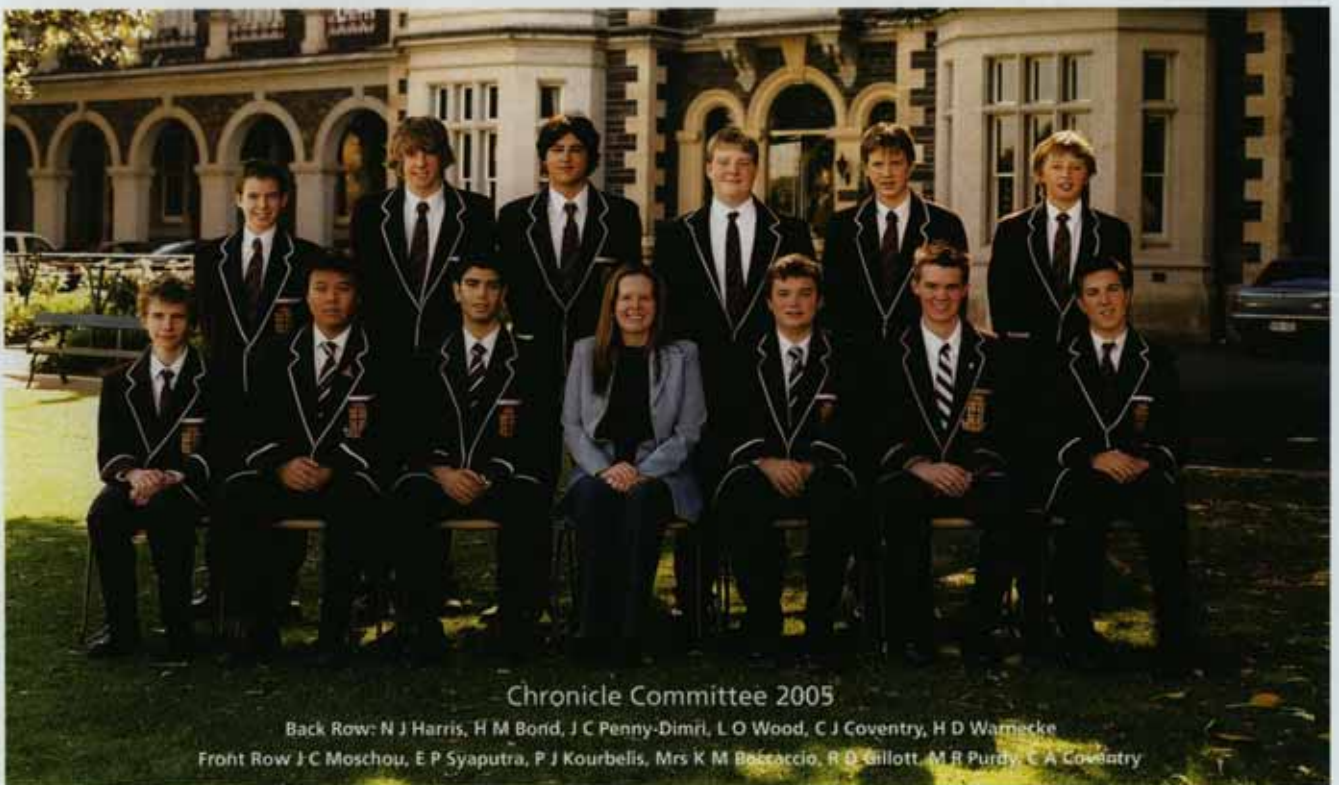

Headmaster's Report 2005

2005 has been an exciting new chapter in the history of Prince Alfred College. The year has seen the beginning of our \$15 million Master Building Plan to upgrade the facilities in the Secondary School and complete the Preparatory School Master Plan. More importantly, the future of the school has been forecast in *New Horizons* — our Strategic Plan for 2005 to 2010 launched on 17th June. The next five years will see considerable building developments and a focus on the four goals of the Strategic Plan in Values and Culture, Teaching and Learning, Leadership and Governance, and Resources and Environment. At the time of writing this report, I have completed my first official year as Headmaster of Prince Alfred College. It has been a richly rewarding and challenging experience and I look to the future with great enthusiasm.

I am indebted to the Prince Alfred College Council led by the Chairman, Mr Bruce Spangler, for their support. Members of Council have a shared vision for the future of the school and I have been pleased to work closely with them during the year. The commitment shown by all Council members is generous and I thank them all most sincerely for their dedication to this wonderful school. I pay tribute to the Rev Margaret Polkinghorne and Mr Ian Dodd who retire as members of Council this year. The retiring Moderator, the Rev Dr Graham Humphris, has been President of the College and has served as an important link between the school and the Uniting Church in Australia, Synod of South Australia.

The Master Plan for capital development will provide the best educational learning environment for our students now and in the future. This year we have seen the completion of the elevated walkway between the Centenary Wing and the Gerard Innovation Centre, and major works on the refurbishment of the Memorial Wing and Stage 2 of the walkway due for completion in February 2006. This 10 classroom facility will be named the Neil Smart Memorial Building and



provide state of the art teaching and learning spaces for English and Humanities, but also for our Middle School boys in Years 8 and 9. The year has also seen planning for the renovation of the Colton Wing to include new spaces for Music, a Common Room for the staff, and accommodation for the Noel Baker Centre for Mathematics and the school's archival collection. The next stage of the Preparatory School Master Plan has been finalised, which will see classrooms for Years 5 and 6, and a computer and general learning space, to be completed in June 2006. All in all, these three projects represent more than \$5 million worth of new buildings and upgraded facilities. These first stages of the Master Plan will provide our teachers and students with a modern campus for a visionary future.

The Strategic Plan is designed to develop Princes as a world class school and to ensure our place at the forefront of boys' education in Australia. The Strategic Plan, developed after a comprehensive consultation exercise, builds on the strengths and successes of our past and projects the school into the future. *New Horizons* has four key goals and 40 initiatives to be implemented over the next five years, which aim to guide the development of the school in educational programs, curriculum development, pastoral care, teacher development, research and community participation. An important consideration of the Strategic Plan was the revision of our Mission and Vision statements. The Mission statement, redefined as our Statement of Purpose, cements the school's commitment to developing boys into men who value integrity, excellence and Christian principles and who will serve their community and the world with confidence and compassion. Our Vision is to build on the school's proud tradition to be a world class school for boys.

The four goals of the Strategic Plan are:

1. To affirm and enhance a culture that upholds Christian values, respects tradition and instils a commitment to service and the global community.
2. To provide a rich learning environment comprising a challenging curriculum and a diverse co-curriculum within a caring environment.
3. To develop and demonstrate leadership at all levels in the school.
4. To provide the best possible human, physical and financial resources to develop as a world class school for boys.

Much has been achieved in 2005 with 11 strategic initiatives identified for priority implementation in 2005 and 2006. The Plan has established a number of guiding principles for implementation designed to ensure that our hopes for the future are well managed, adequately resourced and implemented effectively over the next five years. The launch on 17th June was a wonderful occasion for the school community with the presentation by Year 7 student, Joseph Gugliotta, the best remembered contribution on the night. I am indebted to Ms Jane Jeffreys for her shared leadership with me in the development of the Strategic Plan and to other members of the working party: Mr Chris McGuire, Mrs Pam Martin, Mrs Rosemary Tormay, Mr Simon Miller, and Mr Ian Dodd. The front cover of our Strategic Plan depicts an image of

flight which is symbolic of our plans to respond to the rapidly changing world which our boys will inherit.

The school is blessed with strong and effective governance and leadership. The support of Council has been significant, but I pay tribute to those who work more directly with me on the Executive Management Team. The group began the year with a leadership retreat which saw an examination of leadership styles and the formulation of goals and key performance indicators for the year. A second retreat in August saw the leadership team focus on developing Prince Alfred College as a resilient organisation. The school is managed and administered effectively through the work of Mrs Cynthia May, Head of the Secondary School, Mr Grant Nalder, Head of the Preparatory School, Mr David Stewart, Business Director, Mr Jim Hartnett, Director of Boarding, Mrs Karin Dunsford and also Mr Grant Davis as Director of Development, and the Rev Trevor Klar, our Chaplain. I express my sincere thanks to these dedicated and professional people for their ideas, dedication, commitment and leadership in the best interests of PAC. The work of the Executive Management Team is more than ably supported by my Assistant, Mrs Margaret Gleaves, and I express my sincere thanks to her for her professional and personal support so willingly offered throughout the year.

2005 represented the second year of the new House system for all boys from Kindergarten to Year 12. The four Houses of Cotton, Taylor, Waterhouse and Watsford are now part and parcel of the school's pastoral care structure and sporting programs. There is strong identity within the House groups, best seen at swimming, athletics, and other inter-House events. The Lion, Stallion, Eagle and Wyvern are representative of the values we hold so dearly for the school and the young men in our care.

The year saw some significant changes in the Boarding House with the appointment of a new Director, Mr Jim Hartnett, who joined us with his wife, Sarah and young daughters, Hannah and Ciara in January. Also joining him was Mr Sam Cheesman, his wife Heather and family, who took up the role as Head of Hartley. Our Boarding House

remains a significant component of life at Princes and I have been encouraged by strong enrolments for boarding in the future. I express sincere thanks to Mrs Rosie Brooke who has worked in the Boarding House for the last three years, who will travel overseas next year to enjoy twelve months leave.

The Year 12 students from 2004 received outstanding results, perhaps the best ever. The Dux of the School was shared between Mayooran Namasivayam, who scored five perfect scores of 20 out of 20 for his SACE, and Cameron Duncan who achieved a maximum TER of 99.95 in the International Baccalaureate Diploma. Fifteen Princes students were represented in the top 1% of the State, which was 11% of our student body in 2004. Fifty-six of our boys from last year scored a TER of 90 or higher, meaning that 38% of our students were in the top 10% of the State. These are exceptional results. The boarders also achieved excellent scores in their final examinations. Our academic performance is a reflection of the quality of teaching and care provided by the staff, who are dedicated to this school and their profession. I cannot thank them enough!

The Primary Years Program for boys in Years K to 5 has proven to be an outstanding curriculum for primary education. Similarly, boys in Years 10 to 12 enjoy a challenging and rigorous curriculum, either the South Australian Certificate of Education or the International Baccalaureate Diploma. A pre-SACE and IB course, implemented

in Year 10 this year, has seen a marked improvement in our Year 10 curriculum and allowed the boys to be better prepared for senior studies.

A major curriculum focus in 2005 has been to establish an effective Middle Years Program which is a key initiative of the Strategic Plan. Mr Ken Watson, Deputy Head of the Secondary School, has played an important role in the development of curriculum and programs best suited to our boys in Years 6 to 9. New programs for middle schooling will begin to be introduced in 2006.

The 2005 Gerard Innovation Lecture was delivered by Mr Greg Siegele, co-founder of Ratbag Productions. Greg is a former scholar of the school who has established one of the world's most successful electronic game companies. Greg's presentation was very inspiring and well received by our students, staff and parents. It was a fine example of the talent and success on the international stage, of which all our students are capable.

The school has been very ably led by School Captain, Samuel Will, Vice-Captain, Anthony Antoniadis, Prefects and House Captains during 2005. There has been clear evidence of progressive and responsible leadership within the student body. The *Red and White*, organised by a student committee, was once again a magnificent event enjoyed by boys and their partners and staff. Student leadership has been evident at all levels within the school, and I also acknowledge the contribution of Edward Young and Tom Fitzgerald

who have served as leaders in the Preparatory School this year.

The annual Intercollegiate sporting matches have seen our teams and individual sportsmen perform at a very high level in all contests. The pre-season lunches with the Prefects and Sports Captains from St Peter's College have strengthened the friendly rivalry and healthy competition between the two schools.

The Swimming team was victorious in winning the ISSA competition and defeating Saints to win the intercol. The efforts of Mr Mark Shepherd as swimming coach are much appreciated, as is the support role of Mr Graham Baird and Ms Evie Morelli. The Badminton team recorded a 9-0 win over St Peter's College which reflects not only the talent of the boys, but the work of Captain Chong Tsang, and coaches Mr Ryan Manuel and Mr Jurgen Kracht. The Tennis team managed to win this year's event after 14 years of losing to Saints. This was a wonderful result for the school with the trophy accepted gracefully and with honour by Captain Alfie Brown.

In Rowing, Princes continued to be the premier school, however did not perform as expected in the annual Head of the River event despite the excellent coaching by Mr Andrew Butler. All rowers performed well under the leadership of Mr Daren Potts as Director of Rowing, and with the support of Mr Vaughn Huddleston. Mr Geoff Lucas, as President of the Rowing Parents Support Group, has led the group of dedicated parents who have continued to make an enormous contribution to this sport.

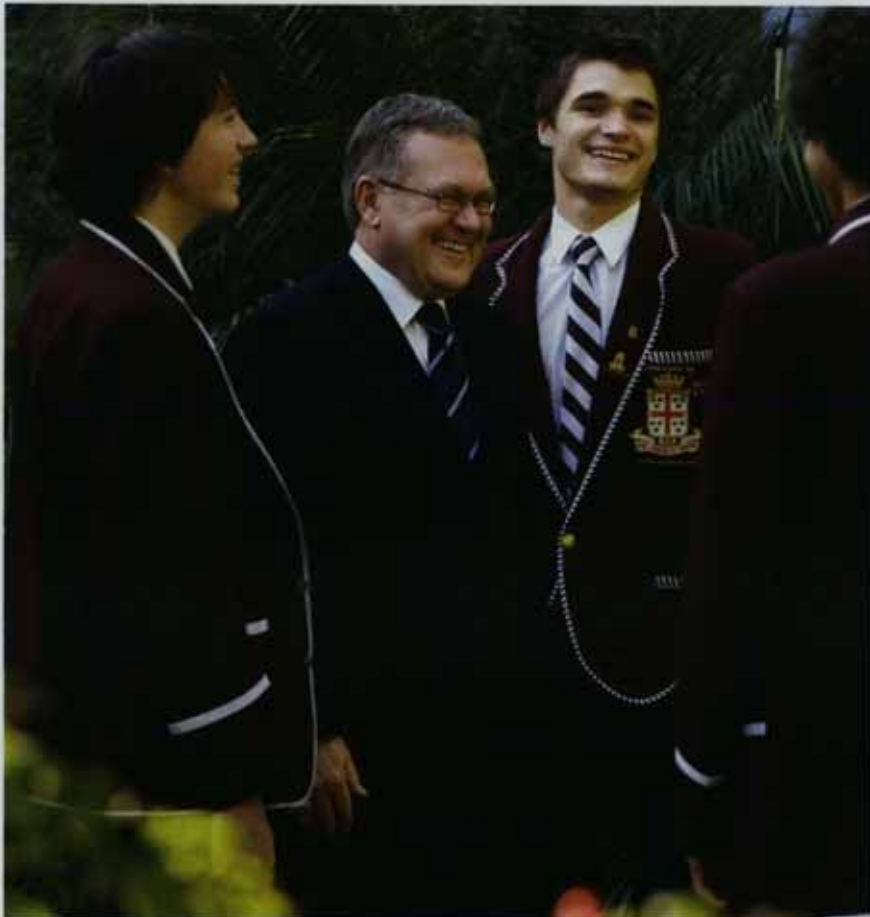
The annual Intercollegiate Cricket match saw outstanding performances from both schools. Captained by Tom Moffat, the PAC team declared at 9/462 in the first innings which was the highest score in an Intercol for 50 years. St Peter's were dismissed for 170 runs and followed on to score 375 leaving PAC 84 runs for victory. The game ended in a nail-biting draw.

The senior cricketers also enjoyed a successful tour of the United Kingdom led by Mr Peter Williams and Mr Peter Karamoshos. The boys played against Felsted and Colchester Schools, Essex, King Edward's School, Birmingham, Tonbridge School, Kent and in Penang on their return home. A trip to Paris was a highlight of their journey overseas.

The winter season saw outstanding sporting contests in Rugby Union, Soccer, Hockey, Basketball and Football. Rugby Union provided a stern test and despite PAC scoring first, Saints dominated the match to win by 48 to 8. The Soccer match featured a magnificent goal by Captain Elias Vlassis but Saints took the lead to win by 2-1. The Hockey match was an exceptional display which saw Princes leading by 3-1 in the second half, but Saints dominated play in the latter part of the match, culminating in a memorable 3-all draw. The Basketball match is always one of our most exciting Intercol events and saw a closely contested first half. However, PAC went down to a better team by 14 points.

The Football match proved to be one of the most exciting for many years. Coming from six goals behind at half-time, then to be in front and lose by four points on the siren made for a sensational match. Our team was absolutely magnificent and showed the spirit of Princes Men at its best. The final score was PAC 14.8 to SPSC 14.12. The Captaincy of Tom Riggs was outstanding and I express my deepest thanks to our new coach, Mr Gary Jenkinson. The annual Intercol Debating contest saw PAC lose to St Peter's, with a similar result in the annual Chess competition.

This year's musical, *Godspell*, co-performed with Seymour College and directed by Mr Peter Hopkins, was a spectacular performance with a full house for each of the three performances. The musical was well supported by our Music Department and by staff working in the Art, Technology and Maintenance areas. The show made a special tribute to Timothy McWaters who was tragically killed in a car accident just weeks before the performance. Tim was a young man who showed us much about life and how to live it. He also showed us how to rejoice in our faith. Tim was the loved and precious son of Kym (Old Scholar) and Sharon McWaters from Minlaton on the Yorke Peninsula. Tim was also a talented artist and outstanding athlete and nationally ranked in pole vaulting. His life was honoured at a memorial service at Wesley Kent Town Church and the new garden at the back of Fiddian Wing has been dedicated in his name.

During the April school holidays, 27 boys joined with girls from Wilderness School for a Chinese Language and Culture tour of China. This highly successful tour was led by the Head of Languages, Mr Jurgen Kracht, with support from Mrs Danying Liu, Ms Mani White, Mr Malcolm Dawe and Mr Anthony Harradine. The group also visited our partner schools in Jinan and Shanghai. In May we were pleased to welcome five teachers from Da Tong High School, our sister school in Shanghai, who visited to investigate our boarding programs and to further the close friendship with Prince Alfred College.

In July, Prince Alfred College hosted the Global Youth Institute Conference which saw 30 young people from around the world gather to explore global issues and to enjoy our Adelaide experience. Five boys from PAC joined the group, which was organised by former Chaplain, the Rev Dr Adrian Brown. Matthew Purdy, who attended the 2004 conference in the United States, played a leading role in the planning and execution of this significant international conference.

Mr Chris McGuire was successful in an application for funding to the National Innovation Awareness Strategy for a pilot student competition called School Entrepreneur of the Year which involved Independent, Catholic and Government schools in South Australia. The final judging of the competition was held at Prince Alfred College and attended by the Federal Minister for Industry, Tourism and Resources, the Hon Ian McFarlane. The project will be expanded into Victoria in 2006.

In so many ways it has been a wonderful year for Prince Alfred College. Our students have achieved at the highest levels in their academic studies, music, sport and other cultural pursuits. The school's Band Program, led by Mr Andrew Newhouse, has seen outstanding performances and recognition at State level competitions. The Big Band Bash was a fantastic night, and the Chapel Choir continues to perform magnificently under the direction of Mr Robert Dawe.

The number of Effort Awards presented each term has remained high,



which is indicative of our boys' attitude to school and their commitment to study.

Year 10 boys enjoyed the annual Peak Adventure program in a range of outdoor pursuits including white-water rafting and mountain climbing. The Year 11 Work Experience program continues to be an important exercise in Career Education. The Year 11 boys also enjoyed a Retreat held at the Adare Campsite at Victor Harbor, which included an exploration of their physical, spiritual, social and emotional development.

This year has seen some significant changes in the composition of staff and administration of the school. At the end of Term One we farewelled our Youth Minister, Mr Peter Riggs. Peter's work at Princes was unique and long-lasting. Mrs Karin Dunsford, Director of Development since 1998, left the school to take up a similar position at Walford. On behalf of the school community, I express my sincere thanks to Karin for her exemplary work in fundraising and friendraising at Princes. A number of staff will leave the school at the end of the year including Ms Karine Aurelien, Mr Grant Cammiss, Mrs Julie Wright, Mr Michael Cowie, Ms Sarah Richards, Mr Michael Vickery, Mr William Sweeney and Mr Ellis Harris, and our sincere thanks go to them all. A number of staff will take leave in 2005 and 2006 including Mrs Kate Boccaccio, Ms Rosie Brooke, Mrs Jenny Chapman, Ms Marilyn Hunt, Mr Anthony Izzo, Ms Rachel Merritt, Mrs Sandra Reynolds, and Mr Bert Schafranek and our best wishes go with them as they enjoy maternity, long service and other leave.

The school community comprising

students, staff, parents and old scholars makes an enormous contribution to this school. The PAC Foundation, under the Presidency of Mr Harry Perks, has committed to support the Master Plan by raising \$3.7 million. The Businessmen's Lunches are but one example of the Foundation's immeasurable support for the school. The Prince Alfred Old Collegians Association, led by Mr Peter Brooks in 2005, allows all of our old scholars to remain active in the school community. The Annual Dinner in July saw more than 530 men gather to celebrate their unique friendship, and 265 Vintage Reds returned to the school in October to celebrate their long association with Princes. Annual old scholar dinners were held in every capital city, all regional centres of South Australia and in London. Sincere thanks are extended to the old scholars for their generous support of the Master Plan fundraising drive.

The school is grateful for the generous support of the Parents & Friends' Associations chaired by Mrs Gerry Stevens, and Dr Janet Young and Dr Suzie Clarnette. The P&F support of Prince Alfred College is generous and beyond expectations.

2005 has been a wonderful year and we look forward to hearing of the success of our Year 12 graduates in December and January once the SACE and IB results are released. More importantly, we look forward to an exciting future including new programs and experiences for boys, and exceptional facilities for their learning.

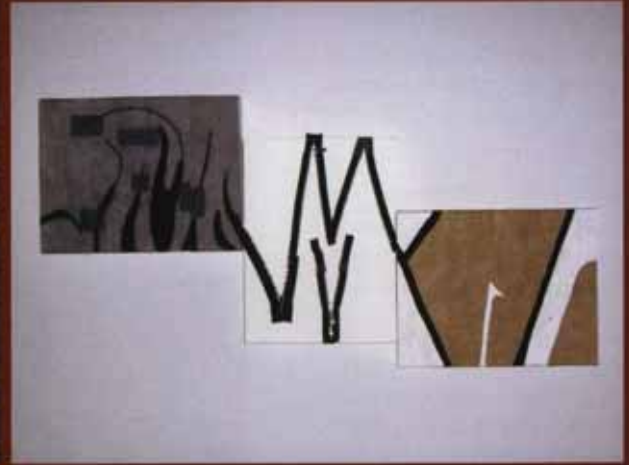

In week 5 of Term 2 the Inter-house Cross-Country Carnival was held. Cotton were victorious for this event and James House and Matt Gillespie,



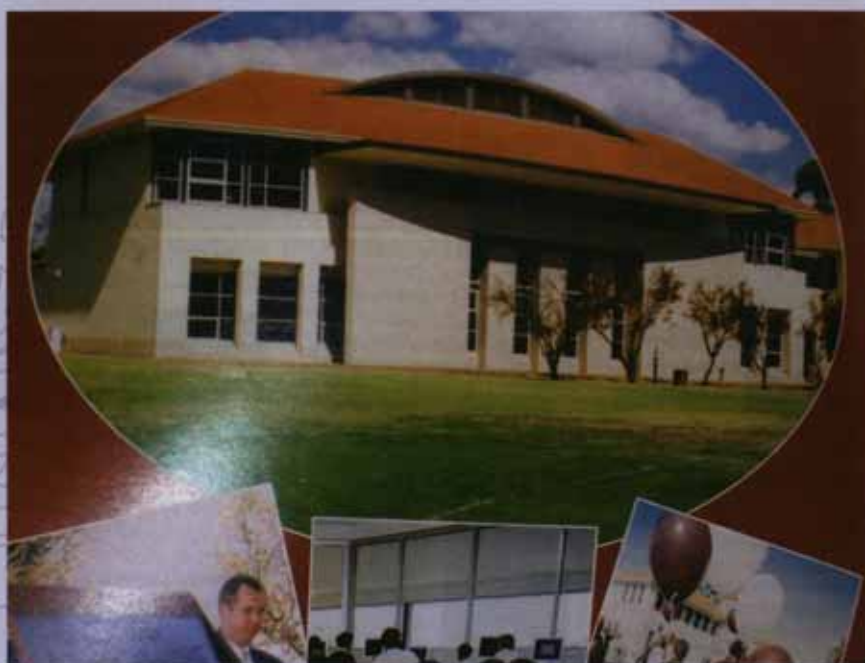

Little Princes

We began the year by investigating who we are and how we belong to our community through our Unit of Inquiry, "We Are One, We Are Many". The students began by identifying special things that made them the same and different to others. We made collage faces, drew self portraits, took photos of us engaged in activities, painted pictures of ourselves and began to make a record of our descriptions. We discovered that there were lots of things about us that were the same. As well as buildings, students created guitars, cricket bats, planes and boats, just to name a few! Students were keen to work with each other to create structures with the indoor big blocks, protecting themselves using dress up hard hats. Pirie room students also went for walks around the school observing the differences in how buildings look and started to record what they had seen.

In Term Three we investigated animals in our unit of inquiry, "Animals are Everywhere". We began by making lists of animals we knew and talked about what made them animals. We took time to refine our definition. "Animals have to eat things" said Jason, "And animals grow and get mummies" said Charlie, "Animals have families too" said Andrew, "and they can move" said Luke B. We took a trip together to the Adelaide Zoo and this certainly encouraged much discussion about animals, how they



live and what their role is. Students used this inspiration creatively and the students from the Pirie Room created a wonderful gallery of black and white line drawings of their favourite animals. The students from the Flinders Room created 3D likenesses of their favourite animals including a life size baby giraffe that students measured to ensure it was 2 meters tall. At the end of the term we travelled to the Animal Barn in the Onkaparinga Hills to find out more about farm animals.

In Term Four we learned about different kinds of food during our Unit of Inquiry "Food For The Imagination" and prepared for our Christmas Nativity. We enjoyed performing in front of our parents and friends.

We had a wonderful year filled with fun, excitement, discovery and creativity.

Another Term One unit was "We are Family". Boys

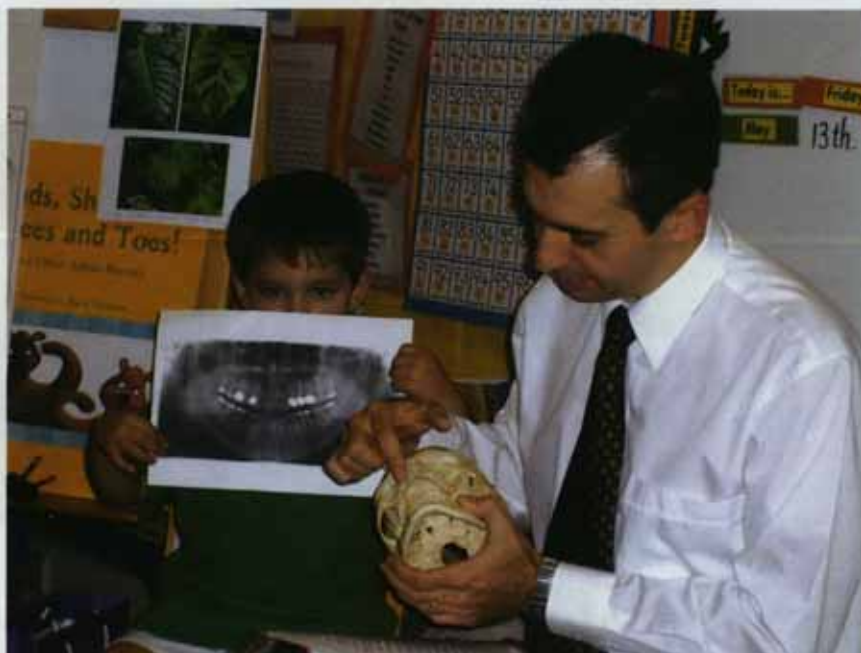

sharing and observation was a highlight, especially as the snails crawled all over the boys' desks. Buddies helped design and construct garden models. Broad beans and cress seeds were grown as Science experiments. The boys enjoyed tasting the grown cress on bread and one boy's comment was "it tasted better than chocolate!"

In Term Four we studied "Who are the People in my Neighbourhood". The boys became familiar with their community and people who help us. Our visit to the Fire Station was fascinating and very exciting.

We all made paper curls to show Dolly's wool. We learnt how important it is to communicate with each other, to wait your turn and to listen and compromise.



Living Things

In Term 3, one of our PYP units was about Living Things. With Mrs Gilchrist, our Librarian, we looked at the features of non-fiction books and how to use them to help with an inquiry. We chose an animal to investigate.

Tell me a Story

During Term Three our PYP Unit was called Tell me a Story. We began by bringing our teddies to school for a Teddy Bears Picnic. Our Teddies enjoyed sharing our fruit and Tiny Teddy biscuits. We drew detailed pictures about our bears and wrote character profiles to describe what each bear is like.

Each of us wrote a story about our bear. We used the framework of a narrative and had to think of an interesting problem and solution for our bear. This story was then published by Parker Press or Brooks Books into a special first edition hard cover book. We designed the front cover and made interesting endpapers to include in our books.

Year One Book Launch

To celebrate the publishing of our special books we held a book launch on Thursday the 1st of September. We invited our parents and grandparents to school so that they could share our special books with us. Mr Andary and Mr Nalder presented us with certificates to acknowledge our work. As part of our book launch we worked together to present a chapel service about stories from the Bible. All boys shared art work. We sang songs and even acted out one of the stories called The Lost Coin. It was great to share our work with our family and friends.



Years 2 and 3

Throughout the year we have enjoyed our learning journey. We began with a PYP unit called 'Good as Gold'. This was a literature based unit focusing on fables and parables. The boys explored the genre of stories with messages through a variety of activities culminating in producing their own fables. Our next unit coincided with the Clipsal 500 Race. We were excited by a visit from Gary Baxter and his Holden Ute Racing Car. This provided the momentum for the boys to design, make and appraise their own cars which were raced in our PAC 500 Car Race.

Our term 2 focus was related to our health and well-being. At the beginning of the term the boys commenced a regular fitness run three times a week. 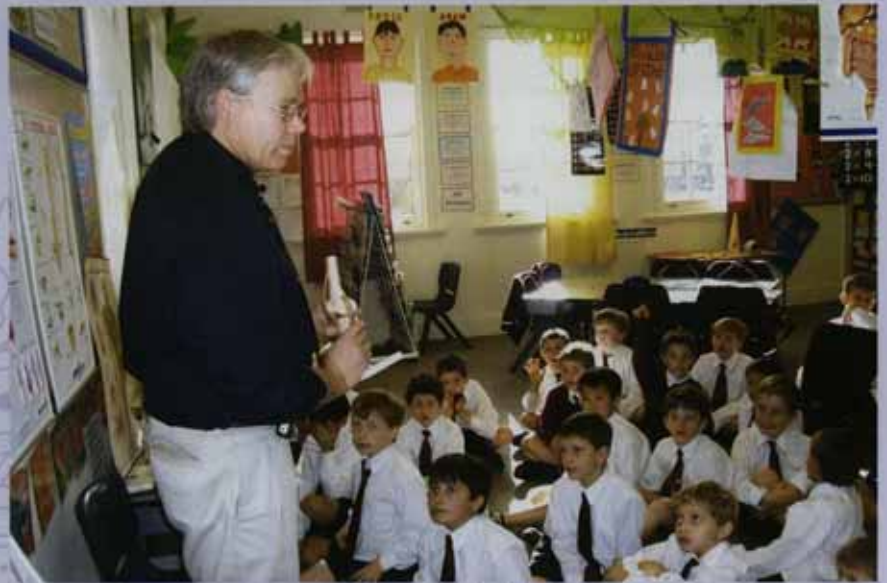

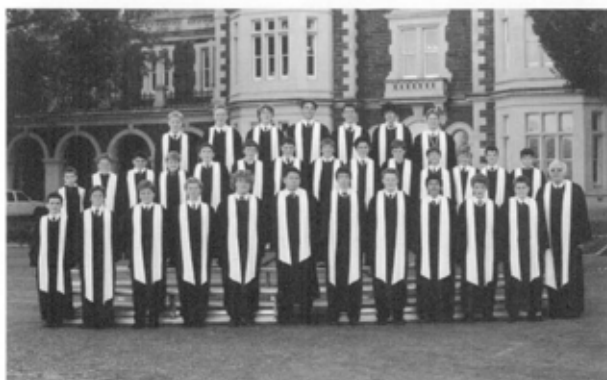

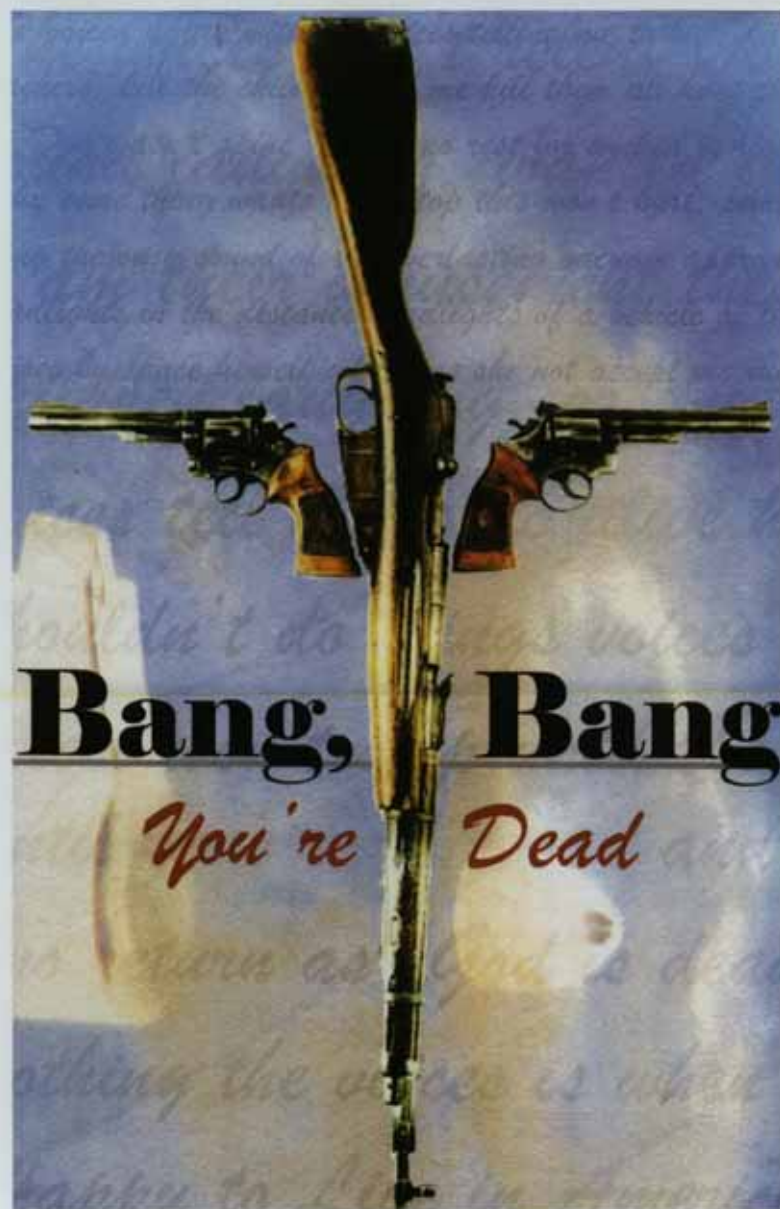
Bang Bang You're Dead

"At last!" the audience gasped as the curtain rose on the long-anticipated return to the stage of Princes artiste-résident Michael Steer, director of this year's senior drama production. His realisation of Mastro Simone's *Bang Bang You're Dead* was sharp, disconcerting, even uncomfortable. The audience shifted awkwardly in their Prince Phillip seats as the typically placid theatre reverberated with the cries of unjust youthful deaths, forcing us to contemplate unspoken possibilities within the halls of our own school.

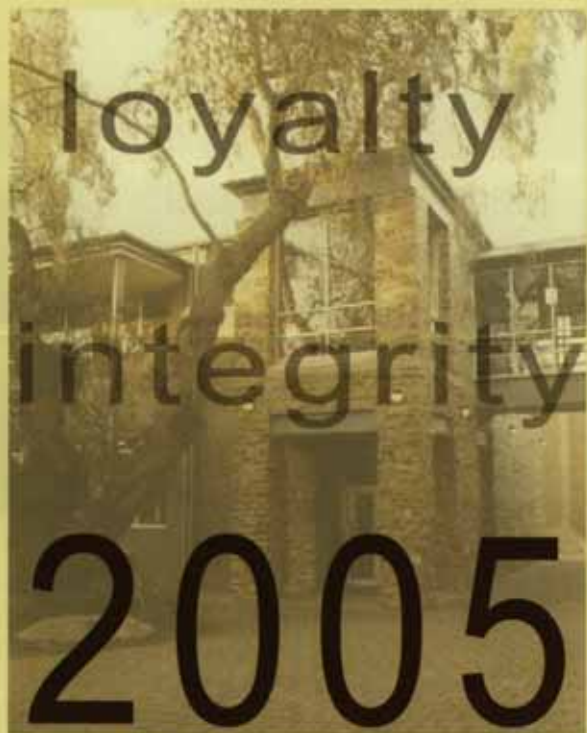
The central character, Josh, was ably portrayed by another neophyte thespian, Eric Parsonage. The villainous protagonist struggled throughout the intense hour to suppress the unspeakable contradictions inherent in what he had done and in the fact that he was still alive while his fellow students rotted and their families grieved. The script had little sympathy for this character who represents one of the most traumatic figures in the American psyche: the familiar classmate, football player and boyfriend turned assassin. The audience was left to consider whether his crimes could be explained away by psychiatric illness, or whether they were to some degree an inevitable product of a fragmented, individualistic society.

Other lead roles were filled by old hands: the highly focussed Hamish King and Nick Harris, who appears to have been permanently type-cast by PAC directors as the runt who can never quite keep up.

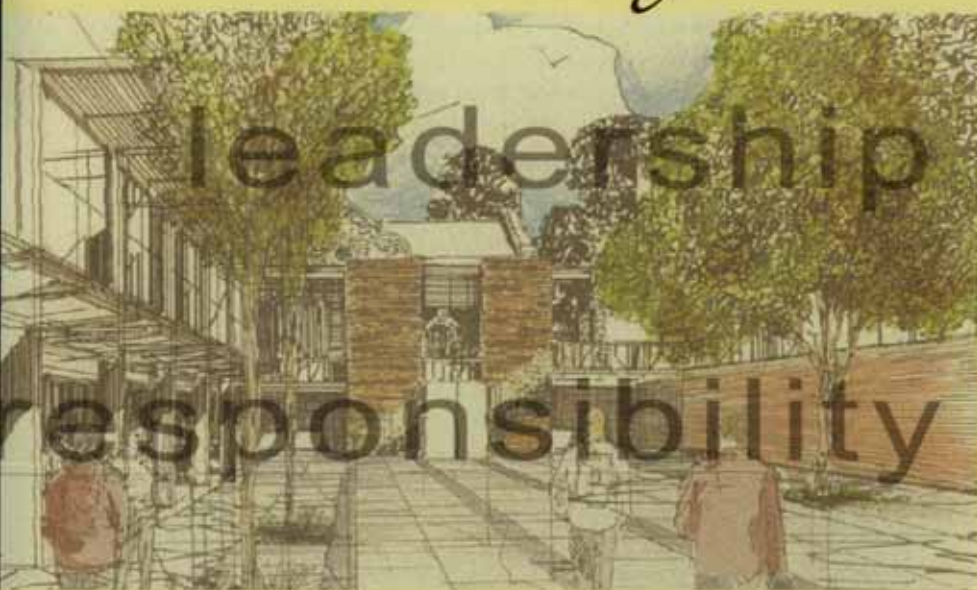

Mr Craig Bowyer, Mr Chris Jordison, Mr Jurgen Kracht and Mrs Sandra Reynolds will all take long service leave in 2006 and we wish them well in this experience.

Mrs Viv Jenson steps down as Head of Cotton (and previously Delbridge) at the end of 2005. There is little doubt that she has shaped the lives of many boys over the years and that we will miss her absolute commitment to the boys in her care. Similarly Mr Peter Williams steps down as Director of Co-curriculum. Peter has ensured that our participation in all things beyond the classroom is broad, of excellent quality and that the school is represented impeccably in this area. We thank both Viv and Peter for their service and are pleased that they are not leaving, but will continue to contribute to other areas within the school.

There are several highlights to the year which require chronicling. For this year's Gerard Corporation Innovation Lecture old Scholar Greg Seigle spoke of his establishment of a computer gaming company and demonstrated some of the software Ratbag produces. This captured the imagination of the boys who were able to identify with his energy and skills.

The entrepreneur challenge continued this year under the guidance of Mr Chris McGuire. The Challenge extended to other schools this year and some exciting projects were developed to raise funds for the next trust.

The Father Son Dinner, addressed by Mr Greg Perks at the Norwood Town Hall, was a most enjoyable evening. A number of parents travelled quite a distance to join their sons. Some grandfathers and close family friends also attended to hear Greg speak of his climbing expeditions with his children as teenagers. Perhaps there will be some parallelling of experiences in holiday planning as a result of Greg's presentation.

As always, many boys were awarded academic certificates for their part in national competitions and it is a wonderful balance to see them also participating in a range of other activities: sport, debating, chess, music amongst others. The Musical Godspell and the drama production, Bang Bang You're Dead, were quite different performances but I hope they herald the arrival of a new period of excitement for the Arts here at Princes. The formation of the PAC Musical Theatre Company, whose membership encompasses schools other than our own, has certainly opened up the possibilities for dramatic performance.

Head of the Secondary School

Sam Will executed his duties as Captain of School with increasing aplomb during the year. Supported by Anthony Antoniadis, the team were utterly reliable and supported the school in every sense. Their team of prefects achieved an interesting range of goals for the year and have set some challenges for the 2005 team, already at work.

What I want most to see develop in the boys, is independence and a sense of personal responsibility and commitment to those who do not have their opportunities. 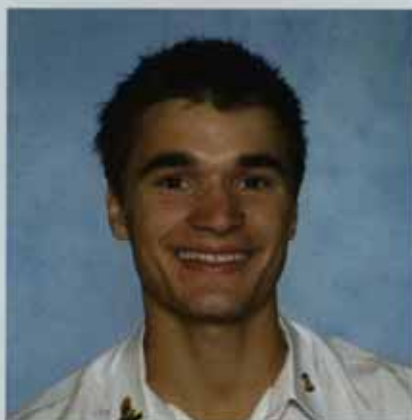

Achieving Excellence

Our boys achieved quite outstanding results in the 2004 Year 12 examinations, both in the International Baccalaureate Diploma (IB) and the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) examinations.

The quality of the results is evident when we note that our previous record number of merit scores was 63, achieved in 2001. This year, there were 51 merit scores, comprising 28 for our 27 IB Diploma students and 23 for our 108 full SACE boys. Moreover, one of our students, Mayoora Namasivayam, achieved the perfect SACE score of 5 merits and another, Cameron Duncan, achieved the near perfect IB score of 44.

Perfect TERs of 99.95% were obtained by 5 PAC students. As well as the joint winners of the Dux of the school, Cameron Duncan and Mayoora Namasivayam, TERs of 99.95% were also achieved by Chris Davies, Peter Ghabriel, and Daniel Toh. In addition, Leigh Warren, Ge Li, Michael Dodd, Lanil Lecamwasam, James Finnie, Cameron White from the IB and Ben Stewart, Alex Dorsch, Jonathon Nguyen and Philip Selby from the SACE, achieved outstanding results that placed them in the top 1% of the state. Pleasingly, this year two bilingual IB Diplomas were awarded. Fifty-six boys or 38% achieved results that placed them in the top 10% of candidates across the state.

Year 11 IB Merit Winners

Many Prince Alfred College students have again demonstrated academic excellence through their performances in external competitions, across a range of learning areas. Congratulations must go to Chas Coventry of Year 11 whose manuscript "Blood Red Sky" was shortlisted in the Somerset/Penguin National Novella Writing Competition. The judges commended Chas on his "mature piece of writing" that "skilfully creates suspense and emotional engagement". We thank David Mattingley, a PAC staff member from 1954-1987 and former RAF bomber pilot in World War II, who kindly allowed Chas to interview him as research for his writing. Year 10 student Lewis Graham (10 Taylor) had a moment of fame in July when his review of a new adolescent novel appeared in *The Advertiser*. Joseph Moore, Anthony Noor, Michael Roberts, Jerome Squires and Alistair Young, all won Certificates of Achievement in *The Advertiser*/SAETA Young Writers' Award for 2005.

Princes students again excelled in the South Australian Mathematics Competition in March of this year. The achievements of 14 boys, in particular, were identified through the awarding of Certificates of Merit. In the Senior Division, comprising Years 11 and 12, the award recipients were Stephen Riddell and Sven Paschberg (High Distinctions), Peter Avina (Distinction), Bo Zhu, Tong Guan, Edward Easling, Andrew Moschou and James Picone (Credits). In the Intermediate Division, comprising Years 9 and 10, the award recipients were: Will Gray (Outright Third in SA), Christopher Harry (Outright Ninth in SA), Glynn Rice (High Distinction), Andrew Pederick (Distinction) and William Young (Credit). These boys, and all others who undertook this demanding competition, deserve our congratulations. An invitation was extended to Stephen Riddell in Year 11 to compete in the Australian Mathematics Olympiad. This invitation is extended to 70 Year 11 students nationwide each year.

In August Prince Alfred College was one of the schools that hosted the MASA Quiz Night. In the Junior Division (Years 8, 9 and 10) our team comprising Simon Xie, Chris Harry, Robin Curran and Vincent Cheung took out 1st Prize, winning the Best Overall category. In the Senior Division (Years 11 and 12) our team comprising Stephen Riddell, Bo Zhu, James Moschou and Heng Tseng Hui won a very closely contested Mathematics category, narrowly beating a team from Pembroke, our traditional rivals in this event. Proving that maths wasn't our only strength, our team comprising Mahesh Umaphathysivam, Jahan Penni-Dimri, David Hanin and Eric Parsonage comfortably won the General Knowledge category of the Senior Division.

In August, 353 Princes students making up of the vast majority of students in Years 7 to 10 and many Year 11 and 12 students, competed in the Australian Mathematics Competition for the Westpac Awards. As in the past, a large number of our students achieved excellent results. Students who were placed in the top 1% of their year level received High Distinctions. These students were Zack Jackman, Jonathan Foo, Terry Moschou, Angus McLaren, Glynn Rice, Andrew Pederick, Chao (Simon) Xie, Adam Collins and Bo Zhu.

In addition to these results, seven boys from Year 7 received High Distinctions or Prizes. In total, nearly 5% of our entrants were placed in the top 1% of their year level, a truly phenomenal statistic. For the third year running, Princes is very proud to have an AMC medal winner within its ranks. In 2003 an AMC medal was won by Ge Li, in 2004 a medal was won by Glynn Rice and this year an AMC medal has been awarded to Will Gray.

Davor Pavlin-Premrl in Year 11 was chosen as one of the twelve finalists to participate in the 2005 inaugural Australia — China Council National Chinese Speaking Competition. He was one of the two winners of the state competition. Davor travelled to Sydney on 8 July for the national competition.

James Picone of Year 12 won the State Final of the "Plain English Speaking Ward".

Early in the year all students from Years 8 to 10 and a small number of Year 11 & 12 students took part in the Australasian Schools Science competition. 3% of PAC students were in the top 1% of the state; 24% of PAC students were in the top 11%; 51% of PAC students were in the top 31%. A total of 11 students received a High Distinction; 76 students received a Distinction and 98 students received a Credit. Students with High Distinctions that placed them in the top 1% of the state were: Year 8 Andrew Dibden and Angus McLaren; Year 9 Harry Crawford, Andrew Pederick, Glynn Rice, Will Young; Year 10 Chris Harry; Year 11 Tseng Hui Heng and James Moschou; Year 12 Oliver Burgess and James Picone. James & Tseng Hui deserve further recognition, as their score was equal top of the state for their year group.

Again, earlier in the year, Year 11 students sat the National Qualifying Exam towards the various Science Olympiads to be held next year. Alex Harms won the Gold Award for Top of the State, and Hamish King the Silver Award. They were placed in the top 20 in Australia and move to the next stage of selection for the final Olympiad team to compete in Argentina next July.

The Australian Institute of Physics,

as part of Science Week, runs a Super Science Quiz. Teams of six students compete in a quiz night format with rounds based on science questions. PAC took the trophy for the first time in the history of the competition. Congratulations to Anton Steketeec, Andrew Moschou, Andrew Brook, Sanjay Schrapel, James Picone and Chong Tsang.

Congratulations to George Evans, Sanjay Schrapel and Anton Steketeec for winning a place to compete in the RH Morrison Student Science Journalism Awards. George Evans won the right to read his entry on Robyn Williams' Radio National (AM 729) program in August. In addition Anton and Sanjay were interviewed on Carol Whitlock's program on ABC Radio 891. Ultimately, Sanjay Schrapel was placed first in the RH Morrison Science Journalism Awards and George Evans was placed second. Sanjay Schrapel from Year 12 enjoyed success with the publication of his article in the Australasian Science Journal. His article, "The Rebirth of the Multi-Function Polis" is a real tribute to his interest and achievement in Science.

Once again, Prince Alfred College students took part in the Oliphant Science Awards. The awards are organised by the South Australian Science Teachers Association for all students from Grade 2 to Year 12 in South Australia. Categories range from experiments, models and essays to inventions, games, web pages and posters to name but a few. Congratulations to Ben Neale, winner of the Year 10-12 Poster category, and Stephen Riddell, runner up in the Year 10-12 Multimedia category. Stephen Elley, Alex Gatley and Simon Dickson were highly commended for their entries. Prince Alfred College was also runner up for the DSTO Secondary Schools Prize for the most successful school in the Year 11-12 category.

This year saw another successful year for Chemistry students at Prince Alfred College who participated in the Royal Australian Chemical Institute (RACI) Quiz. Over 140,000 students from the Asia/Pacific region participated in the Quiz. A number of students deserve special mention as they achieved excellent results and received certificates of High Distinction (top 10% of the state). These students were: Daniel Kerrigan and Christopher Harry Year 10; Bryn Crawford Year 11; Oliver

Burgess, Anthony Noor, Sven Paschburg and James Picone Year 12. Stephen Riddell Year 11 and George Evans Year 12 received Awards of Excellence and were awarded plaques. These two students achieved scores that placed them in the top 0.7% of all participants in the competition.

Ike Kutlaca, Luke Montaniero, Jahan Penny-Dimri and Stephen Squires of Year 11 represented PAC in August in a mock United Nations Security Council competition for the Boutros Ghali Shield. The boys represented a range of countries, arguing for or against different resolutions, and negotiating with other countries to achieve their ends. The President's Award for best all round participant was awarded to Steven Squires and the best speaker award went to Ike Kutlaca.

Ben Pearce of Year 8 was PAC's Entrepreneur of the Year and overall Runner-Up At the School Entrepreneur of the Year presentations, including breakfast with David Bussau from Opportunity International (our Gerard Innovation Lecture presenter in 2004).

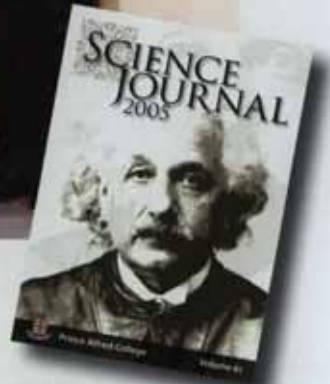
Students at Prince Alfred College demonstrated high-level skills when they participated in the recent Australasian School Computer Studies Competition. Students whose achievement was outstanding were rewarded with Certificates of Credit, Distinction and High Distinction. Students had to solve problems involving navigation on the internet, producing web pages, word processing, using spreadsheets and databases, operating a computer, programming, cabling and networks, dealing with viruses and graphics. This year, over 124,000 students from Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific region participated in this competition. All students from Years 8 to 10 and selected students from Years 11 and 12 participated. Nearly 40% of those who entered were placed in the top 20% of the state. Of particular note was Jacob Kendall (8FLO) who received the highest score in the State. He was awarded a medal in addition to his certificate to acknowledge his achievement.

International Students

Our fiftyone international students come from a variety of backgrounds — China, Korea, Thailand, Malaysia, Indonesia and Hong Kong — and are to be found in the primary years through to Year 12.

Spain Tour January 2005

It goes without saying spending time immersed in a culture surrounded by native speakers has immeasurable benefit for language students.

A combined group of Princes, Pembroke and Walford students who all learn Spanish under the International Baccalaureate program with Mrs Carmen De Miguel embarked on a most successful inaugural Study Tour to Spain in January this year. Accompanied by Mrs Carmen De Miguel, the Director of Studies, Mr Andrew Buxton and a Pembroke staff member, Mrs Sally Attrill, the students enjoyed four weeks of intensive language study and sightseeing.

Short stops in Singapore and Frankfurt were followed by almost three weeks in the student-oriented university city of Granada in Spain's south.

Students attended morning lessons in Spanish in a Spanish language school located in the centre of one of Spain's most picturesque and agreeable university towns, Granada, in Andalusia, southern Spain. Lessons were held everyday for three weeks as part of this intensive language course. They had four lessons daily with a break for recess. The lessons were all in Spanish, of course, and the students enjoyed the mentor style teachers. The language and cultural experiences were enhanced by home-stay accommodation where students were challenged to improve their skills in real life situations.

Days were very long in Granada, despite being winter. After lessons, there were still more than two hours before a late lunch to go shopping or to catch up with emails at school or from the Internet places nearby. After a lunch at home and maybe a siesta, we were ready for the afternoon-evening activities before dinner at around 9 or 10 pm, so there was plenty of time to have a taste of lively Granada's evening street life. A popular option was to go shopping at "El Corte Inglés", a big department store, open until 10 pm every day of the week.

Granada is a very beautiful small town and students quickly became accustomed to finding their way around. They formed their groups of friends and it was very nice to see how well they got along with students from different schools.

Afternoon and evening excursions proved quite popular with something for all tastes. These included the Festival



Parade of Día de Reyes (Day of the Kings, Spain's biggest national holiday), horse riding in the foothills of the Sierra Nevada, visits to a school, the theatre for a Flamenco festival, the Arab Baths, El Abacin (Arab district), and the majestic Alhambra, as well as lectures on Islam in Spain and Federico Garcia Lorca, Spain's much heralded revolutionary poet. Amongst all of the very good memories of this trip, without doubt one of the warmest would be the visit in Granada to the Arab baths with massage included and a tea in the "teteria" afterwards one cold winter evening. Of course, visiting the monuments and museums was a must.

Weekend trips saw us visit the whitewashed mountain villages in the Alpujarras, the snows of the Sierra Nevada, the Mediterranean coast at Almunecar and Cordoba and its huge Mosque and Cathedral. There were also the extremely impressive limestone caves of Nerja.

The final days were spent in Madrid sightseeing, visiting numerous galleries and putting into more practice the language skills learnt over the past three weeks. We visited all the big art galleries in Madrid (Prado, Reina Sofia and Thyssen) together with the Royal Palace. Most students revelled in the opportunity to experience so much art.

While in Granada, we visited a local High School and had a friendly soccer match against them (they won). In Madrid, we went to the magnificent Santiago Bernabeu Soccer stadium to watch Real Madrid playing (they won).

The Spanish experience was full of challenges and excitement. For a great number of students there were many "firsts": first time on a plane, first time overseas, first time away from home, independent living, even perhaps for some, the first time cooking!!?

We were warmly welcomed as the first Australian delegation by the authorities in the Department of Education in Granada. The students did their best to follow with interest a talk presented on Don Quixote and Cervantes, although their language level probably prevented them from understanding most of it. In any case, it was a very nice gesture by the Education Department.

The Princes' students were model ambassadors for their families, their school and Australia. Their language skills have been significantly boosted by their experiences. As a consequence, discussions have already begun for a possible return visit in 2007.

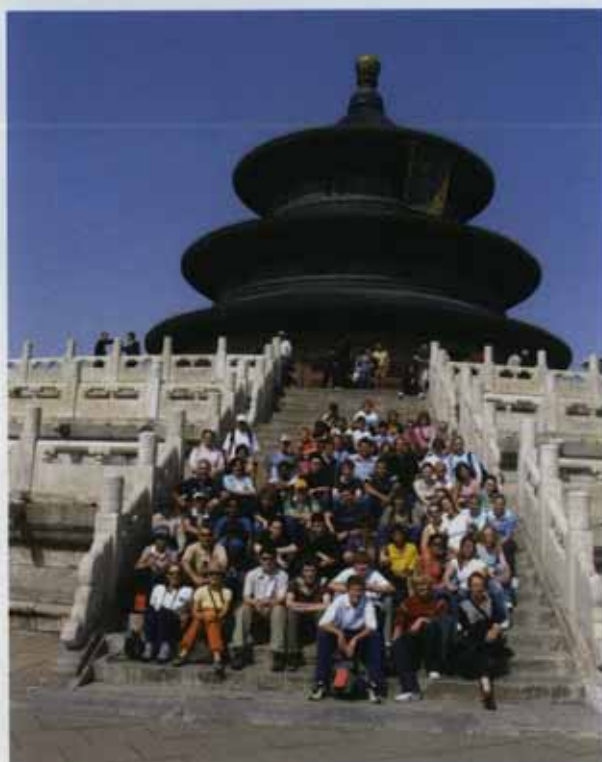
Fifth PAC China Tour

Students, teachers and relatives of the PAC and Wilderness School 2005 China Tour gathered at Adelaide Airport just before midday on the 12th of April. We flew Malaysian Airlines to Kuala Lumpur and then on to Beijing where we began a full day's sightseeing. We first visited the Temple of Heaven, which introduced us to some of the culture we would be experiencing over the next three weeks. During our stay in Beijing we visited famous sites such as Tiananmen Square, where most of us saw Mao's body (which looked more like a wax figure), the Forbidden City where the emperor's used to live, the Summer Palace, Ming Tombs and the Great Wall, which was steep and made its way for miles and miles over mountainous terrain. We also got the opportunity to visit government owned jade, silk and pearl factories and shops, visit

Buddhist temples and buy just about anything for cheap prices at the small shops just around the corner from our hotel.



We then travelled by train to Jinan where we saw Baotu Springs and the Hill of a Thousand Buddhas. We also attended lessons in the mornings, where we learnt much about the Chinese education system and met a lot of students, some of whom took us around the nearby streets, showed us some of the shops and made sure we received good deals. During our stay in Jinan, which was the longest stay in any city, we could relax a bit more and were given time to explore the city square just outside our hotel and the surrounding area. We also had dinner with a Chinese family and, especially for those like me who had a home



cooked meal at the family home, it was an interesting experience!

Next we headed off to Qufu, birthplace and old home of Confucius. We visited his old house and his grave before leaving and spending the night in Tai'an. The next morning we began the ascent up the sacred Tai Shan (Mt. Tai). The climb was steep and difficult, but the view and sense of achievement made it all worthwhile.

After another brief stay in Jinan we headed off to the beautiful Qingdao, a coastal city that is to host the sailing component of the Beijing 2008 Olympics. This city is also famous for its beer. We visited the brewery where it originated and the Year 11's and 12's were able to sample it.

We then caught the night train to Shanghai, where we toured around the old British and French Concessions and visited the Bund. We looked out over the city from the 88 story tall Jinmao Tower and also enjoyed a night cruise on the Yangtze River. Again we visited a school — this time Datong High school — but we didn't stay for any lessons, instead meeting and spending some time with a few of the students.

During the trip we were introduced to a different culture, a different way of life and different food, some of which was interesting, some of which shocked us. Most students were comforted by the thought that there was usually a McDonalds or KFC nearby. Although we had a number of people fall ill during the trip, I am sure we all enjoyed it and made lots of friends — both Australian and Chinese — and would most certainly urge everyone to take the opportunity to go to China on the next PAC/Wilderness School China Tour.

Community Service

He couldn't talk and it was extremely difficult to communicate with him. He also couldn't spell what he wanted to say so he used hand signals, but they were incredibly vague. I found the best way to figure out what he wanted was to write down the question and also write a 'yes' and 'no' which he could point to. The problem was trying to figure out the right question to ask. We eventually realised he wanted to burn a picture of a fighter jet with two people in the cockpit on a piece of wood. Joel, the supervisor, made him saw off the end to make the wood square himself, which he didn't like. We also made him go over the ghost image on the wood again, with the help of my guiding hand. He wanted me to do it all but I didn't. It really improved my communication skills because I had to try harder than I would normally have to.

I spent the afternoon playing Connect Four with Glen. It became boring for me but I kept at it for Glen's sake. Sometimes he would trick me and win with a two-way, while other times he would miss obvious things or I would win and he wouldn't notice. I couldn't figure him out.

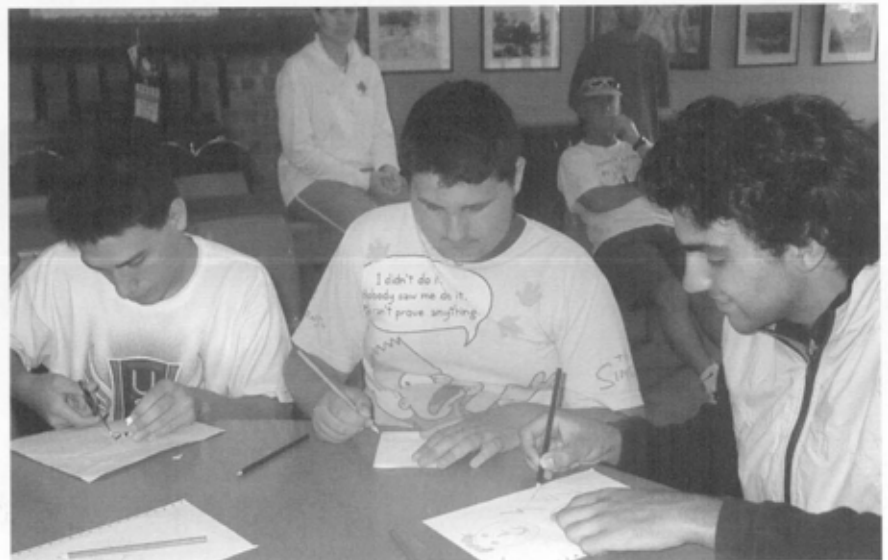

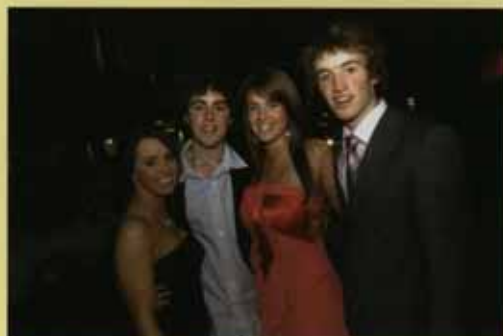
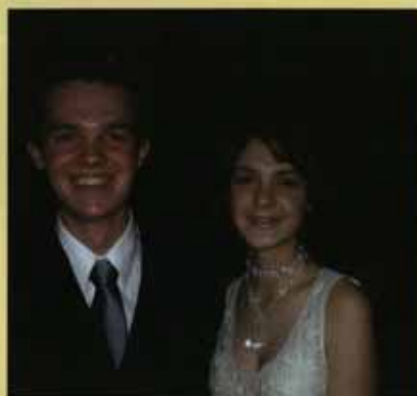
Outreach Camp

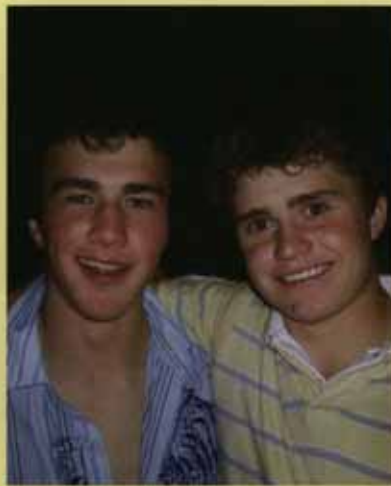

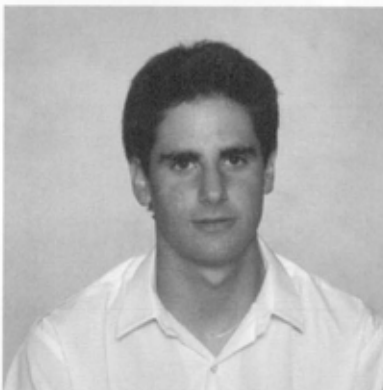

Greg Blewett's six into Mr Kracht's car was a highlight.

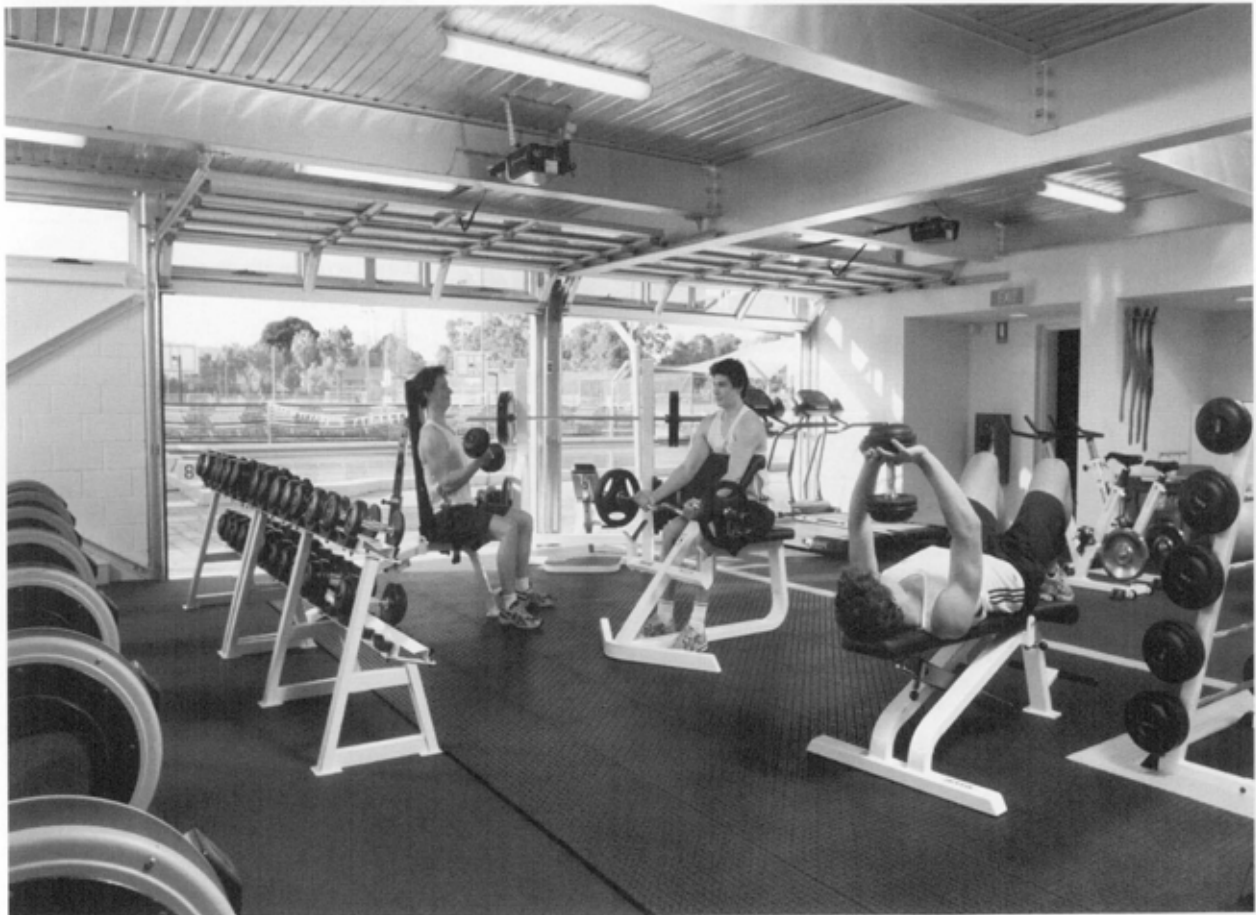
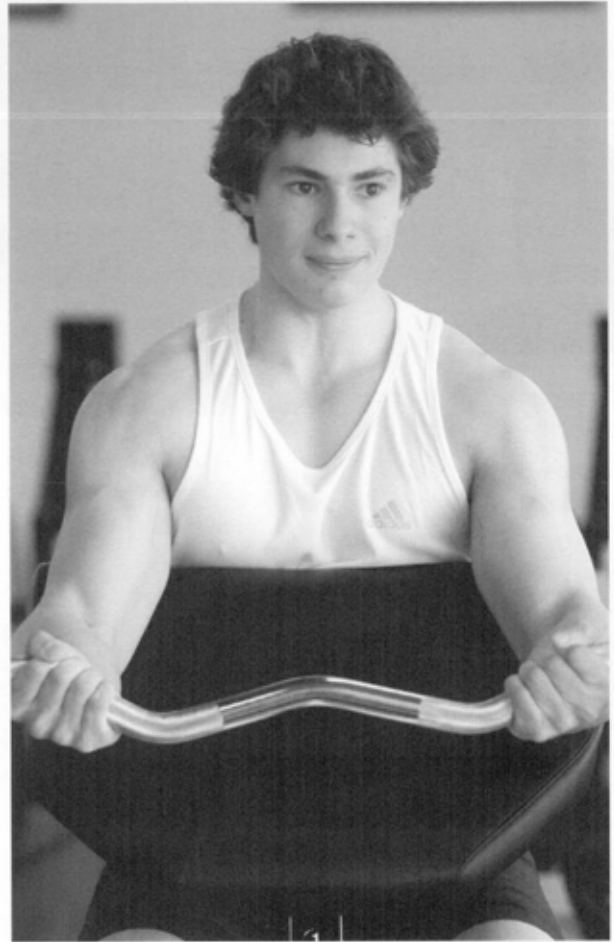
Students use the gymnasium for

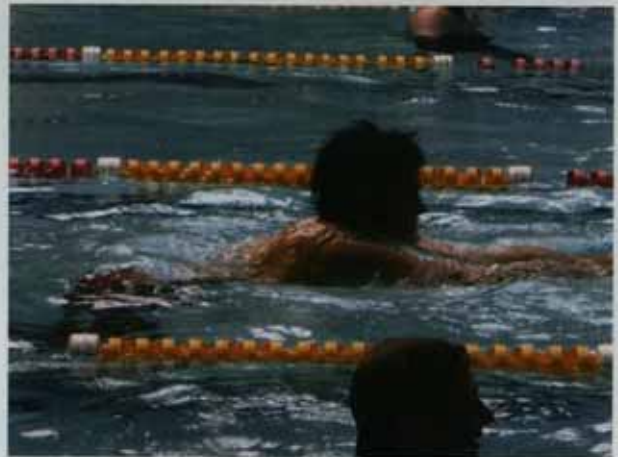

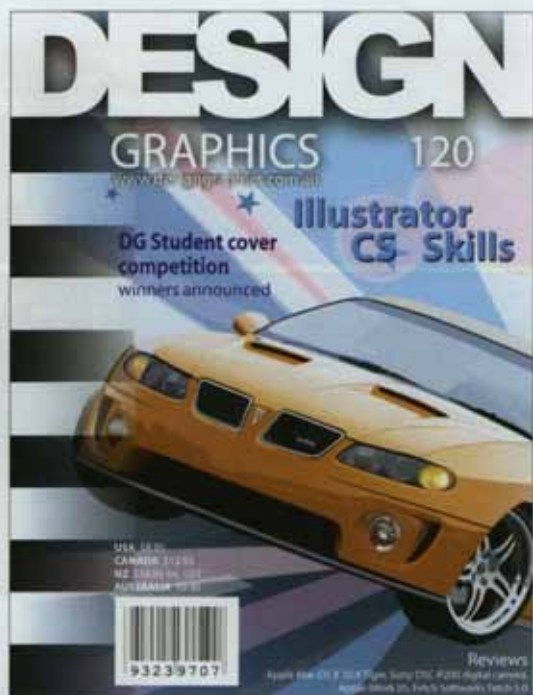

Our President 2006

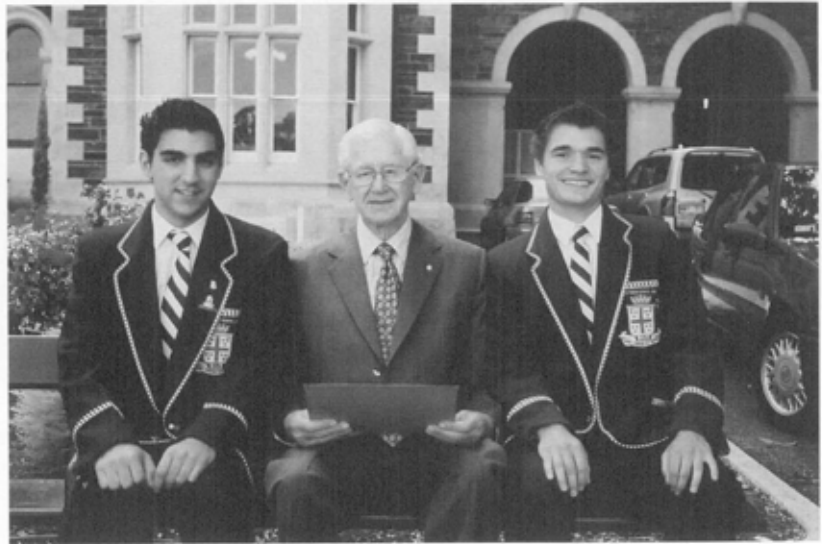

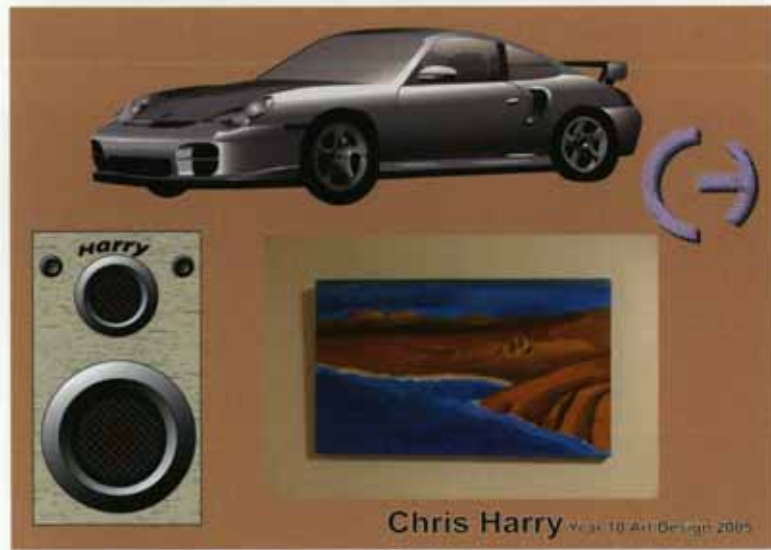

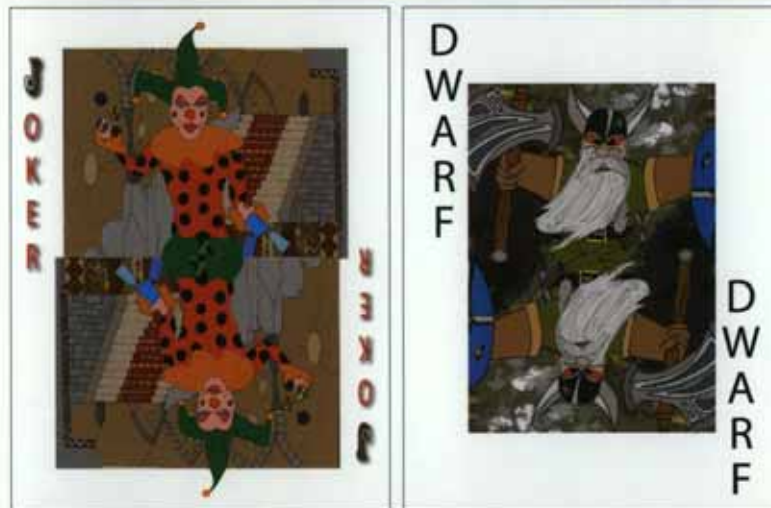
