






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

We should all be living without regrets, striving for excellence and above all, enjoying life. The earlier we all adopt these vital principles, the less painful relearning we shall have to do later in our lives.

Headmaster's Report

2006 has been an important time in the history of Prince Alfred College with considerable capital development and exciting new initiatives in curriculum and co-curriculum. The Master Plan and the Strategic Plan have guided the developments in the school during this year and there is much to celebrate.

The Prince Alfred College Council, led by the Chairman, Mr Bruce Spangler, has overseen the significant developments in the school this year. I am grateful for the support of all members of Council and, in particular, other members of the Council Executive: Mr Peter Bacciarelli, Deputy Chairman; Mr Ross Dillon, Treasurer; Mr Jeff Ellison, Secretary and Mr David Stewart, Business Director. Council held two strategic retreats during the year in April and September to plan for the future of Prince Alfred College. New Governance procedures and structures have now been implemented to improve the effectiveness of Council and its key committees of Finance and Building. Mr Ross Dillon and Mr Craig Nicholls, Chairs of the Finance and Building committees respectively, have made an important contribution to Council and guided the financial and building requirements for the school. I pay tribute to Mr Greg Perks who retires from Council at the end of this year. The Moderator of the Uniting Church, Synod of South Australia, the Rev Graham Vawser has, despite a busy workload, made a serious and genuine commitment to our College Council which has served to cement the important association between Prince Alfred College and the Uniting Church.

The Master Plan for capital development of the College is continuing to provide outstanding facilities for teaching and learning in the school. In February we opened the Neil Smart Memorial Building which comprises ten classrooms including two computer rooms for the teaching of Humanities and English, and also serving as a home base for our Middle Years students in Years 8 and 9. The generosity of Mr Neil Smart, an Old Scholar of 1930, is applauded. Many of his extended family joined us for the official opening of this outstanding educational facility for the boys at PAC.

This building project also included Stage 2 of the elevated walkway which has vastly improved the entrance to the Secondary School and provided better access for students and staff between the Assembly Hall and the Gerard Innovation Centre.

The beginning of the year also saw a major refurbishment of the lower quadrangle area which now provides facilities for student services, including offices and work places for the Chaplain, Youth Minister, School Psychologist, Coordinator of International Students, and facilities for learning support. In July a complete refurbishment of the old classrooms adjacent to the Museum in the Memorial Building has provided new front of house facilities for the Secondary School, and houses offices and spaces for the Secondary School administrative team. Also in July the school was very pleased to rededicate and open the refurbished Colton Wing of the Main Building. This magnificent renovation provides facilities for Music on the lower ground floor, virtually our own conservatorium, and on the ground floor a new Common Room and offices for our Finance team. The first floor is now occupied by Archives and the Noel Baker Centre for Mathematics. This centre also serves as a facility for staff professional development. It remains a fitting tribute to one of the school's greatest benefactors, Sir John Colton, whose portrait now hangs in the Common Room. After more than ten years of work the entire Main Building has now been fully restored to its former magnificence

At the beginning of Term 3, two major projects were begun; a new Library/Resource Centre for the Secondary School in the area formerly occupied by the staff Common Room, and a new eight room facility in the Preparatory School, including a state-of-the-art Computer Centre. Both projects will be completed by the end of 2006 ready for occupancy in February next year.

These building projects represent in total more than \$6 million worth of new buildings and upgraded facilities. We can be very proud of our outstanding buildings, all with the best interests of our boys in mind. 2007 sees further building projects comprising a refurbishment of the Centenary Wing in the Secondary School and a long awaited Sports Centre for the Preparatory School students.

Our Strategic Plan 2005–2010 New Horizons has guided significant educational, pastoral care and resource initiatives in the school. 24 of the 40 initiatives are currently underway or complete. Major developments have included the establishment of a Middle Years Program which will comprise an Extended Stay Program for Year 9 boys on a new facility to be established at Point Turton on the Yorke Peninsula. A School Charter has been prepared and is now on display in the main reception foyer which summarises the core beliefs of the school and its commitment to the education of boys. Key developments in teaching and learning have occurred at every level in the school. Initiative 2.7 which has a focus on literacy will become a major priority area for 2007 after the formulation of a Boys' Literacy Excellence Framework prepared under the leadership of former teacher, Mrs Nan Williamson. Princes aims to set itself apart in development and achievements in boys' literacy. The Arts has also expanded under the leadership of Mr Michael Steer as Head of Department: The Arts, and Mrs

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Pamela Freeman, the Director of Artistic Performance. An appreciation of the Arts is a vital component of a rich learning program for boys.

The ethos of the Uniting Church is a key element of the Strategic Plan and considerable work has been completed this year on ways to instil the ethos in the school community. This is evident in pastoral care programs, community service, staff well-being, and beliefs and values curriculum. The appointment of Mr Richard Bruford as Director of Teaching and Learning is a direct response to the initiatives of the Strategic Plan aimed at developing unique learning experiences for boys and critical and creative thinking abilities.

At the beginning of the year, two
Executive Committees were established;
the Education Management Team,
chaired by the Headmaster, and the
Business Management Team, chaired
by the Business Director. These two
committees have a primary responsibility
for the implementation of the Strategic
Plan and planning for the long-term
future of the College. Both committees
comprise senior members of staff from
across the school who are responsible
for policy and procedures in education,
finance, grounds, property, boarding and
development.

The school has been blessed with outstanding leadership through the work of Mrs Cynthia May, Head of the Secondary School: Mr Grant Nalder, Head of the Preparatory School; Mr David Stewart, Business Director; Mr Jim Hartnett and Mr Sam Cheesman (Term 4), Director of Boarding; Mr. Grant Davis, Director of Development; and the Rev Trevor Klar, the School Chaplain. Other key management staff include Mr Darryl Buchanan, Business Operations Manager, Mr Peter Dawes, Property Manager, and Mr Ian Drake in charge of Grounds. Appreciation is also extended to the two sub-school Deputies, Mr Ken Watson and Mr Neil Andary, and Mr Andrew Fergusson, Director of Computing and Network Services. I express my thanks to all Middle and Senior management for their energy, enthusiasm, creativity and dedication to this school and its community. Without doubt my greatest supporter is my Executive Assistant, Mrs Margaret Gleaves, and I am indebted

to her for her personal and professional support and expertise.

Mrs Cynthia May and Mr Grant Nalder have chaired the Secondary School Management Team and the Preparatory School Management Team respectively. These two committees are responsible for the management of policy and programs in the sub-schools and for ensuring the effective operation of Secondary and Primary School curriculum and programs. My sincere thanks goes to all staff involved in these important committees.

The Pastoral Care of boys remains as one of the important features of an education at PAC. The House system of Cotton, Taylor, Waterhouse, and Watsford is now firmly entrenched in the school's culture and provides an effective structure for the well-being of boys and for extracurricular programs in swimming, athletics and other events. The Heads of House and Year in the Secondary School and House staff in the Preparatory School must be acknowledged for their focus work in student welfare.

At the beginning of the year our boarders returned to refurbished facilities in Hartley and Bayly Wings, mainly comprising new and improved furniture and facilities for learning and recreation. Mr Jim Hartnett, who had joined us in 2005 left the school at the end of Term 3. I extend my gratitude to Jim and his family for their contribution to the school and the boarding community during his time at Princes. I am most grateful to Mr Sam Cheesman who took over the role of Director of Boarding in Term 4 and also thank the boarding house staff,

in particular Mrs Margaret Hurnell, Mr Phil Davis, Mr Luke Ritchie and Mr Gary Jenkinson who provided support for our boarders.

At the beginning of Term 3 the school began an exciting new initiative for our international students. An International Students Transition Program (ISTP) has been established to improve the educational and cultural transition of the almost fifty international students that form an important part of the Princes community. Ms Anna Polias, Ms Karin Iffinger and Ms Mani White have worked tirelessly to ensure that the ISTP is a best practice program.

In January we were thrilled to hear of the success of our Year 12 students from 2005. More than 30 boys received perfect scores of 20 in the SACE or 7 in the International Baccalaureate Diploma. 5.5% of the graduating class of 2005 were in the top 1% of the State, 20% in the top 5%, 33% in the top 10%, and 57.5% in the top 20%. 64% of all SACE results were As or Bs. The John Dunn Prize for Dux of the School was awarded jointly to Ross Gillott and Chong Tsang. The Malpas Prize for Science went to Anthony Noor, the Longbottom Prize for Mathematics to Anton Steketee, and the Colton Prize for Arts and Languages to Andrew Burford. We can be exceptionally proud of these achievements which confirm our place as a leading educational provider in South Australia.

The Preparatory School curriculum has continued to be among the best in the world with confirmation from the International Baccalaureate Organisation



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that we have an outstanding Primary Years Program. In 2007 students in Years 6 and 7 will embrace the IBO's Middle Years Program which will complement the outstanding programs we have for our students from Kindergarten to Year 5. During 2006 under the leadership of Mr Ken Watson, an exciting Middle Years Program has been established for boys in Years 8 and 9. Based on the IBO MYP it is a school-based program which meets the particular needs of our adolescent students in these very formative years.

The 9th Gerard Innovation Lecture was delivered in July by Professor Jock Findlay from Prince Henry's Institute of Medical Research in Melbourne. The lecture was entitled Sex, Science and Society and focused on the development of reproductive technology and its implications in developing nations and for the future of our world. I express sincere gratitude to Mr John Gerard for his generous support of this innovative lecture series.


One of the great joys of this year has been working closely with School Captain, Stefan Pretorius; Vice-Captain, Adam Cunynghame; and the Prefects and House Captains. Along with the Student Forum and PACCC, student leadership in the school has set an exemplary standard. Similarly, Ben Young and Jock Clarnette and other student leaders in the Preparatory School have more than met our expectations for student leadership. This year's Red and White was a spectacular event and it was a pleasure for staff to be in the company of the boys and their partners on the night. Other key student organised events have been Harmony Day and Boarders' Day. These focused on the contribution of two very important groups in our community who join us here in Adelaide from overseas and from country areas. Bo Zhu and Tseng Hui Heng have been outstanding leaders of our international students. Tom Du Rieu, Captain of Boarding; and Cameron McTernan, Lachlan Ramsey and James Smith, Vice-Captains of Boarding, have also represented the student body well and provided great support for the boarding staff.

The annual Intercollegiate sporting matches have once again been important occasions for the boys. Throughout the year we have seen much evidence of

sporting success, sportsmanship and camaraderie between the two schools. During the summer season, PAC was victorious in winning the Swimming Intercol and for the second year in a row defeating Saints in Badminton 9-nil. The swimming team was ably led by Captain Joshua Brewerton and coached by Mr Mark Shepherd with support from Mr Graham Baird and Ms Evie Morelli. The Badminton team owes much to Mr Jurgen Kracht and Old Scholar Mr Mark Surman for the success they have achieved this year. The Tennis Intercol was held at SPSC with a strong win accorded to Saints. Sincere thanks go to Stefan Pretorius Captain; Mr Josh Tuckfield, coach; and Mr Chris Nicholls for their support of the Drive tennis team.

Once again Prince Alfred College was the premier rowing school in South Australia this year. Despite a best-ever time of exactly six minutes, we lost the Head of the River to St Peter's College and Pembroke School. Captain of Boats. Harrison James, made an outstanding contribution to this sport. I pay gratitude to the Director of Rowing, Mr Daren Potts. and to Mr Vaughn Huddleston and other coaches for their ongoing commitment to rowing at PAC. The Rowing Parents' Support Group chaired by Mr John Harry and Mr Barry Butler during the year have maintained an enormous commitment to raising funds for the purchase of boats, and also provided enormous personal support to the boys and staff involved in rowing. The annual Intercollegiate Cricket match saw a win to St Peter's after a valiant effort from all players. This annual match between Princes and Saints has been fought for more than 130 years with an almost equal number of wins for each school. Mr Peter Williams, our First XI coach, is a passionate servant of cricket at this school. Our Captain of Cricket, James Smith, a highly talented all-rounder, has a great future in this sport and will take up a scholarship with SACA in 2007.

The winter season saw contests in soccer, hockey, basketball and football. We were unable to field a First XV Rugby side this year. The Soccer saw a 2-all draw. PAC lost to Saints in Hockey and Basketball by a very close margin, but had a resounding win by 52 points in the Football. The respective Captains, Dong Hee Lee, Soccer; Alex Michell, Hockey; Elliot Watts, Basketball; and Xavier Watson, Football, ensured that our teams performed to a professional standard in our winter sporting programs. Honours



Colours in Football were presented to four outstanding sportsmen, Daniel May, Brendan Papps, Tom Holmes and Xavier Watson. The coaching staff of Mr Gary Jenkinson, Mr Richard Bruford, Mr Paul Rigoni and Mr Bob Claxton enabled our sporting teams to perform and achieve at a semi-professional level.

2006 featured two outstanding musicals, HMS Pinafore in the Secondary School and Bats in the Preparatory School. This year the Princes Musical Theatre Company was formed comprising boys from PAC and girls from the five independent girls' schools. The performance of HMS Pinafore was a magnificent showcase of student talent under the highly capable directorship of Mr Peter Hopkins. Bats was a truly magnificent show with almost every Preparatory boy involved. My thanks go to Mrs Mandy Bell, Mrs Georgia Bradford and Ms Pamela Watts for their work in directing and producing this show which surprised and amazed the audience.

There were a number of interstate and overseas tours during the year. The inaugural German language and cultural tour to Germany was held in April, led by Mrs Monica McCauley and Mr Daren Potts. The football team enjoyed a pre-season visit to Melbourne, playing matches against Wesley College and Melbourne Grammar. A hockey tour to Perth in the July school holidays saw the team compete against a number of schools with mixed success. In January 2007 PAC boys will join with girls from Wilderness School for a language and cultural tour to France under the leadership of Mr Jurgen Kracht. In October, Ms Anna Polias enjoyed a week's exchange with Da Tong High School, our partner school in Shanghai, In March, I. was pleased to visit Da Tong High School and also the Middle School attached to Shandong Teachers' University in Jinan.

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These two schools are an important link between Princes and China, a country that will have an extraordinary influence on the world in the years to come. Also in July ten Year 11 boys travelled with Mr David Freesmith to attend the Global Youth Institute Conference in Taiper, Taiwan. This three week program saw our boys engage with students from around the world in a series of problem-solving activities.

Music has developed as an outstanding feature of Prince Alfred College. The work of Mrs Pamela Freeman and Mr Andrew Newhouse has seen our bands gain state and national recognition at the Mount Gambier Jazz Festival and the South Australian School Bands Competition. The Gig at the Gov and the Big Band Bash are but two events which demonstrate the outstanding musical talent of our boys.

Chess and Debating have been important cultural programs this year. The Intercol competitions saw a loss to-PAC by a small margin in debating and a vast improvement in chess, where there is much promise for the future. Sincere thanks go to Mrs Filomena Longo for her support of debating and Mr Alastair Lupton and Mr George Howard for their coordination and coaching of chess. Mr Richard Thorne continues to be an outstanding patron of chess at PAC. The PAC Mooting team of Ike Kutlaca, Javed Alam and Davor Pavlin-Premri won the state competition giving them the opportunity to compete in the national finals at Bond University on the Gold Coast. Their knowledge of a complex legal issue and capacity to present a strong case was clear evidence of their debating skill. and intellectual ability. I am indebted to Ms Helena Jaskinski, Mr. Andrew Williams, Mr Mark Hosking and Mr Richard Arnold for their coaching support.

Prince Alfred College is served by an outstanding teaching and non-teaching staff. The quality of a school is highly dependent on the quality of its staff and I pay tribute to every staff member of this school for their commitment to its vision to create a world-class school for boys. At the beginning of the year we welcomed Ms Annabel Ecroyd, Mr Randall Pearce, Mr Luke Ritchie and Mr Kelvin Sparks to the teaching staff of the Preparatory School. On the Secondary staff we were joined by Mrs Sara Browning, Dr

James Flatt, Ms Emma Marshall, Mr
Mark Dell'Oro as Director of Sport, Mr
Andrew Chambers, Youth Minister, and
Mr Timothy Agnew, Head of Humanities.
New appointments included Mr Richard
Bruford as Director of Teaching and
Learning, Mrs Pamela Freeman, Director
of Artistic Performance, Mr Michael Steer,
Head of the Arts, Mr Anthony Izzo, Head
of Technology, and Mr Peter Williams,
Head of Cotton House.

We farewell Mr Ian Rossotti, who takes up an exciting opportunity as Director of Studies at Trinity College, and Mr Peter Karamoshos, who takes two years' leave to teach at the Australian International School in Singapore. Other staff leaving the College include Mrs Sara Browning, Mrs Carol Shaw, Ms Janet Harris, Mr Nick Venardis, Mrs Margit Hosking and Ms Rachel Merritt. A special farewell is granted to Mrs Joy Magain who retires after 33 years of outstanding service to the Preparatory School at Prince Alfred College. Joy's contribution to the school is beyond measure and we wish her the very best in retirement. A further special thanks is extended to Mrs Lucy Petherick who made a significant contribution to the administration of both the Preparatory School and Secondary School and to Mrs Dorothy Gregg who managed the Bookroom for many years. Both women have worked tirelessly for the benefit of staff and students. Mr Michael Hissey, Finance manager, also left the College to seek new opportunities.



Joy Magain started teaching at PAC in 1974 as a Year 3 teacher. She remembers that women teachers were not permitted in the Preparatory School beyond Year 4 at that time, but were mainly there for the nurturing role in the early years of school. She had previously been

a demonstration teacher with an outstanding reputation for classroom management. Her innovative teaching techniques and the integrity of her pastoral care made an immediate impact and have continued to enrich her students and colleagues to this day.

In 1978 there was a fire in the Prep which necessitated a major reconstruction of the old building and it also coincided with the arrival of a new Master-in-Charge, Graeme Whisker. These events seemed to provide the impetus for significant change in the Prep and soon Joy was teaching the upper levels of school. In fact, Joy has taught every year level from Year 3 to Year 7. In the course of all these years she has held many positions of responsibility. She has been Maths Coordinator, Asian Studies Coordinator, Curriculum Coordinator, Year Level Coordinator and Head of Waterhouse. She has managed Hockey, Debating, Public Speaking and Tournament of Minds teams.

Her fondest memories are of the boys she has taught and the rewards in watching them grow and develop. She says it has been wonderful watching the school change and grow and to experience the tremendous camaraderie and teamwork of the staff over the years. Her passion for teaching has kept her at the cutting edge of educational progress and she has made and invaluable contribution to professional development in the Preparatory School.

Joy has been an inspirational role model for her colleagues, who will miss her sorely. Her departure will also be deeply regretted by students and the parent body. Joy is exceptionally well liked and highly respected, and the school is extremely fortunate to have enjoyed the benefit of her services over thirty-three years. We wish her every happiness and fulfilment in her retirement.

Adelaide University was her alma mater and Sandra is still acknowledged in the Organic Chemistry Department as one of their finest Masters graduates. Although encouraged to continue an academic career Sandra chose to pursue a vocation in teaching. A generation of Princes men can be

thankful that she did, as their lives have been enriched because of her passion for science in general and chemistry in particular.

Sandra finally found her home at PAC in 1986 after serving an 'apprenticeship' at Pembroke and Saints. Despite a commitment to her classes at Princes Sandra always found time to make a contribution to the wider community of chemistry teachers. As a marker, examiner or member of the Subject Advisory Committee, her input and judgement was sought and highly valued. The depth and breadth of her understanding of the chemistry syllabus was second to none and you could always expect Sandra to make a significant contribution to any debate about curricula, examinations or assessment procedures. Sandra was never intimidated by the male-dominated environment of science teachers. In fact, she thrived with the challenge and shook many out of their complacency.

An avid reader, talented artist and closet poet, Sandra became a leading member of a writing team responsible for the production of chemistry text books and resource material used here and overseas. Her research and writing skills are clearly illustrated through the informative and fascinating articles written over many years for the Science Journal. She has promoted women in science and provided a perspective often left buried or blurred through inaccuracies in the historical record. We will miss the clarity and insight of her contributions to the Journal.

Those Princes men fortunate enough to work with Sandra will have fond memories of a camera lens emerging from a cloud of chalk dust during lessons. Sports days, Intercols, assemblies or simply eating lunch in the science courtyard, Sandra would capture the 'Kodak' moment and then rush off looking for another opportunity. Her photos have enriched Princes publications for two decades and her ability is widely recognised as illustrated by the frequency with which her photos are highlighted on TV.

Sandra has been a very supportive colleague. A sharp and insightful intellect, her contributions have been instrumental in building a sense of teamwork and collegiality within the Science Faculty, often through the organisation of social gatherings. Her thoughtful and caring nature provided a valuable perspective amongst colleagues who often needed to be reminded that boys will be boys.

Staff Farewells

Sandra made an invaluable contribution to sport. Having excelled in netball at University, her Varsity Blue provided the background to understand the demands of team work and skills development. Never one to seek the spotlight, she chose to work with junior tennis and basketball teams and nurtured emerging champions by building confidence, skills and the importance of being part of a team. Many Princes men will fondly remember the encouraging word from Sandra as they strived to achieve their best. Indeed, some of her teams went through the season undefeated. When PAC increased the enrolment of international students, many had a background in basketball and wanted to play. Sandra chose to coach these teams. As these boys were often boarders she used her car as a taxi service to transport the team to various parts of Adelaide for their matches. Having just arrived in Australia, these boys sometimes struggled with the language and culture. It was often because of the care and interest Sandra showed to these boys that they grew in confidence and felt part of the Princes community.

One might say that Chemistry has been her passion but in reality it is the boys themselves who have been her motivation. Whether it is through attending events for the sake of her students, coaching basketball, or teaching Chemistry, the growth and development of the boys is her legacy for Prince Alfred College. The outstanding results secured by her students in SACE and IBD Chemistry year after year and their acceptance into specialist courses and career pathways are testimony to the quality of her teaching. Everything she has done at Prince Alfred College has been to advance the boys in her care and the boys themselves are richer for the contact they have had with her.

The Princes Community will miss her unique blend of scholarship, sharp wit, devotion to teaching and the care she provided so willingly for students throughout her career.

An edited version of Sandra's words of leavetaking to the school:

I was born in the dark days of World War II but as a child I only knew love, joy and security. I was born lucky. I am the eldest of six children, the product of a loving, stable marriage and we were raised by a village — loving parents, involved grandparents, aunts, cousins, neighbours, teachers, the local Methodist church, sports coaches — an entire web of relationships and community structures to support young families in those first exhausting, crucial years. This must sound like the chorus in the School Musical staged recently — "All my sisters and my cousins and my aunts..." and my father used to tease my mother that she was related to half of South Australia.

Here is a description of my High School written by a girl, now a successful author and artist, who was two years ahead of me:

High School; the happiest days. At fledgling Brighton High there were about 500 students when I started and no established groups to bully or belittle anyone. Every student was made to feel special. ¹

I had the same experience, and so did my siblings. NO

BULLYING and my friends from that time make the same claim. By the time I left at the end of Year 12, that school had 1400 students. I was a well-behaved child, you might say boring, with my freckles and pigtails. I did not stage a rebellion until Year 12. I did not want to study Medicine, my father's ambition for me. I wanted to be a teacher! I had never been so happy as I was at school.

Some years ago now, at the suggestion of PAC's Head of English, I held a meeting of female staff. This led to a meeting with Neil Jackson who, like his successor Mr Ken Watson. thinks with both his head and his heart. The outcome was a Senior School Staff Meeting and, most unlike me. Lintroduced it. I made the opening speech expressing the concerns of Neil Jackson and the women staff. Well what an outpouring ensued. Bullying and harassment of students towards staff, including student teachers, was discussed but the main focus was bullying between students. A policy against harassment was developed and Princes was one of the first schools in S.A. to admit there was a problem and to do something about it. Our sadness is that despite ongoing work from all staff today and inspiring leadership from Ken Watson and the Heads of House, there is still a problem. Bullying and harassment is still with us and it is with all other schools too.

And what should schools be like? "Warm, friendly and with very few unhappy moments for students and for staff." It is possible to have a school environment free of bullying. I know. I experienced it. I ask you please to give to others fun, fellowship, example and care.

Adam Hanieh was a school prefect, Captain of Chess, top of PAC Year 12 Chem and Editor of the School Science Journal in 1989. We didn't know Adam is a Palestinian until Mr Kracht saw him on SBS television in Palestine. It turned out that since 1997 Adam has been working for several human rights organisations including the UN in Palestine. His role includes documenting cases of human rights violations against Palestinian children and providing legal services to children held as political prisoners. He does this despite considerable danger to himself and surely follows the School motto, "Do brave deeds and endure".

You are becoming young adults. Please carry the baton for a better society. Do you know that according to UNICEF less than half of one % of today's world economy would be the total needed to eradicate the worst aspects of poverty and to meet human needs over the next ten years? In other words, there is no deficit in human resources — the deficit is human will.

I have been very happy here — most of the time. I have done my best to care for my students, to provide a secure, happy, and disciplined environment with lots of fun and opportunities to succeed — which of course would not have been possible without the unending and generous support of my colleagues and so many responsive and absolutely delightful students. Keep your brains and willpower connected to your hearts, and you can all help to make a happy school and a better world. God bless you all.

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Head of the Preparatory School's Report

As another year draws to a close, the Preparatory School continues to break new ground. Over the last few months we have seen the Preparatory School numbers exceed 400 students for the first time in its history from Kindergarten to Year 7.

There were some wonderful units of work completed by the boys this year. Who could forget the Kindergarten students, the Year 3s and 5s taking advantage of the Clipsal 500. The Year 5s getting into the pits and learning the importance of 'TEAM' work (Together Everyone Achieves More). The Year 5s also visited the Stone Brothers Racing Team and the Year 3s visited Team Betta Electrical. The boys were very lucky to get to interact with Craig Lowndes, James Courtney, Brian Lawrence and Peter Jamieson.

The Year 6s took some time to focus on aviation and we were fortunate enough to have Albert McBride's father, Jim McBride land the surf rescue helicopter on our front oval. The boys certainly got a kick out of that. Through this unit, the PAC Preparatory School took part in and won the Metropolitan School category for Plane Crazy Day 2006. As a prize they were given a tour of the newly upgraded operational hangar at Adelaide Airport which is normally not open to the public. The boys got the opportunity to talk to the flight nurses, pilots and engineers and see the aircraft up close!

During National Book Week the Year 1s released their very own hand written, published story-books. Each of the books were originally written and illustrated, and featured a character derived from their Teddy Bear, a narrative framework, and a set formula. In Term 1 we held our third Year 5 Father and Son Camp, with Harry Potter as the theme. Once again the teams were responsible for generating their own group names. They included Hogwarts Gryffindor Harry Potter, Hogwarts Hufflepuffs Cedric Diggory, Durmstrang Victor and the Beauxbatons. But it was the Hogwarts Hufflepuffs Cedric Diggory who emerged as the victors for the weekend. Phil Noble, Dale Hobbs and the staff did a wonderful job of coordinating this event.

They enjoyed seeing their own book develop

through the writing process, from using a simple idea and creating a wonderful book to share with others.

Our Book Launch included a special Year 1 Assembly where our boys used pictures, writing and drama to explain how stories are put together. This occasion was shared by many visitors to our school and was definitely one of the year's highlights.



Through a Literacy and Numeracy grant this year, as well as financial support from Year 1 parents and Max Edward's grandfather from Peacock Publications, all Year 1 boys were able to have their special book printed to give as gifts to family and friends. A copy of every boy's book was also presented to our Prep School Library and another copy to representatives from the Christina Noble Foundation to send to an Orphange overseas. This was a powerful experience for our boys because they began to understand that not everyone in our world has the opportunities or resources to learn to read.

To celebrate Book Week we went to the Odeon Theatre to see the Patch Theatre Company's production of Pamela Allen stories. This was particularly relevant for our boys as they had studied her books in great detail during first term.

The Year 2 boys and teachers have enjoyed their learning journey this year. We began with a PYP unit called 'Read Between the Lines'. This was a literature based unit focusing on Aesop's fables and parables from the Bible. The unit culminated in an Assembly presentation where the boys acted out a selection of fables for the enjoyment of the Junior Primary boys. Our next unit coincided with the Clipsal 500 Race. Excursions to the National Motor Museum and the Road Safety School were informative and involved hands on learning. A selection of guest speakers answered the boys' inquiry questions about cars, past,

Bodworks

We researched together about our body systems. We learned about the muscular, digestive, skeletal and circulatory systems. We really loved exploring all the interactive models of organs and systems we were lucky enough to have in our room. The body systems research taught us lots of new words we had never heard of before. Some of the words we used were long and difficult to spell like vertebrae and epiglottis. At the end of the topic we gave a presentation to our class about our systems. Some of us built models, made posters or a PowerPoint presentation to demonstrate what we had learnt. We discovered that the body systems all need to work together and we also learned how to look after our bodies with healthy eating and drinking along with regular exercise.

Cars Through Time

During Term 1 the Clipsal 500 V8 car race was zooming past our school gates. We decided to research the history of the car. Some boys chose really old cars to research and some chose more modern cars. We discussed what was similar and different between old cars and the cars of today. We got to go to the National Motor Museum at Birdwood and



view a variety of cars. We got to sit in an old car and a convertible car. When the Clipsal 500 race was on we got to go in the pits and meet the Ford Betta Electrical Team and the drivers. In technology we used Lego to discover more about wheels and axles. We raced them down a ramp to see which wheels rolled further.

Chocolate

In Term 3 we did a whole lot of research about chocolate. We began by tasting and describing cacao beans, cocoa and dark, milk and white chocolates. We asked questions about when it was discovered, how they make it and where do cacao beans grow. Together we researched interesting facts about the discovery of chocolate and we made a time line to show some of these events. We put it up outside our room. Next we decided to create our own chocolates with individual boxes. We began with some market research, asking boys in lots of classes questions about their favourite flavours and chocolate wrapper designs. We used this information to design our own chocolates and wrappers. Some had mint in them, some had cherry or nuts and some even had a mixture. We produced our boxes on the computers. One we had printed them we carefully folded our boxes. They looked fabulous. To complete our unit we went to look at chocolates at several stores in the city.

SANFL Launch

At the end of Term 1 we were lucky enough to be invited by the South Australian National Football League to participate in the launch of the 2006 season. We were given Guernseys and caps to wear from all the SANFL clubs. On the banks of the River Torrens, at Pinkie Flat, we had a skills training session and got to meet all the captains and coaches. The players and coaches arrived on Popeye. We enjoyed watching them in the paddle boat race and kicking the footballs through the floating goals. We were allowed to have food and drinks from the food stalls that they had set up. We had a great time.



Year 3/4/5R

It was an extremely successful year in 3/4/5R with many activities including the PYP Exhibition focusing on the topic of energy. Our central idea was about humans' energy needs and how we need to sustain energy for future users. The whole class did projects, models and PowerPoints on energy. Even though the main focus was on the Year 5s the 3s and 4s did the own show called 'A Tale of Three Islands'. Throughout the year we went on exciting excursions to many places including the Adelaide Zoo where we went to learn about ecosystems, to the Royal Australian Air Force Base at Edinburgh to learn about aviation and to the Maritime Museum and to the Pelican Point Power Station to find out about energy and its different forms. In Term 2 we had a look at the atmosphere and what things use or rely upon it. We got into planes and how they work. We ended up buying two remote controlled planes and two air pressure powered planes which we had a ton of fun with. We also had a paper plane competition with many intriguing designs. We did many fun experiments using such things as fire and water and the effects they have on humans and the world. We made many scientific based models such as simple machines with simple mechanics and Marble Magics where we had to make a marble do simple tasks like go up, down and through tunnels. In maths we had fun with problem solving challenges and developing skills for working with measurement, decimals, data handling and algebra. We wrote in many ways such as creating scripts for plays, poems and articles for magazines. In summary we had a great year in Mr Roller's class. Thanks Mr Roller for the wonderful year and the experiences we had.

What a busy term! We completed two units of inquiry titled 'Invasion or Settlement?' and 'Change Matters'.

For 'Invasion or Settlement' we went on three excursions to help us inquire into the question, 'Was Australia invaded or settled by Europeans?' We visited the Migration Museum, where we learnt about how the Aboriginal people lived before white people and how they were treated afterwards. We also visited Tandanya, where we were further exposed to the Aboriginal culture. We went to the Botanical Gardens, our guide was an Aboriginal man named Wally, and he told us how the Aboriginal people used the environment and plants in their everyday lives. Finally we went to the Art Gallery with Mrs Watts and she described the Aboriginal paintings and art works to us.

In 'Change Matters' we became young scientists. We invited Mr Ecroyd into our classes, because he is a scientist. He did experiments with us, using dry ice, water and food coloring to make a reaction. Then we tried out our own





experiment using food and growing mould and bacteria. We learnt how to write a scientific procedure.

Term 2 finished with buddy activities with Year 6/7M and the Mid Year Receptions, celebrating the World Cup and raising money in the 'World's Greatest Shave'.

Term 3

Our first unit was called 'Packing a Punch with Poetry' and we became powerful poets ourselves. We first read many different poems, we asked parents to help us perform poetry in a 'Poet's Theatre'. We practiced poems to recite for the year 3/4/5 poetry festival. We became fans of poetry when we saw Pegge and Potter recite many poems to our classes. Our favorite was a poem titled 'Mangoes'. We used the computers to publish our own poems that went into our portfolios.

For our second Program of Inquiry we studied inventions in a unit titled 'Technological Times'. We looked into inventions from the past and present and we made our own models and researched into whether they have improved our lives. We used the library and the resource section with its encyclopedias to help our research.

To make our term even busier we enjoyed other activities such as Grandies' Day and being part of the school musical *Bats*.

Term 4

In Term 4 we inquired into 'Choices' and how to make good decisions, in a unit titled 'Being Choosy'. We worked a lot in groups and learnt how to get along as well as working to achieve a goal. We planned and lead our class in a fitness lesson.

There are many things we are looking forward to, as the end of the year comes near, such as excursions to the Central Market and the Aquatic Centre, New Boys' Day and Speech Night.



I have continued to enjoy the relationship between the Preparatory and Secondary Schools and appreciate in particular the professionalism of Grant Nalder and Neil Andary.

Stefan Pretorius as Captain of School led his team of Prefects with distinction throughout the year. Adam Cunynghame assisted him most ably and it was always good to know that these two boys could be depended upon to complete any task required of them.

Student Forum was a pleasure to convene this year. Discussions were hearty and relevant and the presentation of badges truly meaningful. The boys gave direction on matters relevant to their peers and this was valuable at the management level.

The Red and White saw the Convention Centre decorated beautifully and once again it went very smoothly. Hamish King is to be commended for his excellent management of the event. Valedictory was a similarly impressive event with parents hearing a thirty second snapshot of their son's achievements from their son's Head of House and dining together as adults as the boys step into the next phase of their lives.

This year has been enveloped with the Building Master Plan. The Secondary School Office is now more centrally



located and we are using the Neil Smart Memorial Wing. We will be able to move into the new library over the break. This building program has tested the patience of boys and staff and yet all have been generous in their tolerance of the inconvenience of the process. Achieving Excellence

Our Year 12 students of 2005 began this year with some excellent results both in the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) and the International Baccalaureate Diploma (IBD). In all, 90 students attempted the SACE, and 37 the IBDP. These students were awarded a total of 40 merit scores, 6 for SACE and 34 for IBD. Many boys achieved merit scores in two or more subjects, including Ross Gillott, Anthony Noor, Sven Paschburg, Oliver Burgess, George Evans, Anton Steketee, Chong Tsang, Samuel Ellison, Andrew Burford and Saniay Schrapel. Perfect TER's of 99.95% were achieved by two of our students, Chong Tsang and Ross Gillott, both in the IBD. Overall, 5.5% of our students were placed in the top 1% of the state, 19% were placed in the top 5%, and 32.3% achieved results that placed them in the top 10% of the state.

The Malpas Prize for Science Anthony Noor

The Longbottom Prize for Mathematics Anton Steketee

The Colton Prize for Arts and Languages Andrew Burford

The results of the Australian Mathematics Competition saw a continuation of high achievement from our mathematicians. 28% of our boys were placed in the top 15%. 7% of our boys who took part in the competition gained a High Distinction, placing them in the top 2%. Year 8 boys achieving this award included Tim Smith, David Brown, Yao Ly, Roberto Reidig, Joshua Gugliotta, Anthony Milton, David Nguyen and Richard Gale. Year 9 students included Zack Jackman, Scott McPhee, Jared Barkla, Sung-Hyeog Park, Lars Paschburg. Those in Year 10 achieving awards included Ben May, Tom Wu and James Griggs. Simon Xie (Year 11) and Bo Zhu (Year 12) were our high flyers in the senior age group. Angus McLaren

(Year 9) was awarded the prize for major achievement in the competition placing him in the top 300 students overall. This is an outstanding achievement considering that Angus has three more years left to enter this competition. Finally, the BH Neumann Award for Excellence, for the student who achieves a perfect score in the competition, was awarded to Philipp Allgeuer. Philipp amazingly was the only person in Australia to achieve this result!

The Arts Faculty has been particularly active in 2006 and has contributed significantly to student life at Princes. Design

students achieved success at a national level in the Australian Secondary Schools Digital Design Challenge run by the Griffith University in Queensland. Boys have participated in this event for the past three years, gaining recognition as the third placed school in 2004. A number of boys had work selected for the final, which led to the school again achieving third place in Australia. Congratulations to all the boys for their hard work and we look forward to improving our performance in 2007 with a new batch of budding designers. Outstanding performers who received individual awards included: Thomas Carlier (second overall), Simon Dickson and Caleb Salagaras (third place for 3D Design), Nicholas Katsaros (fourth place for Architectural Design), Alex Silins and Elliot Opie (second place Junior Graphic Design).

Our Mooting Team comprising Javed Alam, Ike Kutlaca and Davor Pavlin-Premrl, all in Year 12, won the State finals of the Bond University Mooting Competition. The boys then traveled to the Gold Coast in July for the national finals. Although not advancing to the grand final, Mr Tutt was extremely impressed with the way in which the boys tackled the complex issue of non-delegable duty of care like polished legal practitioners. Sincere thanks are extended to Helena Jasinski, Mark Hosking, Richard Arnold and Andrew Williams (parents and old scholars) who all helped prepare the boys superbly for this competition.

Once again Princes mathematicians performed admirably in the South Australian Mathematics Competition. This year the results were very strong, across all year levels. Overall, five boys placed in the top ten in the State for their division, with three placed in the top three! In the Senior Division, made up of Years 11 and 12, an outstanding performance by Bo Zhu earned a place as outright third in the State. Other award recipients at this level included Stephen Riddell (High Distinction), Simon Xie (Distinction), Will Gray, Christopher Harry and Jack Yang (Credits). In the Intermediate Section, comprising Years 9 and 10, congratulations must go to Philipp Allgeuer who was placed outright first in the State. Glynn Rice was placed outright eighth in the State. The other award winners in this division included Will Young (High Distinction), Andrew Pederick

In the Junior Division, largely made up of Year 8 students, David Brown was placed outright second in the State. David Nguyen also placed equal seventh in the State. Other award recipients included Tim Smith (Distinction), Richard Gale and Josh Gugliotta (Credits).

Philipp Allgeuer, Christopher Harry and Glynn Rice were all invited to compete in this year's Australian Mathematics Olympiad. Only 100 of the nation's best mathematics students are invited to compete in this event. To have three students from a single school participating in such a prestigious competition is testament to the strength of Mathematics at Prince Alfred College, Philipp achieved a Bronze Certificate in the Olympiad and was therefore selected to compete as an Australian representative in the Asia Pacific Mathematics Olympiad. As part of the preparation for this event, Philipp was invited to attend a mathematics training camp in Canberra. From this camp Australia's team is selected for the annual International Mathematics Olympiad. Given that he is two or three years younger than most of the other participants, his achievements are somewhat remarkable.

Another student who made the journey to Canberra this year was Christopher Harry from Year 11 who achieved runner-up spot in the Simpson Prize Competition for History writing on the ANZACS.


This year saw the third running of the PAC Entrepreneur of the Year Award. The pressure is always on for creative and innovative ways to commence business at a micro level with students rising to the occasion. It was difficult to determine a clear winner this year and seven boys have been selected for entry into the School Entrepreneur of the Year Competition. Ideas ranging from selling sweets at a staff versus prefects soccer game to the supply of eco-bags in the Preparatory School drew the judges' attention. Well done to Travis Cordingley. Andrew Lukowicz, Blaire Brewerton, Lars Paschburg, Richard Gale, Hamish Bubner and Michael Thompson on their advancement to the final.

This year has seen the study of Languages take a new approach thanks to Mrs McCauley who introduced the use of clay animation as a method for learning conversational German. This concept has proven to be very popular with the boys who made their first venture into this year's German School Film Festival. Jared Barkla and Jordan Agutter were successful in having their German clay animation selected for the final as representatives of schools in the South and Western Australia region.

Year 8 student Sam Wilhelm gained success in this year's Young Writer of the Year Award run by *The Advertiser*. Sam was awarded top prize from over 1000 entrants. He received his award from *The Advertiser* editor, Melvin Mansell. Sam's piece, titled 'The Oak Tree', tackled the issue of drug abuse and was described as "innovative and mature" by Mr Mansell. Congratulations are also extended to Jerome Squires in Year 9 who managed to pick up third place for his poetry in the Year 9 and 10 Division.

There were some outstanding results achieved in the Australasian School Computer Studies Competition. Overall, 44% of our students achieved awards in this event, finishing in the top 20% of the State. A total of six boys attained Distinction awards that placed them in the top 2% in the State, including Andrew Dibden and Jacob Kendall from Year 9, and David Gabb, Ian Mazure-Johnstone, Glynn Rice and Elliot Wasow from Year 10.

Students also excelled in the International Science Competition run by the University of New South Wales. Bryn Crawford (Year 12) was successful in winning a Gold Medal for achieving first place in the State. A number of boys placed in the top 1% and were credited with High Distinction Certificates. Congratulations to Year 8 students Tim Smith, Roberto Riedig, David Piper, David Nguyen, Jack Morelli, Yao Ly, Richard



Gale and David Brown. Year 9 award recipients included Andrew Dibden, Jacob Kendall and Terry Moschou. From Year 10, Glynn Rice, Philipp Allgeuer and Andrew Pederick all received awards. Christopher Harry was the sole High Distinction winner from Year 11.

In the Royal Australian Chemical Institute (RACI) Chemistry Competition, Philipp Allgeuer (Year 10) achieved an Award of Excellence for top place in the State. High Distinctions were awarded to Glynn Rice (Year 10), Javed Alam, Tseng Hui Heng and Hamish King who all placed in the top 2% of the State.






Hugh Bond (Year 12) displayed his scientific talents for medical research with the Australian Society for Medical Research Prize.

Global Youth Institute, Taiwan


Seven Year 11 students (Chris Harry, Harold Ratcliff, Oliver Broadbridge, William Gray, Brian Chui and Harry Perks), one Old Scholar (Matthew Purdy) and one teacher (Mr David Freesmith) represented PAC and Australia at the 16th Global Youth Institute, in Taipei, Taiwan in July this year. For three weeks we lived a very different life with host families in Taipei. We enjoyed the beautiful 30°C temperature and what seemed like 1000% humidity.

The first week was devoted to allowing us to get to know the other students in the program, as well as learning more about their respective countries including the United States, Germany, Latvia, Russia and Taiwan. A four day camp at Taichung was the perfect setting for this. The GYI motto, "we met as strangers, we grew as friends, we parted as one", was clearly coming to life.

By this stage, a number of stark contrasts between Adelaide and Taipei were becoming evident. Numerous students noted they had been stared at by the Taiwanese citizens, especially whilst on the MRT (metro). We were also shocked to find that the Taiwanese had never heard of having eight hours' sleep, five-and-a-half to six being the average for most high school students.

After an exciting evening at the puppet theatre, in which an Aussie who will remain nameless managed to knock the head off a puppet, the more serious side of the GYI commenced. The last two weeks included many different speeches from important Taiwanese, such as the Minister of Foreign Affairs and a telecommunication company CEO. It also allowed us all a brief camp, in which students attempted rafting, and prepared for and participated in a Model United Nations (MUN).


Very close relationships were formed between the group participants from around the world. This can be seen in the

Overseas Tours

German Tour, 11 April to 2 May

On the 11th of April 2006, 10 boys from Prince Alfred College, along with one student from Seymour, and two staff members, German teacher Mrs Monica McCauley and Head of Rowing Mr Darren Potts, congregated at Adelaide Airport in great anticipation, as we were about to embark on the inaugural Prince Alfred College German Study Tour. Two weeks of touring around Germany, seeing marvelous sights in München, Nürnberg, Leipzig, Dresden and Berlin, was followed by a week with a German homestay family and schooling in Hildesheim, a picturesque little town situated near Hanover.

The first few days were spent exploring München and nearby tourist destinations, with the group spending a day at the extravagant Neuschwanstein castle, where arguably one of the biggest attractions was the masses of snow, which many of us thoroughly enjoyed putting to good use. The trip to Dachau, the former concentration camp during World War 2, was a revealing experience. While there, we showed the utmost respect in a place involved in a shameful chapter in a wonderful country's history. After visits to Leipzig and Dresden, we spent the next five days in Berlin, where we were able to see the remnants of the East-West Berlin division, as well as gaining a deeper understanding of the issues involved and the lives affected. We visited the celebrated Pergamon Museum which houses artifacts the Germans have acquired over the years that would otherwise have been destroyed. A memorable afternoon was spent at the Olympia Stadion, the venue of the 2006 Fußballweltmeisterschaft (soccer world cup) final, pondering the excitement in Germany of the weeks to come.

During the last week, we were hosted by families of German students from the Hildesheim High School, which was a fantastic experience for all. It gave us the chance to experience up-close many aspects of German culture and



family life, as well as to look on in astonishment and envy as the German students enjoyed the afternoons, since their school day finished at around 1 pm. Overall, the trip was a tremendously rewarding experience, and while certain aspects of life remain similar to ours in Australia, all students were taken out of their comfort zone, ensuring they reaped the full benefits of the experience. All of us wish to give Mrs Monica McCauley our utmost thanks for her meticulous preparation of the tour, for without her none of this would have been possible.


PACCC



Prince Alfred College's two Open A Badminton teams dominated the sport once again this season. Despite losing many of last year's strongest players, including six of the eight 2005 Intercollegiate players, both teams enjoyed great success.

The teams powered through Term 1 this year, only losing to one school each. The Open A1 team managed to gain a well-earned 6(151):6(147) victory over Glenunga International High School, and then also won all five reverse singles games. Glenunga is traditionally one of the strongest of our opponents, and their teams have defeated us the past two years. The Open A1 team also managed to snatch victory from another of our close rivals, Adelaide High, a team which also won against us in 2005. The score, 6(126):6(117) shows just how hard everyone had to fight to win this match.

The main event in the 2006 Badminton calendar was the annual Intercollegiate match against our biggest rivals, St Peter's College. Coming off a 9–0 win in 2005, the team was careful not to underestimate our opponents. This was reflected in the sheer number of hours and amount of effort put into training by every member of the Intercol squad.

This year's Intercol was held at St Peter's College, giving Saints the home ground advantage. Despite this, the size

and volume of the Princes crowd dwarfed that of the home team, definitely helping to motivate the team throughout the night. Play began with the three doubles matches played simultaneously on all courts. With lightning speed, the powerful third doubles pair, Davor Pavlin-Premrl and Lewis Graham, annihilated their opponents, dropping only three points in the entire two set game. Shortly afterwards the second doubles pair, Richard Seglenieks and Winston Luu, comfortably won their game in two sets, putting Princes ahead 2–0 very early in the night. By far the most exciting and closest of the doubles matches

was played by the first pair, Tanawat Sutuntivorakoon and Dong Hee Lee. After narrowly losing the first set, hard work and determination saw them win the next two sets to give the team a solid 3–0 lead at the end of the doubles.

The singles players then walked onto the court for the next matches. Davor managed a close two point win in his first set and then with his superior fitness he walked all over his opponent to win the second set convincingly. Lewis was unlucky to be down at the end of his first set, but bounced back amazingly, only allowing his opponent to score eight points in the remaining two sets. The Princes Intercol team now had an unassailable 5-0 lead, but the match of the night was still being fought on the first court. Winston, appeared extremely evenly matched with his opponent in the first set which he narrowly won 17-15. The second set saw him worn down and was the biggest win Saints achieved on the night. Come third set, however, Winston got a second burst of energy and ended with a very solid win. The first three singles were then played by Tanawat, Richard and Dong. These players were generally older and more experienced than the rest of the team and this was seen in the convincing manner in which they won. Not one of Saints' first three singles players scored double figures across the three straight set Princes victories.





Activities

What a year it's been to serve as President of the Association. 
