

Headmaster's

Report A.D. 2000

Introduction

May Prince Alfred College be:

- " a place of inspiration and learning;
- · a place of welcome and nurture;
- a place where each person might find the courage and strength to fulfil their potential;
- a place where each is mindful of the needs of the other;
- a place of forgiveness and reconciliation:
- · a place of justice, healing and peace;
- · a place of security and compassion;
- a place of support and reassurance; and
- a place of strength and understanding."

These words were spoken by our Moderator, the Rev Don Catford, on 15th September this year when he dedicated the central tower of the main building following its extensive refurbishment. It is my sincere hope that his words of encouragement and challenge shall endure here permanently, long after the time when even our Main Building might have decayed and collapsed. The essence of any school is not bricks and mortar, but the experiences and the challenges which are essential to transform young lives.

I use the word 'endure' deliberately when I express the hope that his words of encouragement and challenge shall endure here longer even than our Main Building. Our school motto is Fac Fortia et Patere, which has traditionally been translated as 'Do brave deeds and endure'. If we were to paraphrase our motto in today's language, we would probably say 'Go well beyond your comfort zone, and persevere!' With a contemporary understanding such as this, I believe that the message of our motto is as relevant and appropriate today as it has always been, and it still offers a challenge to our boys and young men.



The opening of the Central Tower of the Main Building was just one of many highlights we have experienced this year at Prince Alfred College.

For me personally, I arrived in Adelaide on 3rd January together with my wife and four children to take up my position as the College's ninth Headmaster. I am very grateful to the entire Princes community — students, staff, parents, members of Council and Old Scholars — for the warmth and sincerity of the welcome extended to my family and me, and all the support and assistance that has been so freely given.

It is a good experience to arrive in a school and look it through fresh eyes as I have done this year. Now that I am at Princes, and feeling very much an integral part of this great school, I can understand why everyone is so enthusiastic about Princes — we share a very special place which is playing an important part in shaping the future of our society. In a literal sense, we are forming Australia's future today in our classrooms, in our corridors, in our playground and on our sports fields.

Strategic Plan

One of the most important things to happen at Princes this year has been to undertake the process of developing a new Strategic Plan. One of the 'biggest' questions we can ask ourselves in this school is: How do we make sure Prince Alfred College will continue to provide a relevant, challenging and excellent education to prepare our students fully for the future?

The answer is that we inform ourselves and make ourselves aware of changes, and then plan ahead accordingly; and that is the strategic planning process we have undertaken. I am confident that the strategic plan will be published and available to the school community early next year.

Academic Program

In the Preparatory School the decision was taken to adopt the Primary Years Program (PYP) of the International Baccalaureate into Years 1 to 5 with immediate effect.

Adoption of the PYP is consistent with and supportive of the other key educational directions of Princes, specifically Reggio Emilia, the MYP, the IB Diploma and the Dimensions of Learning framework.

Much of the staff professional development this year in the secondary school has focussed on developing the Middle Years Program (MYP) which is now in its second year of implementation at the school.

At the end of term 1, a new initiative designed to encourage effort and application on the part of our students was introduced into the Secondary School. All boys who earned Grade 1 for effort in all their subjects were awarded a specially designed certificate (The Headmaster's Gold Award for Effort). It is useful to understand the thinking behind this new initiative. While academic achievement is vitally important in a school, by definition very few students are capable of coming first in their class. It follows, therefore, that rewarding achievement is a realistic incentive only to a very small proportion of our students. On the other hand, the effort grade on reports is a measure of a student's application, irrespective of natural ability.

Student academic successes

In the final Year 12 examinations at the end of last year, SACE and IB, 70% of our students came in the top 20% of the state — an excellent result for a non-selective school and clear evidence if anyone needed it that Princes gets the best out its boys right across the academic spectrum (see P 8).

At the end of Term 2, for the third year in a row, Prince Alfred College completely dominated the Australia-wide

Also in second term, 150 Prince Alfred College students from Years 8, 9 and 10 entered the annual Australian Geography Competition, organised by the Royal Geographical Society of Queensland and the Australian Geography Teachers Association. Approximately 48,000 students entered this event from 637 schools across Australia. Tristan Clements (8 Bubner), finished equal second in Australia for his age group. A total of 68 Princes boys were awarded High Distinctions, Distinctions and Credits.

In fourth term, Craig Paterson (11 Blacket) was awarded the State Prize in the 2000 National History Challenge Awards. Another Princes student, Tom Farrant (11 Stanton) came second in the Year 11/12 age category in South Australia, with an entry that went on to be the National winner in the Year 11/12 age category. Other Princes boys who made the State Final in South Australia were Philip Selby, Hamish Smyth, Aaron Garry, Chris Seglenieks and Tom Morgan. Matthew Davis made the State Final in another History Competition, the Simpson Prize.

In third term, all Chemistry students in Years 10, 11 and 12 participated in the Australian National Chemistry Quiz organised by the Royal Australian Chemistry Institute. Students from PAC performed at a level well above the national average and Edward Wilson (10 Rushton) secured an Award of Excellence for achieving the rare distinction of 100% in the examination. Tom Evans (11 Blacket) was awarded a plaque for scoring in the top 1% of candidates at his year level. Chris Seglenieks (12 Rushton) was also worthy of congratulation, securing the highest score within PAC and gaining a place in the top 1% of candidates in the state.

In fourth term, the results of the annual Australian Maths competition showed that Princes boys also performed to a considerably higher standard than the state average in every age group. In some age groups, Princes out-performed the state average by 20% or 25%, even though we enter every boy in the competition, while many other schools allow only their elite mathematicians to enter. Earlier this year, a smaller group of 17 students in Years 8, 9 and 10 entered

the '2000 Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians'. The overall success of our students was very pleasing, with three boys — Chen Tu, Stuart Floyd and David Mao — earning High Distinction awards, two earning Distinctions and three earning Credit awards. These results, and the others I have described here, reflect very positively on the efforts of our teachers and students given that Princes is an academically non-selective school.

Wider School Program

A highly successful basketball tour to the United States was undertaken during January. The enthusiastic group, led by Mr Steve Johnston and Mr Greg Fletcher, experienced a wonderful mixture of basketball matches and sightseeing during their four week trip from 3rd to 30th January.

This year's musical production was 'Pippin', and marked the first time we have undertaken a co-production with Seymour College. The standard of the production brought positive comments in many areas and the efforts of Mr Michael Steer in directing the show are acknowledged with deep gratitude.

A new initiative this year was the first annual musical production performed jointly by our Preparatory School and the Junior School at Annesley College, 'Music!' by Cenarth Fox. Mrs Candace Kruger did a wonderful job of directing and co-ordinating this production with the staff from Annesley College, and the Year 6 and 7 boys participated with great enthusiasm.

Several boys from Prince Alfred College performed in a highly acclaimed production of 'Lord of the Flies' at the Playhouse Theatre in the Adelaide Festival Centre. Chris Olver, Edward Brockhoff and Tom Morgan played the roles of Jack, Simon and Roger respectively. In addition, several other students from Years 8 to 11 were given supporting roles.

A highly successful program of Outdoor and Transition Education (OTE) was conducted with Year 10 boys during the last week of August and the first week of September. Dr Adrian Johnson and Mrs Viv Jenson made a huge effort in organising and coordinating this program which I know was deeply appreciated by the boys who participated in it.

Every year, the Intercollegiate (intercol) Matches are a highlight of life

at Princes. This year, the winter intercol matches were conducted with an excellent sense of sportsmanship but a disappointing set of results. It was generally conceded that the teams from Saints were stronger in each sport, although not always by the margin which the scores might suggest. In every case, the Princes teams played in a thoroughly sportsmanlike manner which represented their school extremely well.

The results of the summer sporting intercols and the 'cultural' were more heartening, with wins in badminton, swimming and chess, and narrow losses in debating and rowing. Perhaps even more remarkably, our success in chess shows no sign of waning and deserves a special mention. This year, Princes has won the South Australian schools chess championship for the 26th time in 27 years, a run of success which is unique. Sincere thanks are due to our chess coach, Mr Richard Thorne, and our two teachers who support and assist him, Dr Doug Rowston and Mr Murray Thompson.

A very large number of Princes boys gained prestigious positions in representative sports teams this year, thus contributing to sport outside Princes and bringing considerable kudos to the school

Each year for the past 56 years, Prince Alfred College has produced its Science Journal. This publication is a model of its type — professional, scholarly, and produced entirely by our students. I congratulate this year's editor, Iain Murchland (12 Hemsley), the business manager Reuben Salagaris (12 Blacket), sub-editors Ben Ung (12 Blacket) and Chris Seglenieks (12 Rushton), together with Mr Bob Holloway who guided the editorial committee, for upholding more than half a century's tradition of high quality with the publication of this year's Science Journal.

A more recent publication at PAC is Uncle Alfred, our literary journal which has been significantly improved this year. (see P 71) I congratulate the editors, their panel, the contributors and Mrs Jane Nelson for their support of Uncle Alfred.

Spiritual Life and Programs

The way in which our Christian foundations are expressed is central to our identity as a Uniting Church school. For this reason, we are currently reviewing the relationship between chaplaincy, counselling and Religious and Values Education (RAVE) teaching here at Princes.

Meanwhile, further work occurred this year in developing our Religious and Values Education (RAVE) program in both the Preparatory and Secondary Schools by infusing the 'five strand' approach developed by Dr Peter Vardy from Heythrop College at the University of London. This approach has been adopted from Kindergarten through to Year 12, with some modifications to suit our Uniting Church tradition.

Dr Vardy visited Adelaide in May and provided staff development for our Preparatory School staff and the staff of Seymour College, and he visited Princes on Friday, 12th May.

It is important that our Christian understandings are put into practice wherever possible. This can occur in many ways, but I especially wish to congratulate the boys in Year 7 who combined with girls from Annesley College on 27th March this year in a 'walk against want'. The boys walked five kilometres to raise money for Community Aid Abroad.

Once again, the Alpha course was conducted at PAC, providing an opportunity for parents and friends who are interested in finding out about Christianity to meet together once a week for 12 weeks to share a meal, watch a video, chat over coffee and enter into small group discussions where questioning is welcomed.

I wish to record my appreciation to several groups which have continued to support PAC through regular and faithful prayer this year. An open invitation has been extended to parents, students and staff each Wednesday morning to join together in the chapel to pray for the Princes community, and I thank the Rev Dr Adrian Brown for his co-ordination of this group. I am grateful also for the support of the parents' prayer group under the direction of Mrs Joanne Chalmers

The essence of pastoral care is communication and love. If we took our Christian heritage seriously, and loved one another as Christ himself commanded, then almost all the disciplinary, harassment issues we face would simply evaporate. We cannot express love without open and transparent communication.

Because clear communication is so important for a school community (and any other relationship) to function effectively, efforts have been made this year to open up communication as much as possible. I have made two lunchtimes available each week as 'Open Door' times for students, so that any boy can come and discuss any issue or ask any question to me directly without having to make an appointment. I have made similar arrangements for staff.

I have also enjoyed the opportunity to meet every boy in the school this year by seeing each one individually on their birthday. I have been very impressed with the calibre of our young Princes Men as I have chatted with them, and I have found this to be an excellent way for me personally to get to know every student. The practice of seeing boys on their birthdays will continue next year.

I am deeply grateful to the Heads of Houses — Mr Mike Millard, Mr Michael Steer, Mrs Viv Jenson, Mrs Judith Hodgson, Mr Grant Davis and Mr Scott Parker — for the care they show to the boys in their houses and for the extraordinary amounts of time they spend with boys in need at times. I wish also to express my appreciation to Mr Ken Watson for his oversight of the pastoral care system in the Secondary School, and to Miss Linda Douglas for the work she performs in this area in the Preparatory School.

Boarding

Boarding has been an important part of Prince Alfred College ever since the school opened in 1869. The service we provide to isolated rural families in South Australia is an important one which is being shared increasingly with families in overseas countries which are keen to have their sons receive a Princes education.

Mr Grant Davis assumed responsibility for the boarding house at the start of 2000, and has done a wonderful job in making the boarding house a 'home away from home'. The reaction from boys and parents to Mr Davis' leadership in the boarding house has been extremely positive, and it is clearly evident that together with his assistant staff, Mr Craig Bowyer and Mr Philip Moore, Mr Davis is exercising a strong sense of pastoral care that the boys themselves are the first to appreciate. Partly as a result of Mr Davis' effective care and leadership, boarding numbers will increase next year and we may even have a waiting list;

Princes is one of only two schools in Adelaide to be increasing its boarding numbers at present, the other school being an all-girls' school.

Student Leaders

This year for the first time since 1911 when prefects were introduced at Princes, the new prefects have been appointed at the beginning of term 4 of Year 11 rather than the beginning of Year 12 as in previous years. This follows from a suggestion made by this year's Year 12 prefects. In past years, as Year 12 boys have concentrated on their studies and examinations in term 4, it has been said that we have experienced a lack of dayto-day student leadership until the appointment of the new group of prefects in the subsequent year. Appointing the new prefects in term 4 of Year 11 seems to have overcome this problem, and it has also enabled our new prefects to ask questions and tap into the wisdom of the retiring prefects. Our new prefects were commissioned at a ceremony on the last day of term 3 this year, and spent two days at a leadership training camp early this term to equip them with the skills and vision to be effective student leaders.

This year's group of prefects has been outstanding as student leaders who have strengthened the role of prefects and who have served the College unselfishly and generously. I pay particular tribute to our School Captain, Theodore Bourlotos, for his wide involvement in many diverse facets of the College, his willingness to help anywhere at any time, and his authentic 'leadership by example'. I congratulate and thank also Nathan Hallion as Vice Captain, and the prefects Alexander Chapman, Michael Findlay, Scott Harris, Andreas Heuer, Nicholas Hoffmann, Nicholas Jackman, John Jovicevic, Michael Low, Iain Murchland, David Pilcher, Aaron Puvi, Marcus Syvertsen, and Alexander Taylor. Like the other boys in Year 12 this year, these students have emerged as fine young men — Princes Men — who I am sure will follow in the footsteps of earlier generations of Princes graduates who have gone forward to serve their fellow humanity and to change our society for the good in many and various ways.

'Valedictory Certificates' have been introduced for the first time this year, presented to our Year 12 students at their Valedictory Dinner. The words on the certificate try and encapsulate the

essence of a Princes education, and read in part: (this student) has, in accordance with the policies, practices and principles of Prince Alfred College, completed a course of education at the College which aims to provide for young men an outstanding spiritual, academic, physical, cultural, vocational and values-based learning experience to maximise individual growth and development, centred upon an educational system which measures and accounts for each student's individual performance in a caring community which is based upon Christian principles, and is thus eligible for candidature in this year's South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) and/or International Baccalaureate Diploma (IB) examinations, and for introduction to membership of the Prince Alfred College Old Collegians' Association.

Computer Technology

Very soon after my arrival at Princes at the beginning of this year, significant concerns were expressed to me about the difficulties faced by students and staff in accessing computers and the internet. In order that the perceived problems could be remedied as quickly as possible, a detailed report on Information Technology (IT) was commissioned and this was completed by Mr Geoffrey Voller, an educator with extensive IT background and understanding. The report was delivered in term 3 and now forms the basis of a significant upgrading of our IT provision.

The 17 page report contained many recommendations, but two key recommendations were (a) the appointment of an IT Manager, with direct responsibility to the Headmaster, in order to provide coherent decision-making and direction, and (b) the formation of an ongoing IT Development Plan. These recommendations have been accepted, and interviews for the position of IT Manager were conducted in late October.

Many of the recommendations in the report concerned issues of upgrading our infrastructure, addressing the issue of access to computers, IT support, and other areas. Priorities are currently being

finalised and the firm intention is to make Princes once again an exemplar school in the provision of curriculumrelevant IT.

Some immediate issues were able to be addressed late this year, including the purchase of 30 new iMac computers for the Upper Primary Computing Laboratory, and 15 PC-clone computers for the Secondary School Library to replace machines which were no longer functional.

Relations with the wider community

A highlight of the year for Princes was the National Assembly of the Uniting Church, which was conducted in the Hall, boarding houses and many classrooms. This national event was a wonderful opportunity for people from across Australia to experience our grounds and our hospitality. The Assembly is held only once every three years, and this was the second time it has been held at Princes, the previous time being 1982.

We are delighted each year to host the Clipsal Innovation Lecture which is sponsored by Gerard Industries. This year's lecture, the third in the series, drew a record crowd of almost 700 people when Ric Charlesworth spoke on a broad range of themes drawn from his extensive background as coach of the Gold Medal winning Hockeyroos, a politician, a doctor and cricketer.

A very successful day was held on Friday 9th June when Princes (and specifically the Preparatory School) hosted the annual conference of the National Asian Languages and Studies in Australian Schools (NALSAS) (see P 16).

Global Links

At Princes we take seriously our claims that we must educate young men to be citizens of the world and to think as members of a world economy. For this reason, we emphasise a global perspective through links with several schools overseas (notably Tunku Putra International School in Kuching Malaysia), through international student exchanges and the courses of the International Baccalaureate, or IB, culminating in the IB Diploma as an alternative to SACE as a means of matriculation.

In late February we had a visit of 40 students from Jinan, China. This delegation of students was the largest group of students ever to come to Adelaide from China. Six teachers from Datong High School in Shanghai (China) visited Princes from Tuesday 23rd to Saturday 27th June. Several potential means of co-operation were discussed and a memorandum of understanding was negotiated.

Campus Development

Much of the capital works effort early in the year was devoted to the refurbishment of the central tower of the main building, a project that began last year. (see P 11)

Also at the beginning of the year, significant renovations and improvements were undertaken in several areas of the school. Painting was done in a number of areas, a new computer room was established in the Secondary School library, air conditioning was installed in several Preparatory School classrooms, one of the science laboratories was upgraded and repainting occurred inside the Waterhouse Wing Tower. Shade sails were erected around the pool area and repairs and maintenance of the pool tiling were completed.

The other significant capital project this year was new seating and carpeting in the Hall. Much of the funding necessary for this project, which was well in excess of \$100,000, was raised through the Development Office, spearheaded by the indefatigable Mrs Karin Dunsford.

Parents and Friends Association

The Parents and Friends' Association (P & F) is an important part of the Princes community, which has made important contributions in many areas of the school. Direct improvements that have occurred as a direct result of P & F funding assistance include video editing equipment for the library, improvements to the sound and lighting of the Hall, practice cricket balls, water polo caps, equipment for the health centre and new music uniforms.

Another important aspect of the P & F's role is to assist in the building of a true sense of community within the College family, and I have been delighted with the range of initiatives undertaken by both the Preparatory School's P & F and the 'whole school' P & F in this regard.

I wish to record my appreciation to the President of the P & F, Mrs Meg Craven, and to the President of the Prep P & F, Mrs Sharon Pugh, for their constant support and enthusiasm.

Old Collegians' Association

As I often say, the measure of the quality of any school is the calibre of its former students. It is well known that PAC has the largest ex-students' association in the southern hemisphere. This fact alone says a great deal about the loyalty that the school inspires among its students and former students. Other schools may have larger student numbers, but none can match our capacity to retain the ongoing affection and loyalty of its former students. The Prince Alfred College Old Collegians' Association (PAOC) makes an important continuing contribution to the school community.

Prince Alfred College is remarkable for the quality and quantity of the contribution which its former students have made to our society. I used the occasion of our Old Old Boys' Assembly at school in the last week of July to announce an important new project which will recognise these contributions to society — a well decorated and beautifully lit gallery display in one of our highest traffic areas of the school, to be known as 'Our Princes Men' gallery.

Towards the end of last year, Dr Brian Webber informed the Committee of the Old Collegians' Association that the World War II Memorial Board in the Assembly Hall was in need of an upgrade. The Management Committee of the Old Collegians' Association resolved this year to provide up to \$6760 for restoration of the Board, requesting that the school arrange for the restoration work to be completed. I am delighted to report that the new honour board is now proudly in place in the School Hall.

Enrolments and Marketing

We began the year with 916 students, of whom 281 were in the Preparatory School and 635 were in the Secondary School. Of this total, 98 were boarders, and of the 281 in the Preparatory School, 21 were in Little Princes Kindergarten. At the end of the year, enrolments had grown to 939 students students, of whom 312 were in the Preparatory School and 627 were in the Secondary School. Of this total, 97 were boarders, and of the 312 in the Preparatory School, 33 were in Little Princes Kindergarten.

A new prospectus has been developed this year, together with foreign language versions in German, Czech, Russian and Chinese for use in overseas marketing. It is expected that other foreign language versions will be produced next year.

A newspaper advertising campaign was undertaken in the first week of September announcing a new initiative to cater for the needs of high ability students entering the Secondary School. The focus of the advertisements was acceleration of high ability boys directly from year 6 into year 8 through "The Einstein Program." Several boys starting in 2001 will be coming to us from other schools under the Einstein Program, and this program shall continue in future years also.

Staff

A wonderful group of new teaching staff arrived at the beginning of this year, having been appointed by Dr Webber before he left at the end of last year. This group included Mr Rob Andrew to teach English, Mr Dale Hobbs to run the outdoor and environmental programs at Scott's Creek, Mr Anthony Izzo as a computing teacher with a special responsibility for the Information Literacy across the Curriculum (ILAC) program, Mr Chris Moir to teach mathematics, and Mr Charles Roberts to teach Biology and to co-ordinate our Rowing program.

After serving in our Before and After School Care service for 11 years, Mrs Yvonne Johnson shall retire at the end of this year. Mrs Johnson has given wonderful service in this role, and she will be certainly missed.

At the end of term 2, Mr Jim Cameron retired after 12 years of faithful service as a member of the maintenance team. Mr Cameron was a well known and well loved member of the school community. Another person to retire after many years at Princes was Mrs Bev Huckstepp, who finished her duties as Housekeeper after 10 years of solid service during third term.

Mr Phil Donaldson, Director of the

Scotts Creek Field Centre, submitted his resignation, effective 28th July. Mr Donaldson has accepted a position with the Department of Environment as Water Conservation Project Officer.

The Head of the Preparatory School, Mr Ian Penny, retires at the end of this year. Mr Penny has served Princes very well for ten years and has provided our Preparatory School with a strong professional, ethical and educational focus.

Our Preparatory School is widely acknowledged as being at the forefront of primary curriculum development, and Mr Penny's term as Head of the Preparatory School sees us well-placed to move ahead into a confident future.

The appointment of Mr Grant Nalder as Head of the Preparatory School was announced late in term 3. Mr Nalder is currently Deputy Head of the Primary Section of John Wollaston Anglican School in Perth.

Conclusion



A New Beginning



(Revelation 21: 1-6a)

The following is an extract from the sermon delivered by the Chaplain, Dr Adrian Brown, on the occasion of the commissioning of the school prefects for the year 2000.



The off beat Christians who thought that the end of the world, or something similar, might happen on January 1 got it wrong but that didn't stop the rest of the world getting into the new millennium party mode. And the weeks before "the day" saw an endless supply of lists: the greatest sportsperson of the century, the worst criminal, the most spectacular disasters, the best inventions etcetera, etcetera, etcetera. There was a great deal of looking back and a great deal of looking forward.

With any new year, but especially one that begins a new era where we have to put a 20 in front of the year instead of a 19, there is, and ought to be, a sense of excitement.

You are the first prefects of a new century, the first of a new millennium, the first in the Codrington era. But you are not let loose in a vacuum. You have a marvellous opportunity to look forward and a marvellous opportunity to cast off the baggage of the past. But you cannot cast off the past and you cannot get rid of the influences of the past. You are still prefects in along line of prefects. You are still heirs to the values of this school and you are still the protectors of those values. You have a great opportunity to make those values live in new ways and for a new generation.

Our reading is one that comes from a time when things were oppressive. A time when people were not free to practise their religion, when they were not free to pursue their own destiny, when they were not free to have a say in how their community was run or developed. In fact, it was a terrible time and it had a lot of similarities with what happened in East Timor and which still happens in too many other countries around the world. But the terror was not enough to stop people hoping or trying to make a difference or being determined to follow their beliefs. In fact, listening to what was said you would be excused from thinking that they were on the verge of a new millennium and were already in party mood. The words from Revelations give us hope.

All of you here are successors to those words of hope and opportunity. Those words were what drove those who founded this school and which have influenced all of those who have followed them. If we do not have the same sense of hope then why bother? We might as well close this place down and retire on the proceeds of the real estate sale.

You, as prefects, are the ones who stand as the ones who lead the expressions of hope amongst your peers. You have the opportunity to demonstrate the reality of that hope in the way you work, the way you play, the way you lead. You are the very symbols of that hope and of how it handles and impacts upon this new millennium

But you are not alone. To have the task and the intention to fulfil the promise you have made on your own would be both unrealistic and unfair. Like those who hoped at the time of our reading, like those who did so when the school was begun and like those who have gone before you, you can be assured of support. You have the support of each other, of those who are your peers, of the staff of the school, your parents and particularly of God, the one who inspired the hope and vision of a new earth. Depend upon Him and the support of others and you can succeed and you can lead the students of this school on a new journey and with renewed enthusiasm as this year, another century and another millennium unfold.

Men who are the products of a school, which has always embraced not only academic and sporting excellence, but those principles which contribute to the development of young men of honour and compassion.

There were many highlights during the year. I'm happy to report that this year's Red and White Formal was a resounding success. Its success was the culmination of hard work by Michael Findlay, Michael Low, Marcus Syvertsen and John Jovicevic. It was particularly pleasing to see all in attendance on their best behaviour.

Another cultural adventure, which

proved enormously successful, was the co-production of the musical "Pippin" by students from PAC and Seymour College. Special thanks should go to Mr. Steer for his creative direction. Although hard work, I know that everyone who participated in the musical enjoyed it greatly.

As members of the school we feel privileged to have the fine refurbished Assembly Hall. The seats are the result of generous donations from different members of the Princes community and these people have taken the opportunity to be bonded to the school forever with the option of having their names engraved on plaques at the back of the chairs.

The arrival of Dr. Codrington at Princes has brought a new lease of life to the school as we enter the new millennium. He has introduced things such as a visit to his office on your birthday, which I'm sure is a traumatic experience for the younger students; awards for exceptional effort and academic grades; and the large colourful 'Millennium Hanging' you see in the Assembly Hall. Early in Term One, all members of the school were required to outline imprints of their hands on coloured pieces of felt to be cut out and stuck on the hanging. The end result is most impressive. Which brings me to one of my personal blunders for the year. A special Assembly during Term 2 saw the unveiling of the 'Millennium Hanging' and I was asked by Mrs. Dunsford to 'gently' pull the sheet concealing the artwork. So there I was tugging at the string, 'gently' just as instructed, with the whole school watching and the cameraman poised to capture the moment. I pulled once, then twice and then with far more force, I almost pulled the whole thing down. I looked towards Dr. Codrington in embarrassment and,

sensing that, he came to my rescue. That's something I won't forget in a hurry.

On a more serious note, I'd like to say a few words about this year's Intercol. The intercollegiate contests against St. Peters are not merely a sporting contest to determine a winner and a loser. They are much more. They are an opportunity to celebrate the ideals for which Princes stands. This year I was proud, as School Captain, to participate in and to witness several team performances during the Intercol. I contend that in no other arena of school life can the personal attributes of Princes boys be better demonstrated. Although in sporting terms the year was not as successful as we would have hoped, I believe that, by a far more important measure, it was the Princes boys who were the 'real' victors.

Prince Alfred College inspires the best effort out of every student not only on the sporting field, but also in academic and artistic pursuits. This is what makes PAC special. Achievement


Students from Prince Alfred College obtained excellent results in the 1999 Year 12 examinations, both in the International Baccalaureate program and in the South Australian Certificate of Education.

The most outstanding result was that of Mitchell Raeside who gained the elusive maximum score for the IB. This achievement placed him in equal first position in the world as well as Dux of the school. Andrew Saint followed with a score of 43 and Alex Silz with 42. These three students achieved the maximum TER (Tertiary Entrance Ranking) of 99.95. Tim Nicholls, Nicholas Simmons and Paul Crossley each had a score of 41, giving them a TER of 99.90 and joining them on this ranking was Matthew Fisher with a score of 40.

Mitchell Raeside received the John Dunn Prize for the Dux of the School and Andrew Saint the E B Colton (Proxime Accessit to the Dux of the School). The Malpas Prize for Science was won by Eshan Wijeyekoon and the Longbottom Prize for Mathematics was won by Matthew Fisher. Alex Silz was the recipient of the Colton Prize for Arts and Languages.

An outstanding result of 22 merit scores for SACE and 30 scores of 7 for IB, an overall total of 52 maximum scores, were attained by our students. In addition to these outstanding scores at the top end of the scale was a very solid set of results in the middle ground, reflecting strongly on the quality of teaching and care provided by the staff of the school.

The highly successful school leavers of 1999 have entered a range of further study, reflecting their wealth of talents. One hundred and twenty PAC school leavers applied for places in tertiary education and achieved 114 placements -a success rate of 95%. The most popular areas of university study selected by last year's students were commerce, economics, finance and business and engineering. Increasing numbers of students are also undertaking double degrees in engineering with a focus on business and law.



The Millennium Hanging



In his first week at PAC the Headmaster expressed his wish that a Millennium Quilt should be made, incorporating the hand of every person in the school in that first week in 2000.

It was more than a term later when the striking quilt was finally unveiled on the wall of the Assembly Hall. Measuring some 6 by 5 metres and carrying the hand cut-outs of approximately 1100 people - staff and students, the colourful wall hanging represents all members of the community of Prince Alfred College. This important new work of art commemorates the beginning of the new millennium at Princes. The aim was to capture a snapshot of the entire Princes community at the beginning of the year 2000, with hands spread out together to suggest 'celebration.' Tracing the hands was just the beginning of the work needed to complete the project. The hands were carefully cut out and arranged, attached to a cloth base around a quilted school crest, and then the entire hanging was quilted and sewn together.

The plaque attached to the wall near the hanging explains the significance of it and acknowledges the huge effort made by the voluntary group of mothers. This hanging symbolises the entire Prince Alfred College community on the first day of the year 2000. The hand of every student, member of staff and council member was traced, signed, cut out and attached to this hanging. The different colours represent the diversity of the Princes community, while the arrangement of the hands concentrically around the College badge symbolises the working together for a common purpose and care for one another that are distinctive features of the school. 
The committee looks forward to welcoming our new Head of the Preparatory School, Mr Grant Nalder in 2001.

Report

This has been a decade of change and development, a decade of which all teachers, students and parents can feel proud.

When I arrived at PAC at the beginning of 1991, I interviewed the teachers and apart from a few changes, they identified, such as eliminating the ringing of the bell for lessons every half hour, they all valued the collegiality of staff in the Prep School and their independence to teach classes, to meet the needs of students in their own way. I understood what they meant and have tried to honour these sentiments during my time at the school. I found the school and teachers were friendly and open. Teachers valued others coming into their classrooms because they were proud of what they did and the achievements of boys. A very healthy school indeed and one of which I was lucky to be Head.

I had come with a vision of a school where there would be a high sense of achievement by boys and teachers; a school where everyone was valued for the contributions they made; a place where students would be happy and stimulated; a community where teachers, students and parents would work harmoniously towards common goals and shared outcomes; a community where everyone felt safe to express opinions and values and would work hard to achieve at the highest possible level. I wasn't disappointed, the school was indeed much like I had expected, with some areas which could be developed and

We cut out the bells instantly apart from those at the beginning and end of the day and to announce breaks.

Everyone felt better and there were less audible disruptions to the school routine. We then worked on a homework policy and together with the Senior School finished the development of our Harassment Policy which set new guidelines and goals for student behaviour. This policy added to our Discipline Policy, developed just prior to my arrival. There was a vigour and mood



to encompass change which was furthered by our review of the Prep School Gifted and Talented program. This review resulted in more classroom open-ended tasks and the Prince Alfred College Extension or Enrichment Program. By the end of the first year much had been achieved and set into action. Curriculum priorities also included a review of the mathematics program and an analysis of State and Commonwealth Curriculum Statements and Profiles which aided our understanding of more appropriate learning outcomes for students.

In the second year we devised our first curriculum plan to give us long-term direction and goals for our achievements. This plan included a review of, not only our maths curriculum, but English and science. The curriculum reviews subsequently, led to our first parent questionnaire which helped us understand parent priorities. These

priorities included recording and reporting which began a long process of developing our practices in this area together with the improvement of our communication strategies which included term overviews and assessment tasks and the improvement of our communication processes.

In subsequent years we completed the first plan and devised at least two further plans which covered Studies of Society and Environment, Religious and Values Education, a review of Languages Other Than English, the R-12 introduction of Dimensions of Learning, a review and plan of our Prep building priorities, the introduction of the Reggio Emilia Early Childhood Philosophy and the Middle and later Primary Years methodologies of the International Baccalaureate. More recently as a whole school exercise, we have developed plans to extend our Information Technology programs with new computer facilities: many developments and changes which have put Prince Alfred College Preparatory School at the forefront of primary education and have enabled us to ensure that our facilities, equipment, methodology and expertise is at the highest possible standard to move into the 21st century.

These achievements have been considerable but of even greater importance is the restructuring of the Prep School into year level teaching teams which has enabled teachers to plan

and implement their teaching programs together. Their communication of these plans to parents each term has increased parents' awareness of our teaching programs. Our planning and reporting processes have benefited and enhanced classroom programs. Teachers still maintain their independence to teach in a way which best suits their students, a value they shared with me in my first weeks at Princes, but this is done within the frameworks of the PYP and MYP Programs and Dimensions of Learning.

I came with a vision and found a school which had high expectations. Recognising this, we all worked together to ensure that boys' and teachers' achievements were valued and to create a place where everyone was happy and stimulated to work harmoniously and diligently to establish and achieve shared goals and outcomes. An achievement of which I am pleased, because I know that whenever a boy feels proud of what he has done, he knows we share that pride, whether it be academic or co-curricular. The school House competition is an avenue for boys to show their skills, and competition is always friendly and strong. In 1999 Robertson House won the Welsh Cup after a year of strong competition and changing fortunes.

The list of individual achievements is long. This year 18 Year 6 and 7 boys gained distinctions and credits for the Australian Mathematics Trust Maths Challenge for young Australians. Javed Alam gained a High Distinction. In the Australian Mathematics Competition, 23 students at Year 7 gained credits and distinctions. Cameron Roy gained a high distinction. In late 1999 three students Nicholas Martin, Brett Willsmore anad Jonathan Nguyen - gained commendations in the Dorothea Mackellar Poetry Awards and in the Community Aid Abroad Writing Competition Andrew Brook's was one of the state top entries.

During the ten years of achievement, our co-curricular program has also been extended and developed. There are more sports teams than ever, we have strong and successful chess teams: an enviable record in public speaking and debating — this year we have been runners up in

the ISHAA Debating Competition for the third time — and this year, a dance group. Boys are not "supposed" to like or be competent at Dance, Public Speaking or Debating and so these achievements have given me great satisfaction. However, of even greater importance to me has been the growth of the Music program. When I first came to Princes, music was not considered to be our strength. In fact, when boys were being sought for lunchtime practices they literally hid in the bushes, A most regrettable state of affairs, so with Mrs Virginia Whittle, we planned steps to raise the status of Music. These were further extended when Mrs Freeman became Director of Music. The Prep P & F organised and designed choir gowns for a Chapel Choir, an idea which was met with surprise and agitation by some. Mr Robert Dawe was appointed Choirmaster and he, together with Mrs Freeman, began the process of establishing a fine choir. Prep lunchtime practices for most musical groups

disappeared, with some school time

being given for Festival Choir and

instrumental practices. We conducted a whole Prep School Musical "Truckers", under the direction of Mr David McLaren (Deputy Head 1993-1997) and Mrs Tracey Callinan. More recently, there have been further musicals with our Year 4/5 "Olympic Odyssey" led by Miss Douglas, Ms Hunt and Mrs Kruger, and the Year 6/7 musical, "Music!" under the direction of Mrs Kruger which was performed jointly with Annesley College. Boys now sing with gusto, a far cry from earlier years. I just hope our Senior School boys benefit from such enthusiasm for singing. Boys are recognised for their work in music with music badges, certificates and choir medals for long service.

Sport is an area of fluctuating fortunes. When we do well, most people are happy but when we don't, obviously it is the reverse. Over the years, the Prep School has shared with Saints a relatively similar number of wins and losses in most sports except hockey where we have had a constant high standard. The most significant achievement without doubt, is

the Sullivan Cricket Foundation. Tony and Sheila Sullivan have ensured that a significant focus is placed on the development of cricket skills in Years 3 and 4 through the donation of sufficient funds over 1999, 2000 and 2001 to ensure that a special coach can be employed during school time. These funds should enable the program to go for nine to ten years. A significant gift indeed which is not only generous but visionary for the future of cricket in this school. We continue to offer a variety of sports in the school which extends our capacity to support teams with staff. These sports cover cricket, tennis, basketball, football, soccer and hockey. Teachers collectively have a solid level of coaching skills but the demands often exceed the number of teachers available and their level of skill. We have, over the last five years especially, employed more and more coaches and enlisted the support of parents to enable more teams and better coaching to result. At an individual level, strong achievements have been made. Alexander Bubner was selected to represent South Australia in the Pacific Youth Games in Sydney in April 2000. He competed in the 100m, 200m and the 80m hurdles. Jake Stacy and Jamie Bahnisch were selected in their respective age groups to represent South Australia in the SAPSASA Interstate Hockey.

The recent building developments have been outstanding. I look with pride on the first stage of this development and hope that the school will continue the vision to transform the Prep buildings into a place of stimulation and excellence.

Many people have assisted in our processes for change and development. These include all staff in their various ways. However, some need mention for their special efforts.

- Mr David McLaren as Deputy Head of Prep from 1993–1997 who was outstanding in the effort he gave to further many aspects of the school operations.
- Mrs Joy Magain, who, as Curriculum Co-ordinator and Maths Co-ordinator for over eight years, bears much of the credit for our curriculum changes,

- especially in the Middle Years Program.
- Mrs Nan Williamson and Mrs Lynda Polain for their curriculum developments in English and Religious and Values Education respectively.
- Mr Marc d'Unienville for developing our science curriculum.
- Mrs Susan Lock for her wonderful effort in creating our Little Princes Kindergarten
- Miss Linda Douglas, our current Deputy Head from 1998, who has done so much to develop the PYP and timetable to name just a few achievements.
- Mrs Irma Landi whose support for me personally has been valued most highly.







Extracts from the speech given to the School Leavers' Dinner on 31 October, 2000 by Director of Studies Mr Roger Marshman.

I salute the young men now leaving us at the close of the amazing and disturbing 20th century — a century which has handed to you a set of exciting and difficult challenges, as great, probably, as this globe has ever seen.

The circumstances of your birth: your nationality, your relative wealth and your education, have given to you the challenge of leadership, during the next fifty years or so, of a world desperate for men of courage and selfless vision — qualities all too rarely apparent in some of our political and commercial institutions. In recent surveys about future directions at PAC, some respondents have suggested changing the school's motto; I wish, in part, to address that question.

Fac fortia et patere. Given that the European world was at war in 1916, and patriotic Australians enmeshed in that war, it is not surprising that our forebears in this school looked to a patriotic and warlike context to supply the school motto that we still use today. It is my fervent hope that you will never be called upon to demonstrate your bravery in a war. Indeed I hope that you might live to see a world where narrow and selfish ideas of nationalistic and warlike patriotism might become quaintly old-fashioned.

Of course we have plenty of challenges within Australia, but in many ways our 'nation' is now the world; globalisation is here: our economies and currencies are all too obviously interdependent; ozone-depletion, AIDS, species-extinction and other environmental blights know no national boundaries; those of us in the rich industrialised or post-industrialised world continue to gobble up a staggeringly disproportionate amount of the earth's resources. To some this same 'globalisation' is just another chance for commercial, political or ideological



exploitation of poorer nations or communities.

In its Roman origin and in its application during the first world war, our PAC motto was about manly virtue. Let's not even think about changing it; manly virtues are as important as they ever were. It is our sense of what those manly virtues must be that has to change to enable Princes' men to meet the challenges of their world.

The enemies in our new globalised world are ignorance and apathy, to which I would add greed and complacency. The manly virtues with which to fight these enemies are their opposites: knowledge, commitment, generosity and self-examination.

It will take bravery of a new and special order for you to stand up for the common global good and to achieve the better world of your dreams. Here are some of my challenges to you;

- commit yourselves to the hard work, of reconciliation between black and white Australians
- reverse the current trend both nationally and globally towards an increasing gap between poverty and affluence
- change Australian political systems so that short-term goals and appeals to greed and self-interest in the electorate do not rule the debate; consider, for example proportional representation and longer term parliaments
- be willing to make the lifestyle and financial sacrifices needed to make the earth environmentally sustainable; start by ensuring that Adelaide does not become a city enslaved to the motor car

- recognise that exploiting and harassing the weak or different is not a sign of strength or manliness but of cowardice; so is standing by and doing nothing when others exploit and harass the weak; so too is hiding in the crowd. It takes a real man to stand apart from mob mentality
- do not succumb to the popular ethical argument of radical relativism: the idea that anything you want to do is all right as long as no one gets hurt. That's a slippery slope indeed and one apt to have unforeseen outcomes. Develop responsible sexual attitudes.
- challenge the media to deliver information that goes beyond the soundbite, and argument that goes beyond the facile false dichotomy.
 Support a strong public broadcaster;
 Australia needs an independent ABC
- in a world where IT worship can be the new idolatry, recognise that wisdom is more than knowledge and knowledge is more than information; recognise that advertising is not the only purpose of language.

Because of the very privilege of your birth and education, many of you will in due course be the leaders who influence and inspire others. You will be powerful men; you will have disproportionately great power financially, socially and intellectually. I have tried to suggest to you that this carries awesome responsibility; you will have to choose repeatedly to use that power for good or ill, for selfish ends or for the good of the community, for society at large and for a more just and equitable world. You may, for example, choose to exploit those who work for and with you, or you may choose to treat them honourably and pay them generously.

I hope that the privilege of a good education will lead you to challenge bravely all forms of complacency. It is all too easy to go from a place like this with only the limited and limiting intentions of maintaining the status quo of privilege and power. Worse, those limitations are expressed as often as not in dreams — or more dangerously, perhaps, in the reality — of mere material affluence.

May you continue to grow in knowledge and in wisdom, bravery and endurance. Go from this place with pride, rejoicing in your power, but go also in a spirit of generosity, determined to share your good fortune, and strive to 'do brave deeds and endure.'

PAC Offers International Programs R-12

The year 2000 has been significant in terms of the school's commitment to the programs of the International Baccalaureate Organization (IBO). We have taught the Diploma Program for Years 11 and 12, as an alternative to the South Australian Certificate of Education, with conspicuous success since 1997; we began the Middle Years Program (MYP) at Years 6 and 7 in 1999 moving through to the secondary school this year; now in 2000 we are going through the processes of planning and authorization to offer the Primary Years Program (PYP)

These steps are indicative of our wish to have a strong global perspective in our curriculum and to place ouselves publicly and proudly on a worldwide educational stage. The IBO headquarters are in Geneva and its curriculum and assessment operations are based in Cardiff; we are in the IB Asia Pacific region which has its regional office in Singapore. The IBO guards its standards zealously and in all three programs a school's authorization must be reviewed every five years. There are currently only 22 schools worldwide authorized to offer all three programs; four of these are in the Australasian sub-region and three of those are in Adelaide.

The Diploma Program

During this year we decided to expand our Diploma subjects and from next year will teach Information Technology in a Global Society, Psychology and Spanish ab initio, the latter mainly to allow boys who have entered the school since Year 8, and who therefore have not studied French or Chinese, to take the Diploma. One boy with aspirations towards Diplomacy is taking Chinese and Spanish in his selection of subjects.

In 2001/2002 PAC will have its biggest contingent so far taking the IB Diploma: 37 boys.

The Middle Years Program

The Middle Years Program (MYP) addresses the special needs of students from Grade 6 to Year 10 inclusive, as they move from puberty to midadolescence. The academic program caters for students of mixed abilities and focuses on the education of the "whole person," in preparation for a life of active, responsible citizenship. The program is based upon the fundamental concepts of intercultural awareness, holistic eduction and communication. Particular emphasis is placed on the importance of verbal and non verbal communication. The acquisition and development of a second language is central to the program.

The Middle Years Progam at PAC transcends the domains of traditional school subjects and focuses on a more holistic view of knowledge. Emphasis is placed on a thorough knowledge of eight subject areas; however an interdisciplinary perspective also invites the student to consider issues and problems in their widest perspective and to recognise that the best solutions draw insights from many sources.

The curriculum model is sufficiently flexible to allow for the introduction of other subjects, should the school wish to do so. At PAC, Religion and Values Education remains part of the curriculum and students may undertake extension work in Philosophy.

Five broad Areas of Interaction give the MYP its distinctive core. They are embedded within the academic subjects and are made explicit in the delivery of the content of the program: — Approaches to Learning, Community Service, Health and social education, Environment and *Homo faber* (Man the maker.)

The program was introduced at Years 6 and 7 in 1999 and this year, students who began working with the model at that time have moved into the Senior School. Curriculum challenges and innovation were highlighted by the implementation of three interdisciplinary units. Citizen of Australia: Citizen of the World analysed Australia as a nation of immigrants who came to a long-settled land. In focusing on their own family history and on the rights, responsibilities and roles they play in groups and organisations, students came to an increased understanding of their own place in the family, school, local, national and more global contexts.

Dynamic Systems linked the curriculum across Kent Town and Scotts Creek Field Centre to establish meaningful connections from the classroom to the bush campus setting. Exploration of the landscape and natural systems around Scotts Creek, reinforced students' understanding of aboriginal peoples and their belief systems. By studying man-made micro and macro systems, the boys were able to understand their own interrelatedness to the environments in which they exist.

Perspectives explored ways of knowing and being in different cultures and contexts. While students considered

ancient and modern cultures, many were surprised to discover the different paradigms associated with the 'insider'-'outsider' points of view.

Student evaluation indicates a growing understanding, across the Year 8 student body of how their learning transcends subject boundaries and each student can develop strategies to improve his learning. Best of all, those students who moved across from the Preparatory School were also able to make connections with elements of their MYP work in Year 7. All boys have developed sound understanding of the program and have a working knowledge of the five Areas of Interaction.

During Year 10, the final year of the MYP, students undertake an independent unit of work that is the culmination of their five year involvement with the program. Students nominate a topic or task of their choice and consult closely with staff and an approved mentor. The project must demonstrate the student's involvement in two or more of the Areas of Interaction.

Successful completion of the MYP, including the personal project, allows students to qualify for international certification, under the auspices of the International Baccalaureate
Organization. All students will be issued with a record of their achievement.

The Primary Years Program

In 1991 the International Schools
Curriculum Project (ISCP) devised an
International Curriculum based on the
guided inquiry method. There was a
recognised need for a curriculum
framework in the international schools to
allow each individual school to respect
the culture and needs of its own
community while still focusing on global
education. The program is now
administered by the IB organisation and
was adopted by the Prince Alfred
College Preparatory School in 2000.

The PYP has a strong commitment to the implementation of the inquiry as a vehicle of learning: the three interrelated components of the PYP curriculum definition are expressed as open-ended questions, compelling us to think deeply about our own practice with regard to student learning:

What do we want to learn?

How best will we learn?

How will we know what we have learned?

The MYP program culminates in the presentation of personal projects in Year 10. The PYP has a similar structure with the presentation of a Student Exhibition in Year 5. Individual students are encouraged to focus upon an area of interest and, through their own research and guided inquiry work in the classroom, present their personal project.

This year Preparatory School staff have worked hard to become familiar with the PYP program, starting the school year with a workshop, run specifically for our staff by Mr Kelvin Sparkes, an IB PYP trainer.

The major change promoted by the PYP has been instigated by the planning of the Program of Inquiry units. Staff from Kindergarten to Year 5 collaborate across year level groups and with specialist staff to ensure that a truly trans-disciplinary approach is achieved. Staff have had to use a different set of guiding principles to organise these units of work and then ensure a sense of continuity across the K-5 continuum. They have focused on providing students with an interesting, relevant, challenging, varied and significant curriculum that is related to their lives and their world. They are viewing the curriculum as a dynamic tool, ever changing according to the needs of the community and the world in which we live. The Preparatory School has joined a network of schools throughout the world working towards the same goals.

The PYP is providing the Preparatory staff with an intensive time of personal and professional development. More importantly, it is providing them with a strong sense of collegiality and a sense of success through the positive learning and teaching experiences it has already provided.

Reggio Emilia

In July 1999 a new era began at Prince Alfred College when the Little Princes Kindergarten opened its doors. Little Princes provides stimulating and challenging learning experiences which are based on a comprehensive understanding of the ways in which a young child learns. Where possible some of the ideas used have been adapted and blended into programs used in the Junior Primary section of the school. The focus of the program is the principles and philosophies used in Childhood Education in Reggio Emilia. Educators in Reggio Emilia have received worldwide acclaim for their programs. The approach celebrates uniqueness and individuality and focuses on creating an environment which fosters the development of the whole child.

The educators in Reggio constantly reflect on the role of the child, the teacher, and the parents and believe that the quality of the environment can be enriched through close communication and collaboration. Children are encouraged to create and express their theories and continually work to develop them through constant sharing and exploration of various materials and their environment. To facilitate this approach the staff are seen as researchers along with the children They document discoveries, ask questions and work from the children's ideas and interests.

Staff listen to and observe each individual student's interests and perceptions. This sharing helps to develop children's understanding of their world by creating a rich learning environment. Discoveries and reflections are constantly being made by staff, students and parents to share the boys' joy of learning and to celebrate childhood. The Princes community is an important link in promoting the Reggio Emilia philosophy and approach to learning in the Early Years.





Grand Opening of the Music Suite

16 August 2000

I doubt that the Headmaster and Council of 1869 ever dreamed that the upper level of this building would become part of the Music Centre of Prince Alfred College. For over a hundred years the rooms on the uppermost level were in fact boarding house, with dormitories, prefects rooms and even an ablutions block on the verandah, which was only demolished six years ago.

Fourteen years ago, when Dr Webber took up the Headmastership, the upper level was used for the occasional music and drama lesson, and housed the school radio studio "Birdland". The first floor was empty and almost derelict, the balconies were closed off and secondary music was confined to a section of what is now the Prince Philip Theatre, with three practice rooms underneath the assembly hall. Music for Reception to Year 7 was confined totally to the Preparatory school, and music staff in the two sections of the school operated essentially independently. Boarders still lived on the first floor of Waterhouse [the southern] wing of the main building.

In 1991 (the year before I arrived at Princes), the boarders vacated the main building, after 120 years of enjoying the views, to occupy the newly developed Hartley wing of the current boarding facilities. The senior school music program transferred to the upper level of the main building and the Prep Class Music program continued in a transportable dwelling near the Prep Library. The ground floor of Waterhouse wing was totally refurbished as a drama/performance space and opened by our Royal Visitor, HRH Prince Philip the Duke of Edinburgh, in February 1992. Two years later, the upper level of Waterhouse wing was refurbished allowing the whole music program to come together in the one building, now known as the Music Centre.

The further vision of a magnificent building fully utilised for educational purpose in a modern context is now two thirds of the way to becoming a reality.

I am delighted that Dr and Mrs Webber were present at the Grand Opening to see one of Dr Webber's many visions come to fruition. I was also thrilled that so many of the people who helped these visions materialise were also present. Princes is a very special community where every person and every job is valued. Some jobs are highly noticeable - how can anyone miss hearing and seeing our musicians performing - while others are often invisible or done before and after events. We have a lot of 'fairies' at Princes, who magically take care of everything from providing cups of tea to magnificent feasts, supplying power, hanging up pictures and replacing locks, setting out furniture, cleaning and polishing and removing impossible marks, making timpani covers, preparing PPT for Recitals, signing cheques and balancing books, painting stairwells, raising money, saying 'yes' when

they really should say 'no' and most of all for doing all these things and more with such willingness and good cheer.

Rex Hoberoft, our Patron of Music, was unable to be present. He wrote from Perth:

"Thank you very much for inviting me to the Grand Opening of the Music Suite at the College next Wednesday, 16 August, I would love to be there but unfortunately distance will defeat me on this occasion. And what a wonderful occasion it will be!

I did, at least, have the pleasure of seeing the Music Suite when its renovations were well advanced in May, and thus have a fair idea of its overall appearance.

One of the joys I have in being privileged to be Patron of Music has been the regular opportunity to witness the rapid growth of musical courses and activities. I believe more than ever that music education of the quality fostered at Prince Alfred College is an essential educational ingredient for all primary and secondary school students.

I wish you, your enthusiastic staff and students all good wishes in your beautiful new setting. Please accept and send on my apology for my absence next Wednesday."

Headmaster Dr Stephen Codrington then officially opened the Music Suite, Level 2 of the Main Building.

Pippin the Musical



From the moment the members of the audience shuffled into the Assembly Hall, they knew they were in for something different. An almost painfully bright psychedelic kaleidoscope of colour confronted them as they surveyed the thrust stage and surrounding set from their seats. This was to reflect the style and feel of the performance of this year 2000 Prince Alfred College and Seymour musical.

Pippin is the central character of the musical whom the whole story surrounds. Ted Bourlotos played Pippin with admirable skill and sensitivity that is the culmination of many years as a seasoned performer. His brilliant voice and thoughtful delivery of his numbers enabled him to capture the emotions felt by Pippin as he is faced with all the dilemmas that confront the youth of today while he desperately searches for his place in the world. Pippin begins his journey as a confident, ambitious young prince, determined to become "extraordinary." However, as the musical progresses Pippin realises that being an extraordinary young man isn't easy and plunges into deep despair, abandoning his obligations to the throne, falling from the heights of the mighty Holy Roman Empire to the gutter of gloom and doom.

Fortunately Catherine, played by Kate Bonney, the widow of a noble and head of a vast estate, takes him in. Pippin is introduced to her world and the world of her son Theo, played by Ben Magain, and away from his princely duties to develop a taste for the simple things in life. The relationship between Catherine and Pippin develops from one of pure acquaintance to a more affectionate one. Kate Bonney stunned the audience with her soothing voice and her captivating appearance as she eloquently played the strong and brave but gentle Catherine, perceptively capturing the cunning of her feminine nature.

Pippin struggles to relate and communicate with his all powerful but domestically feeble father, King Charles, played by Lachlan Scott. While presenting the father figure to Pippin, both in stature and status, Lachlan manages to capture the dichotomy in his character. An exalted king who is the figurehead of an almighty empire - "a giant in the battlefield and in the bedroom," to a husband who is easily manipulated by his cunning and deceitful wife, Fastrada, within the confines of his castle. Megan Jahnke brilliantly played the wife of Charles as she pushed for her favourite son Lewis, played by Andreas Heuer, to be placed on the throne. Andreas combined his well developed acting skills with his natural flair to play the lovable, simple minded ignoramus younger brother of Pippin, developing as an audience favourite, providing many hearty laughs in many stereotypical scenes displaying sibling rivalry.

The musical was narrated throughout by three leading players including Hilary Coleman, Alexandra Yong, and headed by the leadplayer Danielle Harding. Possessing outstanding voices, these three combined with Ted to produce memorable quartets as they supported each other throughout their sterling performances.

The mixture of bright colour, mesmerising mass choreography, and strong choruses all combined to deliver a strong, up front and spectacular performance.

A Tribute to Ian Penny — Head of Prince Alfred College Preparatory School.

In 1991, I first met Ian Penny at my interview for the position of Director of Music. My first impression was that of a man devoted to finding and giving the best on offer to the education of his boys in the Prep School. It was obvious that he held music at the forefront of his vision and that he was determined to build a strong tradition that would not end at Year 7, but accompany the boys throughout their school lives at Princes. Himself an accomplished singer, experienced actor and lover of all musical performance, Ian encouraged, supported and 'stuck his neck out' to ensure that music encapsulated both the curriculum and the co-curricular life of the

school. Princes has always been involved in the JSHAA Festivals at the Town Hall, two of which Ian Penny coordinated and hosted in 1997 and 1998. This year was quite a typical year of involvement for Princes, with a strong Festival Choir, a first-ever boys' Dance Troupe, and fifty per cent of the percussionists in the Festival Percussion Ensemble, trained and conducted by our Percussion Teacher Simon Varga. 

Public Speaking

Public Speaking provides boys with the opportunity to acquire valuable skills which enhance their confidence and performance in the classroom, as well as in a range of other contexts. Indeed, all the boys who have been involved in public speaking at various times throughout the year have demonstrated a significant growth in self-esteem, the ability to communicate clearly and unselfconsciously, and a preparedness to undertake leadership roles and responsibilities when they arise.

Because team sports bring with them so many positive experiences, students sometimes feel uncomfortable committing to an activity that focuses so specifically on the individual. However, the camaraderie that develops among the boys, as they work together, allows them to focus positively on their strengths and weaknesses and to help each other attain their personal best. Self-consciousness soon disappears. Nowhere is this more evident than in the preparation for competitions.

This year three PAC boys made it through to the state finals of the Legacy Junior Public Speaking Award. This competition is open to students up to fifteen years of age.

Stuart Floyd from Year 9 Delbridge prepared a speech entitled Imagine and focused on the positive contribution of volunteers and their benefit the community. He also presented a thoughtful, polished, impromptu speech. Tom Ricketts of 8 Baird evoked the trenches of the First World War and focused on mateship and the spirit of Anzac. His impromptu comments about the preparations for the Olympics were thought provoking and perceptive. Peter Savvas from the Preparatory School spoke in a forthright manner and wooed the audience with his impromptu account of a visit to the ancient ruins in Athens.

Our boys finished equal third. They were congratulated by the organisers for

Each year the Bond University in Queensland organises a national mooting competition. Young advocates from around the country compete as teams of three, comprising two barristers and a supporting solicitor.

Our team shared a high level of experience with each of the members having competed in the past year. The process of mooting focuses on a mock situation wherein competitors assume the actual role of lawyers in a civil trial. The legal issue for our specific case centred on the loss of commercial worth for a public figure. The difficulties associated with the case required extensive research in order for Princes to construct a cohesive and effective argument within an area of 'new-law'. We were ably assisted in our preparation by Mr Edward Jolly, a current barrister and old scholar of the school, who provided invaluable insight and knowledge into the processes and theory of the courtroom. Mr Kevin Tutt also aided the team significantly by providing access to relevant resources, suggesting avenues of approach and ensuring that our preparation remained on schedule.

Unfortunately the team was unsuccessful in its attempt to win the State Division and thus did not proceed to represent the school at national level. Despite this disappointment each member of the team gained due credit from the judges for advocacy skills and all enjoyed the opportunity to participate.



Museum



Report

The year 2000 has been an important year of transition for the School Museum and whilst much has remained the same, there is strong evidence of change and innovation too. The first change was brought about by the resignation of Mr Norm Bennett, who had been the Curator for the past three years. He was succeeded by the Coordinator of History and Head of Studies of Society and the Environment, Mr Andrew Buston.

One of the first impacts of this change was that the resources of the Museum have been utilised more fully in the History classrooms of the school. All Year 11 History students undertook research on some aspect of the school's history, presenting their findings in the form of a table display, a poster or a pamphlet. Copies of the latter have been printed off for distribution to visitors to the Museum and have proven particularly popular. At present the range of subject matter is quite limited but it is expected that this will grow over time as each new group of students undertakes research.

Given the increasing number of visits and visitors to the Museum in recent years a calendar was produced and distributed around the school to assist in planning. Special visits were arranged for every Year 8 class early in the year as well as for new boys at other year levels. These visits proved very popular and resulted in eight boys taking up an invitation to join the student Museum Committee as junior members. Besides Meet the Headmaster Tour visitors and Old, Old Boys, other visitors included a Probus group, Uniting Church Ministers, Year 11 Parents, Boarders' parents, Japanese exchange students and the members of the National Council of the History Teachers Association of Australia (Mr Buxton being the President of this Association). In another new initiative a digital camera is being used to photograph all groups that visit and these photos are on display in the Museum.

Acquisitions continued to grow throughout the year and these are very much welcomed by the committee. Occasionally, items were borrowed for House meetings and on one memorable occasion, a borrowed photo of an early football team was used by Mr Vaughn Huddleston to inspire an unexpected football victory!

In the exhibits areas an attempt was made to rotate displays more frequently and boys were encouraged to take some reponsibility for mounting these. There was an upgrading of signage and boys were encouraged to engage in more long term planning.

Maintenance and improvements to fixtures also occupied the Committee's time. Security and lighting were improved, door latches were added, cupboards repaired and investigation made of storage space. Some original paper items and paintings in the Museum will soon be copied so as to prevent their deterioration. The originals will then go to the Archives. The most notable item to be copied will be the portrait of Prince Alfred and the letter in which he agrees to have the school named after him. A second copy will be placed on the wall in the front fover of the school. In Term Three a submission was made to the Information Technology Committee to upgrade the Museum and Archives computer facilities and to link

them to the school network to improve access to the collections.

An interesting development was the contact between the Curator and a teacher and students from the Moscow Economic School who are in the process of setting up a school museum.

Communication is particularly slow but the school very much appreciated hearing about the workings of the Princes Museum.

With respect to the future, we intend to increase the curriculum links to the Museum's resources and extend the range of publications produced and the aspects of the school's history covered. The new computer facilities when installed will greatly assist in the areas of displays and data collection and access to Museum visitors. The current members of the Museum Committee are entering their final year of schooling and the junior members of the committee will gradually assume greater responsibility for the duties of managing the Museum. In recognition of the older boys' work over almost three years Mr Buxton initiated a special badge which was presented to the boys by the Headmaster at a school assembly. The work of the committee and the important role played by the Museum in introducing the boys of the school and visitors to the history and traditions of the school is invaluable.


and trust we have increased awareness of concerns in the wider community.

Diving

Vanuatu Trip

Imagine spending two weeks in paradise, softly gliding through tropical waters surrounded by aquatic life that would take your breath away. Well for 27 members of the Prince Alfred College Community, this dream became a reality during the Second Term holidays when we left the depths of the Adelaide winter for the tropical oasis of Vanuatu. Led by the very brave Dr and Mrs Johnson, Mr and Mrs Jordison, and Mr Baird, students, families and friends packed their bathers and beach towels and said goodbye to Australia for a much needed end of term break. Although the purpose of the trip was to SCUBA dive, nondiving participants amused themselves in a range of activities, such as sightseeing, sunbathing, snorkelling, and generally making the most of the laid-back lifestyle and rich culture that just is Vanuatu. However, for the divers there was hardly a moment to spare - as was the intention - for we had an entire ocean to explore; an ocean, by the way, that seemed like bath water when compared to the ice-box that winter Adelaide waters become!

The first week was spent on Hideaway Island, a very small coral island resort about twenty minutes out of the capital, Port Vila, which makes even Adelaide look big! For the odd moment not spent diving (in sites such as 'Gotham City' with the 'Bat-Fish'), we engrossed ourselves in various other water sports, or catching a lift into the city for shopping in the markets, or making the most of must-see destinations including a bit of a paddle in the beautiful Cascade Waterfalls. Night-times, after enjoying a nice (and expensive!) feast of coral crab right beside the waters' edge, lit only by the natural moonlight and the soft yellow glow of lanterns, and with a gentle ocean breeze rustling our salt-laden hair.... Night-times were spent kicking back and relaxing with perhaps a gentle stroll, only the sound of lapping waves in your ear, or sitting outside on the sofa in front of a nice, violent video, pirated of course (it was Vanuatu after all!).



But at the end of the first week it was time for some to say goodbye as some members of the party headed back to Adelaide and others joined our merry troop for the second week on the island of Espiritu Santo, about a forty-five minute plane journey from Port Vila. During the Second World War, Santo was the site of a large Allied naval base and, although receiving no attack from enemy fire, friendly mines played havoc with Allied ships, sinking two: the battleship 'USS Tucker,' and the luxury passenger liner-turned troop ship, the 'SS President Coolidge.' It is for these sites, especially the latter, that Santo has become a Mecca for SCUBA Divers. The Coolidge is the largest most accessible wreck dive in the world, and at 22,000 tons, 200 x 25 metres, that is a very large ship. Obviously the dives on the Coolidge were simply sensational: donning army helmets and gas masks still on the decks, sitting in the firing position of a 20mm cannon (still moving, if ever so slightly), sitting on the Captain's official 'thunderbox' (toilet paper is a bit of a problem though), and giving one last farewell kiss to the 'Lady,' its famous Elizabethan sculptured resident. This is of course not to mention the other, this time living residents: Nessie, the monteray eel, and Boris, the 200kg groper that just loves a fish and a tickle under the chin.

However, other must-dive sites included "Million Dollar Point," where thousands of tons of US Army equipment were dumped at the conclusion of the war, and the 'USS Tucker,' 'MV Henry Bonneaud,' and even a memorable night time dive on the 'Coolidge' surrounded

by glowing lantern fish. Each dive presented its own unique challenge and thus an invaluable learning experience to us, all of various ages and diving expertise, from learning how better to conserve air to prevent a build up of sediments, or just how to relax and thoroughly enjoy the dive-which we all certainly did! And of course much of our time in Santo was also taken up with sightseeing, shopping, cave snorkelling, jumping off a 14 metre bridge into the river below, or simply saying 'g'day' in our typical Aussie way to a few of the friendly locals.

All good things must come to an end, so tired, wet, even sick, and certainly for most, flat broke and heavily in debt to entrepreneurial fellow travellers, we piled onto the plane (alongside a live and clucking chicken) to return to Port Vila, and then on to home with our diving logs and camera rolls complete, and hearts and minds filled to the brim of memories to last a lifetime.

On the 14th October 1999, the PAC Solar Cycle team left Adelaide bound for Alice Springs where the second ETSA World Solar Cycle Challenge would begin in just a few days. The boys quickly acclimatized to the 35+ degree-days we encountered and several training sessions were provided for pit crew and riders under race conditions just out of the Alice.

Speed qualifying saw the PAC vehicle place in 11th from a total of 26 teams representing 8 different countries. Switzerland, United Kingdom, Malaysia, Italy, United States of America, South Africa, Netherlands and of course Australia were all represented, making the event a truly international one.

On Monday the 18th the first stage of the race was underway finishing 200km away at Erldunda. PAC demonstrated its early intentions, finishing 3rd in class (Aerodynamic Experimental) and 7th overall.

The riders, Adam Price, Richard Edwards, Scott Harris, Alex Cowley, Clarke Petrick and Richard Steenvoorde all proved to be determined and both mentally and physically strong. Most riders spent up to 2 hours at a time in the vehicle with temperatures in the cabin exceeding 55 degrees at times. Iain Murchland, Craig Bayetto, Sam Olechnowicz, Aaron Puvi, Jonathan Bishop and Henry Rankine made up the pit crew and were just as responsible for the great success we had. The pit crew were able to stop the vehicle, get the rider out, change water bottles, change radio, get the new rider in and push the vehicle off in just over 17 seconds. At the end of many days they kept us in front with the accuracy of a Formula One

The first day gave a fairly accurate picture of how the teams would place nearly a week later. PAC consolidated its 3rd in class position, and after battling

For a group of high school students competing against, in some cases, world class cyclists I feel we have certainly held our own and shown what can be achieved by sheer determination. In fact the team was so successful the Malaysian government

Outdoor Education at Scotts Creek Field Centre

During the year 2000, classes from Years 6,7,8 and 9 have undertaken programs at the Scotts Creek Field Centre.

Students were exposed to a huge range of environmental and outdoor challenges. Specific programs in Outdoor Adventure gave the boys an opportunity to challenge their personal limits and to develop their camperaft skills. The Centre's focus during 2000 was to gain a balance between Outdoor Adventure and Environmental Education. This was achieved through a number of activities. The inclusion of an aboriginal spokesperson and personnel from the South Australian fisheries and government initiatives such as Waterwatch and Bushcare all contributed to the successful outcomes of the year level programs. Of particular note was the linking of the Kent Town and Scotts Creek campuses in the integrated study undertaken by Year 8 students in their Middle Years Program interdisciplinary unit in Term 2

Year 6 students continued with the Earth Education program, begun at Year 5 the previous year while the program for

Year 7 students took on a new focus incorporating Waterwatch and Bush care, land regeneration, canoeing, navigation and camperaft.

The Middle Years Program in Year 8 afforded the opportunity for planning an interdisciplinary unit, Dynamic Systems, with a Geography, Science and English focus. Students were organised into research teams to map and study transects of the wetlands and mallee region. Since European settlement, the Brenda Park/Scotts Creek wetland has been used for a variety of agricultural purposes, all of which have had a huge impact on the fragile ecology of the area. Research teams of students collected data about flora and fauna and the impact of white settlement, land use and imported species. Teams reported back on these and data collected from these studies has been placed on a data base at Kent Town and will be used for longitudinal studies of the region.

Aboriginal perspectives were investigated and an aboriginal custodian of the region spoke with the students. Dreamtime stories of the Ngarrindjeri region, stretching from Adelaide to
Morgan and on to the Coorong, were
studied along with the functioning of
aboriginal communities prior to
European settlement. The addition of a
campout night in Year 8 allowed students
the opportunity to develop new skills in
the outdoors.

Outdoor Adventure was the Year 9 focus with students participating in a two-night canoe expedition, an adventure ropes course and initiative activities.

Our continued involvement in a wetland project funded by the National Heritage Trust gave our students the opportunity to make a real difference to our ecosystem. The retrieval of transect data and animal observation contributed to the success of this project.

As we look towards 2001, the programs at Scotts Creek Field Centre will focus on the development of students in the Outdoors.

Our broad aims include:

- contributing to a clean and sustainable environment
- extending students in outdoor activities involving adventure, challenge and risk taking
- giving boys the opportunity to make informed choices about their lifestyles which will help them live more harmoniously with the Earth

...and above all

 providing students with fun and enjoyable experiences.

Intercollegiate Cricket 1999

This year's intercollegiate, the 121 st fought out between Prince Alfred College and St Peters, was never going to be easy. Unlike last year when PAC had two of the under 19 State fast bowlers in its attack, Paul Rofe and Oliver Thomas. this year it faced two of the State's opening fast bowlers, Chris Delaney and Jonathon Worthley. Add to this St Peters home ground advantage and a very inexperienced PAC side, eight of its players being from years 11 and 10, it was a big challenge. However, this year's Intercol lived up to its traditional reputation. It had all the necessary twists and turns a hard fought 4 day cricket match should have.

A start on the opening day was delayed because of heavy rain that had fallen the previous days. An early lunch was taken without a ball being bowled. Tireless work by the Saints ground staff, using a sopper and large industrial fans, allowed

The first session of day 2 was all Saints. At lunch they had taken the score to 5–262. Ryan Byrne, Sam Tyler, Nick Jackman and Tim Angel worked tirelessly with the ball and the fielding was still solid. The break came after lunch, and although Verco had scored a brillant 116 St. Peters started to lose wickets and were all out for 326. Nick Jackman had bowled 27 overs 3–63, Ryan Byrne 26 overs, 1–60, Tim Angel 27 overs 0–59, Sam Tyler 21 overs , 1–53 and Dan Killey 8 overs , 3–15.

PAC's innings started disastrously. It was late in the day and a hard call for the openers, Ben Haylock and Tim Hudson, after fielding for nearly two days. Hudson was out for two, the score one for five.

Day 3 saw Haylock and Chris Hancock take the score to 54 before Haylock was out for 23. Hancock was dismissed for 24, Jackman and Killey lost their wickets in quick succession. Tyler 23, and Byrne 33, added 56 valuable runs. PAC was dismissed for 154.

Prince Alfred was asked to follow on and in its second innings gallantly made 269. Four of PAC's batsmen stood out.
Jackman 37, Tyler 48, Byrne 39 and
Chris Hancock's 69 was a special innings.
The team had been able to put
partnerships together and had given
themselves a glimmer of hope. Saints
needed only 98 runs to win and only won
the match late in the last session of play.
At one stage a draw seemed possible. In
achieving the total Saints lost 6 wickets,
Jackman and Killey taking 2 wickets
each. Another 50 runs may have swung
the match in PAC 's favour. But this is
just a what if.






The first event for the year was the annual Quiz Night in the Assembly Hall, a highly successful night with funds



Stanton House Report

Fortunately the Millennium Bug failed to diminish the momentum that Stantonites have begun to build in recent history and this year has yielded ample opportunities for the men of Stanton to frequently achieve levels of academic, creative and sporting excellence. The house has continued its tradition of producing fine school leaders with the appointment of Ted Bourlotos as Captain of School. Ted embodies the qualities most valued by Stanton and his dedication, talent and good humour have culminated in an impressive list of accolades this year.

Stanton has been equally well-represented in terms of co-curricular leadership with Ted (Captain of Soccer) being joined by Ryan Bickmore (Captain of Tennis), Michael Siciliano (Vice Captain of Soccer), Anton van Bavel (Intercollegiate Captain of Debating), Ashley Cleveland (Vice Captain of Swimming) and talented footballers Simon Mullan and Tom Jessop amongst the elite sportsmen of Princes. Stanton's strong emphasis on leadership is further indicated by the impressive contingent of newly-elected prefects who have emerged from our Year 11 cohort.







provided \$9,500 towards this project.

The Association has also provided funding of almost \$7,000 for the restoration and repositioning of the World War Two Honour Board in the Assembly Hall.

At the September meeting of the management committee, it was resolved that a further half scholarship be provided to the School commencing in January 2001, making a total of seven half scholarships funded by the Association. The Headmaster generously reciprocated offering the Association's sporting clubs the on-going use of school facilities rent free.

On Friday 15 September, I represented the Association at the dedication of the Central Tower of the Main Building of Prince Alfred College following its restoration and refurbishment. The Service was conducted by the Moderator of the Uniting Church, The Rev. Don Catford. The Association contributed \$100,000 to the Foundation for this project between 1998–2000.

The Association, in conjunction with the School Music Department, as an initiative for the Year 2000, has invited the School community to compose a new song to embrace the traditions and aspirations of Prince Alfred College. A modern song may find a place in the life of the School if it proves to be popular. Several old scholars were honoured as Torch Bearers for the 2000 Olympics, notably Past President Max Thompson and Past President and Honorary Life Member, Murray Olsson, truly outstanding Old Reds as is Bob Piper, a former President, Honorary Life Member and past Chairman of the School Council, who received an AO, Officer in the Order of Australia in the Australia Day Honours list.

Several meetings of the chairmen of the sporting clubs were organised during the year resulting in the satisfactory resolution of a number of issues.

On Friday 27 October, the inaugural Vintage Reds luncheon for Old Reds aged sixty years and above, was held in the School Assembly Hall. Bob Piper was the Master of Ceremonies, I welcomed the gathering, Brian Fricker, Past President of the Association, said Grace and the Headmaster was the guest speaker. More than 150 were in attendance and once again it was an extremely successful occasion. I thank Karin Dunsford, Director of



Darwin Combined Dinner




