



Headmaster's

Report 2002

It gives me great pleasure to present my 2002 Report to the Prince Alfred College community.

Year 12 Results

Once again, our Year 12 results in 2001 were outstanding. 100% of our students were successful in gaining their SACE or IB Diploma. Furthermore, 67% of our students earned results that placed them in the top 20% of the state, 38% were in the top 10% of the state, 31% were in the top 5% of the state, while 11% of our students were in the top 1% of the state. There were 68 merit scores, the second highest number in the school's history; in fact, 8.6% of all PAC results were merit scores compared with about 2% statewide. As I have stated previously, I believe that the true measure of a school's academic effectiveness is how well it can raise the results of boys in the mid-range of ability into the top end of results, and it is pleasing to see PAC doing so well in this area.

The Joint Duces of the School in 2001 were Edward Brockhoff and Peter Mathews, both of whom gained the maximum TER of 99.95% with a highly creditable score of 43 (IB) and 88.75 (SACE) respectively. Also in the top 0.1% of the state were Gregory Carmody, Thomas Morgan, Joseph Crosby and Thomas Evans, making a total of 6 students. The high calibre of the 2001 cohort is shown by Bond University's offer of two full plus one half scholarship to PAC boys for 2002 entry. These scholarships are highly prestigious and eagerly sought.

Effort Awards

The system of recognising boys' efforts in the Secondary School, through the awarding of Headmaster's Awards for Effort, seems to be going from strength to strength. At one stage this year, 39% of boys in the secondary school earned effort awards (Gold, Red or White), and



in the cases of Years 8 and 12, the figure was 47%. This is most encouraging, and provides solid evidence that PAC stands as a stark contrast to the general underachievement of boys that is evident in schools today. The growing proportion of effort awards is a considerable achievement as effort grades are awarded on a strictly criterion-based system and judged independently by each teacher.

Strategic Plan Implementation

The strategic plan, Princes Towards 2010, that was published last year continues to shape the direction of Prince Alfred College. Since the document was published, some of the changes achieved include the following:

- Significant improvements and expansion of computing facilities.
- Announcement of a new administrative management structure.
- Thorough review of reporting to parents, with new report formats for both Preparatory and Secondary schools currently being designed.
- Enhancement of school pride and identity with the opening of the 'Our Princes Men' gallery, celebrating the achievements of our Old Scholars.
- Significant upgrading of facilities at Scotts Creek Outdoor Centre.
- Upgrading of boarding facilities, including installation of a wireless computing network and installation of air conditioning in Hartley and Bayly wings.
- Air conditioning all general classrooms in the school, K-12.
- Deepening of links with overseas partner schools, especially in China.

- Strengthening of links with Uniting Church girls' schools in Adelaide through measures such as sibling discounts and attendance of girls at our boarders' chapel services.
- Review of the MYP (Middle Years Program) to ensure it meets our future priorities for schooling in the preadolescent and young adolescent years.
- Review of the boarding house with recommendations recently received and currently being implemented.
- Planning for future directions in ICT, including Web-CT and VPNs (virtual private networks).
- Planning for the possible implementation of a Three Schools structure.
- · Development of a school master plan.
- Expansion of foreign languages with the introduction of German and Spanish.
- Significant enhancement of provisions for Gifted and Talented students, including the appointment of a Gifted and Talented Education Co-ordinator, establishment of a Gifted Learning Centre, and advanced planning for two multi-level acceleration classes for high ability students from the start of 2003.
- Appointment of an Overseas Students
 Co-ordinator to enhance the welfare
 and meet the needs of our overseas
 students.
- Appointment of a Youth Minister to enhance the spiritual and moral formation of our students.
- Re-emphasis of the Dimensions of Learning framework.
- Extensive curriculum planning to emphasise open-endedness, creativity, problem-solving, moral and ethical values, critical thinking and constructivist learning.
- Introduction of the new more contemporary and smart school uniform.
- Reconstruction of the Tuck Shop and the opening of Café Princes.

Three exciting new building projects are also in various stages of planning and implementation. First, construction began in July 2002 of an as-yet un-named multi-purpose building that will become the centrepiece of the Preparatory School. The building comprises a new

library, resource centre and audio-visual area on the ground floor, although the upstairs inclusions will be the most innovative part of the project. The upper level will house three classrooms, clustered around an octagonal IT hub of shared computers. The IT hub will be separated from the classrooms by glass walls, so that whenever a boy needs to access a computer or the internet for research, he will simply walk to the hub where he will still be under supervision by his teacher. The IT hub will be large enough for a full class, and it will have tiered seating so every boy gets a good view of the teacher demonstrating at the front of the room. However, the computers will be situated behind the boys, so that they are not distracted by them while a teacher is talking, and they will simply swivel their chairs around to face the back of the room when they are working on the computers. We are confident that this layout will integrate information technology with ordinary classroom work in a way that is state-ofthe-art world best practice. We will be the first school in Adelaide to build classrooms that reflect tomorrow's teaching practices in this way. It is intended that this facility will not be an orphan centrepiece, but will be the model to renovate other classrooms throughout the school in the years ahead. The building is scheduled for completion before the beginning of the 2003 school

Second, work began at the beginning of Term 4 for the total refurbishment of the science laboratories in the secondary school. It is expected that this project will be completed during Term 4 2002 and Term 1 2003. The redesigned laboratories will feature wet areas around the edges of each room and a carpeted 'theory area' in the middle, with laboratories arranged around a series of IT pods to make the integration of computers into everyday science teaching a reality.

Third, consultation is underway on a draft master plan for the entire Kent Town campus that will see a significant upgrading of all our general purpose classrooms for boys in Years 6 to 12, completion of a network of covered elevated walkways, and further enhancement of the facilities for younger boys in Years 2 to 5. Central to this master plan is upgrading facilities to allow more space and flexibility in learning spaces, to integrate IT with everyday classroom practice, and to address the specific academic and pastoral needs of pre-adolescents and early adolescents more effectively in line with contemporary educational thinking.

Capital Improvements

A number of significant capital improvements have been undertaken in the school.

Secondary School

 Complete refurbishment and reequipping of the Senior Computing Centre, situated beneath the Hall, including new layout and benches,

- repainting, new carpet, and new computers.
- Two refurbished and enlarged new offices adjacent to the Senior Computing Centre, one for Mr Bill Sweeney (Head of Technology) and one for Mr Michael Steer (Head of Hemsley House).
- All general classrooms have been fitted with reverse cycle air conditioning.
- Rooms 30 and 31 have been completely refurbished, one to become a classroom to cater for increased numbers of students, and the other to become a combined Learning Centre and Office for the Co-ordinator of Gifted and Talented Education, Mrs Robyn Collins — a new position created this year.
- Classrooms on the bottom level of the double and triple blocks have been repainted.
- New desks and chairs have been provided for the Year 8 classrooms surrounding the quadrangle in the Memorial Building.
- All other desks and chairs throughout the secondary school have been repaired or replaced to ensure they are graffiti-free and in good working order.
- The power supply to Café Princes has been upgraded.
- Two new photocopiers have been provided, one for the secondary staff room and the other for the print room.

Preparatory School

- The old Year 5 classroom block was demolished to make way for construction of the new building containing Library / Information Resource Centre, Computing Hub and three classrooms.
- A new playground for Little Princes and Reception/Year 1 classes has been installed, including redesigned climbing equipment, a creek and bridge, all-weather surfaces, gardens, etc.
- All remaining non-air conditioned classrooms have been fitted with reverse cycle air conditioning.
- Four classrooms (Years 5 and 6) have been equipped with new desks and chairs.
- The Tuckshop has had some minor renovations.

 A new emergency evacuation alarm system has been installed to be compatible with that in the secondary school.

Boarding House

- Air conditioning has been installed to 1st floor of Hartley Wing which means that all three boarding wings now have air conditioning.
- An upgraded security system has been installed.

Information Technology

- 20 new ACER Pentium 4 multi-media computers have been installed in the Clipsal Innovation Centre
- 10 new Hewlett-Packard Pentium 3 computers have been installed in the newly renovated Senior Computing Centre to supplement 20 identical computers relocated there from the Clipsal Innovation Centre.
- The Preparatory School has been equipped with an additional 12 new iMac and 5 Hewlett-Packard Pentium 3 computers.
- The school's intranet network has been extended to include the Geography Room, room 14 (formerly room 15), the Gifted and Talented Learning Centre (formerly room 31), the Senior Computing Centre, three more offices in the Preparatory School, the boarding house and the Headmaster's residence.

General Upgrading

- To support the air conditioning and other new power needs, a significant upgrade of the school's electricity supply was needed. Consequently a new transformer and distribution board has been installed beside the main driveway entrance to the school from The Parade West, and new power supplies have been installed to the Preparatory School and to the Science Building of the Secondary School.
- Upgrading of the projection room in the hall has been undertaken, using money donated by the P & F late last year.

Curriculum Development

A major emphasis in curriculum planning during 2002 has been to plan the future direction of our educational programs in the middle years of schooling (Years 6 to 9). To facilitate this process, a review was commissioned by an independent consultant, Mrs Cynthia May, formerly Deputy Principal at Annesley College. The terms of reference of the review of middle schooling were threefold.

- Identify and define the type of education we wish to offer in the middle years of PAC in the years to come, consistent with the broad agreed goals of the Strategic Plan.
- Ascertain whether the MYP (the Middle Years Program of the International Baccalaureate, which we already teach) is still the best means to achieve this model of middle schooling.
- If the MYP is found to be the best means to achieve our ends, propose solutions to overcome the shortcomings and frustrations that have been identified. Alternatively, if the MYP is not the best vehicle of delivering our model of middle schooling, identify the better way forward and prepare an implementation strategy.

In summary, the recommendations made in the report are as follows:

- A Middle School curriculum suited to the needs of students at Prince Alfred College be adopted.
- 2. A Middle School Team be formed.

- 3. The MYP continue as a curriculum for Years 6 to 9. Some liaison is still required with IBO on this recommendation as it breaks some new ground in thinking,
- 4. An implementation plan be submitted to the Headmaster.
- 5. A Year 10 curriculum be designed.
- Provision should be made for students in Year 10 2002 and 2003 to complete a 'Middle School' Certificate

Negotiations are still underway with the IBO on the duration of our MYP to ensure that our practice complies with IBO requirements and, more importantly, serves PAC's own educational vision and priorities. Negotiations are also underway with other groups to ensure that we have several viable fallback positions if the IBO decides to be unco-operative in allowing the MYP to meet our aims and objectives.

Student Sporting Success

I am pleased to report that for the second year in a row, our 1st VIII rowers won every regatta of the season.

Following this they went to the national championships in Victoria where they gained first place to become Under 19 Men's champions. Then at the Head of the River, they won comfortably to record our first back-to-back win in 60 years — the last time this happened was in 1941 and 1942. Furthermore, at the Head of the River, PAC teams won the 1st VIII, the 2nd VIII, and the 1st IV, the first time one school has scooped all the elite events. PAC also won the swimming

Intercol, but went down narrowly in the tennis, badminton and cricket, to stronger teams on the day, it must be conceded.

PAC enjoyed a wonderful season of winter sports Intercols this year, with the usual mix of triumphs, near-misses, 'learning experiences' and creation of new legends. PAC won the soccer for the first time since 1990 with a score of 3-1. The following morning, Saints won the hockey by the same margin - 3-1. PAC played a better game of rugby than the predictions had suggested, losing by 10-0 (which represents just two goals scored by Saints, neither of which were able to be converted). The basketball was an extraordinarily even and strong match, with the leading teams see-sawing throughout the match. In the final few seconds, Saints pulled away to win by 41-38.

The football was our strongest winter Intercol result, with PAC winning the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 10A and 10B games, a true indication of the strength of PAC football at the present time. The final score of the 1sts match was 19–18–132 to 10–8–68, giving PAC its second consecutive win. The victory of the 2nds was especially encouraging as Saints 2nd team had been undefeated all season prior to playing in the Intercol.

Our athletics team made history this year, winning the Achilles Cup for the first time in PAC's long history, breaking a 32 year stranglehold on the event by St Peter's College. The atmosphere when the result was announced was reminiscent of Australia's first America's Cup win in the early 1980s. At that time, the US had retained the cup for 132 vears, and everyone considered it was almost unwinnable. With the same tenacity, team spirit and good sportsmanship that won the America's Cup, PAC took the Achilles Cup with a nail-biting margin of just 18 points -PAC 1393,5 to saints 1375,5, Some 61% of PAC performances were personal bests, and several records were established on the day.

Flag Football is a new sport in South Australia, and serves as an introduction to American Gridiron. In Term 2, a team of PAC boys defeated all the other teams

in South Australia, and as state champions went on to become Australian national champions in the Junior Division. As a result of this victory, the boys won an all expenses paid trip to Mexico City in Term 3 to compete in the International Flag Football Competition as the Australian team.

At an individual level, Ben Collette (Year 12) won a silver medal for the Under 18 Men's decathlon in the Australian Young Athletics Nationals. In January, Ben won gold at the State Multi-Levels Championships. Alexander Bubner (Year 8) competed at the National Under 13 Little Athletics Titles, winning two gold, a silver and a bronze medal, the best South Australian effort.

Other Student Successes

Among several academic competition successes this year in such diverse areas as Economics, Mathematics, Chemistry and Geography, several performances are particularly worthy of note. For the second year in a row, PAC boys have dominated the Science Olympiad results for South Australia. Edward Heddle and Edward Willson received silver medals in Chemistry and Michael Taylor was awarded the silver medal in Biology. Only nine medals are awarded in South Australia and no other school had more than one student receiving medals, so for students from one school to be awarded three medals was a most pleasing achievement. Edward Willson was the only student from a rural area to win a medal. This success builds upon last year's achievement when three PAC boys also won gold medals in Biology and Chemistry, and bronze in Physics.

For the fourth year in a row, PAC boys dominated the results of the annual national AMP Economics Competition, which was entered by 22,000 students this year. Of the 32 awards presented at the ceremony, 15 were presented to boys from PAC. Year 12 student Matt Will was placed third in the state with three other PAC boys achieving High Distinctions just behind Matt. At the Year 11 level, PAC students were awarded 9 of the 10 commendations with Tim Codrington being placed first in the state and Brett Selga second.

In the Australian Mathematics competition, which almost half a million students entered, Princes boys achieved excellent results. Over 70% of Princes students received a credit award or better, while 19 boys achieved results that placed them in the top 2% of the state. In the SA School Mathematics Competition for SPE Prizes, PAC students achieved the most awards overall of any school in the state, winning 28 awards.

In the Australian Computer Studies Competition, three Princes boys gained High Distinctions. This competition tests skills of navigating the internet, producing web pages, word processing, using spreadsheets, dealing with viruses and implementing graphics.

At the end of his studies at the conclusion of 2001, our School Vice-Captain Tom Farrant was selected to participate in the Uniting Church About Face Program. Tom spent two and a half weeks working with the Aboriginal community at Jabiru in the Northern Territory. He was selected on the basis of

his willingness to build relationships and understandings with Aboriginal people. Early this year, Tom returned to the school to address a full school assembly on his experiences, showing pictures and discussing his insights.

In the artistic sphere Ben Murray
(Year 12) was the Australian winner of
the Red Cross National Poster
Exhibition. Ben's poster was displayed at
the national exhibition in Melbourne.
Joshua Baldwin, who won the 2001 Jack
de Vidas Art Prize, subsequently had
several examples of his work displayed at
a special exhibition of art excellence at
the International Baccalaureate's
Curriculum and Assessment
Headquarters in Cardiff, Wales.

Year 12 students George Raptis, Tom Nguyen and George Georgiadis were runners-up in the 2002 Bond University High School Mooting Competition, held at the Magistrate's Court in Adelaide. George Raptis was honoured as the equal Best Advocate of the competition.

Charles Aust and Matthew Rackham were placed second and third respectively in the national Spirit of Weary Dunlop Competition, which is supported by the Sir Edward Dunlop Medical Research Foundation.

Guys and Dolls

The annual musical production for Prince Alfred College and Seymour College was performed in the PAC school hall on three evenings, 23rd, 24th and 25th May. The high quality of the production drew many favourable comments, and it was pleasing to see 67 boys and 14 PAC members of staff and Old Scholars taking part. The student figure represents more than 10% of the Secondary School. Particular thanks go to the Director, Michael Steer, who managed once again to draw an extraordinary standard of performance from the students in the cast and crew. Letters of thanks and appreciation have been sent to all students and staff taking part.

Enrolments

Enrolments continue to grow steadily, contrary to the overall trend of Adelaide's demographics. At the beginning of 2000, PAC's enrolment comprised 909 boys. We began this year with 952 students, the first time we have had more than 950 for many years, even though we lost a record number of students at the end of last year in the graduating Year 12 class. Current enrolment has grown further to 981, compared with 942 at this time last year and 928 at this time the year before. We have more boys in the secondary school today than we have had for a decade. Apart from a few unusual subject combinations, we are effectively full in Years 9, 10, 11 and 12. We would be full in Year 8 also but we expanded the number of classes this year, so we still have a handful of places there. The boarding house is now full and we are making arrangements to create extra space next year to accommodate increasing demand for places.

Concluding Remarks

There is a real sense in which Prince Alfred College is moving confidently into the future as a school which is dedicated to "transforming young boys into exceptional men". We are firmly dedicated to Princes retaining its place as one of the best schools in Australia, and certainly the best in Adelaide, to meet the total educational needs of boys and young men - without compromise. It was reassuring to have that position affirmed late last year when we were named one of Australia's 10 best schools by the Australian newspaper because of our sustained excellence in so many areas. A panel of six independent experts in education made the selection on the basis of an essay about the school

submitted at his own initiative by a Year 11 student, Lachlan Griffiths. Interestingly, Lachlan was the only student in Australia to submit an essay in support of their school, although hundreds of submissions were received from parents, development staff and teachers.

It was therefore especially encouraging that in October this year, PAC was again named as one of Australia's 10 best schools by the Australian, this time in recognition of our efforts and initiatives in enhancing the education of boys. The low achievement of boys relative to girls is a concern to many parents and educators in Australia at present, but statistics show that boys at PAC are most certainly not underachieving. For the sake of the majority of boys who attend other schools, we can hope that the PAC model of boys' education will receive wider recognition and attention as a result of this award by the Australian newspaper.

In this context, I would like to take this opportunity to express my sincere gratitude to the wonderful staff of the College and to the School Council for their energy, wisdom and support in helping to make PAC the wonderful school that it is. For all of us who are part of the wonderful PAC community, we share a privilege in being here that we should never take for granted. God has been very gracious to PAC this year, and for this we should all be thankful and rejoice as the season approaches to celebrate the birth of His son.

Every two years we team with a sister school to produce a musical. This year Annesley College Junior School and Prince Alfred College Preparatory School co-hosted the musical "Rats", otherwise known as the 'Pied Picker of Pumpkin Crik'. There were around 300 performers over two nights from both Annesley and PAC. There were eighteen months of planning and hard work by PAC's Jenny Chapman and Annesley's Jill McGreggor. It was an enormous success and will be the source of many childhood memories for all of the children, in particular the 80 cast members.

Year 2 and 3 students were given the opportunity to form the first Junior School footy team, coached by Byron Gray and a few parent helpers. The students were extremely enthusiastic and gave their best each Saturday. Their development over the year was outstanding and we look forward to seeing these students going on to bigger and better things in the future.

There have been significant changes to the report format with a mid-year report going home at the end of Term 2 and the production of a student portfolio that contains samples of student work completed throughout the year. These initiatives have been introduced to improve our communication to parents regarding the achievements and progress of their sons.

For the first time all students from Year 3 to Year 7 participated in the University of New South Wales competitions for English, Maths, Science and Computing. The school was very proud of not only the large number of students who received High Distinction, Distinction and Credit certificates, but all the students who took part in the competition and did their best.

This year we have seen some changes to the structure of our assemblies and chapel services. Classes have more involvement in our Tuesday assemblies with individual and group performances. Each Friday we begin the day with a chapel service and a 'spark' from our youth minister, Peter Riggs. His enthusiasm and sense of humour is entertaining to the students, but most importantly his service is always giftwrapped with an important message for the children.

This year we also introduced honour certificate in our assemblies to recognise students who have made an outstanding effort in class. Specialist teachers can also award this certificate to students who make a significant contribution to their specialist area.

Footy Fever was in the air mid-way through Term 3 when a number of boys from Years 2 to Year 7, took the opportunity to accompany dads, grandpas or friends to a Father/Son night at AAMI Stadium. They were treated to a tour of the Crows change-rooms and took part in a kicking competition on the oval. The auction of a Crows footy jumper was another highlight on the night which raised an amazing \$1000 that was put towards many of the sporting trophies presented throughout the year.

This year has seen the introduction of languages to a younger age group than ever before. Chinese is now being taught from Kindergarten through to Year 2, German to Years 3, 4, 5 and 7 and French was also extended to Years 3 and 4 as part of our Languages other than English program (LOTE).

Late last year Robyn Collins joined the staff at Prince Alfred College as the Gifted and Talented Coordinator for the school's K-12. Since her arrival, a number of students have been identified and included in a social and emotional program. More recently, plans have been developed to implement multi-level classes for 3/4/5 and 6/7/8 for 2003 and beyond. This initiative is new to Adelaide and many schools will be watching our progress with great interest.

Head of Preparatory Report

The JSHAA Music Festival, held in the Town Hall, was once again extremely successful. A beginner band introduced at the Year 4 level has been formed to complement our growing musical program in the school. The students performed periodically at our assemblies, showcasing the excellent work of Andrew Newhouse and his boys.

PAC's sporting endeavours continue to be an area of fluctuating fortune. This is an aspect where we are striving for consistency. We continue to battle against the larger schools who have a wider school population to draw from, however we can certainly continue to encourage a 'never say die attitude', strive to be competitive and to accept success or loss in a graceful manner. Mr Weatherald continues to develop a sporting program that includes a number of specialist coaches who will coach the boys in essential skills.

Probably the most exciting development this year would have to be the construction of the new Library Resource Centre. Many people have passed comment on how rapidly this has progressed. We are hoping to open the centre in Term 2, 2003. Due to the continuing growth in enrolment numbers, plans are underway to now extend the Kindergarten into the existing offices and redesign the old library to accommodate a new administration.

This year we bid farewell to Dwayne Todd and Leisa Moore who have contributed to the life of the school in many different ways over a number of years. As one chapter closed for some staff, a new one opened for others and this year we welcomed Helena Sobulis (PYP Coordinator), Gary Jenkinson (Year 7), Pam Martin (Reception), Stephanie Hart (Year 4), Rachel Merritt (Art), Carol Shaw (German) and Jenny Chapman (Music K-5) to a very committed and dedicated team. In the Kindergarten, Ennio Luongo became the fourth staff member to join the team mid-way through the year.

Throughout the year we also had some staff appointed to cover colleagues who were on Long Service Leave. Vicki Psiahos joined us in Term 3 to cover

Primary Years Program Exhibition

The Primary Years Program (PYP) of the International Baccalaureate is an international curriculum for students aged 3–12. At Prince Alfred College the PYP is taught from Kindergarten to Year 5. The Year 5 PYP exhibition is a significant event in the life of the school that marks the boys' graduation from primary to middle school education.

This year's exhibition, which was held on October 24, was the culmination of the boys' extended inquiry about Threatened Animals which the boys had been investigating all year as part of the PYP theme Sharing the Planet.

By applying the skills and learning of previous years, the exhibition was also something that the boys had been building towards since the PYP was first introduced at Prince Alfred College in 2000. The exhibition incorporated the five essential elements of the PYP knowledge, concepts, skills, attitudes and action. Planning for the exhibition began early in the school year. The boys were involved in all stages of planning, working collaboratively with their class teachers Mrs Viv Rowan and Mr Chris Harris and specialist art, music, physical education, French, German and Chinese language teachers. The exhibition involved teachers as advisors and facilitators with the boys helping to identify the issue to be explored, intended learning outcomes, activities the boys would be involved in and assessment criteria

In the spirit of internationalism, the topic Threatened Animals was chosen because it is a real problem — of local

and global significance. The boys researched the issue in detail, reflected on their findings and took action as a result of their concerns. They are to be congratulated on organising a Walkathon that raised almost \$2500 to sponsor animals at the Adelaide Zoo. The boys demonstrated genuine concern for the animals which spurred them on to generating relevant and realistic solutions to the issue.

Parents too, were involved as partners in this activity that captures the essence of the PYP transdisciplinary inquiry, conducted in a spirit of personal and shared responsibility. Working together on the exhibition has helped to strengthen the sense of community that already is so strong at Prince Alfred College — the relationship between students and the relationship between students, teachers and parents.

The exhibition consisted of two parts. It included a display of research reports, English theme studies, models, web page designs, artwork and a video of the action the boys took as a result of their research. The second part of the exhibition took the form of a play titled Animal Quest that incorporated all that the boys have learned about this issue and their proposals for helping animals.

I extend my congratulations to all the Year 5 boys; their teachers — Mrs Viv Rowan, Mr Chris Harris, Ms Rachel Merritt, Mrs Jenny Chapman, Mrs Carol Shaw, Miss Mani White, Mrs Karine Vafiadis and Mr Tim Weatherald; parents Mrs and Mrs Zhu for their help with foyer displays and programs and all those who supported the boys.

When Bob joined Prince Alfred College in 1981, he was given three major roles, one as Head of Chemistry, another as Master in charge of Hockey and coach of the

First XI and a third as Master in Charge of the Aquatic Centre at Goolwa. Geoff Bean obviously saw Bob as an exceptional young man, and when he took leave twenty years later, five people were needed to replace him.

His previous appointments were at Salisbury High School, then Salisbury Teachers' College followed by three years at Taperoo High School where he was Head of both Mathematics and Chemistry.

His background as both an academic and athlete are impressive, and he also proved to be an excellent administrator. He earned a First Class Honours degree in Organic Chemistry at the University of Adelaide followed by a Masters degree in Environmental Studies. His thesis on the Remediation of Hydrocarbon Contaminated Sites earned him the prestigious University of Adelaide medal — the Mawson Medal, in 1993, As a student at Salisbury High School he captained both A Hockey and A Tennis, was in the State Junior Hockey Team for three years and held the State Schoolboy record for both the 400 metres and high jump.

In his twenty years as Master in Charge of Hockey and coach of the First XI, his team only conceded three matches in the ISSA competition and for fifteen consecutive years the First XI retained the Murton Shield in Intercol competition. Bob organised some innovative fundraising for PAC overseas Hockey tours and led the inaugural Princes tour to the UK in 1996. He served as a liaison between Princes and the Old Scholars' Hockey Club, and was himself a member of the Old Scholars' team for several years. As well as coaching the First XI each Saturday, he also observed two other matches.

In 2001 Princes was acknowledged as South Australia's foremost Hockey School and Bob Holloway won the Australian Sports Medal for his service to Hockey at PAC.

He was a water skiing enthusiast when he took over the running of the Goolwa Aquatic Centre. He then took up sailing and sailboarding — skills he and Ian Freney, Bill Coutts and David Murphy imparted to hundreds of Year 8 students over a period of sixteen years. They, together with their wives and families, spent many weekends down at Goolwa, and enduring friendships were formed.

Despite the demands of administration, Bob always maintained a classroom perspective. He has a great love of teaching. His students won Rio Tinto Olympiad Medals, Oliphant Awards, maximum marks in the International Baccalaureate Diploma Examinations, and three, including Sam Whittle and Damien Fung

from Princes, topped the state in Year 12 Chemistry. In addition, many hours were spent in patient tutoring of less able students. Needless to say, Bob's experience on Syllabus Advisory Committees for Chemistry and as a Year 12 Examination marker would have been invaluable.

Since 1989 Bob has co-authored Senior Chemistry Text books including the current Year 12 SACE Text, 'Discovering Chemistry' and is currently working on a new edition of the Stage 1 Textbook. Another book in press is 'Futures in Education' co-authored by Bob and other senior members of the Princes staff.

In 1995 Bob was awarded the UK/Australia Fellowship for teachers of Science and over a period of ten weeks he visited a broad spectrum of UK Schools, involved himself in coursework at several field study centres, toured three interactive Science Centres and spoke with many Science teachers in both the Government and Independent sector.

Two years previously, he had been appointed as Head of Science, a role he fulfilled for nearly ten years. In addition to added administrative duties, he became Master in Charge of the Science Journal, an annual publication now in its fifty-seventh year. Bob changed the format from typesetting to computer generated desktop publishing. The artwork was also enhanced by expanding the Journal to A4 size. Furthermore, amongst other tasks such as updating and redesigning Junior Science courses with emphasis in 2000-2001 on the new IB Middle Years Program, he designed science projects for Scotts Creek Field Camp and Solar Boat trips, was a mentor for IB students working on extended essays and was one of three Science staff working with the Administration and Architects on the redesign of eight Science laboratories and their preparation areas.

As a colleague, Bob inspired admiration, lovalty, and friendship. His kindness, commonsense, conviviality and sense of humour are well known. He set high standards for himself, and by his example and encouragement brought out the best in others. He developed an esprit de corps in all undertakings both curricular and extracurricular. We pay tribute to his energy, idealism, intellect, organisational skills, adaptability to worthwhile innovation and sense of fair play. We record with gratitude the outstanding service he has given to the whole school community — the boys, their parents, the staff and Old Scholars. In his twenty-one years at PAC Bob has always given all that he has; always tried to do too much. He has an enormous pride in and love of Princes. The school owes him so much.

We wish him well in his continued teaching career at the University of Adelaide, and time to reflect and savour his pinots and chardonnays at his vineyard in the hills.

David was appointed as Head of Biology at Princes in 1993, and his infectious enthusiasm for his subject matter, for teaching, for sport, for pastoral care of both staff and students was apparent right from the start.

He comes from a family of teachers and his father was a Headmaster in both the city and country. David himself was educated at Whyalla Technical High School — (Milton Haseloff was his Latin teacher) — and at Plympton High School. He completed his tertiary qualifications at the University of Adelaide finding time to play football, baseball, table tennis, golf, cricket, badminton and basketball, all at A grade level.

David was appointed as Head of Science at Smithfield High School in 1976 and so brought 25 years of senior Science leadership and teaching experience to this school. He was also the Convener of the Biology subject area at SSABSA from 1985–1991 during which time a new Biology syllabus was written and he co-authored a Biology practical manual which became the standard practical text.

At Princes he has coached Basketball and both Year 8 and 10A Cricket, a major highlight being the year his 10A cricketers were undefeated. As in all areas both curricular and extracurricular, David has established a special bond with his students. Many of his former students have kept contact and expressed gratitude at his guidance during their formative years. A number of these students are now top Science researchers in their own right.

This year David was acting Head of Science and he left no stone unturned in furthering his beliefs in what is best teaching practice, especially in Junior Science where the IB Middle Schooling Program was under review. He is patient, compassionate, quick-witted and determined in his approach and he shares his knowledge and experience freely. A major initiative has been 'Men's Health Week', a cross-curricular Year 9 program which he has run for several years. He has been Master-in-Charge of 'Trees for Life', PACCC, and for nine years was a Blacket House tutor. David was also much in demand as a mentor for extended essays for IB Diploma students. This year he has worked exhaustively on the redesign of the Science Laboratories and preparation areas, these skills being refined from being involved in designing Science Laboratories at Underdale, Willunga, and at Brighton Secondary School. Ironically he has not taught in any of them. New Labs have become the signal to move on, but this time it is to a well-earned retirement. Princes has been extraordinarily fortunate to have had ten years of David's vision, stamina, and dedication. We express our heartfelt thanks and wish him well and many years of fulfilment and happiness in pursuing his wide range of interests in life beyond Princes.

Building a New Library in the Preparatory School

The most exciting building project underway at Prince Alfred College is the huge new multi-purpose building that will be the centrepiece of the Preparatory School. On the ground floor there will be a new library, resource centre and audio-visual area. What happens upstairs will be even more exciting.

The upper level will house three classrooms clustered around an octagonal IT hub of shared computers. The IT hub will be separated from the classrooms by glass walls so that whenever a boy needs to access a computer or the internet for research, he will simply go to the hub where he is still under supervision by his teacher. The IT hub will be large enough for a full class and it will have tiered seating to ensure good viewing of what is happening at the front of the classroom.

The beauty of the design is that the computers are behind the boys so they are not distracted by them while the teacher is talking. When a boy needs to use a computer he must simply turn his chair to the back of the room. We believe that this layout will integrate information

technology with ordinary classroom work in a way that is state-of-the-art best practice.

This building will not be an orphan centrepiece. It will be the model to renovate other classrooms throughout the school in the years ahead. The building is scheduled for completion before he beginning of the 2003 school year.

The new building in the Preparatory School will be completed early in 2003 and it will provide spacious accommodation for a new Prep School Library and Resource Centre on the ground floor, and three classrooms and an Information Technology Centre on the first floor. In the third room our leader told us about the hygiene on the boat. In the last room we talked about how children were separated from their families.





Music

This night helped raise enough money to purchase new percussion equipment. Ms. Guterres' role as a classroom teacher and conductor of the Chamber Orchestra has been an added bonus.

Being Music Captain this year, alongside Band Captain Matthew Spangler and Head Chorister James Bonner, has been a truly enjoyable, valued experience. I attribute this to both the high quality of music students at PAC, and the opportunities we are given by the Music faculty and by individual teachers. 

The JSHAA Festival continues to be a highlight in our Prep School Music Calendar. This year Robert Dawe and Jenny Chapman prepared the Festival Choir, Andrew Newhouse conducted the Festival Concert Band and Simon Varga conducted the Festival Percussion Ensemble. We had a large number of musicians successfully audition into both these ensembles. The Festival ran over two nights with our Choir performing on the Tuesday evening and the Ensembles performing both nights. As predicted it was a spectacular event and will remain in the participants' memories for a long time. New to the school, this was a wonderful experience for Mrs Chapman, who was also preparing the boys concurrently for our Musical Production 'Rats' - see separate report.

The Sunday Recitals have continued to provide a platform for our solo performers, studying in the Single Studies program. It is a tribute to their teachers that so many take part and demonstrate considerable improvement throughout the year. The annual Keyboard Concert was held in the Prince Philip Theatre this year, with over sixty students demonstrating their solo, duo and ensemble skills on keyboard and piano. We shall move to two programs next year! Thank you to the Keyboard Staff and Concert Co-ordinator Janet Parkinson.

Performances in the community are very important both for the musicians and for those beyond Princes to

understand the support and levels our musicians are reaching. One of the highlights was the annual "Art of Jazz" Concert with Don Burrows at Norwood Town Hall in August. The Chapel Choir continue to sing for Weddings and Services at Kent Town Uniting Church, and have been invited to sing at Pilgrim Church next year. (See separate reports for Chapel Choir and Concert Bands).

This is the completion of my eleventh year teaching at Princes. Music was quite a low priority in 1992; it now enjoys a recognition and respect equal to any other subject in our busy curriculum. When I arrived, I taught Prep classes in a small transportable building near the Prep Library and senior classes in the old boarding house section of the main building - a very dilapidated and unsavoury area, with very difficult access (especially when transporting drum kits et al for performances in the Assembly Hall). Time, hard work and a generous endowment from the Margaret Jolly Trust enabled us to expand and refurbish. In 1996 we moved into the Waterhouse Wing above Prince Philip Theatre and in 1999 the Main Central area was also completely refurbished, including the upper level, which now houses the Band Room and four Music Studios. But the most exciting and rewarding transformation has been the gradual change in attitude and commitment to Music in particular and the Arts in general. It is now "cool" to not only study guitar, but any of 23 other

instruments from viola to trombone as

well; it is also "cool" to perform and share music with our peers (without getting 'paid out'). Our community applauds, enjoys and encourages musical participation to the full — I believe we are a better community because of it.

Eleven years on and it is time for some reflection, time to stand back and appraise and a time to have some input and evaluation from other sources.

Consequently I am taking two terms leave from the beginning of 2003; my colleague and ex-Princes Music teacher David Jacquier will very ably take on the mantle of Director of Music during this period. I have every confidence his input will be welcomed and appreciated.

The Drama Department has been active again this year both within classes and at a co-curricular level. The musical production "Guys and Dolls" was the most significant undertaking, involving collaboration with Seymour College. Year 9 students have devised a series of performances for the Preparatory School after researching children's picture books in the Preparatory library. The boys enjoyed the challenge of solving theatrical problems and relished the opportunity to present work to the junior students.

Senior students have spent the second half of the year preparing a production with the unusual title of "Bowling Noir." Set in a bowling alley the play combines the genre of "Film Noir" and 'murder mystery' with the 'absurd' to create a comic and disturbing production. We are delighted that the talented Michael Taylor and Nicholas Selth were able to take time out from their demanding IB studies to participate in this process. Matthew Myhill, Anthony Sallis, Casey Raeside and an energetic group of bowling pins ably supported them. An important part of our vision for Drama is to produce original plays on the PAC campus.



Mr. Tutt for giving me the opportunity to let me discover things on my own through the Red and White and the Education Reference Group and also providing valuable support in times of need. Mrs. Codrington for her support in keeping me organized and always looking forward to the next hurdle. Finally to all the students who have supported me in my role as Captain. You have made this year unforgettable.

Now as we Year 12s sit and reflect on our schooling at PAC, the end means a new beginning: a beginning into uncharted waters. We enter these exciting times in our lives knowing that we have received the best education possible to endure the uncertainty of the future, a future that we will construct.

What Price Leadership?

The following address was given by the chaplain, the Rev Dr Adrian Brown at the commissioning of the school prefects in Term 3, 2001. The reading was taken from Luke 12: 35–40.

Leadership is not something that is only available to Prefects, and not all leaders come cast as the 'good guys' in white hats. Sometimes they come wearing 'black hats'. And, those of you who have been chosen, how did you come by leadership? What colour hat are you wearing? And what are you going to do now that you have been chosen and have made promises because of it?

The world has always been a bit mixed up when it comes to leadership. There seem to be easy leaders and hard leaders. Easy in the sense that they promise the world, hard in that they promise a road that is tough but which has plenty of light at the end of the tunnel. Following the tragedy at the Pentagon and the World Trade Centre the world seemed to divide very quickly into three camps with each camp throwing up its share of leaders.

On one side were those who found themselves to be frustrated by what they saw as the arrogance of the United States and her refusal to acknowledge the hurt of those who had been treated as so much garbage in the battle for land in the Middle East. Some of them felt that the only way to achieve their goals was by carrying out extreme acts of terror. They followed leaders who promised them justice. On the other side were those who found themselves angry with those who would use terror as a weapon of warfare and who claimed to have right on their side. They felt that the only way to achieve justice was to exact revenge on those who used acts of terror.

These two applications of leadership are both right and both wrong. They both seek justice and their activities inevitably lead to pain and suffering on the part of the innocents. We often find ourselves drawn to these styles of leadership because they seem to be strong and offer us security in the midst of insecurity.

I mentioned a third group of people who try to find a middle way which seeks to resolve conflict in a peaceful fashion. They don't always succeed because they are working with very stubborn people.

So what kind of leader are you going to be as prefects in this school? Are you going to try and roll the opposition? Are you going to try and exercise an authority that says 'do this', simply because you say so? Are you going to exercise a strength that comes out of the office of prefect or are you going to exercise it out of your own inner strength?

A prefect at Princes is interested in justice for its own sake. You are charged with the responsibility to take your own needs out of the equation and look to reach out to the one who has been hurt without asking questions about his or your own popularity, reputation or perceived position in the pecking order.

A prefect at Princes is one who needs to be alert at all times. The toughest thing you will have to do is tell yourself not to look ahead, see something which makes you uncomfortable and then take the nearest turn away from it.

A prefect at Princes is one who is called to serve. It means being responsible, taking your turn, turning up at Intercols and school community functions. How can you ask others to do something that you are not prepared to do yourself?

A prefect at Princes is someone who cares for those who are not easy to care for as well as those who are easy to care for. Caring means trying to break the cycle and bringing in people from the cold.

Leadership costs. It doesn't come easy and it never has. Some leaders have been rejected by crowds, some have given up and others have stuck with the task, no matter what. The one thing you need to remember is that those in our reading waited for the leader who changed the world. That same leader is always there for those who have to lead, providing care and understanding, courage and resourcefulness, sensitivity and resilience. His name is Jesus and he continues to provide each of us with those resources.

You have a wonderful opportunity to follow in the footsteps of some great leaders who have been prefects at Princes. Go in their pathway and go in the name of Him who has called you to this role.

Academic Achievement

The 2001 Year 12 student results in both the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) and the International Baccalaureate (IB) brought great credit to Prince Alfred College.

Altogether 63 Merit Awards were received, 35 for SACE and 28 for the IB Diploma. This represents the second highest number of Merit Awards achieved in our school and across the broadest range of subjects ever offered.

In January this year, 102 local South Australian school leavers were offered places in various educational institutions, with 51% of students taking up places at the University of Adelaide, 30% at University of South Australia, 14% at Flinders University and 5% at TAFE institutions.

The Year 12 results highlighted the following:

- More than 50% of students earned results which placed them in the top 20% of the state.
- Over one third of students were placed in the top 10% of the state.
- An outstanding 11% of students achieved a place in the top 1% of the state.
- 8.6% of results achieved were Merit scores.
- 100% of IB students obtained their Diploma.

Anton Steketee (9 Stanton) won third prize in the Model Section for his model of a solar wind tower.

Jonathon Tamblyn (12 Delbridge) won second prize in the Experiment Section for "Tarzan's swing.' Jonathon's entry also won the Australian Institute of Physics Prize for the best exhibit with Physics theme and second prize DECS Young Science Award.

Ashby Martin (11 Hemsley) was awarded first prize in the Experiment Section for 'Water vs Air Cooling for CPU.' Ashby's entry also won the University of Adelaide faculty of Engineering, Computer and Mathematical Sciences Prize and third prize DECS Young Scientist Award.

 In the Science Olympiad, once again three PAC students earned medals.
 Edward Heddle and Edward Willson won silver medals in Chemistry and Michael Taylor was awarded the silver medal in Biology. Only nine medals are presented in each state and no other school had more than one student earning a medal. This outstanding achievement follows last year's achievements when three PAC students also won medals.

PAC students again achieved a
 dominant presence at the awards
 ceremony for the 2002 AMP
 Economics Competition. Of the thirty two awards presented at the ceremony,
 fifteen went to boys from PAC. SACE
 student Matt Will was placed third in
 the state in the Year 12 division with
 three other PAC candidates achieving
 High Distinctions just behind Matt.
 They are George Grevelis, Tom
 Nguyen and Jon Tamblyn. Distinctions
 were awarded to Themis Chryssidis
 and Matthew Kildea.

At Year 11 level, PAC students were awarded nine of the ten commendations with Tim Codrington

All PAC students in Years 7, 8 and 9
 along with most Year 10 students and

 per cent of those who sat for the
 competition earned a Credit award or
 better. There were ten prize winners
 — double the number received in the

For the second year in a row, Chen Tu returned the best standardised score for PAC.

 Students at Prince Alfred College showed their mastery of computer skills when they competed in the Australian School Computer Studies Competition this year. Over 102,000 students from Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific region participated in this competition.

Of the 363 students from the Secondary School who entered the competition,116 received awards of excellence. These included 11 High Distinctions, awarded to the top 1% of entrants in the state, 41 Distinctions for the next 10% of the entrants in the state and 64 Credits for the next 20% of entrants in the state. This means that of those who entered, one-third was placed in the top 20% of the state.

High Distinctions were awarded to Stephen Elley, Ben Edwards, Alexander Harms, Simon Keith, Stephen Riddell, Anton Steketee, Yegor Tchitaev, Cameron Roy, Philip Cleggett, Hugo Oks, Douglas Cowley and Gareth Seglenieks.

In the Preparatory School, High Distinctions were awarded to Adam Collins, Christopher Harry, Andrew Codrington, William Young, Tom Teague and Max Burford. The Australian National Chemistry Quiz, held during National Chemistry Week in July this year saw outstanding results for PAC students. Stephen Ghabriel (11 Oldham) and David Mao (11 Hemsley) both earned plaques.

Altogether eighty merit awards went to PAC students, with High Distinctions going to Michael Davies, Edward Heddle, Sean O'Flaherty and Edward Willson in Year 12, Douglas Cowley, Robert Dodd, Stephen Ghabriel, Lucas Goode, Xin Luo, David Mao, Devon Marshman, Stuart Moffatt, Ben Newbery and Chen Tu in Year 11 and Michael Dodd, James Elwood, David Hocking, Mayooran Namasivayam, Hugo Oks, Chris Prior, Kurt Strazdins and Daniel Toh in Year 10.

 PAC was the school with the most awards overall in the SA School Mathematics Competition for SPE prizes. Our students achieved an outstanding total of 28 awards.

Awards for outstanding achievement went to Chen Tu (outright third place, Senior), David Mao (outright fifth place, Senior), Chris Davies (outright ninth place, Intermediate) Richard Seglenieks (outright ninth place, Junior). High Distinctions in the Intermediate section were awarded to Hugo Oks, Phil Cleggett and Paul Avina. In the annual Australian Geography competition held in March, PAC students from Years 8, 9 and 10 took part. Forty-five per cent of the PAC boys participating achieved Credit awards or higher and fifteen per cent achieved High Distinctions.



Geography Field Study to Kangaroo Island

During Week 3 of Term 2, Year 11 Geography students left on a field study to Kangaroo Island. We departed Adelaide a little after 6:30 am in two minibuses to catch the Sealink Ferry at Cape Jervis. After the hour-long ferry trip we arrived in Penneshaw and were soon back in the buses. The relaxed nature of the trip continued throughout the week and the teachers were able to blend hard work with fun activities.

After leaving Penneshaw, another small bus trip brought us to our final destination at the 'Vivonne Bay Outdoor Education Centre'. The Education Centre had six dormitory rooms each with about 12 beds. Sleeping arrangements and general camp rules were the first items on the agenda. After that we were divided into four groups for working on tasks during the time at Kangaroo Island. The students named the four groups — 'Bogans', 'Mullets', 'Outbackers' and 'Stingrays' — the final responsibility before the week of fun activities could begin.



Each day we completed various tasks relating to the field study at different locations around the Education Centre and all over Kangaroo Island. The location of these studies took us to stunning sand dunes, fire affected areas, large farms and to one of the ten most beautiful beaches in Australia. The work conducted on these field studies comprised taking soil samples (which included details like texture, pH, conductivity and colour), study of microclimates, and the identification of vegetation and animals in a particular area. Since each student was in a group, tasks could be rotated around during the week. Certain animal surveys required the safe and legal trapping of animals for research purposes — during this time students could handle the local mammals and birds. Once the





animals were studied and the birds were fed with a sugar water substance, they were released back into the wild unharmed.

Other parts of the experience leaned towards the enjoyable side of learning. These occasions included trips to a marron farm and Seal Bay. The students visiting the marron farm were able to learn a little about the relatively unknown marron and, unfortunately for the marron, finished off with a sample of the tasty crustacean. The students who visited Seal Bay were able to get relatively close to these large creatures while being led by a tour guide.



I can thoroughly recommend the trip to people doing Geography in Year 11. Thanks must go to Dr Johnson and Mr Vickery who worked tirelessly to make the trip possible; and to Mr Hall and Mr Cowie who offered to join us on the trip and lend a hand with every activity.

The 2002 Prince Alfred College and Wilderness School study tour to China was a great success. Eight teachers, 12 parents and one grandmother accompanied the 40 students on the trip. We all saw many extremely interesting sites and learnt a lot about Chinese history and culture. We travelled to five different Chinese cities, beginning with Beijing and continuing to Jinan, Qufu, Qingdao and Shanghai, also stopping off in Kuala Lumpur between flights.

In Beijing, we visited Tiananmen Square, The Forbidden City, The Great Wall, the Emperor's Summer Palace, The Ming Tombs with the Animal Avenue, and the Lama Temple. Our nights were occupied attending the unique Beijing Opera, eating a delicious Beijing Duck banquet dinner and shopping in various markets near our accommodation.

Shopping in Beijing is very unlike shopping in Australia. For example, at virtually any tourist site, you will be followed by locals trying to sell you fake goods in loud Chinese or extremely broken English. Bartering was a new experience for many of us. Some of us (such as Kyle Williams) mastered this art more quickly than others. Many students bought authentic Chinese silk shirts, affectionately known as 'Jürgen Shirts' (named after Mr Kracht).

We did of course visit some significant historical and cultural sites...

The most memorable of Beijing's sites was The Great Wall. Unfortunately there was a significant dust storm when we climbed a section of it. The climb was more difficult than we expected, as the wall is built over mountains, but it was definitely worthwhile due to the breathtaking scenery. The Forbidden City is a section of Beijing, which in the Emperors' times was closed to the general public. The first thing which amazed us about the 'City' was its enormous size. The large compound was filled with various palaces and temples along the way. Their entrances were guarded by two massive stone lions.

We took the train to Jinan, which is the capital city of South Australia's sister province, Shandong. We found Jinan to be a surprisingly modern and clean city. Our motive for going to Jinan was mainly to attend Chinese lessons at the Senior High School attached to Shandong Teachers' University. We must thank the school, staff and students for their hospitality and friendliness during our stay. Each morning we had Chinese classes, and often joined in with the school's PE lessons, and morning exercises. We also attended some English classes towards the end of our stay, and

had sports matches against their top teams in soccer and basketball where we, not being regular players, did not stand a chance. We did also manage to attend some of Jinan's more interesting sites, including Quancheng Square, which had a large movie screen and attracted many locals to see Jackie Chan movies at night, the Baotu Springs and Daming Lake. We visited the Jinan Zoo where pandas and other animals live under what we would call appalling conditions, and we also had a delicious banquet dinner held by representatives of the Shandong Provincial Government. The best night for many students was having dinner at Chinese students' houses, with many of us having Chinese dumplings, a delicacy. Everyone found their meals extremely delicious. Many friendships were made between students at their school and us.

While in Shandong we spent a weekend in Qufu, where Confucius was born more than 2500 years ago. We visited his grave, temple and mansion. On the Sunday we climbed the Sacred Mount Tai (Taishan), with its 6996 steps (David Harrison counted each one) and all students were pumped to tackle it. When we first arrived, it did not seem as bad as we had first thought, but when we stopped briefly for photos after 2500 steps, and surveyed the rest of the climb, our minds were changed. Congratulations must go to Ms Woods who was the only teacher to complete the climb and Mrs Leung for leading the parents home along with Dr Penhall (in front of many students). Mr Tutt and Dr Healy must be commended for reaching half way. Around half the students completed the climb. Everyone else took the cable car.

We returned to Jinan for a few more days, before journeying to Qingdao by bus. Qingdao is a coastal city with many European style buildings. Students found the trips to Laoshan and the Qingdao Brewery less interesting than other parts of trip, especially as we were not allowed to taste test the beer which was offered to us. One interesting feature of the city was the three seater bikes which many students attempted to ride with varying success.

We once again took the bus back to Jinan before taking a night train to Shanghai. We were shown to our 'soft sleepers', the best beds on the train, compared to the 'hard sleepers' compartments, reserved mainly for locals.

Shanghai was extremely different again, with many more people able to speak English. In Shanghai we visited Iin Mao Tower (the third biggest building in the world), the Bund, the Jade Buddha Temple and The Yu Garden which had lovely scenery and was surprisingly interesting. Other highlights of Shanghai were watching the Shanghai Acrobats, where Michael Healy made a guest appearance having knives thrown at him, and we had lunch on a Dragon Boat. We got even more shopping in, at the department stores on Nanjing Road, though we were limited for time. Many of us stopped at the McDonalds there (McDonalds and KFC were frequented after dinner by students throughout the trip) only to find our Chinese tour guide eating dinner there, and Mr Kracht exiting the building (with a burger stain on his Jürgen shirt). Shanghai's tunnel was also a unique experience, seeming like an amusement park ride as we crossed under the river. Our last stop in Shanghai was Datong High School, with which PAC has strong ties. We were shown around their school briefly, and Mr Tutt and Tom Ellison made speeches at their official welcoming assembly, which were brilliantly translated by Ms Liu. Once again we owe thanks to our Chinese hosts, Datong High School, for providing us with a delicious lunch before we left for the airport.

Shanghai was our last Chinese destination, before we left for Kuala Lumpur and our return to Adelaide. We had a great time.

The initial team consisting of Matt Simounds, Sam Will, Ben Noblet, Hamish Toop and Alexander Bubner easily won this match by a scoreline of 40 to 12. Unfortunately it was discovered that Matt and Sam were older than allowed by the rules of the competition and hence a rematch was scheduled. With substitutions allowed, Lachlan Wicks, Ryan Winter and Ben Riggs were added to the initial squad and played against MGS in the school holidays. This second encounter was much tighter with PAC winning by the narrowest of margins, 20 to 19. By winning the National Title, PAC won an all expenses paid trip, funded by the NFL, to Mexico City to represent Australia in the World Flag Football Championships.

At the World Championships, PAC won two games and lost two games in the preliminary rounds. Losses were recorded against Korea and Canada (an eventual finalist) while our wins were against Thailand (where we came from 19–0 down at half time) and the Netherlands. We were defeated by a very fast Austrian team in the consolation play off for fifth and sixth place. Heat, smog and high altitude made competition at this level extremely draining — one player at a crucial stage of the Thailand game actually crawling to the bench for a recovery.

This trip was a learning experience of the highest degree. The NFL budget was approximately a million dollars for this tournament and it was administered in an extremely professional manner. The team was taken sight seeing to the Castillo de Chapultepec, the castle built for the emperor Maximillian that now houses the National Museum of History, and to the Museo del Papalote, a type of Questacon science centre. At all times the team was under guard from a security force to keep street urchins at a safe distance.

The team also visited the Six Flags theme park. Free rides were enjoyed by all and superstar status was bestowed on the team, particularly by the local teenage girls. Our English/Spanish speaking chaperone alerted the boys to excited Spanish shouting wherever we went and the boys responded with hugs, kisses and autographs to the throng that quickly gathered — this adoration of tall fair skinned people was also prevalent at the ground on competition day.

The view from the hotel window looked across a vacant allotment that had innumerable wild dogs running around - it was said by our chaperone that the wild dog population exceeded the population of the entire city of 22 million. In this allotment there were also a number of galvanised iron shanties that served as places of abode for a number of the locals. Thus the stated population of the city at 22 million was probably less than the number that actually lived there if the shanty people were taken into account. In the background view from the hotel was the Azteca stadium that seats 116 000 people - a once world record at a sporting venue. We also daily drove past the 1968 Olympic Stadium where Bob Beamon did his 8.90m long jump world record that stood for over twenty years.

As the trips to and from Mexico City took approximately 24 hours, the team soon resolved that air travel is a far from glamorous pastime and were certainly glad to arrive home. All have come to appreciate the Australian lifestyle and value it far more highly than previously.



Solar Cycle Team Win



In November 2001, the PAC Solar Cycle team left Adelaide bound for Alice Springs where the third World Solar Cycle Challenge would begin in just a few days. The boys quickly acclimatised to the 35+ degreedays we encountered and several training sessions were provided for pit crew and riders under race conditions near Ross River.

On Monday the 19th the first stage of the race was underway, finishing over 200 km away at Erldunda. PAC demonstrated its early intentions, 1st in B Class (Non-Aerodynamic Experimental) and 2nd outright by 11 minutes. Day 2 saw the PAC team win its first ever stage into Marla, pegging back the overall leader by seven minutes and establishing a comfortable lead in B-Class. The win was even more inspiring as only five of the six riders were used, as Dylan Greeff was unable to ride after a fall on the first day.

The riders, Mathew Rex, Dylan Greeff, Greg Garrard, Jordan Allen, Hamish Adamson and Ashby Martin all proved to be determined and both mentally and physically strong. Most riders averaged speeds in excess of 40 km/h over 30 km stints. Robert Dodd, Karl Hage, Callum Banks, Gareth Seglenieks and Jordan Mutton made up the pit crew and were just as responsible for the great success we had. The pit crew were able to perform their tasks in under 8 seconds, a time which would prove valuable to maintaining our lead.

The Coober Pedy — Glendambo stage ultimately sorted out the placings. The PAC team, caught in a violent electrical storm and riding a carbon fibre bike, decided to stop for 20 minutes for safety reasons. This time penalty was the difference between final placings.

Overall the trip was the most successful PAC has had thus far. 1st place in B Class and 3rd overall has certainly maintained our top 3 seeding in international solar cycle racing. The boys slowly realised that they were part of huge solar consortium travelling across Australia, pioneering solar transport for the future.

Education

For Prince Alfred College students, the annual outdoor activities program provides a unique and unforgettable learning and living experience. Students face challenges beyond those possible in a suburban day school, including taking responsibility for themselves, the community and the environment, while learning life skills and values including leadership, teamwork and tolerance.

The outdoor activities program takes place in the tranquil environment of Scotts Creek Outdoor Centre, an extended facility of the school located on a secluded branch of the River Murray, and at Victor Harbor and selected locations throughout South Australia, Australia and the world.

Outdoor Education and Young Students

Eagerly anticipated by the students in Years 4 and 5 is the trip to the seaside town of Victor Harbor. During their time away students work in small groups to gain an understanding of coastal environments and basic ecological concepts, as well learning surf skills and beach safety.

The Scotts Creek Experience

Located 160km north east of Adelaide near the town of Morgan, the Scotts Creek Outdoor Centre was established in 1976 with the concept of providing students with a learning experience away from the main school. Situated on 100 hectares of mallee scrub and enjoying frontage on a picturesque lagoon of the Murray River, Scotts Creek comprises three dormitory blocks accommodating up to 60 students, a dining hall, ablution block, staff building and teaching resource room.





Each year students from Years 6–9 participate in programs at Scotts Creek as a part of their education at Prince Alfred College. Programs are developed in a sequential manner with particular emphasis on the balance between environmental education, personal development and adventure. Each program attempts to develop particular skills and includes a community service and cultural understanding component. Key aspects of the program include:

- Integration with and enrichment of classroom based activities.
- An opportunity to develop outdoor skills such as canoeing and lightweight minimal impact camping.
- A contrasting balance to the students' normal pattern of urban living.
- Leadership training and practical experiences for students in Year 11.

While each Scotts Creek program has specific learning outcomes, we aim to develop in all students:

- An increased understanding of basic ecological systems
- The ability to problem solve and make choices about lifestyles
- Social interaction in a residential environment which helps boys to develop tolerance and understanding
- Skills which will enable boys to go safely into outdoor environments with minimum impact and maximum satisfaction and appreciation
- Skills and ability to make informed decisions about sustainable environmental development
- · Self confidence
- An awareness of their strengths and weaknesses
- · The value of cooperation

Highly experienced and qualified staff provide a supportive environment in which students can feel comfortable and secure throughout their stay. Class teachers and house tutors from the Kent Town campus accompany their students on these programs and give special attention to the pastoral care and development of students.

The Curriculum

Year 6 — Eco-Adventure (Personal Perspective)

A major component of the Year 6 program is aquatic based with students learning the fundamental skills and safety procedures of canoeing and river rescue. Through students working in small activity groups, we aim to help our students develop an appreciation of ecology and ecological concepts, build better relationships with the natural world and make informed choices about their lifestyle.


Year 7 — Eco-Adventure (Community Perspective)

In Year 7, students study the ecology of mallee and wetland environments, with the monitoring of the river system and seedling propagation and planting being a part of this program. Waterwatch and Bushcare are national programs undertaken by students and the results of their findings contribute to a national database to help in the improvement of water and bush quality. Year 7 students continue developing their skills in canoeing, navigation and campcraft.

Year 8 — Outdoor Education (Cultural Perspective)

The Scotts Creek camp experience at Year 8 is a central component of the school's outdoor education program. At this level, it focuses on a balance between environmental education, personal development and adventure.

The outdoor program forms part of a three-week interdisciplinary unit, which is delivered partly at the Kent Town campus and partly at the Scotts Creek

campus. Concepts are introduced through the subject delivery in the classroom, reinforced through outdoor activities and consolidated back in the classroom. The boys come to understand the meaningful connections that exist between the different subjects they study in class, as well as the more holistic nature of education that focuses upon local and global systems.

Year 9 — Outdoor Education (Adventure Perspective)

The major focus of the Year 9 outdoor education program is the introduction of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award. This is an internationally recognised awards program (Bronze, Silver and Gold) that offers young people the opportunity to participate in a broad range of activities.

The Award is divided into four categories:

- Service
- Expedition
- · Skills
- · Physical Recreationm

The focus at Scotts Creek is to assist boys in the planning and preparation of the Bronze component of Expedition, the aim of which is to encourage a spirit of adventure and discovery. During camp week, students plan and prepare a 3day/2-night canoe expedition and take part in activities including canoeing, the new adventure ropes course and big wall challenge, and initiative activities.

Challenges for Senior Students

Year 10 — Outdoor Education (Peak Adventure)

A core component of the Year 10 outdoor education program is to extend students through a five-day expedition implementing skills and knowledge learned and acquired during previous camps at Scotts Creek.





Expedition activities provide challenges and opportunities for our students to take considerable responsibility for the planning and organisation of the venture, which take place at selected South Australian and interstate national parks:

- · Canoeing (Chowilla National Park)
- Bushwalking (Deep Creek Conservation Park)
- Rock Climbing (Mt. Arapiles & The Grampians National Park Victoria)
- · Sailing (Coorong National Park)
- Cross Country Skiing (Bogong High Plains, Alpine National Park, Victoria)
- White Water Rafting (Buffalo River, Victoria)
- Kayaking (Chowilla National Park)
- · Sea Kayaking (Coorong National Park)
- Mountain Biking (The Grampians National Park, Victoria)

Year 11 — Journey Program
Year 11 students are given the opportunity to participate in one of three outdoor experiences:.

- · Nepal expedition
- New Zealand tour
- Kangaroo Island journey program

These experiences are designed to extend the students' understanding of local, national and global perspectives of outdoor and environmental education and have a focus on community service.

Student Leadership at Scotts Creek
Students in Year 11 are given the
opportunity to return to Scotts Creek to
further their personal development
through service as a leader of a small
group of Year 5,6,7 or 8 boys during their
camp. The leadership program, which
has successfully operated for many years,
encourages boys to develop their own
leadership styles.

Some Year 11 students care for mentally and physically handicapped children as part of their annual community service program, Princes Outreach.

Committed to the Future

Scotts Creek continues to develop its curriculum links with the main campus of the school and, through involvement with the Australian Camping Association, will gain accreditation as a best practice campsite. A primary aim at Scotts Creek is to develop alternative technologies that demonstrate environmentally friendly practices such as low energy consumption.

As a focus for the future, Scotts Creek is actively involved with Landcare programs within the Murray Darling Basin. An example of this is the Brenda Park/Scotts Creek Wetlands Project cooperative venture between Overland Vineyard (Brenda Park Station), Prince Alfred College and other community groups. The wetland adjoins Scotts Creek 5 km downstream from Morgan adjacent to the Murray River.

Funded by a grant from the National Heritage Trust the project aims to:

- · Establish base line data
- Eradicate exotic plants and feral animals
- Revegetate the wetlands with indigenous species
- Reinstate a through flow of water to encourage native fish to breed

Students and staff are actively involved in all aspects of the project, providing a real experience highlighting human impact on the natural environment.

The Prince Alfred College outdoor education program is a key component of meeting the School's vision statement:

To provide a superior education that prepares our students to be highly ethical global citizens who think creatively, reason critically, communicate effectively and learn enthusiastically throughout life.

In Term Two Richard Arnold's Outreach Committee did an excellent job organising "Australia's Biggest Morning Tea" at the School, selling doughnuts and hot chocolate and making a profit of over \$500 for The Anti-Cancer Foundation. This set the precedent for our next activity which was to raise money for SIDS research on Red Nose Day. Tom Huxtable's Outreach Committee sold red noses and badges raising close to \$1,000, an excellent effort by all involved. Term Two also saw the School Services Committee, led by Rowan Tape, helping the Music Faculty in selling tickets and serving supper at both the Seymour/PAC Musical production of Guys and Dolls and the Annual Café Princes Musical Recital Evening.

Term Three kicked off with Tom Huxtable's Outreach Committee working hard on organising Daffodil Day, again raising money for the Anti-Cancer Foundation. Four hundred bunches of



Internationally

Fifteen years ago Prince Alfred College offered its students only one living foreign language, French. Students who were good at it could opt for Latin as an extension. Both languages were taught in the Secondary School only, and the latter was abolished when one of the teachers retired and a supply of enthusiastic Latin teachers was no longer guaranteed. In 1988 Mandarin Chinese was introduced into the Secondary School and a year later into Years 5, 6 and 7 of the Preparatory School. At the same time we started a Year 12 Specialist Chinese course for students of Chinese background. This course has been taught after school hours twice a week and has been attracting native speaking Chinese students, boys and girls, from other schools, both independent and state.

We believe that learning another language enhances students' literacy in English. It helps students to understand better their native tongue and in turn leads to a more accurate and correct use of the first language. An intellectual exercise which requires rigour, studying a second language contributes significantly to clear thinking and is a beneficial tool for the study of other subjects.

Learning another language is an enriching experience. It is the key to a true understanding of another people, its culture, customs, attitudes, values, feelings and ways of thinking. A genuine understanding of another culture leads to a clearer and more objective view of one's own culture and a deeper

appreciation of the commonality and differences between peoples of the world. This builds tolerance towards other people and helps to combat parochialism and chauvinism.

The introduction of the International Baccalaureate Diploma program more than six years ago and more recently of the IB Middle Years Program (MYP) and the IB Primary Years Program (PYP) has brought along the notion of internationalism, a greater awareness that Australia is an integral part of the global community. Consequently, an expansion of our languages program was required to reinforce the school's commitment to providing a globally relevant educational experience. Two years ago, we introduced IB Ab Initio Spanish into Years 11 and 12, and this year, Chinese and French into Years 3 and 4. Responding to requests from parents of potential new students,

German from Years 3 to 8 was also introduced, which in years to come will extend to Year 12. Finally, Mandarin Chinese is taught from Kindergarten onward because we believe that this language and its character writing system stimulate not only the intellect, but also the artistic ability of our students.

Speaking Internationally

In order to make their language learning more meaningful and have them experience a culture where the language is spoken, we have been offering our language students the opportunity to travel to France and China every three years. Apart from visiting major French and Chinese cities, students take language classes for one to two weeks where native teachers not only help the students to improve their language skills but also to understand better the cultures of the respective countries. In China, we have two partner schools and over the past few years student and teacher groups of these schools have made a return visit to PAC. In February 2003 we will host a return visit by students and staff from Jinan in Shandong Province.

Early this year we enrolled a group of students from China who were keen to pursue the IB Diploma program. As their English is not good enough to do IB English A, we initiated the first IB Mandarin Chinese A class in South Australia. While all other IB students have English as their compulsory first language subject, these students study their country's literature as well as their world literature component in translation in their native tongue in our school.

Prince Alfred College has a number of students from various other non-English speaking backgrounds. Apart from in Chinese, French and German the school is not able to directly help these students maintain and improve their native tongues. We recommend that these students take language and culture courses outside normal school hours. This year we have had students from Greek, Korean, Russian and Vietnamese backgrounds sitting for their Year 12 SACE examinations. By encouraging

them to maintain their first language we hope to contribute an important share in fostering pride in their ethnic identity.

German — Third Time Lucky!

When Prince Alfred College opened for classes in 1869, German was part of the opening curriculum. It was a former wine and spirit merchant, Herr Nootnagel, who had been appointed to give the German lessons within the school. During the First World War German was abandoned but later reintroduced in 1939, only to be again dismissed from the curriculum due to world events. Today, more than fifty years later, students can once again partake in the study of German at Prince Alfred College.

With the introduction of German into Years 3 to 8, the already existing languages Chinese and French have been moved into the Years 3 and 4 classes, and Chinese to the Little Princes Kindergarten. The students have been like sponges soaking up their learning of a second language and have been keen to use it outside in the playground and throughout the hallways.

Within the Preparatory School LOTE teaching, there is much emphasis placed on the 'hands on approach to learning,'

with lots of activities, movement, rhyme and interesting visuals to help the boys exercise their logical brain and become better problem solvers. As part of the Preparatory Years Program Exhibition, Year Five German students, together with their Chinese and French language learning peers, have been producing a short documentary, skits, songs and dances all based on the theme of Endangered Species.

Cultural connections are already blossoming amongst our Year Eight students who are sharing their new language skills, in the form of pen friend letters to Year Eight Seymour College girls. It is hoped that these boys can continue these friendships in German and engage in joint activities together meeting at the German Club for a lunch, or attending German plays.

If Herr Nootnagel could sit alongside us now, with a glass of wine in hand and reflect on the development of German at Prince Alfred College, I'm sure there would be a proud twinkle in his eyes. With such a supportive school community and extended LOTE environment that have successfully nurtured Chinese and French, there is certainly room for German.







REACH Program: Differentiating the Curriculum

This year has seen the introduction of a new position at PAC to cater for the needs of gifted students in the school. This was an initiative highlighted in the Strategic Plan, recognising the individual needs of all students in the PAC community, including those boys who fall into the gifted category.



Working with gifted students has been a pleasure and a privilege. I have worked with students from Little Princes to those in Year 12. We are housed in the room with the wonderful window and view which looks on to the back oval.

Small groups of boys use the room for REACH sessions and individual boys meet with me for counselling, discussion, practical help and testing. There are plans to include computers in the room, and to develop it as a space for boys to meet others with similar interests at lunchtimes or after school.

The REACH program has involved small groups of gifted boys who meet to discuss issues relating to giftedness; we cover topics ranging from brain physiology and how a gifted brain is different, to social and emotional differences in gifted people.

Over the course of the year I have met with many parents of gifted boys at PAC and new parents looking for a school to suit the learning needs of their gifted boys. I look forward to continuing the many wonderful associations and educational partnerships made with parents and their sons' teachers.

My colleagues at PAC have helped and supported me, embracing the concept of provision for gifted and talented students with enthusiasm and professionalism.

The establishment of two multi-level classes for gifted students in 2003 has been the major focus in Terms 3 and 4. This is an exciting project designed to meet the unique learning needs of gifted boys.

My role at PAC is still in its infancy and there is still much to be done. I would like to thank Dr Codrington, Mr Grant Nalder and Mr Kevin Tutt for their support and guidance during the year, and for having the vision to recognise the needs of gifted boys at PAC.



The Prince Alfred College First VIII crew had a remarkable and historic 2001/2002 season. The School's premier boat crew was unbeaten in all schoolboy races in South Australia throughout the season. Major successes have included winning the prestigious Advertiser and Cornell Shields for First VIIIs, becoming the 2nd Grade State Champions as well as taking out the State Schoolboys' Championship. The crew's outstanding domestic season culminated in it winning the coveted 2002 Head of the River at the Public Schools' Regatta and in so doing it received the Gosse and Blackmore Shields.

At the Australian Championships held at Lake Nagambie in Victoria in March, the Princes crew became the Under 19 Men's National Champions, the first time an eight from the school has achieved this level.

The crew was still undecided after the week had finished due to the strong depth of the squad. First Grade State Champs was the perfect opportunity. With the conditions set to row a sub six minute time, the crew was

focused and pumped for a big race. Out of the start we were sitting in the middle of the pack. We did a monster push at the 1000m mark, pushing us into second, a length down on Adelaide. In the last 250m we gave it our all but we couldn't catch Adelaide rowing club. We had beaten Saints by 5 lengths and recorded a good time of 6:02.

In the Schoolboy state champs, we were racing for the Advertiser Shield. We received a major fright as Saints came out of the blocks extremely fast and had a half a length on us till the 1000. We stayed composed and calm to row through them and to win by a length. Two weeks later we were racing for the Cornell Shield on the Port River. With very quick conditions, we took out the race and posted a time of 5:43. This was the fastest time we had gone under six minutes.

After being the best schoolboy crew in South Australia, the two categories that we were competing in were the Under 19 and the Schoolboy (U20). We performed strongly in the heats making the final of the U19's, qualifying second behind a strong club crew from Western Australia. In the final we had a good start, trailing behind the Friends School from Tasmania to the 1000. We pulled an extra 10% to make history for our school and South Australia as well. We were only the second South Australian schoolboy VIII to win a national title. There was jubilation on the bank with every South Australian there clapping and cheering us in. Unfortunately, we had a super quick semi for the schoolboy and we missed out by a fraction of a second on making the final.

We came back for the build-up for the Head of the River and went on to win the Gosse and Blackmore Shields for the second year running.

This season has been the best ever for any Prince Alfred College First VIII. We were undefeated in schoolboy events. We created history by becoming only the second South Australian schoolboy crew to win a National title, and to win back to back at the Head of the River, a feat that has not been done for over sixty years at Prince Alfred College.

The crew's thanks must go to our sincerest friend and weights coach Mr Huddleston who has stuck by us through all the tough times and when we needed him most; Mr Roberts, Director of Rowing, who has helped throughout the season and the parents who have given so much support; and to James Ledgard and Andrew Stunell for all the tremendous coaching and advice.



Stanton House Report







Farmers to study overseas

Gum Nebula

A discovery by the late Dr Colin Stanley Gum (PAC 1939–1941) an astrophysicist, has now been listed in the Encyclopaedia Britannica. Gum Nebula, a complex of diffuse, glowing gas, too faint to be seen with the unaided eye, was discovered by Gum and his findings were published in 1995. It is the largest known nebula as seen from Earth.


Squash


So the Reds entered the half way break at 4–2 up and the Blues were not impressed.
