Adam Liaw (b.1978)

PAC 1983-1994

Adam attended PAC from 1983 until 1994. He went on to study Science and Law at the University of Adelaide, attaining two degrees before practicing law at Adelaide firm Kelly & Co., and later as the Head of Asia Pacific Legal Affairs at the Walt Disney Company based in Tokyo. The opportunity to return home and ultimately fulfill his dream came in the form of MasterChef Series 2. Having lived in Japan, Adam knew little about the series but in late 2009 he took the plunge, quit his job and returned to Australia to line up with 7000 others, all hopeful to secure a place in the top 50. On the 25th July 2010 watched by over 5.7 million people, Adam completed a gruelling round of final tests to be crowned the winner of the second season of MasterChef. In the most coveted part of the prize package, Adam is writing his first cookbook, to be titled 'Two Asian Kitchens' a mix of Asian and Australian fusion.



Edward Brockhoff (b.1984)

PAC 1997-2001

Edward attended PAC on a full scholarship from 1997 until 2001, graduating as Co-Dux. He was then awarded a full scholarship to study Law and International Relations at Bond University. He served as Student Council President and represented Australia in the international rounds of the Jessup International Law Mooting Competition in Washington DC. After graduating with First Class Honours and as Valedictorian in 2006, Edward travelled through North America, Europe and Asia for one year. Returning to South Australia, he was appointed Associate to two South Australian Supreme Court justices. Edward relocated to Canberra in 2008 to become Associate to Justice Michael Kirby of the High Court of Australia. He was the first graduate of either PAC or Bond to serve as a High Court Associate. In 2009, Edward interned in Tanzania with the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda, followed by nine months exploring Africa, the Middle East and the Balkans. On his return to Australia, Edward took up a position with Save the Children.



Mark Hosking (b.1985)

PAC 1996-2003

Mark attended PAC from 1996 to 2003, graduating as Dux of the School. Mark was awarded a full scholarship to study Law and Commerce at the University of Adelaide and graduated in 2009 with First Class Honours. During his time at university, Mark represented South Australia as an adjudicator at the National Debating Championships. He also represented the University of Adelaide in a number of national competitions, including the Sir Harry Gibbs Moot and the Australian Law Students' Association Open Moot. For two years Mark taught in the School of Commerce at the University of Adelaide. After leaving university, Mark worked as an intern at the International Criminal Tribunal for the former Yugoslavia, a United Nations court situated in The Hague. Moving to Melbourne in 2010, he commenced work as a lawyer at the law firm Allens Arthur Robinson. More recently Mark accepted a position as Associate to Justice Susan Crennan of the High Court of Australia.



Christopher Davies (b.1987)

PAC 1996-2004

Chris Davies attended PAC from 1996 until 2004. Chris was an outstanding student with a great interest in Mathematics. In 2007 he completed his Bachelor of Mathematical and Computer Sciences majoring in Statistics and Pure Mathematics.

His academic awards included:

- Dean's Certificate of Merit for academic achievement in Chemistry.
- E S Barnes Prize for the highest distinction in third year Pure Mathematics.
- J R Wilton Prize for the student with the greatest distinction in third year courses in Mathematical Sciences.
- David Murray Scholarship for most outstanding results in completing a Bachelor of Mathematical and Computer Sciences.

In 2008 Chris was awarded a first class Honours Degree from the University of Adelaide. He was awarded the Applied Probability Trust Prize for the highest Honours achieved in Applied Probability or Statistics. For outstanding academic merit throughout his undergraduate studies, Chris was awarded the University Medal.
