Headmaster's Report

2008 has been a significant year in the history of Prince Alfred College. This has been our 139th year of operation and we look forward to celebrating our 140th Anniversary in 2009. The second edition of *A History of Prince Alfred College*, by Ron Gibbs, was launched on October 17. It chronicles all 139 years of the school and is a wonderful record of our significant history.

This year has been dominated by initiatives in school organisation, which will see the establishment of a three schools model - Preparatory, Middle and Senior - next year. New teams have also been formed in Finance and School Operations, Community Relations, and Student Life, a new department in the school which is responsible for all co-curriculum programs offered to students. The capital expansion of the College has also been significant this year: we have seen the opening of the Wilfred Cooper Building, the John Dunning Building and our new Wambana Campus on the Yorke Peninsula. Considerable progress has also been made with our Strategic Plan, New Horizons.

At the beginning of the year a newly structured School Council came into effect. This was the result of a Governance Review undertaken several years ago, which required a change

to the Prince Alfred College Act by the Parliament of South Australia. The new Council is a more appropriate model of governance, which suits the needs of a modern school. Mr Bruce Spangler has once again chaired the Prince Alfred College Council with the support of Mr Craig Nicholls as Deputy Chairman, Mr Jeff Ellison as Treasurer and Mrs Fleur Michell as Secretary. The Finance and Building Committees of Council have continued their important work, chaired by Mr Jeff Ellison and Mr Craig Nicholls respectively. The work of the Building Committee is strongly

evident in the capital expansion and facility improvement throughout the school. The Finance Committee works side by side, supporting the development of PAC, to ensure appropriate resources are allocated in the best interests of our students and the school community.

At the Council Retreat in March this year, it was agreed to establish a new subcommittee in the area of Organisational Development and Strategic Human Resource Management. This committee is chaired by Mr John Harry, and will play an important role in securing quality staff and making appropriate provision for human resource requirements for the future.

The Rev Graham Vawser, former Moderator of the Uniting Church, has continued on Council as the Moderator's representative this year. His work is important with respect to sustaining the Christian culture and Uniting Church ethos of Prince Alfred College. I extend, on behalf of the school, sincere thanks to retiring members of Council, Rev Dr Adrian Brown and Dr Barbara Spears.

Prince Alfred College can now boast outstanding facilities for all students from Kindergarten to Year 12. In March, the Wilfred Cooper Building was blessed and opened. This building is named in honour of the significant bequest made to the school by Wilfred Cooper, whose generosity supported the funding of a major upgrade of the former Centenary Wing in the Secondary School. This modern building includes a covered courtyard, classrooms for Mathematics and Business Education, generous locker and access areas for students, and office accommodation for staff. It connects with the Neil Smart Building to provide a magnificent space for teaching and learning.

In May, the Mayor of Southern Yorke Peninsula, Mr Ray Agnew, formally opened Wambana, a \$2.5 million development which provides facilities for our Extended Stay Program for Year 9 students. Wambana means wisdom and knowledge in the local

Narungga language, making it a very appropriate name for this five-week long experiential learning program. Wambana is situated on six and a half acres of coastal land at Point Turton and includes six wardlis (or accommodation units), a learning centre, a director's residence, and sheds. It has been designed as an environmentally sustainable facility, incorporating solar power and heating, recycled water, and rainwater storage. It is an important example to our students, encouraging awareness of environmental sustainability and greater regard for the future of our planet,

In June we were thrilled that Mrs
Beverley Haig (daughter of the sixth
Headmaster, Mr John Dunning) joined us
for the opening of the final stage of the
Preparatory School Master Plan, named
in honour of her father. This \$2.5 million

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project provides the Preparatory School with a gymnasium, classrooms for music and languages, spaces for Out of School Hours Care, toilets, change rooms and a tuck shop. John Dunning was a highly accomplished sportsman and would be pleased that his contribution to the school has been honoured in this way.

In October this year, work began on a \$2 million development to provide for our Kindergarten students and Early Learning Program. This building is a redevelopment of the site formerly occupied by Princes Parade, adjacent to the school's entrance on the Parade West. It will provide early learning programs and child care for students aged two to four, and accommodate 110 pre-schoolers. To be completed in May 2009, it will lead to the relocation of the current Kindergarten in the Preparatory School, which will be redeveloped to provide an exciting new space for our Reception classes. I extend particular thanks to Mrs Mel-Bishop, Director of the Kindergarten, and Ms Karen O'Neill, a consultant in early learning education, for their significant work in establishing a very new concept for pre-school children. I also thank Mr Alan Daws for his role as Project Manager and his work in coordinating our significant capital works program for the last twelve months.

The current Strategic Plan, New Horizons, defines our vision to build on our proud tradition to be a world-class school for boys. Launched in 2005, it was designed to develop the strengths and successes of the past and project the school into the future. It has four key goals and forty initiatives, which set targets for progress in teaching and learning, resources and environment, leadership and governance, and values and culture. The majority of the plan will be completed this year, and the Council has made plans for a consultation process across the school community from the start of 2009, which will see the establishment of a new strategic plan for Princes to the end of 2012.

In 2008, key initiatives have focused on improving knowledge and process management, the development of a cohesive curriculum framework from K to 12 and the introduction of a new, integrated computer system. The focus remains on the students, with respect to

building a rich learning environment, a relevant and challenging curriculum and a diverse co-curriculum, as well as ensuring student well-being.

The Pathways to Excellence project, using the Australian Business Excellence Framework, has continued to direct our initiatives in quality assurance and continual improvement. In 2009, we will embark on Stage 2 of Pathways to Excellence, which will see a focus on leadership development, human resource strategy, and improved information and communication systems.

In March, an Educational Leadership Review was undertaken by Dr Jennifer Nicol from Perth. The outcomes of this review have led to the implementation of new concepts in school organisation, beginning next year. The focus will be onacademic leadership, staff performance and review, achievement standards and outcomes, and mission and values. A new Executive structure will also be implemented, comprising the Heads of the Preparatory School, Middle School and Senior School, the Directors of Student Life, Community Relations, and Finance and School Operations, together with the Headmaster. Mr Nicholas de Dear, from Ivanhoe Grammar School in Melbourne, will take up the role of Head of Senior School, and Mr Peter Karamoshos from the Australian International School in Singapore has been appointed Head of Middle School. Mr Neil Andary will continue as Head of Preparatory School. Mr Tony Ashdown and Mr Justin Sinclair will remain in their respective leadership roles in Community Relations and Finance and School Operations, Mr Stephen Clohesy, currently Head of Personal and Physical Development, will lead the new Student Life department. This department will comprise all student activity programs, including boarding, music, sport, House events and other non-academic programs throughout the school.

During the year, Mr Ken-Watson has served as Acting Head of Secondary School and Mr Richard Bruford as Acting Deputy. Both have made a significant contribution to the Secondary School throughout 2008, and the school honours their contribution in this transitional phase of leadership development. Mr Richard Bruford will take up the role of Dean of Studies in the Senior School next year and Mr Ken Watson will undertake important responsibilities in meeting compliance and accountability requirements.

The current School Executive

Committee is chaired by the Headmaster and has involved the Heads of Secondary and Preparatory Schools, Rev Trevor Klar, Mr Tony Ashdown and Mr Justin Sinclair. This committee has been instrumental in important developments for the school this year; most significantly, the restructuring which emerged from the recommendations from the Educational Leadership Review. I extend the greatest of thanks to Mrs Margaret Gleaves, who has supported the work of the School Executive and my work as Headmaster during the year.

The school has benefited from many new appointments this year, particularly Mr Craig McFarlane as Deputy Head of Preparatory School and Mr Kelvin Sparks as Preparatory School Curriculum Co-ordinator. The Preparatory School not only offers a magnificent facility, but outstanding curriculum and well-being programs for our younger boys. Other new staff members this year include Mr Allan Lloyd-Jones, an old scholar who became our Educational Psychologist after working in California for many years; Mr. Alan Daws, who began work this year in Project Management; and Mrs Julie Robertson, who joined the staff as Head of English.

At the end of this year, we will farewell three long-serving members of the Prince Alfred College staff. All have given many years of service to the school. We pay the greatest tribute to the contributions of Mr Andrew Buxton, who has worked in many positions, most recently as Director of Curriculum in the Secondary School; Mr Craig Bowyer, whose contribution to the Arts programs in the school has been enormous; and Mrs Erica Parker, who has taught Junior Primary classes since 1991.

We said farewell this year to a number of key staff, including Mrs Leeanne Brook, Mr Russell Gardiner, Mr Bill Fechner, Mrs Margaret Giddings, Mrs Kaye Leaker, Mr Alex McLachlan, Mrs Elizabeth Murphy and Mr Luke Ritchie. We wish them well in retirement and in new fields. We also

acknowledge the contract and short term members of staff employed in 2008 to cover staff on various forms of leave thank you all.

The current House program has continued to strengthen since its introduction in 2004. The four Houses of Cotton, Taylor, Waterhouse and Watsford provide a strong identity for the boys. House spirit is highly evident at Athletics and Swimming Carnivals and other House-based activities. In the Secondary School, the House structure has been enhanced by the collaborative work of Mr Scott Parker, Ms Evie Morelli, Mr Sam Jordan and Mr Nick Joy, who have been the Heads of House. I thank all teachers for supporting the House activities, and for their efforts to build a strong sense of House identity from K to 12. Next year, the House system will be maintained; however, the pastoral care and student welfare program will be co-ordinated by a year level structure, led by Year Coordinators.

The Preparatory School Athletics was won by Watsford House, and the House Cross Country by Taylor, which also won the Swimming Carnival. In the Secondary School, Taylor House won both the Swimming and the Athletics Carnivals. The Wesley Cup for the overall winning House in the Secondary School was won by Watsford House. Points are awarded from House competitions and from Effort grades achieved over the year.

The Prince Alfred College Boarding House has been full all year. 109 boys have enjoyed boarding life in 2008. Mr Sam Cheesman has continued his outstanding work as Head of Boarding, with the assistance of Mr Peter Hopkins as his Deputy, and Mr Chris Nicholls. A number of other staff support the Boarding House, including the Resident Masters; Ms Hayley Howard; Mrs Pauline Coupe and Mrs Colleen Fagioli in the Laundry; Ms Patricia Cook and other

Housekeeping staff; the Chaplain, Rev
Trevor Klar; Mr Peter Hughes and the
Maintenance staff; and Mrs Caroline
Lenman and Ms Anna Thomson in the
Health Centre. Mr Peter Hopkins will leave
the Boarding House at the end of the
year and we thank him for his significant
contribution over the last two years, as
well as his earlier work as a teacher. Mr
Philip McLaughlin, who will be joined by
his family, has accepted the Deputy Head
of Boarding role, beginning next year.

James Murdoch has been an excellent Captain of Boarding, and has led a new tearn of Boarding House Prefects this year. Once again, Boarders' Day in September was an occasion to celebrate the importance of the boarding community to our school.

The International Students' Transition Program, introduced in 2006, has developed as an important provision in support of the language development and cultural induction of our international students. Ms Mani White, our International Students Coordinator, has been strongly supported by Ms Anna Polias, Ms Robyn Hillman and Mr Chris Sellers. The school has enrolled international students for more than fifty years, and we are privileged to have these young men as members of our school community.

The Year 12 students who completed the 2007 South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE), and the International Baccalaureate Diploma (IB) achieved excellent results. Seventy-seven students completed the SACE, and nineteen completed the IB. These students were awarded a total of eighteen merit scores; five for SACE and thirteen for the IB. In particular, we congratulate IB students Brian Chui, TER 99.95; Vincent Cheung, TER 99.9; Chris Harry, TER 99.8; and SACE student Benjamin Cody, TER 99.05. All four students placed within the top 1% of students in the state. We also congratulate our boarders, in particular James Prest and Nathan Daniel who both achieved an impressive TER of 97.55.

Overall, 5.2% of our students were placed in the top 1% of the state, 8.3% in the top 5%, 20.8% in the top 10%, and 44.8% of our students were in the top 20% of the state. Many of our students achieved beyond expectations, and we wish them well as they enter the world beyond Princes. On the basis of the results of the IB and SACE examinations for 2007, the following prizes were

awarded: The Edward Spicer Prize and Dux of the School went to Brian Chui, the EB Colton Prize (*Proxime Accessit* to the Dux of the School) went to Vincent Cheung, the Malpas Prize for Science was jointly awarded to Chris Harry and Philipp Allgeuer, James Prest won the Longbottom Prize for Mathematics and William Gray was awarded the Colton Prize for Arts and Languages.

This year, Lachlan Stranks has served as Captain of School and Jack Stephens has been Vice-Captain. Both young men have fulfilled the responsibilities of student leadership in an exemplary fashion. They have been well supported by the Prefects and Captains of each House and of Sport and Music. The Preparatory School has been ably led by Captain Charlie Hall, Vice Captain Riley Terrell, and other leaders. There are many opportunities for student leadership at Prince Alfred College and much has been achieved through student participation in decision making, most notably the Student Forum in the Secondary School and the Student Representative Council in the Preparatory School

The Prefects take full responsibility for the organisation of the Red and White formal. Held at the Convention Centre, it was a wonderful night and enjoyed by all boys and their partners. It was a pleasure to be in the company of our young men in Years 11 and 12.

The 11th Gerard Innovation Lecture was presented by Dr Sarah Blunden from the University of South Australia Sleep Research Institute. Her address referred to sleep disorders, particularly amongst young people, and the serious impact it can have on our well-being. The Gerard family continue to sponsor this annual event and we are indebted to them for the special contribution they make to our school.

The summer and winter Intercollegiate contests are important events in the life of the school. The summer contests saw strong wins by the Princes teams in swimming and tennis. Tennis has continued to thrive, with many of our players attaining national and international ranking. The cricket match resulted in a draw, after four days of competitive play. We were third in the Head of the River this year, but won the Second VIII and Year 10 events. Our swimmers were State School Champions.

The winter games were successful, with PAC defeating Saints for the third

consecutive year in football (19–19 to 6–5), and winning 6–0 win in hockey. Our basketball and rugby teams lost in close games, and the soccer was a one-all draw. Our athletes performed well in the Achilles Cup, with PAC coming 6th overall. Squash reaped five premierships from a possible twelve teams which entered the competition.

Our Football First XVIII had a very successful year, not only winning the Intercol for the third successive year, but also the State Knockout Competition, defeating Sacred Heart College for the first time since 1984. We extend our thanks to the coach, Mr Gary Jenkinson, and his support team — Mr Nick Joy, Mr Vaughn Huddleston and Mr Stephen Clohesy. The First XI Hockey also had an outstanding season, remaining undefeated. Many thanks go to the coach, Mr Bob Claxton.

Sport is thriving throughout the school, with considerable improvement evident in the Preparatory School teams. This is largely due to the introduction of Sports Development Coaches, who now work with all students and all coaches in all sports in the Preparatory and Secondary Schools. The work of Mr Mark Dell'Oro, Director of Sport; Mr Tim Weatherald, Sports Coordinator in the Preparatory School; and all staff involved in our sporting programs is applauded.

This year's musical production was Salad Days, under the direction of Mr Peter Hopkins and Mrs Parnela Freeman. Lead roles included Joshua Kapitza, James Mumford, Andrew Pederick, Young Chan Lee, and Simon Barnett. The Princes Music-Theatre Company has thrived since its inception three years ago, and the boys very much enjoy working with the girls from all five independent girls' schools in this important annual event. Similarly, our Drama productions during the year were first class. The senior students performed Macbeth, putting on a magnificent show produced by Mr Michael Steer.

The Preparatory School Performing Arts Celebration in Term 2 showcased every boy in the school. Each year level from Reception to Year 5 performed a song or two and the Year 6 and 7 boys performed the musical *Men at Work*, written and produced by the boys and staff. It was a wonderful celebration of the joy of dance, song and performance. Mrs Mandy Bell,

Mrs Kellie McCauley and Mr Andrew Newhouse are to be commended on their outstanding efforts in music and artistic direction.

The school has a great tradition in cultural programs including Chess, Debating, Mooting and Music. The Mooters, including Cameron Coventry, Llewellyn Wood and Tom Gleeson, were unsuccessful this year but demonstrated impressive legal minds to the Judge. The Princes Chess team won the State Competition and will attend the National Finals in Sydney, and also won the Intercol for the first time in five years. The boys' enthusiasm for Debating remains high with teams representing the school in all year groups. The Debating Intercol, always hotly contested, was lost to Saints this year.

Our Music programs have been strengthened this year under the leadership of Mrs Pamela Freeman, with support from Bands Director, Mr Andrew-Newhouse; Director of Strings, Ms Ema-Berberyan; and Choir Director, Mr Tasso Bouyessis. Mr Robert Dawe retired from the school after ill health and we acknowledge his enormous contribution to the Chapel Choir over nearly twenty years. The Bands have had particular success with performances at the Governor Hindmarsh Hotel and awards at the Mount Gambier Jazz Festival and the SA Yamaha Bands Competition. Our musicians offer much to the school and we thank them for their contribution throughout the year.

Overseas tours this year included a Basketball Tour to the United States, a Language and Cultural Tour to China and a tour of France by the Tennis team. The Cricketers enjoyed a highly successful tour of the United Kingdom. Warm. appreciation is extended to the staff leading these tour groups: Mr Graham Baird, Mr Craig Bowyer, Mr Jurgen Kracht and Mr Peter Williams. Three Year 11 boys were joined by three students from Cornerstone College to participate in the Global Youth Institute Conference in Des Moines, lowa in the USA. The group was led by Mr Peter Hopkins and the 2007 Vice Captain of School, Brian Chui-

An important annual event is the Princes Outreach Program, held at Scotts Creek, where our Year 11 boys mentor disabled young men. Coordinated by Mr Graham Baird, this is perhaps the best example of our Community Service program. Many other Community Service activities exist; I am thankful for the work of Mr Craig Bowyer as CAS Coordinator and Mr Tim Agnew for his work with World Vision. The Preparatory School students make a huge commitment to Community Service.

The school is strongly supported by the Parents' and Friends' Associations, the Prince Alfred Old Collegians Association, and the Foundation. I acknowledge the contribution of the two P&F Presidents. Mrs Mary Evens and Mrs Rachel Johnston. The P&F makes a wonderful contribution to fundraising and friend-raising. The Art Show was once again a fantastic event enjoyed by a large crowd. The Prep P&F Quiz Night was a lot of fun. Mr Andrew Chapman has been an outstanding President of the PAC Foundation and worked beyond expectations to support Prince Alfred College. The Martini Ball, with a James Bond theme, was a great example of community support. The school is sincerely grateful to all members of the Foundation Board.

This year, the Prince Alfred Old
Collegians Association has been in
the good hands of the President, Mr
Andrew Clarkson. Old Scholars Week
was celebrated in July, culminating in the
Old Old Boys' Assembly and the Annual
Dinner, which attracted 630 Old Reds.
Many Old Scholars enjoy an ongoing
association with their school through the
Old Scholars sporting teams, with many
having considerable success this year.
Special thanks go to the members of the
PAOCA Committee.

In November, more than 600 guests gathered to celebrate the 125th Anniversary of Rowing at Princes. The school acknowledges the work of Mrs Annabel Blanch, who has recorded a fascinating history of rowing at this school with the publication *From Tubs* to *Carbon Fibre*. Her enthusiasm for this anniversary and the behind the scenes work of her committee is commended.

We will look back on 2008 as a year of significant change in the life of the school. Our enrolment is strong, our facilities are impressive, the curriculum now meets the exacting requirements of international standards, and we have worked to implement a new structure and model of school organisation which will serve us well into the future. We look forward to 2009 which will be our 140th anniversary year. We have good reasons to celebrate not only our past, but an exciting future.

Chaplain's Report

During the last twelve months, chaplaincy has continued to focus on the spiritual lives and welfare of students. After sixteen years of dedicated service as Choirmaster and Voice Teacher, Robert Dawe reluctantly decided to retire following heart surgery in January this year. When Robert came to Princes in 1992, there was very little singing in the school, but within a few years, Robert had established the Chapel Choir and started presenting performances of traditional choral music. The Choir has become the backbone of our choral program, supporting all the school services as well as several churches in our community. Robert's Junior Chorale has also inspired audiences with their pure, beautiful singing. Hundreds of students have passed through his studio over the years, with many students continuing their involvement in music well beyond Princes, and some entering into professional careers in singing.

Robert Dawe's career in opera, oratorio and on the concert platform spans over fifty years. He studied at the Elder Conservatorium and was a parttime teacher there from 1981 to 2007. His concert work took him regularly to all the Australian capital cities and he was regarded as an 'Elijah' of distinction, having sung the role countless times in every major concert venue in Australia. He has taken principal roles in over twenty-five operas and has performed in Adelaide, Perth, Brisbane, Hobart and Launceston. Robert Dawe was awarded the OAM in the Queen's Birthday Honours in 1989.

His influence at Prince Alfred
College will be ever-present; he will
be remembered for his enormous
contribution to the Choral and Vocal
program. For many years, Robert
awarded up to three sponsored voice
tuition scholarships each year, and it is
with considerable pride we will continue
this tradition; boys will be invited to
apply for the yearly Robert Dawe Voice
Scholarship. This award will be made at
Speech Night and an honour board will
be erected listing all future Scholarship
Awardees.

We wish Robert and his wife Ann a fulfilling and happy retirement together.

Libby's enjoyment of the outdoors, and of the challenges in activities like sailing and rock climbing, was continued upon her appointment to the teaching staff in 1998. On numerous occasions she accompanied groups of Year 10 students on their Peak Adventure camp, where she rejoiced in the personal growth of boys as they faced difficult challenges.

Libby's teaching role was in learning support where she made an enormous contribution to the learning and the wellbeing of many boys who found school life challenging. She was very patient with her boys as she encouraged them to develop their skills. Above all, however, she was always seeking to improve their self-confidence. For most boys who worked with Libby, her room was a haven where they were always encouraged and could feel safe.

Given her compassion, Libby was a constant advocate for students with learning difficulties, and she slowly made gains in the provisions for their learning needs. Such compassion was also evident amongst the staff, as she was a most thoughtful and supportive staff member who was very sensitive to the feelings of her colleagues and willing to go out of her way to help if she could. Libby's retirement at the end of Term 1 left a gap in the lives of both students and staff of Prince Alfred College.





Reception



Reception classrooms have been abuzz with activities in 2008!

We began the year with a PYP unit called 'I'm a School Boy Now'. We established our classroom rules and talked about how to make a happy school, where lots of people work and

their families originated. The boys showed great enthusiasm and a keen desire to learn about Australia, the country in which they live.


Aussie Animals, Oi Oi Oi!

Tell Me a Story



The 'Tell Me a Story' unit is a favourite for all Year 1 boys. This year the key task was to write a detailed narrative about an Australian animal, which was then published into a first edition bound book. Our boys enjoyed seeing their own book develop and experiencing the writing process, using a simple idea to create a book to share with others.

Father/Son Bedtime Story Night

This was the third year we have held this event and it was well attended by over three 300 boys, dads and other special guests. The Junior Primary teachers, Ms Chu, Mr Andary and Mr McFarlane presented a play adapted from the Chinese story, Tiki Tiki Tembo. The boys, dads and guests then returned to their classroom for supper and a bedtime story.

Science in the Kitchen

Boys are fascinated about how things work. In 'Science in the Kitchen', the boys conducted experiments related to everyday reactions that occur in the kitchen. We looked at the effect of heat and cold, freezing and boiling, liquids and solids and storage of food. The experiments were simple and fun to carry out. The boys learnt the correct procedure for conducting an




experiment, and also looked at safety in the kitchen.

Bodyworks

In Term 2, the boys learned about the muscular, digestive, skeletal and circulatory systems. It was evident to see how much they loved exploring interactive models of organs and systems. The boys were also lucky enough to have a few wonderful guest specialists, who presented the information on the different areas of the body. At the end of the research unit, the boys gave a presentation to the class about their chosen system to demonstrate the vast amount of knowledge they had attained.

Year 3 Camp

This year we went on a two-night camp at the Woodhouse Activity Centre in the Piccadilly Valley. The boys took part in various activities such as bush cooking, orienteering, attack and defend and some exciting problem solving games. After some initial trepidation during the first day, the boys quickly got into the camp spirit and had a fantastic time, returning home with new found maturity, responsibility and appreciation.

Chocolate

In Term 3 the boys went crazy for our 'chocolate' unit. They began by tasting and describing cacao beans, cocoa and dark, milk and white chocolates. Together they researched interesting facts about the discovery of chocolate and created a time line to show some of these events. Next the boys decided to create their own chocolates with individual boxes. It began with some market research, asking boys lots of classes questions about their favourite flavours and chocolate wrapper designs. This information was used to design and create their own chocolates and wrappers. The boys produced their boxes on the computers and by carefully folding and fastening, made them look like the real thing.

Rainforest

Trips to the Adelaide Zoo and the Bicentennial Tropical Conservatory in the Botanic Gardens were highlights of the boys' inquiry into rainforests. At the Conservatory we were able to handle a number of insects that live in such environments. Seeing some big spiders and scorpions was a treat that the boys liked. The zoo enabled us to study and see close up some of the endangered animals we had been researching at school. The honey bears and the monkeys kept the boys entertained with their antics.



Solar System

This year we introduced a new unit called 'Spaced Out', looking at the Solar System and our place within it. Boys naturally have a huge fascination with all things 'spacey' and it took a matter of minutes to establish that not only did the boys have incredible prior knowledge, but there were many burning questions to be answered! The boys were given display folders that they used to fill with their inquiry questions. Over several weeks they independently researched, using a variety of sources such as encyclopaedias, reference books and the internet. They were very proud of their completed reference folders. The night walk on the camp complemented this unit well, as the boys had a real opportunity to explore the galaxy.

Year 3/4/5

The year started with a Father and Son camp at Scotts Creek. We enjoyed the flying fox, canoeing, capsizing and camping in the tents. This was soon followed by the Year 5 camp, also at Scotts Creek, which in some aspects was even better than the Father and Son camp, because we had more time to enjoy with our friends. Although we came back tired and filthy, we had a fantastic time under the care of Mr Phil Noble, the co-ordinator of Outdoor Education. The Year 4s had a fun camp at Victor Harbor and the Year 3s had their camp in Term 4.



By Term 2, we were well and truly into learning mode, inventing balloon powered vehicles and visiting the SA Writers' Centre to gain valuable

writing skills. We also reviewed and critiqued authors' manuscripts, including much-published author Janeen Brian, who told us that she made many changes as a result of our ideas. 

A fresh new start

Next, we studied inventions in a unit titled 'Technological

Term 1



Term 2






2008 has been a year that we will never forget!


2008 has been a very busy year for the fifty-six boys in Year 6 and their teachers, Ms Burnard, Mr Cornthwaite and Mrs Polain.

















Head of the Secondary School's Report

by the success at these festivals.





Achieving Excellence

The 2008 Academic Year has been a relatively fruitful one for students from Prince Alfred College. While our examination performances from the Year 12 Class of 2007 were by our own high standards a little disappointing, outstanding performances during the year highlight that we have some great talent in our midst and much to look forward to with our future Year 12 results.

At the end of 2007, seventy-seven students completed the SACE, and nineteen the IB. These students were awarded a total of eighteen merit scores, five for SACE and thirteen for the IB. Outstanding performances were achieved by International Baccalaureate Diploma students Brian Chui (TER 99.95), Vincent Cheung (TER 99.9), Chris Harry (TER 99.8), and South Australia Certificate of Education student Benjamin Cody (TER 99.05). All four students placed within the top 1% of students in the state. Two of our boarders performed exceptionally well: James Prest and Nathan Daniel both achieved an impressive TER of 97.55. Overall, 5.2% of our students were placed in the top 1% of the state, 8.3% in the top 5%, 20.8% in the top 10%, and 44.8% of our students were in the top 20% of the state.

Our Mathematics students have once again produced outstanding performances. In the words of Mr Colaiacovo, 'we have some serious talent'. In the Australian Mathematics Competition, five students achieved individual prizes, which recognized their performances as being in the top 0.3% in the state. Our congratulations go to Tien Chen (Year 8), Vinh Thoi and Yoon-Seok Jang (Year 9), and Yao Ly and Nicholas Burton (Year 10), Overall, 8% of PAC entrants achieved in the top 2% of the state and 28% of entrants achieved in the top 15% of the state. Considering this competition attracts entrants from several countries around the world along with the best Mathematics students from Australia. these are outstanding achievements.

In the South Australian Mathematics Competition, three of our boys were placed in the top ten students for their respective divisions. Yunze Wang (Year 12) achieved third place in the Senior Division, Roberto Riedig (Year 10) achieved second place in the Intermediate Division and Joshua Gugliotta (Year 10) achieved fifth place in the Junior Division. In addition, forty-four High Distinctions were awarded to students across South Australia. Seven students from PAC made up a large chunk of the recipients, including Huan Zhang (Year 12), Nicholas Burton, Aaron Jin, Owen Yang and David Nguyen (Year 10), and Vinh Thoi and Tien Chen (Year 9).

The Mathematics Olympiad competitions are considered one of the most grueling and challenging academic competitions that students can undertake. It is fantastic to report that in the Australian Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad, of the 711 students that participated from across Australia, eight boys from Princes were involved. Drew Clements (Year 9), Yao Ly (Year 10) and Owen Yang (Year 10) all managed to obtain awards of Distinction. Credit status was achieved by Vinh Thoi (Year 9) and David Brown (Year 10). In the even more prestigious Australian Mathematics

Olympiad Contest, Roberto Riedig and Aaron Jin participated in the Senior Contest despite only being in Year 10! These boys were selected to partake in the contest as part of a field of seventy-eight and 100 students respectively, a wonderful achievement.

It is pleasing to see an increased number of boys engage in producing work that contributes to our Red Leaves literary journal each year. Notably, more students each year are submitting their poems and creative writing pieces into various competitions. Owen Yang and Nicholas Burton (Year 10), Alistair Young (Year 11) and Oliver Kabbani (Year 12) have all embraced the writing of poetry and are congratulated on having their works published in the Spring Poetry Anthology, launched on October 25. The publication of this work was part of a Spring Poetry Competition organised by Friendly Street Poets, who provided Adelaide's first regular, open-to-all poetry readings. Tien Chen (Year 8) also won a prize in The Advertiser Young Writers' Award in the Year 7-8 section. He is certainly a very gifted writer and we look forward to future successes.

The International Competitions and Assessments for Schools (ICAS) is conducted in several subjects by the University of New South Wales. Prince Alfred College has had a good track record of success in the annual Science competition. Students are tested in the areas of interpreting and applying data along with their investigating, problemsolving and logical thinking skills. Eleven boys were successful in achieving High Distinction Awards for this competition: Brodie Dobson-Keeffe, Harry Poulter and Oskar Thiele from Year 8; Drew Clements, James Elix and Morgan Price from Year 9; Richard Gale, David Piper and Owen Yang from Year 10; and Travis Cordingley and Angus McLaren from Year 11.

Worthy of note, Angus McLaren also received a scholarship to attend the International Space School in October. The School is a NASA-sponsored two- to three-week program for Year 11 and 12 students from around the world, aimed at introducing students to the various disciplines working in Human Space Flight. It also allows them to receive hands-on training from NASA Astronauts, Scientists, and Engineers and International Cosmonauts stationed at the NASA Johnson Space Center in Houston, Texas. The School is held at the prestigious campus of the University of Houston Clear Lake Extension, situated adjacent to the

NASA Johnson Space Center. Angus won the scholarship for his essay related to Space exploration.

Finally, it is always pleasing to wander through the Secondary School during September and October to see Art and Technology students busily working to complete their final works ready for assessment. Each year there is a high standard of work produced, which is acknowledged in our Year 12 results. On occasion, we have students who complete work of such a high standard that their work is acknowledged by other organizations. Owing to his attention to detail, conscientiousness and all-round woodwork ability, William Virgin (Year 12) was awarded one of the St Peters Rotary Club Annual Vocational Awards for PAC. His award will be presented at the Rotary Club's dinner on December 2 and he will receive a plaque, certificate and cheque in recognition of his efforts.

It goes without saying that both hard work and natural ability makes all the difference to achieving excellence at school and also throughout life. We wish our current Year 12s every success in their examinations and look forward to hearing of future successes in 2009.

Although these ideas did not take root,





Wow! What another fantastic year of Outdoor Education. The year started with old scholar Micha Jensen joining the Scotts Creek staff, along with Belinda Beisiegel and myself. This year, we delivered 41 programs to seven different schools, with over 1300 students from Years 2 to 11, making it one of the busiest and most rewarding years that I have been involved with.

We have had an abundance of different and sometimes extreme weather conditions this year, reaching a maximum of 55.4 °C and a minimum of -5 °C. We had four months with no rainfall and two months with over 25 mm. We had many days with a slight breeze and two days of winds in excess of 100 knots. We saw the building of a new jetty at Scotts Creek, the donation of a weather station from the Parents' and Friends' Association and the arrival of two new buildings to help add to our growing number of programs.

Throughout the year, several of our Outdoor Education programs operate away from our property at Scotts Creek. The Year 8s begin the year with the Pastoral Care camp at Goolwa, which plays a major role in integrating boys new to PAC with those boys who have spent their primary years in the Preparatory School.

The Year 4s complete their program down at Victor Harbor, learning body boarding, surf skills, fishing and team building. Highlights include spending many hours in the water at Horseshoe Bay, seeing penguins on Granite Island and visiting the exhilarating Greenhills Adventure Park.

From Year 5 to 8 the boys attend Scotts Creek, enjoying many outdoor pursuits and challenges on the river. The Scotts Creek experience for Princes students begins with the ever popular Year 5 Father and Son Weekend. This program is a fantastic opportunity for dads to see the campsite at Scotts Creek, where the boys will be enjoying their outdoor education for the next four years.

The Year 5 boys then return later in the term to participate in a number of activities, including canoeing, orienteering, rock climbing and Aboriginal Studies. Boys can also cook their own pizzas, produce art work and explore the Aboriginal history of the area.

The Year 6 boys have a great opportunity to work on their canoeing and orienteering skills as they progress to the extended courses. They also enjoy an overnight expedition into the Mallee, carrying their gear, setting up camp and cooking dinner around the campfire. Upon return, they are introduced to the flying fox and indoor climbing, as well as environmental education.

The Year 7 programs are highlighted with an overnight expedition down the Murray. The boys set up tents, prepare and cook their own meals and enjoy a cheesecake making competition around the campfire. Returning to the base, boys go through the larger orienteering course, do some more rock climbing and participate in the Water Watch and Land Care programs.

PAC programs at Scotts Creek finish as the Year 8s embark on a two and a half day kayaking expedition down the Murray, followed by two days of climbing on the high ropes course. Boys paddle up to 30 km, and are responsible for planning, purchasing and cooking their own meals while on the expedition.

Our Outdoor Education culminates with the Year 10 Peak Adventure program. This year, boys participated in white water rafting, scuba diving, surfing, bushwalking, rock climbing and cross-country skiing across South Australia and Victoria. The program hopes to reward boys with the opportunity to participate in a six day expedition in an activity of their choosing. Boys are once again responsible for all their own food, equipment and planning of the trip. This program is a highlight for many of the boys and a good way for them to enjoy many of the unique and superbly beautiful natural environments around the country.

The success and strength of our Year 11 boys during the leadership programs was again fantastic. The willingness of these boys to give up a week of important study to participate in all our outdoor programs and give something back to PAC is truly remarkable. The skills, attitudes, and willingness to volunteer and participate show the great leadership qualities many of these boys have already developed.

We look forward to the new Year 2 BBQ meet and greet, the Year 3 Woodhouse program and the Year 11 Outreach program during Term 4. Here at Scotts Creek, we have enjoyed delivering these programs to your boys and we are truly grateful for all the support and encouragement we have received over the year. We hope that your son has gained something from his experiences and we look forward to seeing him again next year.

From all of us here at Scotts Creek, thank you and enjoy the outdoors!

Chinese Language and Culture Tour

On Thursday April 10, the sixth triennial Chinese Language and Culture Tour departed from Adelaide International Airport. Our rather large group of fifty-five students, parents and teachers from Prince Alfred College and Wilderness School embarked on a three-week tour around China.

Not much sleep had taken place the night before, as the majority of the travellers were too excited. We had to endure a two-hour wait in Adelaide Airport, before taking off on the approximately six-hour trip from Adelaide to Singapore. Although most of us had brought books, iPods and games, many of them were never taken out of their bags, thanks to the constant talking and swapping of seats. Once arriving in Singapore Airport, we were forced to wait another seven and a half hours before leaving on another flight to Beijing. Initially, we thought it was going to be a slow and tedious wait, but it turned out to be the opposite, as all of us rushed off to see what we could buy in the abundance of shops around the terminal. The subsequent six-hour flight to Beijing was relatively quick, as most people fell asleep.

My first memory of China, when stepping out of the aeroplane, was how tremendously big the airport was! After going through customs and organising the group, we went on a bus to the hotel. When travelling around China, there were a few major aspects which immediately grabbed our attention: the pollution, the population, the largeness and the lack of discipline on the road.

During our five days in Beijing, we saw all the most-visited tourist sites, including the Temple of Heaven, Tiananmen Square, the Mao Zedong Memorial Hall, the Forbidden City, the Great Wall, the Ming Tombs, the Summer Palace and Lama Temple. However, the places that most excited our group were the shops. We visited places like the famous Silk Market; Liulichang, an antique shopping street; Wangfujing, a larger equivalent of Rundle Mall; and some of the millions of street vendors. We had the chance to use our limited Chinese skills in bargaining for presents for ourselves, and for our families and friends back home.

During meal times, we had the chance to experience the different style of foods and methods of eating. By the end of the trip, although most of us had honed our ability





to use chopsticks, we were very tired of Chinese food and were ready for a large steak and Australian KFC. I was lucky enough, in the first few days, to visit one of my Chinese friend's families and to eat tortoise soup, with extras including jellyfish and deer meat.

Our next stop was Jinan, the capital of South Australia's sister province of Shandong. Once there, we visited our sister school, the Senior High School attached to Shandong Teachers' University. There, we had to attend Chinese lessons three hours a day for a week, and we had the opportunity to experience a deeper insight into the true Chinese culture.

After classes every day, we went on excursions to see sights of Jinan and Shandong Province. These places included the Jinan Zoo, the China Council for the Promotion of International Trade, Baotu Springs, Quancheng Square and Qianfo Hill. One night, we each paired up with one of the students from the school in Jinan and went out to dinner with them. This was a wonderful opportunity to either embarrass ourselves by nodding or shaking our head when they talked to us in Chinese, or, if they spoke English, have a wonderful conversation. On the weekend, we visited Qufu, the birthplace of the famous Chinese philosopher Confucius, and the sacred mountain, Mt Tai. After so much good weather, it unfortunately bucketed down on us the day we were scheduled to climb half of the 6666 steps of Mt Tai. This did not, however, discourage our teachers. While the students and parents climbed up, cold, wet and tired, our teachers took the bus up!

On the last week of our trip, we travelled to Qingdao, where the sailing events were held for the Olympics. This was a beautiful contrast to the inland cities. We were introduced to a Chinese beach, where sand was very hard to come by because of all the people.

We then took a train to Shanghai, where we spent two days. We took a tour of the city and then went to Datong High School, where we were shown around and allowed to participate in a lesson about the geography of Shanghai. The next day, we visited the Yufe Temple, the Shanghai Museum and Nanjing Road, another upsized equivalent of Rundle Mall. In the evening, we took a pleasant night cruise along the Huangpu River, celebrating our last night in China.


Basketball Tour

Wikipedia — what's it got to do with science?

Wikipedia is a widely-used information source, but many schools and universities do not accept it as a reference. This stance may be flawed, however, as the method used by Wikipedia — a democracy of knowledge — is similar to methods used in the scientific field. This can be demonstrated by a comparison with the highly respected science journal Nature.

Democracy of knowledge is where knowledge is legitimated by a consensus rather than by those who have the highest credentials. This could be demonstrated by Steven Hawking claiming that a piece of knowledge is true, while ten other physicists who are not quite as prestigious claim it is false. If the democracy of knowledge occurs, then the piece of knowledge will be known to be false.

One of the main reasons that people claim that scientific journals like Nature are more valid than Wikipedia is that Nature uses a peer review system. In Nature, articles get short listed by the main editors, and then sent to professionals in that subject area to test the article's soundness and to detect any major errors in calculation, experimental practice and theory. The main idea behind the peer review system is to find any errors that the person who is writing the article may have made.

The issues with the peer review process stem from the number of people who examine the articles and the external forces influencing those people. Scientists rely on past theories in order to make new ones, and are generally opposed to new ideas that threaten old theories. If a previous theory is proven false, it could result in funding cuts, which can make scientists reluctant about new ideas that challenge old theories. Though one scientist, who finds the data, may be correct, the other scientists could see it as a threat to old theory and cast aspersions over it.

The peer review system also assumes that because someone has more credentials, they are more correct than someone with fewer credentials. This may result in the accurate information being disbelieved because someone with better credentials disagrees. However credentials do not necessarily make someone more correct.

In fact, the peer review system has similar problems to the democracy of knowledge used by Wikipedia. Wikipedia uses a democracy of knowledge whereby the valid theory is decided by what most people believe is the truth. This is similar to the peer review system used by Nature to determine knowledge, because even if the person submitting the article had the most credentials, the article's worth would be determined by the majority decision of the peer review panel.

The system of legitimating knowledge in Wikipedia involves the articles being checked first by the main moderators and administrators, then the specialist in the area, then by everyone else who reads the page. Most

people claim this as a fault on Wikipedia's part, as anybody could edit the page and take out valuable information. However, the majority of people reading scientific pages on Wikipedia would be either scientists or students. This gives a wider group of people who can decide on what the accurate knowledge claim is.

Wikipedia's democracy of knowledge can be praised somewhat, as the decision-makers are less interested about funding, and more interested about obtaining a neutral, accurate knowledge source. Credentials are not always the best way of determining validity. This has been shown most recently with the extremely intelligent child from India, Akrit Jaswal, who taught himself medicine and started engaging theories about a cure for cancer. This child has very few if any credentials, however his ideas can be as sound as or even more so than some people with better credentials. The use of credentials is a potentially flawed approach; the objective collaboration of many people could create a more unbiased truth.

While Wikipedia is criticized for its open editing policies, and Nature praised for its peer review system, these claims are not well-deserved by either group. The peer review system is essentially the same as Wikipedia's policy, except with less people given the option to decide whether it is correct. This could be seen as a less valid method of legitimating knowledge in comparison with Wikipedia, as with more people checking it, the chance for a better knowledge claim increased. Wikipedia's method, although similar to Nature's, has the advantage in that, due to the large number of people, neutrality can be gained more easily.

In 2008, Prince Alfred College achieved many goals and improvements in music. As in previous years, our bands, ensembles and orchestra have won all sorts of prizes in different contests. In terms of individuals, many students are assisted by the specialized music teachers, and have developed their talent and professional skill in this school. However, what is most important is the encouragement and motivation from students' parents, and also the hard work put in by each musician.

Three of our bands competed at the Mt Gambier Generations in Jazz festival with considerable success. In the SA Schools Band and Orchestra Festival, all our bands and our orchestra succeeded in winning awards. Seventy-five ensembles competed in seven sections at this year's Festival, with the adjudicators all complimenting the high standards. In particular, both Big Band 1 and the Senior Concert Band won gold awards.

During this year, the PAC orchestra, led by the String Director Ema Berberyan, co-operated with St Peters Girls College to perform in our Concert Bands and Orchestra Showcase, and at the St Peters Girls College Spring Festival. I believe that all the boys in the orchestra have gained a lot of experience from working with the girls. Also, this is the first time the concert bands and orchestra have combined their showcase together. For individual achievements, I congratulate Albert Wu as the most outstanding soloist of this year. He won the Under 16 Concerto Competition at the Adelaide Eisteddfod and had a successful concert, performing the Saint-Saens Piano Concerto with the Burnside Symphony Orchestra.

The Music Council (which consists of students from Years 7 to 12), together with Mrs Freeman, has contributed some excellent ideas, including the purchase of recording

Band Report 2008

For the Prince Alfred College band program, 2008 has been abundant with challenge, fulfilment and success. Spurring on this thriving program is the overwhelmingly enthusiastic Director of Bands, Mr Andrew Newhouse, to whom great credit is due. Every year, in bands of all levels, boys return after holidays with a sense of dedication and passion for the music they are playing – a testament to the environment created by all teaching staff. The momentum of previous years carried over into 2008, with multiple accomplishments from all bands.

The current prosperity evident in the band program did not just happen overnight. It is the culmination of many years' hard work, by many people. Teachers, students and all involved over the past few years have become integral parts of today's successful band program. This current momentum is still growing, with swelling numbers in the junior ensembles and a growing interest in the music program overall.

The biggest event in the Big Band calendar is the Generations in Jazz festival in Mount Gambier: Bands are always eager to make the trip, to experience an amazing combination of professional performances, competition, and the opportunity to listen to and socialise with other bands from across Australia. Big Band 1 surpassed all expectations to win outright Division 2 in their third year of competing at this level. This win was accompanied by the successes of Big Band 2, who came second in 3rd division A, and Big Band 3, who won 3rd division B outright. To have this level of achievement amidst the 83 bands competing from around Australia is astounding. This result by the younger bands

is an encouraging indicator of what we can expect at this competition in the future.

After Mount Gambier, and a well deserved break, the bands began their preparation for the state band competitions. All bands achieved a high standard, especially the Chamber Orchestra, who competed for the first time and achieved a silver standard for their performance – an incredible first effort. All ensembles were awarded either the silver or gold standard for their performances, evidence of a great show of professionalism and musicianship by all.

There must be special mention given to all the senior players, who dedicate their time and leadership to the improvement and development of the younger musicians. It is through their involvement that the program runs so efficiently and the boys grow both as people and as musicians.

There has been a change in atmosphere over this past year within the bands program. The students are consistently moving towards a more professional working environment. The number of gigs played by the bands is resulting in the effective use of rehearsal time and individual practice. This is essential to the overall functioning of the ensemble, and this approach will stand them in good stead as they move into the outside music world. Unfortunately it is impossible to cover every performance and highlight in such a short band report, except to once again congratulate all involved. I leave 2008 with a feeling of accomplishment, and an eagerness to take on whatever new experiences 2009 has to offer.

The Prince Alfred College 1st XVIII had a very successful 2008 season, winning the Tennyson Football Challenge Cup for the third year running by defeating arch-rivals Saint Peters College the 137th Intercol and claiming the SSSSA/SANFL Open Schools Knockout Grand Final with a strong victory over Sacred Heart College.

After months of conditioning training, our first trials began with the annual pre-season trip to Melbourne, playing fixtures against Melbourne Grammar and Wesley College. Angus Rowntree, one of the team's Vice-Captains, was outstanding in our match against Wesley and was awarded the Dalwood Platter for a Best on Ground performance. Although we were narrowly defeated in both matches, there were promising signs in regard to teamwork and playing structures, suggesting strong performances in the season to come. Two aims for the season were proposed whilst in Melbourne, firstly to win the Intercol for the third year in a row and secondly to defeat Sacred Heart College.

In addition, the boys were privileged to attend the Anzac Day Dawn Service at Melbourne's Shrine of Remembrance, before attending the clash between Essendon and Collingwood at the MCG. Heart.

The Grand Final was played at Norwood Oval on a fine Tuesday evening, August 19, under lights and with an impressive crowd. In the rooms, before the first bounce, there was a sense of urgency and confidence; this was the last opportunity for us to demonstrate our improvement throughout the season, a last chance to defeat a Sacred Heart side that had completed the ISSA season undefeated. With the 137th Intercol against Saints just four days away this was an opportunity to show them what

they were up against.

We were focused on having twenty-one leaders on the field that evening, each prepared to do their

job, to tackle, to chase and do all the hard things. Our aim was to control the things that we could control, and to deliver the ball long and direct to one-on-one contests inside PAC's forward fifty.

After a nervous start that saw Jack Kelly stretchered from the ground at the opening bounce, the boys settled, matching Sacred Hearts' physical intensity to trail by only 2 points at half time. The momentum swing continued in the second half and PAC went on to defeat Scared Heart 7.8 (50) to 4.7 (31). Jack Trengove was awarded the Colin Steinert Medal for a best on ground performance in our midfield and Jack Stephens played irresistible football at full back. Historically, this was only the second time that PAC has won the State Knockout Cup in the cup's forty year history, with the last time being in 1985.

Knowing that the season's job was only half done, and determined to fulfil the goals set at the start of the season, we approached our Intercol clash at home with a steely resolve to finish the season on a high. The lads didn't disappoint and smashed Saint Peters 19.19 (133) to 6.4 (40), one of the biggest Intercol wins in history. Craig Pitt was outstanding and the deserving winner of the Intercol Medal for a best on ground performance.



Players worthy of a special mention through the season are Sam Gunning, winner of the Highest Goal-kicker Award; Henry Riggs, who won the PAOC Best First Year Player's Award; Jack Trengove, the Fairest and Best 1st XVIII player for 2008; Jack Stephens, winner of the Chris House Cup for the Best Team Man; James Van Hoof, who won the Service to Football Award; and Luke Tapscott, who represented his school and state with distinction in the U18 National Carnival in Melbourne.

All in all, the 2008 season was a memorable one and it was very satisfying to have achieved the goals that we set for ourselves way back in Melbourne.

Thank you to Mr Gary Jenkinson for



I enjoyed English where I can write freely, and playing water polo at school level. I also enjoyed being taught by Mr McKinnon, and researching History.





The newly founded Boarders' Basketball League boosted our spirits in the post-winter season. Every Sunday and





Foundation Report

In 2007, gifts to the school totalling \$2,247,000 were made by the Prince Alfred College Foundation. 2008 saw us build this success, with the Foundation once again playing an important role in the development of Prince Alfred College. This support has been especially strong through the Foundation Scholarship Fund and donations received through bequests.

Early in the year we were saddened by the death of Miss Vivienne Langley at the age of ninety-four. Vivienne's link with the school commenced when her father was employed by Headmaster Chapple in 1896, coming from England to take up his position as Classics Master. His career continued at Princes for the next fifty years and including service as the school's bursar.

Vivienne was a regular visitor to the school and took an interest in all aspects of its community and operation. Her great interest in life was music and one of the high points of her long life was the opening of the James Edgar Langley Music Centre at the school. Vivienne's funeral was held in the Eric Freak Memorial Chapel and student musicians performed; how proud she would have been of their exceptional standard.

Vivienne was a founding member of the T.G. Waterhouse Society; the Prince Alfred College Foundation was the major beneficiary of her estate. Her gift of over \$1,000,000 will be used to establish the school's new Early Learning Centre.

Gifts to the Foundation from the estates of the late Rodney Smith, Jack Gerard and Peter Fleming MBE were also greatly appreciated.

During 2008, the tax deductibility status of the Foundation's Scholarship fund was confirmed, enabling donors to receive a tax deduction in return for their support. The support of the Princes community in establishing this fund has been extraordinary, and the Foundation and school

appreciates the commitment of donors who wish to help provide a student with a Princes education.

The Foundation would like to especially thank the family of the late Colin Hassell AO for establishing the Colin Hassell Scholarship, the family of the late Colin McKay for their generosity, and to Mr Ken Lord, Mr John Lord and Mrs Heather Roy for their commitment to the Ken Lord Family Boarding Scholarships.

The Martini Ball, held at the Adelaide Entertainment Centre on August 30, continued the fine tradition of major events hosted by the Foundation, but in doing so moved to a higher level of entertainment and overall professionalism. The bar has been set very high! More than 630 guests enjoyed the ambience of the Bond-themed night. MC for the night, Richard Bosi, rappelled from the ceiling, star attraction singer, Amity Dry, was driven through the audience in an Aston Martin, and the raffle diamonds were stolen by bad guys only to be recovered by our valiant MC! Partygoers danced the night away to Amity Dry and her band Hepburn. Proceeds from the main and silent auction will be committed to development projects at the school.

130th Annual Report

Activities



Planning has already begun for the 2009 season with all grades expected to challenge for the premiership once again. 
