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The Headmaster, Dr. B J Webber

It is most appropriate that the retiring Deputy Headmaster, Mr Milton Haseloff, be our Guest Speaker on the final celebratory night of the year, Speech Night. For the past 30 years, since 1968 when appointed as a teacher of English, Mr Haseloff has been serving the interests of the young men of Prince Alfred College, 22 of them as Deputy Headmaster, a role which he has carried with distinction. Like all good teachers, he has a genuine liking of young people and in spite of his occasional stern disciplinary stance in the role, students recognised the fairness with which he treated them and that he provided within the school an important framework by which relationships could flourish.

Milton Haseloff is recognised within his chosen profession as a consummate educator, a person of considerable knowledge and wisdom with good listening skills and a good eye for detail. Not only is he an excellent administrator within the school setting, he is noted for his support of teachers within the profession, and over the years he has chaired both the Professional Development Committee of Prince Alfred College and the Professional Development Committee of the South Australian Independent Schools Board. He has been particularly active in promoting the importance of self-appraisal by teachers, to reflect on practices and procedures designed to help the learning of students. Most recently this has been incorporated in his guiding the introduction of Dimensions of Learning to PAC. He has also been a member of several teams evaluating NonGovernment schools and was the founder of the Deputies Group within the Association of Heads of Independent Schools of Australia.

The past 30 years has seen considerable change and improvement at PAC, not only in resources but in the nature of curriculum and pastoral care of students. Much of that development has been due to the gentle prodding, encouragement and over-arching vision of Milton Haseloff.

The other significant movements in staff are within the Preparatory School, where another Deputy, Mr David McLaren, has resigned to take up a position as Deputy (Admin.) of the Glamorgan Campus of Geelong Grammar School. Mr McLaren has been dedicated in his four and a half years at PAC to enhancing the standard of teaching and learning in the Preparatory School, but his outstanding service has also extended across the R to 12 spectrum of the school. He is acknowledged for his work in curriculum, Occupational Health, Safety and Welfare, in computing and technology, and for his innovative methods of timetabling, his general attention to detail, and his administrative skills.

Mrs Robbie Hill, after nine years of superb service in the Junior Primary School with Reception and Year 1 students has, unfortunately, found that she is unable to return to the school and has therefore tendered her resignation. And the longestserving member of the teaching staff, Mr Richard Hurn, after 36 years of outstanding service to young people, has indicated his retirement from classroom teaching. Fortunately, Mr Hurn will be able to assist on the odd occasion in a relieving capacity so that his skills will not be totally lost to the school. He is remembered with affection by many former students, particularly as a teacher at Year 5 level, where he spent many of his years, and as a coach of both cricket and football. His identification and support of the school which he loves is exceptional, as he is also a former scholar of PAC.

Another former scholar in Mr Tim Moffat, has offered his resignation from the position of Director of Development in order to return to his profession of law. Mr Moffat has set in place an impressive model of fundraising involving annual giving and pledged giving which will undoubtedly be of considerable benefit to Prince Alfred College in the longer term. He has also guided the wonderfully successful series of Old Scholar Reunions for those who left school 20, 30, 40 and 50 years ago. These reunions have brought together a vast array of men of considerable skill and achievement who had their early educational experiences at Prince Alfred College. As Executive Director of the PAC Foundation, Mr Moffat was also responsible for the planning of special events such as the Banquet Auctions and the forthcoming Princes Carnival. For these significant contributions to the well-being of the school, Mr Moffat is warmly thanked.

School Developments

The PAC Foundation, under the chairmanship of Mr Russell Trim, has produced a very attractive brochure outlining the Development Plan endorsed by the school Council. This plan embraces a number of needs, including the completion of refurbishment to the Main Building, the upgrading of classrooms and laboratories, and the refurbishment of the Assembly Hall. In particular, however, there is a wonderful plan for the Preparatory School formulated by architect, Mr Rob Williams. The first stage of this development will get under way ready for 1999, but further development depends on ongoing support from the Prince Alfred College community; as it is such a huge project, it is likely to be finished only in the longer term.

In the short term the classrooms in the Centenary Wing of the Secondary School will be upgraded during the forthcoming holiday season in readiness for 1998 and plans are under way for completing the refurbishment of the Central Tower of the Main Building. Further, those who visit the school will be well aware of the continuing development of the main entrance to the school off Parade West with street lighting and the planting on the northern side of an avenue of decorative Bradford Pear trees. Kerbing on the southern side of the entrance way will be completed in the holidays, and the avenue of trees in mid-1998.

During the year, with the support of the Prep Parents' & Friends', the junior primary Adventure Playground was completely redesigned and new equipment purchased. It has been an ongoing requirement over the years to completely upgrade our playgrounds to ensure that they meet the changing safety standards of the day.

Tunku Putra International School

It is pleasing to report that with Mr Neil Jackson at the helm, and with the support of Ms Alison Hunt on secondment from PAC,

and Mrs Jill Forster, a former teacher at Princes on secondment from Scotch College, Tunku Putra School has flourished in its first year of existence. Over 120 students at kindergarten and primary levels attended the new school built on the inner approaches to Kuching City in Sarawak. Prince Alfred College is responsible for the educational management of the school and for the professional development of its teachers. The curriculum covers both a national strand, as Malaysian students are required by law to sit an examination at Year 6 level in Bahasa Malay, and an international strand which is offered in English. It is interesting to reflect on the peculiarities of an international school in that many of its students have yet a third language, and in the first year a large cohort were from Brazil with Portuguese being their native tongue. These students were at the school because of a dam project for which a Brazilian company had received the contract.

Another feature of international schools is that unlike Prince Alfred College, where stability is the order of the day, many of the students are mobile and stay only for a short period. Many of the Portuguese-speaking Brazilian students are no longer at the school, having returned home when the Government put on hold further development of the dam site. The school does attract students from nearby Kalamantan in Indonesia and there has also been interest from the Philippines and from Taiwan. One of the important developments from our point of view has been the establishment by e-mail of connection between Years 2/3 students of PAC and students of Ms Hunt's class in Kuching. It is proposed in future years that there will also be communication by videoconferencing.

Unfortunately, partly due to ill-health, Mr Neil Jackson was forced to cut short his intended stay at Tunku Putra and retired at the end of November. Mr Malcolm Dawe, former Deputy Director of Studies at Prince Alfred College, and Co-ordinator of Physics, has taken up the role of Head of the International School for a period of three years on secondment, Ms Hunt continues for another year, and Ms Michelle Burrows has been appointed in place of Mrs Forster who will return to Scotch College. Mr Dawe is meticulous in his preparation and presentation, qualities which were most evident in his teaching and administrative roles at PAC. His work with students over a period of 16 years, both in the classroom

and as coach of the First XI for 15 years is acknowledged gratefully. Mr Dawe is pleased to be able to reflect on his support of top cricketers such as Greg Blewett and Ben Johnson, and top students in Physics, including Brian Ng and Richard Moore, as well as the whole range of excellent young men whom he has taught.

Curriculum Matters

Under the Chairmanship of Mr Roger Marshman, the Board of Studies has implemented recently several changes of curriculum. These include the expectation that all students to Year 10 are to take a compulsory language, either French or Chinese. Not only is this sound educationally, it is a requirement for those students who wish to undertake the International Baccalaureate, and for those who undertake the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) it offers the possibility of bonus points for entry to University. Latin has also given way to Philosophy as an extension subject introduced at Year 8, and has been well received by students as evidenced by the two classes which have elected to take the subject at Year 9.

This year has seen the introduction of the International Baccalaureate at Year 11 level and in 1998 the first of our senior students will undertake the IB Diploma. As expected, a larger cohort of students next year will be entering the program in Year 11. It is significant that the South East Asian Regional Workshops for teachers of the International Bacclaureate program will be held at Prince Alfred College in July 1998 with Mr Roger Marshman as convenor. Students are also invited and the workshops will be a wonderful forum for both students and staff to explore the IB Curriculum which is now an established part of our academic program. The focus for the workshops will be "Technology, Creativity and Values".

Another important development is the curriculum review focusing on the special areas of Health, PE and Religion, or what may be recognised as the pastoral and affective areas of the curriculum. Within Australian Independent Schools there is considerable discussion regarding the nature of Religious Education and Values Education. Dr Peter Vardy of Heythrop College at the University of London and a leading authority in this area, has been conducting a series of conferences for Heads of Independent Schools and next year in early May will run a similar conference at Prince Alfred College for the Heads of South Australian Non-Government Secondary Schools. The emphases will be on Religious Education as an integral part of the curriculum, Theoretical Ethics and its implications, the central role of Philosophy in Religion in dealing with specific issues, and the challenge of how to make an appropriate approach to the use of the Bible for young people in schools. The notion of spirituality will also be considered.

Coupled with this approach will be consideration of Futures Studies, or Education for the Future. Young people are encouraged to consider current trends and to determine what might be probable future scenarios but, more importantly, to determine from an ethical viewpoint what futures they might prefer. Prior to the start of the new school year, staff will consider these issues in a Professional Development program devised by Mr David Rawnsley and Mr Bob Holloway, who both recently attended the 15th World Conference for Futures Studies in Brisbane. Ms Kathleen Rundall, former teacher and school Principal, who has introduced a Futures Studies curriculum at Year 11 and 12 in Queensland and a program for the Malaysian Education Department, will be invited to guide our staff through this new domain of thinking.

A small working party, convened by Coordinator of Information Technology, Mr Andrew Fergusson, has also been formulating a plan for development of IT within the school. In particular, it is essential to properly network the various components of our computer programs within the school, and a decision will be made soon on the appropriate network arrangement for the school. Consistent software must be used throughout the school on whichever platform, IBM or Macintosh, so that the one data base can provide consistent useable information. An important part of the planning relates to the use of the facilities by students and a decision has been made to integrate the development of generic Information Technology skills across the curriculum, rather than as a separate entity of study. Members of staff have been working at Year 8 level to develop new curriculum units of work in 1998 which will employ IT skills and these will be further successively developed. Keyboard skills, which are recognised as being important for young people are, however, like learning a piano in that it is a matter of the individual's commitment to practice with the appropriate

software. It is not seen to be an essential course in its own right.

There have been some significant grants offered for Curriculum Development within the school, one of which is for an Information Technology approach to shared learning between schools. A grant of \$16,200 from Telstra was provided early in the year to establish a video technology link with Seymour College to enhance the teaching of mathematics skills. This same link was used to enable two of our students to undertake German at Year 10 level with a teacher from Seymour.

Following the successful publication of the historical narrative "What Were You Doing During the War" based on research by students interviewing people in the district of Sturt, the History Department under the guidance of Mr Andrew Buxton, has successfully applied for a grant of \$3,000 to conduct a similar review looking at the links of families with Asian immigration. That study is now underway. Recently, Mr Jurgen Kracht received a grant of \$2,500 from the National Asian Languages (NALSAS) program for support of the teaching of Chinese and staff in the Preparatory School similarly received grants for the development of Asian Studies, with particular reference to Indonesia in Year 5 and Korea in Year 7.

Mr Phil Donaldson, Director of Scotts Creek Field Centre, received a grant of \$7,000 for a wetlands project at Scotts Creek in concert with the local owners of the land, Southcorp, and an environmental team from the University of Adelaide. This project will enhance the emphasis on Earth Education which is an inherent part of the Scotts Creek program. This aspect was put on display during the Open Day celebrating the 21st birthday of Scotts Creek in April 1997, in the presence of the then Minister for the Environment, Mr David Wotton, a former scholar. Finally, while not a specific grant, we have also been most fortunate to have within the school. Ms Del Walker as artist in residence. She is a sculptor of considerable skill and offered a new and interesting dimension to those students interested in visual arts.

Pastoral Care

It is pleasing to record the excellent work of Mr Ken Watson in his first year as Senior Housemaster and to acknowledge the importance that he and his colleagues place on students feeling valued and safe within the school, an essential first element for Dimension 1 of the Dimensions of Learning program.

For many, the weekly meetings in the tutor group every Wednesday have provided important opportunities to undertake activities which support the curriculum and extend learning. There has been valuable work done by tutors aiming to develop selfesteem and improve inter-personal relationships. Towards the end of the year in particular, the focus has been more towards academic support with emphasis on goal setting, personal organisation and study methods.

The weekly House meetings, and year level meetings in the case of Year 8, have been an important element in the building of a sense of belonging and the establishment of a house culture. Through a mixture of entertainment, performance, exhibition and competition, boys have had the opportunity to organise and plan activities, to participate in a safe environment, and simply enjoy belonging to the House. There have been some special guests at House meetings. A particular highlight for Oldham House was the visit by 1986 House Captain, David Pittman, some weeks after his success with the Adelaide Crows.

There have also been many activities aimed at developing the responsibility of students. The leadership of its senior students is a critical element in the success of each House. Each week at House meetings, as well as the major House events such as the Swimming Carnival and the Sports Day, we see not only the House Captains and Vice Captains, but also a number of other senior students undertaking significant roles of leadership and responsibility.

For Year 11s, a large number of boys have been involved in a very active Prince Alfred Care and Concern Committee (PACCC). Major activities included the Winter Sleepout (raising money for Mission SA), and the Year 8/9 Social, along with a large number of smaller activities which have raised money for charities and provided services to the school community. A total of 37 Year 11 students undertook roles as leaders of camps at Scotts Creek for boys in Years 5, 6, 7 and 8. Once again, these young men played a significant role in creating successful camps.

In Term 4, an evening meeting was held for parents of boys in Years 7 and 8 with a guest from the Drug and Alcohol Services Council. This provided an excellent opportunity for both the input of valuable information for parents about drugs and alcohol, and a valuable sharing about parenting of teenagers. Such evenings will become an annual feature.

The end of this year marks the end of an era as Mr Thompson steps aside from the position as Head of Oldham House to become Co-ordinator of Physics and Coordinator of SACE. Mr Thompson is the last survivor of the original House staff teams set up in 1981. At that time, he was Tutor of 11 Oldham and he has remained with Oldham House since, spending the last nine years as Head of House.

Staff and students in the Preparatory School have shown their concern for others by continuing to collect for the World Vision child, Louis Angel Gonzales, whom they support, and to maintain contributions to the Fijian Library in Koroleru, providing money for wheelchairs and toys at the Vellore Hospital in South India and supporting UNICEF, the Salvation Army, and the Adelaide Central Mission. Student leadership positions in the Preparatory School have also been enhanced, with several new positions so that leadership is embraced not only by the School and House Captains but also in areas such as Public Speaking, Debating, Chess, Music and various sports. There are now more than 20 leadership positions of this nature in the Preparatory School.

Finally, within the realm of Pastoral Care it is important to record the exchange between the School Chaplain, Dr Adrian Brown, and the Chaplain from Tusculum College, (USA), Dr Stephen Weisz. We were delighted with the contribution of Dr Weisz and his family, Mrs Gloria Weisz and their sons, Kirk and Shep, who joined us as students, and we are grateful for the new insights and pastoral support that they provided. Equally, Tusculum College and the small pastoral church community associated with the Presbyterian school, were delighted to share with Dr Brown. Each of Dr Brown and Dr Weisz are confident that they learned from their experiences and returned to their respective duties with new-found vigour and new ideas

Student Achievements

Consistent with previous years, there have been some remarkable achievements by the young men of Prince Alfred College and not only are their efforts acknowledged, but so also are those of the teachers and others

who have supported them in their development. Selection for tertiary entrance is based on the academic results of Year 12 examinations, and it was most encouraging early in the year to have PAC mentioned in The Advertiser as one of those schools which rated highly in terms of acceptance of applications for tertiary places. Based on results from 1995 a survey indicated that 95% of Year 12 students from Prince Alfred College were offered a place in a tertiary course. This excellent result was due to the sheer hard work of the students and their teachers, the strong support of their parents, and the provision of a very sound counselling program from Heads of House and the Careers Adviser, Mr Garry Simcock.

Results from students in 1996 would have provided a similar outcome. The outstanding student of this cohort and Dux of School was Guy Dundas who gained four merit scores of 20 out of 20, and was denied the elusive fifth merit by a very fine margin. In all, 24 students gained a score of more than 80 out of 90, there were 32 merit scores and 16 students finished with 5 As. Most importantly, there were some very sound results from students in the middle range, more than matching expectations and giving them clear opportunity to undertake further study at tertiary level.

A similar set of results is expected from the current group of students in 1997 for there have certainly been some outstanding individual achievements during the year. Most recently a team of four young men from Year 12, Damian Fung, Andrew Linn, Brett Hill, and Jeremy McMahon were overall winners in the Senior Section of the Annual Quiz Night for the SA Mathematical Association. Other teams from PAC were also most competitive. Early in the year, several of these students competed strongly in the IBM Mathematics Competition and Mathematics also the Australian Competition. In these latter two competitions, however, it was the students in junior classes who were the most successful, with prizes being awarded in the Australian Mathematics Competition to Year 8 students Joseph Crosby, Tommy Asimakopoulos, and Peter Mathews; Year 9 students Christopher Seglenieks and Richard Steenvoorde, and Year 11 student Tom Newman. Joseph Crosby produced the best standardised score for the whole of the school, an outstanding feat for such a young person. In the Junior Division of the IBM Competition, Thomas Evans gained outright third place and Peter Mathews outright seventh place, with others recording

distinctions. Matthew Fisher of Year 10 was outright ninth in the Intermediate Division, and also was selected to attend the Maths Search program, a three day camp for the best Mathematics students in the State, as were Year 8 students Tom Evans, Peter Mathews, Chris Olver and Michael Tysoe. Mark Henderson, Year 12, was honoured to be invited as student tutor for this program.

Science achievements were similarly most impressive with four year 11 students, Tim Clark, Bradley Clothier, Hugh Jones, and Tom Newman each being awarded a plaque for excellence in the National Chemistry Quiz, a most unusual outcome for a particular year level. Earlier in the year, Year 12 students Andrew Linn, Lincoln Law and Damian Fung were selected to contest the National Finals of the Chemical Analysis Competition and Ben Kurylowicz, also Year 12, was awarded the Esso Medal in the Australian Schools Science Competition for 1997, being the top student in South Australia and Northern Territory in the Senior Section. Jamie Messner, who won the top award in 1996, was again most successful in the Oliphant Science Awards, being third overall and first in the Experimental section. He was also selected as one of the top five in the Biology and Microbiology category for the 1997 BHP Science Awards and attended final selection in Melbourne as one of the top 20 students in the country. Jonathan Mitchell of Year 9 was first, together with his sister, in the Computer Section for Years 8 and 9 of the Oliphant Science Awards, and Richard Steenvoorde received a high commendation for the Photograph section. Not to be outdone, students from the Preparatory School also were exceedingly successful with seven prize winners in the Oliphant Science Awards, Myalls Fawcett winning both the Video section and the Experiments section, and Tom Cuthbertson the Essay section, for R-2.

In the Asia Wise Geography Competition for Years 9 and 10, Alex Chapman, Ben Dufour, Kris Hodgins, Richard Steenvoorde received high distinctions and others also performed most creditably. Year 10 PAC Photography students were highly successful at the Schools Exhibition of Photography, with PAC winning the South Australian Photographic Federation Plaque for the top aggregate school. Paul Bulley of Year 10 was outstanding, winning the plaque for top aggregate student and top awards for colour print, people category, colour prints of school activity and nature. Nick McLeay and Angus Mitchell also won

trophies and there were a number of merit awards. A group of students, Gwyn Morfey, Andrew Linn, Hayden Gaunt, Duncan Taylor, and Owen Morfey were the winners in the Eco Works category of the Networks 96 Web Site Competition, and presented their outstanding site to school assembly. Gwyn, working with friends Alissa Proctor and Joel Williams, has over the past six months, developed another outstanding web site, Global In Site, as part of the Think Quest Competition funded from America: he was one of 35 international finalists who were invited to attend a presentation ceremony in Washington, D.C. in late November.

Jamie Messner, who teamed with Michael Hartstone and Scott Olver to successfully argue a winning case for the 1997 Intercollegiate contest in Debating, gained third place in the Senior competition of the Plain English Speaking Awards and Alexander Saint, Year 8, was runner-up in the Junior competition. Michael has also been most successful with his writing, having a story published in The Advertiser's Summer Short Story Competition, and being awarded a merit certificate in the Senior Poetry Section of the Young Writers' Competition. Haydn Yates similarly won a merit certificate in this competition. Student teams in Year 8 and Year 10 were finalists in Debating as was a team from the Preparatory School for the fourth year in a row. George Raptis was also third in the Junior Schools Public Speaking Competition. It is interesting to record that the Year 8 Debating team was coached by Michael Hartstone. Finally, among very keen competition, the winner of this year's Jack de Vidas Award for English was Ryan Williams whose article, along with many other well-written pieces, has appeared in the school's literary publication, 'Uncle Alfred's Journal'.

The growth of Music in the school is a credit to the Director of Performing Arts and Music, Mrs Pam Freeman, with the development of the Concert Bands under the baton of Mr Andrew Newhouse being particularly pleasing. Early in the year, the Music staff presented their skills at a staff concert which would have been revealing for our music students and an inspiration for them. Three students, Jesse Adams (flute), Matthew Just (trumpet), and Alexander Politis (violin), were selected to participate in the Combined Non-Government Schools Orchestra in support of the visiting Youth Orchestra from Vancouver; these orchestras presented an outstanding concert and it is

now planned to maintain a Non-Government Schools Orchestra to provide a performance group for our outstanding music students. The choir, under the guidance of Mr Robert Dawe, remains a jewel in our music program, no more evident than when it performed for the induction of the incoming Moderator of the Uniting Church, Dr Don Hopgood, at Wesley Church, Kent Town. The school was also favoured by a visit from a choir of Grammar School, and Knox joint workshops with the visiting choir which were most beneficial. The Music program has its roots in the Preparatory School and we were pleased to have two choirs and a percussion group selected to participate in the JSHAA Music Festival.

The school in concert with Annesley once again presented an entertaining musical, the classic Gilbert and Sullivan operetta, "HMS Pinafore". Andrew Linn, Tom Pledge, Kevin Khaw, and Chris Simcock were superb in lead roles and well-supported by the cast. Mr Tom Eastland, in his first year of producing and directing plays for the school, came up with a winner in the selection of five plays by Anton Chekhov, promoted as "The Sneeze and Other Episodes". These presentations provided for a fine evening of relaxed entertainment, and commendation is due to lead players Paul Rofe, Marcus Coates, Duncan Tan, Sam Barlow, Hugh Rowland and Lachlan Williams. Supporting these productions within the school was a very fine Arts Week developed under the guidance of Mr Roger Marshman. Starting with an Opening Night led by percussionists from the Preparatory School and with a spectacular fireworks finale, the week provided a forum for visiting artists to extend the creative talents and aesthetic senses of our students.

One of the highlights for the year in the Preparatory School was the building by the boys of the 1997 Pedal Prix vehicle developed under the guidance of Mr Philip McLaughlin. Their vehicle won two prizes, for the most innovative in the Primary Section, and for design and construction. The team came seventh overall out of the primary schools in the competition. Similarly, the outstanding achievement in the technology world for senior students was the development, under the guidance of Mr Paul Balestrin and Mr Phil McLaughlin, of the Prince Alfred College Solar Cycle which competed in the ETSA World Solar Cycle Challenge from Adelaide to Alice Springs and return. The six day event covering 1500 kilometres saw our riding team of Year 10 students, Miles Crawford, Adam Grogan, Alex Silz, Paul Bulley, Stephen Thomas, and Mark Woodforde finish third outright in the contest and second in the category of aerodynamic experimental. Speeds during the competition reached 70 kilometres per hour and there were extremes of heat and wind to The team was capably be endured. supported by the pit crew of Fergus Adamson, Eddie Lane, Matthew Fisher and Chris Pyragius.

Once again, the players of Chess had an outstanding season winning the Schools Championship for the 22nd year in the past 23. They also won the competitions at A, B, C and D grades as well the Lightning Teams competition at A Grade. With three State Champions in Andrew Saint (under 18) Eshan Wijeyekoon (under 16), and Peter Mathews (under 14) and with such a strong record in the build-up PAC might have been expected to win the annual Intercollegiate Chess competition, but this was not to be. The 25th Intercollegiate Chess match was a truly intense encounter with the match resting on the last two boards. Unfortunately, with an apparent draw between the two teams the likely outcome, a late move took the game away from Princes with Saints winning 5-1/2 boards to 4-1/2. The superb efforts of senior students is based on a very strong program in the Preparatory School with PAC teams being finalists in both the Primary Chess Competition and the Koshnitsky Shield.

The sporting program has continued to provide a forum for excellent achievement by our young men under the guidance of a very strongly supportive teaching staff. Luke Williams, the First XI Cricket captain in 1996 had remarkable success during the holidays, being selected as Player of the Championships in the Australian Under 17 competition, and being named in the Australian Under 17 Cricket Squad, the only South Australian so honoured. Recently he has been playing A Grade Cricket with the Adelaide Club and was selected by The Lord's Taverners as the 1997 Junior Taverner for South Australia. The Cricket team, under the guidance of Mr Peter Williams, has this year gone from strength to strength and at the time of writing is undefeated, due primarily to an excellent bowling attack led by Michael Jones, Paul Rofe, Oliver Thomas, Chad Parrish and Sam Williams. The team has won the Knockout Competition in South Australia and in December will be travelling to Geelong to compete in the finals for the Australian Schools Competition, formerly known as the Gillette Cup.

The Tennis players too, have performed most creditably, recovering from being displaced to second division and competing strongly in the open division. Andy Timbs and captain Daniel Forbes, have a superb record in doubles competition, but neither of them were able to take out the Schools Championship with the accolade of School Champion being won convincingly by Year 9 student, Ryan Bickmore. Ryan also won the Under 15 Age Singles title at the State Tennis Tournament held during the year. Not to be outdone, our Table Tennis players have also performed exceedingly well with another Year 9 student, Alex Swanson, representing South Australia at the Under 20 level in Table Tennis and winning the Under 14 and Under 17 Singles of the Victorian Open Championships. He is also State Champion at Under 14 level and was runner-up in the Under 17 title. Similarly, Ryan Manuel, Year 11 student, was selected in the State Under 17 Badminton team and was a member of the highly successful team from PAC which comfortably won the 1997 Intercollegiate contest 8 matches to 1, completing an outstanding season for the team.

Once more, our Rowers had an excellent season, winning more than their fair share of events to be awarded the Schoolboys Championship, Joseph DeMaria, coxswain of the First VIII, was also selected as the coxswain for the 1997 South Australian Kings Cup Crew, an outstanding achievement for a schoolboy, and Under 15 rowers Nicholas McLeay, Clifton Hurburgh and Stephen Thomas, in a three-way tie, were each awarded a trophy for the Champion Schoolboy Rower for the 1996/7 season. In Swimming, Year 10 student Christopher Leung was outstanding, being selected to represent South Australia in the Australian Age Swimming Championships, winning medals in his favourite breaststroke event. Christopher also helped lead Blacket House to their fourth consecutive victory in the swimming carnival, the first of an important double for Blacket as it also won the Athletics Carnival later in the year.

The inter-house Athletics Day was held in glorious weather and was an excellent event with Ms Pallett's Year 8 tutor group dominating the Under 14 age group and with Blacket and Rushton Houses competing strongly for the School Championship. The former emerged as victor during the relays, although Delbridge House dominated the relay events to win the much coveted Relay Shield. Paul Rofe set new school records at the Under 17 level in shot-put and high jump, soaring over 2.03 metres in the latter event. Sam Nicholls, Captain of Athletics, competed strongly at the Under 19 level and in the Achilles Cup won impressively the important sprint double for 100 metres and 200 metres. There were other excellent results in the inter-school Achilles competition, but none better than the record-breaking javelin throw of Warren Kerr at Under 14 level.

Prince Alfred College once again dominated the Squash scene, with 9 teams out of 10 competing in the five grades of the grand finals. The school won four of the five premierships and for the seventh year in a row, won the Knockout Squash Competition led by impressive performances from Christopher Simcock. Interestingly, the former Captain of Squash, Dan Jenson, continues to perform superbly in the international arena and is now rated as number 11 player in the world. He was present at the finals competition.

In winter sport, the Basketball team led by Damian Williams was the only successful team in Intercollegiate contests, winning 42 to 27 with Damian scoring 30 points. He was also selected during the year to captain a winning Independent Schools side, and was a member of an under age Australian Squad. Ryan Woite and Michael Hobby for football and Andy Timbs for soccer were similarly selected to represent the Independent Schools in competitions against combined State Schools, performing most creditably. Both Football and Soccer had successful seasons, with the soccer team winning against Wesley but being outclassed in the Intercollegiate Contest against St Peters. Our footballers were favoured to win the Intercol but were beaten by a much more determined and impressive side on the day, although Ryan Woite kicked eight goals, six in the last quarter in a desperate attempt to turn the game around. In the other code of football, Rugby, Con Pappas was selected as a member of the State team to compete in Darwin, but he was well covered in the Intercollegiate contest by a strong pack from St Peters who were determined to keep their winning record intact.

Hockey, introduced with the strong support of Mr Geoffrey Bean, celebrated its 25th year of competition in 1997. The results during this period have been outstanding, particularly in latter years, and the development of the game has been a credit to the many teachers who have participated, but none more so than Mr Bob Holloway, who has been its guiding light. The First team under his guidance were looking for an undefeated season and had competed very strongly against Wesley and other teams during the year, including a strong win against their old foe in St Peters. Unfortunately, the last game of the season, again against St Peters, brought an unexpected reversal. After a one goal all tie at half time, Saints converted two well won short corners in quick succession to put the game beyond doubt.

In concluding this report I would like to commend and thank all members of the Prince Alfred College community who have contributed so wonderfully in making this school so vibrant, and such a wonderful platform for the achievement of young men. In particular I would thank all members of the teaching staff, and every other member of staff who each in their own way, has contributed to the well-being of students in this school. I would like to acknowledge the work of the School Council, under the guidance of Chairman, Mr Bill Johnson, and its many sub-committees and record my appreciation of the outstanding service of Mr Murray Aitken who, after 27 years, latterly as Chairman of the Building Committee, has retired from Council. I would also thank Mr Philip Speakman, Chairman of the Marketing and Public Relations Committee for his contribution to this school over the past five years. Similarly, to the outgoing President of the PAC Foundation, Mr Malcolm Buckby, now the Minister for Education, Children's Services and Training, and Minister for Youth and Employment, we offer our heartfelt thanks for his support of the school. We are delighted for Mr Buckby and wish him every success in his new portfolio.

I would also acknowledge the strong support from the members of the Prince Alfred Old Collegians, and particularly that of the outgoing President, Mr Alistair Walker. I am particularly encouraged by the scholarships which the Old Collegians offer for the sons of Old Scholars entering at Year 10 level, and by their strong commitment to the building program of this school. Their support also of the reunions is most significant in the life of the school. Similarly, both Parents' and Friends' Associations have continued to provide the framework for exceptional parental involvement and support.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge the work of the students in leadership, particularly at Year 12 level, including the Prefects under the guidance of Captain of School, Tennyson Wickham. These students are to become the new Old Scholars. We know their achievements at this point in time and will follow with interest their development in the years to come as they make their mark in this global community.

May I thank all members of the Princes community, students, staff, parents, members of Council and Old Scholars for their interest, involvement and support through the year.

Whether it be in sport, the arts, school camps or helping in special projects like the sunboat and the solar powered car, these all provide ways in which you can broaden your mind and daily experience.

For me, the many camping trips over the years both at Scotts Creek and other places around the state have provided many people with a chance to interact in a relaxing non school environment. It has also been interesting to note how people cope and react in these new or unusual situations. More importantly it is in the year nine camp at Scotts Creek and year ten OTE camp where there is more of an emphasis placed on teamwork and leadership. Working together to solve problems is very powerful and can be useful when related to the life in the real world that awaits us.

Again leadership opportunities are prominent in year eleven. Along with many other year twelves last year I participated in the year eleven leadership camp, again held at Scotts Creek. This involved leading a group of younger boys from PAC for a week through their camp course. This turned out to be much harder than I had thought as it involved relating to boys at a much younger age, trying to tell them what they can and can't do.

One of the more important activities during my time at Prince Alfred College has been sport. Right from prep-school to my last year of school I have been competing in various teams at many different sports. Sport is a much needed component in anyone's life. It provides a basis from which you can meet all kinds of people, some personalities you will like, some you may not. But in any case many friendships can evolve from competing in a team orientated sport. While not everyone will compete at the highest level, putting in the best effort until the final siren is all that can be asked. This philosophy over the years has resulted in PAC building up quite a tradition of not giving up, a tradition that is respected by every other school.

Furthermore playing such sports exposes a person to many experiences that may be translated directly into life situations. Win, loss, joy, disappointment, pain, persistence are all emotions and experiences from which you can grow.

I have dealt with all of this at some stage, and in particular in the last couple of years being involved with this years and last years football intercol games. Both were very similar matches with differing results. In each game the PAC side was down and not playing to its' full potential and in each game PAC staged a seemingly impossible coméback in the last quarter. Last year we were good enough to win by a solitary point, this year however the seven goal deficit at three quarter time was too much to overhaul, eventually going down by twelve points.

More to the point, in those two games for the last twenty five minutes there were twenty one players that lifted, played some of the hardest football of the year and played together as a team in part of a tradition that is older than any one alive today.

For me I feel that my ten years at PAC have prepared me well for whatever lies ahead. A school like PAC can present boys with many situations, choices and decisions. It is out of these experiences that boys grow and mature into young men. To the many students attending PAC in the years to come, make the most of your last years at school by getting out of the comfort zone and participating. You will never have the opportunity to live these last years at school again.

At this time I would like to thank Dr Webber and Mr Haseloff for their friendship and guidance throughout the year. To the staff, Vice-captain Tom Pledge for his help through the year and to fellow year 12's, thankyou for making everyone's time at PAC one to remember.

The Mentor

Thirty Years in Retrospect

Late on a beautiful October afternoon, I sat in the Headmaster's office, less daunted by Mr Dunning's questions than by the penetrating eyes in T.G. Waterhouse's portrait. The sounds of ball on bat and smatterings of applause drifted in from the House Cricket match on the Front Oval. Prince Alfred College, at that moment, seemed to represent tranquility, assurance, continuity. I resolved to seize any offer of employment that Mr Dunning might make.

The strong sense of links with earlier times became even more evident when, in January 1968, I found myself teaching classes described in terminology I had previously only read about: an Upper Sixth and two Sixth Form English classes, as well as a Fourth Form and a Lower Fifth Latin class. I soon learnt that boys were addressed by surname. And although I had had leadership experience in three Education Department schools, when I stepped into the Masters' Common Rooms, which are now offices used by Mrs Intini and Mr Marshman, I found myself amongst colleagues whose towering insights, experience and intellectual and professional standing were saved from being intimidating by the warmth and approachability they offered to newcomers

I realise, now, that I had a privileged glimpse of a former era, a reminder of less harried, more elegant times. But the world was already changing and to look back from a vantage point 30 years later is to be stunned by what has occurred in that interval.

In a brochure prepared for the centenary of the school in 1969, an aerial photograph records a campus smaller and less crowded than the 1997 equivalent. Pirie Street still divided the property and houses fringed the Capper Street and Parade West boundaries. The Prep was a much smaller school. Some boarders continued to occupy the Colton and Waterhouse wings of the main building. Yet to be built were such facilities as the Secondary Library, Laboratories, Prep classrooms, Sports Centre, boarding accommodation, Clipsal Innovation Centre and Hockey Field. Now the Prince's campus has become a more complex, more specialised place. Off campus, too, facilities like the Scott's Creek Field Centre and the Goolwa Aquatic Centre have been built or refurbished.

None of these developments, however, has had any point unless it resulted in better opportunities for students. Happily that, I believe, has been the case, for each has extended or enhanced the total curriculum offering. Nevertheless, it seems to me that less tangible developments have been even more significant. Examples that spring to mind include the setting up of Middle and Senior Schools in 1972, the Myponga conference that developed Life Studies, and the introduction of Asian and European Studies for those Year 9 students not continuing with French or Chinese. Important, too, was the Council's decision in 1982 to commit time and funding to professional development opportunities for staff. Much more recently, we have turned attention towards a deeper understanding of the learning and teaching processes, while establishing a more global perspective through our involvement with both the International Baccalaureate Organisation and Tunku Putra International School in Kuching. But the period that spanned the late 70s and early 80s saw the most exciting developments of all and set the patterns that have persisted, most successfully, into this decade.

From low-key beginnings that gave little hint of their ultimate effects, discussions began in 1978 among members of staff keen to review the educational experiences of PAC students. What emerged was a model of effective change; the debates were informed, intense, inclusive and highly professional, and they led to careful, timely and detailed planning. The Goolwa

Conferences of 1979 and 1980 ensured that many stakeholders could be involved in reaching the solution finally selected and have input to the planning process. And so, in 1981, we launched a new curriculum pattern and a new House structure.

In curriculum terms, the outcome was greater diversity. For students in Years 8, 9 and 10, their core subjects now included not only a more generous provision of humanities, arts, technology and language subjects, but also a greater flexibility in the choice of those subjects. The curriculum framework established at that time has continued to evolve to the point where each year's timetable regularly implements some innovative thought. And the benefits of all this curriculum development? The most obvious outcome has been a burgeoning of the cultural life of the school. This probably is best symbolised in the biennial Arts Week, but is regularly seen in a very busy co-curriculum, and the large numbers of boys involved in, for example, the Music program. The School's timetable now offers a great diversity of learning experiences that simultaneously are relevant to students' immediate requirements and provide the skills to go on learning well into the Twenty First Century.

1981 also saw Bayley, Cotton, School and Waterhouse Houses replaced with the current ones. This major change honoured the service of former scholars who did not survive World War One, but it also signalled a shift in purpose. The House now became the basis for administration in the Secondary School, thereby offering more opportunities for responsibility and leadership to students and staff. Moreover, the House provided students with the security and friendships of a smaller and more intimate group within the school. It promoted too, through the on-going commitment of the Head of House and the stability of the Tutor team, a close, well informed relationship between home and school. As we note the intensifying pressures and difficulties of modern life, we realise that the support, counselling and discipline of the House structure is becoming ever more relevant and urgent for the young men in our care.

To look back is to see the late 70s and early 80s as crowded, powerfully formative years. The truth is, however, that throughout the past thirty years, it has been exciting to work at Princes, where innovation and experiment seem to have been the norm. Yet, in the midst of change, my early expectations of continuity have been fulfilled, for the sense of community has never really wavered. As in most families, there may have been moments of tension, but the various groups that form Princes have gone on serving the school and one another with a quality, commitment and generosity that have been outstanding.

That moment in Mr Dunning's office in 1967 was my watershed. I have never regretted the decision that brought me to Princes and gave me so many opportunities. On the contrary, membership of such a diverse and powerful team has been a great honour. I know that I shall miss the day-to-day involvement in the projects even now being planned, but I am equally certain that my interest in Princes and my delight in its family will remain as bright as ever.

When Milton became Deputy Headmaster, only the second in the history of the school, in undertaking his own professional development for his new role, he discovered insights that he wanted to share with his colleagues. Viv Jenson:

Every individual associated with Prince Alfred College will have anecdotes to share about their interactions with Milton Haseloff. The recurrent theme however remains the same: a man dedicated to excellence, his own as much as his colleagues' and his students'. There is nothing that he would ask of others that he would not be prepared to do himself. He is an expert in his field, with a library of reference materials generously shared. He is a genuinely interested supporter of every aspect of the school's program-he might materialise at any match, competition, performance, display or any group where staff or students are involved. He believes in the rights of the individual and he will not allow injustice to anyone. He is generous with his talents and will offer advice when it is sought, and he has proven himself to be a good listener: this open door policy to teachers and students, despite the pressure of his work, has been remarked upon by the many who have benefited .He is a warm person, with a sometimes wicked humour, carefully concealed of course beneath his very proper demeanour.

The range and strength of his character have been exhibited over his years at Princes: Milton Haseloff has been a most significant figure in the evolution of Prince Alfred College.

Ken Watson:

From my first meeting with Milton Haseloff I saw him as a thoughtful, analytical, scholarly man who chose his words carefully. He has a remarkable ability for drawing several elements together, which has allowed him to provide a rationale for a course of action which has been important in guiding boys. It has also been a powerful force in directing the energies of teachers as he has led the Professional Development Program.

In this context, Milton has maintained an absolute commitment to two key principles.

The first is the notion of teachers as "reflective practitioners" and the second is the central position of learning in schools. The notion that the process of cognition is the essence of what schools are about, expressed in our case in the form of the Dimensions of Learning, is Milton's greatest legacy to PAC.

Just as Milton has been committed to professional development, so also has he been committed to simple pragmatic notions of what is important in running a successful school. Milton is a firm believer in the importance of school traditions, constantly reinterpreted as time passes, but never losing sight of the core values those traditions express. He maintains a high regard for such occasions as full school assemblies in establishing the mood and inculcating the values of the school. Above all Milton values simple everyday routines, with the highest possible expectations of dress, deportment, and demeanour in establishing and maintaining that intangible yet so critical "school tone".

I consider it a privilege to have worked with Milton Haseloff. He has been of inestimable importance to this school, to a huge number of teachers, and to a far greater number of students who have been touched by his influence.

Roger Marshman:

It is hard for me to say, after working alongside Milton for 24 years, which of his qualities and which of his roles I value most.

Perhaps more than anyone else, I have been privileged to work in concert with Milton as a Teacher, first when for several years we taught parallel classes of Year 12 (or Matriculation as we called it then) English; subsequently, we have together kept alive the study of that supposedly dead language, Latin. Supported by his love of great literature and his masterful appreciation of precision and elegance in the use of language, the hallmarks of Milton's teaching have been meticulous preparation, utter clarity of explanation and the setting of challenging and meaningful tasks for his students.

Then there is Milton the Administrator: measured, loyal, insightful, politically skillful and professionally supportive of his colleagues far beyond the bounds of duty and often enough beyond the bounds of an ordinary mortal's patience.

After a difficult disciplinary matter involving a student who was thought by some to have been unlucky to be caught, I recall saying to Milton, "No-one could ever say that you did not act according to principle" and he replied, utterly in character, "And that's all right with me."

A man of principle indeed - fearless, firm and fair -- Milton has been a consummate schoolmaster, with all that this rather unfashionable word implies; dedication, loyalty, wisdom and a patient concern for students, challenged especially in recent years by a bewilderingly changing world and the shifting sands of pluralism. Milton has a commitment to the transmission of cultural heritage: his recent assembly talks, redolent with classical references and images from his researches into school history are an expression of that. But he is no hideaway mindlessly clinging to the past. Few educators could have done more than Milton to awaken in a school a lively awareness of some of the more productive developments in pedagogy and cognitive psychology, as shown through his leadership of the school's commitment to Dimensions of Learning.

I think of Milton in the most positive senses of both words as a radical conservative, concerned to enable our students to think independently, to be manly, to ask fundamental questions and to dare to stand up for right; not to compromise principle, not to be overcome by superstitions, ancient or modern, but to value tenaciously the good that comes to us from the past.

At the end of 1996 we were successful in winning the SAPSASA State Baseball Competition which is the second time we have achieved this. Considering we don't have baseball as part of our sporting program this was a fine outcome. In sport during 1997 our various teams again performed well. However, apart from our successful soccer teams and a very close 'A' Football team result, the Intercol against Saints was not one of our best. Congratulations also to George Raptis on coming second in the SAPSASA Skiing Year 8 Championships and to our teams who SO well in the Year did 7 Championships.

School and House Captains who are listed in the following pages have been outstanding during 1997, and I would like to commend them for their attention to detail and consistency over the year.

Year 7 boys gaining scholarships and prizes following academic distinction in the scholarship examinations are as follows: The J. We enjoyed our association with the Weisz family as they entered into the life of the school so well. Steve, in supporting the boys, and Gloria in assisting Leisa Moore in Art. Shep's efforts on the soccer field, in cross country and in class were also appreciated. We hope they settle back into Tusculum College, Tennessee easily and that we will see them again soon.

A busy year with many achievements and one to look back upon with pride. We have a fine staff in the Preparatory School who give considerable effort and time to ensure the boys have the best possible education. This attribute is supported by a fine parent and student body which, when all put together, makes a fine school.

This was the best campsite because the inn (next to the camp site) had a lot of arcades, swimming pools and saunas. After that camping trip we went to the same place every year.

The only time we didn't go to Wales was our last camping trip which was in 1995. Instead we went to Cornwall, which is in the country by the coast. We stayed at a farm where they rent small cottages out to people. It also had a pool, spa and right next to the cottages there were lots of smelly farm animals. I have so many memories of the place. Cornwall was also the place where I caught my first wave at a beach. I really like Cornwall and I would like to go back.

Straight after the trip to Cornwall we packed and left for Holland, which is on the coast of Europe next to Germany. > New Leaders for New Times (Judges 2: 6-7, 14-19)

"These are the best of times, these are the worst of times" (Charles Dickens, A Tale of Two Cities) is the beginning of a story set in a time of turmoil and revolution, of hope and despair, of power and opportunity. These words could have just as easily been written about today, about 1997, about the year that is just beginning and for which you are about to be inducted as prefects.

1997 is a year full of promise, full of opportunity. It is a year where more new things will be discovered, developed and change the way that we think and work. There will be technological advances that even you, the children of the technological revolution could never imagine. There will be more changes to the way you learn than there have been in the lifetime of those of us who work and teach in this place. You will continue to deal with topics that only a relatively short time ago were only dealt with in universities. This is a time of revolution but it is also a time of turmoil.

There are challenges that face you that did not really confront me when I was your age. In spite of all the advances in areas such as transport or communication, medicine or energy you are still entering the countdown to issues that will put you on your toes.

Not only are there issues that wait for you once you leave this place there are also issues that are here now, waiting to push your patience and ingenuity.

1997 is not 1996 even if 1996 was with us only a few short weeks ago. Last year's leaders have gone, last year's problems will take on a different shape, last year's year elevens have disappeared and been returned as year twelves. You cannot hide in the past anymore than anyone else can hide in the past. You cannot even use last year's solutions even if there might be resemblances. 1997 is not 1996, all 1996 can do is to prepare you for 1997 and 1997 demands new leaders for new times

At the end of last year there was grief in the air as students who had been part of this place for a long time were farewelled. Teachers reflected on the loss that they and the school would feel because this student or that would no longer be here. There was reflection over the difficulties associated with trying to replace people who had been leaders in a whole range of ways and in a whole set of circumstances. But even as the year drew to a close change was in the air, new leaders for new times were already emerging as so many of you, as year elevens, volunteered to fill those gaps left by the departing year twelves.

As prefects you represent those who have emerged out of the shadows of 1996 into the spotlight of 1997. You will surprise us in many ways as you travel through the year. We will see some of you who have been quiet achievers, shadowing figures in some way, we will see you emerge into the spotlight and respond to the challenges of leadership. We will see others of you confirm the promise of the past by doing what you have always done, lead. We will also see some of you struggle with the challenge and it will be an effort to carry the leadership torch. And it is always possible that you might actually trip and fall.

The reading this morning could well have been about today and about you. It is about the best of times and the worst of times, it is about hope and disappointment. Above all though it is about the way in which God always raises up new leaders for new times.

Joshua was an understudy to Moses, the man who led a desperate group out of slavery towards freedom. Moses died before they actually entered the promised land. His death was a major blow and there were those who wondered about how they would cope. But it was Joshua who emerged from the shadows to take the lead, to encourage, to challenge and to show the way. Joshua became the new leader for a new time.

Maybe the burden and opportunities that are yours are not quite in the same league as Joshua's. After all, Joshua had the responsibility for the founding of a new nation. However, that is not to say that you can sit back and relax or imagine that what you do is not of any real importance.

You still stand in the same tradition, you still stand in the same tradition of those prefects who have gone before you, you still carry with you that expectation that has been carried before you.

While you stand in that same tradition, though, you do not, and should not, stand in the shadow of those who have gone before you. There is neither any need to hide nor any useful purpose to be served by looking to move into the shadows.

In many ways, all the past is just that, past. You remain new leaders for a new time. You have both the opportunity, the responsibility and the support to be leaders for now.

Your leadership will mean that you will need to look for ways to exercise it in the context of this year. You will need to seek out ways to show others what it means to be part of this community, to seek out ways to demonstrate that even the most unlovable are important, to show that it matters nothing whether you look, speak or act differently that you are to be valued; to be in the forefront of practising justice when injustice has occurred; to adopt behaviours that are responsible examples to others; to support your colleagues when they seek to act as leaders.

As the year unfolds there will be times when you will be faced with situations that will be new and/or uncomfortable. As and when they arise remember that you are new leaders for new times; that you stand in the tradition of others who have also been new leaders in new times; that you do not take on this task without help and counsel being available; and that, like Joshua, you will need to challenge, to lead, to encourage and to show the way. And also, like Joshua, you can be assured that God will be with you whether you seek him or whether you do not.

HMS Pinafore

To have seen HMS Pinafore, and to have been a member of the audience was to have witnessed a true spectacle, epitomising the artistic talents of Princes men and the role cultural enrichment plays in the studies of Princes men.

Opening night was brilliant. I'm not one for musicals, but I admit, Pinafore was sensational. The fact that you know the people on stage, that you know they make mistakes and where and that you helped them through the weeks before, preparing their singing encourages you to admire the skill and dedication of all who took part in the musical, and to finally see it run through unabridged.

Sitting in the milieu of a hearty crowd, the anticipation was electric. Everything seemed just fine; 1...2...3...4..., the orchestra was a few bars into the overture. Suddenly from the aisle of Stanton block, came a panicked screech - some girl's coordination enabled her to drop a box of Maltesers. Andrew Linn's precise and melodious voice dominated his character, evident from once being a chorus boy in operas. Congratulations to Andrew on his first principal role in a musical!

Sir Joseph Porter's fiery brow was only mildly overpowered by those feathers and that hat. A musical performer, Tom Pledge showed us once again how much he loves the stage, and how he can work the audience successfully.

The orchestra, as usual, was impressive. Gilbert and Sullivan tunes are very catchy, and the orchestra played melodiously, never overpowering the singers.

The musical seemed to have been produced in such a short time span - I was amazed at how performance week just sprang up on us all. However, sheer determination and encouragement from every member of the cast and crew made sure of the success of the musical.

And so, the accolades must be presented. The Sneeze

Plays about nothing, in the style of Seinfeld: that was what had Prince Alfred College talking after 'The Sneeze' and four other plays by Anton Chekhov were presented by Mr. Tom Eastland and his cast in the Prince Philip Theatre. These plays focused on the way that people behave in different situations, and although they were written in the nineteenth century they are still relevant and funny today. Ranging from the very short to about twenty minutes, the plays held the attention of the audience through-out its three night season; playing to a full house on all three occasions. The presentation began with 'Drama' - the story of an aspiring playwright named Murashkina, played by Bec Lawson, who is trying to get her work recognised by a well known author, Vaseliyevich (Hugh Rowland). Unfortunately for her, the play is unoriginal and boring for Vaseliyevich. His interaction with the audience as she drones on is hilarious and there are numerous occasions when he i's caught out by Murashkina. In the end though, this doesn't matter because he finally becomes so frustrated that he plunges a letter opener into her back in an effort to stop her from annoying him further.

There followed the story of a Russian land-owner Kamyshev, played by Paul Rofe, and his French servant, Champagne (Lachlan Williams) and their conversation over a meal. 'The Alien Corn' looks at the different ways that people can interpret what is said and how they react to those interpretations. Kamyshev makes many disparaging remarks about the French and eventually Champagne snaps and tells Kamyshev that he is leaving. He is unable to do this however, because Kamyshev has his passport and can't remember where he put it twenty years earlier when Champagne had come to work for him. The conversation and acting is riotous, with Paul Rofe superb in his role as the arrogant and racist Russian and as a result the straight role of Lachlan Williams was made all the better.

The final play before the interval was the title play, 'The Sneeze' which describes a night at the opera. In the stalls sits a highly ranked government official, played by Duncan Tan, and a more lowly ranked official, Chervyakov (Hugh Rowland). With no dialogue, the emphasis here was certainly placed upon the actors' expression which was excellent. A faux pas by Chervyakov is only emphasised as he tries to rectify the situation. The farce is finally halted by Duncan Tan's resounding right hand as he slaps Hugh Rowland who promptly has a heart attack and dies.

'The Bear' is a play about a widow named Popova and her refusal to pay her dead husband's debt to Smirnov played by Sam Barlow, a man whom she despises from the beginning. The feeling is certainly mutual as Smirnov stands firm against Popova's declarations of poverty. He remains in her sitting room despite the gallant efforts of Luka (Lachlan Williams), her servant, who tries to expel him but is too old to do so. As the play progresses the audience knows before the characters how it will end. We see the two characters become less and less anxious for the debt to be settled and in the end they realise this themselves... and act on it.

'The Proposal' tells of the pettiness that can stand in the way of the more important issues at hand. Lomov (Marcus Coates) asks Chubukov (Paul Rofe), for the hand in marriage of Natalya, his daughter played by Nicola Denton. Chubukov enthusiastically agrees and sends his daughter in so that Lomov can ask Natalya himself. Before he can do this however, Lomov and Natalya get into an argument over the ownership of some land and they vow not to talk to each other again. Lomov storms out and then Chubukov tells his daughter about the true purpose of Lomov's visit. She is also very happy with the idea and sends her father out to retrieve Lomov and ask him back. He returns and things are settled but then the couple get into another argument, this time over the relative merits of their dogs. This results in Lomov collapsing of heart failure and when he is revived after an hilarious scene in which Paul Rofe was very animated, Chubukov announces their marriage and says that they have started well; they are already behaving like a married couple, arguing all the time.

Over all, these five plays were presented superbly by the well prepared cast and were received very appreciatively by the audience. Congratulations must go to Tom Eastland and all involved, especially the backstage crew who made slick scene changes, allowing the action to proceed without losing the interest of the audience.

Music Report 1997

We were delighted to welcome Candace Kruger to the Music Faculty to teach Prep Class Music, and Thomas Eastland to teach Speech and Drama in the Senior School. Matthew Carey joined us as our Curriculum/Administration assistant; George Grifsas (Guitar), Richard O'Loughlin (Trombone) and Jim McCarthy (Percussion) were newcomers to the Single Studies Staff.

The year began with auditions and rehearsals for the annual Musical Production - this year HMS Pinafore (see separate report). Lots of energy went into our performances for Open Day in March, with all the ensembles and choirs performing at venues around the school, and several music classes presenting demonstration lessons in the Music Centre.

The Annual Service the following Sunday gave the new Festival Choirs their first liturgical performance, together with the Chapel Choir, Brass Ensemble and Chamber Orchestra.

The Music Faculty put on its annual Recital in April in the Assembly Hall, demonstrating an enormous depth of talent, versatility and dedication. It was also an opportunity for boys new to the school to hear all the instruments available to learn through the Single Studies program. Over three hundred and fifty students are enrolled in tuition this year, with many boys also playing in an ensemble or singing in a choir.

The Assemblies in both Prep and Senior School have continued to feature performances by our Choirs and Ensembles, including the newly formed Intermediate Concert Band and the long-awaited Big Band. Both have become very popular and have been much in demand during the year for various performances including the Big Band in the Rotunda for the Rowing Carnival, and the Intermediate Band in Rundle Mall.

The first planning meetings for Arts Week began in Term 1, for what turned out to be one of the most comprehensive and spectacular events in the 16-year history of Arts Week. (See separate report).

Tom Eastland's first Drama Production followed closely after the Musical in June. "The Sneeze" was an enormous success in the Prince Philip Theatre, with packed houses every night.

The Independent Schools Orchestra began rehearsals in second term, in preparation for their combined concert with the Vancouver Youth Symphony Orchestra early in Term 3. Four Princes Men took part - Jesse Adams (flute), Matthew Just (trumpet), Alexander Politis (violin) and visiting Work Experience Student Will Odell (Oboe) - in a spectacular Concert at the Westminster Performing Arts Theatre, featuring a combined Orchestra of over 100 musicians performing the Tchaikovsky 3rd Symphony.

In June, the Knox Grammar Gallery Choir arrived for a 5 day visit with our Chapel Choir. The Choirs combined under the direction of Meg Matthews (Knox) and Robert Dawe for rehearsals and performances. Led by our exchange Chaplain Dr Stephen Weisz, we presented an uplifting combined Service on the final Sunday Night. The Chapel Choir is looking forward to a return visit to Sydney next July.

The newly formed Big Band performed for the Old Old Boys Assembly at the end of July, indulging in some nostalgic tunes from the 40's prior to leading the singing of the School Songs during the Service.

The Music Advisory Committee has continued to meet on a regular basis, bringing various musical issues to our attention and assisting in all our musical functions, most particularly Arts Week and the Year 7 Social, which demonstrated excellent co-operation between the senior and prep students.

The Sunday Recital Series has continued to provide an important platform for our soloists in the Single Studies program. The range of instruments and variety of music has been stimulating and interesting for the enthusiastic audiences. With over 100 students learning piano, we were pleased to have the expertise of Musician-in-Residence Lindsay gingham during Arts Week this year. The PAC White "C" Grade team performed exceptionally well compared to the other teams with a blitzing 9 point win over Marryatville High School and St. Peters College Blue who drew in second place. The Red team also played well in the season and was ranked 12th after the final round out of a total of 22 teams. The strong performance was enhanced by the Certificate winners Michael Stankiewicz, Michael Low, Tom Bridges, Joseph Crosby and Tom Magain. Prince Alfred College also secured the top position in the "D" Grade with Princes defeating 2nd place winner St. Ignatius College by four and a half points. Certificate winners Jacob WayeHarris, Richard Edwards, Feng-An Lin and Craig Paterson all helped to contribute to this outstanding victory.

PAC had won the "A", "B", "C", and "D" Grades as well as the Championship School, a marvellous result for the chess team and all should be congratulated for the strong performances throughout the season.

Towards the end of last year, the Princes' community saw the publication of the first volume of the 'Prince Alfred College Literary Journal.' Subtitled 'Uncle Alfred's Bedside Companion' the journal contained some of the best creative works that students had composed earlier that year. Thirty two young men contributed either prose or poetry which was combined by the Editorial Committee (Tim Clark Michael Hartstone, James Messner, Tom Newman and Matthew Redmond) to form an high quality and varied collection.

The Editorial Committee faced many tribulations throughout the year. One of these was deciding how long the journal should be. It was decided that a shorter journal would be published which led to only the poetry and prose that was of high enough standard being included. The layout of 'Uncle Alfred's Bedside Companion' was made much easier with the finished construction of the Clipsal Innovation Centre. Unfortunately, due to budget constrictions, only one hundred copies were printed so the distribution was to a small audience.

'Uncle Alfred's Bedside Companion' exposed many of the fine writers in the PAC community ranging from Yr 8 to 12. Some of the students submitted work that had been highly commended by the 1996 Young Writers' Awards as well as the winning essay for the Jack de Vidas English Prize.

This year, under the expert guidance and infinite patience of Jane Nelson, the 1997 edition is taking form. With a slightly changed editorial committee (Michael Beard. Mark Henderson, Michael Hartstone, James Messner and Matthew Redmond) this year's edition should prove to be quite formidable. Prose and poetry still continue to fly in as students enter competitions such as the school's own creative writing competition. This means that the editorial committee will still be reading works right up to publication.

NETWORKS 96 AND THINK QUEST

Last year a group of four PAC students, and one from another school, entered an internet design competition called Networks 96. Competitors were required to design a web site in one of five categories -SportsWorks, TechWorks, EcoWorks, ArtWorks or BusinessWorks - over a period of several months, and were judged on technical merit, artistic design, quality of content, usefulness, and several other factors. We formed a team called the WebCrew, entered, and eventually took out first place in our category (winning a cool \$2000!).

The WebCrew comprised (the competition required team members to have nicknames - no, we don't understand it either):

- On programming Joel 'Siva' Williams (from Glenunga International High School)
- On content Hayden 'NaCl' Gaunt
- · On proofing Owen 'Fireball' Morfey
- On graphics Duncan 'Wookie' Taylor
- On stress overload Gwyn 'Grim' Morfey (team leader)

We entered the EcoWorks category, which is sponsored by MFP Australia, and created a site called the EcoWeb. The EcoWeb aims to encourage South Australians to be aware of the environmental problems facing this state, and to take action to help solve them. On the site are detailed reports on the problems, and step-by-step guides to possible solutions, including pre-written letters which can be printed and sent to local government and industry representatives. There is also a very strong focus on interactivity; the EcoWeb includes message boards where people can share ideas and comments, and a database where councils and businesses can make available information about their environmentally friendly policies. For example, you could search for supermarkets in your local area that prominently feature 'green' products or provide string (as opposed to plastic) bags for customers.

The EcoWeb is being hosted at http://www.networks.sa.com.au/NW96_35, although an error in the web server (not our responsibility... in fact, they wouldn't let us mess with it) currently prevents the discussion areas, pre-written letters and database from operating. We did have it working. Honest.

Anyway, we hope this will be fixed soon. We are also making arrangements for the continued hosting and maintenance of this site to be taken over by PAC students - talk to your computing teacher if you are interested in becoming involved.

Everybody says this, but it's true: in large teams (comprising more than one person), it's the ability to work together, rather than individual brilliance, that makes the difference. As team leader, I was very impressed by the way the WebCrew worked together, and am sure that it was this - along with considerable dedication and large quantities of very hard work (I have the email timestamped at 3:30am to prove it) that brought us victory. This is despite the fact that the rest of the team flatly refused to help in writing this chronicle report.

I'd like to thank the sponsors of the competition, namely the Department of Health and Childrens' Services, MFP Australia, and WebMedia, for their generosity and insight in assisting with making Networks 96 possible. It was a truly educational experience.

But the story isn't over yet:

Having had such success with Networks 96, J6el Williams and myself decided that an action replay was in order. At the start of this year, we found a new team member (the "Fantastic Robust Energetic Devils" nearly beat us, which is why we recruited their team leader) and prepared to do it all again. We produced a site called Global InSite, which is hosted at :

http://hyperion.advanced.org/11662, and entered it in ThinkQuest, an international web competition

(http://io.advanced.org/Thinkquest).

So far, we have made the semifinals, and are expecting finalists to be announced Real Soon Now. If we are successful - or

even if we aren't - the three of us are planning to go into part-time web design on a commercial basis.

The Prince Alfred College Solar Cycle team left Adelaide on Saturday 27th September to take part in the inaugural Adelaide to Alice Springs Solar Cycle Challenge. The team consisted of riders Miles Crawford, Adam Grogan, Paul Bulley, Stephen Thomas, Mark Woodforde and Alex Silz and pit crew Eddie Lane, Fergus Adamson, Matthew Fisher and Chris Pyragius.

The event took the boys on a 3015km journey through the outback of Australia facing extreme conditions of heat, whirlwinds and the inevitable road trains. The riders were required to pedal their vehicle they had designed and constructed, with the help of a solar assisted electric motor around 300km a day, competing against teams from USA, UK, Malaysia, Germany and of course Australia.

Miles Crawford was able to get the vehicle named 'SPR' up to a top speed of 70.5km/h which was the event highest for 9 of the 10 days of racing. The Making of a Princes Man Through the Sporting Tradition

Honours Colours 1997 We have pleasure in recording extracts from the citations for Honours Colours.

Athletics: Sam Nicholls

A member of the Athletics S. A. Development Squad from 1994 to 1996 Sam competed at a School's track and field championships and won the 100, 200 and 400 metre events at the U/17 level. As a member of a group of about 50 young athletes, Sam travelled to the United States on an International Athletics Exchange to train and compete in 1996. Against good quality competition he was placed consistently in the top four for the sprint events. During this tour Sam reached the U/16 Australian qualifying standards for the IOOm and 200 m.

In 1997, Sam was captain of Athletics and in this capacity he worked assiduously to build team morale and to assist in improving athletes' performances underlining his worthiness as an Honours Colours Recipient.

Australian Rules Football: Ryan Woite

Ryan came to Prince Alfred College in 1996 as a Year 11 student and immediately made an impact in Australian Rules Football. He was chosen in the S.A. Under 16 football team, and he also earned selection in the Combined Independent Schools team inboth 1996 and 1997. In 1997 he was invited to join the Port Adelaide Football Club pre-season training list and later in the year the State U/18 practice squad. His commitment to Princes football has never been compromised, and he furfilled his role as vice-captain of the 1st XV111 with great distinction.

Basketball: Damien Williams

A recipient of honours colours in 1996, Damien has maintained the exceptionally high standards required of an honours colours recipient. Captain of the Open A Basketball team in 1997, Damien has been named Best and Fairest for a third consecutive year. He was selected as captain of the combined Independent Schools Basketball team in 1997, and as a member of West Adelaide's senior men's training squad and U/20 representative, Damien is highly regarded within State basketball circles.

Cricket: Luke Williams

A recipient of honours colours in 1996, Luke has enjoyed quite remarkable success since that time. He was named vice-captain of the S.A. under 17 team which contested the Australian Championships in January 1997. He broke all batting records, recording the highest individual score in the carnival's history, 225 not out against the N.T., as well as breaking the all time aggregate record by scoring 530 runs at the imposing average of 106. He was adjudged player of the championships, and was selected in the Australian U/17 development squad. Luke scored an impressive 91 runs in his final A grade district match for the 1996/7 season, and was selected in the Redbacks winter training squad and in the State U/19 squad. He received the Sir James Invin Award from Adelaide Cricket club, and was named the inaugural winner of the prestigious Lord Taverners Award for outstanding achievement in junior cricket.

Luke was also a member of the PAC 1st X1, winners of the 1997 Coca-Cola Amatil cup, and soon to contest the Australian Schoolboys Championships.

Hockey: Jesse Adams

Jesse has represented the State at national junior championships, and has been a regular member of the elite State development squads for several years. He has been a key member of the 1st X1 for three years, and has been the recipient of the John Cawrse Memorial Trophy for Best on Ground during the Intercol, and the PAC Medal for Best and Fairest for the '97 season. It is noteworthy that Jesse was awarded Best and Fairest at Years 8,9,10 and 12, an honour achieved by no other player in the 25 years of hockey at PAC.

Hockey: Mark Gobolos

Mark's regular inclusion in the elite SASI Development Squad since 1993 is testimony to his standing in the wider hockey community and he has been identified as a player who has the potential to play hockey at the highest level. He has been a key member of the 1st X1 for three years, and has been the recipient of the PAOC Award for Best on Ground in the 1996 Intercol, and the Brian Leach Award for Service to Princes Hockey in 1997.

Rowing: Joseph de Maria

Joseph's development as an excellent coxswain culminated in his selection in a SA crew which competed in the Trans Tasman Regatta in Penrith in 1996, and earlier this year he was chosen as cox for the SA Kings Cup crew which contested the National and Kings Cup regatta in Tasmania, the most prestigious event in the Australian rowing calendar. Joseph is the first schoolboy to achieve this honour. Joseph's career in rowing at Princes has been outstanding, and he has coxed highly successful crews.

Table Tennis: Ryan Manuel

In 1996, Ryan led the PAC Junior Table Tennis Team to a National title, winning the Australian Schoolboys Teams Championship. He won the Junior Boys Singles title at the same championships, and was awarded the trophy for Excellence in sportsmanship. As Captain of the PAC Open teams in 1997, he led them through an undefeated ISSA season. Ryan is highly ranked in his age group in SA and was awarded the trophy for the Most Promising Junior in the Woodville Table Tennis Club.

Intercollegiate Cricket 1996

The 118th Annual Intercollegiate Cricket match between Princes and Saints commenced on the 6th of December on PAC's front oval. Unfortunately heavy overnight rain delayed the start by two entire sessions and it was a credit to the PAC ground staff that play was possible on the first day.

The toss was conducted just before the scheduled afternoon tea break with, PAC winning the toss and electing to field first after an anxious wait. In a tense session, PAC bowled well to capture two Saints scalps, but failed to capitalise on all opportunities presented by tight bowling. At stumps with the score at 2 for 85, the game was in the balance with Saints' most experienced batsman, Taarnby and Adcock at the crease.

With clear skies for the start of play on Saturday, PAC started well with a steady flow of wickets to have Saints 5 for 154 due mainly to the guile of Chris Watson's off breaks. However the middle session belonged to Saints and in particular Chris Taarnby who in a 91 run sixth wicket partnership with Ryan Sheridan changed the course of the game. PAC continued to battle hard in the last session and found success with the new ball with Michael Jones bowling accurately removing the Saints tail. Saints finally declared late on the second day at 9 for 309 with the highlight of the innings being a magnificent 189 in 412 minutes by opening batsman Chris Taarnby. PAC paid dearly for dropped catches but full credit must go to Chris whose concentration, temperament and skill stood between a low first innings score and a score

that had left PAC with a draw being the best result we could hope to achieve.

The first innings for PAC was very disappointing. Tight medium pace bowling and quality fielding led to PAC being bowled out for a meagre 110 with Matt Jenson (26), Sam Williams (22) and Shaun Nalder (20) the only batsmen to offer an@y resistance. Saints decided to enforce the follow on with PAC needing to bat for four sessions to save the game. By stumps, three PAC wickets had fallen with the not out batsmen Sam Williams and Vice-Captain Chris Watson being the main hope for PAC.

Both batsmen put a supreme value on their wickets but when Nathan Adcock had Sam Williams (43 in 254 minutes) and Chris Watson (40 in 186 minutes) dismissed in quick succession after lunch the game reached its inevitable conclusion just before tea. PAC was dismissed for 148 with the final result being victory to Saint Peters by an innings and 51 runs.

Although this year's intercol was particularly disappointing Saints were a much more experienced side and this was one of the major reasons for this result. However with many members of this year's intercol side returning to Princes in 1997, this augurs well for future intercol success.

In conclusion I would like to take this opportunity to thank the umpires Len Howard and Russell Schumacher who officiated professionally throughout this testing match. I would also like to commend the PAC ground staff for their efforts and the PAC mothers and in particular Jill Williams for their preparation of afternoon teas over the four days. Finally, I would like to thank personally and on behalf of previous PAC Intercollegiate cricketers, Mr Malcolm Dawe whose efforts over the last 15 years as First XI coach have been instrumental to PAC's success as evidenced by just five intercol losses under his tenure. His efforts have been much appreciated and wish him well in his future cricketing endeavours.

This work was a framed reproduction of the original menu from a dinner held by forty Old Reds and Old Blues on 7 July, 1917, in the French village of Amiens, not far from the trenches. The evening was a great success and enjoyed by all.

Old Old Boys' Assembly

One hundred and eighteen Old Scholars who attended PAC in 1937 or before were present at the Old Old Boys' Assembly at the School on Thursday 31 July 1997 at 10.30 am.

The Old Old Scholars, the President and Committee of the PAOCA who attended, were welcomed by the Acting Headmaster, Mr Milton Haseloff.

The Rev. Dr Stephen Weisz conducted the service.

The following homily given at the Old Old Boys' Assembly on 31 July 1997 by the Rev. Dr. Stephen R. Weisz, Visiting Chaplain from Tusculum College, Greeneville, Tennessee USA is based on Luke :41-52.

"The picture portrayed to us by the writer of the Gospel of Luke in which we see Jesus going up to the temple where all knowledge was to be found and where at a remarkably early age he can converse with the "top theologs" of his society is one that captures our attention. For in that event is housed all the hopes we have for a boy eager to have his questions answered and his curiosity solved. His enthusiasm excites even though we feel the pain of his parents who have lost him in the crowds and are searching for him. Boys of 12 can do remarkable things they can surprise their parents and their teachers with the questions they can ask.

Something of that boyhood curiosity, as well as an inquiry into life's deepest mysteries, is what brings us together today. I must say the term "Old Old Boys" intrigued me from the moment I heard the term mentioned. How could grown, professionally successful men allow themselves to be called Old Boys? However, it came to me that the expression "how you doin' ole boy" has always been a way of how we express high regard for each other. I remember one of my professors, who I thought hardly took notice of me, patted me on the back in the dining room of Post College in my first term and how much it meant to me then and how that feeling has remained with me through the years. In a sense we are always boys at heart, perhaps because we never really want to grow old, but also because we are reluctant to let go of that sense of eagerness we felt when we too were going out into the world without our parents looking over our shoulders.

Can the boy Jesus approaching the Scribes still not serve as a role model for all of us? I think he can for two reasons. First, because he had a yearning to grow with God's favour. Early in life he sought God's guidance. He had undoubtedly learned in the synagogue the proverb "The Fear of the Lord is the beginning of Wisdom". Secondly, he wanted to grow in favour with man. He had learned early in life the importance of getting along with others, of interacting with others harmoniously. He had already observed - Unhappy is the man who cannot get along with those he meets along life's way.

Today we come together to celebrate the mission of Prince Alfred College which is to provide a community of learning that inspires its students to grow in wisdom and stature and in favour with God and man. In the short time that I have been here I have seen a number of the students here grow. I know that they still have a long way to go, a long way indeed to go before they sit on this stage and be able to say "because I was once in this school I was given the direction and the impetus to live my life the way God wanted me to live it and along life's way I have done my best to live it accordingly and in that sense I have not been around too long to be called an Old, Old Boy."

May God bless those of you who have returned for the Old, Old Boys' Assembly at Princes, to recapture some of the spirit you felt when you were here during your growing years. May God bless you students today at Prince Alfred College who still have a long way to go in living your lives in such a way that you too will grow in wisdom and stature and in favour with God and man".

The President, Mr Alistair Walker, spoke to the assembly and also welcomed those present, after which all joined in singing Princes Men, the Prince Alfred College song and the Football song.
