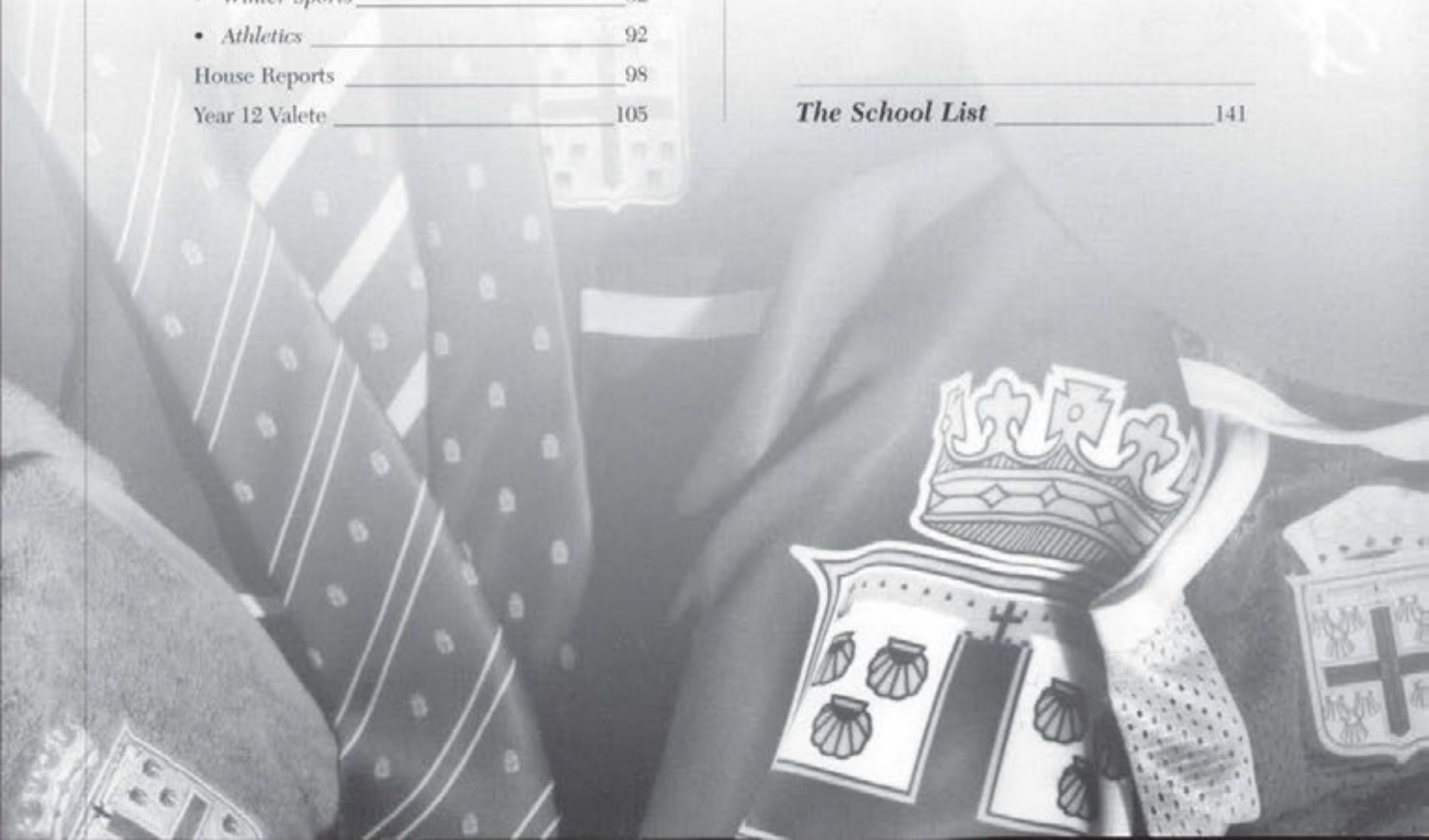

Editorial

Student Forum

2003 has seen the Student Forum play an important role within the senior school, providing boys with the opportunity to voice concerns and raise issues in a constructive manner. Having been established by the prefect body in 2001 the Forum has continued to grow in both influence and esteem within the school. This year the following goals were established in order to give direction and purpose to the Forum.

- a) To provide the students of Prince Alfred College with an open forum in which to express their ideas through a student representative. The forum is run by students for the benefit of students, and the wider School community.
- b) To provide an environment conducive to the discussion of students' ideas and, through democratic means, the development of possible courses of action.
- c) To provide an opportunity for feedback to the Prefects so that they may better understand some of the broader school management issues and, from there, take action for the benefit of the students and the wider School community.

year and, in doing so, ensuring that every issue raised at meetings was heard by the senior staff. Report 2003

It gives me great pleasure to present my 2003 Report to the Prince Alfred College community.

Year 12 Results

Once again, our Year 12 results in 2002 were excellent when judged by almost any measure. A large cohort of boys attempted the examination — 97 in the SACE program (the same number as 2001) and 30 in the IB Diploma (compared with 20 in 2001). Almost all our students (97%) completed the requirements for the award of either the SACE or IB Diploma.

There were 62 merit scores, our second highest number on record, and only one less than our record number one year earlier. For the first time, there were more merit scores in the IB (36) than the SACE (26).

As always, however, the great strength of Princes is in raising the results of boys in the mid-range of ability to the top end of results, and 2002 continued this tradition. 91% of our students finished in the top 50% of results, 60% of students achieved results in the top 20% of the state, 42% of our boys were in the top 10% of the state, and 7% of our students achieved results that placed them in the top 1% of the state.

The Dux of the School in 2002 was Edward Heddle and Proxime Accessit was George Georgiadis. Also in the top 1% of the state were Joshua Baldwin, Aaron Garry, Thomas Nguyen, James Potter, Michael Davies, David Do and Benjamin Boucaut, making a total of 9 students.

Effort Awards

I am pleased to report that the system of recognising boys' efforts in the secondary school, through the awarding of Headmaster's Awards for Effort, continues to be highly effective in promoting a strong culture of learning and application in the classroom. Boys who earn straight '1's for effort on their term reports are awarded a Headmaster's Gold Award for Effort. Boys who earn



straight '1's for effort with one '2' are awarded a Headmaster's Red Award for Effort, while boys who earn straight '1's for effort with two '2's are awarded a Headmaster's White Award for Effort. These awards are eagerly sought after and highly prized, as is the afternoon following the awards assemblies to which they and their families are invited. The proportion of boys earning effort awards over the past six terms has been as follows:

The effort grade system shall be enhanced from the start of next year with the addition of a new award, the Headmaster's Special Award for Improved Effort. This award shall be awarded to boys whose effort shows a marked improvement over their previous report as measured by their EGA (Effort Grade Average).

Strategic Plan Implementation

The strategic plan, Princes Towards 2010, that was published in early 2001 continues to shape the direction of Prince Alfred College. Since the report of achievements was published in last year's Chronicle, additional changes achieved include the following:

- Construction of 'Ningana', the new multi-purpose classroom, library,

resource and computing building in the Preparatory School.

- Refurbishment of most of the science laboratories in the Secondary School, with this facility being re-named the 'Arrowcrest Science Centre'.
- Further significant expansion, upgrading and improvements in computing facilities, including:
 - Redesign and democratisation of the website;
 - Establishment of a Virtual Private Network (VPN) that allows boys to access their work on the school's network from home; and
- Development of online learning materials through WebCT.
- Implementation of new report formats for both Preparatory and Secondary schools to meet parents' needs (as established through extensive consultation) more fully and effectively.
- Enhancement of school pride and identity with the expansion of the 'Our Princes Men' gallery, celebrating the achievements of our Old Scholars.

- Upgrading of boarding facilities, including refurbishment of Hartley Wing and expansion of the wireless computing network.

- Development of a distinctive MYP@PAC (Middle Years Program at Prince Alfred College), enhancing and replacing the IB MYP from which we have now disaffiliated, to meet the specific needs of our pre-adolescent and young adolescent boys.
- Enhancement of Religious and Values Education by being linked where possible into a program of holistic formation in a new faculty of Eudemology.
- Establishment of a centre of excellence in Mathematics teaching, named in honour of former student Noel Baker.

- Implementation of a new management structure in the boarding house, with much greater emphasis on pastoral care and individual attention to boys' needs.
- Reaffirmation of PAC's 'Two Schools' structure.
- Further work towards the development of a school master plan.
- Introduction of two multi-level classes in the Preparatory School to cater for different learning styles of boys and to emphasise individual creativity and giftedness.
- Initiation of the process of reviewing and compiling all the school's policies.
- Expansion of the number of boarding places to cater for increasing demand.
- Expansion of VET (vocational education and training) provision with the introduction of the Rural Enterprise management course in association with TAFE.
- Expansion of international student exchange programs with schools in the UK and China.
- Implementation of an expanded program of staff appraisal.
- Widespread consultation and consideration of changes to the house system as a means to enhance pastoral care of boys and integrate boarders more effectively within the student community.
- Improved communication between PAC and home, especially via electronic means of communication.

Capital Improvements

In addition to the construction of 'Ningana' and the refurbishment of the science laboratories, a number of significant capital improvements have been undertaken in the school.

The old main building in the Preparatory School has been entirely refurbished, making more room for Little Princes Kindergarten, creating new office space, light bright new classroom spaces for Years 2, 3 and 4, new staff meeting areas, and two IT hubs modelled on the glass-walled facilities in 'Ningana' and the Arrowcrest Science

Centre. This extensively renovated facility was opened officially on 26th November.

The sports centre/gymnasium has been repainted, recarpeted and new ball-proof panels have been installed on the walls of the basketball courts. Hartley Wing of the boarding house has been completely renovated — repainted, new carpet, new curtains, new furnishings, extra air-conditioning, creating a wonderful home-away-from-home atmosphere. The colours are vibrant and very 'boy-friendly', and were put together by one of our boarding mothers, Anne Houlihan.

Other work undertaken includes a new surface for the hockey and tennis courts, two extra rooms for computing labs, repainting the entire Tech Studies building (woodwork, metalwork and photography), installation of a closed-circuit television system for daily notices to the boys, a new sound system for the Assembly Hall, extension of the cricket practice wickets, construction of a new storage facility for grounds and maintenance staff, removal of the old green wooden shed to create more open space for the boys, and so on.

Construction of a double-storey extension to the Gymnasium to create a sports science and fitness centre has recently commenced beside the pool, and it is hoped this facility will be ready for use during March 2004. The building will include a weights room, ergo training facility, and open plan teaching and exercise space.

Curriculum Development

Having made the two important decisions to disaffiliate from the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Program (MYP), and to retain our traditional 'Two Schools' structure, a major emphasis in curriculum planning during 2003 has been to map the future direction of our educational programs in the middle years of schooling (years 6 to 9). A curriculum framework known as MYP@PAC has been developed, based upon but improving the IB MYP framework.

MYP@PAC builds upon the excellent IB MYP curriculum, which emphasises strong basic skills development, interdisciplinary learning, global perspectives, international understanding and constructivist learning. PAC-specific enhancements include:

- Expanding the Area of Learning of

'Physical Education' to embrace the physical, spiritual, intellectual and emotional formation of the whole person under the label of Eudemology (the study of 'human flourishing').

- Developing PAC-specific learning outcomes which free the school from the constraints of a somewhat rigid and at times onerous externally imposed program of assessment and certification.
- Re-naming the 'Personal Project' as the 'Personal Best Project' to emphasise the concept of personal excellence.
- Achieving the outcomes of the program by the end of Year 9, rather than Year 10 as the IBO insisted, freeing Year 10 for a school-specific, semesterised, challenging introduction to senior studies which is now in the final stages of planning and consultation.

Student Sporting Successes

The first summer intercol this year was the swimming, conducted as part of the ISSA independent schools swimming championship at St Peter's new indoor pool. PAC won the championship convincingly, defeating Saints who were in second place by 705 points to 592.

Like the swimming, the tennis intercol was actually two competitions in one. In the main competition, the drive tennis, PAC defeated St Peter's 5-4, PAC's first win for 13 years. In the wider intercol match, that involved 12 games rather than the main 9, Saints won narrowly by 7-5. In the tradition of healthy rivalry between the two schools, it was a great conclusion to have each school go away with a victory under their belt on the day.

South Australia has now become a centre of competitive badminton in Australia, and our intercol badminton competition is now apparently the biggest single annual badminton event in South Australia in terms of numbers of spectators and numbers of young elite players. The level of support by spectators was excellent at the badminton (and all the intercols), and we were very pleased with the win by 8 matches to 1.

The fourth summer intercol was the rowing, held as part of the Head of the River regatta. This year, we didn't quite repeat the success of last year when PAC had won all four elite events — the 1st VIII, 2nd VIII, 1st IV — this year we

won 3 of the 4 elite events — the 2nd VIII, 1st IV and 2nd IV.

The final summer intercol was the cricket. Although the official records will show a win to Saints by 9 wickets, the match was hard fought, with the boys from each side displaying great tenacity and sportsmanship.

PAC also experienced mixed success in the winter intercol season. An impressive 3-0 win in the soccer reflected the dominance our First XI had displayed all season. A hard fought hockey game in bitterly cold weather resulted in a scoreline of 4-1 in favour of Saints. The rugby intercol also saw us defeated by St Peters, the scoreboard showing 8-0 in the final minutes. Nevertheless, there are excellent signs for 2004, with our year 11 boys playing very well in both of these sports.

The PAC basketball team had enjoyed a very successful season in which we made the semi-final of the State Championships. Saints also has many talented players, and the intercol was very exciting due to the close scoreline. Saints eventually won the match 37-36.

The football intercol was played at St Peters in very bleak winter weather, both teams battling the unfavourable conditions. While we dominated the play, the scoreline favoured Saints at the end of the day.

I would like to record my sincere thanks to all boys, coaches and parents who have supported the summer and winter sports programs so positively, and to Mr Peter Williams for his excellent co-ordination of the sporting program.

Of course, there is widespread sports activity at PAC in addition to the high profile intercol teams. The level of participation in sports at PAC is extraordinary by any standards, both in the Preparatory and Secondary Schools. A few examples serve to illustrate this depth.

For the second year in a row, PAC was Australia's top school in Flag Football, beating a Queensland team in the national championships in Sydney. This gave PAC the right to represent Australia in the international finals as the national team. In Tokyo, Australia (PAC) came 4th, behind Mexico, South Korea and

Thailand, and ahead of traditionally strong countries such as Spain, Japan, Netherlands, Austria, Canada and USA. In fact, Thailand defeated Australia for the bronze medal by scoring a touchdown with just one second to go in the game. Great credit is due to the team — Brandon Lovell, Alex Bubner, Jake Stacy, Dong Hee Lee, Matt Farkas and Seb Paynter — for their sportsmanship and goodwill, and to their coaches Mr Steve Johnston and Mr Rob Coulls.

During January 2003 a tour group of PAC basketball players consisting of 16 tour members and two coaches, Mr Steve Johnston and Mr Graham Baird, toured the USA playing basketball and engaging in cultural exchanges. The tour lasted for four weeks during January, travelling to California, New York State, North Carolina, Florida, Paris and Singapore — a once-in-a-lifetime experience for the tour members.

During the Christmas holidays, PAC also undertook a cricket tour to New Zealand under the leadership of Mr Chris McGuire and Mr Paul Urban. The tour was regarded by all who participated as an outstanding success: the tour members matured considerably as cricketers, achieving many of the immediate goals set by the coaches, despite winning only a minority of our ten games.

The secondary school swimming championships were held at Adelaide Aquatic centre on 21st February. The standard of competition was very high, with five individual school records being broken during the day. Joshua Brewerton broke the Year 9 50 metre freestyle record with a time of 26.14 seconds, and then the backstroke record, clocking 31.65 seconds. David Leung broke the 50 metre freestyle record with the excellent time of 25.44 seconds. Year 10 and Year 11 butterfly events were held for the first time and Alfie Brown and Nick Rees set impressive times. A relay record was set by the Year 9 Delbridge team in freestyle, where they cut 4 seconds from the previous record.

On March 5th, PAC won the annual South Australian Secondary Schools Swimming Championships at Adelaide Aquatic Centre, winning by 70 points over Bostrevor College. There were many outstanding performances, but those of Josh Brewerton, Stephen Elley, David Leung, Patrick O'Neil were especially noteworthy.

On the last weekend in February, several of our premier athletes competed in the State Athletics Championships at Santos Stadium. One of our students, Tom Lambert, dominated the 400 metre hurdle race, winning the Under 18 event after taking up the sport only a month previously. Tom Lord had three personal best performances, with two bronze medals in the Under 18 shot put and discus. Once again, Alex Bubner was our star performer, being placed 1st in the Under 16 long jump, 100 metre hurdles and 200 metre hurdles, while also finishing second in three other events. Alex's 100 metre hurdles time was 13.9 seconds, just 0.1 second outside the existing state record.

At an individual level, Ben Gunning and James Wardle have made their league football debuts for Norwood and North Adelaide respectively. Brad Coles, Matt Jackman and Mark Phin are also playing reserves football for their clubs and acquitting themselves well.

Over the Christmas holidays Tristan Clements and Joe Murdoch played for South Australia in the Australian Schoolboys' Rugby Union Championships which were held in Adelaide.

Brett Selga, this year's captain of soccer, was selected in the South Australian Secondary Schools' soccer team which contested the national championships in Melbourne in August this year. Stefan Pretorius competed in three important tennis tournaments both in Adelaide and in Melbourne. On his least preferred surface, clay, Stefan finished 11th in his first competition but he returned to Adelaide and claimed outstanding victories in two hardcourt tournaments. In the Golden Crumpets tournament he was both the singles and doubles champion and most importantly Stefan was victorious at the Hyde Park South Australian Open after getting through a gruelling quarter final.

Philip Behrens was selected for the 2003 South Australian Sports Institute men's water polo squad. Being a scholarship holder means that Philip was involved in extensive training and competition schedules.

Jamie Bahnisch has been selected to represent South Australia in the Under 18 and Under 21 Men's Indoor Hockey Team again in February 2004, as he also did this year.

Other Student Successes

Among many academic competition successes this year in such diverse areas as Economics, Mathematics, Chemistry, Information Technology and Geography, several performances are particularly worthy of note.

Prince Alfred College has continued its tradition of outstanding performances in the Australian Science Olympiads, winning more medals than any other school for the third year in a row. On the basis of examination results, three medals (gold, silver and bronze) are presented each year in each of the three sciences. This year, PAC boys have won three of South Australia's nine medals, including two of the three gold medals. Medal winners are Mark Hosking (Gold, Biology), David Mao (Gold, Physics) and James Clarke (Silver, Biology). Medals were presented at Parliament House on Thursday 15th May.

Once again, PAC boys achieved excellent success in the Australian National Geography competition. All boys in Years 8, 9 and 10 participated, and 35% of our students achieved a Credit award or higher. In fact, 16% achieved a High Distinction, placing them in the top 3.5% of students nationally.

The continuing success of Prince Alfred College's mathematics teaching, especially with the establishment of the Noel Baker Centre, was highlighted this year with the arrival of the results of this year's South Australian Schools mathematics competition. Although PAC has always done well in this competition, traditionally we were consistently outperformed by St Peter's College until a few years ago. In 2000, we began to see a rise in the number of awards from PAC boys — in that year we were the school with the second largest number of awards (high teens), in 2001 we were third (low 20s), and in 2002 we took 28 awards. This year, PAC students earned 41 awards (with 5 of the top 11 students in the senior category). The second best school was St Peter's with about 30.

In the Australian Computer Studies Competition, 33% of PAC students won awards and were placed in the top 20% of the state. High distinctions (top 1% of the state) were awarded to 13 PAC boys,

representing 3% of the 515 boys who entered from the school. In addition, 57 boys were awarded Distinctions (next 10% of the state), and 96 boys were awarded Credits (the next 20% of the state).

At the individual level, George Evans participated in the Adelaide University Chess Championships as well as the South Australian Junior Chess Championships over the July break, coming equal first in the State Under 18 championship, an excellent achievement for a Year 10 chess player.

Enrolments

Enrolments continue to grow steadily, contrary to the overall trend of Adelaide's demographics. Our February enrolments over the past few years have grown from 909 in 2000, to 934 in 2001, 952 in 2002 and 963 in 2003. Enrolments have increased still further during this year, so that we finish 2003 with a total of 996 students.

Concluding Remarks

The key benchmarks of a successful school — enrolment demand, retention of students and teachers, parent morale, test scores such as external exam results, old scholar loyalty, all forms of giving, university entry, community reputation, school spirit as reflected through sport and other extra curricular programs, maintenance of the spiritual foundation, ethos and tradition of the school, and so on — testify to the solid state in which PAC finds itself in 2003.

We remain firmly dedicated to Princes retaining its place as one of the best schools in Australia, and certainly the best in Adelaide, to meet the total educational needs of boys and young men — without compromise. It was reassuring to have that position affirmed in November this year when Prince Alfred College was named for the third year in a row as one of Australia's 10 best schools by the Australian newspaper. In 2001, we were congratulated for our sustained excellence in a wide variety of areas. In 2002, we were congratulated for our success in meeting the specific needs of boys. This year, we have been congratulated for our educational innovation in establishing the new learning area of Eudemology. 2003 is only the third year in which The Australian newspaper has identified Australia's most successful schools, and it is most encouraging that PAC had been named on each occasion.

In that context, I would like to take this opportunity to express my sincere gratitude to the outstanding staff and senior management of the College for their efforts. When I attend the many old scholar reunions and speak about the school's healthy progress, I always emphasise that the school's achievements would be impossible without the excellent teaching staff with which we are blessed here at Prince Alfred College — a staff that is the best, by far, that I have ever had the pleasure to work with, and the quality of our teaching staff improves every year.

This year we farewell several long-serving members of the staff who have given many years of devoted service to the school community. Special thanks are due to the following members of staff who have served the school for more than a decade, and who have thus influenced many hundreds of young lives for the better:

- Mr Peter Morris (joined the teaching staff in 1974)
- Mr Garry Simcock (joined the teaching staff in 1975)
- Mr Murray Thompson (joined the teaching staff in 1977)
- Mrs Barbara Intini (joined the office staff in 1978)
- Mr Rob Coulls (joined the teaching staff in 1979)
- Dr Doug Rowston (joined the teaching staff in 1982)
- Mrs Judith Hodgson (joined the teaching staff in 1983)
- Mrs Fay Young (joined the library staff in 1987)
- Rev Dr Adrian Brown (joined us as Chaplain in 1990)

I also thank the members of the School Council for their energy, wisdom and support in helping to make PAC the wonderful school that it is. Our School Council is a very hard-working and committed group of individuals who are committed to seeing our great school move forward in to the future. A school such as PAC arises only through hard work and a concerted team effort, and the successful school that we enjoy today can come only when all elements in the school community pull together cohesively. Long may this great PAC tradition continue!

Garry Simcock

Garry Simcock commenced at Prince Alfred College in 1975, teaching senior Chemistry and

Science. Rarely does a school have a member of its teaching staff who shares such a diverse range of interests.

As a self taught mechanic, it was not long before Garry had Mechanical Studies introduced into the curriculum. Subsequently the shed was home to many boarders and other mechanically inclined students. In the 90's Garry was closely involved in the design, construction and expeditions of both Sunboat I and II. Often it was Garry's mechanical ability, problem solving skills and cool head that enabled the project to achieve its World Records.

Garry has been a major supporter and organiser of the Outreach Camps (formerly the Strathmont Camps) held at Scotts Creek Field Centre each year. Many former students will remember their 'buddy' and all the responsibility of working closely with them at the camp. Garry will be missed from this unsung community service activity for our year 11 students.

Garry retires from Princes as its first Careers Counsellor. He is a widely respected member of the Australian Career Counsellors Association. His wealth of knowledge on Tertiary study, courses, subjects and entry scores is second to none.

As Garry moves on to the next phase of his life as a farmer in the Adelaide Hills he will be remembered for the nickname "evil", those dark sunglasses and the terrible ties he wore in the 80's, his work in the careers room, the bus driving on expeditions to Innaminka and the Cooper Creek, Sunboat trips to Canberra, Field Days at Lucindale and Paskeville, the fourths football team, the rugby team bus driver, the vivid 'reality' demonstrations in the laboratories and mechanical studies, the list goes on and on.



Peter S Morris

Peter "Mogga" was appointed to teach English and History at PAC in 1974. He retires after 30 years of

very generous and varied service. He has the perhaps unique distinction of having served under four different Headmasters, and has taught the sons of old scholars who were his peers as a student at PAC in the 1950s.

The breadth and depth of Peter's commitment to the school is staggering. His lessons are remembered for the wealth of anecdotes introduced, to assist boys to understand complex issues. His ready, if sometimes cryptic humour, along with his singing at assemblies has been legendary. Peter led all staff in the LLIMY Literacy Professional development program, in the process gaining his M.Ed from UniSA.

Peter has made perhaps a far greater contribution to the school through his co-curricular activities. As Master-in-Charge of Soccer continuously since 1980 he was recognised for his contributions through the awarding of the Morris trophy. His expertise in tennis umpiring, including 12 years on the international circuit, led to many years of successful coaching at the junior levels at PAC. He made a significant contribution to the Pastoral care program as the inaugural Head of House for Blacket House. In addition, he led many school camps, including the inaugural interstate History trip and the Wesley Exchanges to Melbourne. He has been Staff Coordinator of the Chronicle.

Peter has shown a particular concern and generosity of spirit when it came to his colleagues. He has given much time to assisting and mentoring staff newcomers. His concerns for staff saw him take up the position of Occupational Health and Safety Officer, including chairing the committee. He has in recent years coordinated relief teaching for absent staff. Finally, he has been President of the Staff Common Room, Vice-President of the Staff Association and Staff representative on the Superannuation Committee.

Peter's well-earned retirement will indeed leave an enormous void. What is certain is that many staff will share not only fond memories of Peter, as will former students, but also the responsibility for the enormously varied range of activities in which Peter involved himself.



Murray Thompson

Murray Thompson took up a position as a teacher of Maths, Physics and General Science

in 1977. Alongside his teaching commitments, he has been involved in tennis, cricket, table tennis and basketball, then, in 2002 he took over as Coordinator of Chess. In addition, his speleological talents came to the fore early in his tenure when he accompanied groups of students on caving expeditions. He has also been involved with a range of water-based activities at the school's Goolwa Aquatic Centre. Murray was editor of the Science Journal in 2002. In 1994 he became involved with the Dimensions of Learning program and in 1998 he became its Coordinator, which involved him in the induction of new staff, weekend conferences at Strathalbyn, sessions with students and classroom support for teachers K-12. From 1989 to 1997 he held the position of Housemaster of Oldham House then in 2000 he took on the role of Coordinator of Year 8 students. As well as teaching Science, Murray was the Coordinator of Physics during the six-year period 1997 to 2002.

Just listing Murray's responsibilities displays two things — the range of his abilities and the enormous commitment he has made to PAC. His departure will leave a vacuum, which will be impossible to fill.

Murray has supported generations of students in finding new ways of thinking, in organising their knowledge and in finding creative ways to retain information. His vibrant personality and dedication to his students ensure classrooms where active learning and humour combine successfully, illustrating what a genuine educator he is.

As one of his colleagues commented recently, "Murray is of the stuff that has held this place together for over a quarter of a century". His honesty, sensitivity, empathy, supportiveness, meticulous organization, reliability, genuineness and patience set a standard for all teachers. Those of us who have been privileged to work alongside him will find our world that much the poorer without him here but our lives are intensely enriched by the memories he leaves behind.

Rob Coulls joined the Preparatory School in 1979 as its first full time physical education teacher.

Subsequently Rob established the new PE program and even introduced a daily fitness schedule for the school.

Arts Week 2003 was a showcase for many of our boys' talents. There were various performances and exhibitions kicking off with a Gala Night that involved a parade of boys dressed in international garb, singing songs from their chosen nation. The Assembly Hall was jam-packed and the food served in the undercroft shortly thereafter was a great way for our families to finish the evening.

At the beginning of Term 4, our administration was able to move from the transportable offices on the school oval, to the new offices adjacent the library. This brought about some relief after battling flooded pathways and a mud-stricken oval for two terms. Little Princes students nearing the age of 5, have also been able to make use of their new facilities this year. The refurbishment of Year 2, 3 classrooms, new technology lab, reception/office and staffroom were completed in the early weeks of Term 4, and will enable classes to commence in the refurbished rooms at the start of 2004.

This year we have set up a Student Representative Council (SRC) that is made up of two students from each year level. Some of the key roles of the SRC are: to be a voice for the student population, assist with changes in the Preparatory School, encourage school spirit, pride and friendships and organise activities for the students. Advantages of the new K-12 House system include: greater coherence between the two schools, increased opportunities for school leadership, long-term association with a House and improving House spirit.

I would like to thank all of the parents who gave us so much positive feedback regarding our inaugural Preparatory School Speech Night at the end of the 2002 scholastic year. It was terrific to recognise so many students for their achievements and talents. I look forward to the evening of Tuesday December 9 when we hold our speech night for 2003 and say a fond farewell to our Year 7 boys.

Future Problem Solving

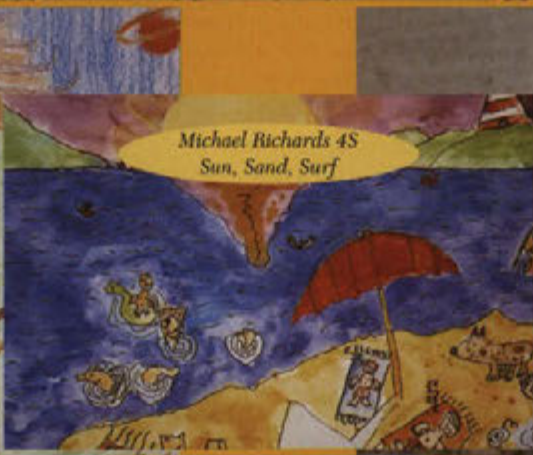

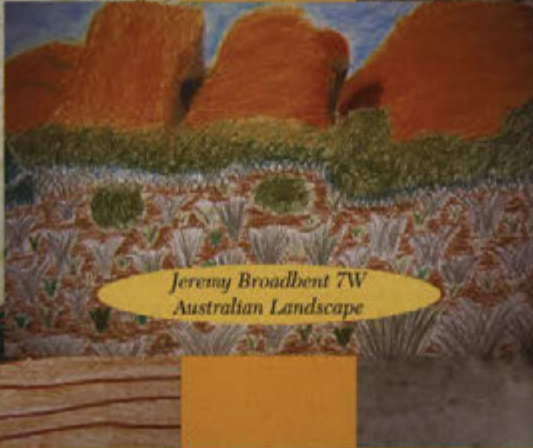

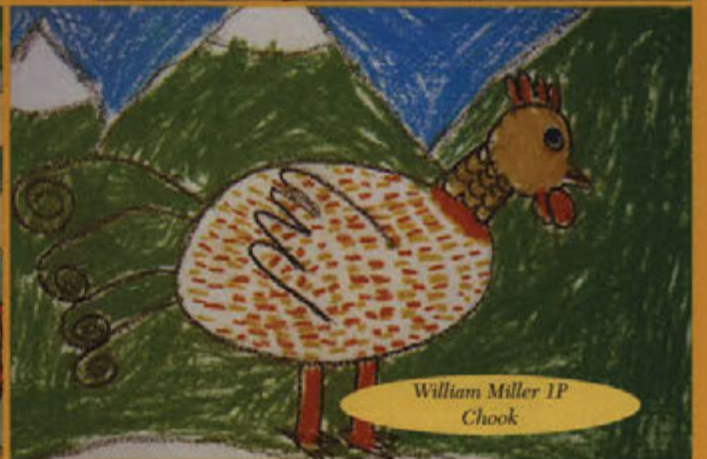

Arts Week

Arts Week began on Monday 15 September in the Assembly Hall with the presentation of the annual Arts Awards. There were 13 Awards plus an additional 9 Arts Honours Awards — a significant realisation of the high standard of achievement and commitment to the Arts at Prince Alfred College. Among those commended a special mention should be made of Captain of Music Henry House, who chaired the Music Council and assisted greatly in the organisation of the preparation and presentation of Arts Week. (We are also indebted to Acting Director of Music David Jacquier, who replaced Pamela Freeman in first Semester this year.)

This first Assembly was then treated to an inspirational performance by the Elder Conservatorium Wind Ensemble conducted by Bob Hower, well known to our Senior Concert Band, who workshop quite regularly with Mr Hower. The Founder's Service this year happened to fall on Opening Day, giving our musicians another opportunity to provide musical support with the combined Concert Band. The lunch hours were devoted to special performances each day and began with student Band "Blutonic" featuring David Leung and fellow musicians. On Tuesday old scholar Joseph de Maria and his band performed and then followed on with a workshop for students interested in "Rap Music"; on Wednesday there was a giant Chess Board match in the Quadrangle; Thursday featured the well known Adelaide band "Special Patrol", who also gave a workshop and on Friday old scholars Mickey Bethune and Sam Knight returned with their Band "Silent Planet". Our Artists-in-Residence this year included Simone Kennedy and Robert Habel; and our exhibition of photography was displayed in the Hall Foyer for the whole week.

Monday began with grey skies, which turned into a steady rain by lunchtime, so our traditional Prep Gala Parade rehearsed "Plan B", which began in the Chapel and ended with their performance in the Assembly Hall. Each class represented a different country; they sang a traditional song, dressed in the National Flag colours and looked superb as they gradually filled the Hall on Monday evening. Their combined performance of two national songs brought thunderous applause from a dry audience, accompanied by the inclement weather beating down above. However this did not deter the crowds from proceeding to the Undercroft for more music (Music Staff Hellenic Ensemble, "Mestizo" and the Bayern Bell Ringers) and international food. A grand Opening to Arts Week.

On Tuesday morning our international theme was carried on with French poetry readings by Chantal Furlong in the Chapel for groups from both the Prep and Secondary school. Before recess the school came together again for an International Assembly presented by Nishani Singh and her students. In the afternoon the Year 9 Music Class presented a very special concert to the Prep School in the Chapel. The Chapel Choir accompanied by a special Chamber Orchestra sang the Vivaldi Gloria in the Chapel at 6.30pm. Prepared and conducted by our Choirmaster Robert Dave, this was one of the highlights of the week. The Gloria is very demanding but incredibly beautiful if sung well — the

Chapel Choir sang absolutely superbly and left a lasting impression on a very appreciative audience. Following a brief interval, the Senior Musicians then presented a program of solo performances — a fitting complement to the music that had gone before.

On Wednesday the first of our theatre experiences was scheduled with the Year 9 students going to the Lion Arts Centre for a cabaret style performance of the play "Boy"; this was followed on Thursday morning with two performances of the play "Beginner's Guide to Romance" for all of Years 10 and 11. On Thursday evening our students took the opportunity to demonstrate their theatrical skills in Drama Teacher Chris Overton's production of "Mr Roberts". The play was preceded by the Chamber Orchestra on Thursday evening and by the Saxophone Ensemble on Friday evening.

On Wednesday night it was the Instrumental Ensembles' turns to share their music with a very enthusiastic cabaret audience in the Assembly Hall. The 'Big Band Bash' co-ordinated by Band Director Andrew Newhouse and hosted by Captain of Bands Stuart Benson was a grand display of music from all our large ensemble including the Beginner and Junior Bands, the Intermediate and Senior Concert Bands, the Senior Percussion Ensemble and the Brass Ensemble. Friday was the final day of Arts Week and again was filled with wonderful music and performances, beginning with the Prep School Concert for the Grandies in the Assembly Hall, where every student in the Prep either sang in a Choir or performed in an Ensemble, beautifully presented and hosted by Music Captain Ian Buxton and Captain of Prep School Lachlan Stranks.

The Grand Finale for the whole school in the Assembly Hall opened with the launch of Uncle Alfred's Literary Journal. Student photographers and Power Point experts Brad McKenzie and Ed Riggs then presented a highlights film of Arts Week, which will be a wonderful keepsake of this special week. The event we had all been waiting for then began — the Bi-annual Staff v Student Debate, with the topic "Arts — without it civilisation would be dead". Some of the arguments were highly convincing, others highly dubious and all of them entertaining. The staff won overwhelmingly (in their opinion), but the students were awarded the perpetual trophy! I doubt if there was a single dissenting voice on the importance of the Arts at Princes though, as the week came to a thoroughly enjoyable conclusion with a performance by the augmented Staff Band "Bird Dog", featuring Jurgen Kracht (toy guitar), Peter Riggs, Carolyn Guterres and Carol Shaw — harmony vocals, Simon Varga (fill-in drummer for Pete Hughes) and regular members Anthony Izzo (Guitar/vocals) and Mike Steer (Bass/vocals).

I think the Princes Community would all conclude that the 12th bi-annual Arts Week was an enormous success and a truly magnificent showcase of the talent and appreciation we have for the Arts at this school.

Mr Roberts

As a play, Mr Roberts has a strange beauty about it. It is not aggressively anti-war, nor is it sentimentally patriotic. It is a story about the 'little man', the 'unsung hero'; those who stand and serve. The title character, Mr Roberts, wants to be a part... to contribute. His heroism is the greater for not seeking the limelight; his heroism he shares with his shipmates and with us.

Our production, as part of Arts Week, was a resounding success. The boys played magnificently; each forming his own part, no matter how small, as a genuine and believable character.

Graham Buxton, in the challenging role of Mr Roberts, was all things. At times riddled with doubt, at times sublimely confident, with subtle humour tinged with moral outrage. Graham played the part delicately earning our sympathy as he went along.

Casey Raeside, as The Captain, went full-bore! His blustering explosiveness neatly took over the stage, as needed, while his ability to control his vocal tone produced everything from a hysterical typhoon to a wheedling whine.

As 'faithful sidekick' Ensign Pulver, Matt Neale got his share of the laughs as he successfully portrayed the bragging but hapless wanna-be who never completes a single thing. Pulver's disastrous attempt to win the heart of fair Lieutenant Ann Gerard [deliciously played by our own Ms Emily Wilsdon]



was simply hilarious as he, totally crestfallen, leaves the stage. Matt had just the right blend of bravado and pathos to carry it off.

"The Doc", ably played by Hamish King, represents the voice of reason. Hamish, his youth no barrier, gave the part a subtle humanity while maintaining the essence of fun that Doc has lurking just beneath the surface.

Other notables are Ben Neale, with more gusto as bosun Dowdy than any of us expected, and a wonderful 'drunk' by Nick Tormay (and the ubiquitous 'Stoner-Dog'). Pete Savvas' pompous MP, and Mr Ben Marton's carefully constructed Southern accented Shore Patrolman, also stand out.

A special cast included the unflappable Jon Charatsis as the surly Insignia; bouncy Blake Wheeler, as Mannion; saucy Luke Montaniero, as Stephanowski; and crafty Kieran Sandow, as Wiley.

The back-stage crew were magnificent with special mention needing to go to Micha Jensen, Robert Olver and Tom Lord, all seemingly tireless with unblunted creativity and enthusiasm. Tristan Clements, as Stage Manager — and the occasional anonymous 'voice-off' — was also superb and great to work with.

The brilliant, versatile and extremely workable set, built by Mr Paul Balestrin, Mr Shane Reidy, & Mr Phil McLaughlin, and decorated and dressed by Mrs Janene Overton, was a powerful aid in audience acceptance of the setting, while enabling some dramatic complexity in the relatively small Prince Phillip Theatre space.

Thanks to Mrs Jenny Neale, Mrs Rosemary Tormay, and Mr Mike Steer for invaluable assistance with costumes.

As a person of some 40 years on-stage, back-stage, and directing the stage, I am proud to say that most of my experience has been in what is called Community Theatre: church groups, local Drama companies, and Amateur Theatre associations.



At Prince Alfred College we talk a lot about Community and we mean it. It has been delightful, while staging my first Drama production for Princes, to discover the wonderful Community attitude as boys, staff, and parents have come forth, often without needing to be asked, to offer their services.

Proudly, we can say this was a total P.A.C. effort: No hiring of outside equipment or tradespeople —

The musicians move with animation and direction and the deep moans of the cello soon begin to summon the exhaustion of the last few weeks upon me and my head falls to my open hand. The notes stream from the instruments intertwined in a dance of harmony, the pace begins to slow and my eyes begin to close.

However, the increasing speed of the musicians' bows deny me any pleasure of sleep, as if they have been in my head for the last few weeks. The diametric feelings of exhaustion and sheer panic grip me... *DAMN I forgot to get the social notice out, No, No, NO, the social's only week one next term. If we don't get the invites out soon it will just be another cancelled PAC social. Damn, I thought about this the other night, I even wrote it down; why hasn't it been done yet?*

The masked man's arms flail about out of control.

The five black figures now move in unison, their slow, mournful swaying bodies creating the harmony of deep notes that swirl around my head. *Oh God I made an idiot of myself on Friday night, how could I have been such a pig? I really should talk to Terri, I'd hate to think what she is thinking at the moment!*

The masked man's face contorts into a mass of deep furrows and lines which further outline his fear.

The piece now grows bold and quick as the figures break formation, their swinging bodies grow wild and, after a fury of high pitched notes, the bows suddenly halt in the air and I feel as if they are all focused on me. *My life a mess! Me HA! What about Mary? Typical, thinking of myself, God I hope she makes it through this all right, it's only now I realise what a good mate she is, always listening to everybody else's problems and never saying anything about her own. The second piece starts much more slowly, the figures swaying together like the slender tentacles of a sea anemone delivering the notes majestically in a smooth merger of moans and wails to our seats. *So, Mr Tutt thinks I'm working too hard! That's nice to know, I wonder whether he would like to take some of the load! Well, at least I know I'm not the one of the prefects who is "not pulling their weight." Am I being too involved though? I really should have another meeting with the committee soon, I should try and get them more involved in*

what we are doing. It's not that I don't trust them, it's just that I know what I want to happen, at least I think I do...

The masked man tucks into the foetal position, in a vain attempt to prepare himself for impact.

Once again, the figures become crazed like an angry swarm of bees, their bows a blur of white against their black suits. The violins' screeching g's and b's bounce around the great hall like out of control insects. *Sports Day, Water polo dinner, Rushton House Play, this English assignment, Chemistry write up, Maths test, Terri, end of term speech for the boarders' parents. How on earth am I going to do all of this before the end of term? I can't, not the way I'm going, I have to change something or something has to snap.*

The final piece finishes in a frenzy of angry violin and deep moaning cello. The hall falls silent, I no longer see the grey heads in front of me. I am above my body and the silence carries me to the frozen figures of black. I see the masked man in front of them throw his arms out in one final attempt to break his fall; he doesn't trust the thin steel wires. As his arms fly out his mask is detached leaving him exposed. He no longer moves in slow motion, he no longer moves at all. I stare into those familiar eyes for what seems an eternity, consumed by the silence.

I am indebted to Mr Jacquier for his professionalism, dedication and extremely hard work maintaining the curriculum and the many and varied cocurricular activities in our Music Program. Mr Jacquier also took on support of the annual Musical — "Oliver" produced in conjunction with Seymour College and the early preparation of the Arts Week program together with the Music Council. Mr Jacquier was highly respected by staff and students alike, he brought in some new initiatives and reinforced our vibrant program with his own quiet, but enthusiastic style. We all wish Mr Jacquier well in his new position as Director of Music in a Hong Kong International School and trust another opportunity may present itself for David Jacquier to return to Princes.

We welcomed two new teachers to the Single Studies program this year — Mr David Brookes (Saxophone) and Mr Frank Fragomeni (Drums/Percussion) — the return of Ms Robyn Tannhauser (Violin), who left us 3 years ago to complete some other musical commitments.

Music in the Prep School has been very busy and exciting again this year. Some of the Prep students were given the opportunity to perform in the Senior Production "Oliver" in May (see Musical Report). The JSHAA Festival was held in August at the Town Hall — Choirmaster Robert Dawe assisted by Jenny Chapman prepared the Festival Choir. Andrew

Newhouse again conducted the Festival Concert Band and Simon Varga the Festival Percussion Ensemble. We had a large number of musicians successfully audition into both these ensembles. The Festival ran over two nights with our Choir performing on the Tuesday evening and the Ensembles performing both nights.

The Sunday Recitals continue to be an important aspect of the Single Studies program. The annual Keyboard Concert was held in the Prince Philip Theatre again this year, with the students demonstrating their solo, duo and ensemble skills on keyboard and piano for a very appreciative audience.

Performances in the community are very important both for the musicians and for those beyond Princes. One of the highlights continues to be the annual "Art of Jazz" Concert at Norwood Town Hall in August. The Chapel Choir continue to sing for Weddings and Services at Princes and Kent Town Uniting Church, and this year also for Malvern Uniting Church. (See separate reports for Chapel Choir and Concert Bands). We are also delighted to provide music for a number of school events during the year including Meet the Headmaster, the Opening of the New Prep Library and Teaching areas and the Senior Science Laboratories.

The most important event on our Musical Calendar for 2003 was Arts Week (see separate report).

Another very exciting event was the arrival of our Gamelan Orchestra at the end of Term 3. We were successful in obtaining a grant from NALSAS in conjunction with three other schools

(Pulteney, Pembroke and Seymour) to purchase the Gamelan. Melbourne-based teacher Poedejono arranged the purchase on our behalf on a trip home to Indonesia in July, saving us an enormous expense and ensuring that an excellent set of instruments were found. During the Term 3 holidays we unpacked and set up the instruments ready for classes on Day 1 of Term 4. Following Javanese traditions, Dr Brown conducted the Blessing Ceremony on the Thursday, placing the bowl of rice and flowers by the Gong-Ageng and Suwakan instruments. (These will be renewed every Thursday.) The Year 8E class performed "Bendrong" and Michael Storer videoed the Service for replay to the Prep and Secondary Assemblies. The Gamelan will spend a term each year at each of the schools allowing us to continue our Studies of Asia music and cultural programs on a regular basis. Poedejono will also visit each year to assist with In-servicing our teachers.

It has been a very short year for me with first semester on leave. I took the opportunity to spend time with my family, to travel to the Northern Territory and to learn to play the cello. The luxury of being able to practise 3-4 hours daily has long since disappeared as I returned to work, but I have managed to stick by my motto of 'not practising only on the days that I don't eat!' I greatly appreciate the support Prince Alfred College has given me through my 12 years and during my extended leave, which I am delighted to say has only strengthened my resolve to continue to teach, lead and guide the Arts Faculty at Princes for some years to come.

Thomas Wolfe was one of the great writers of the twentieth century. At the age of eleven he attended a private school in Asheville, North Carolina, where he received personal attention and encouragement. Shortly before he was sixteen, he entered the University of North Carolina. At the university, he wrote for school magazines and newspapers and became the editor of the college newspaper. He graduated at the age of 20 and went to Harvard to study playwriting and completed his Master of Arts degree in Literature in two years and later took up teaching at New York University. A man of great talent and ability, he wrote many books including four autobiographical novels. His literary achievements were large. He breathed life into his vision of the world around

him and proclaimed his impressions of the world with total mastery.

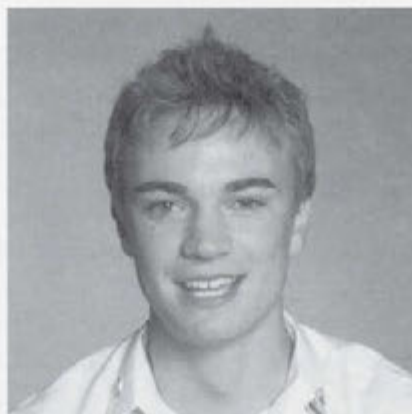

They Come with Authority

(Installation of the Captain and Vice-Captain of the School for 2003)

It was the beginning of another year and for those who had been there before they reckoned that they had heard it all before. Congratulations to those who had done well. Expectations about the wearing of hats. The need to keep the grounds free of litter. New staff introduced. Then it came time for another leader to say something, just like all who had stood there each year. But this year seemed to be different, this year seemed to go beyond words, this year seemed to go right to the heart and made everyone feel uncomfortable. People began to squirm in their seats, because this year the ante seemed to be lifted up and there was a different feel. What was it? How and why did it sound and feel different? And then the penny dropped. This year was, in fact, not like any other year. This year, there was a sense of authority.

Authority isn't new, it just seems that way. Presidents want to exercise it and sometimes have to force it on others. Prime Ministers think they can exercise it but sometimes get a shock when they find that a poll rejects their desire to be filled with authority. Teachers, Headmasters and sports captains expect it, often have it but usually have to earn it. Authority is not automatic. But sometimes it emerges with a sense of the unexpected.

Our reading was about Jesus' first venture in public. People were used to teachers having their say and they mostly listened politely but this time was different. This time someone got up and pushed the envelopes and forced everyone to listen. Some didn't like what he said but no one could listen without having to take notice. "He taught with authority", they said. But that wasn't all.

A man with a chip on his shoulder and who had a reputation as a stirrer confronted the new teacher. The voice of

anger, bitterness and sarcasm suddenly spat it out. "Are you here to bring us down? Are you here to lead us along a path that you say is God's but is really that of evil?". This was a test and everyone waited, anxious to know which way Jesus would jump. Would he back off? Would he try and argue? What would he do? But Jesus called the man's bluff and called on him to put up or shut up. The man couldn't handle the confrontation and buckled under the authority which Jesus seemed to exude. He let out a scream and was no longer an enemy but a follower. The crowd were amazed and had trouble coming to terms with it all. They were in awe of this man who could sway even those who seemed to be possessed and make them obey and recognise his authority.

What Jesus did was powerful stuff. It took determination, self belief and a commitment to follow the path he knew was right. And people responded. Some were afraid, some decided to get rid of him while others saw him as the one they had been waiting for.

In this service of installation of Tom Huxtable and Andrew Warren as Captain and Vice-Captain they are given authority. It comes from the school, from the tradition of having captains and vice-captains and it comes from you because you have the ability to affirm them as people with authority. It has nothing to do with whether you agree with how they exercise it, because you might not agree with or like what they do. It does have a lot to do with what they represent as your

leaders and representatives. How you respect the office, the people and what they do will say a lot about you and your commitment to the traditions of the school. Those who heard Jesus as one with authority heard and responded to God. Those of you who hear Tom and Andrew act with authority are listening and responding to all that this school holds to be of value.

It is no different for you who have been entrusted with the authority that comes from being captain and vice-captain.

Each of us has a journey to travel. Each of us has a burden to bear. Each of us has the opportunity to practise the values which we share by being part of this school and as heirs to the authority mirrored in Jesus himself. It will not be easy but it can be both fun and rewarding. As captain and vice-captain you are blessed with authority and we are blessed with the opportunity to help you exercise it as authentic Princes Men.

Excellence

The 2002 Year 12 student results in both the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) and the International Baccalaureate (IB) again brought great credit to Prince Alfred College.

Altogether 62 Merit Awards were received, 26 for SACE and 36 for the IB Diploma. This represents the second highest number of merit Awards achieved in our school.

In January this year, 90% of PAC students accepted places in various educational institutions, with 67% of students taking up places at the University of Adelaide, 21% at University of South Australia, 7% at Flinders University and 5% at TAFE institutions.

The Year 12 results highlighted the following:

- More than 60% of students earned results which placed them in the top 20% of the state.
- 42% were placed in the top 10% of the state.
- An excellent 7% of students achieved a place in the top 1% of the state.
- 91% of our students were ranked in the top 50%.

- Students again took part in the Oliphant Science Awards. Although Science is the focus, the categories allow collaboration with other areas of the school. This year the Science department worked with the Visual Art department to create a new, non-traditional link and enter the poster section of the Awards. The result was PAC students taking first, second and third prizes as well as a number of highly commended entries. Ashby Martin was the overall runner up and won the Australian Institute of Physics prize. Prince Alfred College also was awarded the DSTO Secondary Schools Prize for the most successful school in the Year 11-12 category.
- Ashby Martin (11 Hemsley) was awarded first prize in the Experiment Section for 'Water vs Air Cooling for CPU.' Ashby's entry also won the University of Adelaide faculty of

Engineering, Computer and Mathematical Sciences Prize and third prize DECS Young Scientist Award.

- In the RACI Chemistry Quiz, Mayoora Namasivayam was outstanding with a perfect score and Chris Davies and Sam Riggall were placed in the top .5% in the state.
- Jonathan Greenhalgh (10 Delbridge) and Anthony Noor (10 Oldham) were selected as an elite group of 40 students to be part of the Seventh Annual South Australian Space School during the July school holidays. Later in the year, they were invited to a civic reception, along with Joseph Mencil and Mark Hosking, to meet Australian Astronaut Andy Thomas.
- Mark Hosking was selected as one of the top 20 students in Australia to attend the Biology Olympiad training camp earlier this year. He received a

gold medal along with David Mao in Physics. James Clarke received a silver medal in Biology.

The Mathematics Department at Prince Alfred College continued its commitment in delivering an innovative and creative Mathematics Program. The problem solving approach taken by boys in all year levels and the constant integration of technology has given them the confidence to tackle any situation. This is reflected in the outstanding results achieved by our boys in Competition Mathematics this year.

- PAC received 41 awards in the prestigious South Australian Mathematics Competition, more than any other school, with William Gray achieving outright 3rd in the state and Duo Li achieving outright 4th.
- The Australian Mathematics Competition further revealed the high thinking skills our boys where we received 24 High Distinctions (top 2%). Special mention should go to William Gray, Chris Harry, Yegor Tchitaev, and Chong Tsang, who achieved prizes for being in the top 0.3% of the competition while Ge Li of Year 11 was presented with a medal in Sydney for being the best performed Senior boy in the state of South Australia.
- Ge Li along with six other Princes boys, was invited to take part in the Australian Mathematics Olympiad, a gruelling four hour paper. Ge's near perfect paper ranked him in the top twenty secondary mathematicians in the country and would have led to the opportunity of representing Australia had he been an Australian citizen.

The Australasian Schools Computer Skills Competition was sat by all students in years 5 to 10 and volunteers from 11 and 12. As always, our students excelled, receiving over 160 Awards of Merit. 33% of PAC students won awards and were placed in the top 20% of the state.

High distinctions were gained by Christian Evans, Duncan Soang, Edward Young in Year 5, Christopher Harry, Angus Gillott in Year 8, Carl Beardsley and Andrew Moschou in Year 10 and

Basketball Tour of the USA — 2003

During January 2003 a tour group of PAC basketball players consisting of 16 tour members and 2 coaches, Mr Steve Johnston and Mr Graham Baird, toured the USA playing basketball and exchanging cultures. The tour commenced on January 2nd and the group returned back on February 1st after having travelled to California, New York State, North Carolina, Florida, Paris and Singapore. During the tour the members were hosted by many different families and attended many different high schools allowing for an exchange of cultures and a once in a lifetime experience for the tour members.

The group left Adelaide at 10.30am to fly to Los Angeles via Sydney, spending a total of 16 hours on planes and arriving in LA at 10.00am also on January 2nd thanks to the International Date Line. During the 2 day stay in LA the group visited many famous 'west side' destinations such as Hollywood Boulevard, Beverly Hills and Venice Beach. After coping with the jet lag of such a long flight the tour group was off again, flying out of LA on the 3rd to travel to Fredonia.

Fredonia is a town about one hour drive from the city of Buffalo in New York state and is very close to the border of the USA and Canada. The tour group spent a total of 12 days in the Fredonia and Chataqua Lake area where they were hosted by families and made many friendships that will last a long time. This is where the tour members spent most of their time attending high schools such as Fredonia High School and Southwestern Central School. During the group's stay in Fredonia the two teams played six games against high school teams in the space of only nine days with the varsity team leaving a record of 2-4 against some tough competition and the junior varsity leaving an impressive 4-2 record. The tour group drove across the Canadian border to Niagara Falls on the 14th before our last game in the western New York area.

On January 16th we moved on to Greensboro, North Carolina for five days. We were hosted by the parents of players from Greensboro Day School and Forsyth Day School, two private co-ed secondary schools in the Greensboro area. We were centrally located within a 1 1/2 hour driving area of FIVE basketball stadiums that could seat over 15,000 fans. These are the stadiums for the University of North Carolina, North Carolina State, Duke University, Wake Forrest and North Carolina A&T. We had two games in the area and although we came away with losses in both, there was no question

that we played our best basketball. Greensboro and Forsyth were ranked at the time Number 1 and 6 respectively in North Carolina for private schools and we gave both of them a game until the second half when a combination of weariness from the travel and the fact that we were running only eight players began to take its toll. We also were able to attend a Wake Forrest vs Georgia Tech basketball game which gave us a taste of the amazing college basketball that is played on a nightly basis in North Carolina. It was quite an experience to witness 14,000 vociferous fans cheering on their Wake Forrest team.

The basketball highlight of the tour occurred in our Greensboro game as we happened to be in North Carolina during the time when Lebron James, the best high school basketball player in the country, was scheduled to play with his team from Akron, Ohio against RJ Reynolds from North Carolina in the massive Greensboro Coliseum. We were extremely lucky to have been asked to play our game against Greensboro in the Coliseum just prior to the Lebron James game. Over 16,000 fans came out to watch Lebron James and there were over 11,000 in their seats by the time our game ended against Greensboro. This was indeed the highlight of all of our basketball careers.

On January 21st we flew to Florida. Unfortunately Florida was in the midst of a cold spell but this did not deter us from having a wonderful time at Disneyworld for two days. We also had an amazing tour of the Kennedy Space Center where we were able to get up close to one of the Space Shuttles (the Discovery). We also were driven onto the runway where our tour guide explained how the space shuttle Columbia would land on the very same runway nine days later. At the end of the tour he gave us a patch that the Columbia crew were currently wearing in space as a keepsake of our tour. It was certainly a surreal moment for myself and my team in light of the tragic events that unfolded only a few days later.

We left the USA with wonderful memories on January 26th and began our long flight home by travelling to Paris. We spent a very enjoyable (but cold) three days touring the Eiffel Tower, Versailles and other noted landmarks in Paris before flying home to Adelaide via Singapore on January 31st.

World Flag Football Championships in Japan 2003

Flag Football is part of the physical education program at PAC and has proven to be very popular since its introduction by Mr Rob Coulls just three years ago. It is a non-contact form of Gridiron where flags are taken from a ball carrier instead of a tackle being made.

PAC has won the State Championships for the past three years and National Championships for the past two years. Last year the team received an all expenses paid trip to Mexico City to represent Australia in the World Flag Football Championships. As a result there were 64 boys who tried out for the team to represent the school at the National Titles this year and a chance to represent Australia in Japan at the World Titles.

The final PAC team, selected after numerous practices and coaching sessions at lunchtimes with Mr Steve Johnston (whose coaching background in the USA gave us an enormous advantage over other schools), consisted of Alexander Bubner (Captain), Seb Paynter, Jake Stacy, Matthew Farkas, Brandon Lovell and Dong Hee Lee.

We travelled to Sydney for this year's National Championship and competed against a mix of Queensland and NSW schools winning the right to represent Australia at the World Flag Football Championships, this year in Tokyo Japan. It was hard to believe but we were all about to experience the trip of a lifetime. The NFL in the USA had a budget for the World Championships of approximately half a million US\$ and the ten teams (Canada, Austria, Netherlands, Mexico, Korea, Japan, Thailand, Spain, USA and Australia) were provided with air fares, hotel accommodation, all food, playing uniforms, boots, sightseeing and most importantly a team guide and interpreter for the week.

PAC won three of the four games in the preliminary rounds and thus finished second in our pool of teams. The Spanish game in particular was a thriller as we scored a touchdown with seconds remaining to claim victory and earn a place in the Semi-finals which had been our initial goal.

Game 4 Vs Spain: won 31-27

In the semi finals PAC lost to Mexico, the eventual winner of the tournament. In the playoff for the Bronze Medal against Thailand we felt the pain of losing in literally the last second of the match after the lead had changed several times in the second half. The final score was 45-44. Mexico defeated Korea comfortably in the Gold Medal game. During the Closing Ceremony we were all presented with medals to remember the tournament.

Australia (PAC) had come fourth in the world and had made many new friends. The Canadian Team Coach was especially impressed with what Mr Steve Johnston had developed and called our "Aussie Rules" play, where we used our Aussie rules players' ability to run, jump and catch in the end zone to score. He had not seen anything like this in Flag Footy before and believed it had been a major reason for our success. (The Canadians came ninth when they considered they had the best team Canada had ever sent to the World Championships.)

We learnt later, at a social gathering, that the team from Thailand came from an orphanage. They had been sponsored by an American businessman who had seen the boys practicing in a park after school. He consequently hired a Gridiron coach who had been training with the team for two years for up to 4 hours a day in preparation for the tournament.

During the week we were taken sightseeing. Tokyo Disneyland was a highlight with the water ride and indoor roller coaster particularly popular amongst the team. Transportation for this day trip, as well as to and from the competition stadium, was slightly different than what we were used to in Australia. It was certainly an experience to ride on a three layered freeway, in a bus, and be level with the sixth floor of a multi-storey building alongside.

Over the week many of the teams developed a dialect unique to Flag Football as the many social gatherings necessitated communication with non-English speaking teams. A lot of grunting, nodding, pointing and sign language were employed by all teams from all countries. We found the Spanish speaking Mexicans, the Thai team and the Canadians (who spoke a version of English) very friendly and easy to communicate with. This, no doubt, was an indication of the universality of sport in terms of breaking down language, political and social barriers.

Unlike last year when we returned to Australia badly jet-lagged from Mexico City, the team only lost half an hour in change of time zones this time but nonetheless it still took a number of days to recover from what was an excellent trip in absolutely every respect.

New Zealand Cricket

School was over for 2002 but it was time for an extended First XI cricket squad to travel to New Zealand. Auckland was destination number one, which to us was a lot like being in Sydney except smaller. There was an enormous amount of traffic but we were just excited to play cricket on some very green New Zealand wickets. However the tour did not start well with three consecutive losses in Auckland. Perhaps our luck was going to come in the windiest city of the world in Wellington. However things did not start well with our number one spinner (Phillips) breaking his thumb in an early morning warm up drill of touch football. Wanganui College was next and the team greatly enjoyed staying in their boarding house facilities. This side was quality and smashed a huge score of 236. Giving it our best shot we were 5 for 175 after the fifty overs. Politis had the innings of his life scoring a quick fire 83 and was well supported by Bailey making 28. Travelling down to Palmerston North we were up against one of the best cricketing schools in New Zealand. Due to weather difficulties we played on a hard wicket. They made 190 off 40 overs. The task was ahead of us as Hocking and Politis headed out to the middle. Taking centre, Politis looked behind him to find their wicket keeper over half way to the boundary. Their opening bowler was quick to say the least. We made 124 with both Vince (30) and House (25) finding some form. Our luck changed the

following day and it was an exciting day for us as it was the first team we had played that was our age. The first five games had been against older and stronger opposition, however this was far better for our confidence. Outstanding performances from Hocking (84) and Vince (72) with the bat helped us to victory (224 to 123) as well as fine bowling from Haydon (3/10) and Cleggett (3/25). We then won the following day facing a weaker bowling attack. A dismal 135 was made (Edwards 32, Murdoch 29). Eudemology

Eudemology: New advances drawing upon ancient wisdom

The word Aristotle used for Human Happiness was Eudaimonia. He understood this to mean the sort of happiness we achieve when we look back on our life and realise that we have flourished as much as is humanly possible. He was talking about the physical, mental and spiritual flourishing with which, in the final analysis, all education is concerned. In the same vein, the Department of Eudemology at PAC is concerned with the rounded flourishing of boys. It is not enough to fill young minds with information, we need to encourage our boys at PAC to develop into men who are capable of spiritual insight, mental agility and physical and emotional well being. Whilst all departments contribute to this development, the Eudemology Department is responsible for the following areas:

- Philosophy and the Theory of Knowledge (TOK) aspect of IB
- Psychology
- Physical and Health education
- Religious and Values education
- Duke of Edinburgh, Community Services and the Creativity, Action, Service (CAS) aspect of IB

In PE boys have been reflecting on their own performances and on how they have improved throughout the year. They have been considering their motivation, level of fitness, tactical skills and considering the influence of PE on their lives. A real success this year was with the International Flag Football competition in Japan. Boys competed at this extremely high standard and in speaking with them on their return, it was clear that the experience of travelling to a different culture and competing at this level had had a profound effect on the boys. Many thanks to Mr Coulls and Mr Johnston for their coaching skills in this domain. Mr Coulls also did a great job training the boys for the Athletics Achilles Cup this year.

In TOK classes this year boys have been observing the empirical nature of Science as it is experienced by students at PAC. They have also had extra talks and discussions on Art, Mathematics and History to examine the ways in which these subjects offer their own strengths and weaknesses as a means or way to truth. This should help to move away from discrete learning areas towards education as a whole: the essence of Eudemology.

In RAVE classes some boys have had the fortune of using Drama as a means of experiential learning. Mr Overton has made a major contribution to the department in this area, which serves the needs of boys to learn through movement.



In Year 11 RAVE boys have spent a series of days focusing on particular topics such as War, Islam, Justice, Money, Aboriginal beliefs, Jesus and the Philosophy of Religion. The new format has been a challenge for us all but we have learned a great deal from the process and look forward to making an even bigger impact with boys next year in Years 10 and 11.

A new option to study Philosophy of Religion has been made available for next year which is an exciting opportunity for those studying the SACE program, getting to the heart of the philosophical puzzles faced by religious believers. It also heralds a time in which, quite rightly, RAVE is seen as an academically challenging and intellectual subject.

This year, for the first time, all Year 9 students were encouraged to participate in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme. We hope that more boys will go on to discover things about themselves which they never knew were possible by taking the award on to the silver or gold level in the future.

Psychology continues to thrive as a subject for IB boys under the encouragement of Mrs Codrington. In addition, the study of religion, as well as the Theory of Knowledge, often involve discussing ideas which relate to psychology.

In contributing to the Pastoral program, teachers within the Eudemology Department have drawn upon their expertise in areas of personal development which overlap with Health Education and spiritual development.

In Philosophy classes Year 10 pupils have not only studied "Sophie's World" as an introduction to western philosophy but they have also produced a project on one aspect of the Eudemology Department as it relates to philosophy. For example some boys produced work on the moral issue of using drugs in sport.

All of the above examples help us to see that Eudemology is thriving at PAC. This innovative idea which draws on the wisdom of the ancient Greeks is truly up and running.

Mooting at PAC in 2003

2003 was an extraordinary year for Mooting at PAC, with the team consisting of Stuart Floyd, Richard Arnold, Mark Hosking and Simon Le Poidevin winning the South Australian regional heats of the national Bond University Mooting competition and only narrowly missing out on a place in the national Grand Final.

This year's regional case at first appeared to be simple in nature, however, it was extremely difficult to argue the points of law in question. The problem revolved around the plight of one Eduardo Pastrallo who fled his home nation of Equitania via light aircraft to escape what he claimed to be political persecution. After crash landing the light aircraft he applied for a protection visa, which was subsequently refused in a High Court Decision made in favour of the Office of the Minister for Immigration and Multicultural and Indigenous Affairs, as his crimes were deemed non-political. It was the task of Senior Barrister, Stuart Floyd and Junior Barrister, Richard Arnold and Instructing Solicitor, Mark Hosking to provide arguments appealing against the High Court decision. The team successfully proved that the actions of Mr Pastrallo, in bombing a convoy of vehicles killing elected officials and producing illicit drugs to fund his political campaign, were political crimes and Australia, therefore, had an obligation to provide protection under the relevant United Nations Charter and Convention on the Status of Refugees.

After many weeks of arduous research, preparation and planning, the team presented their case to a bench consisting of two senior law lecturers (who are practicing lawyers) from Bond University. The team's presentation was flawless, and the responses given by both barristers to questions from the bench were concise and correct. These factors resulted in the team winning the State

competition and being invited to take part in the National competition held at Bond University on the Gold Coast. Stuart Floyd was also named the most Outstanding Advocate in the South Australian competition.

This team was the first from PAC ever to make it to the national finals of the moot competition. The finals took place over one weekend, with the moots and the Grand Final held on Saturday. The team, this time consisting of Stuart Floyd, Mark Hosking and Richard Arnold, travelled to the Gold Coast after preparing another, more difficult moot topic. This case concerned the fate of Mr Erik Tostig Bjornquist, a native of the country Valhalla. Mr Bjornquist had committed certain crimes that led to the collapse of the government of Valhalla before he fled that country and settled down with a family and successful business in Australia. Several years later, when the government that Mr Bjornquist damaged came back to power, Mr Bjornquist found himself the subject of an extradition request from Valhalla. The request was originally granted and Mr Bjornquist ordered to return to Valhalla to face sentencing for his crime. In this case, the team had to present arguments as to why the decision should be upheld and returned to Valhalla.

The team invested a great deal of time and effort in the preparation of this topic and delivered the arguments admirably on the day. However, despite thorough preparation and a skilled performance,

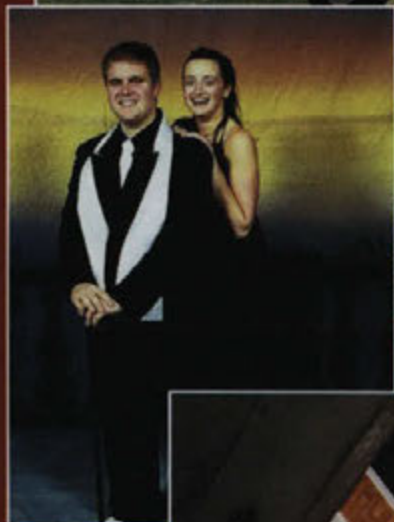
the team was not one of the two selected from the 12 teams present to compete in the Grand Final in front of a Federal Court Justice. Although the team were not successful in winning the national competition, they were awarded a plaque for being the South Australian Champion Mooting Team for 2003. The team have also gained valuable experience in the field of law that will surely be useful in the future.

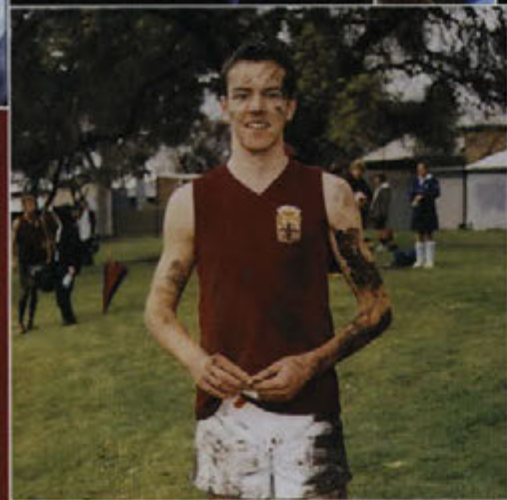

David's brilliant innings of 75 was full of powerful drives and clever placement. St Peters began their innings late on day one and they too lost early wickets with Bernie Vince, Ryan Edwards and Dillon Haydon combining well to have the opposition batting order under some pressure. Dillon's off cutter to remove James Harford, the Saints' Captain, was an outstanding delivery. With St Peters 3/58 at stumps, honours seemed about even after day one. Ryan Edwards picked up an early wicket on day two and the Princes' team was buoyant. At 9/202 it seemed that we would dismiss the powerful St. Peters batting line up for a slender lead but unfortunately things went horribly wrong from there. Dropped at 25, Saints' allrounder Rob Porter went on a sustained hitting rampage and his stunning century allowed the Blues to reach an imposing 302 and to gain a psychological edge over our team. Our three medium pacers each picked up three wickets and they all toiled manfully throughout the innings. Forced to bat again late in the day we soon met early difficulties but Tom Moffat, another Year 10 with a bright future, and David Hocking saw us through to stumps. Still facing a deficit of about 90 runs to force Saints to bat again the rest day allowed us to regroup and to come back on Monday determined to give a good account of ourselves. David once again played well for 36 runs but we soon became bogged down and then lost wickets at regular intervals. Henry House made a defiant 24 but it was a face saving

last wicket partnership of 41 runs between Ryan Edwards (34) and Dillon Haydon (14no) which at least forced our opponents to bat again. Nevertheless they were able to score the required total to win the 127th Intercollegiate Cricket match by 9 wickets. Bernie Vince won the Most Valuable Player Award, presented by the Old Scholars' Cricket Club, Alex Politis the Fielding Award and David Hocking the Award for the Highest Score in the Intercol.

Tennis

Soccer

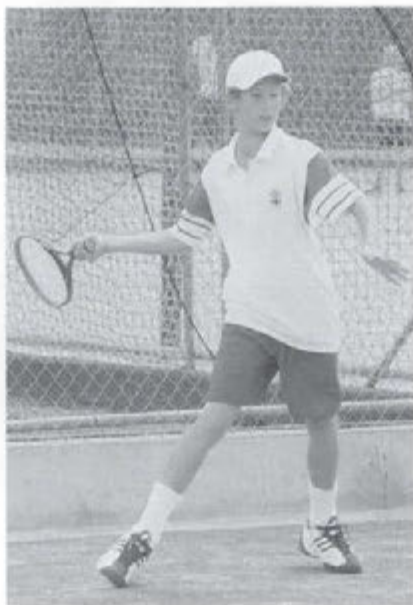

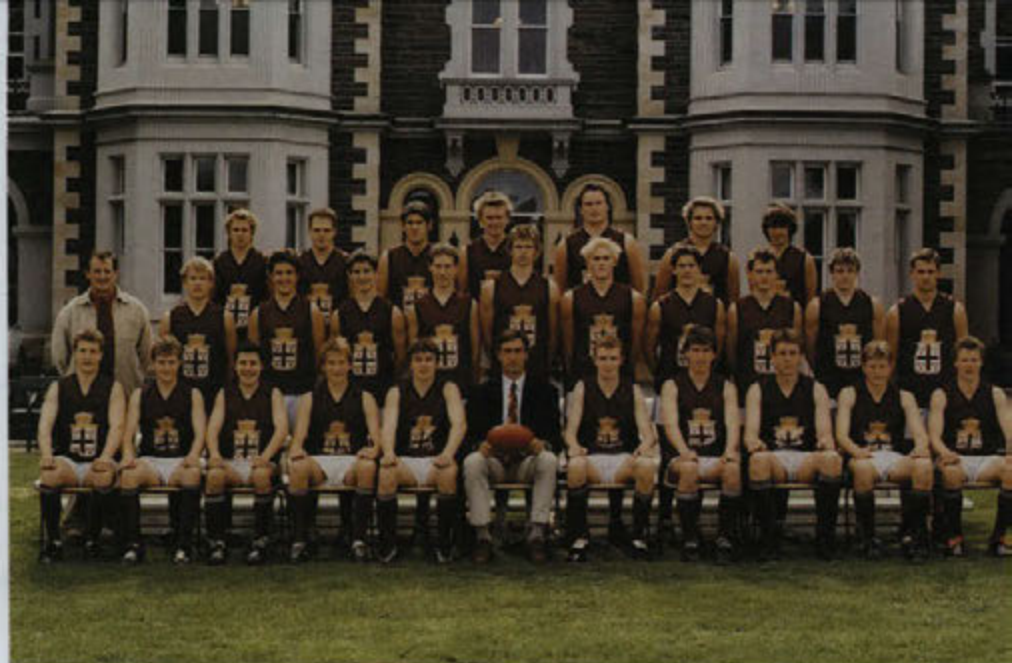

Buxton, had to do quite a lot of juggling. He did this by making sure that everyone got time on the field and encouraging us all to support each other and build our skill levels.

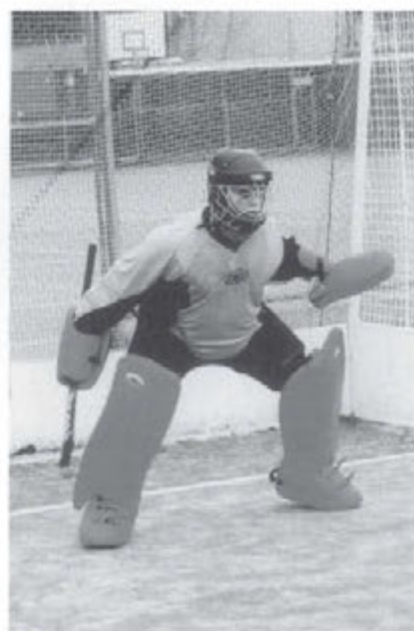

Last year the Old Scholars' Association began an initiative, which will be extremely important in maintaining the bonds with our current Old Scholars while also promoting strong ties with New Old Scholars. We have undertaken and now developed a dedicated Old Scholars website.

As times change, it will become an integral part of the fabric of communication by which the Association maintains links and disseminates information with its members. This site went live earlier in the year and we have ensured it is of the highest standard.

Also this year we have supported and committed \$150,000 towards the building of a new weights and physical fitness facility at the school on which work will begin in late 2003. We are very excited by this initiative as it will be used by not only the current generation of Princes boys but also by the Old Scholars clubs and groups.

The Committee also took a proactive approach to the challenge to find the four new house names to be used at the school from 2004. As at the date of writing this report, it has been confirmed that Council has agreed on the names selected and recommended by our sub-committee.

The Classes of 1983, 1973, 1963 and the 1953 and Vintage Reds reunion functions were also a great success again this year. The Development Office is to be congratulated for their fine work to organise these events. Then finally on the Tuesday night we won both the Badminton and Squash. Only the Snooker saw a win recorded by the Blues.

Therefore I can officially report that we have won the annual Old Scholars' intercols by 8 to 4.

The Annual Dinner was a highlight of the year. Numbers were up slightly on previous years and we continue to strive for ways to increase numbers and make the event relevant to all our Old Scholars.

Teams' Report:

After such a successful year in 2002, it would always be difficult for the Club to replicate the previous year's success, with teams playing in higher grades than previously. That said, five of the seven teams made the finals, the other two teams only missing out by one win or even less. The year was full of highs and lows, but was enjoyed by all, highlighted by another premierships for the Club's trophy cabinet and an Intercol victory.

The A team, having won the Eastern 1 division at MARS the year before, asked to be put into A Grade, the highest grade in the Church Basketball competition. With another solid year in E2 last year, the Saturday "B's" were moved up into Eastern 1 Grade, a division which would include some teams that they knew, together with some of the teams that the As played in 2002. The B's added some quality players to their line-up and battled valiantly against some tough opposition, but unfortunately missed some key players at points during the year, making their run to the finals difficult. The B's finished in their league exactly the same position as the As did in theirs, and likewise suffered the same fate, missing out on the Grand Final. Nathan Graham was named the Most Valuable Player for his outstanding debut season for the B's, with Phil Motteran awarded Best Team Man in his return to the Club and Adam Wheatley recognized as Most Outstanding for another solid season.

The Saturday C's had a disappointing season in comparison to the glory of their premiership the previous year. As with other teams in the Club, they were moved up a grade and battled tirelessly, playing very well against some quality opposition. The C's were unlucky to miss out on the finals by just one game, their experience in last year's campaign may have given them the edge to go further if they could have made it through. The players will be keen to make amends next year and push for another flag. At the annual Club luncheon, an award was presented to Mark Powell for Most Valuable Player, Andrew Todd was judged Best Team Man and Ben Foran was named Most Outstanding.

After the successful return of the D's the year before, the team looked to

continue building on the foundations of 2002. With a mix of youth and experience, and a blend of inside and outside scoring abilities, the crew was well rounded in every sense. The team started the season very well; however with a limited roster the team looked to Rookie of the Year Matt Williams to bolster their line-up. The league was very even, with most games coming down to the wire, and generally only a few points separated victory and loss. Of particular note was the D's great win over Saint Peters by 6 points and an amazing win over Aldgate — down by 12 at half time, Matt Trim's 23 points and Ben Palk's second half of 12 points saw the D's claw their way to win by 5 in a titanic battle. Unfortunately the playoffs were not to be. The team finished with a better than 50% record with 10 wins and 9 losses but it showed the evenness of the league and finished 5th by percentage only. Matt Trim was sublime this year, averaging over 14 points per game with a season high of 31 points. Guy Collins had a stellar year and was named Most Valuable Player, regularly playing all 5 positions on the court. James McCullough, the only player to play every game, was named Best Team Man.

The Monday team at Wayville had another decent year, finishing in third position. The Club was blessed with a talented line-up and proved they could beat any of the other teams on their day, however the depth of their team meant that there was a varied roster from week to week. After the dinner, some continued the fellowship next door at the Karaoke Club, with one performer, to remain nameless, strutting his stuff to the delight of the audience.

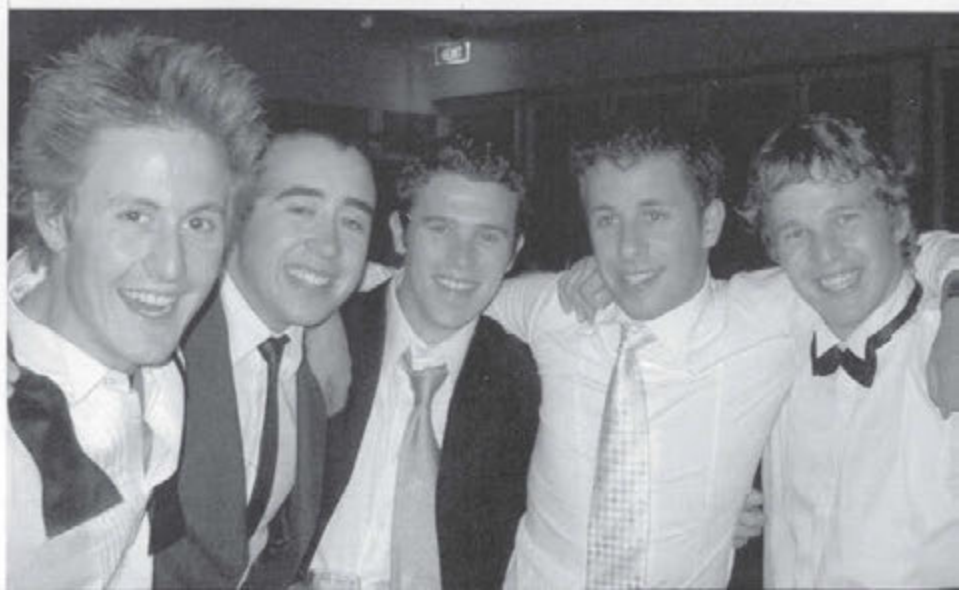
