Headmaster's Report



This year has not seen the level of interruptions and modifications to our program and activities that we had in 2020. Whilst still having to deal with some COVID-19 related restrictions, we have been able to resume most school activities and events, and particularly enjoyed welcoming guests back to the College.

We commenced the year with another record enrolment of around 1,125 students, with the Secondary

School at 98% capacity and a full Boarding House. I say full, but I need to acknowledge again the particular challenges associated with our international students. Those who intended joining us this year were unable to do so, and our current international students have now completed almost two years without being able to return home, with the majority staying here again for the forthcoming summer holidays. I would like to acknowledge the resilience, adaptability and good humour demonstrated by these students, as well as the excellent leadership of the senior boys. I would also like to acknowledge the outstanding work of the staff who have supported them, particularly our boarding staff under Phil Noble's leadership, but also the other staff who support our international students.

Our 2020 Year 12 results were at a similar level to the previous year and represented a strong performance by the cohort. Our NAPLAN results have again been strong across the board, with the best ever results accorded in Years 3 and 5. Our adoption of a new learning management system, SEQTA, is assisting us both in recording and also communicating programs of work and student performance across all year levels.

It has been an excellent year for us in the Co-Curricular area, which saw us dominate in a number of sports and achieve state or association champion status in eight sports, indicating the quality of leadership and coaching that we enjoy across a range of sports. In the performing arts, our bands were again recognised through a dominant performance and winning several divisions in the state bands competitions. We had our first Year 12 Drama class in many years and have also seen some excellent performances in both the Curricular and Co-Curricular programs.

At the governance level, the major event has been the adoption of a new Strategic Plan. Both through the launch event, and also in subsequent feedback, our strategic directions appear to have resonated well with our community. That is not surprising, since we gathered a good deal of feedback from our community to assist in formulating this plan.

As well as building on the key directions from our previous Strategic Plan, including commitment to academic excellence and a focus on the development of our Princes Men, we identified a strong desire amongst our community to see the College taking a leading position on current directions in education and in society in general. There was both an awareness of our position of influence and also an acknowledgement that a leading school should aim to lead in everything that we do. We have already made significant headway on progressing the key strategic directions, about which we will report further to our community over time.

A major focus for the Council this year has been the oversight of a comprehensive selection process to appoint the next Headmaster of Prince Alfred College, to commence when I complete my time here in the middle of next year. Council Chair Richard Hockney and his team are leaving no stone unturned in finding the best person for this position. Council is now in the final stages of the process and hopes to be in a position to make an announcement in the near future.

The major facilities development this year has been the Secondary School Library and classrooms project building above our Dining Hall. This project is now very close to completion and the facility will be in full use for the start of next year, providing an enhanced library and three additional classrooms. I commend the library staff under Library Manager Ana Grieve for the way they have coped with their temporary



relocation to the McBride Room in the RED Centre and also for their input into the planning process, which we believe will see an excellent outcome in this new facility.

Amongst our departing staff at the end of this year, I would like to acknowledge our Director of Teaching and Learning, Ben Evans, whose impact on our academic program, and indeed on the College as a whole, has been profound. Over the past six years, Ben has led the transformation of our academic structures, systems and processes, and most importantly our academic philosophy and culture. Moreover, he has played the major part in building and promoting the College's intellectual culture and capital, which is a major legacy that he will leave. He has had a great impact, both directly and indirectly, on all of us, students and staff, and I would like you to join me in recognising Ben on this final formal occasion that he is attending.

I would also like to acknowledge our Chaplain, Reverend Mark Dickens, who this year dedicated half his time in a special Church placement providing pastoral support to people on Kangaroo Island who had been affected by the bushfires. In taking on this role, Mark set a wonderful example of community service and support to all of us. In addition, we were delighted to welcome the Reverend David Prior to share the Chaplaincy with Mark, an arrangement that has worked remarkably well.

We have had a very positive Year 12 group this year under Captain Mitch Searle and Vice Captains Thomas Malik and Thomas Searles, and recognise the excellent leadership skills they all have offered. I think we were all impressed at the Valedictory Assembly and Valedictory Dinner to hear the young men giving the keynote speeches speak openly about their feelings and emotions at this important juncture in their lives as they finish their school days. We know how important it is for young men to be in touch with their emotions and to be prepared to express these, even in a public setting. To the boys here today, I think you saw an excellent example of this at the Valedictory Assembly and I encourage you to be similarly thoughtful and open in your own lives. Our staff across all sections of the College deserve a special commendation for their fine work during the course of 2021. For the teachers, new modes of operation, including the use of our new learning management system, always present challenges and I thank you for your hard work and forbearance in ensuring that this has gone as well as it has. Moreover, our many successes have only come about because of the leadership and support that our staff have provided to our students to enable them to achieve their best. So often when we see our students performing well, it is only because of the preparatory work done by individual staff members.

I would particularly like to thank my Executive Team for your outstanding work and support throughout 2021. We welcomed the Head of Secondary School and Deputy Headmaster Mr Greg Atterton at the beginning of this year and he has done a superb job in this most challenging of roles. His focus on building strong relationships, his involvement in all aspects of the life of the Secondary School, his experience and his principles have all seen him make a significant impact on the Secondary School.

I wish to acknowledge the outstanding governance that Prince Alfred College enjoys under the leadership of Council Chair, Richard Hockney. Having served on four College Councils, I can say that Prince Alfred College is very well governed and we can all be confident that the school is in very good hands in this regard. I would also like to thank our various community groups and supporters for the many ways in which you continue to support the College.

Preparatory School Report



We began 2021 with one significant hope. That 2021 would not hold the challenges that we faced throughout 2020. Reflecting on the year that has been, we had success with some of those hopes becoming a reality.

At the beginning of the year, many new boys joined the Prince Alfred College community. Thirty-five freshfaced boys started in Reception class and were quickly running around the playground like they had been here

for years. The start of the year also welcomed many new families to the Prince Alfred College community, which once again embraced them with open arms.

My hopes for the year were in part realised. We still had events that had to be modified and, in some cases, canceled due to the threat of COVID-19. We could not invite parents into the school buildings and had to limit attendance at assemblies and other events that showcased the boys' talents. For the boys, the year progressed as close to normal as we could have hoped. They got off to a flying start in their new classes with their new teachers. Swimming lessons began early in the school year, and our Inter-House Swimming Carnival took place at the end of February.

As we could not have parents in the school buildings, parent/ teacher interviews took place via the now all-too-familiar Zoom format. The Zoom interviews demonstrated some additional benefits however, such as allowing more parents to engage with their son's teacher at a more convenient time.

Late in Term 1, we were able to host our Junior Primary and Year 3 to Year 6 Cross-Country Carnivals, where the boys once again demonstrated their outstanding athletic skills. Many of our talented runners went on to represent the College in regional and state competitions. In addition to the many sporting opportunities, our Year 6 classes began their outdoor education program with the first of many trips to Scotts Creek for Years 5 and 6.

As COVID-19 and the Delta strain became more prevalent in the eastern states, the stress of a lockdown continued to loom. We were not immune to the new variant and had a short lockdown where the boys had to engage in remote learning. Fortunately, we had taken advantage of the opportunity to reflect and learn from our experiences in 2020. The remote learning experience for our boys and our families was outstanding, with the boys continuing to learn collaboratively with their friends and teachers.

As restrictions began to relax, we were able to welcome parents back to school events. Parents were able to attend assemblies to see their boys receive awards and to watch class items. Parents were able to join me for coffee mornings to discuss and ask questions about our plans for the school year. Key events of 2021 included the highly successful reading and literacy workshops hosted by Preparatory School teachers Mrs Fiona Howat and Mrs Heather O'Hara and the mental math workshop led by Mrs Nesha Sathuraya. These highly informative workshops were attended by over 80 families. They provided parents with a wealth of resources and knowledge to use at home to support their son's reading and mental maths skills.

A significant highlight of 2021 was the inaugural Shakespeare project. The Year 6 boys, under the leadership of Miss Nicole Runge and Mrs Kelly McCauley, performed *A Midsummer Night's Dream*, one of William Shakespeare's comedies. Working with the Bell Shakespeare Company who wrote our script, the boys presented a three-act play where each class performed one-third of the play, with different boys performing the key roles. Supported by Mrs Paula Little, Head of Performing Arts, and Mr Terry Crawford, the boys performed an extraordinary rendition of the play, engaging the audience and demonstrating outstanding theatrical skills. This performance marked the commencement of the College's Shakespearean program that will be followed in 2022 with *The Tempest*.

While the remainder of 2021 proceeded without significant interruption, some events still needed to be canceled due to COVID-19, such as the Year 6 trip to Canberra. As the year progressed however, we were able to engage more with parents and have them able to celebrate with their boys. At the end of Term 3, the boys led a significant educational experience for our families. The Year 6 PYP Exhibition was an excellent opportunity for the boys to showcase their outstanding learning to their parents and friends over three full days. The Year 6 boys did an exceptional job under the leadership and assistance of their classroom teachers and should be very proud of their efforts.

As we proceeded through to the end of 2021, we looked forward to the many other events that would bring our school community together to celebrate the end of what had been a very successful school year. The Mother and Son Dinner was a special event that allowed Year 6 boys to thank their mothers for all they do for them. The Junior Primary Nativity was a highlight at the end of the year. This event included performances by the Junior Voices Choir, the Junior Rock Band, and a sing-along for the families who gathered on the oval for an evening picnic culminating with the lighting of the College Christmas tree. As we moved into the final weeks of the school year, we farewelled our Year 6 friends at a very special Valedictory service. Presentation afternoon concluded a wonderful year.

I wish to thank the parents of Prince Alfred College for their support in 2021. In addition, I would like to thank the outstanding teachers and educators of this fine school. Their commitment and contributions to our boys' education are commendable and ensure we deliver the highest quality education to all the boys who attend our school.

As I turn to 2022, I look forward to the challenges that lay ahead, knowing that this community will ensure we have another successful year and do the very best for our students and families.

Secondary School Report



Pursuit of excellence in all spheres of school life embracing the areas of academia, sport, music, and drama are well known traditional components of a Princes education. The students are encouraged by much preparation, vigour, and celebration. Notwithstanding its challenges, the 2021 academic year has been a very productive and rewarding one.

The year began by welcoming many

new students into our school community, resulting in a record college enrolment. We also celebrated the hard work of our Year 12 Class of 2021. The 2021 graduates achieved pleasing results in both the South Australian Certificate of Education (SACE) and the International Baccalaureate. An impressive 24% of the Year 12 cohort joined the over 95 club with our students awarded 51 merits across 34 subjects. We were thrilled to congratulate Bill Chen and Ryan Li who were joint Duces, both with an ATAR of 99.55. A wonderful achievement for Bill and Ryan and for the College.

Our student achievements in national English, Mathematics and Science competitions continued to be of a very high standard. While students in Year 8 thoroughly enjoyed eduKart, eduCook and Adelaide Week opportunities with some experiencing the famous Balfours frog cake for the first time. The Year 9 Wambana program continued its success this year, with all boys able to experience the program in its entirety, enjoying the sail across to Yorke Peninsula and the chance to share a Wardli with new friends and old.

Music at the College continues to flourish. The Princes Goes to Hollywood concert was a memorable occasion which showcased our student's exceptional talent and enthusiasm. This was combined with our very special guests on the night, Mr Kym Purling and his talented trio, who provided wonderful mentoring to our budding musicians. The Australian Band and Orchestra Directors' Association (ABODA) music festival was moved at short notice to an online format this year. This is the largest competition of its kind in South Australia, with the Senior Concert Band, Intermediate Concert Band and Big Band 1 all winning their respective divisions, while Drum Corps and our string ensembles also achieved strong results. This year's production of Blood Brothers saw our students work collaboratively with students from Seymour College and Wilderness School to produce an outstanding performance. All who attended, marvelled at the skill and talent of the young actors, and appreciated all the efforts from those both on and off the stage to achieve such a high standard. We also saw our annual Film Festival go from strength to strength. Interestingly, all submissions were required to meet the added challenge of having to include a pineapple in the film.

The annual Journal launches for *Shades of Red*, History and Science continued under the leadership of Mr Iadanza, Mr Pippett and Mr Hopkins and we were pleased to see creative and considered contributions from students across the College. A further highlight

was the Art/ Design and Technology Showcase which attracted large crowds to view and celebrate the incredible creations of our Technology/Design and Art students. This year's exhibits included beautifully crafted pieces such as a guitar, coffee tables, side boards and some delicately carved wooden pieces. Some large dog kennels and ute accessories demonstrated the metal work skills of many of our Year 12s.

The Secondary School Swimming Carnival which takes place annually at the North Adelaide Aquatic Centre was enjoyed by all with the change of pace and the opportunity to represent their House. Fergus McLachlan swam for gold and was the winner of the Champion of Champions race in record time. At the end of the meet Watsford House was crowned the overall winner. The Summer and Winter Intercollegiate fixtures took take place with impressive performances in football, rugby, hockey, tennis, water polo, basketball, badminton and squash. These were accompanied by outstanding results in debating and chess. The Wesley Cup was also fiercely contested this year. Students competed admirably in 14 events with House participation at an all-time high. The House competition culminated on Athletics Day where the deserving winners of this year's cup was Taylor.

Our pastoral care programs continue to strengthen across our tutor groups with continued emphasis on the Princes Man, the reading program, a focus on mental health and wellbeing, indigenous reconciliation, respectful relationships and consent. Despite COVID -19 threatening to derail several key college activities, all were still able to enjoy the Red & White, our popular Careers Expo, the Old Boys Assembly and Year 12 valedictory events. Furthermore, we were thrilled to induct Mr Alex Hill, Mr John Keeves and Mr Keith McBride into our Princes Men Gallery this year as proud Princes Men who embody our ethos of Work Hard, Be Kind.

Throughout the year our prefects demonstrated strong leadership and positive engagement with the wider student body. Their teamwork was evident in arranging Bilsy Round, a special football match affectionally named in honour of Old Red, Jake Bilsborow. As a college community, we had a wonderful opportunity to show our support for Jake and his family, after his accident at the beginning of the year. Players from PAC and Pembroke wore different coloured socks to show their support for Jake and the Wings for Life charity. Our community responded with much needed funds to support Jake's rehabilitation.

The Annual Boarders' week is a fun and much anticipated event on the College calendar, with 4 major events, including the Young Boarders Challenge, Boarders BBQ, Boarders Herald and the revamped Rushton Cup. The annual football match saw the best of the city boys take on the country boarders' team, making for a great spectacle. With the match tied at the end of full-time the city boys ended up winning with a golden goal. Our boarding community has been in the spotlight over the last two years with its doors remaining open all year round to provide a home away from home for our international students. Unfortunately, they had been stuck in Adelaide due to COVID-19 travel restrictions and many of the international boarders had been confined here for the entire time. So, we finished 2021 with a very special and emotional farewell dinner for our Year 12 international boarders. Our thanks extend to Mr Zac Savage, Mr Phil Noble, Ms Mani White and to all our boarding staff for their outstanding efforts in supporting our international boys.

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This year I have enjoyed the privilege of getting to know the PAC community and the opportunity to work alongside our students who make an extraordinary contribution to the life of our school. I am also fortunate to lead a team of highly committed educators, dedicated to exploring best teaching practices and genuinely interested in the welfare of each student in their care. Much of the success this year is due, as always, to the sterling efforts of staff and we remain indebted to their untiring service.

Thank you to all who have provided me with such a warm welcome, for your ongoing support of our school and for entrusting PAC with the distinct privilege of educating your children. I have thoroughly enjoyed my first year at the College and am excited by what we will achieve together.

Academic Report



The graduating students of 2021 performed strongly in their Year 12 studies. The mean ATAR score was 82.01 and the median was 87.50. The median score was a 3 point improvement on 2020 while the mean was slightly down (82.73). In particular, it was exciting to see our IB Diploma cohort rise to the occasion and achieve a record school result averaging 40 points which equates to an ATAR of 97.90. This is an academic pathway in which students

can excel and prepare for university study.

Dylan Holland was Dux of School, achieving 45 points in the IB for an ATAR of 99.95. He is winner of the Sir Thomas Elder Prize. Dylan achieved six subject merits (plus a perfect three points in the IB 'core'). Dylan will now take up a place to study Mathematics at the University of Adelaide in 2022. Dinan Perera was awarded the E B Colton Prize (Proxime Accessit to Dux of School) with an ATAR of 99.90, with 5 subject merits. We wish all of 2021's leavers the very best for future endeavours.

66 merits were obtained by 35 students in 2021. In the last four years, 232 total merits have been awarded, at an average of 58 merits per year. In 2021, again almost a quarter of the cohort (35 boys) achieved at least one merit. This hammers home the point that at Princes, academic excellence is not the preserve of the few.

It was pleasing that we were able to consolidate our recent improvement in NAPLAN in 2021. And in academic terms, the data continues to provide a meaningful, important information that offers a point of reflection for our boys. Growth in their English and Maths proficiency is crucial to academic progress.

We maintain our commitment to reading for pleasure and its clear academic benefits. In 2021 400 (250) boys completed the Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC), which a significant increase on the 250 boys who completed the challenge in 2020. This proves yet again that high levels of achievement require the setting of high expecations. We look forward to building further momentum in 2022.

A commitment to academic enrichment remains one of our key priorities and the development of minds/expansion of horizons is central to our educative purpose. During 2021, targeted extension classes ran throughout the Preparatory and Secondary Schools. Around 10 teachers make up the extension team of 2022 and areas for exploration amongst many include; An anatomy of the Global Financial Crisis, Rembrandt's The Nights Watch, How the Soviets invented advertising, Game Theory – Strategies and Payoffs, and Pompeii, Herculaneum, and the bodies below.

As the global pandemic extended into a second year, opportunities for travel (both international and interstate) remained limited, and we continued to focus on opportunities close to home. In Mathematics we continued to have great success across a range of competitions. In the Hamann School Mathematics Competition (SMC) requires extensive knowledge and strong mathematical problem-solving skills. Owen Chen and Vivaan Sood in Year 7, Tim Huo (Year 10) and Kyan Ford (Year 12) achieved Distinctions, while Don Bui (Year 10) and Dinan Perera (Year 12) were both awarded High Distinctions in the respective sections. Dinan finished 9th in the Senior division.

The Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC) focuses on the importance and relevance of mathematics in students' everyday lives, with papers attempted by students from around the world. Eight boys in the Secondary School achieved High Distinctions: Jack Zeng, Owen Chen and Connor Heath in Year 7; Jack Zeng, James Cree, Luke Ecomonos, Oliver Fenton, Vivaan Sood in Year 8; Shengqi Huo in Year 10; Dinan Perera in Year 12.

Furthermore, in the future is bright, with excellent AMC results achieved In the Prep school. High Distinctions were achieved by Aiden Chen in Year 4, Aansh Tiwari in Year 5 and by Jayden Yue, Toby Munt, Harry Paholski in Year 6. In addition, Distinctions achieved by Jonas Knight in Year 3; William Pan, Lucas Pizzino, Tate Symons, Hugo Mittiga in Year 4; Alf Zheng, Carter Gerecke, Sage Goel, Domenic Palmieri, Bernie White, James McDonald, Xiang Tony in Year 5; Daniel Foo, James Selby, Milo Kotzee, Nathan Wang, Jensen Hunt, Dougal McDonald, William Pledge, Joshua McDonald, Alexander Oakes in Year 6.

We also had a smaller entries in two other competitions. In Term 1, a number of boys also sat an international competition - Kangourou sans Frontières, it is one of the largest Mathematics competitions in the world, earning a Distinction in this competition were the following boys: Deren Yin (Year 7), Don Bui (Year 10), Anthony Huynh (Year 10), Jiarui Zhang (Year 11), Luca Barei (Year 12). While a group of boys in the challenging Australian Intermediate Mathematics Olympiad (AIMO) with Tianyu Sun achieving a Distinction.

The College has a strong tradition of success in the field of science, and there were many commendable performances in 2021. The Australian Science Olympiad respresent some of the most challenging exams a student is likely to face at School, with High Distinctions awarded to the top 10% of students who sit these exams internationally, a High Distinction is a superb achievement. In this respect, Olufemi Komolafe performance is particularly noteworthy, he achieved High Distinctions in Chemistry, Biology and Physics – an outstanding achievement. It was also very pleasing to see fourteen students at PAC were awarded Distinctions in one or more of the sciences. In addition to this, fourteen PAC students in Years 7 to 9 achieved High Distinctions in the Australian Science Innovations 'Big Science' Competition, placing them in the top 10% of all participants.

There were several pleasing achievements in the field of Humanities. In History there were stellar performances from Ethan Liu, who was the Year 10 State Champion in the Australian History Competition and Max Thomas who was awarded the Premier's Anzac Spirit School Prize. While Henry Nind was a state finalist in the National History Challenge - 'Democracy Matters' in the Year 11/12 category. In Geography, the Australian National Geography Competition is the premier competition in this subject for School students. Our Year 9 boys performed exceptionally well with 8 High Distinctions, including Zachariah Anderson who placed in the top 3% nationally.

The reinvigoration of language learning at PAC continues apace with students (both SACE and IB) achieving excellent results. The average

grade across all languages being 6.10. And it was In Chinese the average grade was 6.33 and it was compelling that in Chinese the average grade was 6.33 and none of the students came from a Chinese background. At Princes we understand that in our globalised world language learning is a key means of developing connection and understanding across different peoples and cultures. In this context, There are exciting developments ahead in 2022 as well, with purpose built Language Labs being installed, programs supporting Chinese and French Language learning being initiated in the Prep School.

Academic growth continued in the co-curricular area with Princes successful participation in OzCLO Computational and Linguistics Olympiad (OzCLO) is part of an international code-breaking competition designed to pit the wits of students against puzzles in language and linguistics. Building on our 2020 debut in the competition, PAC entered two teams in 2021. The team of Adam Black, George Bartley, Lachlan Bryson, Ruben Japp qualified for the national round, where they were awarded a silver award.

Finally in this area, Public speaking and debating continued to feature prominently in school life. The standard for 2021's King's Speech Competition was again strong, with winners of the Lionel Logue Awards judged to be Jayden Yue, Nicholas Henchliffe, Dinan Perera

for the Preparatory, Middle and Senior School divisions respectively. While our Debating teams performed in an exceptional manner, with 7 of our 9 teams making the quarter finals and 4 teams; Intermediate B, Intermediate A, Senior B and Senior A all making and winning the Grand Finals.

Overall, 2021 was an excellent year and we have much to look forward to in 2022.



Princes Man Program

Paul's emphasis is always on safety and how boys can look out for one another at social events. Later in November, Brett Lee gave us a valuable insight into Cybersafety and earlier in the year Dr Kristy Goodwin spoke to the boys about managing Digital Technology.

In The Senior School

In the Senior School the pastoral support dovetails strongly with the academic program. PAC's owned and operated Out of School Hours Care is a place where all students feel at home. Throughout the year we assist families by providing a before school and after school care service filled with structured sporting, play-based and educational activities. Our philosophy is that at PAC OSHC every student has an opportunity to develop their social and personal skills, while exploring their physical and creative interests.

Our well-equipped facilities assist us to run a variety of regular activities that include, a quiet space for boys to complete their homework, the Prep School gym for indoor games and sporting challenges, outdoor handball courts and front oval for games throughout the year, as well as access to outdoor play on both the Adventure and Junior Playgrounds.

In 2021, we implemented a separate room for our ever-increasing Reception cohort that specifically targets the needs of the younger boys. This is run by our regular staff who have ongoing experience in the Prep School, thus providing a smooth transition from the classroom to the care provided at OSHC.

During the school year, our professional staff welcome all boys with an afternoon snack upon arrival. This is an opportunity for all boys to catch up on their day and unwind before homework and structured activities take place. The staff rotate in providing age-appropriate activities for all boys, and continuously look for ways to improve the programme.

In line with the National Quality Standards and the My Time Our Place Framework, OSHC staff continue to focus on developing an OSHC programme that nurtures positive, trusting, and supportive relationships with their students.





In consultation with our regular students, every term we develop a unique vacation care program that is both exciting and educationally relevant to our student needs. This includes a combination of both incursions and excursions that expose students to activities that build on their learning and further develop their social skills and knowledge.

Early Learning Centre

Angwin Classroom

Angwin students spent the year exploring how relationships work and how feelings help us think about the needs of others. They started the year thinking about their own sense of identity and how they are part of communities. The children not only explored this idea of belonging through the development of shared classroom expectations, but also by thinking about our sense of belonging to the Earth. Children looked at other inhabitants of our planet and, through art and science, considered the needs of other living things and how we can help our planet thrive. We then refined our inquiry directly to Kaurna land and what flies over it. Our observations of ngauwaka (rainbow lorikeets) and their lifelong partnerships launched a mini numeracy inquiry into pairs.

In second semester we continued to look inward and explored the broad range of feelings we identified, not only in our everyday lives, but also in the lives of characters in our favourite books and songs. We were surprised to discover how many feelings we can have inside. We thought about what those feelings look and feel like and how we control them and respond to them. This encouraged us to consider how we communicate with others. This inquiry was supported by our bug hunting in the garden and we discovered that insects also communicate with each other in a myriad of ways.

The children have had the opportunity to experience being vets, doctors, police officers and hairdressers. Play is a vital experience for children. It has value in terms of modelling numeracy and early literacy as they work with great enthusiasm in cafes and libraries. It enables them to reinforce learning, taking aspects of the Keeping Safe Curriculum to develop their understanding of people who can help us. They get to practise new skills such as using 000. They progress their independence by dressing and using equipment. Through role play, their confidence grows and their communication skills mature. Most importantly, they get to be social. They learn to negotiate for tools and play space. They express their caring and empathy as they look after sick animals and people. They work together in teams and get to play, changing roles and experiencing differing viewpoints. Their capacity to concentrate improves as they are driven by their own interest and creativity. All this is driven by the underlying aspect of the children learning through enjoyment.

During these activities, the children developed their fine motor skills and delved into the world of mark making. Observational illustrations and access to various Information Technology devices were used to explore and express ideas as individual learners and

Langley Classroom

Vehicle play has been a prominent feature in the Langley room throughout 2021. This began with a strong interest in matchbox cars, the children seemed to enjoy the small size of these items through the way they practiced managing and manoeuvring them in their play. As a way to extend on this, we introduced large wooden ramps as an additional means for the children to use their cars, providing them with the opportunity to practice cause and effect, trial and error, and motion. This also allowed ample opportunity for the children to practice turn-taking in their play, waiting for one another to release their car along the ramp, and collaborating with peers, as they had to work together to ensure the ramps were placed correctly for the cars to roll their way down.

In Term 2, we started to focus on how we share our natural world and what emerged from the children was an interest in looking at maps. As this focus continued, we noticed that some of the children naturally began taking this in a new direction, by creating their own road maps through markmaking experiences and driving the matchbox cars along the lines they had created.

Emergency vehicles have also weaved in and out of this ongoing interest in vehicles over the year – fire trucks in particular. It has therefore been most exciting when a fire engine has ended up at the school, often parking right in front of the ELC where we have been able to venture out the front to see it and take in all of its details in real time.

Mattingley Classroom

This year in the Mattingley room we have followed many learning journeys. However, the children have been deeply engaged in our inquiry – We Share Our Natural World, in particular recognising change and life cycles. We observed with awe, the transformation of yellow, white and black Monarch caterpillars from miniscule to colossal sized. We studied them and represented our thinking in observational drawings. Then, we saw the start of the process of metamorphosis as they changed into their chrysalis. And finally, the remarkable stage where the Monarch butterfly emerged from the chrysalis and began the cycle again.

Next, we welcomed a clutch of chicken eggs to the ELC and waited with excitement for the first chick to hatch. We detected a little hole, then a good-sized crack, and then the chick inside pushed the two halves of the shell apart! Over the course of a couple of days the children excitedly watched this occur numerous times! Watching the chicks hatch, grow and change has been the most amazing learning experience!

We have relished the opportunity to engage with life cycles in this way, as it has supported the children to not only observe and wonder at the beginnings of life, but also fosters empathy, by seeing firsthand that living creatures deserve care, safety and respect.

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Wilkins Classroom

In 2021 we have witnessed the children in the Wilkins room launch from tranquil and curious learners, to determined and inquisitive beings through their desire to learn and to build on their existing knowledge through play and planned experiences. Our strong classroom foundation provided a comfortable environment for children to establish their sense of belonging, forming meaningful connections with their peers and educators through play, conversations, and interactions. The Wilkins children engaged in an array of inquiries related to their ongoing interests, development, and the Early Learning Centre's curriculum. We commenced the year by thoroughly observing children's play, pausing to notice similarities and differences, conversations and imitations, likes and dislikes. These observations led the classroom inquiries for each term.

In Term 1, children were fascinated with toy animals and animal expression during play. Through this we were able to provide an inquiry where children could connect their fascination to various identities of common animals, including animal patterns and colours. As the inquiry progressed, the children's curiosity led to mark-making experiences depicting animal marks and colours. In Term 2, children explored their environment through different perspectives using binoculars, magnifying glasses, light tables, mirrors, cardboard tubes and more. This provided an avenue to establish self-recognition. In Term 3, discussions about the weather, particularly rain, led to an inquiry regarding common weather patterns and an introduction to the famous folktale, The Three Little Pigs. The story activated children's absorption in building as they created structures using multiple resources. Emphasising Term 4's inquiry of emotions provided a fitting conclusion as children prepared to move to their new classroom in 2022. We discussed feelings and how to be kind.

The team and school counsellor focus on building boys' self-belief and confidence as a lifetime learner, nurturing the development of meaningful social relationships with peers and encouraging participation in all aspects of school life.

The Student Success Team strongly believes all boys are capable of learning academic skills. As Mitchel experienced, high expectations are consistently maintained by the team. The Student Success Team ensures that individual learning strengths are identified and explicitly programmed in close partnership with class teachers.

As Mitchell has mentioned, there are many wonderful opportunities as boys move forward in their learning journey. The Student Success Team has worked on diverse programs with boys before school, using explicit evidence-based reading and maths intervention. The before school sessions allow all boys to spend quality learning time in the classroom. The team was also delighted to have the support of the Year 11 Community and Service students each morning. This program saw the boys focusing on developing reading fluency, comprehension and building confidence in reading. The team makes use of technology using the Speech to Text and Text to Speech on iPads. This has helped boys access more authentic literacy experiences. Through this medium, students were able to showcase their learning with enthusiasm and confidence. Across the Preparatory School, the Academic Extension Program is facilitated by various teachers. Selected boys have progressed through literacy and maths challenges aimed at their exceptional academic level. The journey through the College's Outdoor Education experiences has continued throughout 2021 in what has been a busy year of programs at Scotts Creek.

The Scotts Creek programs this year have continued to provide students across the college with amazing opportunities to build their relationship with not only their peers, but also the unique environment that makes this place so special.

It has been wonderful to witness a number of boys across several year levels express their appreciation for the opportunities and the experiences on offer through the Outdoor Education program. As an educator these moments of genuine gratitude and connection to place encapsulate what Outdoor Education at Princes is all about.

This year we welcomed back Sally and Ivy from Ngaut Ngaut. These sessions provided the Year 5s with wonderful insights about the local Indigenous people and ways in which the country provided for them in order to be self-sufficient and thrive in the environment around Scotts Creek.

The Year 7 program gave the boys opportunities to put some energy into a project focussed on improving the property. This year the boys assisted in: planting a new area of citrus trees with a selection of lemon and mandarins, painting the wood shed and storage unit by the dining hall, distributing bark chips by the big walls, assisted in planting the new native edible foods garden as well as creating a pathway through the garden and digging trenches for its irrigation.

A number of major projects have been completed on the property in 2021. An additional rainwater tank was installed beside the student toilet block and plumbed in to reduce our reliance on the river. This tank takes our total rainwater holding capacity to well over 250,000 L. The other major development this year has been the upgrades to the classroom. This has included new windows and screen sliding doors, data projection and the installation of the large viewing deck added on to the classroom. This project has completely transformed the classroom, making it a more useable space and has tied it into the rest of the property. I look forward to seeing it in full use for many years to come.

As the year concludes we farewell a number of staff from Scotts Creek. These staff will be missed but we wish them all the best for 2022 and beyond. A big thank you to Sarah Habel and Ellie Stroeher for their work and contribution to Scotts Creek during their time here.

2021 also marks my final year living and working at Scotts. As a family we have thoroughly enjoyed our time here and have so many wonderful memories and connections to this special place. For me personally, I have a deep connection to Scotts having spent time here as a student and now having worked here for nearly 13 years. The completion of the final Wambana Program for 2021, brought with it a time for reflection and celebration, as we looked back on fifteen years since the inauguration of Prince Alfred College's extended stay initiative. Over that time, 63 combined tutorial groups have stayed at the Point Turton Campus.

It was in March of 2007, that Wambana opened its gates to the very first group of Year 9 students from our Kent Town Campus. Since then, the nature of the Wambana program has grown and evolved. Wambana has been identified as a place where a significant 'rite of passage', for all Year 9 PAC boys, has occurred. Clear evidence of just this, has been gathered through ongoing feedback from parents and students, in every program. The findings from the years of pre and post survey feedback, confirmed that when our boys leave Wambana, they do so with a greater awareness of themselves, an empathy for others, an increased independence, an improved confidence, a greater maturity, and an elevated appreciation of family.

A look back through the 2021 Wambana Calendar, provided us with the opportunity to reflect upon the many achievements and enjoyable times experienced by the students from tutor groups Year 9 Schofield/ Montagnese (Term 1), Year 9 Smith/Ellis (Term 2), Year 9 Bianchetti/ Beattie (Term 3) and Year 9 Coats/Dawe (Term 4).

2021 has seen a continuation and an increase to the varied community work undertaken around the Yorke Peninsula. This included, maintaining the Pt. Turton Adventure Playground in conjunction with the Pt. Turton Progress Association, we partnered with Leisure Options to undertake work with those less fortunate than ourselves, and we created a community space at the Minlagawi Gum Flat Reserve.

The Wardli Living phase of our program, continued to provide both a highlight, and a challenge for our students. Each boy entered their wardli with unique personality traits and a wide range of personal experiences. Through the many domestic activities they undertook, teamwork and selflessness grew until they achieved harmony, and in most instances, a fully functional house.

Wambana continued to promote a love for outdoor adventure, as students cycled around Yorke Peninsula, hiked through Dhilba Guuranda (Innes National Park) and Melrose in the Flinders Ranges and took part in adventure class. Coastal activities included snorkelling, surfing, beach running, research into the rare Hooded Plover and marine debris research.

Student participation in the rigorous Wambana fitness and running program, which culminated with an 11-kilometre run along Hardwicke Bay to Point Turton, had a focus on building boys' health and well-being. Feedback from pre and post fitness testing clearly indicated the many physical gains made throughout the five-week program.

Wambana has an ever-growing focus on character education. Both in the classroom and intertwined throughout all activities, there were interactions and activities that focused on gratitude, empathy, and mindfulness. Students became aware of, and reflected upon, their development throughout the program. In the Student Assessment

Criteria Booklets (SAC), boys kept a written record of their ongoing development, mindset map daily, and documented friendship, personal and health and fitness goals. In their daily journal writing they undertook mindfulness, and gratitude exercises and shared their feelings and thoughts through daily letters home to their families. There was much writing and discussion about how they were living and how they could grow a positive mindset through positive affirmation. There has been a recent focus on ways to live life and grow their influence to impact others in a positive way. That focus involved, not being judgmental but respecting others, being punctual, being kind to all, doing things well and serving others often (the intrinsic rewards of being altruistic).

In 2021 there has been a growing awareness and understanding of the Indigenous owners of the Yorke Peninsula, the Nharangga. The Nharrungga culture is acknowledged through the naming of the Wambana Campus, (Wambana, meaning wisdom and knowledge) and the student accommodation houses, (wardli, meaning dwelling). Throughout Wambana's evolution, Wambana staff have met with local Nharangga elders, and Nharangga Aboriginal Progress Association (NAPA) representatives to make connections and have conversations about how Nharangga culture can be included into the Wambana program.

PAC Wambana are active participants in a partnership with the District Council of Yorke Peninsula in the Minlagawi Gum Flat project. This project involves the regeneration of a significant Nharangga site, Minlagawi Gum Flat, located at Minlaton. Each program, students work at the site, providing community service hours to restore the area and create a community space. Staff and students work alongside NAPA representatives and community leaders who explain to the boys the significance of the Minlagawi Gum Flat site.

In a community sense, senior Wambana staff have been active in the drafting of the Minlagawi Gum Flat Management Plan, attending meetings with representatives from Nharangga Nations Aboriginal Corporation (NNAC), NAPA and Nharangga families. This group has identified that more cultural experiences can be developed and offered for schools in the future. This discussion generated directly from Wambana's involvement at the Minlagawi Gum Flat site to date.

As mentioned above, activities we undertake at Dhilba Guuranda – Innes National Park include Hooded Plover research, a marine debris survey, and a 12km day hike. These activities have, at times, been conducted with staff who are Nharangga, and on those occasions, students have learned about connection to Country, and new projects, such as Marna Banggara, that are underway within the National Park.

In conclusion, despite the difficulties faced in these unprecedented times, Wambana has continued to deliver outstanding outcomes for our Year 9 students, in 2021.

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Careers

These last months of 2021 have been very busy with Senior School students making key decisions regarding their future pathways. University applications opened in the first week of August, and Year 12 students were abuzz with considering their different options. Year 10 and 11 students made their subject choices for 2022 but quite a few have revisited these choices to ensure the subjects will be the best ones for them. Questions for the students have centred around what subjects they like the most and why; what subjects they achieve well in and why; and what subjects they are curious about in relation to the world of work. In addition to being able to book into careers guidance appointments, all Senior School students (and parents) have been directed to the Prince Alfred College careers website www.paccareers.com. This is where they have been able to access significant future pathway resources, including guides to ascertain strengths and interests, links to further studies and information on various occupations

The Careers Office hosted a Bond University (Queensland) breakfast in June with twenty-five students and parents in attendance. Admissions Manager Scott Williamson shared information on the programs at Bond University, as well as the scholarships on offer. As borders have started to open again there has been renewed interest in national universities. The College received exciting news in November that nine PAC Year 12 students were offered scholarships for 2022 from Bond University.

The Careers Office hosted a number of different careers events this year, but by far, the biggest was the 2021 PAC Careers Expo held at the end of Term 1. Despite being in a pandemic, this was the largest careers expo in the history of the College. We had 600 students (9 – 12), parents, exhibitors, guest speakers and staff present. The positive feedback from all who attended was most encouraging. The students agreed that this important event was a game-changer for them, as they considered their futures outside of Prince Alfred College.


The 11th Australian Space Forum was held in March 2021 at the Adelaide Convention Centre and streamed live to a global audience. With over 1000 participants and 70+ exhibiting organisations – this was the largest edition of the event since its inception in 2016. Prime Minister Scott Morrison flew in to give the opening address. There were eight fortunate Prince Alfred College Year 12 students who attended and engaged with world-class speakers, presenting from around the world and on stage in Adelaide. Topics included were space education, quantum engineering and advanced manufacturing. In addition, the exhibition was a thriving hub of activity, with attendees interacting with participants at all levels, from students and educators through to innovators, industry leaders and government representatives. The PAC students who attended were definitely inspired by this visit.

In Term 3, Dr Sara Browning stepped up to take on my role, as I went on three months long service leave. She did a wonderful job keeping the 'careers ship' steady and took great care of the students in my absence. Indigenous Program

It was wonderful to receive this message included in an email from the Headmaster, at the end of June regarding Prince Alfred College's Narragunnawali Reconciliation Action Plan and the national awards:

'I was delighted to receive the news that we had been shortlisted nationally, which will in itself give further momentum to what we are doing.'

PAC launched the Narragunnawali Reconciliation Action Plan RAP in 2016 and learning the lessons have been meaningful for us. When we dropped down to one Aboriginal student in 2014, we knew we needed help in: understanding Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and their cultures, acknowledging our College's role in a painful history, and guidance in building restorative relationships. We wanted to undertake meaningful actions for real change. The Narragunnawali RAP has been our key resource as we build stronger relationships in and around the entire PAC Community. We had very little Aboriginal Elder involvement prior to 2013 at PAC. Our journey began when Uncle Ivan Tiwu Copley helped us develop our RAP. Our relationships with the local Aboriginal community have grown significantly. Uncle Lewis O'Brien, Uncle Mickey O'Brien, Uncle John Lochowiak, Uncle Moogy Sumner, and Aunty Shirley Peisley are valued friends who endorse the positive changes that PAC is making in the reconciliation space.

Interest started to come in from Aboriginal families and communities and a new relationship with the Smith Family Indigenous Youth Leadership Program IYLP Program began. In 2017 Prince Alfred College commenced the Yaitya Tita Program, a youth program for Aboriginal students. What started off as a way of connecting small numbers of Aboriginal students in the neighbourhood has grown to 15 schools being involved, with large numbers of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students coming together to socialise, learn and celebrate culture at the meetings.

PAC is guided by Elders, Aboriginal families and students as we learn about respect. We are humbled by their grace and patience as we learn to pause in our own drive and enthusiasm as we consult with the Aboriginal community first and take heed of their suggestions. Consultation denotes respect. We bring in Elders for Welcome and Smoking Ceremonies for special events such as Harmony Day and when the Aboriginal students return to school. An Acknowledgement of Country has a special place since we launched the RAP in 2016.

A Kaurna-themed sports guernsey is worn with pride. Teachers collaborate with Aboriginal people to prepare and deliver lessons. Janette Milera shared her family's experience with the Stolen Generation and her grandfather Private Herbert Milera for a group of Year 9 History students. PAC celebrates cultural events throughout the year but gives special emphasis for NRW and NAIDOC Week, with input from Elders and Aboriginal families. We have increased our table presence to two at the Apology Day Breakfast and NRW Breakfast. We have so many more staff and students who want to attend. Leadership is enabling professional development to ensure histories and cultures are priorities within the curriculum and early years framework.

As we continue on our reconciliation journey into 2022, Prince Alfred College is expecting to have 20+ Aboriginal students. We've come a long way since we only had 1 Aboriginal student in 2014. The interest in attending here is a result of families recognising that we are seeking to be culturally intelligent and responsive. The feedback we have had from the families and communities is that their children feel respected here and that their culture is valued and supported. On behalf of the College, we are honoured to be working in this space.



International Students



Our boys have again risen to the challenges of travel restrictions, remote learning and limits to social interactions. For some boys, it has been two years since they have seen their families and friends back home. We have seen their resilience, maturity and positive outlook as they have navigated the 'new normal', and we have been so proud of all of our international boys for continuing to be hardworking, kind and grateful.

As we farewell our Year 12s, we acknowledge their grit and determination that have enabled them to succeed beyond our expectations. All of our boys leave the College very much as Princes Men. At the International Student Valedictory Dinner, our International Student Captains, David Sun and Hayden Wong, on behalf of the international cohort, expressed their immense gratitude to the staff for their support and guidance over the past 12 months. The boys were were particularly grateful to Ms Thompson in the Health Centre for ensuring the health of all students in the school community, and to the boarding staff for their ongoing commitment to the wellbeing of all boys who call the boarding house 'home'. Our Year 12 cohort, while smaller than the previous year, was still very diverse. We had boys from China, Hong Kong, Vietnam, Qatar and Malaysia. We sincerely wish our nine graduates all the best for the years to come.

2020-2021 has marked a new milestone in our boarding history, with the boarding house remaining open over another year of school holiday breaks. The boys celebrated Christmas and New Year with various staff members and participated in a range of activities organised by Ms White, Mr Noble and Ms King. These included many socials with international students from other schools around Adelaide and participation in activities such as rock climbing, board games, quizzes and team building games. The boys were also involved in Yum Cha meals out and movie premieres, as well as a very successful 'Lockdown Olympics' in honour of our international students being in lockdown during the Olympics this year. This was a great night with lots of laughs and we even made our own Olympic torch for the celebrations. Our international students have continued to excel and make valuable contributions to the College. Hayden Wong was the winner of the College prize for Global Citizenship for his considerable effort in enhancing the cohesiveness of the College and for his service to the international community. We also have several talented musicians, including Ethan Han, Jiarui Zhang, Hayden Wong and Ivan Gao, who made regular appearances at various concerts, assemblies and key events. On Harmony Day, Fred Bruce represented his international peers as he spoke at the assembly held to mark the day. Fred talked about the interconnectedness of cultures at the College and how PAC provides a welcoming learning environment for all. The academic achievements of our international boys have also been acknowledged, with many receiving Academic Awards in a range of subject areas, including Science, Maths, English and Chinese. One major highlight was the announcement that one of the College Duces for 2020 was the very talented Bill Chen, who started at Princes as a Year 9 student in the International Student Transition Program (ISTP). Bill shared the award with Ryan Li, who was offered a place at Imperial College, London.

A core part of our international program is the ISTP, which aims to build students' confidence in using English and develop their awareness of the expectations of an Australian school. In Term 1, we had a small class of boys from Years 7 to 10. They learnt how to write essays and reports, and studied Chemistry, Physics and Mathematics. They also did Physical Education with Mr Ellis, playing sports such as badminton and squash, and doing fitness training in the gym. We were fortunate enough to have a number of guest speakers visit our class. Mrs Fitzhenry and Mr Coates came to discuss wellbeing and support services. Our 2021 International Student Captain, David Sun, talked about his experiences in the mainstream. Ms Cadiz took the time to discuss facilities and services in the library and to recommend books for the group. We usually undertake a number of excursions as part of the ISTP experience, but due to Covid-19, we were unable



to offer these activities. We hope to continue to run our city tour, Cleland hike and Haigh's trip in 2022.

For the remainder of 2021, we delivered the ISTP online due to the pandemic. Students and staff rose to the challenges of an online learning environment. The boys studied English for Academic Purposes, Science and Mathematics. They also read a number of literary texts to broaden their cultural knowledge and deepen their understanding of the English language. One of our online students, Gavin Zhang, was the proud recipient of an Academic Award for English as an Additional Language, making him the first ever online student to receive an award from the College!

The international student group has engaged with the school community through a variety of interclass and school activities which have helped develop camaraderie across peer groups and year levels. In Term 2, the Year 10 Chinese class presented their dialogues to the Chinese Literature class. In Term 4, they interviewed a Chinese international peer on their hometown and presented their information in their final oral presentation to both classes. In the Year 11 Language B English class, we were very fortunate to have Uncle John, an Indigenous elder, talk to the boys about spirituality, connection with the land and relationships between people. The letters of thanks that the students wrote to Uncle John after the session were much appreciated. The pandemic limited our social events, but we managed to hold some gatherings with our sister schools. These kinds of interactions build stronger bonds within and beyond the College community.

Our international boys experience a broad curriculum at Prince Alfred College. They are involved in the life of the entire school. Boys are placed in Tutor groups and House teams. They attend assemblies and are strongly encouraged to take part in co-curricular activities including sports, music and art. Our international boys have made us very proud through their participation and achievement in a range of College activities including squash, badminton, basketball, table tennis, debating and musical bands. Some of our boys even performed the Lion Dance at the Preparatory School for Chinese New Year. We have been impressed by our prefects and leaders, who have successfully organised several events and activities. Our International Student Captains for 2022, Toby Zhao and Ivan Gao, and our international Prefects, are sure to follow in the successful footsteps of their predecessors.

We are excited about the announcement of potential border openings, and look forward to welcoming at least 15 new international students from Year 1 to Year 11 in 2022. We take pride in providing our boys with exciting learning opportunities and helping them thrive at Prince Alfred College.

Performing Arts

The Year in Review

We don't read and write poetry because it's cute. We read and write poetry because we are members of the human race. And the human race is filled with passion. So, medicine, law, business, engineering... these are noble pursuits and necessary to sustain life. But theatre, beauty, romance, love... these are what we stay alive for.' - Walt Whitman, *Leaves of Grass* (1855)

Once called 'the American Shakespeare', writer, Walt Whitman's work has inspired countless pieces of art, poetry and performance. I received a copy of his early volume of *Leaves of Grass* for a birthday many years ago and his verse has always resonated with me. Whitman began attending plays in New York when he was 14 years old, and in his youth counted himself a 'perpetual theatre-goer.' One of his 'awakenings', as he described it, was a musical version of *The Tempest* in the early 1830s, and he wrote incessantly of the need for children to see 'real life realised' on the stage. This is what we have aimed to do this year, with a record number of excursions, workshops and live performances across the Performing Arts.

Drama Curricular: Years 7-12

Students of Performing Arts experience a semester of learning per year in two of their chosen subjects. Boys in the Drama cohort of Semester 1 always enjoy a smorgasbord of live performance, with the Adelaide Festival, the Fringe and the DreamBIG Children's Festival occurring in the first half of the year. In 2021, alongside their curricular studies of Ancient Greek Theatre and Commedia dell'Arte, Year 7 and 8 students continued their exploration of acting approaches with both year groups attending the Festival Centre to see Tröll in May. Using only simple props, puppetry, extremely creative light sources and shadow effects, we were transported on an intriguing journey back to the year 1998 - which was seemingly prehistoric, according to the Year 7 boys in the audience, though I can remember the days of dial-up internet like yesterday. With a table and a projector screen as the centrepiece items on stage, we witnessed scary scratching behind the walls, cables moving like snakes and a sarcastic Icelandic grandma who knew all there was to know about terrifying trolls. It was a dark but magical journey which touched on issues of the digital age, depression, illness and death. Tröll also brought light and happiness, conveying how important the value of family and real-life connections truly are.

The second Year 7 and 8 group saw *I Wish...*, an exciting collaboration between Patch Theatre and renowned South Australian circus company Gravity and Other Myths in August. This production pushed the boundaries of expectations of live performance and surprised many boys with the myriad of possibilities it explored. Through physical theatre, stunning visuals and a healthy dose of humour, the play explored our differences to reveal the magic of individuality which provided the basis of key class workshops in the weeks following.

Slapstick comedy appeals to many people, and Year 8 Drama students always begin the year by learning of its origins in the traditional Italian theatre style of Commedia dell'Arte. After a hiatus in 2020, we welcomed Andrew Crupi to the College to deliver expert workshops on commedia skills, which the boys worked on and refined to present group performances. Year 8 Drama students were also fortunate to enjoy three action-packed days with the State Theatre Company across the year as part of their Adelaide Week explorations of the city. We worked with the well-known actor Rory Walker on improvisation and with Elias Psiros, whose expertise in puppetry and bodily limbs enabled the boys to make their own 'fake fingers' at the Lion Arts Factory. We trawled the wardrobe warehouse and the prop shop, trying on clothes and carrying out our own treasure hunt amidst hundreds of period and modern-day items. Thanks to the STC Education Manager Fiona Lukac, we were incredibly lucky to also see a School's performance of *Euphoria* by Emily Steel. A two-hander, the lead actor James Smith certainly inspired several boys resolve on that day that they would continue studying Drama past Year 9, so entranced were they by his stellar performance.

This year, Year 9 Drama students were focused on play review writing and scripted ensemble work. Learning how to effectively rehearse together and present a tightly-focused performance is a serious exercise in self-discipline, which Year 9 Drama students approached with fervour. In March, we saw *The Boy who Talked to Dogs* as part of the Adelaide Festival, presented by Slingsby in conjunction with the State Theatre Company and An Draíocht Arts Centre, Dublin. Based on the bestselling memoir by Martin McKenna, this rough and tumble tale worked very effectively with shadow puppetry and amazing physical performance fused with stirring Irish music. Set in the round, the stage was a new experience for many of the boys who recognised Wendy Todd's work from *Man Covets Bird* (also by Slingsby) which they saw as young Year 7 boys in 2019. It was wonderful to see them make this connection based on the similarities in design that they noticed, and to speak with confidence about their thoughts on the set design.

In September, Year 9 further explored their study of Australian realism when they visited the Space Theatre once again to see Windmill's *Amphibian,* an epic story about migrants, displacement, loss and teenage trauma. This was a confronting experience for many Year 9 students whose raw honesty made their reviews engaging to read. Also in September, both Year 9 Drama classes welcomed special effects maestro Phil Grummet to the Prince Philip Theatre to learn how to create blood, guts and gore on stage. Creating realistic stage injuries is an essential part of the Year 9 study of Black Comedy this semester, where controversial topics such as violence and terrorism are explored through shockingly funny moments of a graphic nature. We had a lot of fun creating broken arms using chicken bones, 'false flesh' and Grumm's gore – Phil's own recipe for artificial venous blood, which sells around the world.

Industry professionals and the valuable connections they provide our students are an integral feature of the study of Drama in the senior years. Among others, we met with Graham Silver, now Head Lighting Designer for the Australian Ballet and PAC Old Scholar. Boys in Years 10, 11 and 12 also enjoyed intimate workshops with David Mealor, Artistic Director of Flying Penguin Productions and awardwinning director; Mitchell Butel, Artistic Director of the State Theatre Company; Finegan Kruckemeyer, internationally-renowned playwright; Nathan O'Keefe, actor, and Sally Hardy, an AWGIE-winning playwright, screenwriter, children's author and producer.

Year 10 Drama continued to develop their skills throughout the year, culminating in a fabulous performance of *Ernie's Incredible Illucinations* by Alan Ayckbourn in September. Year 4 boys and ELC students visited the Prince Philip Theatre for a special daytime matinée to watch the antics of Matthew Economos as Ernie Fraser, a daydreamer with a difference – his daydreams actually come true! This performance explored Grotowski's Theatre of Transformation and the use of exaggerated comedy techniques in its style. It blended fantasy with

reality through lighting and sound transitions, ably operated by our Tech Crew. Directed by Rebecca Hassam, *Ernie's Incredible Illucinations* highlighted the importance of nurturing our imaginations as a valuable form of escapism for both young and old – a good reminder for when we need to take time out and enjoy a daydream or two.

Year 10-12 Drama boys visited city theatres regularly throughout the year. Whilst 7 *Stages of Grieving* was sadly cancelled again due to lockdown, in addition to the above productions we saw *The Appleton Ladies Potato Race* in June, Sam Shepard's *True West* in July and *Glengarry Glen Ross* in September.

Two major productions were mounted by Year 11 Drama this year, as required by the SACE Stage 1 Drama course. Studying Twentieth Century American Theatre, Year 11 boys launched Parachute Productions as their own theatre company with a series of vignettes exploring masculinity in all its forms: Falling Short, which played to a full house in June. This was followed by a full-length production of Glengarry Glen Ross in October to an audience of invited guests. Rebecca Hassam's direction was superb, whilst performances from Year 11 students Angus Porter, Shae Olsson-Jones, Matthew Adams, Sam Read, Leith Johnson and Hugo Walker-Mizgalski were sharply heightened by the excellent lighting and sound design by Patrick Femia. Mamet's play is a scathing satirical exposition of the ruthless business world in American society, and it appealed to the actors of Parachute Productions in its willingness to lay bare controversial issues such as capitalism and greed. Having worked closely with David Mealor, who directed the same play at the Bakehouse in September, the boys and Mrs. Hassam tackled this daring work head-on and delved deeply into the societal norms of petty criminals and dubious salesmen where language is intransitive, gestures are incomplete, relationships are self-serving and temporary. The result was an explosive evening of simmering tension and overwhelming betrayal which will be remembered for some time to come. The boys behind Parachute Productions promise more boldly creative performances in 2022 - watch out for their work.

In April, Year 12 Drama students blazed a spectacular trail at PAC for the first time in many years as they presented Hitchcock's classic noir thriller, *The 39 Steps*, adapted for the stage by Patrick Barlow. This was a very special milestone in the growth of Performing Arts at Prince Alfred College. As the first SACE Drama performance to be staged at the College since 2007, I am delighted to have been part of this journey and to be able to celebrate the outstanding achievements of Rebecca Hassam, Ethan Bald, Bailey Lock (Captain of Drama 2021) and Mitch Parker, who were dedicated to bringing this story to the stage alongside Isabelle Milsom (at university) and Astrid Teague of St. Peter's Girl's School.

The stiff upper lip is a difficult concept to get across in a loose-limbed country.' So says Maria Aitken, a prominent British director about the challenges for Australian actors of bringing to the stage well-known characters from the 1930s, more specifically, about a play that takes sly, inventive liberties with the notion of British heroism, with the concept that emotional display is rather vulgar and that danger must be faced with undemonstrative restraint and comic consequences. These gigantic challenges have been faced head-on by Ethan, Bailey and Mitch, expertly guided by director Mrs. Hassam. The play is playful, but there is no room to play around. The energy and rapid physical transformations demand precision and control, and it is these skills which I have had the privilege to watch develop over the years in all three boys. The time they have given to their work, the energy and the commitment which is vital and which is modelled every day by Mrs. Hassam, the depth of understanding and appreciation of theatre that has taken root and flourished is testament to the quality of the Year 12 Drama program at PAC. Their success paves the way for others to follow.

The Princes Players Theatre Company

Established in 2017, the Princes Players Theatre Company is proud to have continued the tradition of co-curricular theatre at PAC with major productions such as *Oliver!*, Thornton Wilder's *Our Town, Bugsy Malone* and *One Man, Two Guv'nors*.

In September 2021 one of the most well-known West End musicals premiered at PAC, *Blood Brothers* by Willy Russell. *Blood Brothers* is only one of three productions to ever run on the West End in London for more than ten thousand performances (the other two are *Les Misérables* and *The Phantom of the Opera*). Widely recognised as Russell's masterpiece following such successes as *Educating Rita* and *Shirley Valentine, Blood Brothers* is a hilarious, heartbreaking and multiaward-winning musical which tells the story of the Johnstone twins. Separated at birth when their mother cannot afford to keep them both, Mickey and Edward grow up only streets away from each other but worlds apart; one rich, one poor. Each of them never knows they are a twin. By a twist of fate, the boys meet and become best friends, even falling in love with the same girl. There can be only one tragic end to this story when the prophecy of their death comes true in a shattering conclusion.

So speaks the Narrator, beginning the rollercoaster of emotion that is the smash hit musical *Blood Brothers*. Written and composed by Willy Russell, this contemporary saga of social class was embraced with gusto by the Princes Players Theatre Company. We were determined to present a compelling show. This is a highly charged, suckerpunch of a play (for it is a play with music, really), taken on with raw tenacity by the Princes Players and the girls from our sister schools: Seymour College, Wilderness School and Westminster School. The cast performed some of the best musical numbers ever written and were accompanied by the Year 10 Advanced Music class who made up the full orchestra, guided with perception by Director of Music Andrew Edge and Old Scholar, Edmund Black. After a tumultuous year which included the inevitable lockdown and a three-week pause on rehearsals, but with their eyes firmly fixed on the prize, the Players presented a realistic, gritty performance of emotional depth. With some adult themes, suggested violence and apparent gunshots, we faced a challenge like never before and our student cast executed it perfectly.

'I first saw Blood Brothers in November 1989 in London. We'd seen *Me* & *My Girl* and *An Ideal Husband* the previous two nights, and my family took a punt on a new show which looked interesting. I'd never even seen a musical or play prior to that trip and I was completely taken with the energy that live theatre produces. After initially being confused by the casting of adults as young children, I still remember the feeling at the conclusion - my fickle teenage facade disappeared as the enormity of the production took hold. I distinctly remember deciding there and then that the theatre was going to be my life. I wanted to tell stories and draw people in, to make them feel like I did. The world drops away during a good production, when the audience becomes part of the story and takes ownership. I learnt empathy that day: to never dismiss people's actions based on what you can see, and I can still remember the sound of Mickey's voice in my head, thirty-two years later.' – Alicia Zorkovic, Co-Director

With the omniscient narrator (Angus Porter) embodying the sinister force of Fate and powerfully setting the scene from the opening bars, we met the downtrodden Mrs Johnstone, played by Isla Zorkovic, as she navigated a life of poverty with six children and two more on the way. Zorkovic's sweet singing voice added much to the pathos and her musical references to Marilyn Monroe enabled the audience to see Mrs Johnstone as a bright flame burnt out too soon. Her job as a housecleaner brings her into contact with Mrs Lyons, who is unable to have children and who wants to adopt one of the twins, and the women form a pact. Everything in life depends on decisions, and there is nothing more poignant for an audience than watching Mrs Lyons' random choice in one moment of a twin plucked from a pram whose life then goes on to be entirely different from his brother. As witnesses to the impending tragedy we feel somewhat responsible for the invisible forces commandeering the innocent brothers, Mickey Johnstone and Edward Lyons, and that is where the true power of this story lies.

Shae Olsson-Jones (Year 11) played Mickey with natural flair and agility opposite Julian Dawson (Year 7) as his secret sibling, Eddie. The pair became skilled in their craft, capturing the youthful energies of sevenyear-olds, moving through their teens and then into adulthood in a believable manner. In the first act, Olsson-Jones embodied the young Mickey of 'nearly eight' so enjoyably well with his innocent face and gangly limbs and boundless energy, later cutting a convincingly tragic figure in contrast. Along with the ensemble, led by Matthew Adams as Mr. Lyons and Jack Elms as Sammy, the cast harnessed the energies of the young and playful perfectly in large chorus numbers like Kids' *Game*, but Olsson-Jones' tour de force of Mickey's mental collapse near the end with the complete change in his body language and posture as his descent begins, was masterful. For one so young, Julian Dawson's turn as Eddie Lyons also evolved smoothly from awkward child to suave politician, portraying privilege tempered with humility and grace. Theirs was a partnership which developed so naturally over the course of the production that it was often entertaining to watch the off-stage antics as well as the on-stage scenes.

The cast benefited hugely from their enthusiasm and energy. Zara Hower (Year 8, Seymour College) played Linda, the girl of both Eddie and Mickey's dreams, with both charisma and compassion beyond her years. She captured her character through the various phases of her life; from a squeaky young girl (evoking Aveline from *Bread*, for those who may remember it), to a seductive teen and then a concerned wife as Mickey's mental health deteriorates. Of remarkable note was Stella Byrne in the role of Mrs Lyons. Joining us for auditions, callbacks and twice-weekly rehearsal sessions all the way from Westminster School, Stella made the mad Mrs. Lyons utterly disagreeable through her haughty manner. There were times when her withering stare towards Mrs Johnstone could have exterminated her a thousand times over.

Matthew Adams' star turn as Mr. Lyons evoked both the rigidity of the class system and the futility of mass redundancies in Thatcher-era Britain. His solo number *Miss Jones* raised the roof, whilst cameos by Captain of Drama Bailey Lock, Tom Williams, Will Pointon and Luke Economos strengthened the small, focused ensemble.

With in-depth theatrical training one of the focal points of development for the Princes Players, we engaged the services of professional production armourer John Coory who introduced the cast and crew to the correct use of real firearms in the context of a theatre. John's expertise in handling guns and his knowledgeable, calm approach in supporting our actors helped them to feel confident in using the real guns which we decided to use as props. These firearms and John's sound effects greatly enhanced the show and added to the audience's authentic experience of the tragedy as it unfolded before their eyes.

With haunting melodies that remain in the subconscious as I write, the ghosts of Mickey and Eddie will forever haunt the ANZAC Hall. This cast of students worked hard to create a world so far removed from their own and to explore what happens when humans believe they can change their destiny. I commended this production to our audiences who provided standing ovations to the last, and I hope you enjoyed what was a memorable journey for us all.

The walls in the Prince Philip Theatre are now adorned with thirteen more posters since I arrived at PAC five years ago. Thirteen more productions to add to the rich history of Prince Alfred College, including Oliver! (2017), Our Town (2018), Bugsy Malone (2019), Julius Caesar (2019), One Man, Two Guv'nors (2020), Twelve Angry Men (2020), The Prodigal Son (2020), The 39 Steps (2021), Falling Short (2021), A Midsummer Night's Dream (2021), Blood Brothers (2021), Ernie's Incredible Illucinations (2021) and Glengarry Glen Ross (2021). Our small team has achieved so much in five years and I have never been more proud of the Performing Arts faculty and our students. My sincere gratitude to all, and in particular my colleague Rebecca Hassam who has guided Year 12 Drama with meticulous attention to detail.

In 2021 we have indeed seen 'real life realised' across all facets of the Performing Arts, as Whitman said. As I pass the baton to the next faculty leader, I know there is more to come.

Tech Crew Review

The 39 Steps tech crew

The College Tech Crew enables all students involved to engage in theatre and events in a way most students will never experience. As a co-curricular option which allows boys full access to professional training throughout the year, it runs as one session per week after school as well as during technical rehearsals for all Drama productions and major Performing Arts events.

Tech Crew introduces students to the backstage world of theatre, the stuff the audiences don't see, but which is vital to the mounting of productions. The training, which is led by Craig Williams and the team at Mosaic AV, enables boys to design and program the AV for everything! We have boys involved from Year 6 to Year 12, and we are always looking for more members to come and learn the systems and methods we use to enhance and inspire our College events.

The main roles undertaken by members of the Tech Crew include lighting design and operation, sound engineer, vision tech and stagehand assisting with furniture and prop movement. By choosing relevant tasks that match the appropriate needs of each production, we have been able to develop new skills and approaches for each performance required by curricular and co-curricular Drama. For the first time ever, this year saw a full program of productions across the senior Drama curriculum, so 2021 has been a busy one. With six productions staged over the course of the year, we worked on the whole school co-curricular production of Blood Brothers, the Year 6 production of A Midsummer Night's Dream, year level productions of The 39 Steps (Year 12), Glengarry Glen Ross (Year 11), Falling Short (Year 11) and Ernie's Incredible Illucinations (Year 10). Each one takes at least two months to plan and rehearse for. These production opportunities gave the team in Tech Crew the time and creative freedom to explore the power of sound, vision and lighting systems that the school has to offer, through state-of-the-art facilities such as the Grand MA II. When we are asked to create something – which is usually in the director's head! – it is our job to bring it to life on the stage.

The Tech Crew does not only work on theatre productions. We also control the tech for many other events such as assemblies, music performances and intercols. These events often challenge the boys as there is usually much less time to plan and prepare, and problems invariably arise have to be dealt with in an effective way. Intercols provide a unique opportunity for the crew to experience and be 'hands on' with professional-grade livestreaming equipment that is watched by hundreds of thousands of people. Prince Alfred College is uniquely capable of providing this extra-curricular activity to the boys with the recent upgrades to the ANZAC Hall and Prince Philip Theatre sound and lighting systems, which previously did not exist. This training teaches us many problem-solving skills as well as how to perform under pressure. PAC is only able to support this activity due to the committed staff that guide the program. We are grateful to Ms. Little and Mrs. Hassam for their work which often runs longer and later than we think due to the complexities of theatre.

With the opportunity of another full year of jam-packed productions, and professionally-designed tech crew sessions, 2022 is set to be an exciting year which will consolidate the skills we have been putting into practice this year.

Music

Princes Voices (PRV), the College's core vocal ensemble, has also had a memorable year, demonstrating their continual development with every performance. Along with their popular music favourites, such as *Pompeii* by Bastille and *I'm Gonna Be* by The Proclaimers, PRV explored a range of musical styles throughout the year including traditional, choral, musical theatre and World music. Alongside College events such as assemblies and *Princes Goes to Hollywood*, PRV performed at Burnside City Uniting Church, Wesley Uniting Church, and Saint David's Anglican Church in November.

2021 saw the introduction of a new vocal group, the Middle School Vocal Ensemble. This small group of select students aims to develop the skills of our most promising Year 7-9 singers, focusing on vocal technique and tone, harmonic awareness, and balance of sound. Beginning with short barbershop style tags and familiar songs, they first performed a special capella rendition of 'Happy Birthday' to two surprised and delighted Junior Voices members at Live Music Week #2. They followed this with a five-part harmony of Roy Orbison's *Pretty Woman* at the College's premier music event, *Princes Goes to Hollywood*.

Our Preparatory students' enthusiasm for singing and performance skills continue to develop, with Junior Voices numbers growing steadily throughout the year. Our 45-strong ensemble of Year 3-6 boys demonstrated their talents at assemblies and Live Music Weeks, culminating in a show-stopping performance of *Hakuna Matata* at *Princes Goes to Hollywood*.

As there is so much such talent amongst the Junior Voices, a small group was also introduced this year - the Junior Vocal Ensemble (JVE). Five promising singers now meet weekly to practise simple vocal harmonies and choreography to popular music songs. Their debut performance of *There's Nothing Holding Me Back* by Sean Mendes was a tribute to their efforts in weekly lunch time rehearsals. This was followed by another crowd favourite, *That's What Makes You Beautiful* at the Term 3 Prep Music Showcase.

Another new opportunity afforded to Preparatory students was the addition of the first Junior Rock Band (JRB). Learning to sing and play instruments at the same time, the JRB held their own as a band next to senior rock bands, performing Green Day's *Boulevard of Broken Dreams* at the outdoor event, Jammin' in the DC. The boys skills have continued to grow throughout the year, with their latest performance of *The Middle* by Jimmy Eats World being a big hit at the Term 3 Prep Music Showcase.

Thank you to all staff, students, and parents for supporting Voice at the College and making it such an enjoyable and rewarding year.

Bands

2021 has been a year of many successes for the bands at Prince Alfred College. Even under the cloud of COVID-19, we managed to fill a year of concerts at school and the wider community that challenged the boys to play at the highest levels.

Big Band 1 was the first ensemble to hit the ground running with a weekend filled with community gigs in the first half of Term 1. First, a highlight playing at the ANZ Community Ball at the Convention Centre to over 1200 people, including distinguished guests and the Premier of South Australia. This performance opportunity was a result of the band's Division 1 win at Generations in Jazz in 2019. In recognition of their win, James Morrison invites the winning band to perform at this high-profile event as one of the headline acts, alongside his very own Motown Band - and what a thrill it was for Big Band 1 to have James Morrison step in and play with them. The following day the band performed at a Fringe show in the Capri Theatre which saw them joined by the leading big bands from Marryatville High, St. Peter's College and Brighton Secondary School. It was a fantastic afternoon of high-calibre music to a sold-out audience. A big thank you to Mr. Andrew Edge, our Director of Music, for organising this event. Following this, Strike Up The Bands late in Term 1 gave our concert bands their first performance for the year. This included the Beginner Band which played a confident set after fewer than ten weeks of learning their instruments.

In 2021, Generations in Jazz was cancelled once more, but we were fortunate that ABODA SA stepped in to set up the SA Schools' Jazz Festival at the University of Adelaide. PAC's four big bands in the Secondary School competed in Divisions 1 to 4, making us the only SA school to have big bands in all four competitive divisions; a credit to the depth of talent we have here at PAC. Big Bands 1 and 2 placed second in their respective divisions while Big Band 3 received a silver award, and Big Band 4 a merit award in their divisions. Big Band 1 also won Best Section Awards for Trumpet and Trombone, and Dinan Perera received one of only two Outstanding Soloist Awards at this highest level. Two other boys from Big Band 1 were also recognised in the National All-Star Big Band: Ben Spitty on Lead Trumpet and Joshua Fedele on Lead Trombone.

This year the ABODA Band Festival was set to return to Westminster School and as such, PAC had various bands preparing for this Statewide event. However, due to the lockdown in early Term 3 the event moved swiftly to an online platform with video submissions. This did not dampen the spirit of the boys and they continued to work hard and prepare. Their dedication was evident with Senior Concert Band taking home the Bob Hower Memorial Award for Best Concert Band in the Advanced Division. They now remain undefeated in the top division of this event since 2017. The Intermediate Concert Band also won their section, and the Junior Concert Band came in second place in the Junior Division. The big bands didn't disappoint either; with the Ellington Festival not taking place, Big Band 1 entered the ABODA Festival in the Advanced Stage Band section, winning the Hal Hall Memorial Prize for Best Big Band. Credit also must go to Big Band 3 taking home a Bronze Award in a very competitive section which saw them up against many schools' top big bands.

September proved to be a very busy time for bands at Prince Alfred College. This year the annual cabaret-style themed concert, *Princes Goes to Hollywood*, featuring world-renowned jazz pianist Mr. Kym Purling, was one of the biggest and most successful Term 3 concerts ever. The bands once again played a large role in delivering fine performances alongside Kym Purling; of note, the showstopper finale, with all PAC musicians and our special guest all on stage together which provided a wonderful farewell moment for our talented Year 12 performers.



Film

Film is a specialist area of academia at PAC, and we have revelled in its unparalleled growth in the last few years. 2021 saw the most significant growth in Film at the College in its history, with lots of curricular and co-curricular study happening on the ground. I commend our Film students for their work throughout the year, and I would like to make special mention of three: Myles McEwen, Year 12, whose piece *Australian Misery* was selected for the Bond University Film and Television Awards BUFTAS – the premier film competition for high school students in Australia. Bailey Lock, Year 12, whose film *KLEPTOMANIA* won Best Film at the Adelaide Youth Film Festival – a spectacular achievement. Bailey's film was selected as the winner from over forty submissions, which highlights the quality of his work. And finally, Joshua Pullino, Year 7, was also selected for the AYFF for his short film, *The Recipe*. Film students are constantly working in a hive of activity at PAC. There is always a camera on, capturing the action!

This year's Year 12 class consisted of twelve boys, with many more filling Year 10 and 11 classes. In all, there were 63 students of academic Film and Media Studies this year. These classes were expertly led by Film teachers Mr Michael Oomens and Ms Paula Little, with Mr Harry Postema and Mr Mike Steer recently taking over whilst Mr Oomens is on long service leave.

Year 12 IB Film had a brilliant year. Taught by Mr Oomens, we worked tirelessly on three major submissions. Each assessment allowed us to actively engage in unique research relating to the films we studied, with students exploring different cultural contexts. The final film Portfolio allowed each of us to demonstrate our technical knowledge. These included Confession by Ripley Stevens, Angus Gniel and myself, The Cove, by Edison West, Bailey Lock and Josh Brazier, and Insanity by Joshua Lasscock, Mitch Parker and Harrison Jurisevic. Although IB Film is possibly one of the most demanding subjects in terms of time and work, I could not recommend a better course to study at PAC in your senior years. Driven by collaboration, creativity and critical thinking, the knowledge and growth students gain from the course can be transferred to any facet of education and life. The Year 12 IB class had the chance to enjoy an IB Film screening in the PPT on the final day of Term 3, showcasing all our films we made from Year 10 to 12 which was an emotional experience.

2021 also marked the first year that two official Prince Alfred College documentaries were created. First, the secondary school witnessed the assembly premiere of *Recognition*, produced by teacher Mark Wilde, Year 12 student Thomas Mitev and myself, revealing the remarkable work of the staff whose work goes unnoticed at the College. This film will continue to be a primary resource for year levels to come, and I believe it has contributed to the ever-evolving culture within our school. Secondly, Year 12 Student Bailey Lock's documentary *The First Eighteen*, which documents the First XI footy team and their path to victory in the 2021 Intercol, was an enormous success and has been watched by viewers throughout South Australia. The documentary has certainly set a remarkable standard for future film productions.

The BleedRED Film crew was again a key factor behind the success of Film this year. The crew was relaunched at the beginning of the year, with students Tom Haden, Patrick Femia, Max Oswald and Jack Schirripa and coordinated by myself. Our student-led crew created videos for assemblies, and as a result, the feature film has now become synonymous with assemblies. I would also thank Joshua Lasscock, Joshua Brazier and Jack Miller for their ongoing support throughout the years.

In October, the third annual Princes Film Fest took place. We were joined by guest speaker and judge James Marshall, the Head of Studio at CDW animation, who provided insightful personal experience and advice. James's career includes film, TV, online video, mobile games and virtual reality development. Among other roles, James has worked as the Head of Learning and Development for Technicolor and most recently, he just finished a two-year stint in the South Australian Government's Department for Trade and Investment as Business Development Manager for the Creative Industries. Now Head of Studio at CDW Studios, 3D Animation, as well as sitting on various advisory panels for IGEA, The University of Adelaide, and others, James's advice was timely and focused for our young filmmakers.

Using the significant item SI of a pineapple, films were submitted from year levels throughout the College from the Secondary School and the Prep School. This year's judges included Nick Iadanza and Harry Postema, representing SACE Creative Arts. It was an amazing night and yet another example of the explosion in film at PAC. The winners included:

Science


A feature of our science program this year were the activities during Science Week – in fact there were so many opportunities available to the boys that we ran it over two weeks. The theme this year was 'Food – Different by Design.' Our Year 7s and 9s experienced hands on practical workshops related to sustainable food practices and indigenous foods. Our Year 8s saw how ice cream could be made with liquid nitrogen (and tasted it) and the senior students were able to attend lunchtime workshops by outside presenters from the University of Adelaide and Pernod Ricard Winemakers. The workshops focussed on Genetically Modified Foods, CRISPR therapeutics Artificial Intelligence and Sustainable Food Practices. The week also saw our Year 11 Biology students dissecting kidneys with students from the ELC – a real highlight for all concerned.

As we began to emerge from the COVID-19 pandemic, the Chief Editor of this year's Science Journal, Dinan Perera (Year 12) and his hardworking committee asked the question 'What lies ahead of us now?' This question provided the impetus for the theme of this year's journal, *A brave new world*. Our guest author, Associate Professor Matthew Tucker discussed the changing nature of the genetically modified food debate and if they and other technologies will provide a solution to our ever-increasing food supply demands. The publication included student contributions on a range of topics including the International Space Station, the Dyson Sphere, mRNA vaccines, nanomaterials, melatonin synthesis, nuclear medicine and in somewhat of a first, an article related to the science of mathematics.

Opportunities for our students to extend themselves beyond the normal scope of the curriculum were once again offered in the form of the Big Science Competition, (Year 7-10) the Science, Biology, Chemistry and Physics Olympiads (Year 7-11), the Oliphant Awards (Year 7-12) and the Chemistry Titration Competition (Year 11). We had several boys achieve at a very high level in all of these competitions.

History

Despite some COVID-19 restrictions remaining, history students still had many opportunities in 2021 to explore the numerous possibilities this subject offers.

The year began with a dedicated group of students meeting in the History room to lay the groundwork for our 2021 History journal ably led by chair, Tom Mitev. It was decided that 'History around the globe' would be our theme (perhaps a reaction to COVID-19's parochialism). This journal included some of the best examples of historical writing by students from Year 10 through to Year 12, plus staff and old-scholar contributions. So, thanks must go to the hardworking committee who steadfastly saw this project through to its final stage.

The History Journal launch has become a noteworthy evening on the College calendar and although our audience was capped, it remained a night to remember. The format this year included two splendid student mini-lectures by Lachlan Hill and George Bartley. This was followed by Ms Jacquie Sexton's eloquent dissertation on Anzac memorialisation. Additionally, Max Thomas and Dinan Perera were both presented with the Ron Gibbs' prize by Mrs Margaret Gibbs for two outstanding contributions to the Journal.

Our success in various History competitions continued with Max Thomas selected as a Premier's Anzac Spirit Prize winner for 2021 for his brilliant essay on his great grandfather, Maxwell Leonard Thomas. Max was presented with his award by the State Premier, the Hon. Steven Marshall (pictured) and follows Archie McEwen's success in the same competition last year. Like Archie, Max will participate in a study tour around Australia with a focus on Australian history. Furthermore, Ethan Lui was a state champion in the Australian History competition, winning a citation and medal presented to him by Mr Evans and Henry Nind was the state winner of the National History Challenge 'Democracy Matters' section and a finalist in the Year 11/12 category.

An innovation in 2021 was the introduction of an excursion to the new Adelaide Holocaust Museum involving the entire Year 10 cohort. Each class was designated an afternoon to attend and were transfixed as they listened to Holocaust survivors share their harrowing testimonies. The boys were then taken through the exceptional display area by Jewish guides who explained the various historical artefacts, objects and stages of the Holocaust. Many questions were answered in subsequent History classes, but some, of course, will always remain unanswered.

Finally, whilst some guest speakers, trips and events were curtailed this year, on every occasion, boys made the best of the situation. Certainly, it was another year history will not forget but we look forward to 2022 with a degree of cautious optimism.

Preparatory School

The Preparatory Library continues to be the beating heart of the Primary Years Programme facilitating over 1100 borrowing and inquiry visits for students in the Preparatory School and another 300 visits from our friends in the Early Learning Centre with over 20000 items borrowed and returned.

Monday 22 March was filled with excitement as the College opened to welcome Grandparents and special guests. There was an opportunity for visitors to donate a book for the boys to read and share, the first big event of the year for the library. Donations of new books to the Preparatory Library in 2021 exceeded all expectations and I am humbled by the support and recognition from the wider community in regard to the importance of reading.

Eight students in Year 6 represented Prince Alfred College on Friday 4th June in the Kid's Literacy Quiz (KLQ). The KLQ is an international literature quiz for students aged 10-13 years. Students participated in 10 different rounds against schools from around Australia. Congratulations to PAC team 2 who scored a perfect 10 out of 10 in their speciality topic 'Legends and Mythology.' The boys competed with perseverance and passion.

Jack Buckskin visited the library during Book Week (August 21 -27) to share stories through dance. After instruction and rehearsal, the boys were able to perform while Jack played the didgeridoo. I congratulate the boys who demonstrated respect, had the courage to try something new and kept an open mind.

Non-fiction author Danielle Clode visited the library for 2 days in August. Danielle is the author of Prehistoric Giants, Prehistoric Marine

Life and Dinosaurs to Diprotodons. The boys were treated to a presentation about nonfiction writing which included replica skulls of the extinct marsupial lion Thylacoleo and jaw bones from the extinct short-faced Kangaroo Procoptodon.

On Wednesday 1 September, 14 year 5 boys from Prince Alfred College wrote a book in one day for children's cancer research. It was all part of Write a Book in a Day, an annual competition promoting literacy, collaboration and creativity. This year the College entered 2 teams. Boys were given a brief and within 1 school day they had written, illustrated and submitted a storybook. The completed books are uploaded to an online library to give access to children undergoing treatment in hospitals across the country. The 2 teams raised over \$2000.00 for the Kid's Cancer Project. The books have been printed and available for viewing in the library.

In Term 4 we celebrated the 265 boys who completed the Premier's Reading Challenge. The challenge required boys to read 8 books from a selected list and 4 books of their own choice. Congratulations to 30 year 6 boys who have completed the challenge for 7 consecutive years. Our final event on the literary calendar was the Christmas Book Fair. Scholastic provided us with cases of new books and stationery for students and families to browse and purchase, turning the library in to a pop-up book store.

2021 has been a successful year for reading and the library, I look forward to a 2022 literary calendar brimming with reading opportunities for the community to participate in.

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Senior School

This year the Frederic Chapple Library has undergone significant change, including its physical appearance and an expansion of the wide array of resources available for the benefit of our students and staff.

The library redevelopment project commenced in May 2021. During the mid-term break, our collection was temporarily relocated to the McBride Room in the Red Centre, a bright and light space with stunning views of the back oval. There were no disruptions to the library's usual services during this time. We anticipate that the building works will be complete at the beginning of December.

In addition to the redevelopment of the library, our focus was to expand our library collection and to further develop the reading identity of our students. With the help of our dedicated library staff and our wonderful teaching staff, the library added over 600 new titles to the collection.

This year we have witnessed an outstanding commitment to reading by our Middle and Senior school students. With the consistent help and encouragement of Mr. ladanza and a team of dedicated teachers, a record number of 398 students completed the Premier's Reading Challenge (PRC) by reading the required 12 books each for the year, an increase of 139 students (or 54%) compared to last year! Three of our Year 12 students, Myles McEwan, Angus Croser and Thomas Searles, received Hall of Fame Reader for Life 13 years certificates for their commitment to reading; what an inspiring achievement!

Throughout the year, among other festivities, the library celebrated World Book Day, Harmony Week, Reconciliation Week, History Month, Men's Health Week and Languages Week. We also organised various activities and competitions such as the Library Mystery Bag, Photography and Poetry Writing Competition and Sweet Competition. The competitions sparked lively conversations among participants, some fierce competition among staff, and produced plenty of laughter.


We look forward to welcoming our students and staff in the new library space in 2022.



Sailing

Sailing got back on the water in Term 1 this year, after the initial impact of COVID-19. The first Metropolitan Trial took place on 28th February at Port River Sailing Club, in light SE breezes that shifted SW building to 12-16 knots. There were 12 teams from 7 schools, with 6 rounds sailing a total of 36 races. We had some new skippers and crews, and defeated Walford 2 in their first race, then lost to Investigator, Westminster 1, Westminster 2, and Immanuel 2. In our final the sixth race, we defeated St Peter's College 2 with a 1,2 finish, despite our third boat retiring due to an injury sustained by Thomas Henchliffe.

Thomas was out for the next regatta, so it fell to green skipper Apollon Velonakis to steer our third boat. Frederick Sands showed strong leadership throughout the day, most notably in our defeat of Walford 2. The pass back Frederick orchestrated at the third downwind mark compressed the fleet, squeezing the Walford team, just as a wind gust caused a sudden gybe and capsize of their boat onto their teammates, providing a very dramatic finish.

We entered one team in the Metropolitan Championship, with Thomas rotating in as a reserve skipper to replace Apollon. Sam Read and Ruben Japp thus gained a bye each over our four races of the day. The highlights were a convincing 1,2,5 win against Concordia and a nail-biting race against Ocean View 2. Sam Read was forced to withdraw just before the start with gear failure, a broken jib halyard, so it was up to Thomas and Frederick to sail 2 v 2. Thomas led the whole race, but Frederick was squeezed into fourth place at the first mark. He pulled off an impressive downwind manoeuvre after Mark 2, forced a penalty onto the opposition boat and attained third place. In 2v2 racing, the winning team cannot come last, that is, fourth place. Unfortunately, despite Frederick putting a good cover on the last leg, the opposition boat in second place came back at Frederick after Thomas finished and held him out to just get his teammate into third over the line. We lost our last race against St Peter's College 1 1, but as they came fourth in the regatta overall it was no disgrace. We were placed mid-fleet in seventh place out of 14.

We returned to Goolwa Regatta Yacht Club again in April for the annual State Championship, unfortunately without Frederick our captain and best skipper. However, senior boys, Sam and especially Ruben stepped up to the mark. and led the team well which worked as four pairs skippered by Sam, Ruben, Thomas and Apollon. Again, this meant a rotation of the final pair to give everyone a chance at racing. Xander Green made an excellent crewman, as did new Year 11 sailor James Lee. Our two best international students Julian Yang and Stephen Wang filled out the squad, with Stephen joining us in Goolwa midway. The competition amongst the 16 teams from 13 schools was very close, especially mid-fleet where we initially found ourselves. Unfortunately, our inexperience combined with waning stamina by the third day, caused us to drop several places in the dying rounds, ending 15th on the table behind a close rival in Concordia but above Immanuel B. St Peter's 1 were the clear winners of the state title, though unfortunately for them and the other two top teams, the national regatta was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

I would like to acknowledge the work of our specialist coach, former St Michael's sailor and West Lakes Aquatic Centre instructor Matthew Sampson, along with the loyal team of parents, who always support their sons so well throughout the season. A farewell thank-you should also go to Mani White, who left us in Term 4.

Swimming

Due to the lack of a Swimming Intercol in 2020 the PAC swimming team approached 2021 with a determination to be victorious in all of their 2021 meets. The first major meet of the season took place on Thursday 18 February. Here a group of PAC swimmers competed in the annual School Team Swimming Championships. The competition is made up of purely relay based events, both within and across age groups. It brings together some of the best swimming schools in the state for an exciting night. PAC were very successful placed second in the Years 7/8 category, second in the Years 9/10 category and were victorious in the Years 11/12 category. This combined effort also meant that PAC took out the Boys Overall Champion trophy.

This momentum continued into March with the SSSSA A Grade Swimming Carnival. This is the highest level of competition in the state for school swimming. PAC had won the past four years in a row in the male category. PAC started strong with Fergus McLachlan winning the first event of the meet, the Open Male 50m Butterfly in a time of 25.28, beating the previous record held by Kyle Chalmers. This set the tone for the rest of the night with many PAC swimmers going on to win their individual events and/or PB personal best PB times were also achieved. The true highlight for PAC teams came in the relay section where our swimmers won every relay. Particular success to note was the Open Male 4 x 50m Medley Relay, which saw Isaac Keighran, Regan Nelson, Fergus McLachlan and Will Ayres break the previously held state record. While the Open Male 4 x 50m Freestyle Relay, with Billy Trim, Will Ayres, Isaac Keighran and Fergus McLachlan broke the existing state record. This led to PAC winning the male section of the meet for a fifth year in a row, with a score of 769 points, rivals St Peter's College finished second with 574 points.

Intercol was the next challenge for our swimmers and on Wednesday 24 March, the PAC Swimming Team competed in the combined SAAS Swimming Final / 36th Swimming Intercol, held at St Peter's College. PAC performed particularly well in the team relay events. Each race was close, but PAC were victorious on the day, winning both events, with a total of 716 points to St Peter's College's 649. We were extremely proud of the way the boys represented the College this summer and all swimmers should be commended on an excellent season, winning every competition entered. Special congratulations need to go to Co-Captains Isaac Keighran and Fergus McLachlan who led with distinction both in and out of the water. Thank you also to staff: Peter Bubner, Felicity Liddy, Marta Matthews and Super Coach, Connor Kioussis who provided support each week. Finally, thank you to all the families who were our consistent cheer squad, you were very much appreciated.



Chess

Senior School

The 2021 Chess season began in more normal circumstances than 2020. Despite some disruptions early in Term 3, the interschool chess season was completed with only a single round lost. The return to over the board chess was welcomed by the boys, and the social aspect of the games helped draw in more participation than previous years. In all, over 40 boys participated in interschool matches for our seven teams, across 3 divisions. Our Division 1 sides were dominant throughout the season, coming first and second. PAC Division 1

Red, led by Captain of Chess George Bartley, as well as PAC Division 1 White, led by Vice-Captain Ben Stevens performed consistently throughout the season, and deserved their final positions. In Division 2, PAC Division 2 Red, which saw the emergence of a number of new players over the course of the season, finished comfortably first, while PAC Division 2 White achieved moderate success, coming equal seventh. These successes saw PAC retain the Champion School Shield for the 12th straight year.

Our three Division 3 sides, made mostly of players new to secondary chess in 2021, also performed admirably. This included, nine Year 12 students, all of whom were new to chess. Many of these formed PAC Division 3 Gold, known commonly as the Year 12 All Stars, which started the season strong, though would later face some more challenging sides. Ultimately, all three sides would finish within 2.5 points of each other, with PAC Division 3 Red in equal seventh, PAC Division 3 White in 12th and PAC Division 3 Gold in 13th place.

PAC also won the annual Intercollegiate Chess match for a record twelfth straight time, defeating St Peter's College 7.5 – 2.5. While the result was very convincing, St Peter's College's players made it difficult on the night, with the result of almost all matches still unclear after over an hour of play. The result was a credit to the character and determination of the boys.

In terms of individual performances, Ethan Retnaraja, Anthony Huynh, Ethan Liu, Adam Black, and Alastair Whyte were all undefeated in interschool competitions, and the Intercollegiate match. The performances of Captain George Bartley were also commendable, winning 5 out of his 6 Division 1 matches, and losing only two matches for the school overall, both of which were to St Peter's College's Captain of Chess, Chathula Kiripitige.

A pleasing number of boys also competed in SAJCL and SACA tournaments outside of the College over the course of the year, as well as tournaments elsewhere. The most notable among these were Ethan Retnaraja, who came equal first in the City of Adelaide Junior U21, and won the U18 State Championship and the U21 October 60. Ethan also achieved strong results in other tournaments, such as, the 55th Begonia Open at Ballarat, where he was equal first in the U16 category. Other achievements included George Bartley being runnerup in the State U18 Championship, Anthony Huynh runner-up in the State U16 Championship, and Tim Gibbons, Ben Stevens and Alastair Whyte coming fifth, sixth and seventh in the City of Adelaide Junior U21.

In terms of in-school competitions, the Middle School Championship was comfortably won by Ethan Retnaraja, while the Senior School Championship was won for a second year by George Bartley. Anthony Huynh's excellent season, playing on board 2 during the Division 1 season, and Board 3 during the Intercollegiate match and winning all of his matches, was recognised with him winning the Michael Wills Prize. George Bartley is to be congratulated as Captain of Chess this year, along with Vice-Captain Ben Stevens, both of whom took on these roles as Year 11s.

A special thanks must also go to Mike Hill, who assisted enormously through the year, doing so with a splendid knowledge of the game. Assistant Coach Peter Gregoric was excellent, with his understanding of the game, and notably endgames. His rapport with students led to their steady improvement. Finally, Coach Richard Thorne must be thanked for his tireless and continuous support of the program. Additionally, a special thanks must go to Sophie Davies and the facilities team, notably for assisting the SAJCL by hosting a Division 1 night on short notice, due to the disruptions early in Term 3. Such things do not just happen, and the efforts of her and her team make such things possible, even in the face of the special challenges of the past two years.

Preparatory School

While there was some disruption during Term 3, the Primary Chess season was a success overall, with all rounds ultimately being played. The return to full time over the board chess was warmly welcomed by the boys, and Friday afternoon matches, hosted by the College, provided an excellent opportunity for players of all skill levels to develop their understanding and compete in a welcoming environment.

The College entered seven teams into the competitions this year, with one in Primary A, three in Primary B and three in Primary C. Notably, we had a large influx of new Year 4 players this year, many of whom played in Primary C. In the end, boys from years 3 to 7 competed, with a special mention to ELC boy Arthur Kerrigan and Year 2 boy Teddy Bown, who both offered to fill in for a handful of matches towards the end of the season when other boys were unavailable.

In terms of results, PAC A, led on board 1 by Jayden Yue, came third in Primary A, behind East Marden Pink and Blue. In Primary B, PAC B Red, White and Gold would finish fifth, sixth and seventh respectively, while in Primary C, PAC C White came third, while PAC C Red and Gold came equal fourth and sixth respectively. PAC also competed in the EK Shield, coming third behind East Marden and North Adelaide Primary, with a team made of players from across all three divisions.

In terms of individual performances, Angad Gill and Xander Oakes, both new to the College, played impressively through the season in Primary A, with Xander winning 5 out of his 6 matches. Most impressive of all, however, was Dougal McLachlan, who won all 6 of his Primary A matches, with a seventh won by forfeit. William Pan won 4 out of his 5 matches in Primary B, while Aadeesh Nanvey won 5 out of his 6 Primary C matches. Year 3 Thomas Dobbins also won 4 out of his 5 matches in Primary C, completing an impressive first season in the program.

There was also a pleasing number of boys who chose to compete in SAJCL competitions outside of the College, particularly during the July break. Beyond PAC's gates – external competitions



Football

Season 2021 will be remembered for being a very unique season for a number of reasons. The season marked the 150th year of football competition against St Peter's College. An incredible achievement and with even more significance from the fact that the competition has run consistently since its commencement and without interruption. Even COVID-19 was unable to impact this extraordinary competition. We were very fortunate in, losing only two games and two and a half weeks of training. Touring inter-state wasn't possible which meant our annual Wesley competition was cancelled.

Interest in football at the College continued to grow, we now have 16 teams in competition which include a team being entered at all grades and multiple teams at Years 4,5,7,8 and 10. Five teams complete our cohort at senior level, which makes the highest number of teams from any one school in the whole competition. As almost 400 students from the College were engaged in our football programs a coaching cohort of 30 coaches would facilitate, direct and develop the players, to become engage accomplished footballers and effective team members in a positive culture. Old scholars, James Borlase, Jamison Murphy, Ollie Gasparin and Jesse Temme joined the coaching group to remain connected to the College and give back to our younger players in the process.

Week 3 of Term 2 would mark the commencement of the official season. The two weeks previous would be used as of the selection period for the teams that would take the field in Round 1. Jarrod Cotton would join football management to ensure that a more focus was placed across all grades and that players and coaches were supported diligently to promote fluency and efficiency.

Highlights from the season:

This marked the second year that our Year 8/9 boys would be entered in the Knockout Football Competition. This once again proved to be a test of our ability and gave us an an awareness of the standard that exists at the top level of this competition. The side included strong representation from our Year 8 players, who would combine with our high performing Year 9s to create a team that could mix it with the best at this grade. Head Coach Jarrod Cotton led the group with an impressive start and a significant win over Brighton High School and then a close win against Blackwood High, which was achieved through a spirited late surge. This put us in a position to progress to Round 2 and play Henley High School followed by Adelaide High. Both teams would prove too strong in very wet and scrappy conditions, ending our run quite abruptly but teaching us all some important lessons as a result of the experience.

Once again, we had formidible PAC representation leading into the 2021 SAPSASA carnivals. Five players out of a total of 16 players,

Round 6 of our normal season's fixture was memorable. and named Bilsy's Round, to support Old Scholar, Jake Bilsborow after a terrible accident that left Jake with life changing injuries. Jake attended the game and many of our senior boys, led by Rory O'Callaghan, would group together to drive a number of fundraisers in support of a cause that provides much needed help for those learning to live with a disability. A very successful day and a notable show of PAC community spirit. Credit must also go to Pembroke College for their additional support of the event.

Although the First XVIII schedule did not pan out the way we would have liked it due to a clash with SAAS and SSSA's season's fixtures we were unable to consistently field our top two teams to progress to a finals State Knockout Champions series. On the other hand, the Intercol Competition was highly successful across all teams. We had 12 teams compete on the day and 12 wins. We were able to completely stamp our dominance on the game with teams such as; 7A, 8B, 10A Red and the 3rd XVIII registering significant winning margins. In addition, the First XVIII produced an exhibition of fast, clean and physical football in the first quarter, shocking our rivals as they headed into the first break with a 7goal lead. The evident display of positive teamwork with all teams producing their best performances for the season in their final game, which is what we aimed for, considering that the development of player and team is a consistent progression. Although crowds were limited due to COVID-19 the atmosphere and celebrations were not, and rounded out a tremendous day of competition and made the day for Principal Bradley Fenner who was present at his last Winter Intercol in his current position.

The end of season Presentation Dinner took place in Stadium 2 on Saturday the 11th of September with 280 players and family in attendance. It was a grand night to finish off and celebrate the season. The mood was set immediately with the exquisite table decorations inspired by Jude Searles and assisted by Tash Hortle and Jodi O'Callaghan. Bailey Loch would highlight his documentary – *The First IVIII -150 Years in the Making*, through a snap-shot introduction and an explanation of the planning, capturing and compiling process involved. We saw a behind the scenes overview of the PAC Intercol Competition, with emphasis on the First XVIII team in 2021. Inspired by the 150th Year Anniversary of the competition, Bailey dedicated an incredible amount of time attending training sessions and games, interviewing numerous people along the way in order to effectively capture the essence and importance of the Intercol Competition.

Jim Parkinson and the PAC Old Collegian's would continue to sponsor our Most Courageous award for each team and in addition, the recipients would also receive a PACOC T-shirt produced by Old Scholar designers ORTC. Major award winners on the night included: Harry Tunkin winning College Champion as our First XVIII Best and Fairest for the second year running. Harry McInnes would also win his consecutive year as the leading goal scorer for the First XVIII. All players who were Best on Ground in their Intercol clash were acknowledged and following this event, Kane McAuliffe would be awarded the joint winner of the Gosse Medal for best player in the First XVIII competition.

A special thank you to all our extraordinary coaches for your hard work to achieve the impressive results that we experienced throughout the season. To Deb Trengove, Paul Brown and Troy McKinnon, thank you for all the behind the scenes work with co-ordinating the logistics and support. Credit must go to our grounds staff for ensuring that our facilities remained top notch. Congratulations and well done to all our players for the committed approach you have all delivered throughout the season. Finally, to our parents for the sacrifices you have all made to accommodate the season and especially those that have chipped in to assist on game day with match duties, fund raisers, function organisation, and trainer duties. I cannot thank you enough. I am confident in saying that Season 2021 certainly lived up to expectations.

1st XVIII

Season 2021 emerged with an extremely large number of Year 12 students earning consistent selection throughout a shortened 2020 season, then after graduation leaving a huge gap in our First XVIII squad. As a result, a proactive start was on the agenda and gathering early interest seemed a necessity. We initiated this in the middle of Term 4 with a presentation to 95 potential players of the First XVIII Following this, all attendees were required to complete a 2km time trial to benchmark players current level of fitness, rank the squad based on their performance and set targets for players to meet through their training over the break. Some impressive times were recorded in this initial phase which gave the re-assurance that we were guaranteed to be a very fit side, so focusing on ground cover would feature as a game plan priority.

Pre-season commenced in Week 3 with our traditional 6:30am sessions twice a week and our primary training venue became Park 15 to protect the front surface back on site. Credit to the group, and their commitment evidenced by their consistent attendance record.,

The coaching panel gained some high-quality inclusions with: Taylor Walker and Brodie Smith playing mentoring roles and assisting with line coaching, Nathan Steinberner taking on the permanent runner role and acting as a roaming assistant with lines when required, as well as Crows Strength and Conditioning Coach Jarryd Wallace taking on some of the training duties to build the teams explosive power, general strength and repeat effort fitness.

After 5 weeks of intensive training and trialling, we were able to confidently choose 55 players who would make up our First XVIII squad training group and filter through the First and Second XVIII on Game Day. Harry Tunkin earned the main role as skipper for the season. He was a run-away favourite amongst his playing peers and the coaching staff, as a result of his impressive level of commitment to the program, as well as his passionate approach to success and the positive culture of the group. Harry McInnes and Aston Woods were awarded the Co-Vice-Captain Roles and Declan Hortle the Deputy, completing the core Leadership Group. Charlie Adams, Will Charlton and our Year 11 players in Kane McAuliffe and Hughen Wissman, filled the remaining spots establishing our Squad Leadership Group who were accountable for driving the team and culture from a player perspective.

Taylor Walker played a pivotal role with assisting the driving of a number of morning workshops to assist the Leadership Group to understand the key elements of effective leadership and strategies to fast-track leadership development and effect influence. Additional features characterising our pre-season phase included, a gruelling sand session at the City Beach Volleyball courts, an educational night upstairs at the Alma Hotel, with guests; Taylor Walker, Brodie Smith, Marco Bello, Harry Schoenberg, Luke Pedlar and James Borlase, who provided profound insights into the life of an AFL footballer. A bonding session for the players was also added very late in the pre-season phase to help bring the group together after the Wesley tour was cancelled

The next progression was to put all our hard training into game context and securing trial matches against PACOC U21s and Rostrevor College, provided us with real clarity relating to how we were competitively tracking. Both games exposed a few areas for us to refine leading into a major test in Round 1 against a very accomplished Sacred Heart College.

Round 1 - PAC v Sacred Heart College

Our first official game for the season proved to be our biggest challenge. Sacred Heart had maintained a large portion of their side from Season 2020 and combined with the highest number of State representatives in any one team in the competition, we realised that we would have to be at our best across 22 players and throughout the entire duration of the game. Although our team would debut 15 players in this game, potentially a record in any one season, the approach was positive and winning seemed within our reach.

The first quarter delivered some promising signs that we were capable and up for the challenge, however, our boys could not sustain this, then Sacred Heart College;s class, experience and ability to push hard forward in waves, proved too much. The end result was a disappointing 91-point deficit, and one of the largest losses from our First XVIII in over a decade. However, we had some consistent performances from: Kane McAuliffe showed that he was certainly ready and equipped to compete at this level, Captain Harry Tunkin worked hard from start to finish and Luca Slade, our only Year 10 player won his position convincingly with flair and clean skills throughout.

Round 2 - PAC v Westminster College

After a week on the track soul searching and rebuilding, we were able to head into Round 2 with a clear focus, which acted as the first building block to re-creating our season. This time an 18-point final margin resulted, but inconsistency prevented us from taking firm control of the game from Westminster Patrick Weckert and Ollie McInnes were added to our 2021 debutantes. Zac Bishop was lively and untouchable all game, Kane McAuliffe maintained his good form and Patrick Weckert raised a number of eyebrows with his sheer presence up forward early in the game.

Round 3 - PAC v Immanuel College

This was our first game on home soil and with a very satisfying outcome. PAC excelled with their passages of ball movement and structure as key features of the game as we moved the ball accurately with fluency and clear intention. Harry McInnes was unstoppable inside the forward 50 m finishing with 8 goals and Harry Tunkin and Kane McAuliffe were dominant throughout the midfield from start to finish.

Round 4 - PAC v Scotch College

After coming off an easy win in the previous round, this game would prove as a much-needed test to gauge how far we had progressed since Round one. Scotch College were potentially the biggest movers in the competition. They were an extremely tall side with a handful of State representatives, which ensured that they were a real threat and not a team to be taken lightly. A commanding start set us on our way to a very healthy win, with Declan Hortle dictating the stoppages throughout the game. Our midfield displayed a physical dominance by winning contested balls repeatedly and ensuring the ball left the contest in the right direction. Aston Woods was dynamic across half back providing plenty of drive and George Cox controlled the last line with discipline and an impressive ability to play tight and win contested balls.

Round 5 - PAC v St Michael's College

Round 5 took us out to Henley Beach to play against a fast-improving team at St Michael's College. After a quality performance the previous week, complacency could be a problem so, the focus was directed at playing to a standard and not to the conditions. Unfortunately, the first half was a real battle, with few players displaying their potential or consistency throughout quarters. After a stern address at half time, desire and discipline returned and the final term produced a flood of goals assisted by a relatively strong breeze favouring our

scoring end. Overall, not one of our best performances with very few standouts across the four quarters. Harper Montgomery was one of the few positive movers of the game winning his position clearly and displaying a strong physical presence. Luca Slade and Tyrell Sgroi chipped in with four goals each for the day and Hughen Wissman put in a hard-working effort.

Round 6 - PAC v Pembroke

There was an atmosphere of determination and anticipation before Round 6 as the event was played in support of Old Scholar, Jake Bilsborow. The game focussed on ourselves, our standards and how we want to play the game or in other words, our desired Brand. Although conditions deteriorated as the game progressed, the quality of football from PAC was sustained as was the dominance over our opposition, which resulted in a 112 point annihilation. Hughen Wissman led the way with a hard-working Best on Ground performance. Harry Tunkin was a consistent performer, as always. Milo Bennett made an impressive debut to First XVIII football with an unbelievable 16 tackles for the game and a performance warranting third best for the day. Year 10, Loch Rawlinson made his debut and proved his ability on the field of First XVIII football. Mark Manno another debutante, proved to be an effective utility player throughout the game.

Round 7 – PAC v Rostrevor

Rostrevor College had displayed their extreme determination to re-establish their reputation as one of the league's best. As they had a number of convincing wins against quality sides and a close loss against St Peter's College they were well on their way. Our game was built up with the primary message to 'Be a Big Game Player' and the boys entered the field fuelled with this notion. However, it didn't translate in the performance with the side slightly trailing at half time with our two Year 10 players who provided the majority of the spark. A half time address that will probably ring in the ears of many players, inspired the side as they took they took control of the game in the second half and ensured that the ball spent more time in our forward line. The final result was a 34-point victory against a well accomplished side after producing only 50 minutes of football. It was reassuring although it wasn't our best football, but the game reflected the ability and growth of the group.

Luca Slade produced an exceptional fourth quarter effort and kicked five goals. Charlie Adams demonstrated success around the stoppages and Loch Rawlinson displayed a consistent show of class from start to finish in only his second game at First XVIII level. Oscar Law and Will O'Brien debuted and both showed glimpses of their ability to succeed at this level. Will O'Brien kicked the goal of the year with an impressive kick on the boundary with very little margin for error.

Round 8 PAC v Trinity College

The team_made a lengthy trip out to Trinity College, Gawler to complete our final game of the season in the lead up to Intercol. After our disappointing first half in the previous week and the feeling that the players were relying on too much coaching direction, it was put to the core Leadership Group members to drive the game. This relied on the Captain Harry Tunkin running the pre-game address and the pregame warm-up and Vice-Captain Harry McInnes to collaborate with the skipper for the half time and post-game address. Although it was a risk, the aim was to develop team and individual accountability. On this occasion the players rose to the challenge, kicking the first goal within seven seconds and stamping their dominance on the game, while sending a message to St Peter's College that we were peaking at the right time. A 126-point win produced in a game where each quarter had been shortened to 20 minutes was enough to startle opposition viewers and excite our supporters. Kane McAuliffe was unstoppable with contested balls, ground balls and aerial contests. Harry Tunkin provided plenty of grunt while also steering the team

for the day with precision and passion. Josh Fedele returned to the side on a mission to impress with a hard working four quarter display. Harry McInnes and Luca Slade combined for nine goals to round out the occasion. Tom Bromley added to the selection pressure with a solid performance in the backlines in his debut game playing after a lengthy hamstring injury.

Round 9 PAC v St Peter's Intercol

The final test of the season gained a tremendous amount of traction in the lead up to the match. St Peter's College would field a side featuring the whole cohort of their talent, including a host of State players and two very strong draft prospects. Our boys would receive a boost from a series of video messages sent through from some of the household names that had been in this position in the past. They wished the boys well and painted a clear picture of what it meant to them and how to prepare in the lead up. Troy McKinnon designed and introduced a heritage guernsey for the game which was inspired by one of the original designs. The original had been worn by players 150 years prior, in what was the initiation of this incredible competition that has run consecutively since that point in time.

The message to the boys was clear. We filter better to 22 than the opposition and we are a tougher side. For these reasons, all players need to consistently contribute, play tight giving no space away, win the contested ball with aggression and then simply work harder to cover more ground at speed. The boys delivered, heading into the first break with a seven-goal lead and shocking our biggest rivals in the process. An arm wrestle in the second term kept the score line reasonably consistent, with the third term completing the destruction and ending any hope for the visitors. A 29-point win was the result with a few late St Peter's College goals softening the scoreboard for them. Harry Tunkin and Jake Walker were exceptional with physicality and clean hand and foot skills. Luca Slade impressed with agility, flair and four goals, Tom Bromley and Hughen Wissman took playing for the team to a new level by giving St Peter's marquee players no space to ensure they had no impact on the game.

It was an enormous display of class, high intensity and physical football to achieve an impressive win in a game that marked the 150th year of competition. It was also the final Winter Intercol for Principal Mr Bradley Fenner. A post-game celebration dinner in the city ensured that the win was duly honoured and celebrated by all those involved.






U14s

Soccer

Soccer at Prince Alfred College has continued to make inroads in 2021. Whilst Senior and First XI Coach Phil Stubbins continued his fine work with the Senior School, the key appointment of Michael Matricciani saw significant growth in the Preparatory School and the Middle School.

Phil's support meant that, Michael was able to share his considerable knowledge and experience to not only help boys to develop their skills but also nurture our young coaches in their own development. This has been reinforced with many fine performances on field and representation continues to be steady across the College.

Overall, soccer coaching at PAC has changed considerably over the years and the success that soccer has experienced over the last few years has been due to five factors: the athlete, the coach, the organisation, the culture and the environment. They were highlighted by P Chelladurai in his book *Leadership in Sports; Handbook in sports psychology (2007)*, Of these, the first two, the athlete and the coach are the most influential as these arguably have an immense impact and influence on the other three factors. The coaches ability to communicate with players, not only during practises and on match days but also off the field, has been significant in building a positive culture and environment.

Coaches have recognised the importance of progression not only in terms of skills but also teamwork and decision making. As a result, many training sessions have been crafted to maximise a player's development in these key areas. As such, many sessions have been organised to challenge players in a pressurised scenario which have been rewarding as this has often been translated to match days. The high energy training environments has enabled boys to cope on match days and allowed them to make decisions without relying on coaches' input.

Culturally, there has been an enormous shift particularly in our senior teams and although it was not always translated into success in terms of results, it played a huge part in maintaining a positive and enjoyable environment. This was particularly evident in our First XI team this year. After losing seven key players from 2020, the leadership of Laurence Galluccio, with assistance from his Vice Captains, Zak Unerkov and Nick Nomikos was instrumental in turning around the team's fortunes. The three boys were able to create an environment in which every member regardless of how much game time they played, were important and all were encouraged to have a voice. This attitude was particularly evident during the last part of the season with a come from behind win against our huge rivals St Peter's College. Despite going behind 1-0, the boys were able to maintain their focus and dominate their opponents to win 2-1. This success was in part due to the team's spirit which had been nurtured by not only First XI coach Phil Stubbins but also by Laurence, Nick and Zak.

The quality of coaching has been highlighted by their ability to encourage each boy to get the best out of themselves. Each has in their unique way used their role to teach more important life lessons beyond sport and recognised that what they teach and how they teach it will have an impact beyond their years at PAC. Foundation

As it has since its establishment in 1974, the Foundation has worked closely with the College community to ensure the tradition of giving which established us and continues to the benefit of current, future and past students.

Projects supported through philanthropy are indeed diverse. In March recipients of the Ken Lord Family Boarding Scholarship joined with Mr Ken Lord to celebrate his 94th birthday. An afternoon tea was held in the Ashton Room and parents joined via Zoom from their remote locations, adding their best wishes to Mr Lord and to hear his speech in response to a toast made by Year 11 student, Cody Morris.

This proved to be the last occasion Mr Lord met with the 'my boys,' as he fondly called them before his death in September. The College was represented at Ken's funeral by past recipients Henry Slade (2020), Seb Desmazures (2019) and Charlie Treloar (2016), staff member Molly Dyer, and I was proud to speak of Ken's scholarship and his legacy. Boys from the outback will benefit from Ken's vision and generosity for many years to come. Thank you, Ken Lord.

The Foundation also facilitates the activities of the Grandies Club and this year the group met three times: Wambana day trip, the annual morning tea, and Christmas Lunch. The morning tea will be long remembered for the Scone Bake Off pitting Thomas Catford (Year 11) and his grandma Mary Catford against Will Wheaton (Year 12) and his grandma Meredith Paterson. It was lovely to see the spirit of the boys and their Grandies as they strived to make the perfect batch.



Canberra Christmas Drinks



It is a difficult task to truly honour a man who has not only been a good friend and work colleague for over 26 years of working together, but also one of my unofficial mentors. On his retirement, Phil McLaughlin would have served in education for 45 years with over 36 years at Prince Alfred College.

Phil was appointed to Prince Alfred College by the then Headmaster, Mr Geoffrey Bean in 1985. He quickly entrenched himself in many school activities such as Junior Cricket, Senior Hockey, Sailing, Scuba Diving, Coordinating the annual Ski Trip, Coordinator of Pedal Prix teams and to be honest, the list went on and on.

Phil was a pioneer in the Pedal Prix world but also worked on the SSABSA advisory committee for many years. He was appointed Manager of the Clipsal Innovation Centre, on which he had overseen the design and construction of in 1995. It was a truly exciting time for the Technology, Science and Art departments as this building tied what were separate faculties together. It was in this building that Phil conceived many more Pedal Prix, Solar Cycle and Model Solar boat and car teams.

Phil led the construction teams of Sunboat I and Sunboat II and in early 1999, after a 56-day voyage and 4170km on the Murray River. SunBoat II was awarded a World Record for its carbon neutral journey.

In 2001, after several roles as Acting Head of Blacket (now Watsford), Phil was appointed as Head of Year 8 and then later as Deputy Head of Boarding in 2009.

Phil was pivotal in the introduction of blood donations within the school by eligible and willing Princes boys and staff for several years. He also managed after school cooking classes for our boys at Annesley College, which became the prelude to the now highly successful eduCook program. He also performed other roles such as the Duke of Edinburgh Coordinator, Table Tennis Coordinator, President of the Staff Common Room, VET Assessor/Trainer, WEA Adult Education Tutor and Royal Show Technology Judge.

Phil also played a huge part in many of the schools musicals and drama productions as a set designer and builder. It seemed this man loving known by boys and staff as 'Mr Mac' had no limit to his talents and drive to help others.

And so, it is with great pride, sadness and a little bit of jealousy that I farewell my colleague. I have learnt much from Phil over the past 26 years from an educational standpoint but also as a fellow man, husband and father.

Thank you for all your skills and wisdom you have passed on to many over your 45-year journey. Thank you for the relationships you have built with so many Princes boys over the past 36 plus years and most of all thank you for being part of a wonderful Design and Technology faculty.
