeships, travelling the world or working. Our Year 12s were also welcomed into the old scholars community at the Valedictory Dinner by the President of the Old Collegians' Association, Alan Letcher. The old scholars events in Term 3 provided me with a clear sense of the value placed on our students long after they leave the College – something we can be immensely proud of. I hope that in the future we can further leverage the knowledge and expertise of our past students to support current students as they transition into the tertiary sector and the workforce.

The sheer brilliance of the boys who achieved high distinctions in the Australian Mathematics Competition, and the astounding breadth of topics explored in the history journal and spoken of in the King's Speech Competition, illustrated yet again the willingness of many of our students to explore and explain – to begin something and see it through.



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But no matter how far our students have come from their early education, learning basic mathematic principles or how to move a rook, one thing is certain: there is always another beginning just around the corner.

That is where we are at with 'PAC 2033', an exploration of how PAC might look in the future. PAC 2033 will require input and consultation on multiple fronts: parents are joining me at a series of breakfasts where they can voice what matters most to them; a master planning survey has recently been completed by our parents and students and staff representatives have met with the Architects producing our new Master Plan. The Executive is already working closely with the College Council and Middle Leaders, and we have begun a review of some areas of the College's operations using our current Strategic Plan as a guiding framework. PAC 2033 will not be a case of change for change's sake - we are in a good place, so any change must add value - and we will continue to engage students, staff, parents and old scholars to make sure our approaches are informed by both broad and specific perspectives.

Our students and our school are on an ever-advancing continuum. In wise words of British wartime leader and statesman Winston Churchill:

'Now is not the end. It is not even the beginning of the end. But it is, perhaps, the end of the beginning.'

Beginnings can be complex and demanding, but they can lead to great things.









CRACKING THE CODE

Virtual Reality (VR) experiences, in which staff and students utilise the VR headsets to experience locations all over the world, have been valuable opportunities for our boys. Experiencing natural disasters, visiting the Barossa Goldfields, Ballarat and experiencing natural disasters are just some recent examples. Staff are developing their understanding of VR and how it can be utilised effectively across a range of curriculum areas and year levels throughout the school in the future.

Throughout 2022 the Preparatory school has continued to provide opportunities for boys to experience Virtual Reality, Robotics and to develop their coding skills to solve challenges.


Year 3 boys have been joining the Lunchtime Coding Club to work in small groups to build upon the work they have been doing in the lessons they have had. The boys are utilising a "Merge Cube" which provides Augmented Reality experiences.


Year 5 boys have been working with drones, coding them to complete a range of tasks in the coding and robotics room.

Buddy opportunities are provided for our Junior Primary boys; they work with older boys to build, code and enjoy WeDo2 Lego challenges. Lego Spike and EV3 extend our boys to solve "Real World" problems and also allows them to demonstrate their understanding of topics in the Year 6 Exhibition.

The Preparatory School Coding and Robotics Room is an updated space for the boys to work in. They enjoy their experiences and we continue to look for opportunities to build their exposure to these learning tools of the future.









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OUR AUSTRALIAN SPORTING REPRESENTATIVES

A perhaps little-known fact is that 2022 marks the twenty-year anniversary of one of the most iconic moments in Australian sports' history. For those who do not know, that is Australian speed skater Steven Bradbury, in the moment that he literally cruised from relative obscurity to gold medal glory at Salt Lake City in the 2002 Winter Games.

Steven Bradbury had competed at four Olympic Winter Games (Albertville 1992, Lillehammer 1994, Nagano 1998 and Salt Lake City 2002). Ultimately, the last man standing crossed the line in first place, while his competitors lay strewn across the ice attempting to make it to the finish, following a spectacular crash. Following the event there was a degree of scepticism about the legitimacy of Bradbury's success and, I am told to this day he still feels levels of unease about the nature of his win. But, to me, the real story of Steven Bradbury followed when he made the very simple but incredibly accurate statement: "I'll accept this gold medal. But not for the 90 seconds of the race - I'm going to take it for the 14 years of hard work...and for the honour I have in representing my country in doing that."

It is a rare distinction to represent your country – as behind it comes all of the commitment, doing little things like prioritising discomfort over comfort through hard training, having a disciplined diet, minimising time with family and friends or simply having less time for schoolwork.

The sacrifices that are made make the recognition of representing one's country the single greatest honour that can be bestowed upon a sportsperson.

In 2022, we have been fortunate to have had a group of boys attain the honour of becoming Australian representatives. Each of these boys displayed genuine commitment and excellence in gaining such opportunities and the College is proud of this and their fine character in representing themselves, their families and the College in such a way on the greatest stage!

RECONCILIATION SHARED CANVAS

How do you represent all that has been achieved at Prince Alfred College within the Reconciliation movement? While we can never truly measure the impact of having Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students and families participate as members of the Prince Alfred College community, we continue to celebrate the diversity of Indigenous cultures that continue to thrive across Australia.

This year Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students from across all year levels ran workshops with students to create something that truly reflects the diversity here at Prince Alfred College. This year's theme, "Be Brave and Make Change" helps us understand the commitment required to make true change within our communities. Being courageous and standing up for what we think is right looks different for everyone.

We often get lost in our own world here at Prince Alfred College; it is a truly beautiful place to come each day. We can forget though, how challenging it continues to be for many Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families around Australia and the disadvantage they face due only to their race.






To illustrate our diversity and the importance of family we asked students to think about all the important people in their lives, to think about how often we all need to be brave everyday so that meaningful change can be made. We asked students to record each of their important people onto a canvas, in the Kaurna season they were born in.

With hundreds of families and thousands of people recorded on the canvas we invited Peramangk and Kaurna Elder Uncle Ivan Tiwu-Copley to assist the Aboriginal students in creating a narrative that links all people together, recognising the significant Kaurna history of this very site that Prince Alfred College now occupies.

You will see the four distinct seasons of Warltati, Parnati, Kudlila and Wirltuti represented with the same colours of the School Houses, Waterhouse, Watsford, Cotton and Taylor. There are four significant meeting places represented, interestingly, also seen on Google Maps. If you look carefully, you will see people surrounding each meeting place and surrounding them are tarndanya (red kangaroo) tracks with white marks representing ancestors and the traditional name for Adelaide Tarndanya. Finally, you will see a river going from one side of the canvas to the other, representing the now hidden river running underneath our campus.

While the canvas is a shared artwork created by everyone, it is led by Aboriginal knowledges and perspectives and has now become a valuable gift to the College community.

DEVELOPING Early Literacy

Term 3, in the Four Year Old Rooms, is the commencement of our formal phonics curriculum in the Early Learning Centre.

The children experience the Heggerty and Jolly Phonics programs. They focus on the initial sounds of the letters and aim to develop the children's understanding of rhyme and syllables as well. These are the building blocks for early literacy. Yet pre-literacy does not start here, literacy skills are not taught in isolation in the early years or restricted to formal programs.

Children are hardwired to play. Play is not an impediment to learning but a vehicle to engage children in the development of lifelong skills. Activities such as puzzles and craft enable the children to learn and develop their knowledge in a fun and interactive way. Additionally, they are wonderful instruments to support collaboratively learning. Jasper and Oscar worked together on a puzzle.


Jasper:	This is too tricky.

Jasper: Ok. Where does this go? Watermelon!

Oscar: On top of V. We can do it. We were stuck, but not now we know how to do it.

To further embed their understanding, the children take part in plays and creative role-play. This develops the children's oral language and allows them the opportunity to enhance their vocabulary. As part of Sound of the Week "s", the children retold the story of "Stone Soup." The children took the role of characters within the story, using their creativity and risk-taking to add ingredients to the "soup." A role-play area was set up to continue the idea with a campfire. This enabled the children to continue to rehearse and practise their language in their free play. This is particularly important for children who have English as a second language as children can learn risk-free from each other. The children also use craft activities such as painting silhouette sunsets and making springy snakes.

Altogether, this builds a literacy rich environment for the children and hopefully sets them up to become confident speakers, readers and writers.

This year we proudly opened the new Galatea Playground. The opening featured a special pirate dress-up day where the students and staff of the Preparatory School got into the day's spirit, donned their best pirate costume, and gave a "hardee" welcome to our new and improved play space.

Based on the idea of a shipwreck, the boys helped *Climbing Tree* designers to create an area that was both physically challenging and would spark their imagination. Early on, it was clear that they had created a space that did just that.

Countless studies have concluded that physical and imaginative play greatly assists children in their physical, social, emotional, and intellectual development. While physical play can differ from imaginative play, we have created a space where boys can combine both in their engagements with each other.

Through their physical play, the boys have benefited from increasing their muscular strength in their arms, core, and legs. They can be seen jumping from a height, clinging, and scrambling over the traversing wall, or navigating the monkey bars and rope course. The uneven surfaces and platforms to jump to and from, help the boys strengthen their core muscles, legs, and confidence in their play. The boys run and chase each other over the play spaces, breaking into a sweat as they dodge one another up the slopes and through the tunnel. Their physical play is great to witness, knowing that as they play, they are improving and developing their muscular and bone strength and cardiovascular and mental health.

As they engage in this physical play, a great deal of role and imaginative play is taking place. The boys can be seen acting out stories from their favourite shows, books, or movies. Characters are adopted, and roles are played. They always seem to have a challenge to solve or a treasure to find, and the new play space provides the ideal backdrop for their adventures. As they create their play, they engage in several highly beneficial activities. They stimulate their language development. Children love to describe and narrate what is happening. Their conversations enhance their vocabulary and language skills. Their social development is enhanced as they learn to share, take turns, and work together. Play helps them to solve problems and understand relationships as they experiment with social boundaries. They improve their social skills through imaginative play and become more connected, confident, and self-reliant. As a result, they build better relationships with their peers.

Their imaginative play encourages them to connect with their world, create stories, explore new ideas, and make their own rules incorporating what they have learned. Through imaginative play, the boys are developing their problem-solving skills, negotiating who gets to play what role to re-enact real-life situations. Their play, both physical and imaginative, encourages the freedom to take risks. Risks that are essential in gaining their independence, becoming critical thinkers and that sometimes end in failure, another crucial step on the path to learning.

The new pirate ship play space was added to be a unique meeting place for the boys, but one with a hidden purpose. While they play, they develop. While they play, they learn. Each time they use the space, a challenge is overcome and a new one set. This new space has exceeded our expectations for how it would change our boys' play, development, and learning.

We look forward to seeing the benefits it brings to our boys in the years to come.

SCHOOL ACADEMIC JOURNALS: A RICH CULTURAL LEGACY

One of the important academic cultural traditions at Prince Alfred College is the student driven academic journals that are published every year in the Senior School. Current publications include Shades of Red (English - 1996) along with the Science (1945) and History (2017) Journals and Principia (Philosophy).

Teachers and students come together around common interests to organise, connect, curate, and publish the intellectual pulse of the students at Princes.

Student agency has been a crucial aspect of the academic journal experience. In September each year, the English Journal, Shades of Red, is published. Every edition has a distinctive cover, reflecting the unique nature of each committee and the submissions that leap off every page. Boasting the biggest editorial team of any journal, becoming part of the literary scene is hotly contested with students going through an interview process with members of the English faculty, Nick Iadanza (Academic Leader) and Melody Marshall. The publication has continued to evolve

over time with students and teachers now submitting both poetry and photography.

Individual students can make a difference. The School *History Journal* (2017) was started by IB Diploma student Minrang Li as part of his CAS (Creativity, Activity and Service) experience. He saw the opportunity to curate the amazing research and in-depth historical analysis his fellow students were doing in History. As a result of his determination, energy, and leadership, some five years later the journal continues to thrive under the stewardship of a new generation of inspired and academically minded young historians.

The teamwork, creativity and project-based nature of all of these

publications offers a rich learning experience for our senior students in a different mode from their dayto-day learning. These experiences are not connected to an Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR). For the many students who help drive these publications, their investment of time and energy is tangible authentic service and pride in their school, which provides a positive message to younger students and archives the learning and subject passions of each generation.

In this sense these academic journals are a powerful cultural legacy. George Bartley, student editor of this year's edition of *Principia* and member of the *History Journal* editorial team, reflected the pride senior students take in being part of maintaining

Our Princes Men Gallery honours old scholars who have excelled in their respective fields. Recently, we recognised Tom Clarnette (1976-1982).



Thomas Clarnette (1976-1982)

Thomas Clarnette commenced at Prince Alfred College in 1976 in Year 6 following in the steps of his father David Clarnette (1952) and brother, Richard Clarnette (1979).

Thomas achieved excellent academic results in his senior years at PAC achieving five As on his Year 12 report for Maths 1 & 2, Physics, Chemistry and Latin. His reports contain many glowing comments from his teachers with the tutor comment on his Year 12 report reading as follows:

'A Prefect of the School and Monitor of his tutor group, he has given valuable assistance. In his studies he has proved to be a serious, zealous and conscientious worker with first-class results."

Thomas was awarded the Rob Scholarship in 1981 and the Longbottom Scholarship in 1982 and was presented a Year 12 Academic Excellence Award. During his time at PAC Thomas not only excelled academically but also enjoyed a number of sporting successes. He was a member of the Combined Athletics Team in his final year and took out 1st place in the 110m hurdles at the School Championships. Thomas was awarded Colours for both athletics and cricket in his senior years. He was Captain of the Intercollegiate Cricket Team in 1982 and his Prefect profile from the Chronicle that year illustrates his passion for the sport:

Name – Thomas Clarnette Characteristics – Very puny Likes – Fertilizer Dislikes – Weed Killer Favourite Team – Princes 1st XI Ambition – To make double figures for Princes 1st XI

This ambition was realised in Term 3 of that year when he made 20 against Sacred Heart College, 21 against Westminster, 42 against Pulteney Grammar School and 30 in the Intercol. Thomas graduated from the University of Adelaide Medical School in 1988, before completing his surgical training in both South Australia and Victoria. He went on to paediatric surgery and at the conclusion of his training undertook three and a half years of post-fellowship training in the United Kingdom. This included 18 months at Kings College Hospital, London, specialising in hepatobiliary surgery in children, which remains a key area of interest.

In 2018, Thomas was part of the medical team who successfully separated 18 month old conjoined twins Nima and Dawa Pelden from Bhutan.

Thomas currently lives in Victoria where he is a Senior Consultant Paediatric Surgeon at Royal Children's Hospital, Monash Children's Hospital, Sunshine Hospital and Goulburn Valley Health.

In February 1919, Colin Hassell at the age of eight commenced as a Preparatory School student. Little did Colin know that this would become a life-long connection as a parent, grandfather, PAOCA President, College architect and culminate as the Oldest Old Old Boy at the annual assembly. How proud he would be of the fourth generation of his family who now attend PAC.

Colin's link with the College did not cease upon his death in 2007 (aged 98) as his wife had a vision to give boys the opportunity to attend the College through a scholarship in his name. During her later years, Marjorie 'Spook' Hassell derived great satisfaction that the Colin Hassell Scholarship was fulfilling her vision. Her death in 2018 realised an unexpected bequest which now enables up to fourteen boys to attend Prince Alfred College.

Currently thirteen boys are supported by the Colin Hassell Scholarship, and Barb and David Hassell (1953-62) have met weekly for five weeks to hear from each of the boys, how they are enjoying College life and to get to know them. Some of the boys are old hands at these morning teas but importantly six boys who commenced in 2022 have now had the opportunity to meet with the Hassell's, and to appreciate their link with the Colin Hassell Scholarship.

Year 12 recipient Ryan Schwarz has got to know David Hassell well and he and David put into words their thoughts on what the Colin Hassell Scholarship means to them. The outstanding generosity of the Hassell family has provided me with the opportunity to attend this excellent college. It has opened doors, pushed me further and most importantly it has enabled me to be acquainted with the exceptional people that are Mr and Mrs Hassell. Their warm smiles and genuine interest in my time at the school has never ceased to make me feel welcome. Now, as I leave the College, my aim is to ensure that I make the very most of their generosity, and the opportunity they have provided me so that they may look back knowing they have had a positive influence on my life.

Following the service guests enjoyed morning tea in the Piper Pavilion.






