Editorial

2004 has been a year dominated by change that has confronted both the Prince Alfred College community and the world. It has been a year when peace has been in the foreground of many events, but was perhaps best expressed during the Olympic games in Athens, when the opening ceremony reminded us of the evolution of civilization and the way the world today has truly become a global village. However, the conflicts in the Middle East and Iraq and the hostage crisis in Russia have highlighted that peace can sometimes be elusive. During this time, Prince Alfred College has been continuing its efforts of previous years to produce compassionate global citizens capable of not only surviving but also excelling in a world in which conflict, bloodshed and terrorism are all too evident.

For many students, this year represents the end of a chapter in their life. The year 12s are about to leave the school where they have done so much to uphold the strong traditions forged by the generations before them. However, with the passing of one group of students, another waits to step up to take their place. The potential in the other years is endless, and I am sure that they are ready to fill the large gap left by the year 12s.

Developing sound leadership skills has been one of the main focuses at Prince Alfred College this year and, in an election year - not only in Australia but also in Indonesia and the United States - this seems to be more important than ever. People all over the globe are being confronted with choices and decisions about which leader they believe can lead their country to freedom, peace and prosperity. The Prince Alfred College community was also confronted with a leadership choice because of the departure of our headmaster, Dr Stephen Codrington, and the School Council was given the arduous task of finding someone to fulfill this demanding role. One of the strongest themes in our current federal election campaign, and

one that we hear used often by all parties, is 'Who do you trust?' I believe that, with the appointments of Mr Kevin Tutt as the new headmaster of PAC, Mr Trevor Klar and Mrs Cynthia May to the positions of Chaplain and Head of the Secondary School respectively, the council has answered that question on behalf of the school in a most positive way. Report 2004

2004 represents a significant year for me both personally and professionally. I feel very honoured to have been appointed the tenth Headmaster of Prince Alfred College. Over the last seven years as Deputy Headmaster, I have developed a great fondness for this school community and look forward to continuing to contribute to the exciting future which lies ahead.

On behalf of the school community I extend thanks and appreciation to my predecessor, Dr Stephen Codrington, and his wife, Dianne. Dr Codrington was responsible for the introduction of a number of significant initiatives in the school and in his time there were several building projects which have improved the facilities and appearance of the school. Our best wishes go with Stephen and his family in his new role as Principal of Li Po Chun United World College in Hong Kong.

It has been a privilege to work with Mr Bruce Spangler, the Chairman of the School Council, and other members of Council throughout the year. Their support for the school is generous and I have greatly appreciated their personal and professional support this year. The recently completed Governance Review will see a new concept of school governance better suited to the current and future needs of the school.

The period 2005 to 2009 heralds an exciting future for the school. The Council has committed to the completion of the Preparatory School Master Plan and a new Secondary School Master Plan which will see the creation of a modern school within the great traditional setting of Prince Alfred College. The key features include a new Library/Resource Centre for the Secondary School, a gymnasium for the Preparatory School and the refurbishment of the Colton, Memorial and Centenary Wings. Boys will enjoy state of the art facilities for learning.

In conjunction with the Master Plan is a new Strategic Plan for the same period.



To be completed by Term 1 2005, the Strategic Plan will establish five to six key directions for the future of the school. These directions will focus on vision, values and school culture, school leadership, the development of the school as a learning community, and curriculum development.

The future of the school requires a strong and effective leadership team, particularly those who work closely with me on the Executive Management Team. The senior leadership of the school comprising Mrs Cynthia May, Head of the Secondary School; Mr Grant Nalder, Head of the Preparatory School; Mr David Stewart, Business Director; Mrs Karin Dunsford, Director of Development, and the Rev Trevor Klar, Chaplain, forms the backbone of the school's management and administrative structure. I express my sincere thanks to these talented people, and to Mrs Margaret Gleaves, my Assistant, for their ideas, enthusiasm, support and leadership abilities.

2004 saw the introduction of the new four House system for all boys from Kindergarten to Year 12. The four Houses, named Cotton, Taylor, Waterhouse and Watsford, are in honour of the key founders of this school in 1865. The new House system has been adopted enthusiastically by boys and staff alike and provides a framework for pastoral care and for sporting competitions. The boarders are now integrated into four Houses, yet Rushton House remains as the residential entity comprising the three Wings of Fiddian, Bayly and Hartley. Each House is identified by a colour and a symbol: Cotton - blue and lion; Taylor - green and wyvern: Waterhouse - yellow and

eagle: Watsford — orange and stallion.

Our history shows that boarders have always been a significant group in our community. This year special Day versus Boarder events have been introduced and the new initiative of Boarders' Day was celebrated in September. The House system has allowed boarders to be more fully engaged in the whole life of the school and they have enjoyed new and rich friendships with day boys.

The school's academic successes have continued. Our Year 12 results for boys in 2003 were the best ever with 83 Merit Scores, 64 from those studying the International Baccalaureate Diploma and 19 from those involved in the South Australian Certificate of Education. This was 30% better than our previous best effort in 2001. The Dux of the School, Mark Hosking, achieved the perfect IBD score of 45. As magnificent as these results are, the strength of Princes lies in the raising of outcomes of boys in the mid-range of ability into the top end of results. 54% of our boys earned results which placed them in the top 20% of the State and 85% were ranked in the top 50%. Furthermore, a very impressive 35% of our students were in the top 10% of the State and 23% in the top 5% of the State. Of particular note are the high achievements of our International Baccalaureate Diploma students with 91% of them being represented in the top 20% of the State. Our boarding students also achieved excellent results achieving three of PAC's top five results in the SACE. Our international students

also performed well with five being awarded Bi-lingual IB Diplomas for the first time. The school's results reflect very positively on the quality of teaching and care provided by the staff who are dedicated to their profession and to the school.

In 2003 Prince Alfred College was named for the third year in a row as one of Australia's 10 Best Schools by The Australian newspaper. In 2001 we were acknowledged for our sustained excellence over time in a wide variety of areas. The following year we were congratulated for our success in the education of boys, and in 2003 for our educational innovation in the social and emotional development of young men. Our application in 2004, although unsuccessful, was based on the establishment of the Noel Baker Centre for Excellence in Mathematics under the direction of Mr Anthony Harradine. Mr Harradine's work in Mathematics education is now recognised throughout Australia and around the world.

The curriculum at Prince Alfred College remains at Best Practice. In October the Preparatory School underwent a comprehensive evaluation of the Primary Years Programme. PAC was identified as a "beacon school" for PYP and for its exemplary primary school teaching and programs. Mr Neil Andary, the new Deputy Head of the Preparatory School and PYP Coordinator, and the entire Preparatory School teaching staff are commended for their professionalism and commitment to teaching and

learning in our Preparatory School. The PYP Exhibition in October remains one of the highlights of the year.

Our curriculum in the middle years for boys in Years 6 to 10 continues to meet the specific needs of young adolescent boys. This year saw the introduction of a new curriculum model for boys in Year 10 which aims to prepare them more effectively for the challenges of senior school courses in SACE and the IB Diploma. Boys in Years 11 and 12 continue to be tested by the variety and rigour of the SACE and International Baccalaureate curriculum.

The 2004 annual Gerard Innovation Lecture was delivered by Mr David Bussau AM, co-founder of Opportunity International. The students responded in a very positive way and committed themselves to raising \$10,000 to establish a Trust Bank to support the work of this organisation in assisting new entrepreneurs in Third World nations. It was a privilege to write to David Bussau in October this year to advise him that the PAC Trust Bank had been founded. This is but one example of our boys' commitment to community service and to internationalism.

The example of student leadership in 2004 has been outstanding in all respects. Leigh Warren, School Captain, Nicholas Bromell, Vice-Captain, the Prefect body, and House leaders have demonstrated great leadership and made an important contribution to the life of the school. The Red and White, a student-organised event, was a magnificent occasion and it was a pleasure to spend time with the boys and their partners for the evening. The Student Forum continued to provide an important opportunity for

boys to contribute to their school. Special thanks is offered to Leigh Warren, Michael Healy and Thomas Ricketts for their leadership of the Student Forum.

Princes has had a highly successfully sporting year. At the Head of the River, PAC was victorious over St Peter's College by more than a boat VIII, coached by Dr John Bolt, had an outstanding season and were placed fourth at the Australian titles. Special thanks are offered to Mr Daren Potts, Director of Rowing, Mr Vaughn Huddleston and the Rowing Parents' Support Group for their invaluable work for Princes rowing.

On 26th March the 128th Intercollegiate Cricket Match between Princes and Saints was held on the PAC Front Oval. The First XI won the game by 22 runs in a tense and close match on the final day. The match was one of the closest for many years with the tally now standing at 52 wins for St Peters, 51 for Princes and 25 draws.

In the school's first Sports Day under the new house system, Cotton House emerged as very narrow victors over a gallant Taylor House. PAC performed very creditably to finish third at the Achilles Cup at the end of Term 3. Four students, Blake Sanders, Tim McWaters, Alexander Bubner and Tom Lord, achieved first places at the recent State All Schools Championships.

Our Open A Basketball team enjoyed outstanding success this season. It reached the semi-finals of the Statewide Knockout competition and during the season it triumphed over several outstanding basketball schools. The team defeated St Peter's College in its Intercollegiate match held at PAC.

The Chess team fought very hard against a very powerful Saints line-up in the Intercol contest but was eventually defeated. Under the guidance of Mr George Howard, the team won the Teams Lightning Chess tournament. Mahesh Umapathysivam, George Evans, Peter Avina and James Griggs earned certificates from the Chess League for having won five or more games during the season.

In its annual Intercollegiate match, our First XVIII Football team acquitted themselves very well in a contest which many regarded as one of the best for many years. Tom Bailey played an inspiring game for the Reds who unfortunately lost by 8 points. The Year 10As had a magnificent win over St Peter's College with Seb Paynter best on ground.

Despite a loss to Saints in the Intercol match, our Open A Hockey team had a fine season under the outstanding tutelage of Mr Bob Claxton. The Year 8

and 9 teams enjoyed success over the Blues and our Year 10s fought out a tight draw in their match.

Our First XV Rugby team enjoyed the most successful season of any team in the school's history. We recorded our first ever win over Blackwood High School, and were narrowly defeated by St Peter's College in the Grand Final of the Schoolboys' competition. A week later the team had a euphoric one point victory over Saints in their Intercol, the school's first win since 1998.

Our Open A Soccer team had a very successful season apart from its final match against St Peter's College. Will Morgan received the Peter Morris Cup for being judged best player in the Intercol soccer match. Healthy numbers continue to support the Squash program run so capably by Mrs Viv Jenson. Many of our teams played in the finals at the various age levels.

The school's Swimming team competed very well throughout Term 1. In the Secondary Schools final, PAC finished behind the Pembroke and St Peter's College teams. For the first time since its inception, the Donohue Cup was claimed by St Peter's College. Joshua Brewerton received the Mark Sheppard Trophy as the schools' most outstanding swimmer for 2004.

The PAC Tennis team recorded some very good results over its competitors, particularly in Term 1. Despite losing to St Peter's College in the Intercol we can look forward to 2005 with great confidence.

Debating continues to engage a large number of boys. Although PAC lost to Saints in the Intercol Debating, the Open A Debating team won the State final against Seymour College.

This year's musical of *Oklahoma*, coproduced with Seymour College, was an enormous success with a full house for each of the three performances. Our boarders showed a particular interest in this show, with the leading roles performed by Stuart Benson, Jason Cane, Micha Jensen and Graham Buxton showing enormous talent. The whipcracking demonstrations were certainly an added feature. The Drama production

of *Hamlet.com* directed by Mr Chris Overton was another feature of our Arts calendar.

Mrs Pamela Freeman, as Director of Music, has continued to lead an outstanding musical program at the school. Highlights include the Intermediate Concert Band's tour to Melbourne, the Big Band Bash, and the performance of our Orchestra and the Chapel Choir at the Annual Service and Carol Evening. The Preparatory School's performance of *Kids at Sea* saw every Prep boy on stage. It was a truly magnificent show with Alistair Young's Elvis rendition a standout.

On 27th September, Mr Graham Fricker opened the Brian Fricker Sports Science Centre in tribute to his brother's contribution to the school as an Old Scholar and member of Council. This new facility offers state-of-the-art gym equipment for our boys and is a wonderful asset to the sporting program in the school.

This year we farewell a number of staff who have given devoted service to the school. I am particularly indebted to those long-serving members of staff, Mrs Nan Williamson, Mrs Shirley Mildren and Mr John Turnbull who will retire this year. Thanks are also offered to Mr Jamie Large and Mr Robert Andrew who have filled important roles as Heads of Department. Our best wishes also go to Mrs Helga Linnert, Mr Adam Starrs, Ms Javne Sherringham, Mrs Nishani Singh, Mr Ben Marton, Mr Eric McDonald, Mr Chris Overton, and Ms Emily Wilsdon who leave the school at the end of the year. A number of staff have filled shortterm contract or replacement positions during 2004 and will conclude their time at Princes in December. Our thanks go to Mr Andre Burges, Ms Christine Cronshaw, Mr David Vale, Mr Mark Foy and Ms Rose-Marie Sgro.

Our best wishes go to Mr Michael Vickery, Mr Michael Cowie and Ms Karine Aurelien who are taking leave in 2005.

Mr Grant Davis has served as Director of Boarding for the past five years. His work has seen many changes in the boarding house and improved structures and programs for our boarders from country districts and from overseas. The school thanks Mr Davis for his leadership in the provision of care and welfare programs in Rushton House.

The school community of students, staff parents and Old Scholars of Princes remains rich and vibrant. The P & F Associations and the Prince Alfred Old Collegians' Association make an enormous and wonderful contribution to this school. Mr Fred Hamood, Mrs Gerry Stevens and Mrs Susan Bethune and their respective committees are but three examples of community expression and commitment.

2004 has been a wonderful year and the school looks forward to reading of the successes of students in 2004 and to the excitement of new buildings and facilities evident in the Master Plan and in the directions for teaching and learning in a new Strategic Plan.

Receptive to the possibilities provided by computer software, Shirley trialled the use of programs especially designed to support students with specific learning difficulties.

Shirley will be remembered for her kindness, warmth and gentle nature. Whatever the task, Shirley approached it with her characteristic calm, thoroughness and high standards. Many a student will think of Shirley and silently thank her for her help and support when it was needed and parents will remember with gratitude her counsel and concern. From the beginning of 2004, Prince Alfred College adopted a four House structure, replacing the previous system of three houses in the Preparatory School, no houses in Years 8 and 9, and six houses in Years 10 to 12.

The four houses provide a framework for pastoral care and sporting competitions for all boys, K-12. Boarders have been integrated into the four houses, meaning that Rushton House is now a residential entity comprising three wings — Fiddian, Bayly and Hartley.

Following extensive consultation, the four houses are Cotton, Taylor, Waterhouse and Watsford. These names commemorate key figures in the establishment of Prince Alfred College, men of unselfish character and generosity of spirit, sometimes tinged with a streak of larrikinism, who shared a vision of the great school that PAC would become in the future.


Witherage Cotton, one of the founders of the school. A land agent, Cotton was a member of the College Committee and alerted it to the imminent sale of land where PAC now stands.

Cotton successfully bid on behalf of the Committee.

Cotton was the first secretary of the College Committee and of Prince Alfred College. He served from 1865 to 1886. Cotton was involved in the selection of the first headmaster and was jointly involved in the development of building plans.

On his retirement from the College Committee an illuminated address was presented to him and it is now in the possession of the school. Cotton became a member of the Legislative Council. A portrait of George Cotton hangs in the Main Building of the school.

Cotton House is represented by a Lion. This symbolises the strength, courage and leadership that the school experienced from GW Cotton, and members of Cotton House can also be people who provide strength, courage and leadership within the school.



Taylor House is named for William Taylor, a man who was most influential in the founding of the school.

A Methodist bishop from the United States, and known as California Taylor from his work in the streets of California, especially on the goldfields where he was a 'social conscience', willing to tackle any social issue in any place.

Taylor was an inspirational missionary in many countries, from Africa to the Caribbean to South Asia to Europe to Australia. He began many churches and encouraged educational opportunities in those countries.

He had a keen sense of vision, mixed with and encouraged business people, and was a most effective preacher in and out of churches. His visit to Australia and Adelaide in 1865 was pivotal in the launching of a Methodist school in Adelaide through his advocacy of such a venture and his profound influence on Thomas Greaves Waterhouse's decision to provide very substantial gifts and guarantees which made it possible for Prince Alfred College to move from a dream to a reality.

Taylor House is represented by a wyvern, a dragon with two legs and an armed tail. It was the symbol used by John Wesley and stands for valour and protection. Taylor House is, therefore, a place for those who would be willing to stand up and be counted, and who seek to support other members of their house.




Waterhouse is named for Thomas Greaves Waterhouse, a founder of the school. More than any other individual donor, Waterhouse's efforts made possible the existence of Prince Alfred College.

The Waterhouse Wing of the Main Building is named after the man, and he contributed to its construction with a 2 for 1 financial subsidy.

Together with Cotton, Waterhouse was responsible for the development of building plans. In responding to the fervent preaching of William Taylor, Waterhouse made a public profession of his Wesleyan Methodist faith. Taylor had been told that if he came and preached for a week in the unfinished Pirie Street chapel, 'we will get Thomas Waterhouse converted to God and he will help us pay the debt on the church, and he will build us a college...'. Waterhouse made the prayers come true.

In ill health, Waterhouse returned to England in 1868 still holding mortgages from his financial support to the school. A portrait of Waterhouse has hung above the fireplace in the Headmaster's office ever since 1878.

Waterhouse is represented by an eagle, a symbol of strength, bravery, alertness and judiciousness. Waterhouse is a house where one would expect those qualities to be very much in evidence.




Watsford House is named for John Watsford, a founder of the school. Watsford, the son of a horse stealer convict who was pardoned after his conversion to Methodism, was the first Australian born Wesleyan minister.

Before being sent to Adelaide in 1862, Watsford spent twenty years as a minister in Fiji and New South Wales. In 1868 he was 'sent' to Victoria where he continued significant ministry, eventually becoming President of the Australasian Wesleyan General Conference in 1878.

Watsford served as minister of the two most prestigious churches (Pirie Street, 1862–64, and Archer Street North Adelaide, 1865–67) and as Chairman of the SA district of the Wesleyan Methodist Church (like our present-day Moderator). Watsford chaired the steering committee and called it together to make the decision to buy the land and eventually establish Prince Alfred College.

Watsford House is represented by a stallion, a symbol of one ready to do all that is required for his school and the house. The stallion is also a symbol of one who leads and is willing to put himself on the line for the sake of others.

Report

When Dr Codrington announced he was leaving the college to accept the position as Headmaster of Li Po Chun, United World College in Hong Kong, it came as quite a shock and elicited a great deal of sadness. Reverend Klar has already started to have a substantial involvement in the Preparatory School by leading many of the Chapel services in conjunction with Peter Riggs, who is also very popular with the boys. Trevor and Peter have formed a great partnership and we look forward to their continuing involvement in the Preparatory School. Despite the changes in leadership, the normal, every-day aspects of the busy life of the school continued.

At the start of the year we saw the official introduction of the four new houses, Cotton, Taylor, Waterhouse and Watsford. This was a significant change for the college, but particularly for the Preparatory School as it was the first revamp of the House system since its inception in 1922. Previously we had a three-house system that was traditionally only significant to the Prep School students from Years 3 to 7 with Chapple, Robertson and Mitchell. It is now a four-

house system that commences in the Kindergarten and extends all the way through to Year 12 in the Secondary School.

Head of Preparatory Report

Thirty-two hours later, travelling back on the Sunday afternoon, all were searching for the comfort of their own beds. The theme of the camp was 'Lord of the Rings'. Dads and sons teamed up to take on the various activities and challenges that Scotts Creek presented and it was an experience enjoyed by all.

RAGE day was another concept introduced this year. Little Princes

We welcomed the largest ever number of students and their families into the Kindergarten this year, marking the first full year of operating with two educational environments. Younger students have entered the Early Learning Centre from the age of three, and two groups of children have moved into the Kindergarten room for two terms prior to entering Reception. Approximately 75 students have participated in play-based educational programs in the Kindergarten during 2004.

Children have been actively engaged in a variety of educational play based activities, supported by an environment embracing the child centred Reggio Emilia principles of Early Childhood Education and the inquiry based philosophy of the Primary Years Programme. A wide range of activities have been embraced covering involvement in creative art and music experiences, outdoor physical games, individual educational programs, small and large group activities, whole class events and involvement in school based activities such as Peace Day, Sports Day, Chapel and Book Week.

Four Units of Inquiry have been investigated, each relating to a different part of the PYP curriculum yet united by their inquiry-based child-directed approach to learning. **Healthy Mind Healthy Body**. All facets of human body and mind were explored during this unit.

Our second Unit of Inquiry, **Story time** gave opportunity to explore the wonders and dynamics of literacy. The unit. **www.comm.unity PAC/Adelaide**, gave opportunities to explore and develop understandings about the whole school and the community of Prince Alfred College.

H2O Where does it go? led to discussions about the importance and use of water.

It has been an invigorating year as the

Kindergarten community has celebrated the life and all achievements of individual students as each and every child has developed, learnt, grown and furthered understandings about themselves, their world and the people and spaces around them.

From the Reception Classes

Little Sports Carnival

We joined with Annesley girls in Term 1 to participate in a Sports Carnival where we enjoyed different tabloid events. The morning was a great success.

Trip to the Botanical Gardens

During our trip to the Botanical Gardens we saw the Fringe Performance 'Captain Compost'. The boys were enthralled with the Captain and his friends who explained the process of making compost by singing and dancing and generally having fun!

The boys have thoroughly enjoyed working with two of our talented mums to create a square of their own image of the sun. Each impression was unique and they look fantastic on our bright quilt hanging in the Reception foyer.

Well here we are at the end of another extremely successful year of music at Princes. It has been an honour and privilege it has been to be Captain of Music this year, and to be part of the Music Faculty for my time here at Princes. This year saw the introduction of the Intermediate Big Band, and they certainly made their mark on the school from the outset. I know we can expect great things from these boys in the future. The Beginner Band improved out of sight this year, with many boys looking to push forward and up into the Junior Band, which has had an excellent year playing at many concerts.

A tour to Melbourne was the foremost issue for the boys in the Intermediate Band, all of whom benefited greatly from the 5 days of rehearsing and performing together. This year the Senior Concert Band has had an extremely successful year, playing progressively more and more difficult material. Choirmaster Robert Dawe — This is your life!

2004 marked the 50th anniversary of professional performance by our Choirmaster Robert Dawe. Unbeknown to him, we decided to celebrate the occasion by taking over the Term 2 Voice Recital with our version of "This is your life". The Music Council and staff spent the best part of first term stealthily researching and preparing a power point presentation of Robert Dawe's musical life. It all began some fifty years ago at Kent Town Uniting Church with Mr Dawe singing the roles of Peter, Judas, Pilate and the High Priest in the St



Matthew Passion by JS Bach, conducted by his father the late Lewis Dawe. In 1968 Robert Dawe won the Australasian Vocal Championship; he travelled to London to study and sing at the Royal Opera House. Since his return Robert Dave has sung many lead roles in local and interstate opera and in Concert performances - many with ABC Orchestras. In more recent times Robert has not only sung in State Opera, but also prepared students from his Chapel Choir together with choristers from St Peter's Cathedral Choir to sing in "Parsifal" — Robert also sang the role of 'Titurel' in this production.

His performance of Mendelssohn's "Elijah" is legendary, and was heard again only last term at St Peter's Cathedral, this time joined by one of his Prep students in the role of the 'boy'.

As well as teaching part time at the Conservatorium of Music, Robert returned to his old school in 1992 to



develop a choral program and singing tradition, which is now highly respected both in Adelaide and Sydney, following the Chapel Choir tour there in 1999.

The Music Council invited a number of guests to speak at the "Recital", including Organist Mark Symons, past-Chaplain The Rev. Kyle Waters, former Head of Prep School Ian Penny, former Chaplain Adrian Brown and David Cornish from the Foundation. Video clips of guests unable to be present included Tim Sexton (State Opera), former Headmaster Brian and wife Beverley Webber, current Headmaster Kevin Tutt, Dr Steven Weisz (Tusculom College, USA), past students Sam Williams (then in England) and Edward Brockhoff (Bond University).

A large number of old scholars were present at "This is your Life" — the finale of the afternoon was a rendition of their barbershop arrangement of "We drink to you Robert!"



All of the performers, including minor principals and chorus played their parts in outstanding fashion thanks to the inspirational direction by Kerry Elliott of Seymour College. Her seemingly limitless energy enthused the cast to



strive for excellence in every department of stagecraft and the result was a slick, pacy show.

The music was of a very high standard, with singers delivering their numbers with confidence under Peter Hopkins' musical direction. 
At the beginning of the school year,

the forum into a well respected and fully



Achieving

Excellence

Our boys achieved quite outstanding results in the 2003 Year 12 examinations, both in the International Baccalaureate Diploma (IBD) and the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) examinations.

The quality of the results is evident when we note that our previous record number of merit scores was 63, achieved in 2001. This year, there were 83 merit scores, comprising 64 for our 35 IB Diploma students and 19 for our 112 SACE boys. Moreover, one of our students, Mark Hosking, achieved the perfect IBD score of 45, making him equal top student in the world!

Perfect TERs of 99.95% were obtained by 10 PAC students. As well as the Dux of the school, Mark Hosking, TERs of 99.95% were also achieved by James Clarke, David Mao, Thomas Ellison, Stephen Ghabriel, David Harrison, David Leung, Victor Lin, Mark McGregor and Chen Tu. In addition, Stuart Floyd (IBD 99.90), Devon Marshman, Joseph Mencel and Rowan Tape (IBD 99.80), Cumatan Narandranathan (SACE 99.40), Timothy Codrington and Jeff Ji (IBD 99.35), and Mark Virgin (SACE 99.15) achieved outstanding results that placed them in the top 1% of the state. In all, 12% of PAC boys achieved results which placed them in the top 1% of South Australian results, and in the case of our IBD students, 46% achieved results in the top 1% of the state.

The results outlined above are remarkable when it is remembered that PAC is not an academically selective school — we welcome all comers — and when we realise that our Year 12 cohort was one of the largest on record, with 112 attempting the SACE (compared with 97 in 2002) and 35 attempting the IBD (compared with 30 in 2002).

We heartily congratulate every one of our students for their efforts, and thank them for the honour they have brought to the school as well as to their families and themselves.

One of last year's Year 12 students Stuart Reid obtained one of five full national scholarships to study in China for a year. Stuart competed nationwide for this prestigious award offered by the Australia-China Council to five Chinese language students. He had a written examination in both Chinese and English as well as an oral test and a conversation with representatives from the Australia-China Council. Apart from the university fees the A\$9950 the scholarship included a year's accommodation in Liaoning University's foreign students' dormitory, the return flight to China, meals and a mid-year local sightseeing trip. This is the second time a PAC Chinese language student has been chosen as a national scholarship holder to China.

Many Prince Alfred College students have again demonstrated academic excellence through their performances in external competitions, across a range of learning areas. Mayooran Namasivayam of Year 12 was awarded the Rio Tinto Science Olympiad Bronze Medal for Physics. Mayooran his medal at a ceremony held at the Adelaide Zoo on Thursday 29 April. Mayooran took part in the selection trials for the Australian Physics Olympiad Team and was judged third best in South Australia.

The results of the annual Australian Mathematics Competition showed that our students continue to be amongst the best problem solvers in the state. Altogether 437 Princes students competed in the competition this year. Individually there were some outstanding results. Glynn Rice, a Year 8 student, was awarded a medal for his brilliant performance. With medals awarded to only 1 in 10000 competitors; less than 4 medals are awarded in SA each year, across ten year levels. Stephen Riddell, a Year 10 student with a history of success in this competition, won a prize for his excellent work; with prizes going to approximately 1 in 1000 competitors. In addition to these two outstanding achievers, students who achieved High Distinctions were achieved by Andrew Pederick, Christopher Harry, James Moschou, Patrick DeRuvo, Greg Wiseman, Casper Kielwein, Bryn Crawford, John Wakefield, George Evans, Phillip Cleggett and Ge Li, who were all in the top 1% of the State. An additional 91 students received certificates of Distinction, placing 24% of our boys in the top 15% of competitors. These results are particularly pleasing considering that we aim for the participation of all students in Years 8 to 10 and we encourage all interested Year 11 and 12 students to participate. These results have once again demonstrated that our Mathematics programmes, with their focus on problem solving, are delivering benefits to students with all levels of ability.

Prince Alfred College students have tested their geographical knowledge and skills in the annual Australian Geography Competition. All of our Year 8, 9 and 10 students took part. As well as photo, map and graph interpretation questions, the multiple choice quiz tested their geographical knowledge of a wide range of current issues at local, national and global scales. Once again the PAC results were excellent. Most significantly, Stephen Squires came 1st in South Australia. He then represented the state in the national finals in Sydney and was

placed 2nd in Australia. He will compete again next year for the chance to represent Australia at the international final in the United States of America. Other results saw 39 boys (15%) achieve a High Distinction, placing them in the top 3.5% of participants nationally and 33% of boys participating achieving a Credit award or higher.

During Term 2 of this year a number of Year 8 students participated in the Mathematics Challenge for Young Australians. This is a mathematics competition where the students are given six mathematical problems to solve over a 3-week period. These problems extend all participants, and their solutions require the use of a range of higher order problem solving skills. Many of the participants produced work of a high standard, but the work of four students stood out.. William Young and Glynn Rice received a distinction award for their solutions. Peter Toh and Elliott Wasow received a Credit Award for their work.

Students at Prince Alfred College showed their mastery of computer skills when they competed in the Australasian School Computer Studies Competition. Students had to solve problems involving navigation on the Internet, producing web pages, word processing, using spreadsheets and databases, operating a computer, programming, cabling and networks, dealing with viruses and graphics. This year, over 124,000 students from Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific region participated in this competition. In total 345 students from the Secondary School participated. 135 of these entrants received awards of excellence. Our students achieved 6 High Distinctions - awarded to the top 1% of entrants in the state. The award winners were in Year 9 Justin Miller and Christopher Harry, Year 10 William Wallace, Year 11 Andrew Moschou, Year 12 Ben Nobbs and Joshua Pugh.

Art and Design classes participated in the inaugural Australian Secondary Schools Design Challenge. This is a 3 hour competition that invites students to solve creative problems in the fields of product, graphic and environmental design, using computer aided design software. Of the 6 categories entered, boys from PAC received 4 awards, including two 3rd places and 2 High Commendations. This placed Prince Alfred College in the top three schools in Australia which is a wonderful achievement by the boys. The award winners were: Senior Graphic Design, High Commendation: Nick Schwartz and Hamish Smyth: Junior Graphic Design, 3rd prize: Xavier Watson; Senior Architecture, 3rd prize: James Martin; Junior 3-D Design, High Commendation: Amrit Sandhu and Braden Reidy.

Stephen Elley and James Moffatt attended the South Australian Space School. Stephen was then lucky enough to be selected to represent South Australia at the Australian Space School. The event was held at Woomera during the holidays and was attended by students from all states and territories. The highlight of the trip to Woomera was the launching of two rockets.

Once again, Prince Alfred College students took part in the Oliphant Science Awards. The awards are organised by the South Australian Science Teachers Association for all students from Grade 2 to Year 12 in South Australia. Categories range from experiments, models and essays to inventions, games, web pages and posters to name but a few. Lachlan McColl received a number of awards for his outstanding contribution: 1st Prize Poster Section "It's more than dirt", Nature Foundation SA Inc Award. DECS Young Scientist Award equal 3rd place, Overall Oliphant Science Award equal 3rd place.

Early in the year, all students from Years 8 to 10 and a small number of Year 11 & 12 students took part in the Australasian Schools Science competition. There were a number of students at all year levels whose outstanding results deserve special recognition. Glynn Parsons (Year 8) and Chris Davies (Year 12) recorded the highest score in South Australia. It was pleasing to see that the average score of PAC students was well above the state average. An analysis of the results by year level reveal: at Year 8, 3% were in the top 1% of the state and 14% of students received Distinctions; at Year 9, 13% of students received Distinctions; at Year 103% were in the top 1% of the state and 17% of students received Distinctions; at Year 11, 22% of students received Distinctions and at Year 12, 43% of students received Distinctions.

Students from Years 10 to 12 again competed in the Royal Australian Chemical Institute Chemistry Quiz. Not only do students from Australia compete, but a significant number of other countries compete to make this a truly international competition. A number of students achieved outstanding results. with 10 High Distinctions awarded to: Year 10 students Alexander Harms, James Moschou, Eric Parsonage, Stephen Riddell, Stephen Squires, Nicholas Tormay, William Wallace, Greg Wiseman: Year 11 Anton Steketee and Year 12 Mayooran Namasiyayam. An additional 24 students, including ten at both Years 10 and 11 gained Distinctions.

French Trip 2004

On a hot morning in January of this year, a group of students from Prince Alfred College, St Peter's College, and Wilderness Girls' School assembled in the International Terminal of the Adelaide Airport, eagerly anticipating our trip to France.

Upon arrival in Paris, we were taken aback by the bitter cold. Aboard the buses however, we forgot how cold it was outside and enjoyed the views of the roadside fog for the duration of the journey to Orly domestic airport. We then boarded one more flight which took us to Nice, a city roughly the size of Adelaide on the Côte d'Azur (South Coast of France). The weather was typically Mediterranean, 23°C in the height of winter for almost the entire time we were in the South. We staved at the Centre Mediterraneen (CMEF), a picturesque international school located on 3.5ha on the side of a cliff overlooking Monaco, and the town where it was situated, Cap d'Ail. Cap d'Ail is a typical Mediterranean town, with small white buildings, expensive cars and magnificent ocean views. The sea was turquoise blue, the breeze was warm. For three hours every day, we would go to class with a French teacher who was a native speaker, and who taught us useful expressions which we would later need when buying from the shops. When we were not in class, we'd go sightseeing. We went to the Italian border to the markets, where we bought fake clothes, watches, and sunglasses from the Senegalese refugees. We also saw these same refugees being brutalised with pistols and night-sticks in a side alley by the police more sinister side to what was otherwise a very enjoyable excursion.

We also visited Monaco at night, and went to a soccer game, a spectacle none of us had witnessed before. There was even a small riot while we were at the soccer stadium. We walked up to the Monaco casino, one of the most extravagant and hedonistic areas in the entire city, where cars worth less than \$200,000 were in the minority, and the police cars in attendance were Ferraris.

In our abundance of spare time, many of us took to playing soccer on the roofs of the dormitories, or we would walk the steep road down to Cap d'Ail, an alleyway between Mediterranean villas with spectacular sea views every day to buy food from the shop-sized vending machine, or to do our washing in the Laundromat. In France, the day would begin getting dark at around 3:30–4pm and dusk would come on very slowly. This gave us the chance to enjoy the picturesque nature of the area at dusk for a long period of time — the red sunsets over the ocean were a particular highlight. We also had a day trip to Nice, the city nearby Cap d'Ail. It proved to be little different to Adelaide — a similar number of people, and a similar size.

On the 18th of January, we left the CMEF very early in the morning by bus and travelled to Nice train station where we boarded a TGV (Train à Grande Vitesse or Train of Great Speed). These trains have set the world record for an electric train at $515 \, \mathrm{km/h}$, but with us on them they reached around $250 - 300 \, \mathrm{km/h}$ in the fastest sections. Although travelling at such ridiculous speed, it was impossible to tell the train was moving at all without looking at the scenery outside moving past.

The train stopped near the town of Avignon, and the coach we boarded then took us to the Pont du Gard, a massive Roman aqueduct over the river Gard. We then travelled to Avignon and stayed in an old motel which was apparently without heating. We survived the freezing night, and then boarded another TGV, which took us to Paris.

Whilst in Paris we climbed halfway up the Eiffel tower — the top was shrouded in fog, visited the Champs Elysees — the largest, most expensive shopping mall in France, visited the Louvre where we were disappointed by the Mona Lisa, but impressed by the size and majesty of Winged Victory (The inspiration for the Rolls Royce statue), and cruised the river Seine by night on a small ferry. Although we only climbed halfway up the Eiffel tower, we were still awestruck by the sheer size of it. We were also impressed by the inside of the levels — there were gift shops, restaurants and best of all — heaters.

Early on the fourth morning, we woke up and got on our bus which took us to Paris airport. We then boarded our 13-hour flight back to Singapore, where we spent a day. Many of us were far too tired to do anything in Singapore and simply slept most of the time, or spent time in the pool, even though the rain was constant & the temperature at around 32°C. Later that night, we boarded our final flight which took us back to Adelaide. We were away for 22 days, and every person who went on the trip had a wonderful time and would like to thank Mr Jürgen Kracht for organising the tour and leading it, as well as Ms Karine Aurelien.





128th Intercollegiate Cricket Match — Prince Alfred College vs St Peter's College

The longest running continuous four day cricket match of its kind in the world was played between Princes and Saints on the PAC front oval beginning on Friday 26th March. The rivalry between the Schools dates back to 1878 and the match is only marginally younger than Test cricket itself.



The Captain of Princes, Tom Radford, won the toss and had no hesitation in batting in beautiful sunny conditions. After a steady, promising opening partnership of 25 runs between Tom and Lachlan Bartlett Princes lost several wickets to soon be reeling at 4 wickets for 45. A gritty and resolute partnership of 76 runs between Radford (41) and Craig Altus (30) allowed us to reach a modest total of 176. Lachlan McColl (24) and Matt Simounds (15) also made useful contributions. For St Peters spinners, Girish Rao and Andrew Hume. bowled exceptionally well taking 2 wickets apiece. Saints faced an awkward situation when its innings commenced with about 70 minutes to go on Day 1. The Saints opening pair batted solidly and appeared to be in little trouble but the introduction of left arm orthodox bowler, Joe Murdoch, with just 10 minutes to go brought about immediate results when he trapped Will Verco LBW. Matt Simounds followed up with a very good run out. This brought arguably Saints' top batsman, Paul Allegretto, to the crease with just 5 minutes left to negotiate. From his first ball he was caught magnificently by Tom Bartlett running back from short leg. Saints finished at 3/31 at the end of day one and understandably PAC felt that it was right back in the contest. Despite a fine half century by the St Peters Captain, Tom Rischbieth, we chipped away taking wickets regularly. Joe Murdoch bowled

untiringly to record the outstanding bowling figures of 33.1 overs, 12 maidens, 6 wickets for 66 runs and Saints only enjoyed a 19 run lead at the end of its innings. Joe was supported well by David Hocking and Tom Moffat who each took wickets.

Batting for a second time we were cruising at 2/73 but on the final ball of Day 2 Tom Moffat was bowled for a determined 18 and once again the game was evenly balanced. David Hocking was the mainstay of our second innings with 62. Lachy McColl made another promising 20. At 9/148 Joe Murdoch (7) and Tom Jenkinson (20 no) came together to put on a match winning partnership of 31 runs. This gave us a lead of 160 runs with St Peters to bat last. St Peters fell agonizingly short by 22 runs in a very tense last day. State junior Girish Rao (39) batted well but when he was well caught by Lachlan Bartlett wickets fell regularly. State teammate, Tom Moffat, was PAC's unlikely hero with 4 wickets for 27 runs. Tim Boucaut also bowled very well indeed and Joe Murdoch followed up his first innings heroics with another fine spell.

The match was one of the closest for many years and the tally now stands at 52






wins for St Peters, 51 for Princes and 25 draws.

Rowing

Going into the Head of the River we were the slight favourites. Saints had us on the back foot early but we collected ourselves as the early nerves wore off and we started to play the game our way. We controlled the game in the forwards and crossed the advantage line through attacking runs from inside backs Andrew Burgess and Richard Lang. The pressure being applied by both teams was enormous. After a Saints infringement Dong overcame nerves to steady the ship with a penalty goal putting us up 3-0. Princes kept attacking hard and eventually Adam Karaduman crossed for a try. Saints scored a penalty just before half time to make the score 8-3 at the break. Soon after half time Dong kicked truly again to see Princes ahead 11-3. Saints counterattacked quickly by regaining the ball from the restart and scoring a try in the corner. With the score now 11-10 we had a hard task in front of us but we didn't waiver. For the rest of the game there was no score and Joe Murdoch kept us out of any trouble with his superb kicking game. After what seemed like an eternity of defending, keeping Saints lethal outside backs at bay, Murdoch kicked the ball into touch and the referee blew his whistle. Princes had won their first Rugby Intercol in seven years by a solitary point.

Basketball

We had not won a basketball Intercol since 1998. Our season culminated in this game and so did our teamwork. In spite of some tension and grey patches through the season, the team pulled together to put on a stellar performance and finished 19 point winners. Integral performances from Nic Blair, awarded Most Valuable Player for the game, finishing with 20 points and Sam Eley, scoring 16 points, with 4 three-pointers in the second half, capped off a great season. Chris Donaldson also contributed a solid performance with 13 points and was awarded Most Valuable Player for the season.

Tennis

Intercol day was filled with excitement as the boys knuckled down and had a crack at the Saints army. Known for great depth, Saints exposed our lower half of the team and took the day by the throat, winning comfortably 7–2. Special mentions go to Josh Boorman, although losing narrowly, for showing true heart and fight against injury and cramp, and also to Alfie Brown for a hard fought singles victory. All boys did themselves and PAC proud through their efforts and sportsmanship on the day.


A fresh first XI faced Trinity in the season opener and we were caught off guard by a stronger better prepared Trinity team.

In the final game of the minor round of the Cup we faced Pembroke with a win putting us in the semi final. A solid preseason and three rowers and a coxswain returning from last year's First VIII saw the crew come a close second to St Peters at the first full length rowing regatta of the season. We knew that we needed to improve our individual technique as well as our crew rowing, as a technically better opposition out

classed us that day. The next regatta at Murray Bridge saw the crew's fitness and determination prevail over the competition. This win marked the end of a year and a half long drought for the First VIII. During the holiday period, the crew competed at the Renmark Regatta gaining some valuable racing experience as well as attending a short training camp where the crew started to come together as a unit. At the Scotts Creek Camp seat changes were made as all the members of the crew became more refined in their rowing abilities.

At the return of racing the crew lined up for the First grade state championships where there were some senior men's club crews to race. Despite the age difference, we put up a good fight to come a close third to an Adelaide Rowing Club crew as well as an Adelaide University crew. Other highlights in the course of the state regattas were wins in all major schoolboy races including the Cornell Shield for the Port Adelaide Regatta and the Advertiser Shield for School Boy State Championships.

The First VIII took an eleven hour road trip to Nagambie Lakes in Victoria to compete at the national championships. Here we competed in the Under 19 coxless pairs, the Under 19 coxed four and the prestigious School Boy coxed eight. The pair and four races occupied the first part of the week. In the coxless pair, Nick Blanch and myself came second in the final while Ben Noske and David Oetjen finished fifth, and Nick Agrios and Scot Tyndall finished sixth. The Coxed four, comprising Tom Temple as stroke, Jack Sandow three, Alex Ratcliffe two and Jason Cane bow, won the Under 19 final.

Mid week the eight races began, a field of 24 crews had to be reduced to a field of six for the Division A final, As a crew we had decided not to race in the Under 19 Men's VIII and to put all our effort into the more prestigious and highly competitive schoolboy race. The semi final was a hard fought affair, with a poor start and a generally flat race. It was not until the last 500 metres where we were able to row through second place and ensure our spot in the final. This was the best result in history for Prince Alfred College at the nationals, never having been placed in the Division A final in previous years. Lining up for the finals was one of the most nervous times of the rowing season, we were racing crews that we had never raced before and that were

stronger, bigger and more powerful. As a result, we lifted our rowing to new levels fighting for a third placing the whole length of the course. Although being an excellent race and great experience all boys were slightly disappointed to have come fourth and not to have achieved a third placing that was within our sights.

The Head of the River win is the highlight of a fantastic rowing season. Special thanks must go to all the parents involved in the transportation of boats and boys to and from rowing as well as their continued support in fundraising. Daren Potts continued his tireless work with organisation of races, boats, accommodation, coaches, and the general up keep of the club, much thanks must be extended to him from all the rowers, seniors and juniors. Other important people involved in the First VIII program are Vaughn Huddleston the weights trainer whose efforts are often under appreciated and Todd Jones who filled in as a coach when John was unable to attend. Finally thanks must go to John Bolt who took time out of his busy schedule to coach the First VIII this season; he now holds a one from one Head of the River win ratio.

The conclusion of a rowing season is always an eventful and emotional time but a season of such success and good times is different once more. I would like to thank all the rowers that have competed with me this season and who have provided such entertainment and success. I will carry the memories of this season with me as some of the fondest I have of my time at Princes. It is only sweetened even more by the calibre of people I had the privilege of sharing this time with.



Honours colours winners were Will Phillips for Hockey, and Nick Giulianetti for Rowing.


Arts Awards recipients were Tom Robinson and Phil Behrens.

Initiatives And Activities

This year saw further development of the website by Sean Heylen. It has proven to be a wonderful success and the number of people using it is growing and growing. In future all dates of forthcoming events will be posted "live" as will the relevant contact details.



Queen's Birthday Honours


Tony Clarkson (PAC 1951–1955) was made a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) for services to renal medicine and to furthering the speciality of nephrology.


Tennis vs Saints
