Headmaster's Report

This year, the College has come closer to realising our vision and purpose. The current Strategic Plan which has guided the development of Prince Alfred College over the last three years will conclude at the end of 2012. The plan has directed our educational, architectural, financial, strategic and operational progress since 2010. Our vision of inspiring excellence has served the College very well these last three years. The Prince Alfred College community has grown together and achieved its goals. We have put realistic changes in place and protected the enduring values and traditions which have defined the school over more than 140 years. We can be very proud of the culture of leadership and learning that is evident here at Princes.

We have now begun to plan for the development of the College to 2015 and further to 2020. This deliberate process of change to be implemented from the start of next year will build on the previous strategic plan to achieve tangible outcomes across the school community. An exciting future is ahead of us.

In 2012, we have made significant steps forward in student achievement, community relationships, communication, school initiatives and enhanced the College's reputation. The College has enjoyed the largest enrolment in recent history of 1102 students from R-12, and a further 140 in the Early Learning Centre. Our boarding enrolment has also stood at close to record levels.

The introduction of the Directorate of Teaching and Learning has been a major feature of 2012. Under the direction of Mrs Andrea Agnew, Mr Kelvin Sparks, Mrs Joanna Cardinal and Mr Martin McKinnon and, in Semester Two, Mr Mark Dell'Oro, we have sought to develop a shared understanding and practice of excellence in teaching and learning.

This year, the Directorate has developed and delivered a highly effective professional learning program on teaching and learning differentiation to the advantage of all students. The introduction of One-to-World tablet computers this year has also enhanced our teaching and learning methodologies. Princes Pedagogy, our philosophy on teaching and learning — the ways boys learn, and teachers teach at PAC — is the key pillar of our work here at Princes.

Prince Alfred College is a proud member of the International Boys Schools Coalition (IBSC). This year we were able to send twelve members of our staff to attend the annual conference held at Scotch College in Melbourne. Several of our staff, including Mr Anthony Harradine, Mrs Andrea Agnew, Mrs Joanna Cardinal and Mr Kelvin Sparks, and the three Deputies of School, presented workshops which shared with national and international delegates, developments in boys' education at PAC in eduKart, wellbeing, and teaching and learning.

The year started well with exceptional results from the Year 12 students of 2011. The first group to undertake the New SACE joined with their International Baccalaureate Diploma peers to achieve 57 merit scores with 34.9% of students gaining an ATAR of 90.00 or more and an average ATAR of 81.73. Four students, Albert Wu, Minhao Hu, Jock Clarnette and Joon Seok-Jang achieved perfect ATAR scores of 99.95. 34 graduates from 2011 joined the 'Over 95 Club' and were listed on the rapidly expanding Honour Board in ANZAC Hall.

The ultimate academic award of the John Dunn Prize and Dux of the College was presented to Albert Wu. The EB Colton Prize for Proxime Accessit to the Dux of the College was Yoon Seok-Jang. The Malpas Prize for Science was presented to Jock Clarnette;

the Longbottom Prize for Mathematics was awarded to Vinh Quang Thoi; and the Colton Prize for Arts and Languages was won by Kieran Altmann. The Year 12 students of 2011 can be very proud of their academic results with the majority being offered first round places at universities here in Adelaide, around the nation and overseas. We were thrilled by the news that 12 graduates were offered places to study Medicine/Surgery and 18 in Engineering.

Throughout 2012, our students have continued to perform at a high standard in their academic pursuits. Henry Bui (Year 11) was one of 100 Australian students invited to sit the Mathematics Olympiad, and Jiahao (William) Cheng and Louis Xiao received prizes in the Australian Mathematics competition at intermediate level, as did Folu Komolafe in the junior section. 30 students in Years 10–12 achieved high distinctions and distinctions in the RACI Chemistry Quiz. Similarly, 27 students from Years 8 and 10 achieved outstanding scores in the Australian History competition, and 25 gained high distinctions and distinctions in the National Geographic Geography competition. Declan Sharpe was Runner-Up in the Simpson History Prize — a national award. Furthermore, PAC was placed 86th of 802 schools in the Language Perfect World Championships. We were delighted to hear that John Dongas, Hank Ly and James Keeves achieved exceptional results in the Alliance Francaise competition.

Boys from the Preparatory School once again entered the Oliphant Science Awards with great enthusiasm and were recognized at the highest level. Regan Nelson took out first place in the R–2 category and Max Kirby won the prize for Year 6–7. Preshaan Thavarajah gained the highest score in the country in Year 4 in the Australian Mathematics Competition, joining with more than 14 Prep boys awarded high distinctions.

The Three Schools structure has enjoyed its fourth year of operation in 2012. The implementation of the IB Middle Years Program (MYP) has been an important curriculum emphasis this year and we were delighted to receive an encouraging pre-authorisation report after a visit by a representative from the Asia-Pacific Regional Office in September. The MYP is now fully implemented in the Middle School and will progress to Year 10 in 2013. I extend my sincere thanks to Mrs Joanna Cardinal for her exceptional leadership in this critical change management process. The PYP provides an outstanding curriculum for our Preparatory School boys and those in Years 11 and 12 continue to benefit from the choice of studying the SACE or the International Baccalaureate Diploma. The three Heads of School, Mr Neil Andary, Mr Peter Karamoshos and Mr Nicholas de Dear have expertly guided the development of our Three Schools during the year.

The Princes Man is defined by his academic potential and his all-round development. All round development occurs within many contexts here at Princes — sport, music, drama, outdoor education and cultural pursuits. Our success in these areas in 2012 has been notable.

The Prince Alfred College First XI won the 136th Cricket Intercol by 266 runs, and advanced to the final of the State One-Day Knockout. Four talented cricketers — Kelvin Smith, Jake Weatherald, Thomas Andrews and Lachlan Griffiths were selected for the Australian Under 19 squad. The 115th Tennis Intercol was won 9 rubbers to 3 and added to our tally of six consecutive wins against St Peter's College. The Intercol badminton, swimming and water polo teams lost to SPSC.

2012 was a wonderful year for rowing. After seven years of defeat, the PAC First VIII won the Head of the River. Our Head of the River crews also won the 10A, 2nd IV, 1st IV and 2nd VIII events. Tom Vasileff and William Burfield were gold medal winners in the Under 17 Men's Double Scull event at the National Championships held in Perth. Four rowers — Jack Kelly, Nicholas Parletta, Tax Skrembos and Blake Anderson competed in the 2012 Royal Henley Regatta, one of the best rowing regattas in the world, and made the semi-final. Congratulations to all rowers, the parent support group, and the coaching team led by Director, Dr Andrew Randell, for an outstanding season.

Winter Intercollegiate contests saw wins by PAC in soccer, hockey and football and defeats in rugby and table tennis. The 35th Soccer Intercol was a 2–1 win with PAC retaining the Simpson Cup for the sixth year in a row. The 141st Football Intercol was a massive win for Princes, 14–16 to 1–2, which recorded the seventh win a row for the PAC First XVIII. The Firsts also won the Messenger Press Premiership Shield. Our hockey team won the Murton Shield comfortably defeating Saints 5–1 and were winners of the State Knockout competition. James Keeves was selected for the Australian Schoolboys Hockey team.

The 40th Intercol Chess competition saw PAC defeat SPSC 6–4 after trailing 4–0 in the early part of the evening. Our Senior and Junior Chess teams were State Champions and competed in the national finals held in Melbourne. The PAC teams won five out of five chess competitions. I extend special thanks to Mr Richard Thorne and Mr Peter Serwan for their passionate support of Chess at PAC. The 22nd Intercol Debate was won by Saints. Our Year 8 Debating team of Aedan Towie, Christopher O'Leary, Eddie Han and Henry Lock won the Grand Final held in Parliament House. Intercol Table Tennis and Rugby were won by St Peter's College teams. The Under 14 Rugby team took out the Rugby Union Grand Final in dramatic fashion trailing 24 to nil at half time to win 26–24. The First XV Rugby team was runner-up to SPSC in the State Under 18 Grand Final. PAC Squash Teams achieved exceptional results winning Division 1, Division 2 and the Year 8 Grand Finals.

The Music program at the College has continued to excel. At the national Generations in Jazz event in Mt Gambier our bands were placed 1st in Division 3B, 3rd in Division 3A, 6th in Big Band 1, and equal 8th in Big Band 2. The Jazz Choir was placed 12th in their first entry to the competition. Luke Janowski was selected as one of the best six soloists out of all 2500 competitors, and Angus Lawrence and Hugo Chapman were given individual honours

with selection for the Division 1 and Division 3 Superbands. Our bands and ensembles were also highly successful at the ABODA Band and Orchestral Festival achieving gold and silver standards in seven of the eight categories. The Senior Concert Band gained first place, and Big Band 2 second place overall. The Director of Music, Mr Andrew Newhouse, has made an enormous contribution to music at Prince Alfred College and I pay tribute to him for his commitment and dedication to music performance.

Artistic performance has been ably demonstrated in drama, visual arts, graphic design and creative writing. This year's publication of *Shades of Red* is outstanding and features a diverse range of prose and poetry from the boys and also staff. William Curyer's poem *A Journey Too Long, Too Short* is a powerful and symbolic expression of his personal experience this year. Fox Crowley's poetic words on bullying had great impact. Drama performances this year included the senior boys' production of *Our Town*, a Year 12 Variety Show directed by Year 12 student Tim Carlier, and many other performances across the year groups. Involvement in media and film has grown with Year 10 boys making a significant contribution to the "Volunteer Now" film competition. artsPACES in the Preparatory School was truly an exceptional display of every boy's creative expression — it was one of the highlights of the year. Art and Design exhibitions also showcased talent in the creative arts. This year's Jack de Vidas art prizes were won by Edmario Lesi, Preparatory School, Marco Mitolo, Middle School, and Xavier Warne, Senior School.

Our outdoor education programs make a significant contribution to the development of wellbeing and character in the boys. Scotts Creek camps, the Wambana Extended Stay and Peak Adventure challenge our students and see them grow in confidence, develop talents and skills and become resilient. I am deeply grateful for the work and leadership of Mr Dale Hobbs, Mr Phil Noble and Mr Brad Newton and their respective teams of staff.

The 68th annual Science Journal co-edited by Theo Squires and Henry Bui included an impressive number of articles from both Middle and Senior School students ranging from 'The Science of Steroids' to 'How are memories stored and retrieved?' Dr Paula Mills has once again assisted the students with this publication, along with her work to promote STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) across the College from R-12. This new initiative has seen a number of exciting STEM projects actively taken up by the boys, including the Space Camp held at Arkaroola. eduKart is now an established component of our Year 8 course, and eduCook under trial this year holds much excitement for the Year 7s. I thank Mr Anthony Harradine and Mr Paul Balestrin for their initiative in developing and implementing eduKart.

The College has been ably led this year by Captain James Keeves and Vice-Captain, Harry Barnes, who have been assisted by Seb Porter and Lucas De Garis in the Middle School and Yuri Coolen and Luke D'Ortenzio in the Preparatory School. Harry Barnes' words at the Valedictory Assembly epitomized the

exceptional student leadership at the College in 2012. He said, "Princes men, do not grow old with regrets. Find the things that make you happy in life and cherish them. The College's greatest satisfaction is not in accolades, but in producing men that can impact for the betterment of the world. I hope that wherever your life may lead, that you remember how you got there. Princes has given us its all, it is time to give our all, to Princes." The new Prefect blazers introduced this year, in celebration of 100 years of Prefects at Prince Alfred College, were a fitting symbol of the outstanding leadership we have seen from this group in 2012.

Similarly we have seen strong leadership in the Boarding House and by our International Students. Jason Tse and Daniel Kim have been highly effective in supporting the international students program, and it was fitting that Jason was one of the two recipients of the Headmaster's Medal this year. Cameron Graetz as Captain of Boarding and his Vice-Captain Digby McNeil have worked closely alongside Mr Tim Agnew to grow our commitment to excellence in every facet of the Boarding experience. I pay tribute to the Boarding House staff, particularly Mr Tim Agnew who departed our shores for Vancouver at the end of Term Three, and Mr Phil Noble for holding the fort in Term Four, and also the Boarding Parents Support Group superbly chaired by Mr Craig Hole. This year's Boarders Day was another highlight of the year with boarding life at Princes well recorded by the Boarders' Herald.

The largest single building project in the history of the College, the new Health and Sports Centre, under construction throughout the year, has transformed the north east corner of the College grounds. This magnificent building, to be opened early next year, will comprise facilities for a multitude of sports, and health and wellbeing programs. It will include a Princes Sporting Hall of Fame which will acknowledge more than 500 State, National and International sportsmen who attended the College since its inception in 1869. I thank Mr Alan Daws, our Project Manager for his vigilant supervision of this significant development. Other building projects in 2012 have seen the refurbishment of the Torrens Boathouse, the upgrade of the toilet block for Middle and Senior School students, and general improvement of buildings and grounds across the



College. Our thanks go to Mr Peter Hughes and his team for maintaining the school to the highest standard.

The Prince Alfred College Early Learning Centre is a special place. The program for our 2–4 year olds is a wonderful tribute to the dedicated teachers and co-educators who work in this unique learning environment. The Town Square is always a hub of activity and Grandies Day a genuine expression of community and engagement in our College.

Community Service has been enhanced this year under the direction of Mr Martin Charlwood, Mr Andrew Stace and Rev Mark Dickens. In December, 17 senior students will travel to Cambodia in support of the Sunrise Children's Villages and Habitat for Humanity. Shaun Gershwitz, Sam Leeson and Jock Girvan cycled to Port Augusta and back and raised thousands of dollars in support of our commitment to children and impoverished families in Cambodia. The Walk a Mile in my Boots campaign in support of the Hutt Street Centre saw a sea of red blazers walking down Hutt Street. Our student led fundraising efforts throughout the year have raised more than \$30,000. The annual Red and White was a great success with students and their partners contributing \$5.00 each to support Prostate Cancer research. The Year 7 boys helped support Juvenile Diabetes research with their billy cart race at the Clipsal 500.

The Prince Alfred College community has been well supported once again this year through the work of the Parents and Friends Associations, the Foundation and the Prince Alfred Old Collegians Association. We are indebted to the leadership provided by Mrs Jane Greenslade and Mrs Lisa Rasheed, Dr Janet Young and Mr Graham Burfield and their respective committees. The Martini Ball this year raised over \$50,000 in support of the Health and Sports Centre and the Moulin Rouge theme was enjoyed by more than 500 guests. Old Scholar 10, 20, 30, 40 and 50 reunions have been held and branch dinners attended in good numbers in every State capital city, in London and Hong Kong and across regional South Australia. Over 500 Old Reds gathered for the PAOCA Annual Dinner in July with special guest Mr Michael Klim entertaining the crowd. Vintage Reds was a great event as usual and Old Old Boys Assembly honoured over 200 former scholars who began at the College 60 or more years ago. The P&F committees in the Preparatory and

Senior/Middle Schools provided many fundraising and friend raising events.

The Prince Alfred College Council fills an important role in governing the school and planning for its future. This year, a new constitution to better serve the needs of modern governance has been negotiated and an Advisory Group established to improve links with the College community. Dr Ben Tidswell has provided exceptional leadership as Chair, ably assisted by Mr John Keeves as Deputy and Mr David Sanders as Treasurer. Mrs Margaret Gleaves, my Executive Assistant, has worked tirelessly as Minute Secretary in support of Council and its committees. The College also extends sincere thanks to Chairs of the Risk and Compliance Committee, Mr John Keeves; Building Committee, Mrs Fleur Michell, and Finance and Audit, Mr David Sanders. Other key business of the Council this year has been assisting me in the development of the new Strategic Plan for 2013–2015. Her pedagogical blend of humour, thorough professionalism and "tough love" made her an engaging teacher who fostered robust relationships with her boys, giving them the confidence and resilience to maximise their full potential. She was a great listener and an expert observer of human behaviour, often being able to sense potential issues and dealing with them well before they impacted upon a boy's learning or social development. Her mother's intuition, which had been so well crafted while raising four of her own children, allowed Viv to be highly effective as an educator, and engendered the trust and respect of her students.

Viv extended her classroom expertise to work in a pastoral setting as Head of Delbridge House and then later as Head of Cotton House. Viv excelled in both these roles. Working closely with boys and families she developed a House culture which was

the pride of the Senior School. Viv's understanding of adolescent development, and her genuine belief in each individual's abilities, fostered a pastoral environment in which boys could flourish. She was an innovator in behavioural strategy and an expert counsellor. She was also instrumental in mentoring a new generation of House Leaders and pastoral tutors.

As a peer Viv was a wonderfully supportive staff member. Kind, generous with her time and sage with her advice, Viv set the highest standards of professionalism whilst filling the room with an infectious love of life. Her pioneering work with the Dimensions of Learning Program in the early '90s introduced staff to ground breaking cognitive methodologies. Viv was indeed pivotal in inspiring a generation of staff members in wellbeing and best practice pedagogy.

Viv's contributions to the development of squash at Prince Alfred College are immeasurable. Her engaging personality as a coach and her personal flair as a player are widely recognised as being the greatest catalysts in making Princes the outstanding Squash School that it is today.

In January of this year the new National Quality Framework became the recognised standard for all Early Childhood settings both public and private across the whole of Australia.

All Early Childhood environments are acknowledged by a new governing body called Australian Children's Education and Care Quality Authority whose role is to ensure the wellbeing, health and safety of children in early childhood settings and to improve the educational and developmental outcomes for these children with a regulatory authority based in each state.

As part of this a new curriculum framework called "The Early Years Learning Framework" has also been introduced as the national standard and the staff of the ELC have been actively working through learning about, understanding and implementing this framework. We have also spent time working on how it fits with our other influences, namely the PYP and the Reggio Emilia project.

Under this new Framework all centres are required to do a self assessment and produce a Quality Improvement Plan that will be an ongoing working document and this became a major focus for the Princes ELC staff over the course of this year. Staff spent many hours of team work to look critically at all our practices and procedures and produce this document that was then submitted to ACECQA.

In early August 2012 our ELC underwent a two day review by ACECQA which focused on seven different areas:

1. Educational program and practice
2. Children's Health and safety
3. Physical environment
4. Staffing Arrangements

5. Relationships with Children

6. Collaborative partnerships with families and communities

7. Leadership and service management

We then anxiously waited for the report for four weeks. When it arrived we were delighted to read that we had been rated as "Exceeding the National Standard" in all seven areas! There are four levels of ratings and this is the highest achievable.

As a centre we were pleased to be rated at this level but would also like to acknowledge that the new rating and assessment process has been designed as an ongoing procedure that continues beyond the assessment and we will continue to work towards our goals of continual improvement.

Another busy year has passed at Princes Early Learning Centre with record numbers of students ensuring rich and diverse inquiries every day. Although our termly PYP units of inquiry served as our main provocations for children to ponder over, the year also saw the unfolding of spontaneous investigations into everything from blossoms to bubbles, mini beasts to mega trucks and the solar system to our senses.

In term one this year children from ages two to five explored interaction with colour in a unit entitled Conversations in Colour. Over ten weeks (and beyond) students not only explored colour mixing but also pondered how colours makes us feel and encourage us to respond to them. Whilst older children investigated how colours send us messages in our everyday life and the process of splitting light into the colours of the spectrum, younger students explored favourite colours and colour creation.

In term two students explored the world of machinery, simple and complex. As provocation educators shared the insides of machines, machines around our homes and machines we could manipulate. In response to this, children developed investigations into pulleys and axels, machine components and their functions, electrical circuits and how simple machines can help us. They further developed historical perspective as they considered how tasks were completed before some machines were invented.

In term three as part of our PYP unit Home Sweet Home students shared their knowledge about homes and houses, both for people and animals, and compared this with information about different places around the world. Together they began to unravel where certain animals and humans preferred to live and how this affected their housing choices. Students discovered that all sorts of animals and humans have to share their habitat and housing and were keen to share their understandings creatively through illustration, construction and modelling.

Term four, always our busiest, saw us exploring our sense of identity and belonging through our unit Who We Are. This investigation had grown over the entire year and allowed children to experiment with identity through dramatic play and role taking, observe similarities and differences between people

and further develop their respect for diversity. Younger students were deeply engaged in their sense of place, exploring family units and classroom communities and how they function, whilst older students looked closely at emotions, achievements and personal relationships.

Through all of our many inquiries, investigations, experiments and ponderings over the year Princes ELC students have been encouraged and supported to develop the skills for living and learning with joy and enthusiasm. Bring on 2013!

Preparatory School Academic Report



Kelvin Sparks, Director of Teaching and Learning: Years ELC–6 (Including PYP Coordination)

2012 was a year in which creativity was emphasised strongly in the Preparatory School as an important component of a well-rounded education. Using the concept of a 'promenade' pioneered in 2010, artsPACes in September was a wonderful celebration of the arts. At every year level from ELC to Year 6, students engaged in a rich creative process that spawned a wide range of performances and installations reflecting their unique imagination and diverse learning.

In a similar way, our Year 6 boys took the PYP Exhibition to a new level this year. Under the central idea that 'Passion can lead us to take action', boys worked in collaborative groups to deepen their understanding of issues ranging from evolution to conflict and global economies. For the first time, the boys used ICT in the form of a wiki to log the process they went through. This medium not only provided a unique insight into the essential social, communication and self-management skills that the boys were learning through an authentic project such as this, it also helped them reflect on and refine those skills along the way.

In terms of staging the Exhibition itself, we challenged the boys to think 'outside the booth'

and find more creative ways to present their learning to their audience. To support them in this, our specialists, Mandy Bell, Kellie McCauley and Greg Bishop, worked directly with groups of boys, helping them to utilise the arts and ICT as a powerful medium for communicating their ideas and understanding. Parents and friends were astounded by the depth of thinking, inventiveness and passion of the boys as they presented a real exhibition of their learning across a wide range of skills, concepts and subjects.

During 2012, we continued to integrate a more play-based approach in our Reception classrooms, allowing our youngest learners to use their naturally playful inquisitiveness to explore the wonders of their world, discovering along the way literacy and numeracy as useful tools for deepening their understanding and communicating their emerging ideas.

Our older boys continue to perform very well in external competitions. As usual, public speaking inspired excellence across a range of formats. The Kings Speech Award, launched in 2011, was won this year by Hamish Greenslade. A large cohort of boys again nominated to join a debating team, giving the Preparatory School two A-grade and four B-grade teams. All these boys, who gave up a considerable number of lunch times to refine their public speaking skills, performed with confidence and debated vigorously. Both our A-grade teams made the finals, placing 1st and 4th respectively after the minor round.

We had our best year to date in the IPSHA Poetry Recital competition. Three boys from Years 4–6 took part in the inter-school competition, where Daniel Mills won the Year 4 competition with a nuanced performance and Saad Khatri was placed second in the Year 6 section. It was pleasing to see Jordan Lesicar, who had represented the Preparatory School for the last three years, go on to win the Year 7 competition. Poems by Preparatory School boys again featured in 'Shades of Red', the school's creative writing and arts publication.

Preparatory School boys again featured strongly among the prizewinners in the Oliphant Science Awards, with Regan Nelson and Max Kirkby taking out First Place in the R-2 and 6-7 categories respectively. Max's computer application on autonomous and wireless cars earned him Third Place overall in the prestigious Young Scientist Award.

A large number of boys in Middle and Upper Primary once again chose to take part in the Australian Mathematics Competition. Axel Heinrich and George Vagionas received High Distinctions for their efforts and our boys were further awarded an outstanding 14 Distinctions and 40 Credits. One of our Year 4 boys, Preshaan Thavarajah, received a prize for achieving the highest score in the country at his year level. Denny Han and Noah Miles (both Year 6) along with Preshaan were the top-placed PAC students in the annual Maths Olympiad.

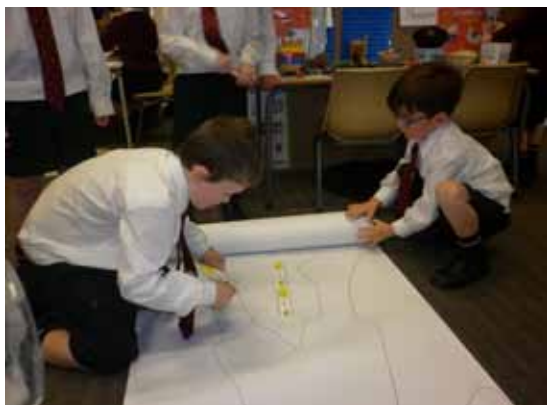

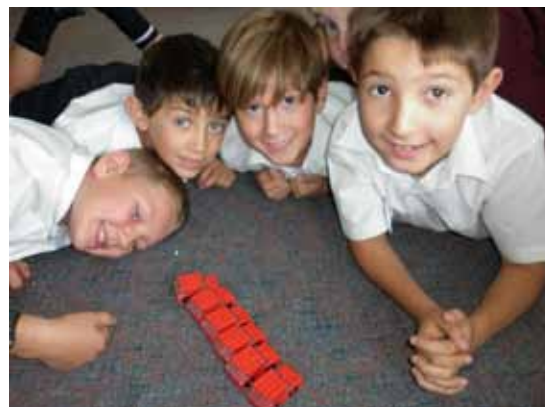

Visit to SAFM / Triple M

'Sharing The Planet' — 'Too Hot To Handle'

An inquiry into rights and responsibilities in the struggle to share finite resources with other people and with other living things; communities and the relationship within and between them.

What will be the main energy source of the future? How does the generation of power impact on the environment? These were questions investigated by the boys as they researched renewable and non-renewable energy sources, looking firstly at how energy was generated; its advantages and disadvantages, then the impact on climate change. Guest speaker, Charlie McKenzie, explained the development of turbines to harness wind to create energy, along with the merits of other energy sources. To demonstrate and share their knowledge, the boys created web pages and powerpoints. A visit to the Pelican Point Power Station consolidated the boys' understanding of energy production for a sustainable future.

A visit to the ship Endeavour highlighted the challenges faced by Cook as he navigated the world



'How We Organise Ourselves' — 'Global Poverty'

An inquiry into the interconnectedness of human-made systems and communities; function of organisations; societal decision making and their impact on humankind and the environment

From the outset, this unit captivated the boys as they investigated and compared the wealthiest and poorest countries in the world to acquire a greater understanding of global poverty and, more specifically, how poverty is caused. 'The World Feast Game' simulated trading relationships and encouraged the boys to question the inequity and injustices in this world. This prompted an investigation by the boys into what action is being implemented to address these injustices. Our research and discussions culminated in the Year 5 'Giant Sale' in which the boys sold pre-loved toys and books to raise money for Uniting World's 'Everything in Common' appeal. To augment this monetary activity we also organised a collection of

used shoes to support the Butterfly Movement in sending containers of shoes to Africa.

'How we express ourselves' — 'To Buy or Not To Buy'

An inquiry into the ways which we discover and express ideas, feelings, nature, culture, beliefs and values, the ways in which we reflect on, extend and enjoy our creativity; our appreciation of the aesthetic.

Everyday our lives are bombarded with advertising, created to persuade us and influence our decisions. The notion of exploring advertising and how and why it works had the boys in an early buzz of excitement. Throughout this inquiry the boys investigated the different forms of advertising, strategies used and how advertising affects our values and wellbeing. We had guest speakers; Mr Andrew Kay and Mr Tim Dangerfield share their expertise and a few tricks of the advertising world, which sparked much discussion about the power of advertising. An excursion to the home of SAFM/ Triple M radio stations opened our eyes to the behind the scenes components of advertising. A lucky few from each class even got to record their own radio advertisement! The boys poured their energies into creating their own advertising campaigns whereby they designed and created a new product, conducted market research to inform their campaign and filmed their own advertisements.

'How the world works' — 'It makes the world go round'

An inquiry into the natural world and its laws; the interaction between the natural world (physical and biological) and human societies; how humans use their understanding of scientific principles; the impact of scientific and technological advances on society and on the environment.

Day one saw the boys designing a marble run in order to move a marble from beginning to end without assistance; a task that highlighted the knowledge and understanding the boys had of energy transfer. There was much discussion and decision making as to why the marble was falling off or slowing to a stop, many creative ideas for problem solving were shared and finally; success. All this was to introduce and demonstrate the different

forms of energy, how it can be stored, used or changed and the sources of energy. A visit from Lee Harris of CSIRO had the boys in a spin with a variety of experiments and experiences demonstrating the different states of energy. The boys thoroughly enjoyed this exciting inquiry into how people, animals, plants and machines use energy to make things happen.

Who we are — 'Under Pressure'

An inquiry into the nature of the self; beliefs and values; personal, physical, mental, social and spiritual health; human relationships in families, friends, communities and cultures; rights and responsibilities; what it means to be human.

The boys began by spending some time identifying the characteristics of a bully and a victim. Once they were able to do that the focus then turned to how our peers can have such an influence, both positive and negative, on the decisions we make.

While it was only a short unit, the knowledge the boys gained was then shared through a range of activities with our buddy classes and was used as a regular reference in our weekly 'Circle Time' sessions.

Where we are in place and time — 'Journey into the Unknown'

An inquiry into orientation in place and time; personal histories; homes and journeys; the discoveries, explorations and migrations of humankind; the relationships between and the interconnectedness of individuals and civilizations, from local and global perspectives.

Our unit involved looking at world explorers and how throughout history, exploration has impacted on the quality of their lives as well as the lives of others. The boys also focused on the reasons for exploration and looked at numerous explorers ranging from Marco Polo in the 13th century to Edmund Hillary in the 20th century.

We were fortunate enough to visit the replica of the Endeavour while it was docked in Port Adelaide. The boys were led on a tour around the boat by volunteers who told us stories of what happened back then, and for a brief moment of time we were able to feel like we were part of Captain Cook's crew as he sailed in search of the "Great South Land".

Year 5 boys learnt more about Cook's voyages when they visited the Maritime Museum.

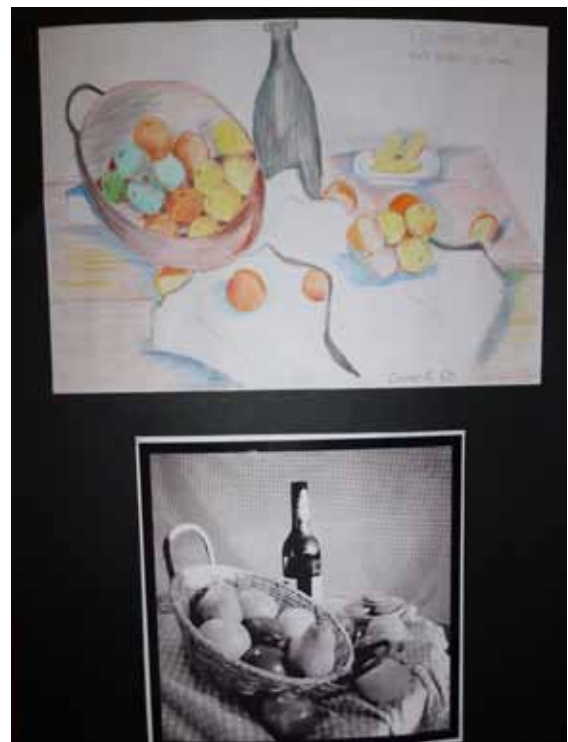

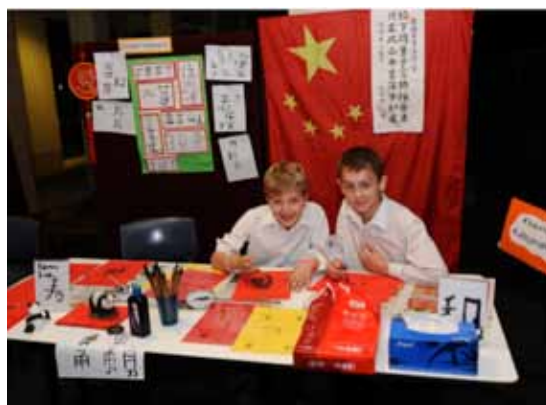
Once again, the Jack de Vidas Art Exhibition was an awe-inspiring display of work with the audience being required to respond by voting for a winning entry in each year level.

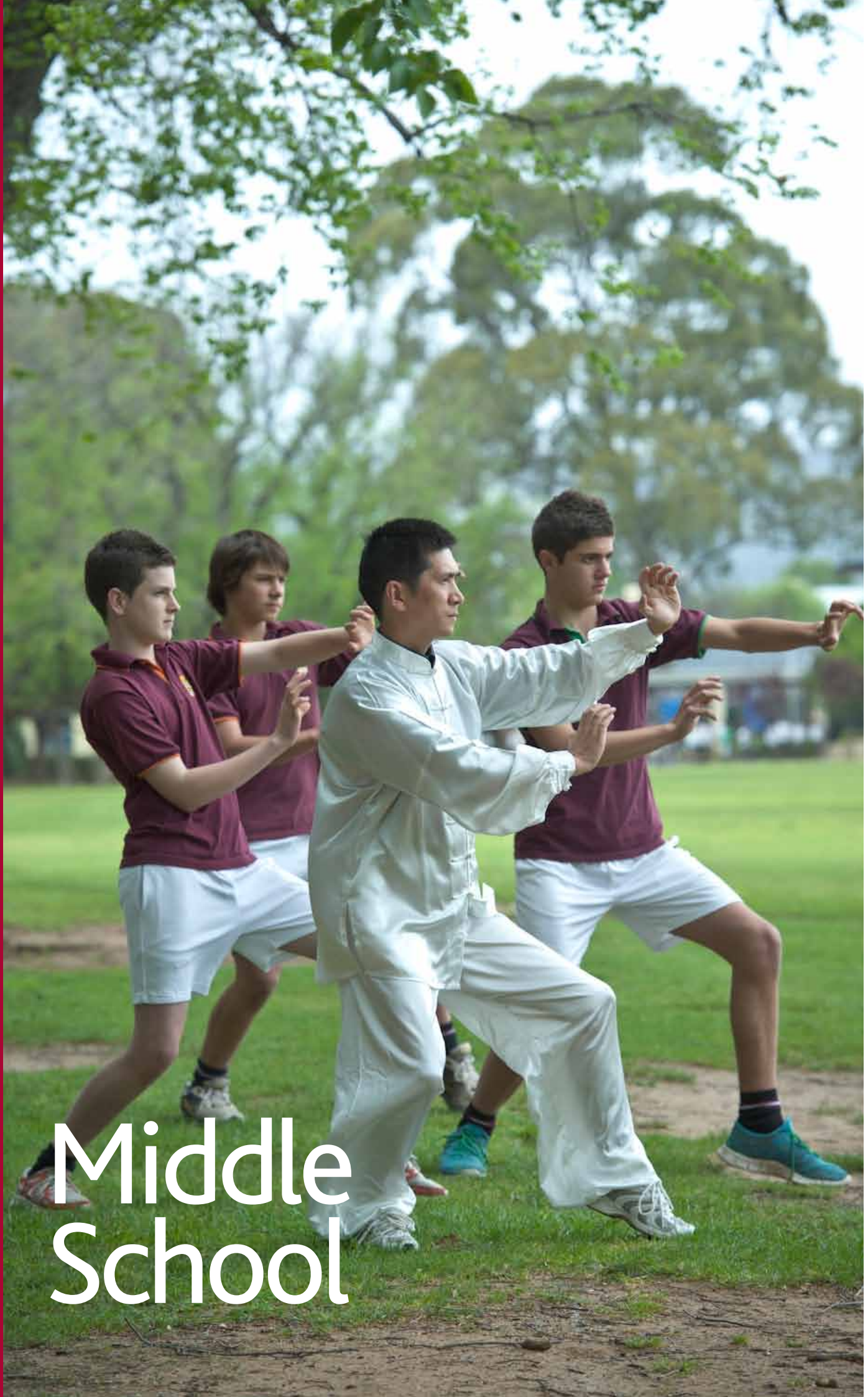

Teaching and Learning through the Middle Years Programme

2012 has seen the inauguration of a new structure for Teaching and Learning. The establishment of a Directorate of Teaching and Learning along with Lead Teachers for Years 7–10 has allowed a greater focus to be given to enhancing the quality of teaching and learning through further implementation of the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Programme in conjunction with Princes Pedagogy.

The newly established team of Lead Teachers has met regularly to share best practice and discuss ways to continuously improve the learning experience for our boys. Teachers have attended conferences and workshops locally, interstate and overseas, sharing new knowledge and ideas on their return. Staff have been able to meet with key representatives from the IBO throughout the year, as well as having a two-day MYP consultation visit to the school in September. All of this has enabled us to receive critical updates and clarification first hand on the changes being made to the MYP.

One of the greatest challenges facing all those involved in educating young adolescents is the loss of engagement often experienced in the middle years. The shift towards concept-based curriculum in conjunction with learning through inquiry aims to address this by making learning relevant. The Middle Years Programme provides an excellent framework for this and places an emphasis on the importance of teacher collaboration in the development of units of work. Through reflection, both by students and teachers, leading to review and revision, continuous improvement can be ensured.

There are many ways to measure progress and success; for the boys themselves competition is often the method of choice. The boys like to compare themselves to their peers, both locally and in larger forums. In 2012 boys competed in the Australian Mathematics Competition, the ICAS Science Competition and the LanguagePerfect World Championships, acquitting themselves well in all.

In the Australian Mathematics Competition 52% of our Year 7 students achieved a credit or better with Patrick Gayen being awarded the Prudence Award, Aaron Hammat awarded a High Distinction and Fiyinfolu Komolafe receiving the prize for his score of 92.

56% of our Year 8 boys achieved a credit or better with Ryan Challis and Merrick Liao both being awarded a High Distinction and Seung Hun Han taking the prize for his score of 84. The results at Year 9 level were also impressive with 53% achieving a credit or higher and 11 boys being awarded a Distinction.

In the International Competitions and Assessments for Schools Science Competition run by the University of New South Wales the majority of students achieved a credit or higher. Special congratulations go to the nine boys that achieved High Distinctions; in Year 8 Terence Ang, Ryan Challis, Nathan Duong, Seung Hun Han, Don Kieu, Joel Lee, Merrick Liao, Henry Lock and from Year 9 Michael Nguyen.

This year marked the first time Prince Alfred College entered the LanguagePerfect World Championships, an online language learning competition. The boys were able to compete how often and whenever they chose and could see their up to date ranking against their classmates. As a school we were ranked first overall in SA, 54th overall in Australia and 86th overall globally out of 802 schools. Furthermore, thanks to the boys' efforts, we came 1st for French in SA and 1st for Chinese in SA with eight boys receiving Gold Awards for having scored over 3,000 points.

In summation, it has been a rewarding year and one which has prepared us to continue to inspire excellence in years to come.

'Pulling' for Henley'

The 2012 Rowing Tour to the Royal Henley Regatta

Following our extremely successful Head of the River winning season, the idea to travel to the Royal Henley Rowing Regatta, the biggest and most prestigious regatta in the world, was born. It was decided that we would compete in the Fawley Challenge Cup. This was a risky decision because none of us had any recent quad sculling experience. Just gaining entrance into this regatta was something very special.

After a long 24-hour flight, we arrived in London on a warm Saturday morning and headed for the course at Henley where we were all captivated by the gorgeous river, surroundings and sheer scale of the regatta; it was all so different to Australia.

Rowing to the line on the first day was a terrifying experience not only because it was our first ever race in the quad but the fear of being eliminated in the first round was very real. We had no idea what to expect and tried to focus on nothing else but our race. Thankfully history shows that we managed to come out of the blocks well and find a good rhythm that Monmouth Comprehensive School could not match. We won easily and progressed through to the second round.

The following day we drew Walton Rowing Club as our opponents, with our race scheduled as the last of the day's events. By late afternoon the wind was blowing hard, straight down the course, and along with the rain and current, the conditions were treacherous and extremely difficult for racing. Once again we gained a small lead from the start and we were able to deal with the conditions much better than our opposition. This was a morale boosting win as Walton was a finalist from the previous year.

On Friday we faced off against a monstrous Canadian crew (Victoria City Rowing Club) who were boasting an average weight almost 10kg heavier than ours. Again we were to race in the late afternoon and in conditions that favoured heavier crews. From the outset we rowed well and sat comfortably alongside them for the first 250m. From here we increased our work-rate to establish a lead at the 500m mark, a lead that we were able to defend for the rest of the race. At race's end we had won quite convincingly and we began to realise that a berth in the final was beginning to seem quite plausible.

Saturday saw the beginning of the semi-finals and we were now one of only four crews left in our event. In our semi we were pitted against a very strong local crew from the Marlow Rowing Club. Despite orchestrating our best start of the regatta and taking a lead of just over a length, we were unable to sustain our work-rate and the local lads managed to row past us with about 800m to go. In hindsight it now seemed like a bittersweet way to end our Royal Henley Regatta campaign.

Overall the trip was a fantastic experience. Rowing in a world-class regatta in front of seventy thousand spectators has surely better equipped us for our future rowing pursuits. We were all very satisfied with what we had achieved. It was eye-opening to see how popular rowing is in England and it has provided motivation for us to continue the sport in the hope that one day we might return to one of the best rowing regattas in the world.

Arriving in Phnom Penh, it was straight to the Sunrise Children's Village orphanage, known as Sunrise 1. With two days here, the group was kept busy with some general yard maintenance and rubbish removal, and interaction with the children. This included a social game of soccer and an introduction to Cambodian culture with a performance of some traditional dances.

An appreciation of Cambodia's history and present circumstances was provided through visits to Toul Sleng, also known as S21 — a high school that was converted to a prison during the Pol Pot regime —

and Choeung Ek, one of the Khmer Rouge killing fields outside Phnom Penh.

The highlight for many in the group was participating in Habitat for Humanity's Global Village Program. This entailed joining local builders for three days to assist in the construction of a house for a local family who, without the benefit of the Global Village Program, would not be in a position to own a home.

After a day's bus journey, via Battambang and a visit to the Cambodian Children's Trust Orphanage, the group settled in Siem Reap for the last few days. Time there included a visit to Sunrise 2 where, again, sporting activities with the children filled in an afternoon. Visits to some of the Angkor temples, the Aki Ra Landmine Museum, and a boat trip on Lake Tonle Sap added to the appreciation of Cambodian history and its current culture.

The boys at Prince Alfred College continue to inquire and explore the great outdoors. Whether it is kayaking down the mighty Murray, learning to scuba dive on the Yorke Peninsula or rafting the wide rivers of New Zealand, our boys are open-minded, take risks with their learning and seek to find balance. Outdoor Education beyond Scotts Creek and Wambana extends our boys through three main programs, Year 10 Peak Adventure, Year 11 Outreach and the Outdoor Education trip to New Zealand.

For all of our Year 10 students the opportunity to select their own outdoor activity experience for a week through our Peak Adventure program is one of the most challenging and rewarding experiences of the year. Boys can select an activity they have done before like kayaking, rock climbing or surfing or can set new challenges like white water rafting, cross country skiing or learning to scuba dive. The boys are then responsible for all elements of the trip, organizing food and equipment, cooking meals, having a go at leadership for the day and reflecting on their experiences. The week sets many challenges, allows the boys to explore different environments and develops strong relationships through sharing these unique experiences with a close group of mates.

For many the opportunity to return to Scotts Creek on the Outreach program is a chance to give something back to the school, provide a

positive experience for others and also allow boys opportunities to care and communicate with others. Year 11 students' act as a "buddy" for a student with an intellectual disability; they provide friendship, guidance and support for these boys 24/7. The days are often long and the challenges tough but one thing all our boys come away with is a sense of happiness, a desire to give back to our community and to become more active participants in the world.

Last year in late December our first Outdoor Education trip to New Zealand saw a group of 7 boys tackling some of the more exciting outdoor pursuits. White water rafting, including a 7m drop, Caving with a 35m abseil underground and Mountain Biking down a 70 degree slope ensured every boy had something to challenge them. Mixed amongst the outdoor pursuits boys also inquired into the history and traditions of New Zealand and its many people and were able to share a little of their own with the people they met along the way.

As we approach the end of another year our next group of leaders prepare to assist with the Outreach program looking to share their knowledge, skills and experience with others. We also will see 10 boys heading off to New Zealand to once again challenge themselves with new and exciting outdoor pursuits.

The purpose of the Wambana program is to foster growth by helping adolescent boys better manage the transition to adulthood through immersion in community, academic, spiritual and outdoor adventures. The program is designed in such a way that allows students to make a connection between classroom based learning and the 'real world'. Time away from their normal support structures allows our boys to reflect on the important things in their lives — their family and friends.

A strength of the Wambana program is the improved social and emotional wellbeing of the students at the conclusion of the program. Living in a Wardli with five others, and often with people they

do not know well, challenges each boy to step out of their comfort zone and develop new friendships and strengthen existing ones. Boys learn to take greater responsibility for their actions and acquire the important skills of appropriate decision making.

Greatest Achievements

The greatest achievement many students identify after their time at Wambana is the awareness of what their parents do for them. This awareness hopefully transfers back into their daily lives as they return to Adelaide. One other great achievement that students identified this year is the completion of the 11km beach run. When students arrive at Wambana they are daunted by the notion of running 11km on the beach from Hardwicke Bay to Wambana. After three weeks of training they are ready for the challenge and so many succeed far greater than they ever imagined.

Once again our students volunteered, mentored and supported various community programs and initiatives under the motto of 'others before self'. Community and environment groups such as Yorke Peninsula Leisure Options, the Hardwicke Bay Progress Association and the Department of Natural Resource Management were very appreciative of the difference our boys made to the local community. This great work follows on from last year when Wambana was awarded an Environment and Sustainability Award by the South Australian

Senior School Academic Report

The 2011 SACE and IB Diploma cohorts continued the tradition of outstanding academic achievement.

It was the first Year 12 cohort to complete the new SACE and the outstanding results are a credit to the students' hard work and our inspiring and highly professional teachers.

In total there were 57 Merits achieved (SACE 24 and the IB DP 33) underlining the academic excellence of the students in 2011.

Overall 34.9% students achieved an ATAR of 90.00 or more and the mean ATAR of the 2011 cohort was 81.73.

Indeed, there were four Prince Alfred College students who achieved an ATAR of 99.95, Albert Wu and Minhao Hu in the International Baccalaureate Diploma Program (IBDP) and Jock Clarnette and Yoon Seok-Jang in the SACE. 34 students (21 in the

SACE and 13 in the IB DP) achieved an ATAR over 95 and joined the rapidly expanding honour roll of our 'Over 95' Club.

It is also noteworthy that students in the International Baccalaureate Diploma Program continued to produce outstanding results with the top score of 44 /45 (Albert Wu) and the cohort achieving a mean ATAR of 94.24.

On the basis of these results the following prizes were awarded:

- The John Dunn Prize and Dux of the School — Albert Wu
- The EB Colton Prize (Proxime Accessit to the Dux of the School) — Yoon-Seok Jang
- The Malpas Prize for Science — Jock Clarnette
- The Longbottom Prize for Mathematics — Vinh Quang Thoi
- The Colton Prize for Arts and Languages — Kieran Altmann

Prince Alfred students also continued to display their academic abilities in the wide array of subject competitions. These include the Mathematics Olympiad, South Australian Mathematics Competition, Science Olympiad, Science and Engineering Challenge, Royal Australian Chemical Institute Chemistry Quiz, The Australian History Competition and Simpson Prize and National Geographic Geography Competition.

The Class of 2012 has demonstrated considerable academic ability and we look forward to reporting on their achievement in early 2013.

Community Service

Across the Middle and Senior Schools this year our students were busily involved in a number of different community service activities that enabled them to make a real difference in other people's lives.

Early in the year a group of 19 Year 7 Students were involved in a new initiative with the Clipsal 500 and the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. The students were given the opportunity to build a Billy Kart and race it down pit straight against some of the biggest names in Australian Touring Car Racing. In return for this once in a lifetime opportunity, the boys had to raise awareness and money for the Foundation. In total, the team from PAC was able to raise an amazing \$17,620.

safe and fun-filled five days. Mr Harradine constantly reminded us of the danger we were working with and he made certain this program has a 5-star safety rating, with zero tolerance for stupid behavior.

The people

The staff members are some of the nicest people I have ever had the honour of shaking hands with. They are people and teachers you will never forget because they are not only extremely knowledgeable and funny, but they are nice to you, not because they have to be, but because they want to be, this is an aspect of the eduKart program that I never want to change.

I now have a whole new perspective of the world and its people. Had I only been given five words I would have chosen: fun, educational, awesome and life changing. This program is amazing, I might seem to glorify the program, but I know that you can never, glorify the eduKart program. I want to do it again because it would be amazing to experience all the fun, frustration and adrenaline all over again. No other program allows a student to have so much fun, learn so much, have such a hands-on-experience and make so many lifelong friends, all at the same time.

In 2011, Prince Alfred College celebrated 100 years of Prefects. To help celebrate this milestone in the history of the College, new Prefect Blazers were introduced. The International Students Transition Program (ISTP) at PAC

In Semester 2 there have been 26 new Year 9 and 10 international students given intensive academic English training through the International Students Transition Program. The boys also undertake cultural assimilation activities as well as developing their Maths, Science and Humanities skills. However, the prime focus of the latter subjects is on the English language skills required within them, such as the writing of reports, essays and reviews, vocabulary building, research, grammar, listening, comprehension and presentation skills. As they progress in the program these students are gradually integrated into mainstream classes where they have more interaction with native speakers. It is the goal of the ISTP to transition students to the mainstream with English language competence and confidence.

The ISTP program has been ably taught and supported by staff members Ms Jensen, Ms Polias, Ms White, Mr Williams, Mr Watson and Mr Ellis as well as the many mainstream teachers who have kindly allowed the boys to join in and audit their classes. This year's cohort has been a particularly lively and cohesive group with many interesting backgrounds and stories to tell. They have come from China (including Hong Kong), Afghanistan, Africa, Cambodia and Thailand. The Cantonese-speaking boys from Hong Kong have additionally had special Mandarin classes to better prepare them for their Language A studies in this subject in Years 11 and 12.

All the boys have also enjoyed their regular Physical Education lessons as a break from the intensity of the classroom, and many have already joined PAC sports teams including basketball, soccer, cricket, table tennis and especially badminton. They have also been keenly involved in local area study excursions out of the school, including a memorable hike on a beautiful spring day from Waterfall Gully to Mt Lofty and return, where we saw wallabies, a koala and many native Australian birds and plants in their native habitat. The students were particularly fascinated by the insect-eating sun dew plants,

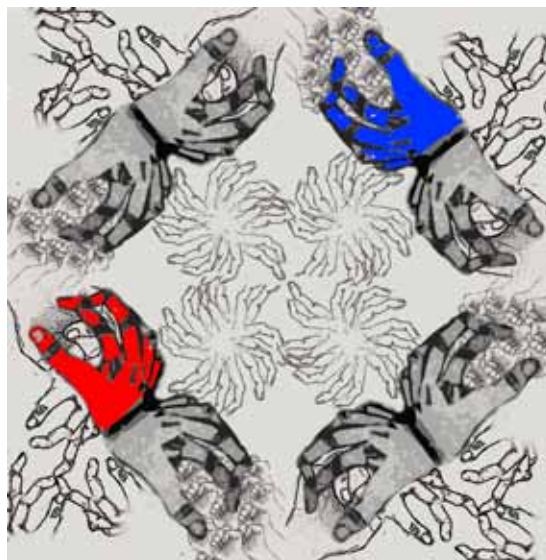
the kookaburras and parrots, and the concept of burning-off to reduce the fuel load fire danger for the hotter summer months. For some it was the first time they had been on a bushwalk, while many commented on the clean air, water, and brilliant views of Adelaide and its coastline from the summit.

As these ISTP students came into PAC after half way through the year, they missed out on the Year 10 Peak Adventure Program and only a couple of the Year 9 students were able to attend Wambana for the full 4 weeks' experience. Hence, a special ISTP Outdoor Education Program was organized at the Scotts Creek Outdoor Centre in November. Here the boys were involved in further team-building, learning and fun through camping, canoeing, climbing, fishing, high ropes and other challenging educational activities.

Similar to international students who have gone before them with considerable success, these boys will be far better prepared for mainstream life at PAC as a result of their ISTP involvement.

For many years now, the College has staged a Senior Drama production. The production is intended to give a creative voice and outlet to the many boys at the College with an interest in theatrical performance.

The College has seen many stellar performances from aspiring young actors that are worthy of note. Over the years we have staged a contemporary production of 'Macbeth'. There have also been engaging productions of "Of Mice and Men" by Steinbeck 'The Time of Ashes' a play written by South Australian, Sean Riley and 'The Comedy of Love and War,' each of which has given students with an interest in theatre an opportunity for self expression. This year, in collaboration with Wilderness school, the play chosen was the wonderful 'Our Town' written by Thornton Wilder.

Our Town is a character story about an average town's citizens in the early twentieth century in America as depicted through their everyday lives. Wilder sets the play in a 1930s theatre. He uses the actions of the Stage Manager to create the town of Grover's Corners for the audience. Scenes from its history between the years of 1901 and 1913 are played out.

Our Town's narrator, the Stage Manager, is

completely aware of his relationship with the audience, leaving him free to break the fourth wall and address them directly. According to the script, the play is to be performed with little scenery, no set and minimal props. Wilder was dissatisfied with the theatre of his time: "I felt that something had gone wrong....I began to feel that the theatre was not only inadequate, it was evasive." His answer was to have the characters mime the objects with which they interact. Their surroundings are created only with chairs, tables, and ladders. Says Wilder, "Our claim, our hope, our despair are in the mind — not in things, not in 'scenery.'"

Tim Carlier was convincing and stalwart as the town's Doctor 'Frank Gibbs.' Will Peculis and Michael Noicos shared the role of the charismatic 'George Gibbs' and both gave natural, fluent performances. The energetic Albert Ngo was impressive as the town's 'news editor.' Sebastian Lau made a well-observed contribution as a 'drunken choirmaster.' "Frank Webb." Sam Leeson, James Whitehead and Alex Mansell performed admirably in the role of 'Stage Manager.' Trevor Adelson, Will James, Theodore Squires, Tom Burton and Tyler Fletcher-Harris undertook supporting roles with considerable flair and polish. Year 10 Tom Parish made a terrific contribution as the lighting and sound engineer.

Tim Carlier deserves a special mention for his leadership and engagement over the last two years.

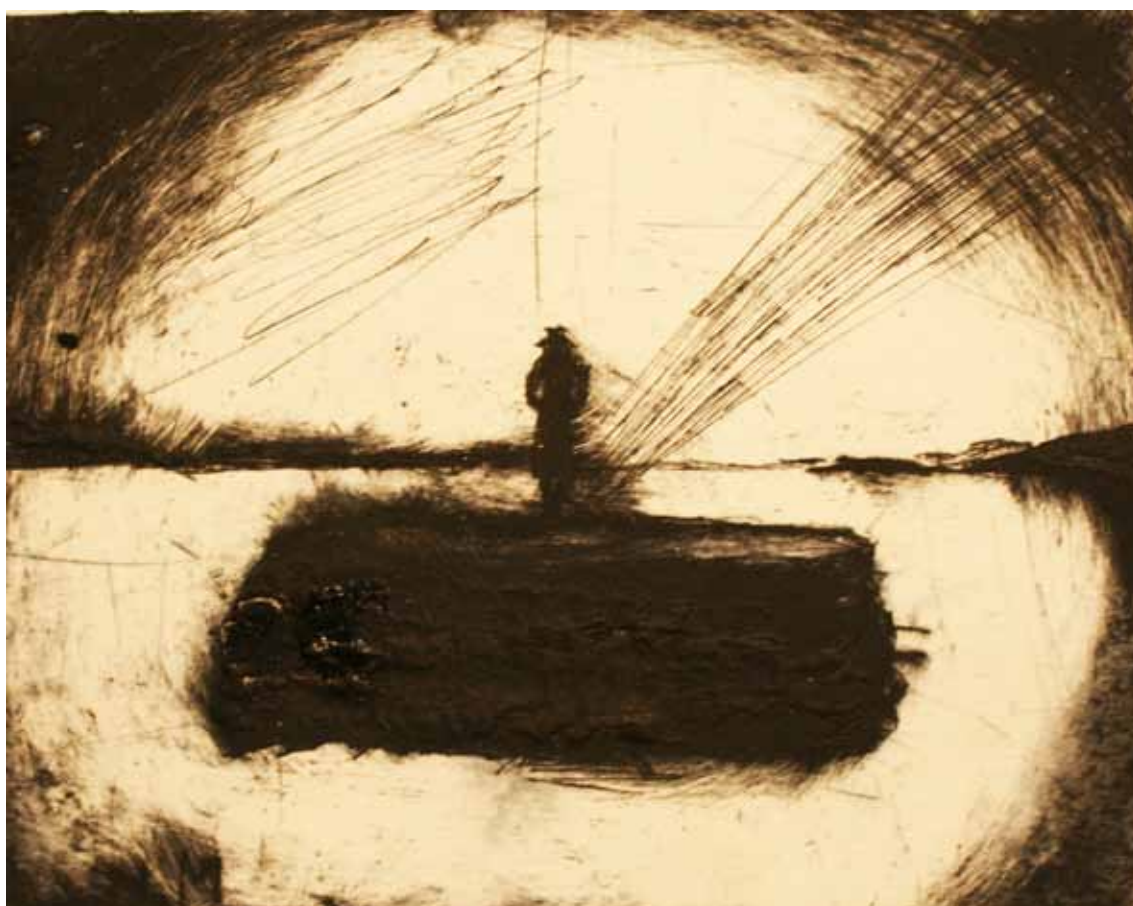

Senior School Chess 2012

A healthy number of boys playing competitive chess was maintained at the Senior School with PAC entering five teams in the Secondary Interschool Competition this year: two in Division 1, two in Division 2 and one in Division 3.

PAC won the Champion School Shield for the third consecutive year, ahead of St Peter's College and Glenunga IHS. The Red team won Division 1 ahead of St Peter's College. The team consisted of Hugh Perks, Morris Cheung, Peter Hu, Eddie Han and Joel Lee.

Led by Jack O'Brien, PAC Red easily won the Division 2 competition by a massive margin with PAC Gold finishing in 8th place from 32 teams entered.

PAC also fielded one team in Division 3, led by Mitchell Porter, which improved strongly to finish in second place from 15 teams entered.

A pleasing number of boys competed in the City of Adelaide and South Australian Junior Championships held during the April and July holidays. Eddie Han (Year 8) continued last year's excellent form, convincingly winning the City of Adelaide Junior Championships. Public Speaking on the rise

Following on from the success of last year's inaugural King's Speech Competition, the number of students wishing to participate in Public Speaking at Prince Alfred College this year has continued to rise.

By June this year, there were so many applications to compete in the King's Speech Competition, especially from within the Middle School, that several heats were required prior to the event to keep numbers manageable. This rise in enthusiasm has also prompted an expansion in the College's wider Public Speaking program, with the addition of several new opportunities for students to both train and compete in Public Speaking during 2012.

Training opportunities

Beyond the classroom, where oral communication skills continue to be both developed and embedded in the curriculum, students this year were also given the opportunity to hone their skills within an intensive two days of training workshops during May, just prior to the King's Speech Competition. Coordinated by Mr. Bailey and delivered by Mr. Patrick Burke (an experienced and highly respected public speaking coach from the Rostrum organisation), these workshops offered students from Years 6 to 12 the opportunity to further develop their skills in preparing and delivering impromptu speeches — a crucial component of almost all Public Speaking competitions.

Practice makes perfect

Complementing these new coaching opportunities, students this year were also given the opportunity to compete in a wider range of local, regional and national competitions. Not counting the King's Speech Competition, students from Prince Alfred College are now also involved in seven other annual competitions. These include the IPSHA Junior Orator competition, SA Rostrum Voice of Youth Competition, Plain English Speaking Award, Legacy Public Speaking Competition, My First Speech Competition, Neville Bonner Memorial Prize and the UN Youth Evatt Trophy Competition. With such a broad range of opportunities to compete against other students from other schools, to observe

gifted orators in action and to receive advice from experienced adjudicators, involvement in these competitions now offers much more fertile ground for the continued growth of Prince Alfred College's own Public Speaking culture.

The King's Speech Competition

In what began as a way of acknowledging the lifetime achievements of old scholar Lionel Logue, primarily for his work in helping others to overcome their speech impairments (most famously, the stammer of King George VI), the King's Speech Competition has now clearly become an annual celebration of the College's Public Speaking culture.

For the second time since its inception in 2011, on the 13 June this year, students again strode to the stage to express their thoughts and opinions to an audience of students, staff, parents and Rostrum adjudicators.

A final list of 25 competitors this year gave audience members a total of 50 speeches over the course of the day, on topics that ranged from concerns over the 'Olympic spirit', to philosophical explorations of social justice issues such as 'Euthanasia'. As with last year, students' speeches were again judged and praised by experienced adjudicators from Rostrum, who ranked competitors according to two criteria: their appeal to the intellect and their appeal to the emotions.

Names of winners and runner-ups in each division for 2012 were as follows: Hamish Greenslade (winner) and Max Kirkby (runner-up) in the Preparatory School division; Nicholas Tsakalos (winner) and Patrick Gayen (runner up) in the Middle School division; and Theo Squires (winner) and Shaun Gerschwitz (runner up) in the Senior School division.

Again, congratulations to all students who competed or assisted in the King's Speech competition this year, and another sincere thank you to Patrick Burke and his fellow Rostrum members for their ongoing support of Public Speaking at Prince Alfred College.

not lose a quarter of football throughout, and the talented Year 8 Debating team that took out the SA Debating Grand Final in the SA House of Parliament just to mention a few. These sporting achievements like many others that have occurred in 2012 are fine exemplars of the school's motto "Do brave deeds and endure".

Participation in the Prince Alfred College Sports Program promotes physical fitness, a healthy lifestyle and challenges young men to face adversity and sometimes strive against the odds. At PAC an important pillar of our school is the tradition of playing sport and it is indeed one of the things that make us tick. The young men who earn places in our teams for intercol week, symbolically represent the entire PAC community as they participate and take their place in intercollegiate sporting history.

I am confident to say that the barracking and enthusiastic support demonstrated during the 2012 summer intercol week from our student and parent body was of the highest order. I want to publicly acknowledge the role that our Prefects played by leading that support in an enthusiastic and extremely positive way.

40th Intercol Swimming Carnival

At 4.00pm on Wednesday 21 March, our intercollegiate contests against Saints began when Billie McFall led our swimmers in the swimming intercol at the St Peter's College pool. After two years without the use of our own pool it was credit to the hard work of Mr Bubner that our swimming team was still competitive. While we were not successful in defeating our rivals, strong performances were recorded in particular by our senior swimmers Billy McFall (Captain) and Ryan Favell (Vice Captain). Nick Husler and Josh Cameron also swam very well when competing in butterfly in an age group above their own. The spirit of our swimmers was positive and all team members competed strongly.

136th Intercol Cricket Match

Kelvin Smith and the First XI began the four day cricket intercol on the front oval at PAC on Friday 23 March, at 10.30am. Inclement weather leading up to the match had made it difficult for the grounds staff to prepare the pitch.

On an overcast, chilly morning, Princes won the toss and we had no hesitation in batting. Thomas Ashby and Thomas Andrews began in a positive manner before Ashby was bowled for 6. Smith joined Andrews at the crease and a partnership of 122 runs ensued. Smith made 40

and Andrews made 110 runs, from 132 balls, in 203 minutes.

Valuable innings from Nick Mosey (19), Jake Weatherald (22), Harry Barnes (12) and Lachlan Griffiths (24), saw PAC reach 7/243 on Day 1.

Saturday and a determined partnership of 57 between Jake Pitt (25) and Campbell Combe (32) enabled PAC to reach a total of 312. Saints made a confident start and were 1/42 going into the final session. Princes, through tight bowling and fielding after tea dismissed Saints for 118. Andrews was the best of the bowlers, with 5/38 and Griffiths 3/19 dismissed three top order bats.

Smith did not enforce the follow-on but decided to bat again. Handy second innings knocks from Smith (32), Mosey (26) and Weatherald (30), put PAC in a strong position during Day 3. Pitt (24no) together with Josh Sandow (17), added a 39 run last wicket partnership and PAC's lead was 363. Princes bowlers toiled hard, with Andrews gaining plenty of bounce and turn and by the close of play on Day 3, Saints was 8/80. Sandow captured the final two wickets on Tuesday morning, giving PAC a comprehensive 266 run victory.

Final scores: PAC 312 and 169 to SPSC 118 and 97.

22nd Intercol Badminton Match

The Open A Badminton Team played St Peters College, at Saints, on 24 March. The contest began with the 3-doubles matches, and Saints, despite some strong resistance from PAC, won all three. Our youngest combination, Yuxing Zhang and Hugo Chapman, had a close match before losing 15–21, 15–21. Saints had the edge in all matches but Princes battled hard. Gabriel Wai gave a spirited effort before losing 15–21, 15–21, and Zhang came back from a 4–21 first set to lose 18–21 in the second. The highlight, however, was the singles match featuring our captain Jayden Lim. Jayden began with great poise and power for a strong 21–14 win in the first set. He lost this initiative and the second set 7–21 and eventually was defeated 16–21 in a tense final set. Jayden, like his team-mates, had lost with honour.

115th Intercol Tennis Match

On Friday 30 March, the PAC Drive Tennis Team, ventured to St Peters. Despite PAC being favoured to win, the first hour did not go well for the visitors. In the early singles matches only James Ma started well (6–2, 6–0). Ben Schuler trailed (2–5), before coming back strongly to win the first set (7–5) and his match in straight sets. Daniel Foo had lost the first set as had Andrew Fortunatow. When Fortunatow came storming back to win in 3 sets, PAC led by 3-rubbers to 1. The next four singles matches saw PAC start decidedly better. Princes captain, De Candia put on a master class winning (6–0, 6–0) and Kurtis Willson likewise won his singles match (6–0, 6–0). A gutsy win from Riley Terrell (6–3, 4–6, 7–5) saw Princes leading 6-rubber to 2 at lunch.

of these matches. A 45-over match against our traditional rival St. Peter's College, completed our Term 4 fixtures, with the Blues prevailing in a nail biting finish and the narrowest of margins, 1-run. The new opening bowling combination of Campbell Combe and George Hewett performed well and Josh Sandow was a significant contributor with his deceptive medium pace.

The T/20 competition also took place in Term 4 but in a strange draw two great wins over traditional powerhouses, St Michael's College and Adelaide High, put us through to the semi-final. Kelvin Smith was the stand out performer with both bat and ball against STMC. In the second fixture AHS was restricted to 6/121 through tight bowling from Thomas Andrews and Kelvin Smith who then followed up with impressive batting. Jake Weatherald top scored with a typically flamboyant 48 from 42 balls. We went into the semi-final against St. Ignatius quietly confident that we could advance to yet another T/20 grand final but we faced an enthusiastic and talented opponent who outplayed us in all facets of the game to spell the end of our 2011 T/20 campaign. Kelvin Smith was the T/20 player of the year with standout performances with both bat and ball.

Term 1 Cricket 2012 was dominated by the State One Day competition and of course the annual intercollegiate match against SPSC. A comprehensive win over Pembroke in the first match was underpinned by brilliant centuries from Kelvin Smith (103) and Jake Weatherald (153 no). Josh Sandow proved to be the pick of the bowlers taking four valuable wickets. Another one day game, this time against Sacred Heart, followed and vice-captain Jack Latchford returned to form with an innings saving 42 not out. Seam bowlers Campbell Combe and Lachlan Griffiths performed well and were provided good support from Thomas Andrews to complete a good all round performance from PAC. Although not participating in the one day competition, St. Ignatius College was our next opponent and as in Term 4 it proved to be too strong for us on the day and another disappointing loss ensued. Griffiths, Sandow and Simon Bean each took two wickets but our batting, apart from a lone hand by Ross Anderson (46), was brittle and we fell an agonizing 4-runs short in our victory chase. Rowing

The members of the Prince Alfred College Rowing Club performed outstandingly throughout the 2011–12 regatta season. A competitive and focused squad, the senior crews executed a hugely successful season, competing magnificently on a local and national stage. With wins at Head of the Yarra and State Championships, the squad then took their success to another level at the Australian National Rowing Championships with the first VIII achieving gold in the Under 19 VIII, and fourth in the Schoolboy VIII.

The Senior Squad was bolstered by a determined and committed Intermediate Squad. Although small in numbers, these crews performed to a high level achieving gold in the Under 17 Double through a series of undefeated heats, semi's and finals at the National Championships, and fourth and eighth in the Under 17 Coxed Quad and Schoolboy Coxed Quads respectively. The Year 10 A Quad also won their State Championship event. Enthusiastic and considerable in size, the Junior Squad showed promise for the future with a huge influx of rowers through the Year 7 Learn to Row program, and several wins across the regatta season in the Year 8/9 races.

Prince Alfred College's performances at the 2012 Head of the River (HOR) were impressive. Six junior crews raced at this year's HOR — Year 9A through to 9F — all of whom were hugely enthusiastic and dedicated, with many boys new to sculling this year. The 9E and 9F crew came third and sixth respectively, the 9Ds third in a competitive field and the 9Cs just missing out on first place in their final. The 9Bs, having reconfigured their crew the session prior to racing provided our first win of the day (but were later controversially relegated to second in a re-row against Scotch), whilst our 9As finished third in a fast field.

The Intermediate Year 10B Coxed Quad performed strongly with new recruits of 2012 — Angus Smart, Mitch Rose and Jeffery Yuen — racing above and beyond expectations to finish a close second to season rivals Scotch. Our Year 10As provided one of the closest finishes of the day, pipping a feisty Unley crew to first place by 0.29 seconds.

The ever-developing Second IV set the standard for senior racing with a strong 16 second win coxed by new recruit Nicholas Chu. The 1st IV continued in style to win their division with an eight second lead. Both IVs showed commitment and improvement across the season.

The Second VIII, a highly competitive crew with several members having spent many weeks in the first VIII during the season, provided a nail-biter through the 1250m mark as they battled with St Peter's College following a close start. Not to be phased, the Second VIII showed the experience and finesse developed by their coach, old scholar Matthew Bolt (2005) as they stepped up in the final few hundred metres, continuing our HOR 2012 winning streak.

Finally the First VIII took to the stage. Having executed a strong regatta season in the run up to Head of the River, the First VIII were favourites for the win. They did not disappoint. Attacking from a strong start, Prince Alfred proved to be the superior First VIII on the day, winning convincingly by 2.95 seconds in a time of 6:07.81.

Overall PAC finished with a clean sweep of four senior wins; one intermediate and junior win apiece, two second placings and three third placings.

Following the Head of the River, a Schoolboy Coxless Quad consisting of First VIII crew members Jack Kelly, Nicholas Parletta, Tax Skrembos and Blake Anderson had pre-qualified for The Fawley Challenge Cup at the 2012 Henley Royal Regatta. Additionally, three members of the Senior Squad, Jack Kelly, Tyson Beauchamp, and coxswain Michael Wilson, were selected in the South Australian Youth VIII which finished sixth in the King's Cup Regatta. Michael Wilson also steered a composite Under 23 VIII to second place at the National Championships and Tyson Beauchamp gained selection in the Australian Junior Development VIII and will compete in a series of races against New Zealand later this year.

Old scholar Alex Hill (2010) became the school's first rowing World Champion when his crew won the Coxed Fours event at the 2011 World Junior Rowing Championships. Drew Clements (2011) and William Brennan (2011) were selected in the South Australian Men Youth VIII finishing 6th at the King's Cup Regatta and Matt Bolt (2002) won a bronze medal for South Australia in the King's Cup VIII.

The 2011–12 rowing season has been arguably the most successful in the history of our Rowing Club. I would like to thank the boys, coaches and parents for their ongoing support throughout the past season and acknowledge the support of the school, Headmaster, Kevin Tutt, Executive Director School Services, Steven Bacon and Director of Sport, Gary Jenkinson, all of whom contributed to the many successes achieved this season.

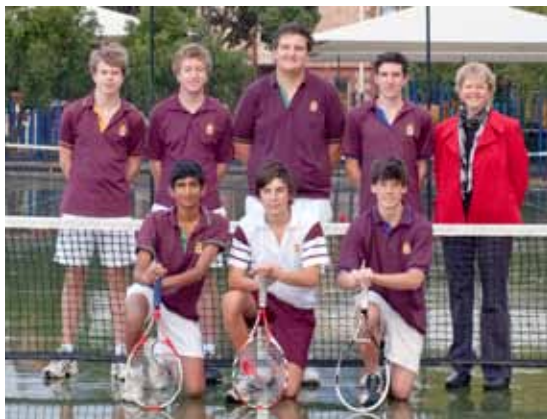

Winter Intercols

Playing sport is an integral part in the lives of most students at Prince Alfred College and that is why we were able to field 52 teams across co-curricular sport during Terms 2 and 3.

Senior winter intercollegiate sporting teams symbolically represent all our teams as they participate in sporting contests against traditional rivals St Peter's College.

The 6th Director General of the United Nations Educational Scientific and Cultural Organisation, French Professor Rene Maheu said this of sport:

"Sport is an order of chivalry, a code of ethics and aesthetics, recruiting its members from all classes of peoples. Sport is a truce: in an era of antagonisms and conflicts, it is the respite of the gods in which fair competition ends in respect and friendship.

Sport is education, the truest kind of education, that of character."

Success in intercollegiate sporting contests should not be measured by matches won and lost but rather the ability of our students to work for and with each other in a team.

Former Australian and Brisbane Broncos Rugby League coach Wayne Bennett wrote the following about teamwork in his book, "Don't Die with the Music in You";

"The key is to work less as individuals and more as a team. A season allows a team to perform and learn together, to develop trust and confidence in each other and to learn from mistakes made. A season must be long enough to allow enough time and training to build confidence in one another. Selflessness is the soul of teamwork."

Teams train long and hard throughout the winter season, to establish trust and confidence in each other. The remarkable improvements our sides demonstrated and the enthusiastic way they played was a highlight of these intercollegiate matches. In the end results become irrelevant. If our students did their best and tried their hardest for their teams... that's what matters.

During the week our spectators barracked enthusiastically and fairly, conducting themselves with dignity. I congratulate our prefects for their leadership and support. Along with the staff who attended, they set a positive tone at each event. In reflection, our Winter Intercollegiate Matches were a success, not because of the scoreboard but rather because the entire school community had worked together to support one-another in a spirit of passionate competition.

Captain Cameron Graetz and the 1st XI Team competed in the 35th Intercollegiate Soccer Match on the Lloyd Oval at St Peters, on Monday 13 August. In a skilful contest, Princes took the lead after half-time with a goal kicked from a Kristian

Quirke corner. Saints equalised but soon after Harry Collison booted a powerful volley into the Saint's net. Goalkeeper Jason Tse played with determination before his injury. Princes held on for a 2-1 victory and retained the Simpson Intercollegiate Soccer Cup for the sixth consecutive year. Graetz, Collison and Lachlan Duffy were outstanding in defence and Shante Mayol, Kong Kea Phon and Jordan Hayhurst were also among the best.

On Tuesday 14 August, in the St Peter's College Sport Centre, Daniel Foo and his team lost the 2nd Intercollegiate Table Tennis match to St Peter's College 9-15. The standard of table tennis was extremely high. PAC won only two of the doubles matches but the team played strongly during the singles matches. Among the better players for PAC was Foo who demonstrated a wonderful combination of solid defence and accurate attack, Shashank Murali, Ricke Reeder, Christo Karageorgos and Fergus Willmore.

The 1st XI Hockey Team's victory in the 32nd Intercollegiate Hockey Match saw Princes retain the Merton Shield for the sixth year in succession. Captain Nick Fitzgerald and his side played powerful hockey to outclass Saints 5-goals to 1. Every player did his job and the team denied Saints effective possession. Simon Brown was lethal with 3-goals and PAC vice-captain James Keeves scored twice. Fitzgerald and Keeves were the on field generals, directing their troops with precision. Keeper David McCappin, Blake Anderson and Kurtis Wilson were also among the better players for Princes.

Hugo Rikard-Bell stepped up to captain the 1st XV Rugby after Mitch Altmann suffered a knee injury at the beginning of the 2012 season. The 25th Intercollegiate Rugby Match took place on The Main Oval at St Peter's College, on Thursday 16 August. In a gruelling contest Princes was defeated 5-18. Torrential rain, icy-wind and slippery, heavy conditions made play difficult. In a contest that at times paralleled a medieval battle and threatened to end early due to lightning, Saints' bigger bodies prevailed. Chester Clarke scored the only try for PAC and Lachlan Griffith, Daniel Skinner, Isaac Partington and Harry Bilyk were among the better players.

On Thursday evening 16 August, in The Big School Room at St Peters, Captain of Debating Theo Squires, Samuel Leeson and Ben Watson debated the topic "Australia should have a Bill of Rights". The lads presented their arguments with great gusto, humour and enthusiasm. Squires in particular spoke with poise and it is fair to say that some of his thoughts were like gleams of gold in unhewn rock. It took an impressive effort from the St Peter's team to win the 22nd Intercollegiate Debate and retain the Intercollegiate Debating Cup.

Lewis Crawford and Tauny Schmidt the co-captains of Basketball, led the 1st V Team to Saints on Friday 17 August for the 49th Intercollegiate Basketball Match. The contest quickly became a battle of defences with Saints taking an early lead. Princes fought back courageously to level the score mid-match. Saints held the upper hand late in the

match through its ability to score long range and that, along with some wayward shooting from PAC, proved to be the difference. In a low scoring match St Peter's were the victors 32–26. Schmidt, Crawford, Darcy Lord, Angus Crawford and Mitchell Kirkham were among the better players for Princes.

PAC Captain of Football, George Hannaford and his side were victorious, 14–16 (100) to Saints' 1–2 (8), in the 141st Intercollegiate Football Match, on the Front Oval at PAC, on Saturday 18 August. A spectacular opening goal by Tom Whittlesea was the start the home side wanted. Tom Ashby booted 4-goals and Whittlesea finished with 3. Princes defence was miserly and its midfield dominant. Among the better players for Princes were, Hannaford, Mitchell Wicks, Campbell Combe, Ashby and Chris Hannemann. The strong victory saw PAC retain the Tennyson Football Challenge Cup for the 7th consecutive year.

The 40th Intercollegiate Chess Match was held in The Big School Room at St Peters, on Wednesday 5 September at 6.30pm. Captain of Chess Hugh Perks and the team lost early games and by 8.00 pm Saints led 4–0. Princes gradually worked its way back into the match. Denny Han on board 6 posted our first win for the evening, followed soon after by wins to Caleb Barns (board 8), Isuru Dissanayake (board 10) and Joel Lee (board 5). Eddie Han triumphed on board 2 giving Princes the lead and Louis Xiao delivered the knock-out blow with a win on board 9. The 6–4 victory to PAC saw it retain the Intercollegiate Chess Trophy for the third year in a row.

2nd Intercol Water Polo Match

Billy McFall Captain of the PAC Open A Water Polo Team led his side into battle against St Peter's College, at the Saints Pool on Friday 24 March. The Saints team had been formidable during minor round matches so coach Scott Parker, endeavoured to keep star players Luke Robinson, U/18 state representatives Billy McFall and Oliver Nicholl in the pool for longer periods of time. These three boys were highly influential throughout the match. Saints opened well scoring 7 goals to 1 and although PAC had had plenty of scoring opportunities, inaccuracy was costly. Princes outscored Saints 5 goals to 1 in the second quarter due to some inspirational passages of play from McFall and Nicholas Krantz. At half-time St Peters led 8–6. The second half was played at a furious pace and eventually PAC tired. The final score was St Peters 15 to PAC 9.

The game had been a wonderful spectacle. Special mention for Sam Jackson, (Year 9) who competed in his second intercol and Seb Higham (Year 10) who made his debut.

Prince Alfred Collegians' Lodge No. 51

The Princes XI, all of whom had celebrated the London dinner the previous night into the early hours, were magnificent in victory over our bitter blue rivals, to secure the David Gray Cup with displays of champagne cricket.

Amid magnificent conditions — no rain — and, in fine Intercol tradition, cheered on by a galaxy of beautiful girls from Adelaide's independent schools, PAC showed why it has produced more Australian test cricket captains than any other school in the country.

Season 2011–12 will go down in history for the Prince Alfred Old Collegians Cricket Club. Four of our five teams made the Grand Finals with three teams winning premierships (A1, B3 & C3), the most in the club's history in one year.

We have now won 10 premierships in the last 9 years.

For the second time in three years, the A-Grade won the A1 flag and also won the T20 premiership under lights at Adelaide Oval for the second year running.
