From the Headmaster

2020 has of course been dominated by the universal experience of our response to the coronavirus pandemic. Whilst I am sure we are all looking forward to a time when this will no longer dominate every news bulletin on the media, workplace meetings and everyday conversations, as we move into the latter part of 2020 it is appropriate to reflect on the lessons learnt.

Here in South Australia, we have of course done remarkably well in many respects in managing and responding to COVID-19. Whilst the impact on many areas of society, and indeed many families within the PAC community, has been profound, the College has been able to operate reasonably well throughout, whilst complying with the relevant restrictions.

Our period of remote learning was relatively brief, with one week at the end of first term and another week at the beginning of second term, whilst also taking an additional week of holidays. We resolved prior to commencing remote learning that we would operate either fully face-to-face, or full remote learning, but would not attempt to do both simultaneously. When we returned to school at the beginning of the second week of second term, we had 97% attendance, slightly higher than we normally register, indicating the success of our approach.

Some of the greatest challenges we faced related to our boarders. With almost 20 interstate boarders, they experienced significant difficulty with quarantine periods, sometimes going in both directions. When the borders were fully closed, some were unable to return to school at all. Fortunately, it now appears that students attending boarding schools are in effect exempt from these requirements, which is a great relief to all involved.

The other group at risk has of course been our international students. With over 20 international boarding students, we have kept our Boarding House open since January. Our staff have done a superb job, not only in keeping the Boarding House open throughout each of the term breaks, but also in providing a range of activities for the boys to enjoy active and productive holidays. We are currently planning for the Christmas holidays, when it is likely again that some of the boys will be unable to go home.

As we have progressively returned to normality, we have spent some time reflecting on the lessons learnt from the experience of dealing with COVID-19. We have developed valuable experience in operating remote learning, which potentially has applications for our own students and also even in preparing students who will join us in the future. We have found a number of activities that we can conduct successfully through Zoom, including some tutoring, meetings, and interviews for new students and staff.

Interestingly, in the last couple of months we have seen a significant surge of interest in enrolment at PAC, with our Admissions Office dealing with a large number of new enquiries. It appears that the COVID-19 experience has caused some families to reflect upon the education of their children in greater depth and seek an alternative that best meets their needs.

But my overriding impression of this period will be our first day back at school in the second week of second term. The sheer delight of the boys at being back at school, re-connecting with their friends and teachers, was almost palpable. At that point, they had been on remote learning or on holiday for at least five weeks. Although they had been connecting during the remote learning period through their Zoom classes, and had no doubt remained in touch with close friends through social media, it became clear that there is no substitute for actually being together.

There was a sense of gratitude and appreciation for being back together again. And as we progressively resumed our regular activities, including sports practices and then fixtures, performing arts rehearsals and then performance, Chapel services and assemblies, the pleasure of all being together, doing the things we enjoy, was only reinforced.

For many years now we have regularly heard predictions of the end of schools as we know them. Online lessons, with their flexibility and ease of access, have been predicted to take over. But these ideas have not taken into account the importance of the social aspects of schooling. Yes, our focus is first and foremost on the academic education of our students, but this is best conducted within an environment which provides social contact, structures and framework.

Moreover, schools which provide a sense of belonging and corporate identity, based on an enduring set of values, enhance the educational experience and provide a positive, supportive environment in which our students can learn and flourish. The school becomes much more than just a place to do lessons, but offers the kind of holistic experience that PAC has always aspired to. COVID-19 has shown us the true value of the kind of education that a school like Princes offers.

An all-round education

When I meet with students and families considering enrolment at Prince Alfred College, I consistently refer to the emphasis we place on providing an all-round education for our students. In particular, I speak of three key areas – Academics, Pastoral Care and Co-curricular. I also make the point that no one area is more important than the other.

We are a school so, naturally, we place a strong emphasis on academic performance and enabling students to achieve their best academically. Pastoral Care is the 'oil of the learning' and few would argue the importance of this given that relationships and emotional processes affect how and why we learn.

Co-curricular activities are equally as important and, whether sport or the arts, the myriad of activities in this space provide boys with the opportunity to take personal responsibility, learn teamwork as well as other important skills such as resilience.

We focus on these core areas as we believe these elements are central to an all-round education. Some, however, continue to focus on the notion that the sole aim of education is to prepare students for jobs in the global workforce that may not yet have been created. At Prince Alfred College we aspire to more than this, as a single emphasis on achieving success often equates to a life beyond school that revolves solely around work, material goods and unhealthy lifestyle habits.

It is essential that an all-round education helps our students learn to live more consciously and to be mindful of the positive relationships that they have with their friends, family and teachers. The easy option is to simply focus on just one area, rather than helping them to learn to enjoy life's rich tapestry of experiences. Success should not be measured by grades alone but by one's influence on those around them and one's contribution to

make the world a better place. To live a meaningful life requires a willingness to learn, to lead and to serve others, and to develop a strong sense of self-worth. Striking the balance between purposeful and meaningful work and a lifestyle that is within one's means is key, and an all-round education provides a strong foundation in this regard.

An exciting vision for the Prep School

A new chapter for the Preparatory School began this Semester. After review of our teaching and play spaces, the decision was made to spruce things up. Before any work began, we looked at what we wanted to achieve in each space and considered our philosophy on why we were making these changes. The areas marked for improvement or redevelopment in Phase One are the Preparatory School classrooms, art room, robotics lab, Ningana and Robertson computer labs and the Junior Primary playground.

We have identified the need to increase space for the boys' learning in the classrooms. We want to provide flexible seating in the learning spaces, with more soft furnishings and space to move. We also want to create key teaching areas in each room that can be the focus for instruction and interaction during whole-of-class time. We have decided to redevelop the locker areas to create additional learning space and design a teaching wall to provide teachers with a high-quality display, recording and technology space. The new design will increase the boys' available space by 20% and allow them to stand, sit at tables or sit on the floor as they collaborate and learn.

As we are now a 1:1 iPad school we no longer need computer labs. The Ningana lab will be repurposed into a shared learning space where boys from different classes can work together. It will be furnished with a variety of sitting areas to promote collaborative learning for the oldest boys in the Preparatory School.

We will be relocating the art room to the current AV room location beside the Preparatory School Library. This space is much larger and will be best suited to assist in the provision of the high-quality art experiences we want our boys to have.

The robotics lab has been a wonderful addition to our school. The experience of building and programming robots is one that all the boys seem to enjoy. We will be adding new storage and work benches to the existing space to maximise the boys' opportunities and experience in this field.

The final piece of the redevelopment for Phase 1 is the building of a new Junior Primary playground. Working with Climbing Tree, who designed and built the Mukanthi Nature Playspace at Morialta Conservation Park among others, we are completely re-imagining this space. We know children of today play differently from how we did. We want a play space that challenges them physically and builds strength in their arms, back, core and legs. We want a space where they have to assess risk and that engages their imagination. We will be consulting with the boys and staff, and sharing our ideas with parents as the project progresses.

All of these new initiatives should provide wonderfully engaging learning and play spaces that will capture the interest and imagination of our boys and contribute to the high-quality teaching and learning of our school.

Developing early literacy

Skills learned at a very young age have a lasting impact on a child's development. Getting the environment right for children to develop these skills is so important. We take great pride in how we have designed the learning environments and opportunities from the Early Learning Centre (ELC) through to the Preparatory School Reception classes. This approach to early literacy skill development has long-term benefits for the children who come through our school.

In the ELC, we aim to develop children's oral language skills by encouraging them to talk a lot, to tell stories, share news, and talk with adults and their classmates. We ask them questions to get them to extend their answers. We want to help them sequence events and re-tell stories they know. All of this oral language

work has a purpose. We know that oral language skills have a direct link to a child's literacy development and their ability to read and write. By engaging them in talk we are building a foundation for English skills to further develop later in their schooling.

Early building blocks are important. The more children understand and apply their learning, the better. We teach Jolly Phonics in the ELC and Reception classes. This synthetic phonics approach gives children concrete strategies for remembering the sounds of each letter. By grouping the letters together, we teach children right from the beginning that letters and sounds can be combined to spell words. These early phonics skills help children grow into confident readers and spellers.

Reading is often seen as the measurement of a child's literacy skills. We see it as an important skill that develops as part of our overall approach. From an early age, we immerse children in print. Objects are labelled in the classroom and children see words and their names all around their environment. Teachers share big books with the children who naturally begin to see that the marks on a page make words, and that words are combined to create sentences. When a child is ready, we begin a structured reading development program with them. Teachers will sit with a child, give them a simple book and start the formal part of reading instruction. Children quickly learn the high-frequency words that they regularly see in the books they read, and fluency and understanding then develop.









Learning to write has its own journey. Linked closely to phonics and reading, it begins with mimicking the writing that children see. A child will begin by simply making marks on paper. They may tell an adult what their marks represent. These simple marks are the first step in a child's writing development. As they progress, a child moves from left to right as they mark-make. They will then begin to place random letters on the page, and then eventually letters that represent the sounds they hear in the words they want to spell. Often you will see their name appear in their writing, usually the first word they learn to spell, and maybe a full stop. From there, as their phonics and reading skills develop and as they learn to read more high-frequency words, a child's writing skills progress.


A child's early literacy development is a gradual process supported by teachers and parents. Exposure to a plethora of opportunities to talk, mark-make, and to see print in their environment sets them up for future success. It also allows them to learn these very important skills in a natural manner, encouraging them to be confident learners. The bridge between our ELC and the Preparatory School Reception classes is key. The seamless program which runs across these two phases of the school ensures our children continue to grow through our consistent approach, designed to provide the best outcomes and an excellent foundation for lifelong learning.

Lifelong learning

As teachers we are expected to have all the answers. For every hand that is raised, there is knowledge to impart and order to be restored. The gap between what is known and what is not must be closed. However, is that even possible? The lifelong pursuit of closing the gaps is what I call 'the joyful impossibility'. As a teacher I have come to find comfort, and even excitement, in the gaps. Only once you truly begin researching something do you realise how much more there is to learn. Knowledge begets more knowledge.

We need to extend the students' learning as far as we possibly can in the relatively brief time they are with us. Once they leave high school, they should be ready to keep moving forward on their learning journey even with the knowledge that there is no end beyond the horizon. To quote Einstein, 'Wisdom is not a product of schooling, but the lifelong attempt to acquire it'.

As an English teacher, a fun goal to set students is to read all the works of a particular author. Complete their oeuvre. We all love Nineteen Eighty-Four, but how does our understanding grow when we consider Orwell's own experiences in Down and Out in London and Paris? Of Mice and Men is enhanced when one finds haunting parallels to Steinbeck's Cannery Row. Understanding an author's text with all their other works waiting in the mental wings elevates educational discussions and reinforces the constant drive to learn more.


After I told my class that I completed Jane Austen's back catalogue, we collectively set my next challenge: all of Barbara Kingsolver's novels. So, where did it lead me? Prodigal Summer led to researching migratory shifts of East American coyotes. The Lacuna prompted a renewed interest in Frida Khalo's art and its intersection with revolutionary Leon Trotsky. The Poisonwood Bible reopened my connection to Sub-Saharan literature, something I had not visited since my university days reading Achebe and Coetzee. However, more important than completing the goal (thanks, isolation) was the fact that I discovered new gaps waiting to be filled. The attempt to fill them has only widened the chasm. That is the point.

There are plenty of academic challenges for the boys at Princes. The inaugural student book club 'Shades We've Read' is now up and running, the Academic Extension program has gone from strength to strength and the Bletchley Club is engaging students in comparative linguistics. Wherever the boys turn, new areas of interest are waiting to emerge, and the knowledge web spools out even further.

The next goal I am setting my students is to complete the Shakespeare plays they have not already read. To echo the words of Macbeth, this lifelong journey to fill the gaps with their various tangents may take them 'tomorrow, and tomorrow, and tomorrow...to the last syllable of recorded time', however, that seems pretty joyful to me.

Careers

While 2020 has been an extraordinary year in many ways, we have remained committed to providing opportunities for boys to explore a variety of career pathways. Although we were not able to hold our Careers Expo in April, we have been fortunate to be able to welcome guest speakers from a variety of industries, who have provided insight and inspiration to our students.

In September, we were joined by Old Red and current parent Darin Lovett (PAC 1987), Director of Space at the South Australian Space Industry Centre. Darin spoke about his career pathway, the challenges of building a sustainable space industry for South Australia, and the emerging employment opportunities in the sector. Darin then joined Year 11 IB Physics students in class for a more detailed discussion.

Further insights into careers in Science were provided through a series of lunchtime talks run by the Science faculty. Three staff members, who had previously been employed in industry, spoke on a range of issues, from gene therapy to industrial chemistry and dark matter. Over 100 boys attended the talks, which were very well received.

Later that month, Professor Nigel Bean (PAC 1983), Chair of Applied Mathematics at the

University of Adelaide, provided insight into careers in mathematics. He also gave a fascinating talk on the epidemiology of COVID, which challenged students to consider how mathematics could be used to solve real-world problems.

At a time when COVID, among other global dynamics, has drastically reshaped the economy and the labour force, talks from industry leaders offer valuable perspectives into 'real world' careers, as well as jobs of the future. As a strand of our careers program, they assist boys in making informed decisions about their future career pathways, as well as inspiring them to consider new possibilities. In the words of Heraclitus, 'The only thing that is constant is change'. Through our careers program, and the broader educational offering at Princes, we strive to equip students for that certainty.

King's Speech

On 15 September, we held the annual King's Speech Competition to acknowledge and celebrate the achievements of Lionel Logue, who attended Prince Alfred College from 1889 to 1896.

Now in its tenth year, the King's Speech Competition sees Princes men from Years 6 to 12 battle it out in their respective heats for a place in the finals, where they perform one prepared and one impromptu speech each before an audience of parents, students, staff and adjudicators for the honour of being named best speaker and receiving the Lionel Logue Award.

All nine finalists gave outstanding speeches, demonstrating a high level of skill in both the construction and delivery of their speeches. PAC entered two teams in each of the competitions and the PAC Division 1 Red team, Captained by Preshaan Thavarajah, recorded a perfect score throughout the six rounds played. Well done chess teams!

Red & White






















Performing Arts

The 2020 Whole School Production, One Man, Two Guvnors by Richard Bean, left the audience in stitches as promised. After working on this project since the beginning of the year and juggling COVID restrictions, we were finally granted the window to perform this hilarious fast-paced farce.

Based on Carlo Goldoni's Commedia dell'arte classic, The Servant of Two Masters, playwright Richard Bean has cleverly remastered One Man, Two Guvnors and relocated the setting to the British seaside town of Brighton in 1963. One Man, Two Guvnors traced a convoluted storyline of the criminal underworld in the East End in a cat and mouse chase for money and love. In amongst the miscommunication and deception was Francis Henshall, who's holding down two jobs and spends the duration of the play keeping one guvnor away from the other to maximise his chances of collecting double the pay.

At Prince Alfred College, we are lucky to have boarders from a range of backgrounds. Our boys come from vast station properties, remote indigenous communities and rural country towns. We also have students from as far abroad as Japan, Taiwan, Thailand, Malaysia, China, Qatar and Hong Kong. With 150 boarders we are the largest boys' boarding school in South Australia and our boys are proud to represent a significant proportion of the student population.

Boarding life provides a unique opportunity to build friendships, often across year levels, and our boarders certainly value their shared experiences as a Prince Alfred College boarder. Life in the boarding house is diverse and varied with our boys participating in a wide array of activities and events.

Our boarders are grateful for the high level of support they receive from the College community. Teachers and co-curricular staff provide wonderful experiences for our students and allow them to extend themselves inside and outside the classroom. Day boys and their families provide friendship and care, transportation to social and sporting events, as well as a place to stay when boys feel like a break from boarding life. Boarding house staff provide ongoing care for each student, facilitate activities and contribute to making the boarding house a second home.

For a number of our Boarders, to attend Princes is to follow in the footsteps of their fathers, grandfathers and other family members. While our boarding families may be one step removed geographically, there is a strong sense of community amongst these families, and their support contributes in no small part to the boys' success and happiness – from the late night call home, to the regular deliveries in the mail, or the six hour round trip to play a home game at the weekend.


- · Marlon Motlop, a wise Aboriginal leader, led an insightful cultural professional development session for staff;

Professional learning

Prince Alfred College is committed to the provision of outstanding professional development opportunities for all staff, including attendances at conferences and workshops, participation in leadership programs, and completion of higher degrees. Staff are encouraged to identify programs which meet their individual development needs; in parallel, the College identifies and develops tailored initiatives which support the growth in organisational culture and furthers educational outcomes. Although external professional development opportunities were curtailed this year as a result of COVID, two key programs offered at Prince Alfred College were the Developing Influential Leaders and new Master of Education Program.

Now in its third year, the Developing Influential Leaders Program is offered through our Hartley Institute. The course, which is aimed at people currently in, or aspiring to, middle management positions, was co-facilitated by College staff with the support of Steve Lacy of Leading Teams. Fourteen staff took part in the program, which offered a blend of individual and group activities focussed on developing self and others, and provided a unique opportunity to develop additional skills and to spend meaningful time with colleagues. In addition, participants benefited from informative sessions run by College Executive staff on topics including Governance and Financial Management.

A tailored Master of Education Program, co-designed with the University of Adelaide, was introduced in 2019 and continued this year. Participants from across the College came together for two two-day intensive classes held in our Professional Development Centre.

From the Archives

The Prince Alfred College Archives is a significant and valuable collection of tangible cultural heritage, which documents the unique history of school life at our College. Donated material adds to the College's rich narrative and ensures that the College's research and stories are preserved for the benefit of both current and future generations.

The International Cap of Former Headmaster Dunning OBE

The College Archives have been fortunate to receive a set of very special items. Recently gifted to us by the former Supreme Court Justice, the Honourable Bruce Debelle AO QC, the International New Zealand Cricket uniform of former Headmaster J.A. Dunning, along with the generous gift of mannequins on which to display them, will be a treasured piece of cultural heritage in our collections.

John (Jack) Angus Dunning OBE MA (Oxon), MSc (NZ), PAC Headmaster 1949-1969

February 1949 saw the beginning of a new chapter in the history of Prince Alfred College when Mr J. A. Dunning took over the leadership of the School after Mr Ward's retirement. By all accounts, the School heartily welcomed Mr Dunning, his wife and their two daughters, Beverley and Barbara. Mr Dunning came to us as a great all-rounder. He was a first-class scholar, a Test cricketer, a fine teacher and administrator, and was known for his strong Christian principles.

School Captain David Prest reported in the 1949 Chronicle: "One can already feel that in

Mr. Dunning, we have a man who will keep this School great and that the following memorable lines will be as true during his leadership as ever before, "Princes all the world over, Hold her inviolate name, You can wager your last drop of blood, Sir, That Princes are playing the game..."

Dunning was born at Leigh, Auckland, New Zealand, and received his primary education at Ti Point Primary School. From there he proceeded to Auckland Grammar School where he matriculated in 1919 to enter Auckland University College. In 1922 he obtained his B.Sc. in advanced Chemistry and Mathematics, and the next year was on the staff of John McGlashan College, Dunedin. At the same time, he continued his studies at the University of Otago, where he obtained his M.Sc. with honours in Mathematics in 1924.

From 1914-19 he was awarded four scholarships and in 1925 achieved the great honour of being chosen as New Zealand's Rhodes Scholar. The years 1925-28 saw Mr Dunning at New College, Oxford, where in the final school of Mathematics he graduated M.A. with honours and gained a blue in both hockey and cricket. Returning from Oxford, Mr. Dunning continued

teaching at John McGlashan College in Dunedin until 1939, when he was appointed Principal of The Scots College, Queensland.

Mr Dunning was described as 'admirably equipped' for the position of Headmaster. He was a fine sportsman and was twice selected for the New Zealand Cricket Test Team to play against England in New Zealand and to tour in England in 1937. Although cricket was his main sport, he was very successful in hockey, rugby, football and golf.

Mr Dunning made full use of his talents in other activities. While at Auckland University College he was secretary of a number of unions and clubs, and in 1927 was the New Zealand delegate to the World Conference in Rome of the International Confederation of Students.

Mr Dunning placed great emphasis on good manners, promptness and alertness. His intense interest in the sport of the School was greatly admired, as well as his firm insistence on a high standard in schoolwork. In the upper part of the School especially, Mr Dunning quickly got to know the boys and seems to have had the power to assess their interests and abilities.

Former Supreme Court Justice, the Honourable Bruce Debelle AO QC

Born in Woodville on 25 June 1938, Debelle grew up with parents in Woodville, Port Pirie and Tamworth. He attended St Peter's College on a scholarship and went to study Law at Adelaide University:

"I came from a family which had no previous association with the law. In fact, I was the first person in the family to go to university, and so I guess it (Supreme Court Bench) was out there in the dream of fond hopes, but not likely to be achieved." The Honourable Bruce Debelle AO QC,4 July 2014.

Despite being an Old Blue himself, Debelle is associated with the Dunning family by his marriage to the daughter of J.A. Dunning, Barbara.

It is wonderfully fitting that our Archives can now both celebrate this generous addition to our collection and admire the contextual links to our School's heritage through the legacy of these two, high achieving, remarkably humble men. I plan to display the uniform, along with photographs and two New Zealand Cricket blazers worn by Headmaster Dunning, when he played cricket for New Zealand 1933-1937 (four Tests).

Donation of the Painting "Come unto Me" (Suffer the Children) by Ainsley Roberts (1950)

This superb original oil painting "Come unto Me" (Suffer the Children) by recognised South Australian Artist, Bertram Ainsley Roberts (1911-1993) was once installed in the study of Rev. Robert Earnest Stanley. Rev. Stanley studied his ministry at Prince Alfred College (1909-1910). He was the President of the Methodist Conference (1951-1952), Member of the College Council (1951-1955) and

PAOCA Football Club Member.

Ainsley Roberts' most recognisable work is his portrait of the Aboriginal elder Gwoja Tjungurrayi (better known as 'One Pound Jimmy') which appears in the 'Dreamtime series' books, perhaps better known as the design on the Australian Two Dollar coin.

The granddaughters of Rev. Stanley, Miriam Rechner and her sister Diana visited the College on Friday 29 May to present the painting, including splendid new framing and accompanying plaque. These are now installed in the Eric Freak Memorial Chapel.

Princes Men Gallery

On Thursday 27 August, we were delighted to induct Old Collegian, Jeffery Mincham AM, into the Princes Men Gallery, in recognition of his contribution and acclaim as an artist and ceramicist.

Jeff was a Boarder at Prince Alfred College in his final year of school in 1969. He quickly made the most of available opportunities, with a number of notable achievements. In just one year, Jeff took up rowing and rowed in the second VIII, was Dux of his class, became President of the Senior Debating Club, was a Troop Leader in the Scouts, wrote the winning entry in the Kenneth Harley Memorial Short Story Competition, had a poem published in the 1969 Chronicle and was the first student ever to complete Year 12 Art at PAC.

Jeff is one of Australia's most prominent and influential ceramic artists. He studied at the South Australian School of Art and the Tasmanian School of Art. He has been a guest lecturer at over 100 workshops in summer schools across Australia, the United Kingdom, USA and New Zealand. Jeff has had 86 solo exhibitions since 1976 in Australia. New Zealand and the USA and is the winner of many awards and prizes nationally and overseas. He has been a judge in over 20 major art and ceramic awards throughout

Australia and New Zealand and is a member of many arts-related advisory panels.

Jeff's work is represented in over 100 permanent public collections and all major State and regional galleries in Australia and prominent International collections such as The National Gallery of Australia in Canberra, Parliament House Canberra, Government House in South Australia, The Australian Chancery in Saudi Arabia, Aberystwyth Art Centre in Wales, The National Galleries of Malaysia and Taiwan, The State Collection of Hawaii and the Silber, and Stephen Alpert and Johnson Collections in the USA.

Jeff was honoured as Australian Design Centre's 2009 Living Treasure. In 2011, he became a Member of the General Division of the Order of Australia (AM) for services to the visual arts as a Ceramic Artist. He also received a Centenary Medal, for service to the community through the arts.

Writing about the influence of landscape on his work, Jeff notes:

'I've always thought of myself as living in a landscape, perhaps because I've never lived in a city or even a town for longer than a few months. The events of the landscape draw me towards it. My works explore my engagement with its moods, its changes and dramas. They speak of harsh, dry, windswept lands, of the shimmering distance beneath brooding skies. A passing moment of mystery and wonderment captured by the eye and embedded in the memory.'

In his induction speech Headmaster, Bradley Fenner, remarked: 'In pursuing his creative passions in a way that has taken him to the very top of his creative field, Jeff has set a wonderful example for all of us. The esteem in which he is held nationally and internationally makes Jeffrey Mincham a Princes Man of whom we should all be very proud."


