His citation reads:

For most conspicuous bravery and devotion to duty during operations on Kaiakij Aghala (Hill 60), in the Gallipoli Peninsula on 29th and 30th August 1915. Although severely wounded in several places during a counter attack, he refused to leave his post or to obtain medical assistance until all the danger had passed, when he had his wounds dressed and returned to the firing line until ordered out of action by the Medical officer. By his personal courage and example he kept up the spirits of his party, and was largely instrumental in saving the situation at a critical time."

2010 has been a significant year in the life of Prince Alfred College.

We began the year with the largest enrolment in the day school and boarding school for almost 20 years. The Early Learning Centre is at capacity and we have continued to grow successfully.

In March our Strategic Plan for 2010– 2012 was launched to the College community. Our vision of inspiring excellence will serve the College well to the end of 2012. Our purpose as a

College has been reinforced, which is to develop young men who will engage in the world with confidence and compassion.

The College is a community that seeks to challenge and inspire students and maximise every boy's potential. The core values of Prince Alfred College have been sustained for 141 years. We believe in excellence in teaching, leadership and teamwork and an appreciation of Christian principles. We also value an international concept of curriculum and a sense of citizenship. The intellectual, physical, social, emotional and spiritual capabilities of boys are our essential focus. The Princes Man is characterised by independence, self-discipline, integrity, and social responsibility. All this occurs within the framework of a community with shared responsibilities including students, parents, staff, old scholars, and friends of Princes.

The Strategic Plan for the next three years is built around five directions for our future. They are Academic Performance, Organisational Development, Student Life and Three School Excellence, Communication and Community Engagement, and Financial and Operational Strength. In 2010 we have seen progress in the establishment of Three Schools at PAC. Most significantly, the Middle School for boys in Years 7–9 has now become an established community with distinct programs and a teaching and learning focus which meets the unique needs of adolescent boys. The emphasis in our strategic development this year has been on stability and consolidation, with a priority for academic excellence and student wellbeing.



Our new Early Learning Centre, which opened in July 2009, now provides for 110 families. Ably led by Mrs Jeanine Dry and an outstanding staff, Prince Alfred College provides an early learning program based on the Reggio Emilia model. We can be very proud of this exceptional facility and educational program.

The facilities available to our school community have continued to expand this year, most prominently with the opening of ANZAC Hall and Piper Pavilion on 7th September. The refurbishment of our Assembly Hall, now ANZAC Hall, was possible through the Federal Government's Building the Education Revolution contribution of \$3million. Piper Pavilion, an extension of ANZAC Hall provides an outstanding space for flexible use across the school. It was named in honour of the contribution of five generations of the Piper family to the College's governing body and the Old Scholars Association. ANZAC Hall pays tribute to the thousands of men, formerly students of this school, who have served in the Armed Forces since the Boer War. We were thrilled to have permission from the Minister for Veterans' Affairs, the Hon Alan Griffin, to use the name ANZAC for our Hall, which was officially opened by the Member for Adelaide, the Hon Kate Ellis.

Other building developments during the year saw the refurbishment of the Art Studios in the Middle and Senior Schools, a new playground for the Preparatory School and the development of a Reception Hub for our pre-schoolers in the former Little Princes Kindergarten. Of great excitement is the new Health and Sports Centre which will begin construction in February 2011.

The Prince Alfred College Council has continued its effective governance of the College under the leadership of Chairman, Dr Ben Tidswell, and assisted by Deputy Chairman, Mr John Harry, Treasurer, Mr David Sanders, and Secretary, Mrs Fleur Michell. Council's key committees, including Building, Finance and Audit, and Risk and Compliance, have charted the key business of governing the College. We were pleased to welcome new members to the Council in 2010, Ms Karen Tierney and the Rev Anne Hewitt. Sincere thanks are extended to Mrs Margaret Gleaves who has assumed the enormous responsibility of Minute Secretary to Council and its committees during the year.

I have been blessed with an excellent College Executive comprising the three Heads of School, Mr Neil Andary, Mr Peter Karamoshos and Mr Nicholas de Dear, Director of Student Life, Mr Stephen Clohesy, Director of Community Relations, Mr Tony Ashdown, Director of Organisational Development, Ms Terry Learmonth, and from May, Mr Stephen Bacon, Executive Director School Services. The Executive began the year with a Leadership Retreat led by Dr Neil Carrington from the Australian Council of Educational Research Leadership Centre based in Brisbane. This program was the second year of a commitment by the Executive to leadership development. The Executives' key responsibilities lie in the implementation of the actions of the Strategic Plan and to manage the effective operations of the College

A restructure of the School Operations area after review by Ernst & Young, has led to the establishment of three distinct areas of management in Finance, Information and Communication Technology, and Property Services.

The development of the school has been enhanced by the appointment of new personnel and the establishment of new positions. Key roles include Mr John Wilson as Director of Finance, Mr Peter Hughes, Director of School Operations, Mr Rob Sieben as Director of ICT, Mr Rob Colaiacovo as Curriculum Leader of Mathematics and Mr Sean Watt, Deputy Head of the Preparatory School. In the last term, we were pleased to welcome Mr Darryl Attiwill as our Catering Manager. There were several new appointments to the teaching staff across the Senior, Middle and Preparatory Schools, all of which have contributed significantly to sustain and improve the high standard of teaching and learning at Prince Alfred College.

Staff leaving during 2010 included Mr Andrew Fergusson, Director of IT, who worked over a long period as a mathematics teacher but more significantly guided the development of IT across the school. I thank Mr Chris Nicholls who has worked for ten years at Prince Alfred College, Mr Tom Dunsmuir, Mr Shannon Bertram, Mr Michael Talbot, and Ms Ursula Menz who will conclude their contracts at the College this year.

It is well known that the effectiveness of any school is dependent on the quality of the staff. More than 200 people are employed at Prince Alfred College and each and every one makes an important contribution to the education of the more than 1000 boys that we are privileged to have in our care. I express my sincere thanks to all those who work in classrooms and across the campus, and also at Scotts Creek and Wambana for their professionalism and generosity of spirit.

The Boarding House has had an exceptional year, expertly led by Mr Tim Agnew as Head of Boarding and Fraser Ellis as Captain of the Boarding House. Boarding enrolments have been at full capacity this year and its development as a 'centre for excellence' has been possible through the commitment of Boarding House staff and also those in Housekeeping, Catering, the Health Centre, and Property Services. Boarders' Day is now an important annual event and once again showcased the life and contribution of our boarding community. I pay tribute to the work of the Boarders' Parents Consultative Committee, led this year by Mr Craig Hole.

The international enrolment at Prince Alfred College has grown during the year. This has seen an expansion of our ESL programs and the appointment of Mr Jeff Ellis to manage our International Students' Transition Program. Ms Anna Polias and Ms Debra James provide the necessary language curriculum for these young people. I thank Ms Mani White for her work in coordinating our international students' program and also Chawis (Boom) Chamnarnkit and Pak Ho Yuen who have been the Captain and Vice-Captain of International Students this year.

Our close relationship with China saw a large group of students from the Senior School Attached to Shandong Normal University in Jinan visit Prince Alfred College in February this year. Four teachers from the Shungeng Middle School, also in Jinan, joined us for four days in September. I was very privileged to attend the 60th Anniversary of our partner school in Jinan in October. New partnerships with a Middle School and Senior School in Dalian have been established and our students will visit there for the first time in April 2011.

Our academic results in 2009 in both the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) and the International Baccalaureate Diploma (IBD) were excellent. These results were arguably the best since 2002. Overall the median Tertiary Education Rank (TER) was 88. There were 55 merit scores with seven students attaining TERs over 99 placing them in the top 1% of the State. Thirtyseven students were in the top 5% with a TER over 95, 42% of our Year 12s were placed in the top 10% and 62.5% in the top 20% of the State. This is a very high level of achievement.

The SACE grade distribution was excellent with 35.8% of the total being A grades and 37.2% B grades. There were 10 merits from students completing the SACE and 1 merit from Year 11. Six students achieved their



SACE through a Vocational Education and Training (VET) pathway. The IB results were outstanding with a top score of 43 out of 45 and a mean score of 36 (which equates to a TER of 96.30). There were 44 merit scores achieved in a range of subjects. Sixteen out of twenty-five students achieved an A grade in the Extended Essay which is excellent achievement.

66% of our students were successful in gaining their first preference at university. The most popular courses of study were Law, Commerce, Health Sciences and Engineering. Thirty four students were offered places in double degrees. Two students were offered places in a direct entry Medicine course.

On the basis of the results of the SACE and IB examinations for 2009, the following academic prizes were awarded:

Student leadership has been enhanced this year under the Student Life umbrella. The Captain and Vice Captains of Preparatory School, Cameron Young and Bill Stam have maintained the high expectations we have for our younger student leaders. In the Middle School, students have been well represented by Simon Brown as Captain and Charlie Hall as his Vice Captain. The Captain of School this year has been John Hood and Vice Captain, Michael Brown, who have worked collaboratively with great effect with the fourteen other boys who have constituted our Prefects this year. I wish to thank Mr Stephen Clohesy, Director of Student Life, for the development of student leadership across the school in 2010. 2011 will represent the centenary of the appointment of Prefects at Prince Alfred College and I am delighted with the contribution to date of our new team of Prefects.

We have had an extraordinary year of sporting success. In the Intercollegiate Contests, PAC defeated Saints 15–nil in Tennis. We also played in the Grand Final of the Drive Tennis competition. The 141st Cricket Intercol saw PAC 285 and 132 lose to St Peter's College 9 for 299 declared and 2 for 119. Prince Alfred College was runner-up to Rostrevor College in the 20/20 Competition. St Peter's comfortably won the Badminton 7–2 and we narrowly lost the Swimming by 3 points. The Head of the River was won for the sixth year in a row by St Peter's College. However, Prince Alfred College won 6 of the 12 Head of the River events, including the Second VIII, all four Year 10 Divisions, and the Year 9 Fourth Division event.

In winter sports, PAC was highly successful, defeating Saints in the Hockey 2–1, the Soccer 2–1, Rugby 31–18, Basketball 51–43, and Football 19.10–5.7. Furthermore, we were third in the State Knock-Out Cup in Hockey, quarter finalists in the Knock-Out Soccer, and runner-up in the SA Rugby Union Schoolboys Grand final. The PAC First XVIII were undefeated throughout the season, were State Knock-Out Cup winners, and won the inaugural Messenger Press Shield for Premier SSSSA Football School.

Intercol Chess and Debating are also important components of our friendly rivalry with St Peter's College, which saw PAC win the Chess and lose the Debating.

Individual excellence in sport includes Kelvin Smith in Cricket, hitting 170 runs as the opening bat against Scotch College, a century in the Intercol, and State team representation and selection into West Torrens District A team. Many boys scored centuries including Adam Perryman (twice), Jake Weatherald, Billie Tapscott, Jack Latchford, Jake Pitt, and Ben Andary. Bill Sandow's best bowling saw a 6 for 17 statistic against Scotch College, and hat tricks were achieved by Seb Higham and Albert McBride.

Alex Hill and Tristan Perkins were State representatives in Rowing and Jack Schipanski was a National

representative in Tennis. Several boys represented the State in Football, including George Hannaford, Nick Amato and Tom Whittlesea who joined Jack Viney as Captain of the State Under 16 team. Sam Day played for the State Under 18 team and was selected for the All-Australian team. Four boys represented the State in Hockey; James Keeves, Nick Fitzgerald, Simon Brown and Tom Fitzgerald. Tom was also selected in the Premier Men's team for Port Adelaide.

Matt Henry played at State level in Rugby, Daniel Foo in Tennis, and John Hall was selected into the West Ham Soccer Academy in the UK. We had moderate success in Athletics, coming fifth in the Achilles Cup. Exceptional athletes include Niwili White-Forrest, Jack Viney and George Hannaford. For the second year in a row, the PAC Tennis team will represent SA in the National Schoolboys Championships, which they won in 2009. Table Tennis and Squash players also enjoyed a highly successful season.

Similarly, our students achieved great success in our Music program. Under the expert tutorage of Ms Erna Berberyan, the growing depth of talent in strings has been evidenced through ensemble and solo performance. The Camerata Quartet has performed at College events and in the wider community. The choir, under the direction of Mr Tasso Bouyessis, has expanded its repertoire including support of religious services, and also more modern songs like Bohemian Rhapsody from Queen. Congratulations are extended to Christian Evans and Roberto Reidig for their ten and five years respective contribution to the Prince Alfred College Choir.

PAC bands performed at the highest level in major competitions; the SA Band and Orchestra Festival, and Generations in Jazz at Mount Gambier. Achievements in the SA Band and Orchestra competition included Bronze awards for the Intermediate Concert Band and Big Band Two, a Silver award for the Sinfonia and Gold awards for the Senior Concert Band and Big Band One. At Mount Gambier, Prince Alfred College was only one of four schools across the nation to enter in four divisions. Big Band One gained sixth place in Division 1, with Super Band Selections for Ned Young and Michael Riceman. Big Band Two was fourth in Division 2, Big Band Three gained first place and Big Band Four played at a high standard in the non-competitive Division 4.

Following the success of Jammin' with James in 2009, we held All That Jazz this year which saw the combined talents of all College bands working with special guests Andy Firth and Amity Dry. It was a sensational showcase event, generously sponsored by Tim Gramp Wines and Mr Bob Soang.

This year's musical was a multi-media performance of War of the Worlds, directed by Mr Michael Steer. Unfortunately, I missed this event held during my sabbatical leave, but was privileged to see the video of the show, which reinforced the high praise received for this production which had come from all quarters of our

community. The Preparatory School artsPACes involved every student in the Prep School and was thoroughly enjoyed by students, staff and parents.

At the time of writing, I anticipate highly impressive publications of this year's Science Journal and Shades of Red. Sincere thanks are extended to Dr Paula Mills, Ms Melody Marshall and the student editors for their support of Science and Creative Writing at Prince Alfred College.

The contribution and support of our community organisations is beyond measure. The Parents and Friends Associations for the whole school and Preparatory School, have been led strongly by Mrs Mary Evens and Mrs Kathryn Webber. Key events have included the annual Art Show and a Melbourne Cup luncheon. Donations from the P&Fs to the school have been to the benefit of the boys here at PAC.

The Prince Alfred Old Collegians Association has been championed this year by Mr Fred Hamood as President and his committee. Their many events have been well supported with more than 500 attending the Annual Dinner in July, nearly 300 at Vintage Reds, and good attendances at annual dinners across the state, the nation, and in London and in Hong Kong.

The school is indebted for the support of the Prince Alfred College Foundation presided over by Mr Andrew Chapman and his Board. The Foundation has committed to raising \$5million towards the construction of our new Health and Sports Centre for which the school is very grateful.

In June and July, I was most fortunate to take a period of sabbatical leave. This included some professional study, attendance at key international conferences, and a time for rest and rejuvenation. I returned with great confidence in our school, knowing that we do inspire excellence and strive earnestly to ensure our boys are well prepared for their community and the world. I thank the staff, the students, our parent body, and all friends of Princes who have in small ways and large ensured one of the most successful years in the history of the College.

Andrew Fergusson retired mid-2010 after two careers at Prince Alfred College. The first began on his appointment as a Mathematics teacher in 1977. An enthusiastic teacher, with strong commitment to Mathematics education and particularly to fostering Mathematical talent, Andrew was a highly respected and influential member of the Mathematics faculty who took responsibility for Mathematics competitions, at which Princes enjoyed considerable success. His interest in nurturing talent led to his involvement with the Extended Curriculum Group, and his leading role in the establishment of an Extension Centre. He was instrumental in the introduction of the teaching of computing at Princes. This began with a Computer Club, then computing as an elective subject finally leading to the development of a Computing Centre and the teaching of computing as part of the curriculum. More generally Andrew played a major part in the redevelopment of the school curriculum in this period, and he was acting Deputy Director of Studies for a year shortly before departing to Canberra at the end of 1984.

In 1996 Andrew returned to take up a position as the Coordinator of Information Technology. Since then his role has seen numerous changes of title and some changes of emphasis but in essence he had the responsibility of upgrading the computer network to meet the needs of a modern school. While we were using computers in 1996 they were still peripheral to the daily lives of most students and teachers. In a few short years information and communication technologies have become central to the operation of schools. Andrew has led a team that established the essential infrastructure that enables daily computer use by all



students and staff, and brought Prince Alfred College to the brink of a new paradigm. He has passed the baton to Rob Sieben, who was a student teacher under Andrew's supervision in 1979.

Andrew leaves Prince Alfred College with the deep appreciation and respect of his colleagues. We have valued the intelligence, attention to detail, problem solving ability and helpfulness that has characterised his work, and his collegiality within the Common Room.

There is never a dull moment in my role as the Chaplain at Prince Alfred College. I would go so far as to argue I have one of the best positions. I am privileged with the opportunity to engage with so many people, in a variety of ways; students, staff, old scholars, parents. In chaplaincy there is always something to do, and someone to see. On the whole, there are many highs. However, at times it requires journeying with people through some lows.

This year I have been charged with the task of introducing a Beliefs and Values program into the Middle

School. Over the next year or so it will become a three year program that will have each year level engaging a different focus. Year 7's will explore Religion and Spirituality to gain an understanding of some of the world's major religions, and develop an awareness of spirituality. Year 8's will be taken through a range of topics with the view to equipping them with tools to face issues such as bullying and harassment, grief and loss, conflict and anger, and self esteem. In Year 9, the aim is to have students exploring moral, ethical and philosophical topics. The scheduling of the Beliefs and Values program has been done in such a way that students participate in four sessions each term. I am looking forward to continuing the development and embedding of this program.

Facilitating Chapel services is, of course, a component of the chaplaincy role. The Preparatory School continues to meet for Chapel weekly, divided into Reception to Year 2's, and Years 3 to 6. The primary classes continue to take responsibility for preparing and leading Chapel. Each term has been based on a theme, with a set reading each week that allows for a varied exploration and expression within the theme. Our staff, boys and families work together for a common goal; inspiring excellence is paramount. This year, with the help of the Parents and Friends Association, staff and boys hosted artsPACes, a promenade of music, dance, art, theatre and learning in a carnival atmosphere. As far as learning is concerned, not much beats it. As a result of this process, the boys were challenged with real life issues to deal with, real life literacy, numeracy, technology,

science and ICT. Their learning had purpose. It involved fun, collaboration, co-operation and communication.

During the October break, I attended the National Boys' Education Conference. I heard Dr Adam Cox, a renowned psychologist and leading advocate for the social and emotional wellbeing of boys, speak about boys needing real time achievement. They want urgency, necessity and recognition.

Interestingly, the school year began with great fanfare with the introduction of the MySchool website. I have written much on the school's views on this issue and it is fair to say we will continue to monitor our boys' growth and development very carefully. Their academic success is very important to us and we will use every available process to assist us. But does this website help us develop young men or does it divert us from what a well-educated young man looks like?

The launch of the Strategic Plan 2010–2012 provided a very timely and pertinent vision: inspiring excellence. Make no mistake; this is as much about academic achievements as it is about developing an "all round" great person. We want our Princes boys to learn and grow into inspiring and compassionate Princes men.

This year, our staff spent many after school, weekend and holiday hours working on refining our curriculum and creating exciting, relevant, significant and engaging learning programs for our boys. They have worked tirelessly to improve their skills through attending

Mr Kelvin Sparks Dean of Studies Preparatory School

Creativity and commitment are important qualities that we aim to develop in all our students at Prince Alfred College.

We develop these in a range of ways such as helping our classes to prepare and lead weekly Assemblies and Chapel services. Our group musical performances have been enhanced in the last two years by the addition of strings from the Junior Primary up. Then there are the large-school celebrations of the arts.

Two years ago, we broke the mould of the previous Musicals by supporting the boys in writing their own musical. The results at that time, in terms of involving more boys in the creative process, encouraged us to think outside the square again this year. Our goal was to promote a wider range of the arts than is possible with a stage production. The idea of a 'promenade', in which visitors meander through an area taking in a range of diverse artistic 'events', was suggested by the success of occasions such as the Bundaleer Forest Festival in the mid-North of the state. The name artsPACes was soon coined to convey the concept.

In a range of interesting spaces around the school, a diverse and dynamic range of art forms were 'happening': dance, opera, poetry, installations, circus skills, busking, tai chi and much more besides, all developed with active creative involvement from the boys. With a little mood lighting and the support of the weather (after a nailbiting month of rain!) the event went off successfully and was well received. The boys certainly had lots of fun demonstrating their creative flair.

The same evening saw the presentation to the school community of the PYP Exhibition. The Exhibition is the culmination of the Year 6 boys' PYP 'journey' in which they apply all that they have learned in order to identify, investigate and offer solutions to real-life issues or problems. The central idea that the boys















themselves developed was 'Human actions, even with good intentions, can lead to disaster'. Under this global heading, groups of boys, working collaboratively, studied issues such as deforestation, climate change, addiction, overpopulation and conflict.

Through the Exhibition the boys demonstrated not only their commitment to learning, but also the depth of understanding of complex issues that their inquiry skills had led them to. The Exhibition was as much about process as product, though. The boys were responsible for cooperating, planning, researching and presenting, all achieved through a group decision-making process. On display, alongside the excellent posters, PowerPoints and models, was every boy's journal of reflections on the learning process as it unfolded. This was powerful evidence of the less visible learning that also took place!

In keeping with the motto of the PAC 2010–2012 Strategic Plan, Inspiring Excellence, our boys performed very well in external competitions. Seventy of our boys from Years 3–6 entered the Australian Mathematics Competition. They were awarded 15 Distinctions and 36 Credits, while three boys, Sparsh Tiwari, Jordan Lesicar and James Jezukaitis, received High Distinction for their efforts.

We are proud of all our boys, of their creativity and their commitment to learning.

We have enjoyed watching the boys' thinking develop in this environment. Their ideas are often very insightful!

At the beginning of the year boys were excited to investigate their new learning space as we established Hub rules and how to make a happy Reception unit. Our PYP investigations have each ignited questioning, enthusiasm and interest in a range of topics. Highlights this year include: dressing up as fairytale characters, a visit from the Touring Car Masters drivers, visiting the Railway Museum, incursions from medical mums and dads and Bugs and Slugs, and Book Week activities. We are constantly astonished at the reading and writing that develops through these units of inquiry.





We had loads of fun producing Crawford's Backyard, a video featuring each of our youngest Princes Men. The older Receptions learnt about opera as a genre and presented their Gardens Opera for artsPACes. All costumes, sets and even make-up were designed by the boys, while the music was sourced (with apologies) from the works of a number of famous composers! The year concluded with the Nativity, which always brings tears as we prepare to say goodbye to our charges.

Reception is such an important year, for boys and their families as they begin their journey at Princes. It paves the way for lifelong learning and friendship. We hope the boys have very special memories to take with them from Reception on their journey as Princes Men.

The 'All the World's a Stage' Unit of Inquiry provided the boys with a range of experiences that enabled them to express themselves through the Arts and to appreciate how other people like to express themselves. The ArtsPACes evening was the perfect opportunity to demonstrate our deeper understanding of what it is to express ourselves, whether in Drama, Painting, Sculpting or Music. The boys created an outstanding arts scene and deserve praise for their efforts.

Probably one of the more exciting Units of Inquiry for the boys was entitled 'Science in a Day.' The parents who came in to work with the boys performing an amazing array of scientific sensations were a great resource and a superb example to the boys of what an inquirer looks like in real life. The ability to make connections relating to how we use science in our daily lives made this a very meaningful Unit of Inquiry and it was such fun! The use of Information Technology through the BrainPop website and other programmes was another important resource to enhance the educational experience for the boys.

To end our year we researched into a unit called 'Australian Animals Oi Oi Oi'. During this Unit of Inquiry we learnt about how we share our planet and what effect we have on Australian animals. The highlight of the Term was visiting Cleland Wildlife Park. Here we were able to get up close to the animals we were researching. We had so many answers to our research questions that we even published our own information booklet!

We had a brilliant and exciting year together in Year One. All the boys have worked together extremely well this year. They have all been great at inquiring, researching, being a scientist and becoming a caring person.

Treading the Boards

This unit of inquiry was structured to help the boys prepare for the artsPACes performance in Term 3. The boys were exposed to a variety of art forms that opened up discussions about what art is and what form can it take. We were able to view some fabulous fringe shows that encompassed the performance arts genre and learn much about the art of performing from them. We took a trip to the Festival Centre where we were guided through the facilities by actors in character. 3Bi set about researching popular culture through decades in preparation for their artsPACes performance Pop Quiz. The event was planned and produced by the class and a good time was had by all boys and their contestant parents! 3BI followed on with the "Chocoholics" theme and converted the Rose Garden into "Willy Wonkas Chocolate Factory". Year 3 Camp

This year we went on a two-night camp at the Woodhouse Activity Centre in the Piccadilly Valley. The boys engaged in some fantastic environmental research and reporting as well as attempting the physical obstacles, rope ladders and wooden tunnels on Challenge Hill. Team

To kick off the 2010 School year, we began with an inquiry into Team. We explored our own qualities and characteristics and the implications these had for working with others. Mr Peter Karamoshos Head of the Middle School

"Adolescents in their Middle Years need and deserve a special approach from schools to encourage them to thrive personally and in their studies."

This statement was made by Professor Paul Deering, a middle school researcher and teacher educator, at the 5th International Middle Years of School conference held recently in Adelaide. He discussed the importance of dealing differently with students in Middle School, and the need to take into account their complex social, emotional, physical and educational needs.

The view of this highly regarded educator reinforces the importance of our Middle School and of the specific middle years program we offer at Princes. We continue to provide explicit programs, teaching and learning approaches, pastoral care, assessment and reporting tailored to meet the needs of our boys in their formative middle years.

Consistency and relevance are essential if boys are to fully engage in their learning. Students across the three years of the Middle School now follow a uniform curriculum: English, Mathematics, Humanities, Science, the Arts, Technology, Languages and Personal and Physical Education. An Academic Extension Program provides additional challenges for those boys who need further intellectual challenges, while a specific Learning Support process provides guidance and strategies to those who need extra assistance.

The sense of identity and community is important to the Middle School. The introduction of a Middle School Presentation Assembly at the end of the year reinforced this sense of identity. Students were presented with Academic Awards, Student Life Awards and Year 9 students graduated from the Middle School.

Beau Muzik, as Deputy Head of Middle School, has promoted the distinctiveness of the Middle School through his organisation, his work with Year Level Coordinators and through enhancing the Pastoral Care Program.

The introduction of the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Program (MYP) has been significant in terms of providing a consistent and coherent curriculum framework for students and staff across the Middle School. The MYP has been introduced into Years 7 and 8 this year and will be extended into Year 9 in 2011. Sean Behan, in his role as Dean of Studies in the Middle School, has been instrumental in this regard. He has worked closely with curriculum leaders and middle school teachers in developing units of work aimed at stimulating and motivating our boys.

The Year Level Coordinators have played a significant role in supporting boys in their personal, academic, social and emotional development. Melissa Brister in Year 7, Paul Balestrin in Year 8 and David de Lacy in Year 9 have been tireless in their support of the students under their care. Megan McLaughlin, in her role as Assistant to the Head of

Middle School, has also been an enormous support to staff, students and parents in the Middle School.

Having a distinct Middle School allows for an effective student leadership structure. Simon Brown, as Captain of Middle School, has performed his duties with maturity and distinction. He has been a fine role model for his peers and has set a high standard for others to follow. His Vice-Captain, Charlie Hall, has been a wonderful support through his considered and mature views and his insightful suggestions. The Middle School SRC, with the support of Stephen Clohesy, the Director of Student Life, have led our boys through a program of community service. Their "can drive" saw hundreds of cans donated by Prince Alfred College students to help feed people in need. The eight House Captains demonstrated leadership through their organisation of competitors for the College swimming and athletics carnivals and in coordinating teams for the tightly contested House Competitions.

Wambana and the Extended Stay Program continue to provide a wonderful and distinctive learning experience for our Year 9 students. The program enhances the holistic development of boys through emotional, physical and intellectual challenges in an environment which requires teamwork and compromise. These skills were evident during the contribution of the Year 9 cohort to a community tree planting project. Their positive approach, humour and hard work were recognised by the organisers who spoke glowingly about the dedication of our pupils. The Personal Best Projects presented by the Year 9's at the end of the year were creative and impressive. Students focused on an area of interest to them and through their passion and dedication, prepared an outstanding display.

The contribution of the Year 8 group was significant to the success of the Middle School in 2010. They warmly welcomed a large group of new Year 8 students in 2010, ensuring a smooth transition for these new Princes Men. The Goolwa camp in Term 1 reinforced the strong bonds between members of the Pastoral Care Groups. The Scotts Creek camps in Terms 2 and 3 challenged the students physically and emotionally and helped develop the attributes of resilience, empathy and teamwork. A number of Year 8 students nominated to trial a new interdisciplinary unit during the Term 3 holidays. These boys created electric powered go-karts from pieces of steel, tin, cables, brakes, nuts and bolts. Boys tested, refined and raced these go-karts. In time, this program promises to provide hands-on, boy friendly learning, which connects seamlessly with the core curriculum.

There has been a wonderful transformation in the maturity and approach from our Year 7 students over the course of the year. They are the first group to enter the Middle School at the beginning of Year 7. They have coped admirably with the change in organisational and educational structures. The individual presentations and displays of their Personal Best Projects showed a new level of confidence and selfassurance. The Scotts Creek outdoor experience enhanced the strong connections within the group through a focus on teamwork and collaboration. The Canberra trip proved to be a resounding success in terms of relationship building and cultural understanding. The variety of sights and activities on this expedition gave our students a strong sense of history and national pride.

I would like to extend my sincere appreciation to a number of staff who have supported the Middle School through 2010. The Reverend Mark Dickens has provided all students with a structured Belief and Values Education throughout the year and offered personal support to many of our boys in need. Allan Lloyd-Jones, our college Educational Psychologist, has been a great support to students and staff. Sasha Frost has run a very effective Middle School Learning Support Program. The Reverend Chris Harkness was very generous in allowing us to run our Assemblies and Chapel Services at the Wesley Uniting Church, Kent Town, while ANZAC Hall was out of commission. Dale Hobbs and Phil Noble were again instrumental in providing students with significant

extra-curricular experiences while Anthony Harradine has created an interdisciplinary unit, which is destined to become an integral part of the Year 8 curriculum. Education moves fast. No sooner has a task been ticked off it seems that another ingenious initiative is waiting for us impatiently around the corner. The trick is for us to avoid being sidetracked by some of these things and remain focused on our overriding responsibility — to create qualitylearning opportunities for our Middle School boys.

When I was writing the 2009 version of this article we were just beginning our Middle School journey and had taken the first steps in implementing the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme (IB MYP). Since then it is pleasing to note that there has been

significant development in our Middle School Curriculum on many levels. Let's spend some time here reflecting on some of these:

It is a testament to the professionalism of our teaching staff that we have now implemented the MYP into Year 7 and 8. What this means is that the 8 MYP subject areas (Arts, English, Humanities, Languages, Mathematics, Physical Education, Science and Technology) have adopted the use of the published IB MYP assessment criteria and invested considerable time in designing meaningful tasks, which engage Middle School students. At the end of each semester, the reports, which used the traditional A–E grading system, now display an IB 1–7 grade describing the characteristics of learners at different levels using an international standard. In 2011, MYP implementation will flow into Year 9 so that our assessment and reporting systems are consistent within the Middle School.

One of the most exciting advances this year has been the introduction of online curriculum mapping which will enable our teaching staff to work with an incredible level of collaboration. Oregon based company Rubicon Atlas have been involved with online mapping for many years and are one of few companies whose work is endorsed by the International Baccalaureate. The format they offer, along with their expert support has been invaluable. From Term 4 this year, in excess of 80 units written across the Middle School have been uploaded to our own designated web space. From this point on, teachers will be able to easily browse curriculum documents throughout the entire school and develop their own units whilst keeping their colleagues informed as progress takes place. There are a whole host of other benefits of online mapping, including the capacity to analyse the kinds of work going on by keyword, year level, subject, assessment criteria and produce graphs which enable us to critically analyse what we offer in terms of curriculum.

This has been an exciting initiative to date and one that has generated interest in many other schools across South Australia as education looks for ways to support its teachers in constructing relevant, engaging, challenging and significant curriculum.

2011 promises to be an equally fruitful year and I look forward to reflecting on the further advances we make in developing a Middle School which continues to nurture the talents of all of our boys.

Outdoor Education at Prince Alfred College for 2010 saw a record number of boys heading out into the great outdoors. With programs beginning at Year 2 and culminating with the Year 10 Peak Adventure. **Outdoor Education at Princes** continues to provide our young men with opportunities for adventure and education in the natural world. This year we had over 750 of our students participate in programs encouraging them to have fun in the great outdoors. Leadership, rowing, international boarders, IB science and Outreach programs were also experienced at the Scotts Creek

campus. We also provided opportunities for 500 students from many other schools across South Australia to enjoy our tranquil river environment.

Once again we welcomed new staff to Scotts Creek for 2010. Brad Newton joined the teaching staff as a recent graduate of UniSA and our Gap position was filled by Delwyn McInnes who finished at Unley High last year. Delwyn went on to complete his kayaking qualification and returned later in the year as an instructor. The team from Active Catering also joined us in 2010 providing wonderful, nutritious food for all of our programs at Scotts Creek as well as our external programs. At the beginning of Term 3 Simon Buttenshaw joined our team from Western Australia, to cover Belinda Rowe who announced the wonderful news of a baby later in the year. Belinda and I started at Scotts Creek together in 2002 and have spent many long days and nights on programs over the years. Belinda's hard work and dedication to Prince Alfred College and especially its Outdoor Education programs at Scotts Creek will be greatly missed. We wish Belinda and her family all the best for the future and hope to see her in the outdoors again soon.

Over the summer break a lot of work was completed at Scotts Creek. The largest project was the lining of all the student dorms at Scotts Creek. This project was kindly supported by the PAC Foundation and PAC parent, Rocco





lacopetta, who organised all the building materials and builders to complete the work. This has resulted in all the sleeping areas being insulated and lined to further increase students comfort at Scotts Creek.

These buildings were put to the test in the first week of the year's programs with temperatures in the high 40's and students able to sleep more comfortably due to the temperature inside being 10 to 15 degrees cooler! The Scotts Creek staff and I would personally like to thank Rocco and his team for working through the hot summer to complete this work and to the PAC Foundation and people who made the project possible with their donations.

The year has seen the completion of the disabled access building, first aid room and extra staff quarters, with flooring work and hot water systems being installed. This new building work has allowed extra room in the staff quarters for visiting staff who often join the boys on program.

The Foundation was once again able to support the continued growth of Scotts Creek with the donation of funds to install an environmentally efficient sub surface drip irrigation watering system. This large project has been completed and a major section of the property has already seen the return of lawn which was once a major part of the Scotts Creek experience. This new system will reduce our water usage, lessen our impact on the Murray and ensure the return of large grassed areas for our boys to enjoy while on program.

In terms of smaller projects we saw the students complete the vegetable boxes around the fruit trees. These beds continue to grow herbs and vegetables that





are used during our programs. For the first time in 3 years this system saw a healthy and abundant production of fruit that was enjoyed by all on program and even found its way to the wider community and turned into jam, marmalade and sorbet.

This year also saw the re-birth of Sun Boat 1 with the help of our Year 7 boys. Over three weeks each of the classes was able to help in the construction, painting and launching of the new Sun Boat 1 pontoon. This addition to Scotts Creek will allow for another swimming area for our boys and sees the mighty Sun Boat returned to the water. We are still looking for a suitable and safe way to get Sun Boat 2 launched into the creek, but hope to see it afloat in 2011. The Climbing Shed continued to grow with a roof extension giving students a little more challenge and excitement. Other projects also included a docking jetty for the flying fox, sports box, recycling crate and the return of chickens to the Garden of Eden.

Our Outdoor Education Program culminates with the Year 10 Peak Adventure program. This year 162 boys participated in Scuba Diving, Surfing, Caving, Kayaking and Mountain Biking in South Australia. In Victoria they went White Water Rafting, Rock Climbing, Downhill and Cross Country Skiing. While the last of the groups went Kite Surfing, Scuba diving and White Water Rafting in Queensland. This program is a highlight for many of the boys and an excellent opportunity for them to enjoy many of the unique and superbly beautiful natural environments around the country, as well as completing a component of the Personal Learning Plan.

Throughout all of our programs the support and hard work of our Year 11 students was once again a highlight.





This year's group of boys worked especially hard to make the experience for the younger students as positive and memorable as possible. This willingness to volunteer their time to our outdoor programs highlights the skills and attitudes that many of our boys have already developed.





As coordinator of Outdoor Education and Director of Scotts Creek I have thoroughly enjoyed my years working with all our boys over the past 9 years. This year will be my final year as full time Director of Scotts Creek, as I will return with my family to Adelaide to take up a position within the Boarding House and also continue the development of the outdoor education curriculum at PAC. The purpose of Wambana is to foster growth by helping our boys better manage the transition between childhood to adulthood. Wambana represents a journey quest, involves confronting challenges and provides an opportunity for service to others. At Prince Alfred College, we are clear on what we want our boys to achieve upon completion of Wambana. This includes, but is not limited to, improved qualities in leadership, social awareness and self-management.

It is hard to believe that it is now 4 years since "Wambana" was introduced to the Year 9 curriculum.

Since the inaugural program in 2007, research has been conducted to gauge the effectiveness of the program. Data from these surveys has been used to inform the school about areas of strength and areas needing attention and focus. At the end of each intake, parents and students are invited to complete a survey.

One significant finding of the study highlights the appreciation boys have for their home and their family. To achieve this, Wambana assists boys in pushing the 'pause button' to allow them time to stop and think! Boys begin to evaluate who they are and what is important to them.

Boys state that they are 'changed' from the Wambana experience. The following is a sample of student comments from 2010 that highlight the impact Wambana had on them:

"It is a life changing experience full of awesome fun, adventure and challenges which involve physical strength and mental knowledge. Overall: AWESOME!"

"I am thankful for the great opportunity I was given and I am proud of what I achieved while I was away."

"Gosh, I loved it. Changed me in so many ways. I wish there was one next year..."

"Changed my life, I will remember it for a very long time, and helped me achieve my goal of becoming as fit as I could be."





"It was the best thing that ever happened to me, I loved the staff. The program was really good. The runs in the morning were the best because it made me heaps fitter. I've continued the program somewhat, running home every day with my bag on my back. My home is around 2 km away from school, and I have managed to run it in under 6 mins! Thank you so much!"

Boys were also asked to rate all aspects of the curriculum. Learning about statistics and climate change, health and well-being and cooking an evening meal were all considered valuable and worthwhile, but overall it was clear that surfing was their absolute love!

In addition to improving the Wambana program, much time and effort has gone into improving the Wambana surrounds. Term two at Wambana was a particularly busy one. Apart from the normal schedule of challenging activities associated with Wambana, boys in 9Watson and 9Williams contributed significantly to the improvement of the Wambana grounds. One important task was to put in place a large limestone rock to house a plaque recognising the generous help from Freddy Chung, Kevin and Nina

Over 200 native trees were planted along the boundary to assist in creating a wind break and shelter from the Yorke Peninsula winds. 9 Williams was particularly busy establishing an orchard in the south east corner of the property. Many varieties of fruit trees have been planted. These range in variety from apricots, peaches, pears, nectarines, apples and peacharines. Our vision is an orchard that will provide a variety of fruit from November to late May. Our boys will have the opportunity to use this fruit for their own consumption as well as learning the skills of pruning, composting, maintaining and caring for an organic orchard.

Every year in the Senior School at Princes is as unique as it is overflowing with achievement, inspiration, accomplishment and laughter.

So it was in 2010. House Swimming, Athletics, InterCols, Work Experience, Peak Adventure, Old Old Boys Assembly or Headmaster's Effort Awards were familiar rites of passage but always different for each individual who experiences them. Our Year 10s only ever experience one Peak Adventure, our Year 11s only one Work Experience or Camp Leadership week and our Year 12s only one shot at their SACE or IB

Diploma. Teachers may teach the same subject but the boys' interaction and engagement with the ideas and with each other each year, is as unique as their DNA.

In 2010 the Senior School grew to 395 students. They were all there in February to inaugurate the 'Over 95 Club' at a new assembly that recognised the exceptional academic performance of the Class of 2009. Supporting our Strategic Plan and tradition of, 'Inspiring Excellence', the Emeritus Assembly is how each graduating Year 12 Class is recognised for its academic achievement.

Our Three Schools structure means new ways to celebrate achievement and the activities of the Senior School. Our Year 12s graduated at the end of Valedictory Week in October. Our Year 10s and 11s celebrated academic and student life achievement at the Senior School Presentation Night in December where Old Scholar and, '2010 MasterChef' Adam Liaw was a guest speaker aptly personifying life-long learning. In addition, presentations and highlights of the learning year engaged all students and parents in attendance.

Year 10 and 11 students undertook two examinations sessions during 2010. The boys rose to this new challenge magnificently. This change reinforced the emphasis that the Senior School places upon our core business; the optimisation of each boy's academic potential. Year 12 students underwent Trial Examinations in Term 3 to

strengthen their preparedness for their final assessments in November.

Towards the same goal, we awarded new Academic Colours and Honours Awards each semester to the highest achieving 15% and 5% of students, respectively. In combination with existing Headmaster's Effort Awards now presented twice each year, balanced recognition of academic achievement, endeavour and Student Life participation, is being achieved.

In another first, our Year 11s completed the first Personal Learning Plan syllabus under the re-modelled SACE. Next year they will be the first cohort to complete the new SACE Research Project.

Ms Monica Magann was Acting Careers Counsellor for much of his year while Mrs Tabitha Noble enjoyed maternity leave. The Careers Expo in August and Work Experience Week were a resounding success and I know many boys were appreciative of her career, study and tertiary planning guidance this year.

Combined Summer and Winter InterCol results favoured us over our rivals and while Football and Tennis results were stellar, it was also pleasing to see the Chess team triumphant once again.

Support for international students was strengthened by the addition of Mr Jeff Ellis to the staff. We now provide additional intensive English language support until students are sufficiently prepared to enter their 'main stream' classes. This further developed the capacity of existing ESL teaching and learning and the potential of overseas students in the Senior School.

The Boarding House led by Fraser Ellis and Mr Tim Agnew excelled again in leadership, sport and academic representation. The measure of the Boarders place in the Senior School and College, was aptly demonstrated by the wonderful, 'Boarder's Herald' publication that coincided with the, 'Boarder's Assembly' in August.

The mid-year musical, 'War of the Worlds' epitomised imagination and effort as Director Mr Mike Steer, led senior students and College staff in back and front of house roles producing nothing less than an artistic triumph. Adaptability was in abundance given the performance was held in the John Dunning Building rather than the still-being-renovated, Assembly Hall.

Our students' moving recognition of Old Scholars who served in conflicts and those that were lost, was a demonstration of how important our young men still consider the College values of: sacrifice, honour and service to others.

If Year 12 students personify the Senior School then we should be proud of the legacy of the Class of 2010. These young men lived and learned together bringing great credit to their families and College. Their work ethic and general demeanour was a model for younger students. One example and a highlight of the year in the Senior School, was their decision to financially support the McGrath Foundation's Breast Cancer Research via the College Formal ('The Red and White'.) This decision was implemented by the students themselves and speaks volumes for a genuine selflessness permeating this group of Princes' Men. The performance of our Student leaders including: the Student Representative Council (SRC), House Leaders and the Prefects led so well and with such maturity by Captain John Hood and Vice-Captain Michael Brown, were excellent.

I thank all Senior School teachers for their performance in 2010. They play the most significant roles in the lives and success of our students at school. I also recognise the inspiring efforts of the members of the Senior School Executive that have led the students and staff so well. Supported by vital non-teaching staff, the Senior School implemented continuous improvement to maintain our purpose of developing young men who will engage the world with competence, confidence and compassion.

Like implementing any major external change, it is a challenge. I must thank the teaching staff for their efforts in writing new learning and assessment plans, teaching programs and developing new resources to ensure that our students are given the best experience possible with the New SACE. At the same time I have been equally impressed with the devotion given to making the last year of the existing SACE a successful one for our Year 12s.

This year has seen significant new initiatives for the Senior School aimed at improving student academic outcomes including an examination session for each semester, flexible study time and the establishment of a benchmark testing and performance monitoring system. The vision of our Head of Senior School — Mr Nicholas de Dear, has been instrumental in allowing for these changes. Equally the support of our SACE Coordinator — Ms Elena Zema and Academic Registrar — Mrs Debi Wilson has been crucial to our continuous improvement. Thank you.

Senior School Academic Award recipients


Overall the median Tertiary Education Rank (TER) was 88. There were 55 merit scores with seven students attaining TERs over 99 placing them in the top 1% of the State. Thirty-seven students were in the top 5% with a TER over 95 and 42% of our Year 12s were placed in the top 10%.

There were 11 merits from students completing the SACE. Six students achieved their SACE through a Vocational Education and Training (VET) pathway.

The IBD results were outstanding with a top score of 43 out of 45 and a mean score of 36 (which equates to a TER of 96.30). There were 44 merit scores achieved in a range of subjects. Sixteen out of twenty-five students achieved an A grade in the Extended Essay which is excellent achievement.

Our students have continued to display their academic abilities in the numerous subject competitions that we enter including the Royal Australian Chemical Institute Chemistry Quiz, Science and Engineering Challenge, South Australian Mathematics Competition, Mathematics and Science Olympiads, Australian Mathematics and Science Competitions, Alliance Francais Competition and the Simpson Prize. All students who received awards in these competitions are congratulated on their achievement.

We anticipate some promising results from the Class of 2010, as we strive to raise the bar once more with academic performance at Prince Alfred College.

Community Service

The generosity of our Prince Alfred Community is remarkable and the support of so many Community Service initiatives this year has been indicative of that spirit of giving and genuine concern for others.

The support of the Uniting Care Winter Appeal and their Christmas Toy and Hamper was outstanding with the College community responding most generously with gifts of cans, blankets, cash, toys and provisions.

This school wide effort was complemented by the support of the Cambodian Sunrise Orphanages, Legacy, World Vision and Child Protection initiatives. Students from all ages participated in raffles, the selling of badges, participation in the 40 Hour Famine and other fundraising programs. Our boys at all levels have been proactive about "giving back to the community".

The Preparatory School have set up a Community Action Team that has reshaped the SRC to be more service focussed. This successful initiative has generated enormous interest amongst our younger boys and planted some very healthy seeds for the future.

The presence of Community Service as part of the Creativity, Action and Service component of the International Baccalaureate program has generated many wonderful service initiatives whilst the inception of the PLP has also challenged our Year 11 boys to create programs of at least ten hours of authentic service.

At time of writing the Year 10 Peak Adventure is being revised to include an equal element of physical challenge and community service which will significantly reshape the program. The year will conclude with two very significant events. These include the annual Outreach Camp where our senior boys will "buddy up" with intellectually disabled boys from the Grove and Elizabeth Special Schools and spend three days at Scotts Creek and the inaugural Cambodia Tour where a small party of staff and students will spend ten days working in the Sunrise Orphanages.

The year has represented a significant increase in Community Service programs across the College and it is certainly a focus which we intend to continue to grow in the years ahead.

Simpson Prize Canberra Trip

As runner up of the South Australian division of the Simpson Prize I was privileged to travel to Canberra with the winner from SA to meet the other winners and runners-up from all around Australia for a prize presentation in the Australian War Memorial.

We all travelled to Canberra on Sunday 14th March and remained there until Tuesday 16th. Monday was our only full day in Canberra and was just that; full.

We were at the War Memorial by 7:45 long before the doors opened and were given the fantastic opportunity to lay a wreath on the tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

I was actually lucky to be chosen to read the Ode of Remembrance inside the tomb itself. An experience I will never forget. We spent, in total, eight hours at the War Memorial including tours of each of the galleries, our prize presentation by a minister from the department of education, and behind the scenes viewings of objects that many staff of the Memorial have not seen, in particular, letters that John Simpson himself wrote to his sister and mother from Gallipoli.

Dinner that evening took place at the Royal Military College of Duntroon which we shared with members of the academy, officers and cadets.

Tuesday passed in a haze which included Parliament house, narrowly missing the Prime Minister himself, the national museum and numerous card games at the airport as each state's winner and runner-up left in turn. The experience was something I feel incredibly fortunate to have taken part in and the entire group became firm friends.

I need to thank my history teacher Mr Williams and also Mr McKinnon who sent my essay to the Simpson Prize. Finally the History teacher's association of Australia and the Simpson Prize Affiliate who provided chaperones and fabulous organisation to make the trip run smoothly. Any Year 9 or 10 who get the opportunity to enter this competition should take on the challenge and do their best, they will not regret it.

Cap D'ail and Paris

On New Year's Day 21 PAC boys, ranging from Year 9 to Year 12, gathered at Adelaide airport ready to leave for a 3-week stay in France, accompanied by Mr Juergen Kracht and Mrs Marie Milicevic. Joining us on this trip were 16 girls from Wilderness and their teachers. We flew by Emirates with stopovers in Singapore and Dubai.

The beautiful blue Mediterranée spread below us as we prepared to land in Nice, the capital of the Côte d'Azur. It was a mild sunny day and after a pleasant trip by coach, we arrived at the Centre Mediterranéen d'Etudes Françaises (CMEF) in Cap d'Ail.

The first two weeks were spent at the CMEF, located in the magical setting of a 3 hectare park-like campus overlooking the Mediterranean Sea. There, the boys practised their French with 3-hour daily lessons in the mornings, followed by excursions to places of interest in the afternoons.

The cultural side of the tour was well catered for by visits to several art galleries such as the Musée Chagall in Nice and walks through picturesque medieval villages such as St. Paul de Vence. There were opportunities for shopping in Nice and even as far as San Remo in Italy, where the open air markets offered great bargains. Monaco and Cannes had a fascination of their own as international centres for world celebrities. The boys enjoyed taking photos of Ferraris in Monaco and looking for the handprints of their favourite stars on the plaza in front of the Cannes Film Festival Centre.

The evenings at the CMEF were filled with many interactive fun activities such as the karaoke, pottery painting à la Jean Cocteau, "EthiCasino", disco night, magician show, film evening and folk dancing lessons. On an excursion to a soccer game to Monaco, the boys happily joined in with the local fans to cheer the home side to a 4–0 win against Montpellier. At the end of our stay in Cap d'Ail, the students received certificates of achievement for their language studies. We were also invited to a reception by the Lord Mayor, held at a mansion formerly owned by Russian royalty, where we were treated to refreshments and received gifts.

We left Cap d'Ail by coach for a one day stop in Avignon on our way to Paris. The Palace of the Popes was the highlight of our visit together with "Le Pont du Gard", an aqueduct built by the Romans. After the visit it was onto the TGV, a train which travels at speeds up to 300 km/hr, to take us to Paris.

Paris architecture was a feast for the eyes. The boys learned to use the Metro as we travelled to the landmarks: Tour Eiffel, Arc de Triomphe, Louvre, Centre Pompidou, Montmartre, Sacré Coeur, Sainte Chapelle and Quay d'Orsay. Paris was much colder than the South of France but even the misty, rainy days did not deter us from long walks through the city and going in the evening for a treat of "crêpes" and "gauffres". We celebrated our last evening in Paris with dinner in a quaint restaurant in Le Quartier Latin, where the boys indulged in the French delicacy of snails in garlic sauce. "Délicieux!", was the verdict.

The PAC boys were excellent representatives of their college and of Australian youth. Mr Kracht, who has lead numerous trips to France, declared this group as: "The best group ever". The students felt they had greatly benefitted from this immersion in French culture and some are even considering studying in France in the future.

Here is a sample of the 2009 colours and honours recipients who excelled academically by achieving TER scores in the high nineties; Alistair Young 99.2 (Drive Tennis from Yr 8, 1st XVIII football), Jack Trengove 97.6 (captain 1st XVIII football, captain 1st XI cricket), Travis Cordingly 99.85 (1st VIII rowing, 1st XV rugby), Tom Cocks 95.25 (Div 1 squash, 1st VIII rowing), Jordan Walsh 97.75 (1st XI cricket), Jonathan Foo 99.85 (captain drive tennis, basketball), Matthew Watson 99.5 (1st XVIII football), Jordan Sanders 97.2 (swimming, water polo), Simon Barnett 98.2 (1st XI soccer), Cameron Wong 95.9 (captain swimming), Joel Amos 99.85 (captain debating), Karl Siebels 96.75 (1st XVIII football), Angus McLaren 97.75 (1st VIII rowing), Andrew Sykes 96.6 (1st XI cricket) just to mention a few.

Many of these outstanding young athletes held leadership positions within their teams, played musical instruments and many were also prefects.

This leads me to the point that Princes encourages boys to be actively involved in the co-curricula program and that despite the busy nature of school life, it would appear that the benefits gained from being fit and healthy certainly enhanced and complimented academic performance.
